June 2005	 New Breed Inc. leases space in GTP One building, a 120,000 SF industrial grade facility at the TransPark.
April 2005	 Delta Connection carrier Atlantic Southeast Airlines (ASA) inaugurates new nonstop jet service between Kinston and Delta's largest hub in Atlanta.
February 2005	 Gov. Mike Easley announces that Workhorse Aviation Manufacturing LLC will open a manufacturing plant at the Global TransPark, creating 50 jobs over the next three years.
December 2004	 Delta Airlines announces the N.C. Global TransPark's airport terminal will be the site of new jet service between Kinston and Atlanta beginning April 1.
October 2004	 Construction completed on 20,000 square foot hangar for GTP tenant Aero Contractors Ltd.
June 2004	 GTP tenant Segrave Aviation, Inc. expands its charter operations, offering a Challenger 600 aircraft that can fly non-stop across the Atlantic Ocean or continental United States.
April 2004	 The Global TransPark and its development partner Duke Realty Corporation break ground on a 120,000 square foot speculative warehouse called GTP One. The building will be completed by the end of 2004.
March 2004	 A special edition of "Connections," the Global TransPark's regularly published newsletter, is distributed to more than 1,000 individuals across the state, nation, and overseas.
January 2004	 Global TransPark tenant Aero Contractors Ltd. announces its plans to construct a 20,000 square foot hangar at the GTP.
	 Consolidated Diesel reports saving \$800,000 in 2003 by using the GTP's Foreign-Trade Subzone.
December 2003	 Reports state that the Global TransPark is a finalist for a Boeing plant that would bring 800 to 1,200 jobs. Although Boeing chose to stay in Washington State for its new plant site, the TransPark received high levels of national and international exposure.
	 The GTP's Executive Committee votes to begin construction of three major industrial buildings: a 120,000 square foot speculative warehouse, a new operations and maintenance building, and a 200,000 square foot building, should one of several existing prospects agree to come to the GTP.
	 Longistics, a Raleigh-based logistics company, is named Foreign-Trade Zone operator for the GTP.
November 2003	 Crescent Road is renamed the Felix Harvey Parkway in honor of the longtime supporter of the N.C. Global TransPark. The four-lane road connects N.C. 58 to N.C. 258 in Lenoir County and will eventually extend to U.S. 70.
August 2003	 The Foreign-Trade Zones Board grants its approval for the GTP to expand its Foreign-Trade Zone into a 35-acre site in Rocky Mount, N.C. This expansion site will be operated by Kanban Logistics.
July 2003	 Isaac Manning, a real estate developer with prior GTP experience, signs a one-year contract to continue assisting with development plans at the TransPark. Manning, president and founding partner of Trinity Works in Fort Worth, Tex., worked closely with Ross Perot, Jr. in developing Alliance, an industrial community in the Dallas/Fort Worth area.
June 2003	 The second issue of "Connections," the Global TransPark's regularly published newsletter, is distributed to more than 3,000 individuals across the state, nation, and overseas.
May 2003	 The GTP launches a web-based database, called TeamNC, making it available to businesses throughout the state. The database links companies to a wide range of information, from bidding on government and commercial opportunities to finding business templates and resumes. The web site can be accessed at www.teamnc.com.
April 2003	Duke Realty Corp. is selected to be the on-site developer of the industrial component of the GTP.
	 The Aeronautical Academy of North Carolina begins its first classes at the GTP's Education and Training Center and airport, offering annual recurrent training for corporate pilots
March 2003	 The final application is submitted to the N.C. Certified Sites Program. By receiving Certified Site status, the GTP Authority will have its developable land certified and permitted for improvement.
February 2003	 As part of a proactive public relations program, 3,000 copies of a GTP newsletter are distributed throughout the state, nation, and overseas.
January 2003	 More than 88 million pounds of freight are handled at the GTP in 2002, an approximate six-fold increase over cargo processed in 2001.
	 Consolidated Diesel reports saving \$600,000 in 2002 by using the GTP's Foreign-Trade Subzone. N.C. Consortium for Homeland Defense Strategies (NCCHDS) is formed by the GTP to create a unified
	program for teaching, training and researching in the critical field of homeland defense. NCCHDS brings

December 2002 The CTP officially opens is newly lengthened muway. At 11,500 feet, it is the longest commercial runway in the state and only one of a few in the Southeast. The Acronautical Academy of North Carolina is created, headquartered at the CTP, melding aviation training courses taught in commanity colleges in Wayne, Lonoir, and Cravers Counties. On-site fiber-optic backbon is in place and in operation at the CTP, providing existing and prospective tenants with secure, high speed internet access at competitive rates. November 2002 The CTP Foundation greeze to jointly develop buildings with the GTP Authority to house new tenants and attract other companies. September 2002 Under the oversight of Issae Manning of Trinity Works, the GTP's Business Plan is completed, intent on making the GTP financially independent within two years. A pilot program for airpart security training is held at the GTP, drawing over 180 law enforcement officers from 10 North Carolina airports, 7 Federal agencies, 3 State agencies and various North Carolina police forces. Additional programs are planned with the N.C. National Guard and the U.S. Automey's office for 2003. The GTP hosts a Foreign-Trade Zone Seminar for Eastern North Carolina companies. About 40 people attend, representing 14 companies and 8 economic development areas. An application is submitted to expand the GTP's Proring Trade Zone into a site in Rocky Mount, incorporating the operations of Kanban Logistics. June 2002 The GTP's 58,800 square foot cargo floatity is opened, occupied by three tenants: General Service Company, DHL Worldwide Express, and Mountain Air Cargo / Mountain Air C		together representatives from the N.C. June 1997	 Global TransPark Foundation raises \$18 million of its \$30 million goal.
May 1997	Work begins on Education and Training Center site.
January 1997	 Draft Environmental Impact Statement released by FAA and US Army Corps of Engineers.
August 1996	 Mountain Air Cargo/Mountain Aircraft Services opens new facility as the GTP's first tenant.

May 1996	 U.S. Secretary of Commerce Mickey Kantor announces in Raleigh that the Global TransPark is approved as a Foreign Trade Zone. August 1995	 Global TransPark Authority receives \$4.8 million in federal military construction funding to extend runway from 7,500 to 8,600 feet, overlay the entire runway, and construct a hardstand and connector taxiway. The Authority and the U.S. military enter into a 20-year Cooperative Agreement allowing military use of the GTP for aviation training purposes.

April 1994	Mountain Air Cargo announces plans to become first tenant.

November 1993	 Global TransPark Foundation raises a total of over \$2 million from Wayne County, Pitt County, Greene County, Duplin County, Carteret County, Wilson County, and Craven County.
_	 The Global TransPark Commission is chartered by the General Assembly, authorized to collect a \$5 auto tag levy for five years – from July 1, 1994, through June 30, 1999. The levy provides marketing and economic development support for the 13 counties in the region and cannot be used to develop the Global TransPark complex.
August 1993	Global TransPark Foundation raises \$3 million in Lenoir County to begin its fundraising.
	 Global TransPark Authority chooses the airfield alignment for the Global TransPark, using existing runway to reduce costs.
July 1993	 Global TransPark Foundation, a 501 ©(3) not-for-profit corporation, sets \$30 million target for private funds to support GTP development.
	Gov. Jim Hunt becomes chairman of the Global TransPark Authority.
	Former Gov. Jim Martin becomes chairman of the Global TransPark Foundation.

Jim Martin's State of the State address, the North Carolina Department of Transportation commissions a study of a "Global Air Cargo Industrial Complex," a concept proposed by Dr. Jack Kasarda, the director of the Kenan Institute of Private Enterprise at UNC – Chapel Hill.
