SUBCOMMITTEE ON DOMESTIC VIOLENCE FUNDING JOINT LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE ON DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

At the August 30, 2010, meeting of the Joint Legislative Committee on Domestic Violence, the Chair, Rep. Marian McLawhorn, appointed a subcommittee with the following directive:

Study how nonprofits or local government entities receive State funding for domestic violence programs or services to determine whether the current system needs to be modified to insure the best utilization of funds. The study should include: (1) A review of the laws which provide funding. (2) The criteria for receiving funds. (3) The grant administration process. Recommendations on statutory changes, including the criteria for receiving future funds and the grant administration process, shall be submitted to the Cochairs no later than December 1, 2010.

The Subcommittee was appointed after the Department of Administration, responsible for administering the Domestic Violence Center Fund, adopted policies that resulted in only one domestic violence center per county being eligible for funding, and in some centers receiving more than one equal share of the Fund.

The Subcommittee, chaired by Representative Melanie Wade Goodwin, met on September 28 and November 18, 2010. The minutes of these two meetings are attached and incorporated by reference into this Final Report.

The final recommendation of the Subcommittee is that two draft bills, 2011-RK-1, and 2011-RK-2, attached hereto, be presented to the full Committee at its meeting on December 14, 2010, for review and consideration.

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MINUTES

Joint Legislative Subcommittee on Domestic Violence Subcommittee on Domestic Violence Funding Thursday, November 18, 2010

The Subcommittee met on Thursday, November 18, 2010, in Room 1425, at 10:00 a.m. The following members were present: Representative Melanie Wade Goodwin, Chair, Representatives Farmer-Butterfield, Ingle and Stevens. Chairman Goodwin called the meeting to order at 10:14 a.m. and welcomed everyone and thanked members for attending. She also recognized the Sergeant at Arms staff.

The Chair asked members to review the minutes from the September 28, 2010 meeting. Rep. Farmer-Butterfield moved for approval of the minutes as written, and the minutes were adopted by a unanimous vote of the subcommittee members.

Chairman Goodwin recognized committee counsel Hal Pell and fiscal staff member Michele Nelson for the next item on the agenda, which is a review of the funding data and domestic violence statistical information. Michele directed the committee to two handouts. The first handout is Domestic Violence/Sexual Assault/Displaced Homemaker Programs (GF Appropriations/Marriage and Divorce Filing Fees).

When information was presented at the previous meeting, the concern was that members could not follow the organization of the information. Members requested to have the information on the funding separated by program area, which is reflected in this handout.

The first page has a summary sheet organized by the three program areas. This data came from the Department of Administration (DOA) website. There are page numbers cited in the summary for each fund. Both funding sources supported 103 grants. There were three grants that were not fully funded under the marriage and divorce filing fee funds: page 6, item 49; page 7, item 79; and page 8, item 96. Rep. Farmer-Butterfield asked if those undisbursed funds revert back to the General Fund. Michele responded that the appropriations funding did revert. In 2009-10, there was a hold-back of five percent imposed by the Governor for all state agencies.

Mr. Pell asked what happens to that money for the ones that are blacked out under the marriage license fees. The Chair recognized Christy Agner from DOA to respond. Ms. Agner stated that any court fees revert back in the same way that all unspent court fees are reverted, and there is no flexibility to reappropriate that money. Michele advised that funding does not generally carry forward unless there is a specific provision to do so.

Receipts may be treated differently than General Fund appropriations. Such is the case for federal funding, and it may be possible to utilize such funding beyond the initial period. Guidelines change as they go through the fiscal year, which is October through September for the federal government. Pages 9-11 feature the appropriations for the sexual assault programs, which supported 85 grants. Page 12-13 feature the appropriations and divorce filing fees which supported displaced homemaker programs. The grand total for the three areas funded is \$11.5 million for FY 2009-10. Rep. Farmer-Butterfield thanked Ms. Nelson for presenting the information in this way, and Ms. Nelson gave full credit to DOA for having the information on their website.

Rep. Stevens noted a discrepancy in the sexual assault funding amounts between programs, and asked for an explanation. Ms. Agner from DOA answered that the sexual assault program grants have a tiered grant amounts: if you are a stand-alone program you are authorized to receive a certain amount of money, if you are a dual program you are authorized to receive funding under Tier 2. Rep. Stevens asked if the program is receiving the \$27,000 figure whether they have other programs. Ms. Agner responded yes.

Ms. Nelson referred to the next handout, a listing of the personalized contacts for the various programs. This was in response to a request from the last meeting. Rep. Stevens indicated the legal-sized handout does not include any of the programs in her area. It was determined that, in printing and duplicating the handout, some material was cut off. The corrected listing was provided to the committee and is included in the minutes on letter-sized paper. Ms. Nelson concluded her report.

Mr. Pell referred to the next handout entitled "Shelter Services by County." This is a redacted chart that does not include some information the committee did not request, such as the number of roll-away beds, single beds, etc. The full information is available upon request. This information is provided in response to a committee request in the previous meeting.

Mr. Pell copied the current statute Chapter 50B-9, the Domestic Violence Center Fund. The charge to the committee related to clarifying the statute as to how current funding is distributed and whether there needed to be any clarification or changes with regard to some of the issues that arose about the policy by the Council for Women to limit the number of centers in each county. One of the initial questions that came up involved the definition of a "center." The first draft (2011-RK-1 v. 8) is one attempt to address the definition – "One per county, but...." It would clarify the definition of a "center," and maintains the requirement of having to have a one-year history of operation. It allows for sharing a hotline by two centers in one county as an exception to the rule. Section (f) addresses the Guilford County issue, which gave rise to this subcommittee. It provides that there is still a limit on the number of centers funded per county but allows for exceptions for the few counties with large population. It further provides that, for those counties with a program that is funded where an additional and

otherwise eligible program opens, the older of the programs shall continue receiving the funds from DOA.

Rep. Ingle asked: if there are two centers operated by the same non-profit that are located in a county that has a threshold population allowing for additional centers, would both centers be eligible for funding? Mr. Pell replied yes, there is no limit on the operating entity. Rep. Stevens advised that this draft does not address the situation in her area. Mr. Pell advised that the second draft does address her area's situation.

Mr. Pell continued that the bill draft further addresses a situation where there is a non-profit in one county contracting with a local government in another county because there is no program in that county. We've had bills in the past where a county wanted to start a program and a special provision was passed exempting them from the previous July 1 operational status. This draft provides for that situation.

Section Two of the draft provides for a study of this issue in greater depth. The N.C. Domestic Violence Commission in consultation with the N.C. Coalition Against Domestic Violence would be required to study and report back to the full committee their recommendations for changes to the funding formula by December 1, 2011. This would enable the full committee to recommend legislation in time for the 2012 short session. Rep. Goodwin advised the members that this study is already underway. Section Three provides this draft would apply to this coming fiscal year.

Mr. Pell moved to the second draft bill (2011-RK-2, v. 3). Everything is the same except that there are no limitations on the number of programs per county in this version. This would increase the number of victims with access to services, but decrease the amount of funding per center. This seems to reflect the original intent of 50B-9, since there was no express limitation on the number of programs supported.

Rep. Goodwin thanked Mr. Pell and called for subcommittee discussion, recommendations for changes to the draft, and any other comment. Rep. Stevens advised she was on the Board of a local program in Surry County that did not receive funding from the Council for Women, despite meeting qualifications and being advised they should receive the funding. She suggested a combination of the two drafts, including some limitation on what is done, but being fair to the people who have gone out and met the requirements and are suddenly cut off.

The shelter in Surry County will serve three counties, but they cannot get a share because there is a center in one of those counties. Shelter is important for this study by the Commission and should be looked at as a key component. Mr. Pell suggested making a separate category for shelters. Rep. Stevens stated that her county's program is looking at a lawsuit because they met all the requirements and did not get funded and they are the only shelter in these three counties. She suggested if funding is only going to one center per county, the shelter center should be given some priority. Our shelter served 49 people in the first six months, and less than half of those people went and got a 50B Order because the shelter was available. Can we say, "For this past year, this was our

intent, and we will fund any shelter that met the criteria prior to July 1. But in the upcoming grants, we will continue our study and make the funding competitive in the future."

Mr. Pell asked if Rep. Stevens was suggesting legislating funding for any entity operating a shelter that met the requirements of the current statute since July 1, 2010 shall receive an equal share of the 2010-11 appropriation. Rep. Stevens replied yes. Mr. Pell advised he would need to check on legal issues with contracts with other programs for the 2010-11 appropriations. If no added money is appropriated, all the program contracts would need to be modified and the contracts rescinded for all the other programs to create a share for the program. Rep. Stevens advised her program in Surry County worked closely with the state, was led to believe they met all the requirements for funding, were informed in July they would not get funding, and then were notified in August they would not get funding due to the one-per-county rule. Rep. Stevens clarified the program is expecting the 2010-11 funds.

Mr. Pell advised he would have to check on the legal issues of the contracts with the state and the programs. He advised he would also check on whether a bill could be drafted to award this particular program funds for the current fiscal year. Rep. Goodwin advised that it would not be fair to ask the programs in other counties to revert monies they counted on and have already received in order to fund the program in Surry County. Rep. Stevens asked what her program should do. Rep. Goodwin stated she did not think the Legislature could do anything about the 2010-11 money which has already been appropriated. Rep. Stevens stated that the program would pursue action against the Governor's Office. Mr. Pell said he will research whether money can be given to that center outside the fund. Rep. Stevens advised that the error was not the program's error, the error was the Administration's error, and it should be paid by the Administration out of whatever funds they have.

Rep. Goodwin asked Mr. Pell to investigate any legislation and legal issues surrounding funding for Rep. Stevens' program for this current fiscal year. Rep. Goodwin asked members to consider the bill drafts in the context of the FY 2011-12. Rep. Stevens moved to amend the study language in both drafts to incorporate priority consideration for shelters. Rep. Ingle suggested the subcommittee should consider sending both drafts forward to the full committee as options. He stated we should be careful about opening the doors to new shelters in these communities, and he expressed support for the population thresholds. Mr. Pell clarified this was intermediate legislative drafting to present some options for consideration, and the more extensive study would be able to more fully consider all the options and issues.

Rep. Farmer-Butterfield expressed support for sending both drafts forward to the full committee. She also asked if the members of the audience who are stakeholders in this process would address the subcommittee.

Mary Williams-Stover, Assistant Director, North Carolina Council for Women, came forward to speak. She wanted the Subcommittee to know that the Domestic

Violence Commission has begun the process of listening to local programs. The Chairperson has implemented a series, along with the North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence, of conference calls where they have had a chance to listen to various programs' perspectives on allocations—whether there should be continuing and equal amounts, what are the pros and cons, for example, of making the process more competitive. What we have heard is that it is very difficult for programs to operate even with the current funding they are receiving. That funding has not increased over time. We have also heard that operating a shelter is extremely expensive because it is a 24 hour a day, 7 day a week operation, and there is a need for time. For any changes that are made, there has to be a minimum of two years for implementing those changes to give the program time to adjust. They are strapped for funding. We as an administration office are monitoring their performance, and they are doing absolutely stellar work; but they want and need for us to be mindful of how difficult it is for them to meet their current needs. Any changes would have a significant impact on their ability to serve people.

Representative Stevens was recognized and commented on the statement of how expensive it is to open a shelter and keep it going. She asked if a group opened a shelter with the plan of this share of money coming into the budget, is it critical that we help that shelter stay open?

Ms. Williams-Stover answered that the information that they provide to the program is that the state funding should represent no more than a 20-25% of their budget because if they are going to sustain their program, the only way is by doing fund-raising year around, resource development and collaboration. That is what they continually advise programs to consider and not to count exclusively on the state funding. They know it is imperative for their sustainability. For example, in Orange County there is no shelter, and that program is very much needed and does an excellent job. The program has to look at generating funds outside of the state allocation. However, what they have heard is that the state allocation is essential as base funding. It allows them to attract other funding.

Representative Stevens commented that that was true but the statute said that if one opens a center, they will receive an equal share of the funding. Isn't providing shelter one of the critical needs of the victims of domestic violence?

Representative Goodwin stated that her question goes to the determination about the grant awards and was not sure they wanted to put Ms. Williams-Stover on the spot in that way and thanked her for sharing her perspective.

Robin Colbert, North Carolina Coalition Against Sexual Assault, came forward to speak and stated that it would be remiss of her if she did not say that, as you are looking at funding and formulas that the committee's charge was to look at domestic violence funding. She encouraged as part of an overall study that at some point the Domestic Violence Commission, who also administers DH funding and Sexual Assault funding,

look at sexual assault funding as part of a charge and to study how sexual assault programs are being funded in the state. Based on the information that you received, it is clear that there is only one funding source for sexual assault programs. She wanted to note that that is the case and that the Coalition is aware that the subcommittee's charge is domestic violence and that the formula that is going to be utilized is strictly for domestic violence programs and not for sexual assault. If you begin to look at the funding of sexual assault, look at the bigger picture that the sexual assault programs are receiving only one funding source from the state.

Representative Stevens asked if there is only one funding source there, is there a limit on the number of people who can apply to it? Ms. Colbert answered, "No". Representative Stevens asked is there a way we need to look at to limit that to keep quality programs open. Ms. Colbert answered that she would encourage the committee to look at funding streams as Mr. Pell brought up, how the DV programs are funded, that you keep in mind that you are cognizant of the fact that there is another funding stream for sexual assault, and based on the criteria of funding for domestic violence programs, sexual assault programs almost mirror that criteria.

Representative Stevens said that her question still is do we need to put a limit on—or think about limiting numbers of centers in the future-- and to include that in the study so that we keep that funding the same as we're trying to do with this one.

Representative Goodwin answered that Mr. Pell mentioned that they could have some discussion about sexual assault in the full committee, but with regard to the bill draft that we're looking at, it is limited to domestic violence because it is 50B-9. Certainly that could be brought up at the full committee meeting as something to consider. She wasn't sure that that was within the subcommittee's charge. Ms. Colbert said that was what they understood was the current charge.

Representative Stevens asked that the subcommittee include in their report that if that issue was to come up in the future under the same type of criteria, that there be some discussion of limiting the number of centers. Representative Goodwin said that would be included in the subcommittee's report to the full committee.

Cathy Stevens, past Chair of the Board of Directors for the new shelter that was opened in Surry County (Mary Sue's Safe Haven). In their planning stages to open the shelter, they looked at all avenues of funding that they could apply for. We were looking at the state funding/federal funding and knew we had to do fund-raising. It came into their business plan and into their future budgets to apply for this grant. One does have to anticipate being able to be funded all the information they were given and reading the wall that they would be eligible for the grant. Therefore, they did depend upon it. To answer the question of fund-raising, since September they have raised \$10,000 by fund-raising; and they have another one coming up in December. So, they try to have a large fund-raiser on a two month basis to keep the shelter sustainable.

Representative Stevens asked if Ms. Stevens would describe some of the impact of not receiving this funding at the last minute. What happens? Ms. Stevens stated that she cried! This shelter is very meaningful to their community and to her as well, very personal. The Board had to make a decision: are they going to stay open, how they are going to stay open, what they are going to do. She believes God's hand was in it because they have been able to stay open and had some wonderful people in the community to come forward and give sizeable donations so that they could keep their doors open until January 1. The fund-raising helped also because their community has come forward because they know the need for this shelter. To tell you one story, there was a lady who called the shelter, and she was hiding behind a bush because her husband had threatened to kill her and him. The police came and brought her to the shelter, and two days later, her husband committed suicide. If they had not taken her into the shelter, she would probably be dead today as well.

Representative Farmer-Butterfield was recognized and stated she did want to ask about the impact but was also curious as to if the shelter was able to get the funding on January 2, you would need 100%, like half of \$45,000 maybe? Would they need the entire amount?

Ms. Stevens stated their budget was \$18,000 per month. That is what it costs them to run their shelter, whether they are full or not. They have many people in the community who bring food and clothing and help in that capacity, but there are ongoing expenses regardless. But they do maintain a full house most of the time. She was asked how many beds and answered there are sixteen.

Representative Goodwin thanked her for being there to share with them as it's always good to be reminded of what they are doing and how important their work as policymakers is at this level. Her being there today and sharing what the situations have been with her program has been helpful so that they can understand why it is they need clarification of the statute.

Michelle Nelson, Fiscal Staff, was recognized and stated she did not want to put a damper on this discussion of funding but thought it was also important to recognize that the upcoming Legislature is going to be dealing with serious funding changes, and she could not speak to what those changes will be within the General Government Subcommittee and how that will affect any of the 18 departments. Generally, the funding is developed in terms of targets for the subcommittee in the appropriations process but no one knows exactly what that will mean. As you look at things and thinking about special assault programs, I wonder if there might be certainly some rethinking of utilizing the marriage and divorce licensing perhaps and some possibility of extending that to sexual assault. That would diminish, however, what is utilized for domestic violence and for the domestic homemakers. Certainly there may be of course the thought to preserve the funding for the program as we understand it currently, but we have no idea what's going to happen in terms of the budget changes. It would be, I would think, for the coming biennium now until the fiscal year 2012-2013. Things will certainly begin to change

budget-wise for the State at that point. I'm using, for example, that is something that will reoccur. Representative Goodwin thanked Ms. Nelson for her perspective as Fiscal Staff for the Appropriations Subcommittee on General Government through which this funding stream comes.

Referring back to the initial comment made by Representative Stevens regarding expansion of the study in section 2, Representative Goodwin asked if the subcommittee liked draft #1, draft #2 or do you want to make that addition regarding the shelter provision in both of the drafts so that she could know their mission. Representative Stevens moved that they amend both draft #1 and draft #2 to include a component regarding shelter services in section 2 and asked Mr. Pell for language. Mr. Pell stated that rough language would be at the end of subdivision 4, on line 33, looking at version #2. On the back on line 33 reads "location of larger municipalities or by some other indicator, such as provision of shelter space." Then, adding a whole new subdivision 5 after line 33 between lines 33 and 34, and specifically put something along the lines of "a provision on utilizing the provision of shelter services as a criteria for funding and that the Commission include a survey of localities and the need for shelter space in those localities" so that there is some tie in between need and funding.

Representative Stevens moved that both drafts be amended to reflect the changes that Mr. Pell has presented. A vote was taken and the motion was approved. Representative Goodwin stated that both bill drafts are now amended and the amended versions of both drafts are before the subcommittee. She stated that Representative Ingle moved to send forward both drafts to the full committee which would be meeting again on December 14 and throw it open for discussion. A vote was taken and the motion was approved.

Representative Goodwin said that that addressed the charge of the subcommittee, and the Chair was commended by subcommittee members for an outstanding job of presiding. She also commended the subcommittee, Mr. Pell and Ms. Nelson, and the audience for being present and part of their discussion. There being no other business to come before the subcommittee, Representative Goodwin adjourned the meeting at 11:28 AM.

§ 50B-9. Domestic Violence Center Fund.

The Domestic Violence Center Fund is established within the State Treasury. The fund shall be administered by the Department of Administration, North Carolina Council for Women, and shall be used to make grants to centers for victims of domestic violence and to The North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence, Inc. This fund shall be administered in accordance with the provisions of the Executive Budget Act. The Department of Administration shall make quarterly grants to each eligible domestic violence center and to The North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence, Inc. Each grant recipient shall receive the same amount. To be eligible to receive funds under this section, a domestic violence center must meet the following requirements:

- (1) It shall have been in operation on the preceding July 1 and shall continue to be in operation.
- (2) It shall offer all of the following services: a hotline, transportation services, community education programs, daytime services, and call forwarding during the night and it shall fulfill other criteria established by the Department of Administration.
- (3) It shall be a nonprofit corporation or a local governmental entity. (1991, c. 693, s. 3; 1991 (Reg. Sess., 1992), c. 988, s. 1.)

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A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO AMEND THE NORTH CAROLINA DOMESTIC VIOLENCE CENTER FUND AS RECOMMENDED BY THE JOINT LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE ON DOMESTIC VIOLENCE.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. G.S. 50B-9 reads as rewritten:

"§ 50B-9. Domestic Violence Center Fund.

- The Domestic Violence Center Fund (Fund) is established within the State Treasury. The fund-Fund shall be administered by the Department of Administration, North Carolina Council for Women, and shall be used to make quarterly grants to centers for victims of domestic violence and to The North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence, Inc. Each grant recipient shall receive the same amount. This fund shall be administered in accordance with the provisions of the Executive Budget Act.
- For the purposes of this section, the term a "center for victims of domestic violence" means an office location with a street address that is open to the public, that is operated by a non-profit or local government entity, and which provides, at a minimum, the following services relating to domestic violence from that office location:
 - A hotline. (1)
 - Transportation services. (2)
 - Community education programs. (3)
 - (4) Daytime services.
 - Call forwarding during the night. (5)

A center shall only be eligible for an equal share of the Fund if it has been continuously providing the services listed in subsection (b) of this section since the July 1st preceding the grant application period.

- An office location that does not provide all of the services described in subsection (c) (b) shall not be considered a center for victims of domestic violence and shall not be eligible for grant funds under this section. If there is more than one center in a county pursuant to subsection (f) of this section, then the centers in that county may share a hotline and each center shall retain its eligibility for an equal share of the Fund, so long as each center meets the other requirements of this section.
- A non-profit or local government entity shall be eligible for only one equal share of the Fund for each eligible center that it operates, and one equal share shall also be provided to

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how the grant funds will be utilized to provide to the county residents, at a minimum, the services described in subsection (b) of this section. Based upon the 2010 census, the following limitations apply to the number of centers that shall be eligible for a share of the Fund: (1) In counties with less than 400,000 population, no more than one center shall be eligible for an equal share of the Fund. (2)

In counties with 400,000 to 800,000 population, no more than two centers shall be eligible, and each shall receive an equal share of the Fund.

If a county does not have a center located within the county that meets the eligibility

In counties with more than 800,000 population, no more than three centers <u>(3)</u> shall be eligible, and each shall receive an equal share of the Fund.

If the number of grant applications in a county exceeds the number of centers authorized under this section, then the application or applications based upon a center or centers which have been in existence the longest, while providing the services required under this section, shall have priority over other applicants.

The study shall include, but is not limited to, a review of the Domestic Violence Center Fund and shall include the following issues:

- (1) Whether grant funds should continue on an equal share basis with minimum statutory criteria for eligibility.
- (2) Whether grant funds should be distributed on a competitive basis.
- (3) Whether the number of grants should be limited by geography, e.g., that there should be a limit of one equal share of the grant to each county.
- (4) Whether the number and amount of grants per county should be determined by the county population, or by a base amount for all counties, with additional funding for each county as may be determined by county population, location of larger municipalities, or by some other indicator.

The study shall include a review of other state jurisdictions, and the methods of used for the distribution of State funds for victims of domestic violence. The Domestic Violence Commission shall report its findings and recommendations, including suggested legislation, to the Joint Legislative Committee on Domestic Violence by December 1, 2011.

MINUTES

Joint Legislative Subcommittee on Domestic Violence Funding Tuesday, September 28, 2010 2:00 PM

The Joint Legislative Subcommittee on Domestic Violence Funding met on Tuesday, September 28, 2010, in Room 1425, at 2:00 PM. The following members were present: Representative Melanie Wade Goodwin, Chair, Senators Atwater, Jacumin and Jones; Representatives Farmer-Butterfield, Ingle, and Ross. Representative Stevens was excused. Representative Marian McLawhorn, Chair of the Committee on Domestic Violence, and staff member Hal Pell were also in attendance. Chairman Goodwin called the meeting to order and recognized the Sergeant at Arms staff and Joint Legislative Committee Chairman Representative McLawhorn who thanked the subcommittee members for serving and those in the audience for attending. The Chair also made changes in the order of the Agenda.

The Chair then recognized Hal Pell, committee counsel, who gave the Charge to the Subcommittee (see Attachment 1). Mr. Pell opined that this subcommittee came from information received from Representative Jeffus and Senator Dorsett regarding a domestic violence shelter program in Guilford County, which was told that even though it had been receiving Domestic Violence Center Fund grants in past years and had applied for grant funds this fiscal year, it would not be receiving funding. The Council had adopted a new policy--after the end of the application cycle--which would preclude it from receiving funds for this year. This situation started the inquiry into the funding policies, and recommendations concerning the Domestic Violence Center Fund.

Mr. Pell explained the Domestic Violence Funding chart (see Attachment 2) to give an overview on domestic violence funding. Mr. Pell advised that we could also include statutory funds, as well as direct appropriations, that went into the Domestic Violence Center Fund. Any laws or statutes which would affect the Domestic Violence Center Fund would also necessarily affect the distribution of marriage license and divorce filing fees. The Council for Women (CFW) has an Executive Director and a Grants Staff. The Executive Director of the CFW is also the Executive Director of the Domestic Violence Commission, which was done by special provision in the budget about ten years ago when the staffs of both were merged. Only one Executive Director position was retained, to serve both the Council For Women and the Domestic Violence Commission. The grants go to two separate entities: the N.C. Coalition Against Domestic Violence, which is a nonprofit and has a statewide orientation, and also to local nonprofits or local government centers across the state.

The next document presented was an Overview of Domestic Violence Statutes and the Administration of the Domestic Violence Center Fund (see Attachment 3), which previously was presented in a meeting of the full committee. Some of the feedback from the Department concerning center responsibilities thought it wasn't clear what a "center" was, and a definition for that term may be a point for the subcommittee's consideration.

The N. C. Council For Women Policy Letter, effective August 1, 2010, is attached (Attachment 4). This letter announced that the Council's funding priorities may occasionally change, and the Council would evaluate economic conditions and assess the needs of domestic violence victims.

A map is included, which illustrates that there are nonprofits that are receiving more than one share for a center that provides the five criteria services. In the case of one nonprofit, it is providing services to another county that does not have a center. And, in that instance, that particular nonprofit is receiving more than an equal share because, in the terms of the CFW, it's providing services to a county. The issue is whether providing services to a county is or is not within the statutory language of an existing "center" that has been providing services.

A situation in Greensboro/High Point was presented to the committee. There is a six county area with a population of approximately 114,000 people receiving over \$190,000 in Center Fund money--with less than one center per county. Guilford County, with a population that is more than four times the populations of those six counties, received only \$69,000. In addition, homicide figures show that there are ten times the domestic violence crimes in Guilford County than in the other six counties combined. This presented the issue of whether there should be need-based criteria on who receives funding and how much.

The next document is the Council's policy letter, which states that the policy allows the CFW to award grants to 102 domestic violence service providers in the state. Mr. Pell presented the Displaced Homemaker statute, which specifically limits the number of programs that can receive funding. He noted that the statute is an example of the language used to limit the number of programs that can receive funding, in contrast to the language of the Domestic Violence Center Fund.

A document entitled Statutes and Regulations was presented (see Attachment 5). Mr. Pell highlighted the purposes and a power of the full Committee, at subdivisions (1) and (2) of the statute creating the Committee. Under Part 10C, Domestic Violence Commission, he pointed out that the membership was to consist of individuals with expertise in the area of domestic violence. These people have been designated by the Governor, the President Pro Tem and the Speaker and their ex-officio members.

Mr. Pell emphasized that this is a legislatively-created Commission; it's not part of the Executive branch. It was specifically designed by statute to assess statewide needs related to domestic violence, assure that necessary services, policies and programs are provided to those in need, to strengthen the domestic violence programs which have been established pursuant to G.S. 50B-9 which is the Domestic Violence Center Fund, and recommend new domestic violence programs.

The next statute described was the one that establishes the North Carolina Council for Women. Mr. Pell pointed out that, noticeable in its absence, is any designation of domestic violence as an issue which is to be studied by the Council for Women, and it has no function to advise relating to domestic violence policy. The sole mention of the Council for Women with regard to domestic violence is the requirement that it administer the Domestic Violence Center Fund.

The Domestic Violence Center Fund statute notes, in the last sentence of the first paragraph, that "to be eligible to receive funds under this section, a domestic violence center must meet the following requirements," and there are three eligibility requirements. As pointed out previously in subdivision 2, after hotline, transportation, and call forwarding, it states "other criteria established by the Department."

The last page in this packet provides for the actual agency responsibilities in administering a fund, and these are from the administrative code. These establish "any agency"—and that would be the Council for Women in this instance—"that receives State funds and disburses those funds to a grantee shall. . . ." These are all the requirements for that agency if they are designated by the General Assembly to administer a fund.

Representative Ross was recognized for a question. She asked if there are any of those agencies' responsibilities that Mr. Pell thinks the subcommittee should pay particular attention to. Mr. Pell responded there were none specifically other than there was a question whether the term that "the Council of Women shall administer the fund" would imply any other responsibilities other than what's in the Administrative Code. In other words, whether by using the term *administer*, that would also permit it to establish additional criteria. Representative Ross asked if he thought there was any particular significance to (a)(7), which says "Ensure state funds are expended with the purposes for which they were granted." Mr. Pell stated that if they were granted for domestic violence purposes and a nonprofit is using them for some other purpose, which would be a violation. For example, if they were utilizing it for paying for some other maintenance needs that don't fall specifically within domestic violence use. His understanding was the regional offices of the Council are involved in this kind of oversight of the fund.

Mr. Pell presented other statutes as examples of statutory funding. He explained that \$30.00 of every marriage license fee goes to the Domestic Violence Center Fund, by statute. The Register of Deeds is supposed to inform people applying for marriage licenses that half of their fee is going to the Domestic Violence Program. Statute 7A-305, subsection (a), paragraph (a2) – these are divorce filing fees and this fund is split up in several ways: \$20.00 goes to the Domestic Violence Center Fund established under 50B-9. Those two funds feed into Domestic Violence Center Fund.

The next statute is 143B-394.10, North Carolina Fund for Displaced Homemakers. This does not specifically have a funding amount. It just provides that its purpose shall be to make grants to up to 35 centers. There is a specific numerical cutoff under number of recipients of this fund. In addition, the Council can use 10% of the funds for administrative purposes that are appropriated. It gives a reference to criteria established by the Council, and this fund is specifically used in the statute in creating the Council that this is one of their statutory obligations to administer this fund as well.

The Department, upon recommendation by the Council, shall adopt rules to implement the Fund. That could have been initially how to implement the fund but is an example of a situation where the Legislature provided that the Department of Administration gets recommendations from an agency and then adopts rules on the situation, which gives the Legislature an opportunity to review that if it comes up.

Representative Goodwin requested that Mr. Pell explain what the rulemaking process involves for those who are not familiar with the Administrative Code. Mr. Pell stated that under that requirement, they would have to have a public hearing, announce certain rules that would go into effect and give opportunity for comment of the rules. There would have to be meetings with discussions about them, and if the rules are adopted, if there's objection, the Legislature has the opportunity to either endorse them or not. They file, and if there is no action by the Legislature, the rules go into effect. But the Legislature can decide to take action to basically stop the rule going into effect.

Mr. Pell introduced Michele Nelson, from Fiscal Research, who is also staff for this subcommittee. A summary of the DV grants chart basically shows that the grants are non-competitive, which is a term that the subcommittee may or may not want to look at in the long term because of discussions about how the grants should be awarded. Should it be across the board that any nonprofit that establishes a center that provides these things gets an equal share? A competitive system would mean that a county like Guilford County with a huge population, is providing shelter space in addition to the other services, and where there is a high rate of homicide and perhaps a need for more shelters, should get additional funding. In any event, right now they are non-competitive and the sources of funding illustrate that domestic violence (DV) grants total over \$4.5 million, and he believed this did not include the \$2.2 million. The total divorce filing fees and marriage license fees is \$2.287 million.

The last document is the DV grants for the last fiscal year (2009-2010) (Attachment 6). Some of the grant amounts will be less than others. If they did not receive all four quarters, a full year's grant amount under DV grants was \$45,286. It does have the marriage license fees as a separate amount, and at the very top, for example, Albemarle Hopeline was the one referred to, there are not five brick-and-mortar centers. In that situation, Albemarle Hopeline is getting a share based on providing

services to a county that does not have a center. This is another situation that the subcommittee might want to look at--whether

there should be some way of dividing a county that does not have a center by statute, just to clarify things, whether that county should get a share because they don't have a center as opposed to a share being given to another ongoing center that may be duplicating their services.

Representative Ross questioned all of these centers—whether they are one center serving multiple counties or one center serving one county—presumably had a hotline, transportation services, community services and all the things, even though they might just call themselves a hotline. Christy Agner, N. C. Department of Administration, was called on to respond and stated that it was correct. They sign a contract with each nonprofit or local government entity and certify every single month that they are on site operating those services that are in that contract for each of the counties in which they cover. Mr. Pell asked if North Carolina is providing services to a county without services, do they have a separate hotline number or are they using the same hotline number that they are using for their county? Ms. Agner was unable to answer in entirety for all of the counties, but stated that's what regional offices do, make sure services are offered. She added that sometimes there are local solutions for low coverage and so the Department makes sure that the contract is appropriate. Rep. Ross questioned whether, particularly for the small counties, offering daytime services, were they offered everyday in every county? Jill Dinwiddie responded that the services that are outlined in the statute are provided in each one of the counties that we fund, regardless of where that county program is administered.

Representative Goodwin recognized Senator Jacumin who asked if the grants were the same, regardless of the number of people served. Mr. Pell responded that that factor had Senator Jones stated that Gates County had Albemarle Hopeline, and Roanoke-Chowan SAFE also serves Gates County. Mr. Pell responded that the share has been split in two parts. In other words, they are splitting an equal share between those two entities. Ms. Agner stated that Gates County is a unique situation where we have talked with the providers who have been providing the services for some time and jointly they developed a MOU. The Department has a contract in place to insure the services are delivered, and they choose to deliver the services in that way. It is a practice that has been in place for the past ten years. Senator Jones stated that Hertford County is receiving only \$11,500 and asked who has the other part of that. Ms. Agner replied that Hertford County has some issues with their contract, and the Department is withholding money due to that, related to the administration. Senator Jones asked where that money is, and Ms. Agner responded it is retained in the Domestic Violence Center Fund, which is capitalized. He asked what happens at the end of the fiscal year, and Ms. Agner stated that it goes back into the General Fund. Senator Jones asked about redistribution of those

funds. Ms. Agner said that if the program is not able to meet the obligations of the contract, if the state does not allow it to spend the money, then it would be held in the Fund. If it is not used for the purpose intended at the end of the fiscal year, it is closed out and the money reverts to the General Fund. After Senator Jones asked about the

numbers on the spreadsheet, Ms. Agner stated there is some discrepancy between the numbers submitted by the Council for Women and the numbers on the spreadsheet before the committee. She called on the grants administrator, Mary Williams Stover, who explained that there is a missing column reflecting Displaced Homemaker funds. These grant funds are not equal awards for all programs. The committee requested a separate spreadsheet reflecting the Displaced Homemaker grant award recipients.

Mr. Pell repeated these policies as far providing funds to counties without a center and all of these other anomalies have been going on a long time, and there has never been an objection concerning that which might have been an isolated instance. As far as the Legislature's looking at compliance and what the specifics of the statute are during this time period, this has basically been the ongoing policy for many years as far as the administration of the fund. It is not something that has just started this past year.

Senator Jones asked how this came up. Mr. Pell responded it was brought up to the full committee that in Guilford County, one eligible center was not going to receive funds. The Council had adopted a policy which said that not all eligible centers are going to receive funds.

The question went initially to the Department why they were not complying with the statute because they were going to withhold money from an eligible center. The initial response from the Department of Administration was that that was their interpretation of the statute. Initially, the full committee reviewed this and voted that a letter be sent by legal counsel to the Governor's legal counsel, stating that the fund requires that all eligible centers receive an equal share, and that is by statute.

Based on the action of the committee and based on what went forward to the Department, the Chair appointed a subcommittee to look into this whole issue about the ambiguity of the statute and whether or not there is a policy in place by the statute that that was the intent of the Legislature that is not being accomplished through the actual administration of the Fund or not and to give the Department guidance because they are interested in making sure they have looked at what the Legislature puts into law, that that's what is going to happen.

Mr. Pell was asked what the resolution was to the Guilford situation. He responded that his understanding was that because the application was made for those funds by the Guilford Center <u>before</u> the end of the application cycle, and that the new "policy" of the

Department did not go into effect until <u>after</u> the beginning of the fiscal year, the Department decided that they would apply the policy that was in effect to the end of that application cycle. Consequently, the second Guilford center is going to receive their equal share for this fiscal year. However, at this point it is also his understanding that the policy will go into effect absent any further action by the Legislature for next year.

As far as only one center per county receiving funds, counties that do not have a center, a share can go to another center, thereby giving them an unequal share of the fund and those types of things. That is the current situation. Senator Jones then asked if they have a center such as Guilford or Greensboro/High Point receiving \$45,286. Mr. Pell responded that each of those two centers provide all of the services that the statute says it entitles them to an equal share. Each of those centers meets all of the criteria. The statute says that every center that provides these criteria is entitled to an equal share. It doesn't say only one per county. The question becomes does the agency establish policy, as far as that goes, or does the Legislature clarify the meaning of the statute. In other words, it does not matter how many are in a county—if you have a huge population there—or if it wants to specify population limits as to how many centers they can have. All of those are policy decisions, and that is what is behind it. But as it stands by statute, those two centers would be entitled to an equal share. Sen. Jones then asked a final question: could a second program be opened in Wake County and receive a full share?

Mr. Pell responded that under the statute, yes. What would be the result of that would be to have a further divided finite sum. The policy decision is for the Legislature is: do you take this finite sum and fund centers wherever they perhaps are needed, which will result in each center getting a smaller amount of money but increasing the number of centers statewide? For example, there may be 110 centers and perhaps every center will only get \$40,000 instead of \$45,000. That is just a policy decision for the Legislature. The interpretation of the statute at present is that there was no limitation, with the evident intent that the fund would be split into as many centers as qualified.

Mr. Pell continued that there are some practical concerns that some areas many not need two centers, such as in a small area where there is an ongoing center. Another group might establish a center and now you may have an over-provision of services in an area—and result in all centers across the state getting less money.

Senator Jacumin asked if another column could be added to the spreadsheet showing number of people served so we can see if this is working as intended. Mr. Pell responded that one of the statutes included in his packet required the agency to come back and show how effective the programs were. Another option for the Legislature is to put in there that each center keeps a census at their shelter, for instance, stating how many beds were utilized in the fiscal year or how many people utilized daytime services, how many people needed transportation services. The Legislature can require whatever reporting it desires in order to get that kind of data.

Rep. Goodwin asked Ms. Dinwiddie if the programs report that information monthly to the Council for Women as part of their grant obligations. She responded that it was on their website and all broken down by the census. Representative Goodwin stated that the information Senator Jacumin requested would be available for the committee.

Representative Ingle stated that Mr. Pell had done a good job of answering all of their questions. His first question was about Guilford County--whether the second location had received funding, which he considered to be appropriate under the current statute, and the second thing that he answered was no matter the size of the county, if the brick and mortar is there and the center is under compliance, there could be as many as ten centers in a county. "I think maybe we need to fix that. I agree with Mr. Pell that we need more information before we can make a policy decision here."

Representative Ross stated that she was not at the August 30th meeting and apologized for that, but she noticed when looking at the chart that Guilford County is not unique and that Gates County is getting twice the amount as well. It is listed under Rowan-Chowan SAFE at \$22,657, \$45,286, and then it is listed under the Albemarle Hopeline, Gates County at \$11,328, \$45,286. Senator Jones stated that it is split in Gates County. Rep. Ross stated that it is listed twice. "Why does it get more than \$90,000 under DV Grants and more than \$34,000 in marriage license fees and all of the other counties -- save Guilford -- aren't listed twice? I understand that there is a MOU, but what I'm saying is that it doesn't comply with the statute to say 'no' to anybody right now. But, if you're going to say 'no' to Guilford, why aren't you saying 'no' to Gates?"

Ms. Agner responded that because her Department did not prepare that information they could not assert its accuracy. She could only say that Gates County received one county allotment. There is an MOU between two programs. They do not receive two separate grants.

Senator Atwater asked if Mr. Speas had responded to Mr. Pell's letter. Mr. Pell said that the response was discussed with the Department, and the result was the refunding of that center. Also discussed was what the Department believed is ambiguous about our statute.

Representative Farmer-Butterfield was recognized and stated that looking at the chart, it appeared that, on page five, Lincoln County gets one grant for two centers—Lincoln County Coalition Against DV and Coalition Against DV. It is listed twice. Mr. Pell responded that they are getting only one DV center fund share and one grant from the marriage license fund.

Mr. Pell stated that there are two non-profits listed: one appears to be getting DV grants, \$45,286, and the other is receiving a marriage license fee amount of \$22,657. Again, the question is, are there centers not receiving equal shares?

Representative Ross was recognized and stated that it just would be good for now -- since it appears the Department of Administration sees some of the concerns -- for the subcommittee to get a revised chart that is accurate per county and then add the information that Senator Jacumin requested so that members know what we're dealing with. Representative Goodwin agreed and made the request of Mr. Pell.

Senator Atwater wanted to mention that in these satellite county operations, we really don't know if they are certifying that they have a Hotline--in point of fact one Hotline—or whether they are carrying overhead for a Hotline. We don't know if they have shelters certified by county. We don't know what these satellites are doing in point of fact. Rep. Goodwin responded that we don't, but DOA does because it is part of the contracts that they have with each of the programs, and if we wanted to see those, we could do that. They are available to us if Senator Atwater wanted the staff to provide those. Senator Atwater responded that we need to make certain that physically the satellite counties are certified and have a number in their counties that they are paid for as opposed to claiming the number of the host county and piggybacking that way. Representative Goodwin stated that copies of the contracts with each of the programs would be requested from staff and DOA or CFW. Ms. Agner stated that they would be happy to share with the committee redacted contracts that do not have an address on them. They are about 80 pages each. They are not available in electronic form, but three which are already redacted were utilized by the General Government Appropriations Subcommittee last year. Out of the three that are redacted, the Department could give the subcommittee an example. Members can pick different kinds of offerings.

Senator Atwater clarified that his interest is in seeing one contract, and he wants the Department to certify that a hotline operating in one county, covering multiple counties, is not claiming overhead in each of the counties. He also wants to know if the other services that are required to be provided are in fact being provided in all of the counties, or are they piggybacking something when they don't deserve the funding for the service in a particular county.

Mr. Pell stated that if you read the statutory language correctly, you would not have these issues. In other words, each center would have to provide these services in order to get equal share, and there would not be a provision to contract out to a county that does not have a center. In order to be eligible, you have to be a center, not a non-profit, but a center. And then the center has to meet all of these requirements, and then it is only entitled to an equal share. What you end up with is, in this case, unequal shares because of contracting out of services. Rep. Goodwin stated that this would be an area that the

subcommittee wants to look at for clarification. Senator Atwater asked Mr. Pell, "So you're saying that by law, the problems I'm concerned about shouldn't exist?" Mr. Pell replied that, according to his reading of the statute, it does not provide for contracting out to create a center in the air. In other words, you end up with one center or non-profit, getting more than a share because it is contracting to a county that does not have a center. Under the Department's reading of the statute, you can do that, and that is part of the issue.

Representative Farmer-Butterfield asked if we could include the displaced homemaker funding in updating this chart. Mr. Pell replied that we could, but it is not related to the DV fund. It is not a domestic violence issue, and there may be other programs involved that don't serve domestic violence clients. Representative Goodwin requested a separate chart with displaced homemaker grant recipients be provided to the committee.

Mr. Pell continued by asking committee to go back to their statute packet. I want to point out what may be some areas for clarification in the statutes and regulations. First, in 50B-9, the lack of a definition of "center", compounded with under subdivision 3, the language "it shall be a non-profit corporation or a local government entity". It may be ambiguous to say "it may be a non-profit". Are you talking about a center conceptually is a non-profit, a non-profit is a center itself, or are you talking about a physical location that is run by a non-profit? Secondly, in 50B-9, subdivision 2, "it shall provide all of the following services", there is a listing of several criteria, and the last sentence states, "it shall fulfill other criteria established by the Department of Administration". Is that specifically related to services criteria for each center or is that carte blanche policy criteria that the Department can utilize in saying they are only going to fund one per county, we're going to contract out services, we're going to split funds?

Representative Ross stated that there is absolutely no statutory construction that would say that when you are within a subsection, that last section modifies anything other than the subsection which it is within. Mr. Pell agreed.

Mr. Pell continued by stating that this whole discussion about the real policy issue of insuring services are available lends itself to the committee's discussion of whether there should be a limitation on the number of centers per county, that there is not overrepresentation in any one locality, that there is sufficient representation in services in larger counties. All of these are policy issues to be considered. Part of what the Domestic Violence Commission is charged with doing is considering the needs of domestic violence programs.

Representative Goodwin thanked Mr. Pell for an outstanding job. She recognized Jill Dinwiddie, Executive Director of the North Carolina Council for Women and the Domestic Violence Commission (Attachment 7).

Ms. Dinwiddie began by stating that the NC Council for Women is a state agency that has a two-pronged mission: to advise the Governor, the Legislature and the State Departments on issues impacting women in North Carolina. Those issues concerning women's safety, like domestic violence and sexual assault, as well as educational opportunities for women, and all of the issues around employment, including transportation, child care, pay equity, and women-owned businesses. In addition, the Council directs resources to the nonprofits around the state serving victims of domestic violence, sexual assault and displaced homemakers or people in transition. Those resources include three grant programs but also include resources like administrative support, board training, professional advising, financial oversight provided by our Regional offices.

The staff of the Council for Women administers and manages the grants program. The applications are reviewed first in the regional office for complete and accurate information. Then they are sent to the Raleigh office. The process is still done 'on paper' so applications and contracts are sent via a mail service which utilizes financial resources. The grants staff reviews them for accuracy and completeness as well. The Executive Director reviews and signs off on them before they are submitted to the DOA where the fiscal office, legal counsel and the Secretary's office sign off on each of them.

The Council for Women has one Board and one Commission:

- The Board of the Council for Women consists of volunteer citizen experts, appointed by the Governor to provide counsel, input and advice, helping the Council for Women to develop its working agenda. We met most of the day on Friday to draft such an agenda. The CFW board also develops review panels in the spring for reviewing the approximately 35 competitive Displaced Homemaker grants, although even those applications are reviewed by the Raleigh staff for completeness and accuracy.
- The NC Commission on Domestic Violence consists of volunteer citizen experts, appointed by the Governor and the Legislature, who have expertise in some subject area related to Domestic Violence (DV) and/or Sexual Assault (SA). The DV Commission reports to the Legislature, although not specifically to the Joint Legislative Committee

The authority for review and approval of the DV and SA grants is delegated to the Department of Administration and then to the Council for Women staff. It's unclear if that's what the Legislature intended. At the time the Domestic Violence Center Fund was created (1991), the Agency was titled the NC Council for Women.

Mr. Pell has already reviewed the statute and the criteria required to receive grant funding. Beyond these criteria, the applicant must submit the following with their application: Confidentiality Policy, Non-discrimination Policy, Organizational Code of

Conduct Policy, Internal Controls Policy, Recordkeeping Policy, and Whistleblower Policy.

Among other things, the application also asks for: community partnerships, supporters and collaborations; the sustainability plan for the organization; a description of the required 20% matching funds; accounting procedures that will be utilized; history of the program; barriers that affect current service delivery and training; objectives for the coming year; and whether or not the current year's objectives were met and how or why not. All of this information is available on the CFW website.

In addition to these requirements outlined above, the Council has developed a Best Practices manual for the programs that spells out in more specifics, what our expectations are for the grantee organizations. Those are all outlined in the Guidelines on our website and form the basis of the program evaluation done each year by the Regional Directors. An example of a couple of our Best Practices would be 1) availability of a Spanish language interpreter for victims or 2) a Board of Directors that is representative of the community being served by the program.

The monitoring of the grant recipients is done by our Region Directors who are in frequent communication with each program, at the very least monthly, when each is required to submit a monthly financial report as well as report on the number of clients served and number of educational presentations they've made in their respective communities. A new database will be rolled out by the Coalition Against Domestic Violence in November. It should be operational around the state by the end of this year. This will be a huge step towards collecting information that is accurate and timely. The Region Directors also do a site visit at least once a year to evaluate the service delivery components as well as the financial record keeping of our grantees. If deficiencies in either area are discovered, the programs are issued corrective action letters and given 60 days to make the corrections or develop a plan of action. When non-compliance issues are identified, the program's funding is suspended until corrective action is taken.

Jackie Jordan has been one of our grants administrators for the past five years. The Domestic Violence grant applicants have not changed during that time, and the practice or policy of one grant per county has been the case during that time. The number of Sexual Assault Fund applicants have crept up, and this year we had 8 new SA applicants, all of which were currently-funded Domestic Violence grantees that are adding SA services to their programs. So that you know, I looked back into some of our records and from all I can find, previous Executive Directors--Leslie Starsoneck, Theresa Pell and Mel Chilton--all operated under the "one DV grant per county" practice. We are currently funding 96 nonprofits or government programs serving women and families, as well as 74 safe shelters for women in crisis. There are currently 27 counties with no physical shelter funded by the Domestic Violence Center Fund. You have a hand-out by

county indicating where these programs and shelters are located (see Attachment 6A). We

also asked the regions to tell us how many programs in their regions are providing services and would probably request funding if the one per county formula were not in place. That number totaled nine (9). It has also been the policy in any given year, to give priority to currently funded programs deemed to be providing adequate services, over new applicants in the same county.

Representative Farmer-Butterfield asked if the same centers have been funded for five years or more, and the grants have been based on per-county in terms of the practice. Ms. Dinwiddie replied "yes". Representative Goodwin asked if that excludes the situation in Guilford County that has the two programs. "In other words, has the Council been funding the two programs for the past five years until the last funding cycle when you made the decision to fund one program per county?" She replied "correct". Senator Jones asked what would the Council do about a funding formula in an ideal world? Ms. Dinwiddie answered that if the Council could come up with a formula that includes the cost of running a program, both in a rural community, as well as a metropolitan area, and factor in a base amount for each program center. The formula should go beyond that base amount of money and give those programs providing quality services to "X" number of clients beyond that more money. Senator Jones stated that he wants to make sure we are providing enough resources to the rural areas to account for transportation across counties to reach services. Ms. Dinwiddie stated that is why she added transportation to one of the issues involved with employment for women.

Representative McLawhorn asked Ms. Dinwiddie about the grant payouts. Rep. McLawhorn stated she knew that the applications were stacked up on Ms. Dinwiddie's desk from her testimony before the full committee in August and she knew they had to be signed off on by a number of people. She asked if that signing was done in one room at the same time and if there was any way to speed up the process. She stated she spoke with a program director that will have to close her doors on October 1 because they haven't had a payment since June 1. Ms. Dinwiddie responded that they have tried to speed it up this year, and she hasn't been through a whole grant cycle yet. It is better, but still far from being as good as it should be. The number of signatures required is fewer this year than it was the last go around. I think there are two issues: one is the programs out there make mistakes on the applications or the grant renewals so that they have to send them all the way back by mail service so that they can make the corrections and return to us. That's one huge delay, and the other is the number of approvals that have to go through at the Department of Administration.

Representative McLawhorn asked whether the Department of Administration decides who must approve, and Ms. Dinwiddie responded "correct". Representative Ross commended Ms. Dinwiddie on how much better the grant disbursement process is this year than before. She advised the Legislature has recommended funding for some way

for them to do it electronically, and we can try to do that again. Representative Ross cautioned that we should come up with a cost to provide these basic services and admonished that we should be careful about opening up this issue of allocation of grant funds because we may end up fighting each other. In a year when the Legislature will be looking for things to cut, if the stakeholders cannot agree, everything will be cut. We want to solve problems, not create them in this subcommittee.

Ms. Dinwiddie further addressed Senator Jones' concern about the rural areas. One thing the Council is very aware of is that in the metropolitan areas, even though we give all of them except Guilford one grant, they do have access to other sources of income. All of them do big fundraisers, and they have businesses that contribute, whereas in the small rural towns, they don't have that many avenues to provide for resources for their programs. She believes that is important to keep in mind. Representative Farmer-Butterfield agreed and asked what happens to the funds that revert back and are not used for whatever reason by the center. It was agreed by Ms. Dinwiddie and Mr. Pell that the funds revert to the general fund.

Representative Goodwin recognized Karen Parker Thompson, Chair of the DV Commission (Attachment 8) (Attachment 8A Listing of Potential New Grantees). Ms. Thompson advised that, after the last meeting of the Joint Legislative Committee, the DV Commission met on September 17. The Commission came up with a plan to develop an allocation recommendation to forward to the full Committee to provide some helpful feedback from the DV Commission and also from the service providers. She shared the plan and asked for feedback.

The first part of the plan is to set up a task force to explore the allocations issue and draft recommendations. The task force will include DVC members, DV and SA Coalition representatives, other DV funders and DV program representatives from a variety of programs – rural, urban, large, small, and some culturally-specific programs that exist and they wanted to include. This Task Force is up and running. The Task Force asked the NC Coalition Against Domestic Violence to collect information about how other states allocate funds to learn from them what Best Practices are.

In September the Task Force sent out an electronic survey to all currently funded DV programs as well as those programs interested in seeking funding and other stakeholders. The survey is broad and seeks feedback about the most feasible criteria for funding allocation and what type and manner of changes will help keep the programs stable. The survey is available in English and Spanish.

In October, the Task Force, in conjunction with the Coalition, will hold 5 to 7 conference calls inviting anyone who wants to participate in order to discuss the issue and

voice anything that was not expressed or covered in the survey. Meeting information will be posted on the DOA website.

After feedback is collected, the Task Force will develop some recommendations and will present a draft at the Coalition's November 1 membership meeting of all DV programs and give one additional opportunity for feedback from the programs. Feedback will also be solicited via the DOA website.

The Task Force will then finalize the draft, and present it to the Commission on December 10 for approval, and present it to the Joint Legislative Committee with the final results.

Representative Farmer-Butterfield asked if the survey solicits information about other funding sources being utilized across the state at individual centers so it can be shared. Ms. Thompson responded that, yes, that information is available and that there is a Funders' Roundtable that meets regularly.

Representative Goodwin noted that there is an accelerated agenda, and asked if the timetable was accelerated due to the creation of this subcommittee, and also if the accelerated timetable provides enough time to thoughtfully complete the process of analysis. Ms. Thompson advised that the Task Force was accelerated because of legislative concerns and a desire to provide information to the subcommittee in time for the long session. She advised that what she has outlined for the Task Force is doable, but some of the recommendations will likely be that further study is necessary, for example, to study the cost of running a bare-bones program. She advised she thought the Task Force could get this piece done and have some really good feedback from the programs. She expressed confidence in being able to complete this piece, but with the caveat that the Task Force may request additional time to complete further study on some of the other items.

Representative Goodwin asked for subcommittee discussion, restating the subcommittee charge and asking how members want to proceed. Representative Ross stated it would be hard to take the next step without reviewing a revised chart, as we talked about, which will tell us what's really happening. She stated she would feel uncomfortable making recommendations without feedback from the Task Force because they are the ones who are going to talk to the actual programs. Without a recommendation from the Task Force, she would feel uncomfortable making a recommendation other than *status quo* for the time being. Senator Atwater stated it would be helpful if Mr. Pell developed some suggestions and recommendations to address the areas of concern he brought up during his comments as points for clarification of the statutes. Representative Farmer-Butterfield suggested that Mr. Pell draft an enhancement of the statute as it relates to reversion of the Domestic Violence Center Fund. Senator Atwater requested numbers of individuals served in different service areas of each program, as previously discussed,

and also a redacted copy of a sample multi-county program contract, as previously requested. Representative Goodwin restated that the subcommittee must report back to the full committee December 1, and asked when the members would like to meet again.

Mr. Pell suggested that the subcommittee recommend additional time be given to receive the report from the Task Force, and the full committee may want to legislate specifically that the DV Commission report back to the full committee at a later date as part of its charge. Members were in agreement.

Representative Goodwin advised that the next meeting would be scheduled when all the requested materials have been received and assembled by staff. She thanked the staff and the members of the committee for attending and participating. Senator Jacumin brought up a situation he became aware of with his constituent, where he was accused of domestic violence and was constantly in and out of jail, and said that the man didn't do anything, but his wife was just trying to manipulate the court system. Senator Jacumin asked if there is anything that can be done to prevent this from happening. Representative Goodwin advised that malicious prosecution is available to District Attorneys if someone abuses the criminal justice system in that way, and that it is used frequently in District 20A for that very purpose he mentioned. Senator Jacumin advised it is not used in his judicial district.

Representative Goodwin adjourned the meeting at 3:40 p.m.


On August 30, 2010, the Chair of the Joint Legislative Committee appointed a subcommittee with the following directive:

- The grant administration process.


Recommendations on statutory changes, including the criteria for receiving funds and the grant administration process, shall be submitted to the Co-Chairs no later than December 1, 2010.

§ 50B-9. Domestic Violence <u>Center</u> Fund — Department Responsibilities

- Quarterly grants to each eligible domestic violence center and to The North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence, Inc.
- <u>Each grant recipient shall receive the same amount.</u>





North Carolina Council for Women Domestic Violence Center Funding Policy

Effective Date August 10, 2010

Revised August 4, 2010

The North Carolina Council for Women (formerly known as The North Carolina Council for Women/Domestic Violence Commission), provides Domestic Violence Center Funds to domestic violence programs serving all 100 counties in the State of North Carolina. The funds awarded to the domestic violence programs are appropriated by the General Assembly through the NC Domestic Violence Center Fund. The North Carolina Council for Women performs monitoring and oversight functions as required by 09 NCAC 03M 0401. Our challenge during the current economic climate is to continue to meet the special needs of domestic violence centers serving "victims of domestic violence and The North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence, Inc." (NCGS § 50B-9) An assessment of the current distribution of funds for domestic violence programs identified an opportunity to improve the equitable distribution of funding, in an effort to meet the increased demand for these State funds.

The North Carolina Council for Women's (CFW) funding priorities may occasionally change based upon economic conditions, increased demand by domestic violence programs, and availability of services within a given county. As a result of this recent assessment, and effective immediately, the North Carolina Council for Women will not be providing funds to multiple domestic violence programs located within the same county. To this extent, any and all domestic violence programs that are recipients of funding provided by the North Carolina Council for Women, must be in compliance with Council's guidelines and policies, including all Federal, State, and local government regulations, in order to remain as the sole recipient of the Council's funding for that fiscal year.

Effective August 1, 2010, the CFW will award Domestic Violence Center Fund grants to only one eligible domestic violence program in each county.

This new approach allows the CFW to award grants to 102 domestic violence service providers in the State of North Carolina. These grantees will be eligible to receive a pro-rata share of the marriage license fees collected in North Carolina.

Final grant decisions and disbursement of those funds rest with the Executive Director and the Grant Administrators of the Council for Women.

The Council ensures accountability, efficiency and equitable distribution of funds for programs serving families struggling to survive domestic violence.

The North Carolina Council for Women will revisit the funding policy as needed to make modifications and will be collaborating with other State funders in this effort.

§ 120-266. Purposes and powers of Committee.

- (a) The Joint Legislative Committee on Domestic Violence shall examine, on a continuing basis, domestic violence issues in North Carolina in order to make ongoing recommendations to the General Assembly on ways to reduce incidences of domestic violence and to provide additional assistance to victims of domestic violence. In this examination, the Committee shall:
 - (1) Study the budget, programs, and policies of the Domestic Violence Commission to determine ways in which the General Assembly may improve the effectiveness of the Commission;
 - (2) Study and evaluate the funding sources and needs of domestic violence programs providing services to domestic violence victims and programs providing treatment to domestic violence abusers;
 - (3) Study legal services funding for domestic violence victims and explore additional sources of funding;
 - (4) Explore sources of additional funding for all domestic violence programs, including visitation centers;
 - (5) Examine current programs and explore new programs to provide effective services to domestic violence victims and treatment to domestic violence abusers;
 - (6) Examine law enforcement and judicial responses to domestic violence;
 - (7) Review data collected on domestic violence cases pursuant to G.S. 15A-1382.1;
 - (8) Study the effectiveness of the Crime Victims Rights Act as it relates to domestic violence; and
 - (9) Conduct any other studies, evaluations, or assessments necessary for the Committee to carry out its purpose.
- (b) The Committee may make interim reports to the General Assembly on matters for which it may report to a regular session of the General Assembly. A report to the General Assembly may contain any legislation needed to implement a recommendation of the Committee. (2005-356, s. 1.)

§ 143B-394.15. Commission established; purpose; membership; transaction of business.

- (a) Establishment. There is established the Domestic Violence Commission. The Commission shall be located within the Department of Administration for organizational, budgetary, and administrative purposes.
- (b) Purpose. The purpose of the Commission is to (i) assess statewide needs related to domestic violence, (ii) assure that necessary services, policies, and programs are provided to those in need, (iii) strengthen the existing domestic violence programs which have been established pursuant to G.S. 50B-9 and are funded through the Domestic Violence Center Fund, and (iv) recommend new domestic violence programs.
- (c) Membership. The Commission shall consist of 39 members, who reflect the geographic and cultural regions of the State, as follows:
 - (1) Nine persons appointed by the Governor, one of whom is a clerk of superior court; one of whom is an academician who is knowledgeable about domestic violence trends and treatment; one of whom is a member of the medical community; one of whom is a United States Attorney for the State of North Carolina or that person's designee; one of whom is a member of the North Carolina Bar Association who has studied domestic violence issues; one of whom is a representative of a victims' service program eligible for funding by the Governor's Crime Commission or the North Carolina Council for Women; one of whom is a member of the North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence; one of whom is a former victim of domestic violence; and one of whom is a member of the public at large.
 - (2) persons appointed by the General Assembly, recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, one of whom is a member of the Senate; one of whom is a district court judge; one of whom is a district attorney or assistant district attorney; one of whom is a representative of the law enforcement community with specialized knowledge of domestic violence issues; one of whom is a county manager; one of whom is a representative of a community legal services agency who works with domestic violence victims; one of whom is a representative of the linguistic and cultural minority communities; one of whom is a representative of a victims' service program eligible for funding by the Governor's Crime Commission or the North Carolina Council for Women; and one of whom is a member of the public at large.
 - (3) Nine persons appointed by the General Assembly, upon recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives, one of whom is a member of the House of Representatives; one of whom is a magistrate; one of whom is a member of the business community; one of whom is a district court judge; one of whom is a representative of a victims' service program eligible for funding by the Governor's Crime Commission or the North Carolina Council for Women; one of

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whom is a representative of the law enforcement community with specialized knowledge of domestic violence issues; one of whom provides offender treatment and is approved by the North Carolina Council for Women; one of whom is a representative of the linguistic and cultural minority communities; and one of whom is a public member.

- (4) The following persons or their designees, ex officio:
 - a. The Governor.
 - b. The Lieutenant Governor.
 - c. The Attorney General.
 - d. The Secretary of the Department of Administration.
 - e. The Secretary of the Department of Crime Control and Public Safety.
 - f. The Superintendent of Public Instruction.
 - g. The Secretary of the Department of Correction.
 - h. The Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services.
 - i. The Director of the Office of State Personnel.
 - j. The Chair of the North Carolina Council for Women.
 - k. The Dean of the School of Government at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.
 - 1. The Chairman of the Governor's Crime Commission.
- (d) Terms. Members shall serve for two-year terms, with no prohibition against being reappointed, except initial appointments shall be for terms as follows:
 - (1) The Governor shall initially appoint five members for terms of two years and four members for terms of three years.
 - (2) The President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall initially appoint five members for terms of two years and four members for terms of three years.
 - (3) The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall initially appoint five members for terms of two years and four members for terms of three years.

Initial terms shall commence on September 1, 1999.

- (e) Chair. The chair shall be appointed biennially by the Governor from among the membership of the Commission. The initial term shall commence on September 1, 1999.
- (f) Vacancies. A vacancy on the Commission or as chair of the Commission resulting from the resignation of a member or otherwise shall be filled in the same manner in which the original appointment was made, and the term shall be for the balance of the unexpired term.
- (g) Compensation. The Commission members shall receive no salary as a result of serving on the Commission but shall receive per diem, subsistence, and travel expenses in accordance with the provisions of G.S. 120-3.1, 138-5, and 138-6, as applicable. When approved by the Commission, members may be reimbursed for subsistence and travel expenses in excess of the statutory amount.

- (h) Removal. Members may be removed in accordance with G.S. 143B-13 as if that section applied to this Article.
- (i) Meetings. The chair shall convene the Commission. Meetings shall be held as often as necessary, but not less than four times a year.
- (j) Quorum. A majority of the members of the Commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The affirmative vote of a majority of the members present at meetings of the Commission shall be necessary for action to be taken by the Commission.
- (k) Office Space. The Department of Administration shall provide office space in Raleigh for use as offices by the Domestic Violence Commission, and the Department of Administration shall receive no reimbursement from the Commission for the use of the property during the life of the Commission.
- (1) Staffing. The Secretary of the Department of Administration shall be responsible for staffing the Commission. (1999-237, s. 24.2(b); 2001-424, s. 7.7; 2006-264, s. 29(o); 2009-342, s. 1.)

Part 10. North Carolina Council for Women.

§ 143B-393. North Carolina Council for Women – creation; powers and duties.

There is hereby created the North Carolina Council for Women of the Department of Administration. The North Carolina Council for Women shall have the following functions and duties:

- (1) To advise the Governor, the principal State departments, and the State legislature concerning the education and employment of women in the State of North Carolina; and
- (2) To advise the Secretary of Administration upon any matter the Secretary may refer to it; and
- (3) To establish programs for the assistance of displaced homemakers as set forth in Part 10B of this Article. (1975, c. 879, s. 37; 1979, c. 1016, s. 1; 1991, c. 134, s. 4.)

§ 50B-9. Domestic Violence Center Fund.

The Domestic Violence Center Fund is established within the State Treasury. The fund shall be administered by the Department of Administration, North Carolina Council for Women, and shall be used to make grants to centers for victims of domestic violence and to The North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence, Inc. This fund shall be administered in accordance with the provisions of the Executive Budget Act. The Department of Administration shall make quarterly grants to each eligible domestic violence center and to The North Carolina Coalition Against Domestic Violence, Inc. Each grant recipient shall receive the same amount. To be eligible to receive funds under this section, a domestic violence center must meet the following requirements:

- (1) It shall have been in operation on the preceding July 1 and shall continue to be in operation.
- (2) It shall offer all of the following services: a hotline, transportation services, community education programs, daytime services, and call forwarding during the night and it shall fulfill other criteria established by the Department of Administration.
- (3) It shall be a nonprofit corporation or a local governmental entity. (1991, c. 693, s. 3; 1991 (Reg. Sess., 1992), c. 988, s. 1.)

SECTION .0400 - RESPONSIBILITIES OF AGENCIES

AGENCY RESPONSIBILITIES 09 NCAC 03M .0401

(a) An agency that receives State funds and disburses those funds to a grantee shall:

Notify each grantee, at the time the grant is made, of the purpose of the grant and the reporting requirements established in this Subchapter.

Prior to disbursing any grant funds: (2)

register with the Office of State Budget and Management's Community Resources Information (A) System (CRIS); and

(B) follow the procedures for disbursement of grant funds.

Develop compliance supplement reports that describe standards of compliance and audit procedures to (3) give direction to independent auditors. This report shall be provided to the State and Local Government Finance Division with the North Carolina Department of State Treasurer for inclusion in the North Carolina State Compliance Supplement.

Provide the Office of the State Auditor with a listing of each grantee to which the agency disbursed State (4) funds during the prior fiscal year by October 31st of each year including detailed information regarding the

purpose and amount of the grant awarded.

- Provide the Office of State Budget and Management with a listing of every grantee to which the agency (5) disbursed State funds during the prior fiscal year by January 31st of each year. This report shall be consistent with the disbursement report previously provided to the Office of the State Auditor including whether the grantee has complied with the reporting requirements established in this Subchapter.
- Hold grantees accountable for the expenditure of State funds by performing monitoring and oversight (6) functions as required in this Subchapter.

Ensure that funds are spent consistent with the purposes for which they were granted. (7)

- Not disburse funds to grantees that are not in compliance with the reporting requirements for funds (8) received during the prior fiscal year. Agencies shall consult with the Office of State Budget and Management in making this determination.
- Determine that the applicable reporting requirement has been met by the grantee and that all reports have (9) been completed and submitted. For grantees receiving less than five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000), the grantor agency shall complete a Certification of Compliance to the Office of the State Auditor.
- Conduct periodic monitoring reviews to ensure that State awards are used for authorized purposes in (10)compliance with laws, regulations, and the provisions of grant agreements and that performance goals are achieved.
- Monitor compliance by grantees with all terms of a contract. Upon determination of noncompliance, the (11)agency shall give the grantee 60 days written notice to come into compliance. After the 60-day period, the grantor agency shall:
 - terminate the contract and take action to retrieve unexpended funds or unauthorized expenditures; (A)
 - (B) suspend payments pending negotiation of a plan of corrective action; or

offset future payments with the amount improperly spent. (C)

(b) Each non-State entity shall ensure that subgrantees have complied with the applicable provisions of this Subchapter. Failure to comply with such provisions shall be the basis for an audit exception.

Each county has one grantee, except for Guilford and Gates, which each have two. A total of 102 grantees were funded in FY 2009-10.

Each county grantee and the North Carolina Domestic Violence Coalition receive an equal percentage of domestic violence funds that are appropriated annually, with one exception: the two Gates County grantees split one share of the appropriation. The two Guilford County grantees receive an equal share of the appropriations.

Presentation to Sub-committee of Joint Legislative Committee on Domestic Violence September 28, 2010 Jill Dinwiddie

You all know what the exact language of the statutes is but when someone asks me what the Council is/does, here's how I explain it. The NC Council for Women as a state agency that has a two-pronged mission: To advise the Governor, the Legislature and the State Departments on issues impacting women in North Carolina. Those issues concerning women's safety, like domestic violence and sexual assault, as well as educational opportunities for women, and all of the issues around employment, including transportation, child care, pay equity, women-owned businesses. In addition, the Council directs resources to the nonprofits around the state serving victims of domestic violence, sexual assault and displaced homemakers or people in transition. Those resources include three grant programs but also include resources like administrative support, board training, professional advising, financial oversight provided by our Regional offices.

The staff of the Council for Women administers and manages the grants program. The applications are reviewed first in the regional office for complete and accurate information. Then they are sent to the Raleigh office (everything we do is still paper so they are sent via a mail service which is getting expensive.) The grants staff reviews them for accuracy and completeness as well. Then they come to me and I sign off on them before they go to DOA where fiscal, legal and the Secretary's office sign off on each of them.

The Council for Women has one board and one Commission:

- The board of the Council for Women consists of volunteer citizen experts, appointed by the Governor to provide counsel, input and advice, helping the Council for Women to develop its working agenda. We met most of the day on Friday to draft such an agenda. The CFW board also develops review panels in the spring for reviewing the approximately 35 competitive DH grants, although even those applications are reviewed by the Raleigh staff for completeness and accuracy.
- The NC Commission on Domestic Violence consists of volunteer citizen experts, appointed by the Governor and the Legislature, who have expertise in some subject area related to Domestic Violence and/or Sexual Assault. The DV Commission reports to the Legislature, although not specifically to the Joint Legislative Committee

The authority for review and approval of the DV and SA grants is delegated to the Department of Administration and then to the Council for Women staff. It's unclear if that's what the legislature intended. At the time the Domestic Violence Center Fund was created (1991), the Agency was titled the NC Council for Women

In order to be eligible for a grant from the DV Center Fund, a program must

Have been in operation since the preceding July 1 and continue to be operating

- offer all of following services: a hotline, transportation services, community education programs, daytime services, and call forwarding during the night.
- Be a nonprofit corporation or local governmental entity.

Beyond these criteria, the applicant must submit the following with their application:

Confidentiality Policy
Organizational Code of Conduct Policy
Recordkeeping Policy

Non-discrimination Policy Internal Controls Policy Whistleblower Policy

Among other things, the application also asks for:
Community partnerships, supporters and collaborations
The sustainability plan for the organization
A description of the required 20% matching funds
Accounting procedures that will be utilized
History of the program
Barriers that affect current service delivery and training
Objectives for the coming year
Whether or not the current year's objectives were met and how or why not.

In addition to these requirements outlined above, the Council has developed a Best Practices manual for the programs that spells out in more specifics, what our expectations are for the grantee organizations. Those are all outlined in the Guidelines on our website and form the basis of the program evaluation done each year by the Regional Directors. An example of a couple of our Best Practices would be 1) availability of a Spanish language interpreter for victims or 2) a Board of Directors that is representative of the community being served by the program.

The monitoring of the grant recipients is done by our Region Directors who are in frequent communication with each program, at the very least monthly, when each is required to submit a monthly financial report as well as report on the number of clients served and number of educational presentations they've made in their respective communities. A new data base will be rolled out by the Coalition Against Domestic Violence in November and should be operational around the state by the end of 2010. This will be a huge step toward in collecting uniform, accurate data from all of the programs on a regular basis. The Region Directors also do a site visit at least once a year to evaluate the service delivery components as well as the financial record keeping of our grantees. If deficiencies in either area are discovered, the programs are issued corrective action letters and given 60 days to make the corrections or develop a plan of action. When non-compliance issues are identified, the program's funding is suspended until corrective action is taken.

Jackie Jordan has been one of our grants administrators for the past five years. The Domestic Violence grant applicants have not changed during that time and the practice or policy of one grant per county has been the case during that time. The number of

Sexual Assault applicants has crept up and this year we had 8 new SA applicants, all of which were currently funded Domestic Violence grantees that are adding SA services to their programs. So that you know, I looked back into some of our records and from all I can find, previous Executive Directors - Leslie Starsoneck, Theresa Pell and Mel Chilton, all operated under the one DV grant per county practice. We are currently funding 96 nonprofits or government programs serving women and families, as well as 74 safe shelters for women in crisis. You have a hand-out by county indicating where these programs and shelters are located. We also asked the regions to tell us how many programs in their regions are providing services and would probably request funding if the one per county formula were not in place. That number totalled nine (9).

It has also been the policy in any given year, to give priority to currently funded programs deemed to be providing adequate services, over new applicants in the same county.

Plan to Develop Domestic Violence Commission Allocations Recommendation September 28, 2010

Karen Parker Thompson Chair, Domestic Violence Commission

At the September 17th, 2010 Domestic Violence Commission (DVC) meeting the following plan was approved describing the development of an allocations recommendation to be submitted to the Joint Legislative Committee on Domestic Violence.

- DVC set up a task force to explore the allocations issue and draft recommendations. The
 committee includes DVC members, coalition representatives, other domestic violence funders
 and domestic violence program representatives (large, small, rural, urban, culturally specific
 programs etc). DOA staff serves on the committee as a resource.
- 2. NCCADV will collect information about how other states allocate funds and forward to the task force.
- 3. In September the task force and NCCADV will create an electronic survey that will be distributed to currently funded domestic violence programs as well as programs that may be interested in seeking funding as well as other stakeholders. Access to the survey will be available through the DOA website and the survey will be available in English and Spanish.
- 4. In October the DVC task force in collaboration with NCCADV will hold 5 to 7 conference calls in order to discuss the issue with staff from domestic violence programs across the state. Meeting information will be posted on the DOA website.
- After feedback is collected as described above the task force will draft allocations
 recommendations and this draft will be presented to domestic violence programs at the
 November 1 NCCADV membership meeting. The draft will also be accessible via the DOA
 website.
- 6. The task force will complete the final draft and it will be presented for approval at the December 10th DVC meeting. When the document is finalized /approved it will be forwarded to the Joint Legislative Committee in December.
