The North Carolina General Assembly House Community Colleges Subcommittee on Education met on Thursday, May 14, 1997 at 11:00 a.m. in Room 424 of the Legislative Office Building.

House Chairman John Rayfield presided. Other House members present were Representative Jerry Dockham,, Representative Rick Eddins, Representative Stan Fox, Representative Julia Howard, Representative Wayne Sexton, Representative Fern Shubert, Representative Joe Tolson and Representative Steve Wood. House pages Caroline Wood, Wake, and Jeremy Newman, Durham, assisted during the meeting.

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Representative Rayfield. Nominee Ruth Arant gave a brief presentation after being introduced by Representative Shubert.

Representative Grady questioned the voting procedure. Ms. Goldsmith, Legal Staff, explained. Representative Grady questioned the possibility of circling four choices and having the staff tabulate. A vote was taken on the voting procedure which was carried unanimously.

The vote was made on written ballots. Ms Goldsmith and Ms. George tabulated. Ms. George gave the results. Four names were to appear on the final ballot to be presented to the House of Representatives. There was a tie between the fourth and fifth names. Representative Grady asked if five names could appear on the final ballot. A vote was taken and it was decided to have five names aappear on the final ballot. Chairman Representative Rayfield asked Ms. Goldsmith to prepare additional ballots in the event the same thing happens on the House floor.

Chairman Representative Rayfield suggested there be two groups of Representatives with three in each group—one reader and two tally persons. Representative Grady made a motion to accept this procedure which was carried unanimously. Chairman Representative Rayfield stated he would cover the voting procedure to be taken on the House floor with leadership.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:10 p.m.

RE: Legal Qualifications of Candidates for Nomination to State Board of Community Colleges

The following is a listing of the House nominees for the State Board of Community Colleges election. I have reviewed the applications that were submitted and indicated whether each nominee has any statutory disability. My opinion as to any nominee's statutory disability is based solely upon the information provided in the application which each nominee has certified is accurate. The nominees are listed in alphabetical order by their last name.

Ruth Arant

Ms. Arant is on the Union County Board of Adjustments and on the Union County Planning Commission Task Force. Ms. Arant's position on the Board of Adjustments probably constitutes a local office. It is not clear whether her position on the Planning Commission Task Force is also a local office. Under G.S. 128-1.1, she would be prohibited from holding two local offices and one State office. If her position on the Planning Commission Task Force is also a local office, Ms. Arant would have to resign one of her local offices if elected to the State Board of Community Colleges.

NOTE: No member of the General Assembly, State officer or employee, employee of an institution under the jurisdiction of the State Board of Community Colleges, and no spouse of any of those persons, is eligible to serve on the Board. No person who has been an employee of the Department of Community Colleges at any time during the last five years is eligible to serve on the Board.

Once submitted, a nominee's application and vitae are public documents.

- (b) The State Board of Community Colleges shall consist of 20 members, as follows:
- (1) The Lieutenant Governor (or a person designated by the Lieutenant Governor) shall be a member ex officio.
- (2) The Treasurer of North Carolina shall be a member ex officio.
- (3) The Governor shall appoint to the State Board four members from the State at large and one member from each of the six Trustee Association Regions defined in G.S. 115D-63 [G.S. 115D-62]. The initial appointments by the Governor shall be made effective July 1, 1980, or as soon as feasible thereafter. In order to establish regularly overlapping terms, the initial appointments by the Governor shall be made so that three expire June 30, 1981, three expire June 30, 1983, and four expire June 30, 1985. Each subsequent regular appointment by the Governor shall be for a term of six years and until a successor is appointed and qualifies. Any vacancy occurring among his appointees before the expiration of term shall be filled by appointment of the Governor; the member so appointed shall meet the same residential qualification, if any, as the member whom he succeeds and shall serve for the remainder of the unexpired term of that member.

(4) The General Assembly shall elect eight members of the State

Board from the State at large in the following manner:

- a. In 1980, the Senate shall elect three members, one of whom shall serve a term expiring June 30, 1981, one of whom shall serve a term expiring June 30, 1983, and one of whom shall serve a term expiring June 30, 1985. In 1985, the Senate shall elect two members to serve terms expiring June 30, 1991. Each subsequent regular election by the Senate shall be for a term of six years and until a successor is elected and qualifies.
- b. In 1980, the House of Representatives shall elect four members, one of whom shall serve a term expiring June 30, 1981, one of whom shall serve a term expiring June 30, 1983, and two of whom shall serve a term expiring June 30, 1985. In 1985, the House of Representatives shall elect two members, to serve terms expiring June 30, 1991. Each subsequent regular election by the House of Representatives shall be for a term of six years and until a successor is elected and qualifies.

c. Repealed by Session Laws 1985, c. 227, s. 5.

- d. The initial elections by the two houses of the General Assembly shall be held on or before July 1, 1980.
- e. Any vacancy occurring among the members elected by the two houses of the General Assembly before the expiration of term shall be filled when the General Assembly next convenes. The member then elected shall be elected by the same house that elected the member whom he succeeds, and shall serve for the remainder of the unexpired term of that member.
- f. At each session of the General Assembly held in an odd-numbered year, the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall assign to either a standing or a special committee of that house the duty of receiving from the members of that house nominations of persons to be considered by that house for election to the State Board. The chairmen of the two committees shall jointly determine a common final date for receiving nominations from members of that house, and a common date for reporting to their respective houses their nominations for the State Board. Each committee shall screen the proposed candidates for nomination as to their qualifications, background, lack of statutory disabilities, and willingness and ability to serve if elected. Each Senator and each Representative may nominate only one candidate. When the nominating

process is closed, each committee shall list all candidates and shall separately vote "aye" or "no" on each candidate to determine whether that person shall be listed as a nominee of the committee. The verbal vote of a majority of those members of the committee present and voting shall constitute one nominee of the committee. An individual cannot be a candidate for nomination to more than one place. If a sufficient number of candidates is submitted to each committee, then each committee shall nominate at least two persons for each place to be filled by that chamber, otherwise each committee shall nominate at least one person for each place to be filled by each of the House of Representatives and the Senate. No person may simultaneously be a candidate for election by both houses, and if one is nominated in both houses, he shall determine by which house he shall be nominated and so advise the chairman of both committees. The two houses shall, by joint resolution, fix a common date and time for the election of members of the State Board. At the election session in each house, the committee shall report its list of nominees with the term of office indicated for each nominee. The ballot in the House of Representatives shall also include the names of all other persons nominated by a member of that house who are determined by the committee to be qualified for the offices, with the committee's list of nominees being clearly set out on the ballot. No additional nominations shall be received from the floor. Each house shall then proceed to an election of the State Board. In order to be chosen, a nominee shall receive the votes of a majority of all members present and voting.

When each house has chosen one person for each place to be filled on the State Board, the chairman of the committee shall make a motion for the simultaneous election of those persons by that house to the indicated positions and for the indicated terms. The vote shall then be called electronically. If a majority of those voting shall vote "aye," persons named in the motion shall be declared to have been elected. Each house may adopt rules consistent with this section with respect to the election by that house of members of the State Board.

When the nominating process is closed, each committee shall list all candidates and shall separately vote "aye" or "no" on each candidate to determine whether that person shall be listed as a nominee of the committee. The verbal vote of a majority of those members of the committee present and voting shall constitute one nominee of the committee. An individual cannot be a candidate for nomination to more than one place. If a sufficient number of candidates is submitted to each committee, then each committee shall nominate at least two persons for each place to be filled by that chamber, otherwise each committee shall nominate at least one person for each place to be filled by each of the House of Representatives and the Senate. No person may simultaneously be a candidate for election by both houses, and if one is nominated in both houses, he shall determine by which house he shall be nominated and so advise the chairman of both committees. The two houses shall, by joint resolution, fix a common date and time for the election of members of the State Board. At the election session in each house, the committee shall report its list of nominees with the term of office indicated for each nominee. The ballot in the House of Representatives shall also include the names of all other persons nominated by a member of that house who are determined by the committee to be qualified for the offices, with the committee's list of nominees being clearly set out on the ballot. No additional nominations shall be received from the floor. Each house shall then proceed to an election of the State Board. In order to be chosen, a nominee shall receive the votes of a majority of all members present and voting.

When each house has chosen one person for each place to be filled on the State Board, the chairman of the committee shall make a motion for the simultaneous election of those persons by that house to the indicated positions and for the indicated terms. The vote shall then be called electronically. If a majority of those voting shall vote 'aye,' persons named in the motion shall be declared to have been elected. Each house may adopt rules consistent with this section with respect to the election by that house of members of the State Board."

House Bill 1136 Page 3

Section 2. G.S. 115D-12(b1) reads as rewritten:

"(b1) No person who has been employed full time by the any local community college within the prior 5 years and no spouse spouse, parent, or child of a person currently employed full time by the community college shall serve on the board of trustees of that college."

Section 3. This act is effective when it becomes law. Section 2 applies 7 to terms beginning on or after that date.
