States that have done this show it to be a far more secure method when all registered voters are mailed a ballot a few weeks in advance of the election. This gives them time to research candidates, fill out the ballot, and return it to the Board of Elections or their local post office. The Board of Elections could hire staff to count the ballots, and much money could be saved by the counties by not having to support several hundred polling sites and pollworker salaries. It would also lessen the danger of a resurgence of the Coronavirus, which is considered by health experts to be a distinct possibility. Initiating a ranked choice system of first, second, and third choice would also avoid any costly runoffs and give voters the opportunity to vote for their first, second, or third choice of candidates. Voters would have to be informed well in advance about the benefits of this so they understand the process, but I believe it would be well worth using this election as a pilot program.</li> <li>Secure elections- save money- avoid runoffs- give voters choices to rate candidates- and maybe save the State.</li> </ul>
03/30/2020 03:08 PM	Continuity of State Operations (Emergency Services, Elections & Public Safety) Working Group	Mr. Sam Watts	From the State Retirement System: A provision from last year's legislative budget would have been very helpful to have had in place prior to the current public health emergency. Section 35.2(a) & (b) of HB 966 from last year would allow for the use of electronic identity authentication by the Retirement System in lieu of notarization for transactions with the state and local retirement systems. Given that our office is currently closed to the public because of the health emergency, we are unable to allow members to drop off paperwork and have it notarized by our staff. This current situation requires members to seek outside notary services and to mail the papers to us. While I realize this is a short-term limitation today, the fact that we are functioning in this manner highlights the long-term wisdom of allowing us to get this updated process in place as soon as practicable. Particularly since it's not unthinkable that we could have another wave or two of COVID-19 outbreaks before the emergency is over it would make sense to move forward on this initiative. Even though House Bill 966 was not enacted because of the budget impasse, the Retirement System staff went ahead and built the infrastructure to use online identity authentication into the refunds process using existing resources. We also have determined that we can begin to build the online process into other processes as we do routine maintenance on our automated systems, so we no longer need to non-recurring portion of the original request. We do, however, in order to begin using what we built, still need the recurring portion of the request as it would fund a new contract for a software maintenance agreement with a provider of the identity authentication service. The

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			recurring appropriation would be \$300,000 per year. The special provision language is needed to adjust the retirement statutes to allow for alternatives to notarization.
			I would also be neglectful if I didn't mention that the paper notarization process would be retained by the division and available to members who don't choose to use the online option.

It may be necessary to deliver ballots by mail, in order to allow voters to receive them safely. Second, counties must be given the resources necessary to both recruit more poll workers for the election and protect their health if the virus is still a threat. We have seen in recent weeks, as some ill-advised states continue to hold their primary elections, that a lack of poll workers has crippled the voting process for many Americans; we must ensure this does not happen here. Third, provisions must be made to give county election boards the necessary flexibility and financial resources to create early voting plans for the fall election. With this data in mind, we make the following suggestions: • Expedite the process for ensuring additional federal funding coming into the state for such programs as home delivered meals gets to the local level quickly. For example, many programs already have waiting lists for people needing meals and demand is expected to grow with this crisis. In addition, numerous programs many have to make accommodations in their food procurement and delivery process which will be more expensive and funding for this is not included in their current budget. • Take steps to ensure that people can get the services they need. This may entail granting state agencies flexibility to approve modifications in how services are delivered, where they are delivered, by whom they are delivered, how they are reimbursed, and what the reimbursement rate is. For ex

• Since having adequate staffing is a critical issue in all settings from home care to longterm care facilities, look at ways to better support existing staff as well as steps the state can take to expand the workforce all across the continuum from direct care workers to medical personnel. Policies pertaining to health care access, sick leave benefits, child care assistance, and other work place provisions need to be examined. In addition, potential options for increasing the supply of workers such as allowing medical and nursing students to graduate early, addressing provisions relative to locum tenens providers, fast tracking reciprocity of licensure for providers from out of state, relaxing scope of practice requirements, and promoting the use of volunteers and non-clinicians as feasible need to be explored.

• Older adult on fixed incomes, including those whose life savings are tied to the stock market or volatile pension plans, may be at risk of having insufficient money coming in to cover basic expenses such as housing, food, transportation, and medical co-pays, deductibles and premiums. Attention needs to be directed to identifying ways to support those at risk through efforts such as short-term financial assistance and counseling on options and budgeting.

· Make grants available to local aging service providers to expand their services to reach out to older adults in their communities, including many they have not previously served. Many agencies are already increasing their efforts in such areas as telephone reassurance to older adults who live alone, assistance to family caregivers, providing help to seniors who need services such as prescription pick-up and food delivery, and matching volunteers to seniors in need. It is anticipated that these agencies will also be called upon to assist seniors who have problems receiving their federal stimulus check. Because many local agencies operate on a very tight budget, they do not have the staff or resources to sustain these efforts. Because of the social distancing policies in place due to the pandemic, older adults are at increased risk of social isolation. There is strong evidence that social isolation and loneliness is associated with poor health and higher rates of mortality among the elderly. Many of the enhanced efforts being undertaken by local aging agencies are directly related to addressing social isolation. Also due to the stay at home orders and social distancing provisions, many agencies are implementing continuous operations plans to support working remotely. Some agencies do not have equipment such as cell phones, laptops, tablets, and other items needed to help ensure they are able to operate with new requirements, and funding for these items were not included in current operating budgets.

• Ensure that staff working with older adults in the home (ex. from local aging agencies and county departments of social services) and in all care settings (including home care, hospice, assisted living, and nursing home) have adequate personal protective equipment (PPE). In addition to gloves, face masks, and gowns, there is also a need for adequate supplies of diapers, wipes, and hand sanitizer. Staff who work with older adults, particularly those with compromised immune systems, should also be a priority for COVID-19 testing.

• Address measures to combat frauds and scams targeting the elderly. Many older adults are very anxious about the COVID-19 virus and this along with the increased social isolation that some of them are facing makes them more vulnerable to fraud and financial exploitation.

· Because there is great dependence on the use of the Internet, not only for using

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			telemedicine as a substitute for office visits with doctors and other medical providers but for such things as providing a source of communication for older adults in long-term care facilities with their family members who are now restricted from visiting them, access to reliable broadband and technology needs to be available in every community in our state. • Due to the COVIS-19 virus, there is heightened concern among some older adults about estate planning, and executing documents such as wills, powers of attorney, and health care powers of attorney which require witnesses and notaries. Due to the provisions of current state law, these sorts of transactions are now becoming more difficult. Some states have enacted provisions for electronic wills and remote notarization statutes. The General Assembly should consult with the NC Bar Association's Elder and Special Needs Law Section, the NC Association of County Directors of Social Services, and other relevant entities to evaluate the need for changing North Carolina requirements pertaining to these legal documents. In addition to examining absentee voting provisions, the General Assembly and the State Board of Elections should look into the possibility of expanding the use of Multipartisan Assistance Teams (MATs). These teams are currently maintained by every County Board of Elections to help those in facilities such as nursing homes, hospitals, and assisted living facilities request and submit absentee ballots. The role of MATs could be expanded to assist anyone outside of these facilities who needs assistance.
			· Many of the agencies who provide services to older adults are non-profits which rely on

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			charitable giving and fund raising to fund significant percentages of their budgets. Agencies are already seeing a reduction in giving and many of them have had to cancel fund raising event for the foreseeable future. We encourage the General Assembly to consider a tax change to add a targeted, temporary giving credit or deduction that would be available to all North Carolinians to encourage them to support the work of charitable organizations in their communities.
			• There are more than 1,200 people over the age of 65 in prisons in the state. Elderly prisoners are more likely to have multiple or serious health conditions like heart disease or diabetes that could lead to higher risk of COVID-19. Under North Carolina law, some people who are terminally ill, permanently and totally disabled or age 65 or older can be released and returned home through medical release. Also, the Secretary of the Department of Public Instruction has authority to "extend the limits of confinement" for people who are permanently and totally disabled or terminally ill so they can receive medical care outside of prison. We recommend that the General Assembly examine the medical release and medical furlough provisions as they apply to older prisoners to determine if they are being used to the current extend needed to save as many lives as possible, conserve prison healthcare resources, and protect the public health. Individuals with cardiovascular disease are at higher risk of adverse health outcomes from COVID-19. For this reason, it is essential that states take timely, meaningful, and appropriate actions to ensure that the health care system has adequate capacity to provide necessary care to patients with heart disease and robustly addresses public health needs.
			The AHA believes everyone, including Medicaid enrollees, should have access to quality and affordable health coverage. As the nation's oldest and largest organization dedicated to fighting heart disease and stroke, the AHA represents over 100 million patients with cardiovascular disease (CVD) including many who rely on Medicaid as their primary source of care.
			Nationally, 28% of adults with Medicaid coverage have a history of cardiovascular disease. Medicaid provides critical access to prevention, treatment, disease management, and care coordination services for these individuals. Because low-income populations are disproportionately affected by CVD – with these adults reporting higher rates of heart disease, hypertension, and stroke – Medicaid serves as the coverage backbone for the healthcare services these individuals need. Even before COVID-19, North Carolina residents with risk factors for heart disease and stroke who lack health insurance or are underinsured are more likely to die early and have poorer blood pressure control than their insured counterparts. Furthermore, uninsured stroke patients suffer from greater neurological impairments, longer hospital stays, and a higher risk of death than similar patients covered by health insurance.
			<ul> <li>While work continues at the Federal level to provide a more robust, comprehensive approach to addressing the spread of this epidemic, the patients and consumers we represent ask North Carolina to take swift action to:</li> <li>remove barriers to COVID-19 testing and treatment;</li> <li>promote continuity of care for Americans with serious health conditions;</li> </ul>

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			<ul> <li>and waive rules that require in-person interactions that promote community spread of COVID-19.</li> </ul>
			With these goals in mind, we urge the General Assembly to pass legislation and work with the Executive branch to enact emergency measures that allow for increased funding and access for Medicaid and public health services to immediately respond to the current crisis. We also urge you to consider additional critical measures that will protect people with pre-existing conditions during this pandemic.
			Medicaid and State-Regulated Commercial Insurance Coverage The purpose of the Medicaid program is to provide health care coverage for low-income individuals and families. In light of the current public health crisis and uncertain economic outlook, the necessity for a robust and stable Medicaid program is more important now than ever. We call on both the executive and legislative branch to take action to ensure quality health care is available, accessible, and affordable to all state residents, including over one million North Carolinians who are currently uninsured.
			Additionally, given these perilous times and due to the increased availability of plans that are not required to meet federal patient protection standards – including short-term limited duration plans and association health plans – many Americans are enrolled in insurance-like products that may not cover testing or treatment for COVID-19, putting them at substantial financial risk. The American Heart Association supports efforts in Congress to increase the federal matching assistance percentage (FMAP) and urge North Carolina to take the following steps to promote access to coverage, remove barriers to coverage, allow access to COVID-19 testing, treatment, and vaccine, and ensure access to sufficient supplies of medication and pertinent pharmaceuticals to all vulnerable populations, regardless of insurance coverage.

Promote access to coverage and Close the Health Insurance Coverage Gap Streamlining and removing barriers to Medicaid eligibility is an immediate step states can take to expand access to health insurance coverage that includes testing and treatment. The AHA strongly encourages the North Carolina legislature work with the Executive Branch to quickly expand access to eligible individuals. Closing the health insurance coverage gap is critical to increasing access to affordable, accessible health care for those at risk of exposure to COVID-19.

Additionally, AHA recommends:

- · adopting additional eligibility groups;
- · increasing effective income standards;
- · expanding hospital presumptive eligibility groups; and
- removing of cost-sharing.

Access to COVID-19 testing, treatment, and vaccine

It is critical that anyone with a chronic condition, compromised immune system, or vulnerable population who needs diagnostic testing related to COVID-19 is able to receive testing at no cost. In this emergency, we cannot allow affordability of testing and associated care to become a barrier that prevents people from taking appropriate action if

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			they show symptoms. We urge you to immediately extend free coverage of COVID-19 diagnosis and testing to uninsured individuals and the vulnerable population in greatest need. As authorized in H.R. 6201, this option is now available to states and can be covered 100% with federal funding.
			Telemedicine Telemedicine has the potential to offer individuals and families access to health care services from the safety of their own home. The state should continue to expand access to and availability of telemedicine services during the COVID-19 pandemic to ensure that patients can easily access health care expertise while simultaneously practicing safe social distancing—allowing patients to avoid being exposed to COVID-19 in provider waiting rooms, exam rooms, and during associated travel. North Carolina should ensure that telemedicine services are covered at no higher cost-sharing than similar in-person visits, and that policies foster rather than frustrate provider participation in telemedicine services.
			The American Heart Association appreciates your tireless efforts to contain the spread of COVID-19 and to work cooperatively and expeditiously to ensure the nation's citizens and vulnerable patients are protected and have access to needed healthcare during these critical times.

We know that you, like us, are attuned to the economic challenges facing those across our state, as well as the need for an adequate and equitable response to this pandemic.</li> <li>Our work at the Budget &amp; Tax Center to advance smart public investments that connect more people to economic opportunity and the supports to achieve greater well-being is informed by rigorous policy and data analysis, engagement with people directly impacted by poverty and exclusion, and assessments of the long-term needs of our state to ensure that all communities can thrive.</li> <li>In our work to date cataloguing the ongoing and potential impacts to people and communities of COVID-19, it is clear that quickly mobilizing state and federal dollars to respond in a timely and aggressive manner is critical – first, to contain the spread of COVID-19 and meet public health needs with the necessary health care, including medical supplies, and supports to social distancing requirements, and second, to stabilize the economic harm to people and communities.</li> </ul>

Name

While we, along with our parent organization the North Carolina Justice Center, will provide additional recommendations in subsequent communications with working group members. The priority areas we have identified are based on the principles of equity, adequacy, and sustained smart investments that will help our response now and build a strong infrastructure for the future. These include making sure our health-care systems and front-line workers in health care, child care, food service, and logistics, for example, have protections and needed supplies while people have access to health care and treatment; that our unemployment insurance system has the staffing and technology to respond to unprecedented claims; and that the state rules for the program are fixed to provide adequate wage replacement, making sure people can safely shelter in place and practice social distancing without putting their economic security at risk.

The Budget & Tax Center stands ready to work with you toward public health and economic solutions that will strengthen our communities in both the immediate and long term so that every person in our state can be healthy and secure. We urge the Committee to propose a balanced approach to financing immediate attempts to slow the spread of COVID-19 and buffer against the secondary but real economic effects to farmers, small businesses, and people who are struggling to meet their basic needs.

Here are three core approaches to the fiscal impacts of COVID-19 that we hope will guide the work of the Committee and the NC General Assembly more broadly.

• First, leverage Federal dollars for their intended purpose and for maximum and equitable impact. Federal funds represent nearly a third of the public dollars invested in North Carolina. Federal funds, as in prior recessions, will ideally comprise the majority of dollars for the long-term response so that we can sustain investments in needed infrastructure and services and stabilize households and the economy. Congress has already passed legislation directing dollars toward states, including \$150 billion that states and local governments can draw down right away to meet virus-related costs. It is estimated that this will result in roughly \$3.5 billion for North Carolina's state investments and \$481 million for local governments. While critical, this is likely to be too little to stabilize budgets throughout the COVID-19 response and to meet the increased expenditures necessary to meet the needs in communities and for families. North Carolina should join the chorus of states calling on our federal delegation to continue to provide additional resources, especially for families most impacted by COVID-19.

• Second, deploy existing State funds to strengthen the infrastructure of response and make public systems more durable in sustained support of the well-being of all. This should be done in consideration that Rainy Day Funds may need to be available for a natural disaster and that the unappropriated balance is the result of not having a budget that keeps up with the needs of a growing state. As of February 29, 2020, the Savings Reserve balance totaled \$1.17 billion. Use of these dollars should be restricted to meeting the immediate needs of people impacted by the coronavirus epidemic who need assistance meeting basic needs, including accessing food, maintaining housing, and receiving the health-care services they need. As of Friday, March 13, the unappropriated General Fund balance totals \$2 billion. These funds should be put toward long-term

			rebuilding of public infrastructure that will put people to work and be a boon for the economy.
			• Third, special Trust Funds or other dedicated capital dollars should be driven toward employment stabilization and critical infrastructure needs at this time. According to the

employment stabilization and critical infrastructure needs at this time. According to the U.S. Department of Labor, North Carolina had approximately \$4 billion in the state Trust Fund as of the 4th quarter of 2019. These funds should support fixes to the state's unemployment insurance system to ensure that it reaches those who are impacted by COVID-19 and not served by the new federal Pandemic Unemployment Assistance program, as well as go toward fixes in the wage replacement calculations and duration of the program.

Capital dollars should continue to be deployed to keep people at work as long as social distancing practices allow. North Carolina has a backlog of physical infrastructure that

needs upgrading, and keeping people employed in this time who can safely work is critical. Importantly, broadband has never been more clearly needed in communities across the state. It is critical to drive existing public dollars that can't be safely spent on other projects at this time to invest in this infrastructure that keeps those who can work remotely connected to jobs or supports students' continued learning at home.

• Finally, we urge you to stand ready to expand the state's capacity to invest in ways that don't make our tax code more upside-down. North Carolina has already incurred significant costs associated with slowing the spread of COVID-19. As economic activity plummets, state revenues will be significantly lower than projected. While it is unclear whether existing federal and state funds will be sufficient, it appears likely, given the abrupt and expansive slow-down in the economy, that new capacity to meet needs will be required. Should that need arise, we stand ready to offer sound, equitable revenue options that will also support our ability to invest long-term.

We look forward to a bi-partisan process and quick movement to advance solutions that support the immediate and long-term well-being of every North Carolinian— and we will urge Senator Berger and Senate members to do the same. We hope that work in both chambers and productive engagement with the Governor and agency leadership will ensure a robust and equitable response to this crisis that is guided by people-first principles.

The following policies provide a good starting point towards that objective.

			First, the General Assembly should codify and expand upon the waiver of the state's Certificate of Need (CON) regulations issued by Department of Health and Human Services and the North Carolina Emergency Management Division.
			The waiver loosens regulations on hospital beds for existing CON holders. The General Assembly should extend the waiver to include all facilities and equipment currently covered under CON restrictions. Expanding the total supply of healthcare – even non- COVID related services – could help mitigate the impact of this crisis. The pandemic may be less likely to overwhelm provider capacity if non-coronavirus patients can be treated at alternative facilities, such as ambulatory surgery centers.
			Second, the General Assembly should expand the scope of practice for both pharmacists and advanced practice registered nurses (APRN). Florida recently passed legislation to allow pharmacists to test and treat for the flu, strep throat, and other non-chronic conditions. Providing North Carolina pharmacists with the same freedom would be a simple way to free up other healthcare providers to treat COVID-19 patients, and would provide patients a safer way to deal with their medical needs with less risk of being exposed to COVID-19 themselves by going into a hospital or doctor's office.
			APRNs, such as nurse practitioners or certified registered nurse anesthetists, have long advocated for loosening the restrictions on their ability to practice within the full scope of their training. The supervisory physician requirements are overly burdensome and can prevent qualified healthcare professionals from even volunteering during times of crisis. The language from the SAVE Act, filed in 2019 as House Bill 185 with broad bi-partisan support, could go a long way to expanding the scope of practice for APRNs.
			Finally, the legislature should expand the state's telemedicine capacity. The governor's out- of-state healthcare licensing reciprocity should be expanded by the legislature to include the provision of telemedicine. The legislature should also resist the urge to over-regulate telemedicine through burdensome parity or coverage mandates. Many insurance companies are currently electing toward reimbursement parity for telemedicine during this crisis, and it should be up to insurance companies to negotiate reimbursement terms with providers in the future as well.

			We are a group of advocates and organizations who work on behalf of persons currently incarcerated in North Carolina and their friends and loved ones. We write regarding the unprecedented current global health emergency and the dire situation facing our state's prisons and jails. Our greatest fears and concerns are for the health and safety of the 35,010 people incarcerated in state prisons and the 14,000+ correctional staff working to better community safety. We have recently learned just how dire the situation is within correctional facilities and how ill-equipped correctional and medical staff are to handle an inevitable COVID-19 outbreak.
			For example, we learned the following from Governor Cooper's March 26 letter to the Sheriff's Association and from DPS's own data:

			<ul> <li>There is a shortage of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) available to correctional officers and the supply chain for this essential protective gear is compromised;</li> </ul>
			<ul> <li>There are no state facilities available for incarcerated patients to go who exhibit symptoms of or test positive for COVID-19.</li> </ul>
			A recent press release from NCDPS explained that these conditions have grown even worse in recent months with the statewide prison staff vacancy rate rising to 21 percent, requiring NCDPS to suspend operations at three prisons. In his letter to the NC Sheriff's Association regarding "this unprecedented crisis," Governor Cooper acknowledged our state's correctional facilities do "not have the capability to take on all high medical need offenders at this time." This incredibly troubling information illustrates the substantial risk incarcerated persons are facing and highlights the substantial risk facing correctional staff every day they show up for work. Furthermore, these conditions present safety risks to people in prisons and correctional staff not just directly via the risk of contracting the

to people in prisons and correctional staff not just directly via the risk of contracting the virus, but also due to the further erosion of staffing that will necessarily accompany an outbreak and will have a profound impact on the ability of corrections officers to maintain security within the prisons.

We are in a critical moment for mitigating the inevitable devastating effects of this global pandemic. Every hour that goes by without action is an hour the situation becomes more dire. We urge the General Assembly to act immediately to protect the health and safety of incarcerated persons and the correctional staff who work to secure and otherwise care for them. We will draw on the best practices of other states to recommend the specific measures we believe are necessary, and the ways in which we, as a coalition, stand ready to help. Virtually everyone will experience some form of financial hardship due to the disruption of social distancing measures but I think there's a massive difference in severity between people paying rent/mortgages and the people/entities to whom they are making those payments. Furthermore, I think it would be a mistake to use means-testing to control who can benefit from an intervention like this because the most marginalized people who most need this kind of support are also the people least capable of navigating a government bureaucracy. Something else that I think is critically important is to provide internet service as a public utility. Whether people are working from home, looking for a new job because they got laid off or simply streaming video content to keep themselves occupied - internet service is a crucial need during this pandemic and everyone with internet service would make it easier to ensure that vital public health information was disseminated far and wide through our most marginalized and vulnerable communities. As with rent/mortgage collectors, I believe that Internet Service Providers are far more capable of withstanding financial hardships brought about by the pandemic than the average North Carolinian and we should expect more from them than we do of ordinary citizens - (particularly their executive boards and shareholders).
