The sand dunes on 17 many of these lots provide valuable protective functions for public and private 18 property and serve as an integral part of the beach sand supply system. Placement of 19 permanent substantial structures on these lots will lead to increased risks of loss of 20 life and property, increased public costs, and potential eventual encroachment of 21 structures onto the beach.

The public has traditionally fully enjoyed the State's ocean and estuarine 22 23 beaches and coastal waters and public access to and use of the beaches. beaches and 24 coastal waters. The Chief Administrative Law Judge may designate certain administrative law judges as having the experience and expertise to preside at specific types of contested cases and assign only these designated administrative law judges to preside at those cases.

The salary of an administrative law judge shall be ninety percent (90%) of the salary of the Director of the Office of Administrative Hearings.

In lieu of merit and other increment raises, an administrative law judge shall receive longevity pay on the same basis as is provided to employees of the State who are subject to the State Personnel Act."





(a) Credit. -- There is allowed as a credit against the tax imposed by this Division 10 an amount equal to seven percent (7%) of a corporation's expenditures during the 11 taxable year for wages paid to an employee while the employee worked as a 12 classroom volunteer for a public school in this State during the employee's regular 13 working hours. The credit is limited to (i) wages paid for up to two hours of work 14 per employee per week and (ii) up to one thousand dollars (\$1,000) of wages per 15 employee for the taxable year. The credit applies only to wages paid for hours the 16 employee would have otherwise been at work and does not apply to work performed 17 during an employee's lunch hour or leave time. The credit applies only to classroom 18 volunteer work approved by the public school. The credit does not apply to work at 19 a community college or an institution of higher education.

(b) Carryforward. -- The credit allowed by this section may not exceed the amount 20 21 of tax imposed by this Division for the taxable year reduced by the sum of all credits 22 allowed, except payments of tax made by or on behalf of the corporation. Any unused portion of this credit may be carried forward for the next succeeding five

In 14 addition, the State Board shall provide a source of supply from which the county 15 boards of elections may purchase the quantity of pollbooks needed for the execution 16 of its responsibilities. In the preparation of ballots, pollbooks, abstract and return 17 forms, and all other forms, the State Board of Elections may call to its aid the 18 Attorney General of the State, and it shall be the duty of the Attorney General to 19 advise and aid in the preparation of these books, ballots and forms."

Sec. 2. Article 4 of Chapter 163 of the General Statutes is amended by 20 21 adding a new section to read:

22 "§ 163-37. Duty of county board of commissioners.

The respective boards of county commissioners shall appropriate reasonable and 23 24 adequate funds necessary for the legal functions of the county board of elections, 25 including reasonable and just compensation of the supervisor of elections."

If the recommendations are received by it no later 20 than the thirtieth day prior to the primary or election, the board shall make 21 appointments of the precinct assistants for each precinct from the names thus 22 recommended.

Before entering upon the duties of the office, each assistant shall take the oath 24 prescribed in G.S. 163-41(a) to be administered by the chief judge of the precinct for 25 which the assistant is appointed. Assistants serve for the particular primary or





Each committee may make an initial determination of whether a challenge has merit. If the committee determines the challenge has merit, it shall provide for a public hearing of that challenge.



- (4) Increased linkages, where geographically feasible, between public schools and community colleges, so the public schools can emphasize academic preparation and the community colleges can emphasize specific job training; and

Section 1. G.S. 122C-115 reads as rewritten:

#### "§ 122C-115. Powers and duties of counties and cities.

- (a) Except as provided in G.S. 153A-77, a county shall provide mental health, developmental disabilities, and substance abuse services through an area authority.
- 10 (b) Counties and cities may appropriate funds for the support of programs that serve the catchment area, whether the programs are physically located within a single county or whether any facility housing a program is owned and operated by the city or county. Counties and cities may make appropriations for the purposes of this Chapter and may allocate for these purposes other revenues not restricted by law, and counties may fund them by levy of property taxes pursuant to G.S. 153A-149(c)(22).
- 17 (c) Within a catchment area designated by the Commission, a board of county 18 commissioners or two or more boards of county commissioners jointly shall establish 19 an area authority with the approval of the Secretary.
- 20 (d) A board or boards of county commissioners that establish the area authority 21 shall allow that area authority to maintain an unrestricted fund balance of up to 22 fifteen percent (15%) for the provision of mental health, developmental disabilities,
- 23 and substance abuse services. The fund balance shall continue forward from year to
- 24 year, in accordance with the rules of the Secretary.


