MINUTES HOUSE COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE

June 2, 1998

The House Committee on Agriculture met in Room 1425 of the Legislative Building on Tuesday, June 2, 1998 at 10:00 a.m. Chairman Brown presided over the meeting with twenty one House Members present, four House Members absent and one excused absence.

Mr. Brown introduced the Pages serving the Committee and welcomed guests.

Representative Brown turned the meeting over to Representative Rex Baker to speak on House Bill #1248. Rep. Baker explained the bill entitled: AN ACT TO EXEMPT FROM INCOME TAX FEDERAL PAYMENTS TO TOBACCO ALLOTMENT HOLDERS, TOBACCO WORKERS, AND TOBACCO FARMERS AS COMPENSATION FOR LOSSES DUE TO THE FEDERAL TOBACCO SETTLEMENT to the Members..

Representative Jim Carpenter moved to adopt the amendment. The motion was carried. Representative Baker explained that the amendment moves to amend the bill on page 1, line 9, by deleting the term"(16)" and substituting the term "(17)". Next Representative Baker stated that this Bill would exempt from state taxation, payments made by the federal government to taxpayers under the federal Long-Term Economic Assistance for Farmers Act as reimbursements for loss of tobacco quotas.

Section 1 of the bill amends G.S. 105-130.5(b) to provide the exemption under the corporate income tax.

Section 2 of the bill amends G.S. 105-134.6(b) to provide the exemption to individual income taxpayers.

Representative Baker stated that the act is effective for taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 1998. Several questions were taken from the floor.

At this time, Representative Rick Eddins moved that the bill be given a favorable report

as to the committee substitute, be given an unfavorable to the original bill and recommended that the committee substitute bill be re-referred to the Committee on Finance. Motion carried.

Next, Chairman Brown introduced Representative Arlie Culp who spoke on House Bill #1529, entitled: AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR A HORSE PROMOTION

ASSESSMENT. Representative Tolson moved to accept the amendment. Motion was carried. Legal Staff explained that the amendment moves to amend the bill on page 1, lines 21 and 22, by inserting between those lines: (4) 'Equine' means a horse, pony, mule, donkey, or hinny. 'Horse owner' means a person who (i) is a North Carolina resident and (ii) owns or leases an equine or has a financial interest in equines or an equine operation." Several questions followed.

At this time, Representative Culp explained to the members that this bill was sponsored by Representative Brown and it provides for a referendum to allow horse owners to assess themselves, through a levy on commercial horse feed, in order to provide funds to the North Carolina Horse Council to promote the interest of the horse industry.

The North Carolina Horse Council is authorized to conduct a referendum among horse owners to determine if the assessment should be levied. To take effect, the assessment must be approved by a majority of votes cast in the referendum. The amount of the assessment may not exceed \$2 per ton of commercial horse feed and shall not extend for a period of more than 3 years. The Council is to determine the exact amount and period of the levy.

He went on to explain that if approved, the North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services shall notify all commercial feed dealers and distributors of the assessment and shall provide forms for reporting the assessment. The assessment is to be remitted to the Department with the inspection fee imposed under the Commercial Feed Law, Article 31C of Chapter 106 of the General Statutes. Anyone who purchases commercial horse feed may demand a refund of the assessment by writing the Horse Council within 30 days of buying the feed and providing proof of purchase.

The department is to remit funds to the North Carolina Horse Council at least quarterly. These funds may be used by the Horse Council to promote the interest of the horse industry, including administrative expenses to carry these functions.

Representative Culp stated that this act shall be effective when it becomes law.

Considerable discussion followed. Representative Owens asked the sponsor if he knew of any opposition to this bill? Representative Brown answered in the negative. Additional questions were taken from the floor.

Representative Owens moved that the bill be given a favorable report as to committee substitute, unfavorable as to original bill and recommended that the committee substitute bill be re-referred to the Committee on Finance. Motion carried.

The meeting adjourned at 10:50 a.m.



MINUTES HOUSE COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE

June 16, 1998

The House Committee on Agriculture met in Room 1425 of the Legislative Building on Tuesday, June 16, 1998 at 10:00 a.m. Chairman Brown presided over the meeting with twenty one House Members present, four House Members absent and one excused absence.

Chairman Brown introduced the Pages serving the Committee and welcomed guests.

Representative Brown turned the meeting over to Representative Frank Mitchell to speak on House Bill #1543 entitled: AN ACT TO REQUIRE THE REGISTRATION OF DEALERS IN POULTRY AND RATITES, TO PROHIBIT SPECIALTY MARKET OPERATORS FROM PERMITTING UNREGISTERED POULTRY OR RATITE DEALERS FROM OPERATING AT SPECIALTY MARKETS, AND TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS FOR THE ENFORCEMENT OF THESE REGISTRATION REQUIREMENTS. Mr. Mitchell state that House Bill #1543, introduced by Representative Brown, would require all dealers of live poultry and ratites, other than those who sell birds on their own premises that were raised on their own premises, to register with the North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. The current poultry laws only require hatching egg dealers and chick dealers to obtain a license from the Department.

Mr. Mitchell reported that in addition to the registration requirement, the bill provides that specialty market operators may not knowingly allow an unregistered poultry or ratite dealer to operate on the premises more than 10 days after the operator has received notice from the Department of the dealer's unregistered status. A specialty market operator is one who leases space to another at a location other than a permanent retail store, for the purpose of selling goods at retail (ie. A flea market operator). G.S. 66-250. Live poultry and ratite dealers are further required to keep records as required by the Department.

Further, Representative Mitchell stated that persons who fail to comply with the act are guilty of a Class 2 misdemeanor and are subject to civil penalties of up to \$5,000. G.S. 106-540 and G.S. 106-549.01.

The sum of \$10,000 is appropriated from the General Fun to the Department for the enforcement of the registration requirements.

The definitional portions of the act, Sections 1 and 2, are effective when the bill becomes law. The appropriation becomes effective July 1, 1998. The registration and records requirements become effective October 1, 1998.

Considerable discussion followed and several questions were accepted at this time.

Representative Gene Rogers moved to give the bill a favorable report and recommendation that the bill be re-referred to the Committee on Appropriations. Motion carried.

Next, Chairman Brown introduced Dr. Larry Tombaugh, Dean of College of Forest Resources at North Carolina State University. Dean Tombaugh gave an overview and showed a slide presentation of the College of Forest Resources to the Committee Members. He stated that North Carolina is a forested state and that 62% of the land area is forested. Our forested area is about the size of New Hampshire, Vermont, Connecticut, and Massachusetts combined. He further stated that North Carolina Forests provide environment values, tourism and recreation, products, jobs and economic opportunities. Dean Tombaugh stated that North Carolina Forests provide opportunities for hundreds of thousands of North Carolinians to make a good living and an environment that makes that good living truly worth living. (Attachment I)

Dean Tombaugh announced to the members that the critical needs in 1998 for the Agricultural Programs at the North Carolina College of Forest Resources Expansion Budget requests are as following:

•	Forest Biotechnology	\$200,000/year
•	Southern Center for Sustainable Forestry	\$300,000/year
•	Rural Tourism Initiative	\$240,000/year

Consideration discussion followed and several questions were taken from the members.

The meeting adjourned at 10:55 a.m.

The Issue

Increasing world population and rising affluence in many developing countries have greatly increased demands for food and fiber. Forestry firms throughout the world have responded to these demands with increased investments in forest production and manufacturing capacity. In particular, countries in the southern hemisphere now have extensive programs of tree planting of exotic pines and hardwoods. Large differences in growth rates--2 to 10 times greater in the southern hemisphere than in the U.S. South--have caused the competitive position of the South to erode rapidly in the last decade.

We must substantially increase our commitment to and investment in the basic means of timber production--genetics, biotechnology, and intensive management--if we are to remain competitive. A focused response in forest biotechnology is a key to unlocking the potentials in the South of increased forest growth rates, timber quality, and forest health. North Carolina State University is beginning its second decade of its basic research in forest biotechnology. This program has already developed the first genetic maps of loblolly pine; identified selected properties that control wood structure; and identified genes that provide resistance to fusiform rust. We now need to capitalize on these path-breaking efforts and ensure that they can be continued and applied to increase forest productivity. To date, much of our research at NCSU has been funded with external grants. More state funding is needed to ensure continued research excellence and leadership by the forest biotechnology group in the face of large investments in other states and in other countries.

Enhanced forest biotechnology research, development, and application will increase wood fiber production in North Carolina and the South. This can help us retain our competitive position as the leading producer of pulp and paper and of solid wood products in the world; produce more wood fiber; improve international competitiveness; and reduce disturbance of natural forests. Local benefits include more employment and income derived from the practice of intensive forestry, and more manufacturing capacity in local communities.

Budget

Funds for the Forest Biotechnology Group are needed for faculty or technical positions and operating funds. This request will amount to \$200,000 per year.

The Center

North Carolina has more than 19 million acres of forests, or almost 62% of its total land area. Rapid development is projected throughout the South, and particularly noticeable in North Carolina. For the next decade, we are projected to have among the highest rates of increase in the U.S. in population, gross domestic product, urban development, road construction, and timber harvesting. A host of issues from water quality to wood chip production to mountain development threaten the productivity, sustainability, and health of North Carolina forests.

Sustainable forestry implies that we must consider both market and environmental impacts of forest practices and their long run consequences. Relevant research questions must examine many issues such as selection of forest practices, effects of timber harvests, plans for regeneration, protection of water quality, improvement of wildlife habitat, markets for nonindustrial private landowners, ecological restoration, and the urban/rural interface.

We have agreed to establish a Southern Center for Sustainable Forests as a cooperative effort between NC State University, the North Carolina DENR/Division of Forest Resources, and Duke University. The Center will provide leadership to promote economically and ecologically sustainable management of forests in the South. The Center will:

- Foster research and applications on the productivity, sustainability, and stewardship
 of forest practices on private forests and evaluate the effects of intensive forestry at
 the stand and landscape scale.
- Improve state, regional, and interdisciplinary cooperation in technology transfer of existing and new research efforts to forestry professionals and to private landowners.
- Ensure development and use of appropriate guidelines for sustainable forestry that incorporate economic and ecological principles.

Budget

Funds for the Southern Center for Sustainable Forests are needed for a Director, a Technical Specialist, and an operating budget. This request will amount to \$300,000 per year.

Rural communities also lack data for tourism planning and have inadequate opportunities for training in tourism and hospitality management for their workforce.

Rural communities have natural and cultural resources that can serve as attractions for tourism development, but generally lack expertise in the utilization of those resources to maximize the economic benefits from tourism. That expertise would be provided to North Carolina's rural communities by the NC Center for Rural Tourism Development.

Services to be provided by the Center include:

- Identify potential tourism attractions, activities, facilities, services and financial investments needed to maximize economic benefits to communities.
- Identify "barriers" that limit tourism development in rural communities.
- Identify tourist development alternatives with projected economic and social impacts.
- Identify strategies to develop and sustain tourism development with emphasis on the responsible use and management of natural and cultural resources.
- Determine the economic impact from tourism to rural communities.
- Provide information and training to local leaders and professionals in successful rural tourism development through the NC Cooperative Extension Service.

MINUTES HOUSE COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE

June 23, 1998

The House Committee on Agriculture met in Room 1425 of the Legislative Building on Tuesday, June 23, 1998 at 10:00 a.m. Chairman Brown presided over the meeting with twenty House Members present, five House Members absent and one excused absence.

Chairman Brown introduced the Pages serving the Committee and welcomed guests. At this time, Mr. Brown also introduced two special guests: Former House Agriculture Chairman Vernon James and Jim Graham, Commissioner of the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Affairs.

Representative Brown turned the meeting over to Representative Frank Mitchell to speak on House Bill #1442 entitled: AN ACT TO EXEMPT THE TRANSPORTATION OF CERTAIN AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS FROM VARIOUS REQUIREMENTS IN CONFORMITY WITH FEDERAL REGULATIONS, AS RECOMMENDED BY THE ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW COMMISSION. Mr. Mitchell stated that recent federal law has resulted in the development of uniform federal regulations governing the intrastate transportation of hazardous material. In promulgating these regulations, however, a number of exemptions were authorized in an effort to reduce the regulatory burden where small amounts of certain classes of material were involved and safety would not be compromised.

He further stated that this bill adopts the exemption authorized under 44CFR 173.5 allowing the transportation of agricultural products over local roads, between fields of the same farm. "Agricultural products" are defined to include fertilizers, pesticides, soil amendments and fuel. "Farmers" are defined as persons engaged in the production of crops, poultry, and livestock. 44CFR & 171.8.

To take advantage of the relief offered in the federal regulations, North Carolina must specifically authorize adoption of the exemption by State statute or rule prior to October 1, 1998. The Environmental Review Commission has reviewed the exemption and recommended its adoption to the General Assembly.

The act is effective when it becomes law.

Discussion followed and questions were taken from the floor.

Representative Charles Buchanan moved to give the bill a favorable report and recommended that the bill be re-referred to the Judiciary I Committee. Motion carried.

Representative Mitchell next spoke on House Bill #1467 entitled: AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO A NONREVERTING RESERVE FOR THE START-UP COSTS OF THE SOUTHERN DAIRY COMPACT COMMISSION AND THE INITIAL COSTS OF ADMINISTERING AND ENFORCING THE SOUTHERN DAIRY COMPACT, AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPAYMENT OF THOSE FUNDS, AS RECOMMENDED BY THE ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW COMMISSION.

Mr. Mitchell stated that this bill would appropriate the sum of 1.8 million dollars for the 1998-1999 fiscal year to fund the start-up costs for the Southern Dairy Compact Commission. The funds would be place in a nonreverting reserve within the North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services. No distributions would be made from the fund unless Congress ratifies legislation authorizing the operation of the Southern Dairy Compact. Further, the State and the Southern Dairy Compact Commission must enter into an agreement establishing:

- 1. The administrative headquarters of the Commission in North Carolina;
- 2. All funds disbursed from the reserve shall be repaid to the State plus interest from revenue collected by the Commission;
- 3. Notes shall be issued by the Commission to the State in the amount of funds disbursed; and
- 4. Prior to disbursement, the Commission shall itemize the needs of the Commission to be served by the requested disbursement.

Mr. Mitchell went on to state that the contract between the State and the Commission shall not prevent another participating state from providing part or all the start-up costs. Sums repaid under the contract shall be credited to the General Fund. Any funds not disbursed by the end of the term of the contract shall revert at the end of that fiscal year. If Congress fails to ratify the Compact by June 30, 2001, all funds in the reserve shall revert to the General Fund.

The act becomes effective July 1, 1998.

Further discussion and questions followed.

At this time, Representative John Nichols moved to give the bill a favorable report and recommended that the bill be re-referred to the Committee on Appropriations. Motion carried.

Mr. Mitchell next spoke on House Bill #1617 entitled: AN ACT TO REMOVE THE SUNSET FOR THE INCOME TAX CREDIT FOR POULTRY COMPOSTING FACILITIES. Mr. Mitchell stated that this bill removes the sunset provision for the Poultry composting tax credit.

The poultry composting tax credit allows taxpayers, or Subchapter S corporations, to get a tax credit equal to twenty-five percent (25%) of the installation, materials, and equipment costs of construction for the building of a poultry composter that is used for composting whole unprocessed poultry carcasses from commercial operations in which poultry is raised or produced.

This credit may not exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for any single installation.

Representative Owens wanted to make sure that this would not change anything other than remove the sunset provision. Mr. Mitchell said that was correct. Mr. Rex Baker made a motion to adopt the committee substitute. Motion passed. Discussion followed.

At this time, Representative Owens moved for a favorable report as to committee substitute bill, unfavorable as to the original bill. Motion carried.

Chairman Brown introduced Representative Jim Carpenter sponsor of House Bill #1649. Representative Carpenter explained AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS FOR THE PIEDMONT TRIAD FARMERS MARKET to the Members of the Committee. He stated that there is appropriated from the General Fund to the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services the sum of fifty-three thousand six hundred thirty-two dollars (\$53,632) for the 1998-99 fiscal year for additional personnel to allow the Piedmont Triad Farmers Market to be open around the clock for wholesale shipping and receiving.

At this time, Representative Don Davis moved to give the bill a favorable report and recommended that the bill be re-referred to the Appropriations Committee. Motion carried.

Representative Brown turned the meeting back to Representative Frank Mitchell for explanation of House Bill #1560 entitled: AN ACT TO PROVIDE ASSISTANCE FOR SMALL, FAMILY-OWNED FARMS THROUGH GRANTS AND LOANS. Mr. Mitchell stated that this bill makes a number of appropriations to the North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services for the assistance of small, family-owned farms.

Twelve million dollars is appropriated to the North Carolina Rural Rehabilitation Corporation, within NCDA, for leans to small, family-owned farms that are in financial difficulty as evidence by their inability to obtain conventional financing. Loan priorities under this fund would include:

- 1. Dairy farms with fewer than 300 dairy cows.
- 2. Turkey farms that have lost contracts with integrators for reasons other than environmental violations.
- 3. Swine farms with fewer than 500 head.
- 4. Peach or apple farms that have lost 50% or more of their crop due to freeze damage.

Mr. Mitchell stated that these loans would not exceed 20 years and shall be made pursuant to the lending requirements of the North Carolina Rural Rehabilitation Corporation.

He further explained that the bill would also appropriate 2 million dollars to the NCDA to be used as grants to farmers of family-owned dairies having fewer than 300 dairy cows for purchase of animal waste management equipment. No funds may be used for the expansion or maintenance of anaerobic lagoons. The recipient of the grant funds must maintain the current level of dairy production for at least 5 years or the grant must be repaid on a prorated basis.

Finally, he stated that the sum of \$250,000 is appropriated to NCDA for grants for local farmers markets to promote and sell farm products produced by local small, familyowned farms.

Considerable discussion with several questions followed.

Representative Douglas Yongue moved to give the bill a favorable report and recommended that the bill be re-referred to the Committee on Appropriations. Motion carried.

The meeting adjourned at 10:50 a.m.

AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO A NONREVERTING RESERVE FOR 3 START-UP COSTS OF THE SOUTHERN DAIRY **COMPACT** 4 COMMISSION AND THE INITIAL COSTS OF ADMINISTERING AND ENFORCING THE SOUTHERN DAIRY COMPACT AND TO PROVIDE FOR 5 6 THE REPAYMENT OF THOSE FUNDS, AS RECOMMENDED BY THE 7 ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW COMMISSION.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

Section 1. There is appropriated from the General Fund to a 10 nonreverting reserve within the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services 11 the sum of one million eight hundred thousand dollars (\$1,800,000) for the 1998-99 12 fiscal year for the start-up costs of the Southern Dairy Compact Commission, to be 13 established pursuant to Section 4 of the Southern Dairy Compact as set forth in G.S. 14 106-810, and the initial costs of administration and enforcement of the Southern 15 Dairy Compact.

Section 2. (a) The Director of the Budget shall make no disbursements 17 from the reserve established in Section 1 of this act to the Southern Dairy Compact 18 Commission unless Congress ratifies legislation authorizing the operation of the 19 Southern Dairy Compact, and the State of North Carolina and the Southern Dairy 20 Compact Commission enter into a contract, approved by the Attorney General and 21 the Commissioner of Agriculture, that contains all of the following provisions:

> That the administrative headquarters of the Southern Dairy (1) Compact Commission shall be located within this State.

- 1 (2) That all funds disbursed from the reserve to the Southern Dairy 2 Compact Commission shall be repaid to the State, plus interest at 3 an amount to be agreed upon by the parties, from revenue pledged 4 by the Commission, assessments collected by the Commission, or 5 the reserve of the Commission, in accordance with a repayment 6 schedule to be agreed upon by the parties. 7
 - (3) That the Southern Dairy Compact Commission shall issue notes to the State of North Carolina in the amount of the funds disbursed from the reserve under this act.
 - **(4)** That, prior to each disbursement, the Southern Dairy Compact Commission shall itemize the needs of the Commission to be served by the requested disbursement and an itemized list showing how the most recent disbursement was spent.

- (d) Any funds not disbursed from the reserve under this act by the end 22 of the term of years provided in the contract under this section shall revert at the end 23 of that fiscal year.
- Upon the failure of Congress to ratify legislation authorizing the 25 operation of the Southern Dairy Compact by June 30, 2001, all funds in the reserve 26 shall revert to the General Fund.

Section 1. Legislative Findings. -- The General Assembly recognizes the 6 economic and environmental advantages in maintaining and promoting small tracts of 7 land for agricultural production. Small-farm families are providing necessary food 8 and fiber for North Carolina citizens. Small farms provide beautiful land and open 9 spaces for the enjoyment of all North Carolina citizens. By using best management 10 practices, farmers of small, family-owned farms are actively working to protect the 11 environment. At the same time, they provide valuable products to our citizens and 12 preserve a way of life important to our cultural heritage. The Department of 13 Agriculture and Consumer Services should offer assistance for small, family-owned farms through grants and loans.

Section 2. (a) There is appropriated from the General Fund to the North Carolina Rural Rehabilitation Corporation within the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services the sum of twelve million dollars (\$12,000,000) for the 1998-18 99 fiscal year to be used to make loans to those farmers of small, family-owned farms having financial difficulty as shown by their inability to obtain affordable conventional loans from other sources.

21 (b) Priority for loans from the funds appropriated under this section shall 22 be extended for the following small, family-owned farms:

- 1 (1) Dairy farms with fewer than 300 dairy cows.
 - (2) Turkey farms that have lost contracts with integrators for reasons not related to having violated environmental laws or rules.
 - (3) Swine farms of fewer than 500 swine at any time.
 - (4) Peach or apple farms that have lost fifty percent (50%) or more of their fruit crop due to frost or freeze damage.
- (c) The term of the loans under this section shall not exceed 20 years. 8 These loans shall be provided in accordance with the lending requirements of the 9 North Carolina Rural Rehabilitation Corporation pursuant to Article 2 of Chapter 10 137 of the General Statutes.
- 11 (d) The Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services shall adopt 12 rules to implement this section.
- Section 3. (a) There is appropriated from the General Fund to the 14 Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services the sum of two million dollars 15 (\$2,000,000) for the 1998-99 fiscal year to be used for grants to farmers of family-16 owned dairies for the purchase of equipment that is a component of an animal waste 17 management system and that is used solely for the purpose of transporting, storing, or 18 distributing animal waste. This equipment shall be limited to: pumps, spraying 19 equipment, scrape blades, box blades, storage equipment, and any transport 20 equipment, including tanks, spreaders, and applicators.
- (b) No funds appropriated under this section shall be used to enlarge 22 anaerobic lagoons or for the maintenance of anaerobic lagoons.
- (c) The Department shall adopt rules that establish guidelines for 24 disbursing the funds in a fair and equitable manner and any other rules needed to 25 implement this section. Each recipient of grant funds under this section shall enter 26 into a contract with the Department that contains provisions of the loan that are 27 consistent with these guidelines. This contract shall provide for the enforcement of 28 the terms of the contract. This contract shall provide that the recipient continue to 29 operate at the current level of dairy production for a period of at least five years. 30 This contract shall provide that if the recipient reduces the number of dairy cows or 31 ceases operation in fewer than five years, the recipient shall repay the Department of 32 Agriculture and Consumer Services a prorated share of the grant funds received by 33 that recipient.
- (d) Only dairies with fewer than 300 dairy cows that were in operation 35 prior to January 1, 1998, are eligible for grants under this section.
- Section 4. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the 37 Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services the sum of two hundred fifty 38 thousand dollars (\$250,000) for the 1998-99 fiscal year to be used as grants to local 39 farmers markets for the purpose of promoting or selling farm products produced by 40 local small, family-owned farms. The Department shall establish guidelines and 41 procedures for disbursing these grants in a fair and equitable manner. 42 Department shall adopt any rules needed to implement this section.
 - Section 5. This act becomes effective July 1, 1998.


