CURRENT ORGANIZATION

On July 1, 2011, the organizational structure of the NC State Capitol Police Division was reorganized to focus on security in and around State-owned buildings in Wake County. The current sixty-one (61) agency personnel are classified as follows:

TYPE OF PERSONNEL

PERSONNEL ASSIGNMENTS

State Capitol Police sworn law enforcement officers and non-sworn security guards are assigned to state-owned buildings and have duty assignments relative to the security, operation, and/or back-up support of such buildings.

Police telecommunicators are assigned to the agency's communications center and provide telecommunication services during business hours of 8a.m. - 5p.m.

The support staff is an Administrative Secretary who has the responsibility of providing administrative support for the agency.

The majority of building security services are being provided during the standard business hours of 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. Limited after-hours services are provided at five government buildings pursuant to facility needs.




Temporary funding from the Department of Administration has made it possible to staff the agency's Communication Center on a 24/7

basis.



Temporary funding has provided for the continuation of support services, it is not a permanent solution to these vital services.



The maintenance of the communication center makes it possible to monitor crimes in progress at government buildings, however, calls for police/security services at most buildings are forwarded to the Raleigh Police Department or the Wake County Sheriff's Office for response during non-business hours.

DISCONTINUED SERVICES

- As a result of the budget cut and reduction in force the following service have been discontinued:
- Conduct Routine Patrols of State-owned Property
- Investigate Threats Against Government Officials
- Investigate Crimes and File Criminal Charges at State Prisons in Wake Co.
- Conduct Comprehensive Criminal Investigations for Crimes Committed Against the State
- Provide Supreme and Appellate Court Bailiff Services
- Provide Police & Security Support at Administrative Hearings at State Agencies
- Provide Police Protection and Crowd Control at Central Prison during Executions
- Coordinate with the US Department of Homeland Security to Prevent Terrorism
- Conduct Limited Traffic Safety & Enforcement Functions



RISKS & VULNERABILITIES

- SCP manpower shortage and lack of personnel to cover critical facilities.
- No personnel redundancy which leads to unprotected/vulnerable facilities.
- No police personnel to provide safety, security, and the prevention of damage/loss to state government during non-business hours.

RISKS & VULNERABILITIES

- Rise in vagrancy complaints from government employees resulting from no police presence.
- Lack of personnel to provide general security services to state agencies:
 - Bank Escorts
 - St. Government Parking Enforcement
 - Prisoner transport from state buildings to jail

Vacant Buildings

- Since July 1, 2011 state buildings have at some point been vacant of law enforcement/security officers due to personnel shortages:
 - Albemarle State Treasurer
 - Old Revenue Sec. of State
 - SBI Lab Crime Laboratory
 - Archdale Public Safety/DENR
 - New Education Public Instruction
 - Ruffin Court of Appeals
 - Justice Supreme Court
 - Bath Public Health
