Every agency, institution, department, bureau, board, or commission of the State, authorized by law to retain private counsel, shall obtain written permission from the Attorney General prior to employing private counsel. An agency that is responsible for the administration or enforcement of any law for the protection of the environment, public health, or natural resources shall request private counsel for a State employee or former State employee who, in any action or special proceeding, is alleged to be personally liable for damages as the result of any act or omission by the employee during the course of his or her employment, if the employee requests private counsel. The Attorney General shall approve the request unless the Attorney General determines that the employee clearly acted outside of the course and scope of the employee's duties. This section does not apply to counties, cities, towns, other municipal corporations or political subdivisions of the State, or any agencies of these municipal corporations or political subdivisions, or to county or city boards of education."

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. G.S. 15A-531 reads as rewritten:

"§ 15A-531. Definitions.

As used in this Article the following definitions apply unless the context clearly requires otherwise:

Bail Bond. -- An undertaking by the principal to appear in court as 10 (1)required upon penalty of forfeiting bail to the State of North 11 Carolina in a stated amount. Bail bonds include an unsecured 12 appearance bond, an appearance bond secured by a cash deposit of 13 the full amount of the bond, an appearance bond secured by a 14 mortgage pursuant to G.S. 58-74-5, and an appearance bond 15 secured by at least one solvent surety. A bail bond for which the 16 surety is a surety bondsman, as defined in G.S. 58-71-1, acting on 17 behalf of an insurer shall be considered the same as a eash deposit 18 for all purposes in this Article. A bail bond signed by a 19 professional bondsman who is not a surety bondsman, as defined in 20 G.S. 58-71-1, shall not be considered the same as a eash deposit 21 under this Article. Cash bonds set in child support contempt 22 proceedings shall not be satisfied in any manner other than the 23 deposit of cash. 24 25



Section 1. Article 5 of Chapter 76 of the General Statutes is amended by 8 adding a new section to read:

"§ 76-40.1. Removal of abandoned vessels.

(a) For purposes of this section, the term 'vessel' means any watercraft or 10 11 structure, including seaplanes, used or capable of being used as a means of 12 transportation or habitation on or under the water. For purposes of this section, the 13 term 'vessel' does not include any shipwreck, vessel, cargo, tackle, or underwater 14 archaeological artifact that is within the exclusive dominion and control of the State 15 pursuant to G.S. 121-22 or to artificial reefs managed by the Department of 16 Environment and Natural Resources.

(b) It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to abandon or cause 18 to be abandoned, any vessel in or upon the coastal fishing waters of the State or upon 19 State-owned submerged lands. The last owner of record of a vessel at the time it was 20 abandoned shall be presumed to be the person who abandoned the vessel or caused 21 its abandonment.

(c) A vessel shall be presumed to be abandoned in violation of this section when 22 23 the vessel is either left unattended for more than 30 consecutive days or the vessel is 24 left in a wrecked, junked, or substantially dismantled condition without the consent 25 of the Secretary of Environment and Natural Resources.

The authority of the guardian shall continue until the guardianship is terminated by court order, until the juvenile is emancipated pursuant to Article 35 of Subchapter IV of this Chapter, or until the juvenile reaches the age of majority.

(b) In any case where the court has appointed a relative or other suitable person as guardian of the person for a juvenile and has also made findings in accordance with G.S. 7B-907 that guardianship is the permanent plan for the juvenile, the court may not terminate the guardianship or order that the juvenile be reintegrated into a parent's home unless the court finds that the guardian is unfit, or has neglected a guardian's duties, or is unwilling or unable to continue assuming a guardian's duties.



In 1999 and quadrennially thereafter, 19 two town commissioners are elected to four-year terms. In 2001 and quadrennially 20 thereafter, three town commissioners are elected to four-year terms. The mayor and 21 the five town commissioners so elected shall constitute the governing body of the 22 Town of Broadway, and such governing body may appoint such other officers and

23 employ such assistants as the governing body of the town may deem necessary for the

24 better governance of the town."

No member shall be entitled to 18 a pension hereunder until the member's official duties as a fireman or rescue squad 19 worker for which the member is paid compensation shall have been terminated and 20 the member shall have retired as such according to standards or rules fixed by the 21 board of trustees.





The occupancy and tourism development tax that may be levied under this act shall be three percent (3%) of the gross receipts derived from the rental of any room, lodging, or similar accommodation in the Town of Banner Elk that is subject to sales tax imposed by the State under G.S. 105-164.4(3). 105-164.4(a)(3). This tax is in addition to any State or local sales tax. The tax shall not apply to any room, lodging, or accommodation supplied to the same person for a period of 90 continuous days or more or to sleeping rooms or lodging furnished by charitable, educational, or religious institutions or by nonprofit organizations.

The term includes tourismrelated capital expenditures and expenditures required to make the downtown tourist area and nearby green

areas more accessible, attractive, and usable to pedestrian tourists, in accordance with the master plan approved by the town council.

The town may retain its costs of collecting the tax, not to exceed 35 seven percent (7%) of the amount collected.

'Sec. 6. Repeal of Levy. The Banner Elk Town Council may by 37 resolution repeal the levy of the room occupancy tax in Banner Elk, 38 but no repeal of taxes levied under this act shall be effective 39 until the end of the fiscal year in which the repeal resolution was 40 adopted. The members 11 shall be appointed by the mayor and approved by the town council. 12 Two of the members must be an owner or manager of a Banner Elk hotel 13 or motel and one of the other members must be a representative for 14 Lees-McRae College. The remaining two members must be individuals 15 who are currently active in the promotion of travel and tourism in 16 the town. Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as the 17 original appointments, and members appointed to fill vacancies shall 18 serve for the remainder of the unexpired term. The Banner Elk town 19 council shall designate one member of the Authority as chair and 20 shall determine the compensation, if any, to be paid to members of 21 the Authority.

The Authority shall meet at the call of the chair and shall adopt rules of procedure to govern its meetings. The Finance Officer for Banner Elk shall be the ex officio, non-voting finance officer of

25 the Authority.

(b) Duties. The Authority shall expend the net proceeds of the tax levied under this act for the purposes provided in Sec. 5 of this act. The Authority shall promote travel, tourism, and conventions in the town, sponsor tourist-related events and activities in the town, and finance tourist-related capital projects in the town.

32 (c) Reports. The Authority shall report quarterly and at the 33 close of the fiscal year to the Banner Elk town council on its 34 receipts and expenditures for the preceding quarter and for the year
