Cooperative and Innovative High Schools (CIHS) and Regional Schools	2004	\$27,140,000	High schools created with an LEA and a college or university that target at-risk students. Students generally can earn college credits for their courses.	<a href="#">Annually by March 15th</a>
Test Bonuses	2017	\$22,900,000	Teachers are given a bonus based on the number of their students who score proficient/passing/well on AP, IB, CTE, and some EOG tests. This bonus was not given in Jan of 2021 due to testing disruptions in Spring 2020 as a result of the pandemic. 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School Resource Officers (SROs)	2013 (expanded in 2018 and 2019)	\$18,000,000	The State provides a grant for LEAs to employ additional SROs in elementary and middle schools.	<a href="#">Annually by March 1</a>
Virtual Charter Schools Pilot	2014	Funded out of SPSF as other charters, last year \$13,900,000	Authorizes two virtual, public charter schools to operate statewide. AP Test Fees	2014	\$9,331,184	The State covers all Advanced Placement (AP) test fees for students enrolled in an AP course.	<a href="#">Annually by December 15th</a>

IB Test Fees	2014	\$1,500,000	The State covers International Baccalaureate (IB) test fees for students enrolled in the IB program.	<a href="#">Annually by Dec. 15th</a>
Advanced Teaching Roles/Teacher Comp Models	2016	\$1,500,000	A program that allows highly effective teachers to earn additional pay by mentoring beginning teachers or taking responsibility for additional students. Designed to create opportunities for advancement in teaching and to help with teacher retention.	<a href="#">Annually by Oct. 15th</a>
CTE Test Fees	2010	\$1,302,243	For students who take Career and Technical Education (CTE) courses, the State covers testing costs necessary in order to receive official credentials from professional organizations.	<a href="#">Annually by March 15th</a>
TeachNC	2021 (taken over from nonprofit)	\$100,000 R/\$880,000NR	Online platform designed to help prospective teachers earn a teaching credential and find employment in NC public schools.	Annually by March 15

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Innovative School District (ISD)	2016	\$434,173 supplemental (also receive ADM funding)	Created as a non-geographic school district to work with consistently low-performing schools to develop innovative models in order to improve performance. Computer Science	2018	\$323,125	To create NC computer science standards and increase the teaching of computer science in NC public schools, especially to female and minority students.	<a href="#">Dashboard</a>
Feminine Hygiene Products	2021	\$250,000 NR	A one-year pilot program to provide public school units with grants for feminine hygiene products for students.	Due March 15, 2022
Even Start Family Literacy	1988	\$78,567	Collaboration between LEAs and nonprofits to support families from birth to age 7. Provides family-based services and early childhood education. Supported also by federal funds.	<a href="#">Overview of Early Childhood Programs</a>
