Α **HOUSE** RESOLUTION TO **ESTABLISH** THE **PROCEDURE FOR** 1 NOMINATING AND 2 ELECTING **MEMBERS** OF THE BOARD GOVERNORS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA, INCLUDING 3 **NOMINATIONS** 4 PROHIBITION ON **FROM** THE FLOOR, THAT A NOMINEE RECEIVE THE VOTES OF 5 REQUIREMENT MAJORITY OF THE MEMBERS PRESENT AND VOTING IN 6 NOMINEE'S CATEGORY IN ORDER TO BE ELECTED, AND TO PROVIDE 7 8 THAT AT LEAST TWO PERSONS ON THE AT-LARGE BALLOT SHALL BE MEMBERS OF THE MAJORITY POLITICAL PARTY.

10 Be it resolved by the House of Representatives:

Section 1. The following procedures for nominating and electing eight 12 members of the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina (hereinafter 13 the "Board of Governors") are adopted:

#### I. COMMITTEE RESPONSIBILITIES.

- 1. It is the duty of the UNC Board of Governors Committee of the 16 House of Representatives (hereinafter the "Committee") to conduct a process for 17 nominating and electing persons for each opening in each category of seats on the 18 Board of Governors to which the House of Representatives is to elect members.
- 19 2. The Committee shall receive nominations for election to the Board of 20 Governors through March 6, 1997. Each Representative may nominate up to two 21 persons. In order for a person to have standing as a nominee, that person must be 22 formally nominated by a member of the House of Representatives. Only a written 23 nomination on a form provided by the Chair of the Committee for that purpose and

1 received in the office of the Chair of the Committee by 12:00 noon on March 6, 1997, 2 shall constitute a nomination. An individual cannot be a nominee or be nominated 3 in more than one category. An individual is not eligible for nomination if he or she 4 is nominated to the Board of Governors by the Senate during the 1997 Session.

- A Representative may nominate persons only for the categories 6 available for election by the House of Representatives. In the 1997 Session, the House of Representatives will elect:
  - Six at-large members for four-year terms; and (a)
  - Two members of the political party to which the largest minority (b) of members of the General Assembly belong for four-year terms.
- 4. On or after March 7, 1997, the Committee shall list all nominees by 12 category. The Committee shall screen the nominees as to their qualifications, 13 experience, opinions, and statutory suitability. The Committee may screen nominees 14 by interviewing, or by soliciting written information, or by both means. 15 completion of the screening process, the Committee shall conduct a vote to ensure 16 that the slate of legally qualified candidates lists no more than twice the number of 17 candidates for the total seats open in each category. No less than two candidates on 18 the ballot shall be members of the political party to which the majority of members of 19 the General Assembly belong.
- 5. Each nominee shall confirm his or her willingness to serve if elected. 21 Any nominee may withdraw without the approval of the sponsor.

#### II. ELECTIONS IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

- 1. A ballot shall be prepared under the supervision of the Chair of the 24 Committee for the use of the House of Representatives. The ballot shall include no 25 more than twice the number of legally qualified candidates for the total seats open in 26 each category. No less than two candidates on the ballot shall be members of the political party to which the majority of members of the General Assembly belong.
- 2. The names of the nominees shall be arranged on the ballot (a) by 29 category and (b) within each category by alphabetical order.
  - 3. The House of Representatives shall hold its election no later than the beginning of the daily session on March 18, 1997. Before the voting begins, the Speaker of the House shall explain the voting rules, which are:
    - (a) No nomination shall be received from the floor.
    - (b) In order to be elected, a nominee must receive the votes of a majority of all members present and voting in the nominee's category.
    - (c) Each member present and voting shall vote for as many nominees as there are positions to be filled in each category.
    - When fewer than two nominees in the minority party category, or (d) fewer than six nominees in the at-large category, receive the votes of a majority of all members present and voting for positions in those categories, a runoff to fill the open position or positions shall be conducted among the nominees who were not elected but who received the highest number of votes cast in each category; and the



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

RE: Questions to Board of Governors Nominees

Each House nominee to the Board of Governors is asked to answer the following questions and to submit a brief vitae. Answers should be succinct and limited to no more than one typed page per question. Please note that the responses to the questionnaire and vitae are public documents. All responses are due by 12:00 noon on March 6, 1997 in the office of Representative Lyons Gray, Room 532, Legislative Office Building, 300 North Salisbury Street, Raleigh, North Carolina 27611.

- 1. In your opinion, what is the role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors?
- 2. What do you see as your role as an individual member of the Board of Governors?
- 3. What are your primary concerns regarding improvement of the University System? As an individual Board member, how would you go about advocating and implementing solutions to address your concerns, particularly when this would mean advocating a position contrary to that of the majority of the Board or of the General Administration?
- 4. In your role as a member of the Board of Governors, how would you reflect an appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities?

#### In your opinion, what is the role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors?

The University of North Carolina Board of Governors, along with the President and General Administration, provides leadership and strategic direction, thus creating and maintaining a higher education system second to none.

A significant responsibility within this role is determining the financial resources needed to accomplish the Board's strategic goals, and fairly allocating those resources to constituent institutions.

The Board of Governors is the steward of the State's investment in higher education. While it is incumbent upon the Board to provide leadership in requesting needed financial resources, it is just as essential that the Board and the General Administration establish high expectations that existing human and financial resources be maximized.

Although most, if not all, members of the Board of Governors have some degree of allegiance to one or more constituent institutions, each member has a responsibility to understand and support the unique missions of all member institutions.

#### What do you see as your role as an individual member of the Board of Governors?

My most important role would be working with the General Assembly, President and General Administration in fulfilling those responsibilities discussed in question one.

Inherent within that role would be devoting necessary time to understand the needs of each institution within the context of the University of North Carolina System.

I would strive to assist in providing the highest quality education while maximizing existing resources.

What are your primary concerns regarding improvement of the University System? As an individual Board member, how would you go about advocating and implementing solutions to address your concerns, particularly when this would mean advocating a position contrary to that of the majority of the Board or of the General Administration?

My primary concerns regarding improvement of the University System center around adequate funding, fair distribution of funds and the most efficient use of funds available.

An environment must be maintained that enables each institution to recruit and retain the highest quality faculty and staff possible. A component of this environment is establishing a stable system that promotes professional growth and appropriate compensation.

While long term strategic goals must be established, it is critical that we keep in mind that appropriate funding be secured and fairly allocated so that science and technology equipment meets the demands of student growth and keeps pace with ever changing technological advances.

My position on any question would be determined after much research and deliberation. A person must have the confidence to advocate a position whether or not it is in the majority of whether it is supported by the General Administration.

In your role as a member of the Board of Governors, how would you reflect an appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities?

It is my hope that I shared, in previous answers, the importance of each Board member recognizing and becoming knowledgeable of the uniqueness and mission of each constituent institution. With this understanding must come the commitment to encourage and support each member institution in being the best they can be.

# RESPONSE OF ARCH T. ALLEN, III TO QUESTIONS TO BOARD OF GOVERNORS NOMINEES

#### 1. Response to Question 1—The Role of the Board of Governors.

Because the General Assembly created the Board of Governors, its role is as defined by the General Assembly: to "plan and develop a coordinated system of higher education in North Carolina . . .," with specific statutory powers and duties. That role must be consistent with the General Assembly's stated purpose: " to foster the development of a well-planned and coordinated system of higher education, to improve the quality of education, to extend its benefits and to encourage an economical use of the State's resources . . . ."

In essence, the Board collectively, through its individual members faithfully and diligently performing those specific duties, sets policies as prescribed by statute toward that stated institutional purpose.

#### 2. Response to Question 2—My Role as an Individual Member.

First and foremost, as an individual member, if elected my role would be to perform those specific statutory duties faithfully and diligently, always adhering to the standards set by the General Assembly. Second, I would personally try to be a good listener and learn more about the system as a whole and about the particular needs of the individual campuses, their faculties, and their students. (My personal style is always to work more with my ears than my mouth.) Third, after study and deliberation, I would assert my individual judgment; and, when I became convinced that a certain policy or course of action was appropriate, I would attempt to persuade a majority of the members of the Board of the appropriateness of that position. Fourth, I would recognize that I must accede to the institutional decisions made by a majority of the members of the Board, even if I advocated another position.

In sum, I would bring my individual experiences and independent judgment to the institutional decision-making process, always adhering to the standards set by the General Assembly.

#### 3. Response to Question 3—My Primary Concerns and Methods for Solutions.

I have primary concerns about all three parts of the university system's academic mission of teaching, research, and public service. First is the need to improve undergraduate education throughout the system with a renewed emphasis on the importance of rewarding faculty for excellent teaching in a traditional core curriculum. (I understand that UNC-Asheville has a model undergraduate core curriculum.) Second, while fully recognizing the importance of research and post-graduate and professional

education to the State, I am concerned that non-educational factors such as regional economic development will lead to a dilution of the State's resources at the graduate and professional school level and a diminution of quality of the system's existing programs at that level; in other words, I would be more inclined to eliminate some Ph. D. programs rather than creating more of them (only after careful study, of course). Third, although I am aware of much of the public service provided to our State by our university system, I am concerned that it has not been more effective in improving our State's public education at the primary and secondary levels.

I am also concerned that the Board's and General Administration's centralized management structure, perhaps appropriate when adopted 25 years ago, is too rigid and bureaucratic for current needs, and I think that the Board should study the desirability of a more decentralized management structure with more responsibility and accountability at the campus level. Finally, a related concern is that the Board is too staff-driven by the General Administration.

In advocating and implementing solutions to my concerns, I would encourage a more pro-active, probing Board. I recognized, of course, that neither I nor any Board member or candidate has solutions to all the concerns confronting our university system. I think, however, that a more dynamic, less bureaucratic environment would be more conducive to solutions.

I would not be deterred from advocating a position contrary to that of a majority of the Board, but once the Board acted under prescribed procedure I would accede to its institutional decision. I would have no reluctance in advocating a position contrary to that of the General Administration. In fact, when I was a member of the UNC-CH Board of Trustees (1989-91 as an appointee of Governor Martin), I advocated positions contrary to those of the system General Administration.

#### 4. Response to Question 4—the Individual Constituent Universities.

I would pursue a personalized and decentralized approach to learn more about the individual campuses.

Because I am already familiar with UNC-CH, I have written the other 15 campuses' chancellors as a courtesy to inform them of my candidacy and to express my interests in visiting their campuses and learning of their particular concerns. I know Chancellor Monteith of NCSU (where my wife graduated) and have already spoken with him about some of his concerns. I also know Chancellor Chambers of NCCU and have spoken briefly with him to discuss arrangements to visit with him at that campus. I also know Chancellor Leutze of UNC-Wilmignton, but have not visited with him since my candidacy for the Board. I look forward to further discussions with them and to discussions with the other chancellors.

As those efforts indicate, I would focus my approach through the individual campuses' chancellors, but I would extend my efforts to faculty, trustees, alumni, students, and interested friends of the individual campuses including members of the General Assembly. Although I would certainly be interested in learning what the General Administration reports about the individual campuses, my emphasis would be on the campuses themselves as the primary sources of information about them.

Despite this personalized and decentralized approach to better understanding the individual campuses, it would be for informational purposes only, and in no manner would those personal informational efforts interfere with management and administrative protocols or executive responsibilities of the University president or other officers.

1. In your opinion, what is the role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors?

The Board of Governors provides the leadership to the 16 constituent universities by:

oversight and approval of financial budgets with strict accountability for submission to the General Assembly,

working with the President of the university system and the Chancellors of each university,

defining and coordinating the various undergraduate and graduate programs of the university system,

establishing and enforcing the ethical and moral codes of the system,

oversight of student tuitions,

promoting a positive working relationship with the general public including the private sector encouraging financial support,

working with the General Assembly on all significant university system functions especially financial planning and budgeting requirements,

and promoting the overall betterment of higher education for the people of the State of North Carolina.

2. What do you see as your role as an individual member of the Board of Governors?

I would endeavor to work closely with the other members of the Board of Governors, the President of the University system, the Chancellors and the General Assembly by:

promoting an active and inclusive agenda addressing the needs of each constituent university,

recognizing the common and different missions of each university,

providing careful budget oversight,

encouraging expansion of the university system as may be demonstrated by the needs of our citizens,

serve on any appropriate committees,

commit a large portion of my time,

and hopefully have an idea or two.

3. What are your primary concerns regarding improvement of the University System? As an individual Board member, how would you go about advocating and implementing solutions to address your concerns, particularly when this would mean advocating a position contrary to that of the majority of the Board or of the General Administration?

I would hope the equity issue concerning the university system can be resolved by a formula that is fair to each constituent university while recognizing the unique mission posed by each university. I would work with the Board and the General Assembly to address and implement the recommendations in the recent study <u>UNC Equity of Funding</u> commissioned by the General Assembly.

The financial needs of the system will continue to increase and must be considered if the needs of our citizens are to be met and if North Carolina is to remain a competitive and vigorous economy. I believe we can do a far better job of encouraging private financial funding and by especially increasing our endowments where we lag far behind many other states and universities.

Where I may hold a position contrary to that of the majority of the Board or the General Administration I would endeavor to consider realistically the facts of the position, to hopefully persuade based upon those facts or to accept an appropriate compromise. If proven wrong I would yield gracefully and at all times conduct myself in an amiable and professional manner.

In your role as a member of the Board of Governors, how would you reflect an appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities?

Our constituent universities have different origins as well as different missions. They range from large student bodies to relatively small student bodies. We have some of the oldest universities in the country, particularly Chapel Hill and later NC State, to some of the newest universities in the country such as UNC Charlotte and the NC School of the Arts. The 16 universities are spread geographically across the state and they serve densely populated urban areas as well as some rural ones. The needs across the state are different yet they have many educational needs in common.

We have two research universities, Chapel Hill and NC State, which have unique requirements and five historically black universities which also have unique and special needs. Each university must be judged and cared for in relationship to its unique roll and mission while an equity formula must be developed that is as fair as possible with the resources that can be provided by the people of North Carolina.

# 1. In your opinion, what is the role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors?

During my six years as a member of the Board of Governors, I have come to understand that the role of the Board is to set policy for our University system. Our Board is the chief advocate for our University to the General Assembly and to the people of our great state. We have the responsibility of setting a course for our campuses that will continue to make our University system the best in the nation. We do not favor any campus over any other campus, however we help ensure that each campus carries out its individual mission to the people of North Carolina, and we do this in a bi-partisan manner.

# 2. What do you see as your role as an individual member of the Board of Governors?

Over the last six years, I have remained an independent voice on our Board of Governors. If re-elected I will continue to be an independent voice not influenced by politics. I have been very active in lobbying for the University both at the General Assembly and across the state. I will continue to do that even if I do not serve another term on the Board of Governors because I believe strongly in our University system. As a two time graduate of our system, I understand the importance of our University to this state. I have worked hard for each campus, and have not shown any favoritism for any school. I have been very active on the Board and committed to the success of the University. I have not been a rubber stamp for anyone or anything, and will not be. In my six years, I have missed only 2 meetings of the full Board of Governors, once for illness and once for my wedding and honeymoon. I am a serious and committed member and will continue to be if re-elected.

3. What are your primary concerns regarding improvement of the University system? As an individual Board member, how would you go about advocating and implementing solutions to address your concerns, particularly when this would mean advocating a position contrary to that of a majority of the Board or of the General Administration?

My primary concern regarding improvement of the system is to keep partisan politics out of our decision making process, and to work hard to improve the University's image with the General Assembly and the people of our state. I have addressed these and many other concerns over the last six years, and at times I have been in the minority on votes on the Board. I have advocated contrary to the General Administration at times, when I disagreed with certain policies and procedures they advocated. The Board is elected to lead the University and make the decisions, we depend on the staff to help in that effort, but the end result is our own, and should continue to be.

4. In your role as a member of the Board of Governors, how would you reflect an appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities?

I have been a strong advocate for each of our campuses. I have worked to help each campus with various projects and problems. I understand the missions of all of the campuses and have advocated for policies and programs to strengthen each campus and to help maintain their individual missions. All of our campuses cannot and must not be the same, but they should have equal access and should be treated fairly by the Board of Governors in every aspect of our decision making process.

# Responses to Questions Posed to Board of Governors Nominees

# Representative Gray, Chair, University Board of Governors Committee

- 1. In my opinion the role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors is to develop the long-range vision for the University of North Carolina System to bring the system into the 21st century with goals and objectives. The long-range vision must take into account the needs of the people of North Carolina, the desires of the General Assembly of North Carolina, the resources available, and the ability of the individual member institutions to develop plans and objectives to meet this vision. The role of the Board of Governors in this process is to collect all the input from the above sources and to provide overall policy that will direct the member institutions to the long-range vision. Over time the role of the Board of Governors is to monitor the progress towards the vision and to modify and change the vision as the situation arises. The Board of Governors has to be responsive to the wishes of the people of North Carolina as they speak to the General Assembly, in particular, the House of Representatives.
- I see my role as an individual member of the Board of Governors much like that of an outside director of the corporations on whose boards I sit. My responsibility is to listen to information presented; to obtain additional information if needed; and help set policies that will achieve a long-term vision for the University System. It is not my role to involve myself with individual member institutions and their daily operations. My role is primarily that of advising and guiding.
- 3. My primary concerns regarding improvement of the University System are related to a vision for the system and that vision's responsiveness to the needs of our state. I have not seen an articulated vision of where the Board of Governors would like or expects the University System to be in the 21st century. While it may exist, it certainly has not been articulated to the citizens of North Carolina for their response. The University System needs a vision that meets the needs of the citizens of North Carolina. Each individual institution under that vision must take actions that lead it to compliment the vision. This vision needs to be exposed to the citizens of North Carolina and to the General Assembly to make sure they are in accord with where the System is going.

As an individual Board member I would not hesitate to advocate a position contrary to that of the majority of the Board or the General Administration if I felt that my position was based in fact meritorious. I would of course want to make sure that I was right on my facts before advocating a contrary position. Just because I may feel or believe differently on a situation, does not mean that I should oppose the majority after the vote has been taken. I am entitled to express my opinion and to seek to implement solutions within the Board. There comes a time in all groups that the majority must rule. If I thought the majority was absolutely wrong, then I would continue to press the issue with members of the General Assembly.

With regard to opposition to the General Administration, I do not feel the same way. I believe it is my responsibility to challenge their positions and test the facts underlying them. When the General Administration makes a proposal, they should be prepared to convince me of the rightness of their position. If I am not convinced, then they either need to present me with more information or face the prospect of having me opposing them within the confines of the Board. I would certainly not expect to be a rubber stamp for the General Administration. I see that happen too many times on boards where I sit.

4. I would reflect my appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities by visiting each member and learning of their uniqueness as perceived by the institution. I would then work within the Board to develop policies that reflected the unique missions while meeting the overall vision of the system. I would be open to input from the various institutions to help me keep a current understanding of each unique mission.

#### ANSWERS TO MEMORANDUM OUESTIONNAIRE

  - A. To govern all of the affairs of the constituent institutions of the U.N.C. system while maintaining close liaison with the State Board of Education, private colleges and universities of the State and the Dept. of Community Colleges.
  - B. Prepare and revise, as needed, a long range plan for a coordinated system of higher education.
  - C. Determine types of degrees to be awarded by each of the sixteen constituent institutions.
  - D. Set enrollment levels.
  - E. Elect and hire the President of the University of North Carolina system.
  - F. Elect the Chancellors of each institution. Also elect and/or appoint and fix the renumeration package for Vice Chancellors and employees of tenure.
  - G. Approve the budgets of each institution as submitted by the President.
- To use my maturity, business and legislative experience, and genuine concern for the availability of higher education opportunities for the citizens of North Carolina to add meaningful input to the decision making process to insure a continuation of one of the best higher education systems in the country.
- I believe my record indicates that I have the ability to form the necessary coalitions to successfully achieve the positions of advocacy I choose to present.

Presently, my primary concerns regarding improvements to the University System are as follows:

- A. Developing a more pro-active Board of Governor's position relative to the Department of Community College's sense of urgency to develop a "common course" curriculum as required by 1995-96 legislation.

- C. Encourage constant internal Board review relative to how the Board can best add "value" to the higher education system.
- D. Encourage the Board to delegate more authority relative to faculty decisions to institution administration while maintaining final control through adoption of necessary "oversight committees".

## Answers to Questions to Board of Governors Nominees

1. In your opinion, what is the role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors?

In the course of being involved in the past with two constitutional appointed positions (Secretary of Commerce and member of the State Board of Education), I have become reasonably knowledgeable of the North Carolina Constitution and particularly Article IX and its content regarding all aspects of public education in North Carolina. I have also secured a copy and reviewed General Statutes 115 and 116 as they apply to higher education in North Carolina. Finally, I have read thoroughly the "Statement of Mission" adopted November 8, 1996 regarding the University of North Carolina System. I understand the provisions and expectations of these documents and support them in their entirety.

Clearly, since teaching and learning of excellent quality is the highest priority of the University of North Carolina system it is the Board of Governors first responsibility to satisfy itself in a variety of wavs that this is indeed occuring. The Board must always be knowledgeable of and responsive to the similarities and differences between and among, the sixteen institutions.

The Board of Governors through the work of its four standing and numerous subcommittees must also insure efficient use of resources, fiscal oversight and planning, adequate attention to governance matters as well as personel and program versight responsibilities.

The Board of Governors should consistently provide to the North Carolina Legislature in a timely fashion information they find necessary regarding higher education to carry out their duties and responsibilities. It must consistently be realized by the Board that they are one of the very important links between the public and their University of North Carolina system.

2. What do you see as your role as an individual member of the Board of Governors?

I would do my homework thoroughly and regularly with regard to both short range and longer range matters and responsibilities of the Board.

I believe it is particularly important to understand the environment in which the endeavor is being conducted and to work to maintain or as necessary to seek changes in that environment.

I would certainly expect to attend each Board meeting and be an active participant in the dialogue necessary to reach creative and beneficial decisions for the system. As a former Chmn./CEO of a successful major corporation and member and in several instances chairman of several significant boards, I am experienced in participating effectively with others to reach positive decisions when faced with complex challenges.

It is important to me that we be consistently alert to the need for adequate cademic rigor so that our students acquire the essential skills and knowledge to be responsible and effective citizens. I believe that one of my most important individual responsibilities is to pursue vigorously this type of outcome throughout the University of North Carolina system.

3. What are your primary concerns regarding improvement of the University System? As an individual board member, how would you go about advocating and implementing solutions to address your concerns, particularly when this would mean advocating a position contrary to that of the majority of the Board or of the Genreal Administration?

I am particularly interested in seeing the University System enhance considerably further its partnership in a variety of ways with the public K-12 schools in North Carolina. This would include but is not limited to such things as teacher preparation, improved techniques to recruit, in part, academically stronger freshmen candidates for our Schools of Education, teacher re-training and technology transfer.

There are many opportunities for making sure that our three major investments here in North Carolina public education---the University System, Community College System and K-12---provide a well coordinated and somewhat seamless opportunity for maximizing excellence in essential skills acquisition by the student to enter in an exciting, productive and rewarding way the myriad world of work. Our mission and responsibility to the North Carolina tax payer requires us to pursue further this opportunity.

Prudent fiscal planning continues to require our best thinking. Because of the partially similar and in some instances disimilar missions and growth patterns of our institutions the needs vary. One thing that is quite clear however is the aggressive attention that must be given to expenses, revenue flows and conservation or efficiency. All this must be accomplished in an acceptable fashion without undercutting the individual institutions ability to carry out its mission with increasing excellence.

In terms of advocating and implementing solutions to concerns, I believe you wild consensus through carefully researching and making available the facts to support your position coupled with convincing dialogue with individual Board members, committees of the Board as well effective presentation of the action you favor to the full board. My experience in accomplishing specific goals in various arenas has been quite positive.

One should always have a strong personal commitment to testing pending decisions against a backdrop of the priorities established both by the institutions mission and the individual Board members perception of importance seen within the context of the complete system. My approach to prevailing in a decision that I was strongly committed to would not be altered by sensing I was in a Board minority or facing opposition from the General Administration. You may be required to work harder to improve your chances of prevailing but you do not change the approach that you have found to be successful a majority of the time for many years.

Once a decision is made that is clearly within the purview of the Board, I would expect to be given by the General Administration and institution(s) involved a plan and acceptable time line for implementation. A further report of outcome and benefit realized would be expected at the timely conclusion of the matter.

4. In your role as a member of the Board of Governors, how would you reflect an appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities?

As a result of living in North Carolina for almost sixty years coupled with being quite active in a variety of endeavors, I have a good beginning understanding of the University System and its various institutions unique missions. Certain involvements

Thave taken me to at least ten of the campuses and I had the opportunity to serve one of our institutions as a trustee for four years as reflected in my vitae.

I would plan as soon as possible a formal visit to each institution for the urpose of meeting with administration, faculty and students thus giving me an early insight regarding mission, physical plant and "on campus" perspective. Further, I would look forward to gathering historical, demographic and statistical summaries pertinent to each institution so as to study carefully the development and unique role that each institution is playing on a local, state and national level.

I would thoroughly enjoy the opportunity to work toward becoming highly knowledgeable of the obvious as well as subltle similarities and differences of our University System. Serving the individual institutions and the total system well as a member of the Board of Governors would require an agressive acquisition of such knowledge.



Answers to Questions to Board of Governors Nominees

1. In my opinion the role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors is to make policy which will guide the general determination, control, supervision, management and governance of all the affairs of the 16 campuses which make up the University. In setting this policy, the Board of Governors should establish the direction in which the University moves as we approach the 21st Century. With the direction established by the policies of the Board controlling the goals and objectives which each campus sets for itself, the Board can act as a monitor of progress.

The Board will have already selected the president of the University to administer the policies set out by the Board by the time the election of members takes place in the House. The Board should offer continuing advice to the president in order that the goals and objectives of each of the constituent campuses will comply with the policies of the Board.

With the opportunity to set policy and advise the president, the Board of Governors has the ability to point the University system in the right direction for realizing its full potential in the 21st century. Continual watchfulness as to the implementation of its policies at individual university campuses by the Board will enable the entire system to move forward in a unified direction.

2. As an individual member of the Board of Governors I see my role as one of helping to set policy and monitor its implementation through the establishing of the goals and objectives of the constituent campuses. I see a need for myself as a member of the Board of Governors to visit each campus and to become familiar with its goals and objectives. With the individual goals and objectives in mind, I will be in a position to help formulate policy that will bring the separate campuses into a unified approach for implementing policy.

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An as individual member of the Board of Governors, I will be required to work closely with the other members of the Board in order to clearly enunciate the Board's policies from a unified front. I would seek to obtain the input of each individual member of the Board as one of my foremost concerns in trying to bring goals and objectives into line with policies.

Finally, I believe part of my role as an individual member of the Board of Governors is to be responsive to the House of Representatives which elected me. Too often in the past it appears that elected Board members have forgotten to ascertain the wishes of the constituency that elected them. I expect part of my individual role to be in contact with the leadership and other representatives in the House in order to secure their input in formulating the policies for the University system.

3. My primary concerns regarding improvement of the University system relate to more efficient use of resources and the need for closer scrutiny of the issues surrounding the University from the perspective of the citizens of North Carolina in general and members of the House of Representatives in particular. There are resources currently available within the system that can be put to the disposal of all the members of the system and create better utilization, as opposed to seeking other monies from the General Assembly which could result in needless duplication. Use of resources has to be done in the context of acknowledging what the citizens of North Carolina want and need, as well as the General Assembly.

Prior to advocating a solution for my concerns, I would first want to visit with each campus and get a better idea of how the campuses view their mission of serving the citizens of North Carolina. I would also like to know how each of those campuses views its responsiveness to the General Assembly. With this background in hand, I would attempt to broaden the interests in my concerns within the members of the Board of Governors. I am quite sure that all members would be interested in being more efficient in the use of resources and responsive to the needs of our citizens and the General Assembly. I would also expect to keep members of the House of Representatives who elected me informed as to opportunities which I thought existed to be efficient in the use of resources and responsive to needs.

Clearly I would seek the input of the General Administration during this process. With their experience and background, I am sure the General Administration could aid in formulating my position. At the same time, I would continue to seek to build a broader group of consensus within the Board itself.

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Obviously, there will be times when advocating a position might be contrary to the majority of the Board or the General Administration. This would be expected in any democracy. The crucial issue for any member of the Board of Governors it how important is this particular issue to the overall benefit of the University System. There will be many cases when the majority of the Board's opinion being contrary to mine might be the correct position for the University as a whole. I would hope I would be intelligent enough to see these times and revise my position. However, there are times when the majority is not always right. In those instances, I would seek the counsel of members of the House of Representatives who elected me with regard to the particular issue. If members of the House of Representatives also felt that my position was not in the best interest of the University system, then I would be forced to re-evaluate my position in light of the strong opposition from two separate bodies.

With respect to a position contrary to the General Administration, I would seek more information from the members of the General Administration. If my position is contrary to theirs based on information which I have, the responsibility of the General Administration is to provide me with all the information I need in order to convince me of the rightness of their position. If I am not convinced of the rightness of the position of the General Administration, then I have no hesitation in opposing their position in front of the Board of Governors. I would hope that my skills as a negotiator would put me in a position of helping the General Administration see that another point of view had validity.

4. I believe it is easy for me to reflect an appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities because I am a father with four children. As a member of the UNC System "family", each individual constituent university is separate and distinct in its needs, mission, and aspirations. Yet as a member of a "family" many times the needs, mission, or aspirations of any one individual cannot be at the forefront, but must blend in with the needs, mission, and aspirations of the other members of the "family". There are obviously times when the needs, mission, and aspirations of a particular university must come before the needs, mission and aspirations of others. Sharing of resources and responsiveness to the needs of the people of the State of North Carolina and the General Assembly are a part of that "family" process. Everyone must be taken care of within the "family" in a loving and caring way, but not always in the same way or at the same time. This is the way a father looks at the needs and wishes of the separate members of his "natural" family.

## Peter Keber answers Questions to Board of Governors Nominees

1. In your opinion, what is the role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors?

The Board of Governors exercises the responsibility of allocating available resources in a way that most efficiently fulfills the higher education needs of the state. While some of their responsibility and authority has been properly delegated to the Boards of Trustees of the constituent universities, the Board carries out the important functions of system-wide planning, budgeting, and key personnel decision-making.

In my view, however, the Board of Governors has an obligation to play other roles as well: It should provide for effective two-way communication with the leadership, relevant committees, and members of the General Assembly; provide leadership to and coordinate its actions and initiatives with other education-related bodies and institutions, such as the Department of Community Colleges, the State Board of Education, and the state's private colleges and universities; and generally provide a forum for education-related ideas and initiatives to be proposed, discussed, and implemented.

2. What do you see as your role as an individual member of the Board of Governors?

As an individual, my role would be to channel my personal experience and perspective into a group setting. This is manifested by being an initiator, by proposing logical and reasoned solutions to recognized challenges. But the strength of any individual is only as powerful as the spirit of respect and cooperation in the group and the individual's ability to tap into it. As an individual member of the group then, I would emphasize a spirit of teamwork in which openness, collaboration, and compromise are viewed as universally accepted standards.

3. What are your primary concerns regarding improvement of the University System? As an individual Board member, how would you go about advocating and implementing solutions to address your concerns, particularly when this would mean advocating a position contrary to that of the majority of the Board or the General Administration?

The most pressing concern of the University System is always the availability of adequate resources. In a time when the General Assembly's ability to appropriate increased resources to the University is limited by ever growing competing demands on one hand and declining revenue growth on the other, creative solutions must be found to deliver more and better education for each public dollar received. At the same time, the University must actively investigate revenue means from non-public sources.

Gaining consensus for new or apparently unpopular ideas is a skill that I have honed during my years of public service. One must have a thorough understanding of a problem while at the same time comprehending the merits and liabilities of various solutions. Through a process of persuasion, inclusion, and elimination which may ultimately demand compromise, support for a favored solution can be gained. Implementation must then be based on an agreeable time frame. The key is to "go slow to go fast" - make sure everyone who has a stake in the outcome is included from the beginning and that all sides are fairly and thoroughly heard.

4. In your role as a member of the Board of Governors, how would you reflect an appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities?

The genius of the University System's organization is that while the Board of Governors plans and budgets for the whole, the individual parts can successfully carry out diverse yet equally important and complementary roles. As a member of the Board of Governors, I would reflect my appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities by gaining a working knowledge of each institution's character and behavior, by encouraging recruitment of the most capable Chancellors and Boards of Trustees to manage them, and by ensuring that each had access to appropriate resources to be effective in their missions.

#### PETER KEBER

Mr. Keber has consistently provided leadership to his community. He is presently Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library of Charlotte and Mecklenburg County, and Chaiman-elect of the North Carolina Library Association's Trustees Division. He acts as a director of Crisis Assistance Ministry and as a member of its executive committee. He serves as vice-chairman of the North Carolina Association of Financial Institutions and as director and member of the executive committee of the North Carolina Center for Public Policy Research and the North Carolina Forum for Research and Economic Education (NCFREE).



Mr. Keber served three terms on the Mecklenburg County Board of Commissioners, and as its vice-chairman. He has been an officer and director of the Centralina Council of Governments, a director of the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners, and the chairman of the North Carolina Joint Regional Forum. ## Responses to Questions to Board of Governors Nominees:

## 1. In your opinion, what is the role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors?

The general powers and duties of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors, as articulated in General Statute 116-11, are summarized as follows: Management and governance as a coordinated system of the 16 constituent University of North Carolina institutions (and approval of the establishment of any new publicly supported institution above the community college level), subject to the powers given to the institutions. This includes determination for each institution of its functions, educational activities and academic programs, types of degrees to be awarded, enrollment levels, tuition and fees; preparation of a unified long range plan and budgetary recommendations; collection and dissemination of data concerning higher education; election of the President, senior staff, chancellors and vice chancellors and determination of their compensation; and assessment of the contributions and needs of private universities and colleges of the State.

I see the role of the Board of Governors as to ensure the continuing development of a well-planned and coordinated State system of higher education; to ensure its quality; to extend its benefits to the appropriate constituency; and to ensure the wise and prudent use of the State's resources in this regard.

In the context of the foregoing, my view of the core responsibilities of the Board is:

- appoint, support and assess the performance of the president and senior managers
- clarify the University's mission
- prepare long range plans and budgets
- approve the educational program
- ensure the well-being of faculty, students and staff
- ensure strong financial management
- ensure adequate financial resources
- preserve the integrity of the University System
- interpret the University to the larger community
- interpret the higher education needs of the State to the University

## 2. What do you see as your role as an individual member of the Board of Governors?

I believe my role as a member of the Board of Governors is to contribute to the fulfillment of the purposes of the Board of Governors as it serves the best interests of the whole State. I believe my membership carries with it the responsibility to be well informed, diligent and conscientious in pursuit of the purposes of the Board by functioning as an integral part of the governing body, bringing to bear my particular strengths, abilities and insights. I offer my talents and expertise gained through 35 years as a manager and executive of a major high-technology corporation and as a leader and member of the governing body for a large number and variety of industry and civic organizations.

## 3. A. What are your primary concerns regarding improvement of the University System?

My primary concerns regarding improvement of the University System are:

- The National standing of the University System. A consistent top assessment of our University System by others is critical to the continued successful economic development of our State. A superior academic reputation also permits us to attract top scholars to our faculty and student body and research dollars to our institutions.
- The cost of education to the student and to the taxpayer. It is critical that higher education remain within the means of North Carolina students and that the associated tax burden remain reasonable. I believe this can be accomplished through a combination of planning, prudent spending, and the recruitment of business dollars into our University System.
- Retention of our students and graduates. An important value to the State of having a strong University System is that it serves as a resource to develop a pool of highly competent and productive professionals within the State. It is important that we find ways to keep talented and motivated students within our university system through graduation. Further, we must develop and expand symbiotic relationships between our universities and the business community that will ensure jobs for our graduates and graduates well prepared for the jobs available so their talents and productivity will not be lost to North Carolina.

3.B. As an individual Board member, how would you go about advocating and implementing solutions to address your concerns, particularly when this would mean advocating a position contrary to that of the majority of the Board or of the General Administration.

While I do not consider my individual vision for the Board of Governors and the University System to be controversial, my background has provided me with a great deal of leadership experience in difficult and sometimes controversial situations. In those situations, I have found that dealing with problems and issues on a factual basis without ownership of ideas or solutions generally results in the best outcome. I will continue this approach to problem solving. In keeping with my background, I will rely heavily on business management techniques such as solid research to assure I have the facts and I will use them independent of personal or political priorities or preconceptions in promoting my ideas and in assessing those of others. In developing and evaluating proposals, I will focus my assessments on the perceived impact on the success of our students in their chosen fields for every dollar spent. Further, I will advocate and use data from benchmarking the successes of other boards and institutions in comparable situations.

4. In your role as a member of the Board of Governors, how would you reflect an appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities?

One of my strengths is strategic planning. An important concept of formal planning is to understand that each viable unit of a particular system or organization has a unique role in fulfilling the overall mission of the mother unit. The system is best served when that role is optimized. So, while it is appropriate and desirable that each constituent member of the University of North Carolina System have its own mission and vision and seek excellence within that role, it is also necessary that this be accomplished in ways consistent with and complimentary to the needs and mission of the larger University System.

Specifically, the ongoing thrust of my work with the Board will be: Are the goals and missions of the member institutions consistent with those of the system and are the member institutions successfully addressing their stated purpose.

## Responses to Questions to Board of Governors Nominees

1. In your opinion, what is the role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors?

The role of the University Board of Governors is broad in scope and yet precise when it comes to certain statutory direction.

The charge to govern the constituent institutions and to work with the other educational institutions in the state -- maintaining an up-to-date, long-range plan for a coordinated system of higher education -- places great responsibilities on the Board to plan, manage, direct and delegate as appropriate the activities that collectively keep the University System at the academic forefront nationally, and leads to continued improvement in the University System for its numerous constituencies. The Board must also pursue the synergies that can improve the overall state of education in North Carolina.

2. What do you see as your role as an individual member of the Board of Governors?

I see my role as an individual Board member as:

- (1) Carrying out the statutory directives and expectations, some which are mentioned in my response to question one;
- (2) Utilizing my past Board experience at the Community College and University level, as well as a Board of Governors member, along with my broad business experience as an executive in a global telecommunications company, to keep the Board thinking towards the future and our changing society as we prepare students for a world that is changing at an accelerating pace;
- (3) Creating challenging debate in committees when appropriate, probing for better answers from administrative staff when required;
- (4) Ensuring that programs added or deleted conform with the mission of the affected Universities;
- (5) Ensuring that we do not condone dedicating resources to teach obsolete skills, holding professors accountable for classroom performance without infringing on their academic freedom; and

- (6) Finally, I will continue to ask Can we do it differently, better, or not at all; and, what will the result be from the System, the students, and the State's standpoint?
- 3. What are your primary concerns regarding improvement of the University System? As an individual Board member, how would you go about advocating and implementing solutions to address your concerns, particularly when this would mean advocating a position contrary to that of the majority of the Board or of the General Administration?

My response to question three is a continuation, in some respects, of the response to the second question. In my business which grows by knowing other people's business well enough to meet all of their telecommunications needs, we find that when an organization is doing well, a certain degree of complacency slips in and one morning you wake up and find that your competitors have leaped out ahead.

I believe one of our major challenges is to keep that from happening to our great University System. We must continually challenge complacency at all levels, avoid decisions that are primarily political to make a certain institution feel good, and always question proposals that address a "today" problem without a "tomorrow" impact accompanying it.

I see my role as a voice in committee meetings and Board meetings to make sure this happens. As to advocating a position contrary to that of the majority -- I believe you will find that I have already earned my spurs in that area.

4. In your role as a member of the Board of Governors, how would you reflect an appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities?

In the eyes of the public I am afraid we have lumped the individual constituent institutions into one category. Some Chancellors have done a good job locally explaining their mission, but overall we have a lot of work to do publicly. We might start with making sure all members of the General Assembly understand the unique missions, why they are unique -- and how they may change and why. Members of the General Assembly are welcome at committee meetings where missions are reviewed and debated. I would suggest legislative workshops in Raleigh for briefings on missions, long-range plans, and future budget impacts anticipated from missions that need to be modified.

Board members must support the approved mission of each University and avoid supporting proposals that stray from the intent of a particular mission.

1. IN YOUR OPINION, WHAT IS THE ROLE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA BOARD OF GOVZERNORS?

The Board of Governors (BOG) is the governing authority of the UNC system of higher education in North Carolina. It is "responsible" for the control and supervision of the sixteen constitutent institutions. Policies and regulations are created to carry out these responsibilities.

The responsibility involves three key elements: planning, governance, and budgeting. Partly because of my service on the Planning Committee, I believe Planning to be extremely important. Long-range planning determines where you wish to go and how you wish to get there. Planning determines how much you need to spend and how efficiently the money is spent. Planning determines the proper evaluation of those persons put in charge of carrying out the objectives of higher education.

A five-year plan, revised every two years, is constantly in place. This plan determines the mission of each institution, and sets basic policies and priorities for the academic programs of each school.

Governance is also a key element. The BOG is responsible for the "general" supervision of the schools. While we do determine the academic programs and degrees awarded at each institution, as well as the enrollments and tuitions, much authority is delegated to the Boards of Trustees. Wisely so! How the BOG has handled its governance function over the years has played a significant role in the success of higher education in North Carolina. The BOG at times has consolidated authority (or "power") and used it in a productive way. (EXAMPLE: development of a comprehensive marine science program on both the graduate and undergraduate level involving UNC-CH, NCSU, ECU and UNC-W.) At times the BOG has delegated authority to the institutions because we felt this method was more effective and efficient. (EXAMPLE: the recent Privatization issue.) The fact that the BOG can use both approaches, and does use them wisely, has been instrumental in the national reputation of our system of higher education.

And of course the third key element is budgeting, which is the most discussed because it involves money, most of which comes from taxpayers. The role of the BOG here is to plan, develop and present to the General Assembly a unified budget for the entire UNC system, but presented in three categories: continuing operations, salaries, and capital needs.

2. WHAT DO YOU SEE AS YOUR ROLE AS AN INDIVIDUAL MEMBER OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS?

My major roles involve reading, listening, questioning, and negotiating.

The READING role centers on "doing-my homework", and conscientiously reviewing the volumns of reports that arrive weekly. Whether the subject matter is Off-Campus Distance Learning, Minority Presence or Professional Development, the reports are important and need to be read and digested.

Then at committee meetings the LISTENING takes place as staff presents verbally the summaries and recommendations of the reports recently received. IF I have read and listened properly, QUESTIONING may not be needed. But sometimes additional information is required, or disagreements need to be addressed.

If disagreements occur and varying opinions are intensely felt, then NEGOTIATING takes place, as appropriate "middle ground" is sought.

In addition to the basic work of serving on committees, etc. that result in the establishment of policy, another vital role is needed - the ability to sit back and look at the big picture. A VISONARY role. With the coordination and cooperation that now exists between public schools, community colleges and higher education, a "total education policy" for North Carolina is beginning to evolve - from birth to death. Therefore all decisions by the BOG need to be evaluated in light of how other educational institutions are affected.

If I am fortunate enough to receive a second term, another role would be appropriate - that of a PUBLIC ADVOCATE. With appearances before civic clubs or other groups, letters to the editor, or various meetings with public officials, the result would be more effective communication with the public concerning higher education in North Carolina - what we are doing right, where we are headed, and what is needed to be even better.

3. WHAT ARE YOUR PRIMARY CONCERNS REGARDING IMPROVEMENT OF THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM? AS AN INDIVIDUAL BOARD MEMBER, HOW WOULD YOU GO ABOUT ADVOCATING AND IMPLEMENTING SOLUTIONS TO ADDRESS YOUR CONCERNS, PARTICULARLY WHEN THIS WOULD MEAN ADVOCATING A POSITION CONTRARY TO THAT OF THE MAJORITY OF THE BOARD OR OF THE GENERAL ADMINISTRATION?

Monies spent on education should never be considered an expense, but rather an investment. Policies and procedures that affect education should be created with the thought of enhancing the return on our investment. Two statistics that have always concerned me are our retention and graduation rates, because they adversely affect our return on investment. While we state correctly that our graduation rates are above the national average, the rates themselves are atrocious. A four-year graduation rate of under 30% for the entire system! And some schools reflect a graduation rate of under twenty per cent in four years! The persistence rate, which reflects the percentage of students remaining in school or graduating, is 61%. Almost four of every ten students entering the system fail to either graduate or remain in school after four years.

How to correct it? Several new programs are underway which should result in higher rates in the coming years. A two-year study of academic advising has resulted in a deeper commitment to assisting students. All schools are devoting additional monies, time, energies, personnel and technology in developing a stronger support system for incoming students. This is true of even the research institutions, who for years prided themselves on not needing an extensive system due to the quality of students at their schools.

With the enrollment growth predicted for the next decade, a long look should be taken at our minimum standards for admission, particularly among those schools that admit borderline students. Is it cost effective to admit these students, when you consider the current graduation and retention rates? And if (admission) space will be at a premium around the year 2000, why not allow these border-line students to attend community colleges, enter the two-year program, and IF their grades allow, transfer to a UNC school after their sophomore year?

A possible increase in admission standards may not be welcomed by General Administration. But my responsibility would be to place the issue on the agenda, have it discussed thoroughly, and see what develops.

4. IN YOUR ROLE AS A MEMBER OF THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS, HOW WOULD YOU REFLECT AN APPRECIATION AND UNDERSTANDING FOR THE UNIQUE MISSION OF THE INDIVIDUAL CONSTITUTENT UNIVERSITIES?

In order to truly understand the uniqueness of our university system, you first have to know it. And that takes time. Time to visit each campus, time to talk with the chancellor, students, faculty and administrators, and time to review and study the academic programs available at each campus.

To realize that under one system we have a small liberal arts school in the west that features an excellent undergraduate research program (UNC-A), another school in the Triad that houses a nationally-recognized minority engineering school (NCA&T), and yet another east coast facility that is building a first-class marine science program (UNC-W), is truly breathtaking. Two research institutions, with world-class reputations, as well as a national school for those interested in the arts, all within the same state and system, available for our high school graduates.

As you gather knowledge about each of the sixteen constituent institutions and your appreciation grows (and it continues to grow, with each passing month and year), then your responsibility as a Board of Governors member is to educate the citizens of our state about this valuable asset. Most citizens simply do not understand the variety and quality of our system of higher education. They do not realize the value of a small institution such as UNC-P, that has sent approximately fifty graduates to medical school (to successfully compete against graduates of Duke, Davidson, Wake Forest, etc.), and have most of them return to southeastern North Carolina to set up practice. The quality of our research institutions (UNC-CH and NCSU) are the solid foundation of our university system, but the true value and service to our state is found in the variety and unique mission of each of the sixteen campuses. We are truly blessed.

As an individual Board member, how would you go about advocating and implementing solutions to address your concerns, particularly when this would mean advocating a position contrary to that of the majority of the Board or of the General Administration?
- 4. In your role as a member of the Board of Governors, how would you reflect an appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities?

# Nominee's Biography

Vernon Robinson's family history is a slice of Americana. His mother's mother was a domestic servant in rural Louisiana. Through hard work and scholarships to Gilbert Academy and Dillard University, Vernon's mom, Dr. Stella Robinson, earned the first college degree in her family and eventually earned a master's degree and doctorate, retiring from the faculty of the University of Michigan. Vernon's dad, grew up in Los Angeles, joined the Army Air Corps famed 332nd Fighter Group as a radio technician during World War II and eventually retiring from Federal service with the Federal Aviation Administration.

With the power of knowledge and hard work, Vernon, his sister and brother are now President of a Foundation, an executive with the World Council of Churches, and President of a Music Publishing Company respectively.

Regrettably, educational opportunities for the working poor and increasingly the middle class are being choked off by the current government education monopoly. Status quo education interest groups have created a system that has effectively broken off the bottom rungs of educational opportunity for many of our citizens. These failures at the primary and secondary level have directly and negatively impacted on the University of North Carolina System.

Vernon played basketball and studied military history in high school. He was appointed to the Class of 1977 at the U.S. Air Force Academy. After graduation, he served five years of active duty as a missile combat crew commander and eight years in the reserves as an intelligence officer at Seymour Johnson AFB and Pope AFB in North Carolina. While on active duty, he earned an MBA in quantitative methods from the University of Missouri.

Vernon accepted an appointment as an assistant professor teaching information systems in the Business Department at Winston-Salem State University. He was shocked by the number of students maimed by the public education systems' diploma mill giving 12th grade diplomas for 6th grade work. He saw the agony of students who realized that they were not only not ready for college work but hardly prepared for 7th grade work.

Vernon became a vocal advocate of school choice to restore educational opportunity, parental authority and taxpayer confidence.

After attracting the attention of Education Secretary Bill Bennett, Pete duPont, the Wall Street Journal and National Review during his 1992 bid for State Superintendent, Vernon founded the North Carolina Education Reform Foundation and the North Carolina Education Reform Action Network. The Foundation holds forums to inform the public about school policy options to empower parents and teachers so that an informed debate can take place on how best to expand educational opportunity. The Action Network builds a grassroots lobby to support passage of school choice legislation.

Robinson drafted HB 955, the Charter School Educational Opportunity Act, that was passed by the House during the 1995 session. In addition to numerous opinion editorials in newspapers across North Carolina, Robinson wrote the article supporting full and fair school choice in the September issue of NC Insight.

Vernon Robinson is currently the President of the North Carolina Education Reform Foundation in Raleigh. He is married to Helene Agnew of St. Louis. They have a daughter, Alexandra.

## Answers to BOG nominee questions:

I believe that publicly supported education must transition with the forces driving the information economy. Once upon a time individuals stored up all the knowledge thatthey were able to absorb and then lived on that inventory for the rest of their lives in one career. My father and many other fathers not only had one career after military service in World War II, but spend 35 years in one company, or in his case, the federal government. For most citizens, those days are gone.

I have had three careers including nine years in Air Force military service, nine years as a college professor and five years as a public policy foundation executive. Most baby boomers will have multiple careers. My daughter will turn 18 years old on August 3rd 2011. In her world, there will be three forms of employment; a limited number of public sectors "jobs," value-added entrepreneurs and temporary employees or temps.

No one will care where you went to school or what degree you have. The only thing they will care about is what skills do you bring to solve the next value added problem or seize the next value added opportunity for next Wednesday's client. An information age university system will offer learning opportunities at the convenience of the learner not at the convenience of university.

I believe that the value of credentials of all types are plummeting. High school diplomas are totally discounted by the market as worthless. Many college graduates are finding out that their diplomas are not much more valuable.

The role of the Board of Governors of the University of North Carolina is to provide public oversight to ensure the President and staff are facilitating the transition of the sixteen constituent institutions into the information age and to do so while keeping faith with the taxpayers who pay the bills and customers who buy our services.

My primary concern regarding improvements of the University System is to help the System through the aforementioned transition.

Anyone who knows me knows that I will forcefully and relentlessly advocate my position. As I have aged, I have learned to select the "good fights" carefully. When the core interests of the University System, its students, or the taxpayers are threatened, I will use all ethical avenues at my disposal to advocate my position, even if I am a minority of one. Innovation, creativity, and knowledge are power in the information age. I plan to wield all three in the interest of the citizens of North Carolina.

I have taught at and studied at a wide variety of institutions of higher learning. This experience gives me both the understanding of the unique missions of the constituent institutions as well as the ability to recognize a snow job from staff or consultants when I see one.

# 1. <u>In your opinion</u>, what is the role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors?

The Board of Governors has final University authority in personnel, planning, financial management, policy development, and governance. The Board is responsible to the people of North Carolina to ensure that the University's affairs are conducted responsibly.

Personnel policies and decisions are a fundamental responsibility of the Board. This responsibility includes the selection of the President and the approval of the President's management staff, including the Chancellors of the sixteen constituent institutions. These personnel ultimately shape the conduct and productivity of the University's affairs.

Planning is an ongoing process guiding the evolution of the University's programs and directions. There is perhaps no other area of state government in which planning will be more crucial over the next 10 to 20 years than in higher education. Considerable increases in student enrollment alone will call for new, innovative planning strategies.

Financial management is a duty of the Board of Governors. The Board is responsible to the citizens of North Carolina to ensure the highest possible level of teaching and learning at a reasonable cost. The State Constitution provides that higher education should be provided at the least practicable cost. The Board must, therefore, exercise sound judgment in the regulation and establishment of student fees and the management and control of costs. The presentation of the University's biennial budget requests to the General Assembly are an important Board product and an indication of the Board's priorities.

# 2. What do you see as your role as an individual member of the Board of Governors?

As an individual member of the Board of Governors I must conduct myself with the interests of the system as a whole and avoid special interests. I recognize that my responsibility is to the people of North Carolina and the University and not individual campuses within the system. I do, however, feel my experience as a member and chair of the East Carolina University Board of Trustees adds a valuable perspective to the Board of Governors.

I bring a special appreciation for the need for cooperation between the General Assembly, the Board of Governors and General Administration of the University. My professional experience with the General Assembly and my understanding of the nuances of effective government could be to the mutual benefit of the General Assembly and the University.

3. What are your primary concerns regarding improvement of the University System? As an individual Board member, how would you go about advocating and implementing solutions to address your concerns, particularly when this would mean advocating a position contrary to that of the majority of the Board or of the General Administration?

My primary concerns for University improvement are:

- a) maintaining, or returning where required, the University to a national leadership position.
- b) ensuring costs are carefully controlled.
- c) developing new, innovative techniques for meeting projected enrollment increases over the next decade.
- d) maintenance and preservation of present capital resources.
- e) improvement of linkages among all levels of public education.

I would advocate these and other concerns which may arise through straightforward discussion with Board members, the University President and his staff. I believe having a thorough knowledge of your position is a sound basis for arguing your beliefs. I would seek to persuade others to my point of view while understanding that there will be much to be learned from my colleagues. A spirit of compromise and cooperation is key to the art of successful Board membership and leadership yet I will not let the process intimidate me or my thinking.

4. In your role as a member of the Board of Governors, how would you reflect an appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities?

I would seek to learn as much as possible about each of the constituent institutions. One of the strengths of our system is the diversity represented by each campus. This diversity should be valued and enhanced by the Board. Students in North Carolina are blessed with an opportunity to find an appropriate match for their needs in higher education. Be it size, curriculum, location or type, there is a campus ideal for them.

The differences among our campuses should be valued. Efforts must be made to address the unique needs of the various institutions. Yet we must not loose sight of the overall mission of the University. Efficient management of resources, avoiding unnecessary duplication, and enhancing the strengths of each campus should guide our decision making.

### ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS TO BOARD OF GOVERNORS NOMINEES

1. In your opinion what is the role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors?

The Board of Governors are charged by the General Assembly with "the general determination, control, supervision, management and governance of all affairs of the constituent institutions." The Board of Governors set policies, and supervise the affairs of the constituent universities. The Board of Governors carry out their responsibilities through the general administration staff and through the service of the Board of Trustees and staff at each of the constituent institutions. The Board of Governors' overall role is to carry out the mission of the University of North Carolina and that is to provide a quality university education for the citizens of the State of North Carolina at a reasonable cost.

The Board of Governors have responsibility for working with the staff to establish a budget for the University System and to approve the budgets for each of the member institutions that have been submitted by the individual universities.

The Board of Governors performs its role through several committees as follows:

Budget and finance Personnel and tenure Educational planning, policies and programs University governance

The Board of Governors approve all acquisitions of property for the universities and oversee the management of the property at the universities. The Board of Governors approve all changes in faculty and management personnel at the constituent universities. The Board of Governors also approve the salaries for the management personnel and general administration at the constituent universities. The Board of Governors approve the budgets for the individual universities and revisions to those budgets. The Board of Governors approve all new capital improvement projects at the constituent universities and they approve all bond issues for the University System. The Board of Governors also approve all degree programs at the various universities. The Board of Governors also elect eight of the Trustees for each of the constituent universities. In addition to the sixteen constituent institutions the Board of Governors has the responsibility for the UNC Center for Public Television, the Agricultural Research and Cooperative Extension Services of North Carolina State University, the University of North Carolina Hospitals at Chapel Hill and the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics.

The Board of Governors has the responsibility to prepare and present to the Governor, the Advisory Budget Commission and the General Assembly a single, unified recommended budget for all of the public senior higher education for the State of North Carolina. The budget has to be presented in three parts:

- (1) A continuation budget for the constituent institutions;
- (2) A separate request for academic salary increases;
- (3) A budget for expansions and improvements for both current operations and capital improvements presented with a schedule of priorities for the capital improvements.

## 2. What do you see as your role as an individual member of the Board of Governors?

As a member of the Board of Governors, I believe that it is my responsibility to attend the meetings, to review the materials that are sent to the Board members between meetings and to come to the meetings prepared to discuss the items that are on the agenda. I believe that it is my responsibility to have a general knowledge of the University System including general administration and the constituent universities. As a member of the Board of Governors, I believe that it is my responsibility to periodically visit campuses of the University System and to generally be knowledgeable about the System. As a member of the Board of Governors it is my responsibility to work for the people of the State of North Carolina and the Legislature to see that the University System provides the optimum opportunity for students from the State of North Carolina to obtain the best possible university education at a reasonable cost.

# 3. What are your primary concerns regarding improvement to the University System?

I believe that we have one of the finest state university systems in the nation. I believe that our University System has generally been managed very effectively for the citizens of our State. Obviously, any organization the size of our University System, can improve its operations. I believe that the University System needs to be more involved in helping our public education system to improve its quality. I also believe that our University System needs to work closer with our Community College System to provide an opportunity for community college graduates to move into the University System as smoothly as possible. I believe that our University System needs to continuously review the degree programs offered to determine if they are effective and needed by the citizens of our State. I believe that there may be some programs that need to be consolidated in order to avoid duplication by another university in close proximity.

As an individual Board Member, how would you go about advocating and implementing solutions to address your concerns, particularly when this would mean advocating a position contrary to that of the majority of the Board or of the General Administration?

As a Board Member it would be my responsibility to present my position to the other Board Members in such a way that I could build a consensus in favor of my position within the Board. If I could not build a consensus for my position within the Board, I should review my position to see if possibly I was in error. Generally I have been able to build a consensus for the positions that I have advocated on the Boards that I have served on in the past.

4. In your role as a member of the Board of Governors, how would you reflect an appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities?

Each of the constituent universities in our System have unique missions and roles. I would certainly want to increase my knowledge and understanding of the individual missions and roles of the constituent universities by visiting the universities, talking with members of the Board of Trustees of the individual universities and talking with the staff of the universities. As I have had the opportunity to serve on the Board of Trustees at UNC-Wilmington, on the Foundation Board at UNC-Wilmington and on a Foundation Board at the East Carolina University Medical School, I have had the opportunity of working with the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and the NC State University in fundraising efforts, I have a fairly good understanding of several of the universities within the System. I have personally visited the campuses of most of the sixteen universities within the System. I have worked on task forces within the State of North Carolina with members of the faculty and staff at several of the universities. I believe that I have a fairly good understanding of the roles of most of the universities within the System. I respect what each campus brings to the total System, and I will work for the total System to the best of my ability.

QUESTION #1.

In your opinion, what is the role of the University of North Carolina Board of

Governors?

The role of The University of North Carolina Board of Governors is primarily that of providing <u>Governance</u>, <u>Budgeting Directions</u>, <u>Program Approval</u>, <u>Personnel Approval</u>, <u>and General Policy Development for the Effective Overall Operation</u> of a Multi-Campus Statewide System of Higher education.

The board selects the President of the University. Upon the Presidents recommendation, the board approves the appointment of each of the sixteen Chancellors and their Chief Administrators. The Board of Governors is the appointing authority for eight members of the twelve member Board of Trustees at each of the sixteen constituent universities four appointed by the Governor).

The Board of Governors has a special obligation to: Recommend appropriate legislation to the NC General Assembly, provide for appropriate policy leading to assessment of educational programs at all institutions, develop long range plans for the university, and serve as a Court of Appeal for internal university matters.

Listed below are selected Statutory Powers and Duties of the Board of Governors:

- Develop a coordinated system of higher education
- Supervision and governance of constituent institutions
- Determine academic programs of constituent institutions
- Approve establishment of any new public supported institution above the community college level
- Collect and disseminate data on higher education in the state
- Operate an Educational Opportunities Information Center
- Advise General Assembly, Governor, and Board of Trustees
- May delegate authority to constituent institutions

Finally, The Board of Governors as a unit should have a balanced interest in promoting effective instruction, appropriate research and meaningful public serve at each constituent institution.



QUESTION #2.

What do you see as your role as an individual member of the Board of Governors?

I see my role as an individual member of the Board of Governors to be:

- An advocate for continuing to make Higher Education accessible and affordable to all North Carolina citizens qualified and eligible to profit from the university offerings.
- Concerned with the long run welfare of the total university and not just a part of it.
- To address policy and productivity with good judgment and restraint without interfering with administrative details.
- To contribute adequate time to the responsibilities of the board in regular meetings and meetings of assigned standing committees.
- To communicate with Grassroots Citizen Groups and organizations as a part of information dissemination.

#### QUESTION #3.

What are your primary concerns regarding improvement of the University? As an individual Board member, how would you go about advocating a position contrary to that of the majority of the board or of the General Administration?

My primary concerns for improvement of the University System are related to:

- Providing student financial aid to eligible undergraduates statewide, with information of same made available early.
- Developing opportunities for institutions to provide an improved level of <u>Public Service</u> to regions of the State, without damaging the instructional program.

Administration, I would first start at the standing committee level with a well documented proposal as to the need, cost and value to the system and the state. I would lobby the committee for a positive recommendation to the full board. Without this consensus opinion, I would lobby the total board and present to the board at a regular monthly meeting a minority report and a request for action and/or further study, with action to take place at a date certain.


#### QUESTION #4.

In 1992 the Board of Governors completed a review of the Mission of all constituent institutions. Because of this involvement, I would insist that each university develop, at a high productive level, the programs approved by the Board of Governors, for that institution in its Mission Statement.



- 3. Be an exemplary governor, a role model for other Board members, by seeking consensus, by being accepting of others' views, by supporting the ultimate resolution/outcome, and by placing the interests of the State and the System above my personal interests.
- 4. Be informed and knowledgeable about the UNC system and each of the 16 constituent campuses.
- 5. Be fair and honest in all deliberations; do not "represent" any one faction or campus.
- 6. Listen, be reflective, and be prepared to ask the difficult questions in order to further the mission of UNC.
- 7. Attend all Committee and Board meetings and be informed to discuss any subjects that comes before the Board.


### A. My primary concerns are as follows:

- 1. Increasing access to UNC for all qualified students either on or off campus.
- 2. Ensuring diversity throughout our campuses.
- 3. Promote the further use of appropriate technology for distance learning applications.
- 4. Be most efficient with the dollars available via implementing the revised funding model.
- 5. The need to increase private (individual) and public (U.S. government and foundations) support for scholarships, facilities, and research in order to supplement the funds from the General Assembly.
- 6. Continue to monitor the productivity of our classrooms, the campuses, and institutes on a regular basis.
- 7. Continue the Presidential and Board assessment processes.
- 8. Ensure that the campus Boards of Trustees represent a cross-section of the State.
- 9. The Board of Governors should take the lead and encourage better coordination among the public school system, the community colleges, and UNC to better utilize their collective resources, improve the quality of education at all levels across the State, and ease the transfer of credits between the community colleges and UNC campus.
- 10. Improve undergraduate student advising.
- 11. Improvement of retention and graduation rates.
- B. I would advocate these concerns and seek solutions to them by:
  - Firstly, understanding the diverse viewpoints by asking probing questions, studying the subject in depth, and seeking advice from those more knowledgeable than myself.
  - Secondly, using my acquired information, good judgement and personal relationships, seek consensus and ask individuals to support this solution.
  - Thirdly, present the solution to the entire Board and ask for their support.

Given my current role as Secretary and as a past Chairman of the Board of Trustees of UNCA, the system's only Baccalaureate (Liberal Arts) I University, I respect the uniqueness of each individual institution's mission and have demonstrated this by:

- Being fair, unbiased, and impartial toward each institution, realizing that each campus fulfills a specific niche and serves a specific need. Collectively their individuality and uniqueness make the system stronger.
- Advocating for the improvement of quality of undergraduate teaching, research, and public service at the smaller, weaker institutions without jeopardizing the quality of the "flagships."
- Funding each university at a level to promote their uniqueness within the policies established by the General Assembly and the Board of Governors. "Equity funding" implies providing funds to each campus for both the continuing and capital budgets at a sustained level to provide for the long term growth and enhancement, but not taking funding from one campus to supplement another.
- As a member of the Committee on Educational Planning, Policies, and Programs, I have read and consequently approved each individual campus' mission statement and resulting educational offerings.

Responses to Questions to Board of Governors Nominees

1. In your opinion, what is the role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors?

The Board of Governors' role is to provide the people of North Carolina with the highest quality public universities. North Carolina's public universities should be known for being outstanding in the areas of instruction, extra-curricular programs, outreach, and research. In all matters of policy and personnel, the Board should uphold the spirit and intent of the Constitution and statutes of North Carolina. The Board must be certain that all financial resources are wisely spent, and any unnecessary duplication of degree programs are eliminated. The Board should provide diligent oversight for the System, and carefully investigate any alleged improprieties. The Board should seek to establish a close relationship with the Boards of Trustees of the constituent universities.

2. What do you see as your role as an individual member of the Board of Governors?

I would bring to the Board a thorough understanding of intercollegiate athletics, the state budget system, and the U.S. Congress. Therefore, I believe my knowledge and contacts in these areas would enable me to assist with promoting integrity in intercollegiate athletics, conserving financial resources, and properly interacting with the federal government. Also, I would be available to discuss issues before the Board with members of the State House of Representatives.

3. What are your primary concerns regarding improvement of the University System? As an individual Board member, how would you go about advocating and implementing solutions to address your concerns, particularly when this would mean advocating a position contrary to that of the majority of the Board or of the General Administration?

I am concerned about unnecessary duplication of degree programs, under-utilization of some faculty, under-achievement by many student, and inadequate control of student conduct.

Before advocating a solution, I would be certain I had collected and studied the best information available and consulted with a representative sample of the affected parties. To implement the solution, I would try to convince individual members of the appropriate committee, and key staff that my solution was needed. If unsuccessful, and I still felt my solution was the best course of action, I would bring it individually to the attention of other members of the Board, and ultimately to a public session of the Board. I have experience being in the minority on some issues, and realize that it often takes a great deal of time for others to accept your point of view. At all times, I would seek to be patiently persistent and conduct myself as a gentleman.

4. In your role as a member of the Board of Governors, how would you reflect an appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities?

I would make it clear in both word and action that I was not representing a particular university or region on the Board Even before I was seated on the Board, I would make a special effort to visit with officials of the constituent institutions to make sure I had an appreciation and understanding for their mission. Through the years, I have visited all but one of the constituent universities, and I was employed by the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill for twelve years. My daughter has degrees from Appalachian State and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and my son attended the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

# Question 1: In your opinion, what is the role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors?

The University of North Carolina Board of Governors supervises and manages the affairs of the constituent institutions. The Board oversees the academic programs and develops a budget to present to the General Assembly.

As managers of the constituent institutions, the Board must focus on the unique needs of the individual institutions and coordinate these diverse goals with the other constituent institutions. It is incumbent upon the Board to provide leadership and guidance to the constituent institutions as we seek to fulfill the needs and missions of the institutions, as well as the needs of the state.

In its leadership role, the Board must develop and implement a strategic plan that is supported by a vision for the future, with clear goals and objectives for achieving excellence. The Board, with input from the constituent institutions, the General Assembly, and others, must formulate a vision for the University System and develop a plan that makes that vision tangible and puts that vision into action.

The Board must also integrate the missions and activities of the constituent institutions with the goals for higher education across the state. We need to continue our efforts to coordinate with the State Board of Community Colleges and the State Board of Education, so that we may improve public education at every level across the state. The outcome should be a state system of higher education that is innovative and serves as a standard of excellence across the country, while providing the students of North Carolina with the tools they need to make our state the standard of excellence for business, industry and government.

# Question 2: What do you see as your role as an individual member of the Board of Governors?

My role as an individual member of the Board of Governors is to serve the best interests of the state as a whole. Doing what is best for one does not require depriving another. In contradistinction, my work challenges me to continually find ways for generally competing interests to seek win-win terms and goals. These skills that I have developed while working with HMOs, hospitals, and physicians will be applied to my tenure on the Board of Governors.

In this era of scarce resources, it is important that we integrate our efforts for higher education and find ways to complement and support one another. As our constituent institutions work together, we will find ways to utilize our resources effectively and efficiently.

As a member of the Board, I will bring to the table the needs of the business community, the citizens, and education as a whole. To fulfill its mission, the Board must understand the changing demographics and the changing workplace. As a member of the Board, I will stay abreast of those changes.

Question 3: What are your primary concerns regarding improvement of the University System: As an individual Board member, how would you go about advocating and implementing solutions to address your concerns, particularly when this would mean advocating a position contrary to that of the majority of the Board or of the General Administration?

North Carolina already has a university system that is the best in the nation. Now, we must become even better and continually stay ahead of the curve. Innovation and excellence must be the cornerstone upon which we continue to build a university system that is a beacon for all other states.

The system must achieve greater goals while operating in a world of scarce resources. This goal can be achieved by integrating efforts across the system while maintaining the integrity and individuality of each institution. Through this approach, we can create a vision of higher education across the state.

As we go forward, the university system must serve the best interests of the state and higher education. We need to strike a balance between liberal arts and technology that allows our graduates to be leaders and achievers for North Carolina. To do this, we must be ever mindful of the changing market place, changing industry, changing technology and the changing workforce. A university is a dynamic, fluid, and changing environment and the Board must embrace the concept of change so that we may prepare our students for what the state will be, not just what it is today.

As the Board seeks solutions, I will attempt to quantify the results of solutions I pose. As people see the outcome of an idea, they begin to agree with the value of the idea. This way of approaching new ideas, when based on a foundation of integrity and trust, helps solidify support for your ideas from the group.

Question 4: In your role as a member of the Board of Governors, how would you reflect an appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities?

We have sixteen constituent institutions across the state that serve diverse populations and provide different programs. As I have traveled across the state with my work, I have discovered how wonderfully diverse our state is.

Our constituent institutions serve regions that have industry, agriculture and environments that are very distinct from other regions. Moreover, constituent institutions have each developed academic programs that meet the specific needs of our state.

As we develop strategic plans, we must embrace each institution for the work that it does and the individual needs that it meets. To this end, we as Board members must have a working knowledge of each institution, the community in which it resides, the population it serves, and the academic programs that form its anchor.

Each institution of the system is key to having a system of higher education that serves the needs of the state. We must find ways to help each institution complement the other and participate fully in the system.

### Responses to Question to Board of Governors Nominees

### Timothy Keith Moore

# 1. In your opinion, what is the role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors?

The role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors (BOG), as prescribed by statute, is to provide the policy leadership of the UNC system of universities. This includes, approving a single unified budget for all of the sixteen constituent campuses and approval of the establishment of any new public senior institution, consulting with the State Board of Education, the Department of Community Colleges, and the private institutions of higher education to develop consistent policies with respect to higher education in North Carolina.

The BOG has tremendous authority to develop consistent policies among the sixteen campuses. One area of particular interest to me is how monies are distributed and used on campuses to support vital programs as well as controversial special interest groups. The use of taxpayer funds and student fees deserves intense scrutiny as the Board of Governors must be financially accountable to the citizens of North Carolina. The BOG also must develop policies that make its campuses safe centers for learning by taking steps to reduce levels of campus crimes. Unfortunately this is a problem that commands attention. The Board of Governors must do all that it can to implement measures to increase safety on our campuses.

## 2. What do you see as your role as an individual member of the Board of Governors?

As a relatively recent graduate from UNC-Chapel Hill (1992), I can relate to the students and their concerns. I have a deepened understanding of the operations of the university bureaucracy and insight into the ways it can be improved through my involvement in student government.

As an attorney, I have the ability to understand the complex legal issues surrounding policy making and enforcing in higher education. As a member of the Board I would zealously defend any positions I advocate without regard to popularity, making sure that my focus is solely on the betterment of the UNC system.

As an individual Board member, I will be an active, educated member clearly focused on improving the direction of the University system with regard to academic achievement, fiscal accountability and oversight, demanding that the university remain an institution of academic freedom.

I believe that the citizens of North Carolina deserve benefits from the University system. Increased educational opportunity, improvements in quality of life from continued university research, and access to varying cultural and political ideologies all combine to make this system one that of which our citizens can be

very proud. It is vital that the BOG continue to support and encourage these endeavors as they are what makes the UNC system a leader among the nations university systems.

3. What are your primary concerns regarding improvement of the University system? As an individual Board member, how would you go about advocating and implementing solutions to address your concerns, particularly when this would mean advocating a position contrary to that of the majority of the Board or of the General Administration?

One of my major concerns is fighting drugs on campus. No one denies that drug abuse has become a blight on society. Drugs have made their way into virtually every facet of our community. This problem has taken its toll on the universities through increased medical costs and heightened rates of criminal activity. In order to combat the crimes and other costs associated with drug abuse on UNC campuses, serious action must be taken.

I propose that the UNC campuses become "drug free zones" where persons convicted of drug related offenses receive greater penalties than those currently applicable. One possibility is a "one strike and you are out" provision in which any student convicted of a drug related offense on campus may not attend a state university for a period of one year following such a conviction. Further, additional action should be taken to punish non-students who would bring drugs onto the campuses such as heightened penalties for convictions of drug related crimes occurring on campus.

There are numerous alternatives that the UNC Board of Governors should consider when deciding how to best attack the problem of drug abuse. Once a decision has been reached, it may be necessary to work with the General Assembly to implement stricter and more aggressive strategies. I plan to be an instrumental part of fighting the war on drugs.

Another major concern is examining the use of student fees. The use of student fees to fund different organizations and causes has been questioned greatly in the past. Students have been required to pay increasing fees to provide for these funds. Large portions of these monies have been used to finance political and special interests groups with which many fee paying students have strong disagreement.

These issues have been and are being addressed by the courts. The legal trend is that forcing students to support causes and organizations through their student fees with which they disagree is violative of the First Amendment's right to free speech, and in any case is undemocratic.

I propose a study of the University student fee process to make the use and distribution of fees more equitable and non-political in nature. The bottom line is that mandatory student fees should not be used for political and ideological causes.

In the event that a position I am advocating is contrary to a majority of the Board, I will work to reach a compromise or look to other avenues to achieve those goals. I have no concern with respect to advocating a position contrary to the

General Administration, because it is the duty of the BOG to develop policy and the duty of the General Administration to carry out those policies, not to debate the policy decisions of the BOG. Accordingly, I will adhere to my ideological and policy positions, advocate them strenuously, and, where appropriate, work for compromise. Be assured that I will never betray my conscience and principles. As a graduate of the UNC system, I have a vested interest in its continued success.

# 4. In your role as a member of the Board of Governors, how would you reflect an appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities?

To reflect an appreciation and understanding of the unique missions of the individual constituent universities, I will visit all of the campuses and during such visits keep a journal of any observations or new ideas from which other campuses may benefit. I hope to take an active role in a project or program at all sixteen schools. Furthermore, I will maintain a high level of interaction with administrators, professors, and students at the different universities to discover what are the local concerns and how the Board of Governors can address these issues.

There should be system-wide evaluation of educational services and learning outcomes. The graduation rate at every university needs to be carefully monitored so that steps to increase that number can be taken if necessary. It is the job of the universities to demand excellence at every level of the college experience so that graduation rates will continue to rise.

Additionally, I will work to see that the regional universities receive appropriate funding and study concerning improvements, expansion, and continuation of undergraduate and graduate programs.

1. In your opinion, what is the role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors?

The role of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors is to discharge their duties consistent with what I believe to be the goal of every citizen in North Carolina. That goal being to establish and maintain the status of the North Carolina University System as the premier university system in the United States. The specific responsibility of the Board of Governors is to develop, implement, monitor, and evaluate the necessary policies to accomplish that goal within the guidelines and budgets as established by the North Carolina General Assembly.

2. What do you see as your role as an individual member of the Board of Governors?

My role as an individual member of the Board of Governors is to actively participate in the attainment of the goal aforementioned. I anticipate this requiring the commitment of time and talent. I anticipate this requiring an open mind, understanding, and a willingness to speak up. I anticipate the necessity to be able to help generate and consider the alternatives and make the difficult choices. I anticipate being an integral part of the decision making process.

Also, I believe there is an ethical requirement of each member of the Board of Governors to remember that only when acting as a Board are their actions significant. 3. What are your primary concerns regarding improvement of the University System? As an individual Board Member, how would you go about advocating and implementing solutions to address your concerns, particularly when this would mean advocating a position contrary to that of the majority of the Board or of the General Administration?

My primary concern is the challenge of providing a high quality education with the realization of the fact we are facing dwindling financial resources from the taxpayers of North Carolina. The North Carolina General Assembly is faced with the same set of expectations all levels of government are receiving. That being to provide the services the citizens need (or want) with no more or less resources. I expect the Members of the General Assembly to demand from the Board of Governors no less. I believe my challenge will be to work to deliver a product (quality education for students) at the absolute best value.

To address how I would advocate or implement solutions when it meant advocating a position contrary to the majority of the Board or the General Administration, I will call upon the resources of a broad array of life experiences. In my professional life I am accustomed to making decisions which have broad impact on my corporation and the residents of my region and are at times controversial. I served as Chairman of the Iredell County Board of Commissioners during which time we built an industrial park, merged two school systems, and performed a countywide revaluation. I was the Co-Chair of a bond referendum. In all these situations, conflict and disagreement were commonplace. However, I am convinced that committed, rational people can disagree and yet work toward a common goal.

I believe I bring three strong convictions to the Board of Governors. One, I am committed to building in North Carolina the premier university system in the United States. Two, I believe I bring strong organizational skills to the Board. I pride myself in bringing diverse and divergent opinions to consensus. Third, I am a team player. I have a strong belief that the proper role for a Board member is to openly and candidly discuss all issues, arrive at consensus as to the course of action, monitor implementation, and evaluate results. The caliber of appointees to the Board of Governors should be capable of making decisions in the best interest of the University.

4. In your role as a member of the Board of Governors, how would you reflect an appreciation and understanding for the unique missions of the individual constituent universities?

Perhaps one of the most important principles a member of the Board of Governors should articulate is a commitment to adhere to the specific mission of the individual constituent universities. I am developing a clearer understanding of the specific mission statements of the constituent universities. I will follow a practice as part of my decision making process that reviews each action proposed to the Board to assure it is consistent with the mission of the affected institution.

Were North Carolina in a position where financial resources were plentiful, then extension, broadening, or even diverting from individual universities' missions might be tolerated. However, as I understand the prevailing sentiment of the citizens and the expectations this brings to the General Assembly, there is a need to maintain as austere budget as possible. This being the case, there is little opportunity to expand individual universities' missions but rather a need to adhere to that mission and insure complete and full attainment of that purpose.

### **MINUTES**

### HOUSE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF GOVERNORS COMMITTEE

February 11, 1997 2:30 p.m.

Chairman Lyons Gray presided at the meeting and the following Members were present: Representatives Aldridge, Alexander, Bonner, Clary, Culp, Dockham, Goodwin, Grady, Howard, and Mercer.

Committee Counsel, Kory Goldsmith, and Sara Kamprath and Jim Watts, Research Division, were present.

Representative Gray called the meeting to order at 2:40 p.m. He explained to the Committee the plan which would have the House elect 6 At-Large and 2 Political Minority persons to the University Board of Governors. Each Member of the House can only nominate two candidates. He asked Committee Counsel, Kory Goldsmith, to explain the Timeline Memorandum and the Nomination Form.

The Chairman explained the draft resolution, which outlines the procedure by which the House elects the 8 members to the UNC Board of Governors. The Committee discussed several aspects of the resolution and the reasons behind prohibiting individuals from being nominated by both houses in the same year. Committee Counsel read part of the statute which explains the Political Minority category. Chairman Gray explained that he took the liberty of placing all the names of the Committee members on the Resolution as sponsors. Anyone wishing that his or her name not appear there, please see him after the meeting and he would delete it. The Committee voted to accept the Resolution in its present form with the agreed changes and send it forward.

Nomination Form discussion: This is very similar to previous years except for the addition of a fax number and a date in the signature space. The questions at the end of the nomination form were discussed as a way to eliminate the painful face-to-face interrogation. There was no disagreement.. Chairman Gray noted that the nomination form becomes a public document after it is filed. He also noted that ballots need to be signed to be legal and that the ballots are not secret.

The Committee discussed further the questions at the end of the Nomination Form. There was some feeling that some of the questions were redundant. Kory Goldsmith explained that some of them were used to establish eligibility.

After much discussion, it was decided to come back a week from today ready with a decision on the form of the questions at the end of the Nomination Form.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:15 p.m.

RE: 1997 Board of Governors election

G.S. 116-6, 116-7

Generally, there are thirty-two members of the Board of Governors of the University of North Carolina serving staggered four-year terms. Each long session, the Senate and the House separately elect eight of the sixteen members to be elected that year. Members may be re-elected to serve a maximum of twelve consecutive years on the Board. No member of the General Assembly, State officer or employee, employee of a constituent university, nor any spouse of these persons may serve on the Board. Persons may hold no more than two appointive offices or one appointive and one elective office.

Each chamber prepares a resolution for a procedure to be followed to develop a slate of nominees. The chambers alternate electing members from among the four categories: at-large, racial minority, political minority party, and female. The process is divided by categories, and at least two nominees are named in each category if enough qualified nominees are submitted for consideration by the committee responsible for organizing the slate. The election is to be held within 30 legislative days of the completion of appointments to the education committees.

In 1997, the House of Representatives is to fill two minority party seats, and six at-large seats. See attached chart

### PROPOSED: 1997 Election Procedures

- 1. The House UNC Board of Governors Committee ("Committee") is responsible for receiving nominations from members of the House of Representatives.
- 2. Nominations close on March 6, 1997. The resolution proposes that only written nominations submitted on a form provided by the Chair of the Committee and received in the office of the Chair of the Committee by 12:00 noon on March 6, 1997 shall constitute a nomination. Forms may be obtained from the Chair of the Committee.
- 3. Members of the House of Representatives may nominate persons only in the following categories:
  - (a) Minority political party (2 seats); and

- (b) At-large (6 seats). Each Representative may nominate up to two persons.
- 4. No member of the General Assembly, no officer or employee of the State, no officer or employee of a constituent institution, and no spouse of any of these persons, are eligible to serve on the Board. Generally, an individual may hold two appointive offices or one appointive and one elective office.
- 5. After nominations close and after the Committee has screened the nominees, the members of the Committee shall vote for their preferences in each of the categories. Based upon the results of that vote, the Committee shall prepare a ballot that includes twice the number of candidates for the total seats open in each category. The Committee shall then vote for their preferences in each category.
- 6. The Committee shall prepare for the House a ballot that includes twice the number of candidates for the total seats open in each category and that indicates the results of the Committee's preference vote for the information of the members of the House of Representatives.
- 7. At the election, to be held no later than March 18, 1997, the Committee shall present the ballot to the House of Representatives. The Speaker of the House shall announce the election procedures, which are set out in the House resolution governing the election. No additional nominees may be received from the floor.
- 8. To be elected, a nominee must receive a majority vote of all members present and voting, as set out in the House resolution.
- 9. When the Chair of the Committee has determined that the House of Representatives has elected two members from the minority political party category for four-year terms, and six members from the at-large category for four-year terms, the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall declare those eight persons to have been elected.

§ 116-6. Election and terms of members of Board of Governors.

(a) As the terms of members of the Board of Governors provided for in G.S. 116-5 expire, their successors shall be elected by the Senate and House of Representatives. Sixteen members shall be elected at the regular legislative session in 1993 and every two years thereafter. The Senate and the House of Representatives shall each elect one-half of the persons necessary to fill the vacancies on the Board of Governors. Of the 16 members elected every two years beginning in 1993, at least two shall be women, at least two other members shall be members of a minority race, and at least two other members shall be members of the political party to which the largest minority of the members of the General Assembly belongs.

(b) In 1993 and every four years thereafter the Senate shall elect at least two women and two members of a minority race, and the House of Representatives shall elect at least two members of the political party to which the largest minority of the members of the General Assembly belongs. In 1995 and every four years thereafter the Senate shall elect at least two members of the political party to which the largest minority of the members of the General Assembly belongs, and the House of Representatives shall elect at least two women and two members of a minority race.

- (c) In electing members to the Board of Governors, the Senate and the House of Representatives shall select from a slate of candidates made in each house. The slate shall be prepared as provided by resolution of each house. If a sufficient number of nominees who are legally qualified are submitted in a category for which members of the Board of Governors are to be elected, then the slate of candidates shall list at least twice the number of candidates for the total seats open in a category. All qualified candidates in a category shall compete against all other qualified candidates in a category. In 1993 and biennially thereafter, each house shall hold their elections within 30 legislative days after appointments to their education committees are complete.
- (d) All terms shall commence on July 1 of odd-numbered years and all members shall serve for four-year overlapping terms.

(e) No person may be elected to:

- (1) More than three full four-year terms in succession:
- (2) A four-year term if preceded immediately by election to two full eight-year terms in succession; or
- (3) A four-year term if preceded immediately by election to an eight-year term and a four-year term in succession.

Resignation from a term of office does not constitute a break in service for the purpose of this subsection. Service prior to the beginning of those terms in 1989 shall be included in the limitations.

- (f) Any person who has served at least one full term as chairman of the Board of Governors shall be a member emeritus of the Board of Governors for one four-year term beginning at the expiration of that member's regular elected term. Any person already serving as an emeritus member may serve an additional four-year term beginning July 1, 1991. Members emeriti have all the rights and privileges of membership except they do not have a vote.
- (g) Effective July 1, 1991, and thereafter, any person who has served at least one term as a member of the Board of Governors after having served as Governor of North Carolina shall be a member emeritus of the Board of Governors, with all the rights and privileges of membership as in G.S. 116-6(f).

§ 116-7. General provisions concerning members of the Board of Governors.

(a) All members of the Board of Governors shall be selected for their interest in, and their ability to contribute to the fulfillment of, the purposes of the Board of Governors, and all members shall be deemed members-at-large, charged with the responsibility of serving the best interests of the whole State. In electing members, the objective shall be to obtain the services of the best qualified citizens of the State, taking into consideration the need for representation on the Board by the different races, sexes and political parties.

(b) From and after July 1, 1973, no member of the General Assembly or officer or employee of the State or of any constituent institution or spouse of any such member, officer or employee may be a member of the Board of Governors. Any member of the Board of Governors who is elected or appointed to the General Assembly or who becomes an officer or employee of the State or of any constituent institution or whose spouse is elected or appointed to the General Assembly or becomes such officer or employee shall be deemed thereupon to resign from his membership on the Board of

Governors.

(c) Whenever any vacancy shall occur in the elected membership of the Board of Governors, it shall be the duty of the Board to inform the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President of the Senate of the vacancy. The chamber that originally elected the vacating member shall elect a person to fill the vacancy. The vacancy shall remain unfilled until the appropriate chamber of the General Assembly elects a person to fill the vacancy.

The vacancy shall be filled not later than the adjournment sine die of the next regular session of the General Assembly. The election shall be for the remainder of the unexpired term. Whenever a member shall fail, for any reason other than ill health or service in the interest of the State or nation, to be present for four successive regular

meetings of the Board, his place as a member shall be deemed vacant.

  - Six persons in the at-large category, for four-year (b) terms.

5. The Chair of the Committee is responsible for 41 42 canvassing the vote and declaring the results and may designate 43 members of the Committee to assist. 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

Representative Gray presided and the following Members were present: Representatives Aldridge, Alexander, Barbee, Bonner, Clary, Culp, Dockham, Goodwin, Grady, Howard, Mercer, and Ex Officio Member Wood. Committee Counsel, Kory Goldsmith, and Sara Kamprath, Research Division, were present.

Chairman Gray called the meeting to order at 4:40 p.m. After copies were distributed, he explained Committee Counsel's memorandum explaining her investigation regarding the nominees fulfilling the legal requirements necessary. He stated his intention to have the Committee vote today for 12 At-Large candidates and 4 Political Minority Candidates. He requested each Committee member to sign the ballots as the ballots would be invalid without a signature. The Committee then voted on ballots provided by Kory Goldsmith, Committee Counsel.

Ms. Goldsmith and Sara Kamprath, Research Division, marked a tally of the votes while Chairman Gray read the names to the Committee. Representative Alexander, Ranking Minority Member, observed during this procedure. The Committee was at ease while the ballots were counted from the tally.

Chairman Gray announced the Committee had successfully achieved their goal on the first ballot. The following candidates will be on the March 18, 1997, ballot as the first order of business at a Session of the full House.
