II. General Fund

A. Revenue

A strong state economy and Wall Street, in combination with a reduction in the federal income tax rate on capital gains, is producing another banner year for General Fund tax revenue. The revised May 5, 1998 consensus forecast of the Office of State Budget and Management and the Fiscal Research Division - North Carolina General Assembly indicates that General Fund tax revenue will exceed the authorized forecast by \$558.9 million in 1997-98. The bulk of the overcollections (receipts in excess of the budget) are concentrated in the individual income tax schedule. As shown below, overcollections of individual income taxes are currently estimated at \$456.9 for 1997-98, or 8.2% above the authorized budget. The corporate income tax schedule is projected to exceed the budget by \$76.5 million, or 11.3%. Overcollections of insurance taxes are currently estimated at \$15.0 million or 5.6%.

On an economic-basis (prior to tax law changes), total General Fund tax revenue is projected to increase by 5.1% in 1998-99. Growth in the individual income tax is projected at a steady 5.7% on the basis of continued gains in employment and wages. Sales and use taxes grow by an estimated 5.8%, in line with the projected growth in disposable income. As U.S. corporate profits growth is forecast to slow in the year ahead, corporate income tax receipts increase by an estimated 0.4%. All other General Fund tax schedules are projected to increase by a combined 3.3%.

The actual growth in General Fund Tax collections will be less than growth on an economic basis largely due to tax law changes which were enacted by the 1996 and 1997 Sessions of the North Carolina General Assembly. During the 1996 Session, the most notable changes were the reduction in the sales tax on food consumed at home from 4% to 3%, the phased reduction in the corporate income tax from 7.75% to 6.90% by the year 2000, and the phase-out of the soft drink tax. During the 1997 Session, the most significant law change for 1998-99 is a second reduction in sales tax on food from 3% to 2% effective July 1, 1998. This change is estimated to reduce the tax burden on North Carolinians by \$83.8 million in 1998-99. As a result of the overall package of tax reductions, the estimated rate of growth in General Fund tax revenue is cut to 4.0%. (A complete discussion of recent tax law changes can be found in the 1997-99, The North Carolina State Budget, Post-Legislative Summary, published by the Office of State Budget and Management in December 1997.)

As interest rates remain largely stable throughout 1998-99, investment income is projected to grow by 3.8%, consistent with the increase is invested cash balances. Normal growth of activities in the state court system produces an estimated 6.6% increase in judicial fees. Insurance fees are projected to increase by 4.4% in 1998-99. Disproportionate Share receipts (DSH) are estimated at \$83.0 million in 1998-99. DSH payments were budgeted as departmental receipts in the 1997-98 General Fund budget.

For 1998-99 and subsequent years, it is recommended that the transfer in lieu of sales tax from the Highway Fund be eliminated. This change would reduce General Fund revenue by \$13.4 million in 1998-99.

Additionally, Governor Hunt will recommend a phase-out of the final two cents of the state sales tax on food consumed at home. As shown in the long term General Fund forecast on page 124, it is the recommendation of the Governor to reduce the state sales tax on food from 2% to 1% effective July 1, 1999, followed by full elimination on July 1, 2000. On an annualized basis, this recommendation will lower the tax burden on families by \$190 million in 2000-01.





Governor Hunt's Initiatives for the 1998-99 Budget: Recurring Funds




Total Recurring Funds = \$704,350,153







(a) Effective for the 1998-99 school year, the Director of the Budget may transfer from the Reserve for Compensation Increase for the 1998-99 fiscal year funds necessary to implement the teacher salary schedule set out in subsection (b) of this section, including funds for the employer's retirement and social security contributions and funds for annual longevity payments at one percent (1%) of base salary for 10 to 14 years of State service, one and one-half percent (1.5%) of

base salary for 15 to 19 years of State service, two percent (2%) of base salary for 20 to 24 years of State service, and four and one-half percent (4.5%) of base salary for 25 or more years of State service, commencing July 1, 1998, for all teachers whose salaries are supported from the State's General Fund. These funds shall be allocated to individuals according to rules adopted by the State Board of Education and the Superintendent of Public Instruction. The longevity payment shall be paid in a lump sum once a year.

(b)(1) For the 1998-99 school year, the following monthly salary schedules shall apply to certified personnel of the public schools who are classified as teachers. The schedule contains 30 steps with each step corresponding to one year of teaching experience.

Certified public school teachers with certification based on (2) academic preparation at the six-year degree level shall receive a salary supplement of one hundred twenty-six dollars (\$126.00) per month in addition to the compensation provided for certified personnel of the public schools who are classified as "G" teachers. Certified public school teachers with certification based on academic preparation at the doctoral degree level shall receive a salary supplement of two hundred fifty-three dollars (\$253.00) per month in addition to the compensation provided for certified personnel of the public schools who are classified as "G" teachers.

(d) Effective for the 1998-99 school year, speech pathologists who are 9 certified as speech pathologists at the masters degree level and audiologists who are 10 certified as audiologists at the masters degree level and who are employed in the 11 public schools as speech and language specialists and audiologists shall be paid on the

12 school psychologist salary schedule.

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Speech pathologists and audiologists with certification based on academic 14 preparation at the six-year degree level shall receive a salary supplement of one 15 hundred twenty-six dollars (\$126.00) per month in addition to the compensation 16 provided for speech pathologists and audiologists. Speech pathologists and 17 audiologists with certification based on academic preparation at the doctoral degree 18 level shall receive a salary supplement of two hundred fifty-three dollars (\$253.00) 19 per month in addition to the compensation provided for speech pathologists and 20 audiologists.

(e) The State Board of Education shall study the current salary schedules 22 for nurses and other allied health professionals. The State Board shall report to the 23 Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee prior to December 15, 1998, on the 24 results of its study and on any recommended modifications to the current salary 25 schedules.

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

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- (b) The district attorney or public defender of a judicial district, with the approval of the Administrative Officer of the Courts, shall set the salaries of assistant district attorneys or assistant public defenders, respectively, in that district such that the average salaries of assistant district attorneys or assistant public defenders in that district do not exceed fifty-three thousand eight hundred eighty-three dollars (\$53,883) and the minimum salary of any assistant district attorney or assistant public defender is at least twenty-seven thousand five hundred nine dellars (\$27,509), effective July 1, 1997.
- (c) The salaries in effect for the 1996-97 fiscal year on June 30, 1997, for 10 permanent, full-time employees of the Judicial Department, except for those whose salaries are itemized in this Part, shall be increased by four percent (4%). commencing July 1, 1997.

MAGISTRATES/SALARY INCREASES

Section 9. Effective July 1, 1998, magistrates shall receive salary increases in the amount of three percent (3%), except that any person entitled to a step increase pursuant to G.S. 7A-171.1 for the 1998-99 fiscal year shall not receive the three percent increase provided by this section.

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GENERAL ASSEMBLY PRINCIPAL CLERKS/SALARY INCREASES

Section 10. G.S. 120-37(c) reads as rewritten:

"(c) The principal clerks shall be full-time officers. Each principal clerk shall be 34 entitled to other benefits available to permanent legislative employees and shall be 35 paid an annual salary of fifty-nine thousand eight-hundred sixty-one dollars (\$59,861) 36 sixty-one thousand six hundred fifty-seven dollars (\$61,657) payable monthly. The 37 Legislative Services Commission shall review the salary of the principal clerks prior 38 to submission of the proposed operating budget of the General Assembly to the 39 Governor and Advisory Budget Commission and shall make appropriate 40 recommendations for changes in those salaries. Any changes enacted by the General 41 Assembly shall be by amendment to this paragraph.

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43 SERGEANT-AT-ARMS AND READING CLERKS/SALARY INCREASES

Section 11. G.S. 120-37(b) reads as rewritten:

"(b) The sergeant-at-arms and the reading clerk in each house shall be paid a 46 salary of two-hundred fifty-eight dollars (\$258.00) two hundred sixty-six (\$266.00) per 47 week plus subsistence at the same daily rate provided for members of the General 48 Assembly, plus mileage at the rate provided for members of the General Assembly 49 for one round trip only from their homes to Raleigh and return. 50 sergeants-at-arms shall serve during sessions of the General Assembly and at such 51 time prior to the convening of, and subsequent to adjournment or recess of, sessions 52 as may be authorized by the Legislative Services Commission. The reading clerks 53 shall serve during sessions only."

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LEGISLATIVE EMPLOYEES/SALARY INCREASES

Section 12. The Legislative Administrative Officer shall increase the salaries of nonelected employees of the General Assembly in effect for fiscal year 1997-98 by three percent (3%). Nothing in this act limits any of the provisions of G.S. 120-32.

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COMMUNITY COLLEGES PERSONNEL/SALARY INCREASES

Section 13. The Director of the Budget shall transfer from the Reserve for 9 Salary Increases created in this act for fiscal year 1998-99 funds to the Department of 10 Community Colleges necessary to provide an average annual salary increase of three 11 percent (3%), including funds for the employer's retirement and social security 12 contributions, commencing July 1, 1998, for all permanent full-time community 13 college institutional personnel supported by State funds. The State Board of 14 Community Colleges shall establish guidelines for providing their salary increases to 15 community college institutional personnel to include consideration of increases based 16 on performance. Salary funds shall be used to provide an average annual salary 17 increase of three percent (3%) to all full-time employees and part-time employees on 18 a pro rata basis.

20 UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA SYSTEM - EPA SALARY INCREASES

Section 14. (a) The Director of the Budget shall transfer to the Board of 22 Governors of The University of North Carolina sufficient funds from the Reserve for 23 Compensation Increase created in this act for fiscal year 1998-99 to provide an annual 24 average salary increase of three percent (3%), including funds for the employer's 25 retirement and social security contributions, commencing July 1, 1998, for all 26 employees of The University of North Carolina, as well as employees other than teachers of the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics, supported by State funds and whose salaries are exempt from the State Personnel Act (EPA). 29 These funds shall be allocated to individuals according to the rules adopted by the 30 Board of Governors, or the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina School of 31 Science and Mathematics, as appropriate, and shall not be used for any purpose other than for salary increases and necessary employer contributions provided by this section. The Board of Governors shall include consideration of increases based on performance in its adoption of rules for the allocation of funds for salary increases.

(b) The Director of the Budget shall transfer to the Board of Governors 36 of The University of North Carolina sufficient funds from the Reserve for Salary 37 Increases created in this act for fiscal year 1998-99 to provide an annual average 38 salary increase comparable to that provided in this act for public school teachers, 39 including funds for the employer's retirement and social security contributions, 40 commencing July 1, 1998, for all teaching employees of the North Carolina School of 41 Science and Mathematics, supported by State funds and whose salaries are exempt 42 from the State Personnel Act (EPA). These funds shall be allocated to individuals according to the rules adopted by the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics and shall not be used for any purpose other than for salary increases and necessary employer contributions provided by this section.

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SCHOOL CENTRAL OFFICE SALARIES

Section 15. (a) The following monthly salary ranges apply to assistant superintendents, associate superintendents, directors/coordinators, supervisors, and finance officers for the 1998-99 fiscal year, beginning July 1, 1998:

School Administrator I: (1) \$2,846 - \$4,857 School Administrator II: \$3,021 - \$5,155 School Administrator III: \$3,206 - \$5,471

The category in which an employee is placed shall be included in the contract of any 10 employee hired on or after July 1, 1998.

The following monthly salary ranges apply to public school superintendents for the 1998-99 fiscal year, beginning July 1, 1998:

18 The local board of education shall determine the appropriate category and placement 19 for the superintendent based on the average daily membership of the local school administrative unit and within funds appropriated by the General Assembly for central office administrators and superintendents.

Notwithstanding the provisions of this subsection, a local board of education may pay an amount in excess of the applicable range to a superintendent who is entitled to receive the higher amount under Section 2 of this act.

(c) Longevity pay for superintendents, assistant superintendents, associate superintendents, directors/coordinators, supervisors, and finance officers shall be as provided for State employees.

- (d) Superintendents, assistant superintendents, associate superintendents, directors/coordinators, supervisors, and finance officers with certification based on academic preparation at the six-year degree level shall receive a salary supplement of one hundred twenty-six dollars (\$126.00) per month in addition to the compensation 32 provided for pursuant to this section. Superintendents, assistant superintendents, 33 associate superintendents, directors/coordinators, supervisors, and finance officers 34 with certification based on academic preparation at the doctoral degree level shall 35 receive a salary supplement of two hundred fifty-three dollars (\$253.00) per month in 36 addition to the compensation provided for under this section.
- (e) The State Board shall not permit local school administrative units to 38 transfer State funds from other funding categories for salaries for public school 39 central office administrators.
- (f) The Director of the Budget shall transfer from the Reserve for Salary 41 Increases created in this act for fiscal year 1998-99, beginning July 1, 1998, funds 42 necessary to provide an average annual salary increase of three percent (3%), 43 including funds for the employer's retirement and social security contributions, 44 commencing July 1, 1998, for all permanent full-time personnel paid from the Central 45 Office Allotment. The State Board of Education shall allocate these funds to local 46 school administrative units. The local boards of education shall establish guidelines 47 for providing their salary increases to these personnel.

49 NONCERTIFIED PERSONNEL SALARY FUNDS/TEACHER ASSISTANT SALARY 50 FUNDS

Section 16. (a) The Director of the Budget may transfer from the Reserve 52 for Compensation Increase created in this act for fiscal year 1998-99, commencing 53 July 1, 1998, funds necessary to provide a salary increase of three percent (3%),

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1 including funds for the employer's retirement and social security contributions, 2 commencing July 1, 1998, for all noncertified public school employees whose salaries 3 are supported from the State's General Fund. Local boards of education shall increase the rates of pay for all such employees who were employed during fiscal year 1997-98 and who continue their employment for fiscal year 1998-99 by at least three percent (3%), commencing July 1, 1998. These funds shall not be used for any purpose other than for the salary increases and necessary employer contributions provided by this section.

The Director of the Budget may transfer from the Reserve for 10 Compensation Increase created in this act for fiscal year 1998-99, beginning July 1, 11 1998, funds necessary to provide the salary increases for noncertified public school 12 employees whose salaries are supported from the State's General Fund in accordance

13 with the provisions of this section.

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The State Board of Education may enact or create salary ranges for 15 noncertified personnel to support increases of three percent (3%) for the 1998-99 16 fiscal year.

(b) G.S. 115C-12(16)b. reads as rewritten:

Salary schedules for the following public school support personnel shall be adopted by the State Board of Education: school finance officer, office support personnel, teacher assistants, maintenance supervisors, custodial personnel, and transportation personnel. The Board shall classify these support positions in terms of uniform pay grades included in the salary schedule of the State Personnel Commission.


By the end of the third payroll period of the 1995-96 fiscal year, local boards of education shall place State-allotted office support personnel, teacher assistants, and custodial personnel on the salary schedule adopted by the State Board of Education so that the average salary paid is the Stateallotted amount for the category. In placing employees on the salary schedule, the local board shall consider the education, training, and experience of each employee. employee, including experience in other local school administrative units. It is the intent of the General Assembly that a local school administrative unit not fail to employ an employee who was employed for the prior school year in order to implement the provisions of this sub-subdivision. A local board of education is in compliance with this subsubdivision if the average salary paid is at least ninety-five percent (95%) of the State-allotted amount for the category at the end of the third payroll period of the 1995-96 fiscal year, and at least ninety-eight percent (98%) of the Stateallotted amount for the category at the end of the third payroll period of each subsequent fiscal year. Department of Public Instruction shall provide technical assistance to local school administrative units regarding the implementation of this sub-subdivision."

(c) Subsection (b) of this section applies beginning with the 1999-2000

school year.

COMPENSATION BONUS/STATE EMPLOYEES/SCHOOL PERSONNEL

Section 17. (a) Any person:



- (a1) It is the intent of the General Assembly that the annual career growth recognition award in the amount of two percent (2%) provided by G.S. 126-7(c)(4a) shall be part of the continuation budget for each fiscal year of the 1999-2001 4 biennium.
- (b) Except as otherwise provided in this act, salaries in effect June 30. 6 1998, for permanent full-time State officials and persons in exempt positions that are recommended by the Governor or the Governor and the Advisory Budget Commission and set by the General Assembly shall be increased by three percent (3%), commencing July 1, 1998.

(c) The salaries in effect June 30, 1998, for all permanent part-time State 11 employees shall be increased on and after July 1, 1998, by pro rata amounts of the 12 salary increases provided for permanent full-time employees covered under 13 subsection (a) of this section.

(d) The Director of the Budget may allocate out of special operating 15 funds or from other sources of the employing agency, except tax revenues, sufficient 16 funds to allow a salary increase on and after July 1, 1998, in accordance with 17 subsections (a), (b), or (c) of this section, including funds for the employer's 18 retirement and social security contributions, of the permanent full-time and part-time 19 employees of the agency.

(e) Within regular Executive Budget Act procedures as limited by this 21 act, all State agencies and departments may increase on an equitable basis the rate of 22 pay of temporary and permanent hourly State employees, subject to availability of 23 funds in the particular agency or department, by pro rata amounts the salary increase provided for permanent full-time employees covered by the provisions of subsection (a) of this section, commencing July 1, 1998.

(f) No State employee or officer shall receive a merit increment during the 1998-99 fiscal year except as otherwise provided by this act.

29 ALL STATE-SUPPORTED PERSONNEL

Section 19. (a) Salaries and related benefits for positions that are funded 31 partially from the General Fund or Highway Fund and partially from sources other than the General Fund or Highway Fund shall be increased from the General Fund or Highway Fund appropriation only to the extent of the proportionate part of the salaries paid from the General Fund or Highway Fund.

(b) The granting of the salary increases under this act does not affect the status of eligibility for salary increments for which employees may be eligible unless otherwise required by this act.

(c) The salary increases provided in this act are to be effective July 1, 39 1998, do not apply to persons separated from State service due to resignation, 40 dismissal, reduction in force, death, or retirement, whose last workday is prior to July 1, 1998, or to employees involved in final written disciplinary procedures. employee shall receive the increase on a current basis when the final written disciplinary procedure is resolved.

Payroll checks issued to employees after July 1, 1998, which represent 45 payment of services provided prior to July 1, 1998, shall not be eligible for salary 46 increases provided for in this act. This subsection shall apply to all employees, subject to or exempt from the State Personnel Act, paid from State funds, including public schools, community colleges, and The University of North Carolina.

The Director of the Budget shall transfer from the Reserve for 50 Compensation Increase in this act for fiscal year 1998-99 all funds necessary for the salary increases provided by this act, including funds for the employer's retirement 52 and social security contributions.

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The Director of the Budget shall transfer from the Reserve for Compensation Increase in this act for fiscal year 1998-99 one million four hundred thousand dollars (\$1,400,000) to The University of North Carolina Board of Governors for allocation to the Agricultural Research and Cooperative Extension budget codes of North Carolina State University in order to provide sufficient operating support for those programs.

Nothing in this act authorizes the transfer of funds between the

General Fund and the Highway Fund for salary increases.

10 SALARY ADJUSTMENT FUND

Section 20. Any remaining appropriations for legislative salary increases 12 not required for that purpose may be used to supplement the Salary Adjustment 13 Fund. 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

EMPLOYER CONTRIBUTION RATES

"(c) Effective July 1, 1998, the State's employer contribution rates budgeted for 44 retirement and related benefits as a percentage of covered salaries for the 1998-99 45 fiscal year are (i) ten and eighty-three hundredths percent (10.83%) ten and one-tenth percent (10.10%) - Teachers and State Employees; (ii) fifteen and eighty-three hundredths percent (15.83%) fifteen and one-tenth percent (15.10%) - State Law 48 Enforcement Officers; (iii) nine and thirty-six hundredths percent (9.36%) - 49 University Employees' Optional Retirement Program; (iv) twenty-two and sixty-five hundredths percent (22.65%) eighteen and ninety-seven hundredths percent (18.97%) 51 - Consolidated Judicial Retirement System; and (v) twenty-four and fifty-eight 52 hundredths percent (24.58%) - Legislative Retirement System. Each of the foregoing 53 contribution rates includes two percent (2%) for hospital and medical benefits. The

The rates for Teachers and State Employees, 3 State Law Enforcement Officers, and for the University Employees' Optional 4 Retirement Program include fifty-two hundredths percent (0.52%) for the Disability 5 Income Plan."

(b) The change provided by subsection (a) of this section is for the 1998-99 fiscal year only. It is the intent of the General Assembly that the rates provided

by Section 33.23(c) of S.L. 1997-443 shall apply for the 1999-2001 biennium.

(c) Required employer salary-related contributions for employees whose 10 salaries are paid from department, office, institution, or agency receipts shall be paid 11 from the same source as the source of the employees' salary. If an employee's salary 12 is paid in part from the General Fund or Highway Fund and in part from 13 department, office, institution, or agency receipts, required employer salary-related 14 contributions may be paid from the General Fund or Highway Fund only to the 15 extent of the proportionate part paid from the General Fund or Highway Fund in 16 support of the salary of the employee, and the remainder of the employer's 17 requirements shall be paid from the source that supplies the remainder of the 18 employee's salary. The requirements of this section as to source of payment are also 19 applicable to payments on behalf of the employee for hospital-medical benefits, 20 longevity pay, unemployment compensation, accumulated leave, workers' 21 compensation, severance pay, separation allowances, and applicable disability income 22 and disability salary continuation benefits.

Chapter 106 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a 8 new Article to read: "ARTICLE 68. "Southern Dairy Compact. 11 "§ 106-810. Southern Dairy Compact entered into; form of Compact. The Southern Dairy Compact is enacted into law and entered into with all other 13 jurisdictions legally joining therein in the form substantially as follows: 14 ARTICLE I. Statement of Purpose, Findings, and Declaration of Policy 15 "§ 1. Statement of purpose, findings, and declaration of policy. The purpose of this compact is to recognize the interstate character of the southern 16 17 dairy industry and the prerogative of the states under the United States Constitution 18 to form an interstate commission for the southern region. The mission of the 19 Commission is to take such steps as are necessary to assure the continued viability of 20 dairy farming in the South, and to assure consumers of an adequate, local supply of 21 pure and wholesome milk. The participating states find and declare that the dairy industry is an essential 22 23 agricultural activity of the South. Dairy farms, and associated suppliers, marketers, 24 processors, and retailers, are an integral component of the region's economy. Their

1 ability to provide a stable, local supply of pure, wholesome milk is a matter of great importance to the health and welfare of the region.

The participating states further find that dairy farms are essential, and they are an integral part of the region's rural communities. The farms preserve land for agricultural purposes and provide needed economic stimuli for rural communities.

By entering into this compact, the participating states affirm that their ability to regulate the price that southern dairy farmers receive for their product is essential to the public interest. Assurance of a fair and equitable price for dairy farmers ensures 9 their ability to provide milk to the market and the vitality of the southern dairy 10 industry, with all the associated benefits.

Recent dramatic price fluctuations, with a pronounced downward trend, threaten the viability and stability of the southern dairy region. Historically, individual state regulatory action had been an effective emergency remedy available to farmers confronting a distressed market. The system of federal orders, implemented by the Agricultural Marketing Agreement Act of 1937, establishes only minimum prices paid to producers for raw milk, without preempting the power of states to regulate milk prices above the minimum levels so established.

In today's regional dairy marketplace, cooperative, rather than individual state action is needed to more effectively address the market disarray. Under our 20 constitutional system, properly authorized states acting cooperatively may exercise 21 more power to regulate interstate commerce than they may assert individually 22 without such authority. For this reason, the participating states invoke their authority 23 to act in common agreement, with the consent of Congress, under the compact clause of the Constitution.

In establishing their constitutional regulatory authority over the region's fluid milk market by this compact, the participating states declare their purpose that this compact neither displace the system of federal orders nor encourage the merging of federal orders. Specific provisions of the compact itself set forth this basic principle.

Designed as a flexible mechanism able to adjust to changes in a regulated 30 marketplace, the compact also contains a contingency provision should the system of 31 federal orders be discontinued. In that event, the interstate commission may regulate 32 the marketplace in lieu of the system of federal orders. This contingent authority does not anticipate such a change, however, and should not be so construed. It is only provided should developments in the market other than establishment of this compact result in discontinuance of the system of federal orders.

36 ARTICLE II. Definitions and Rules of Construction

"§ 2. Definitions. 37

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
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For the purposes of this compact, and of any supplemental or concurring 38 39 legislation enacted pursuant thereto, except as may be otherwise required by the 40 context:

'Class I milk' means milk disposed of in fluid form or as a fluid (1) milk product, subject to further definition in accordance with the principles expressed in subsection (b) of Section 3.



(a) This compact shall not be construed to displace existing federal milk marketing orders or state dairy regulation in the region but to supplement them. In the event some or all federal orders in the region are discontinued, the compact shall be construed to provide the Commission the option to replace them with one or more commission marketing orders pursuant to this compact.

- (b) This compact shall be construed liberally in order to achieve the purposes and 1 2 intent enunciated in Section 1. It is the intent of this compact to establish a basic structure by which the Commission may achieve those purposes through the 4 application, adaptation, and development of the regulatory techniques historically 5 associated with milk marketing and to afford the Commission broad flexibility to devise regulatory mechanisms to achieve the purposes of this compact. In accordance with this intent, the technical terms which are associated with market order regulation and which have acquired commonly understood general meanings are not 9 defined herein but the Commission may further define the terms used in this compact and develop additional concepts and define additional terms as it may find appropriate to achieve its purposes.
- ARTICLE III. Commission Established 12
- "§ 4. Commission established. 13

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
There is hereby created a commission to administer the compact, composed of delegations from each state in the region. The Commission shall be known as the Southern Dairy Compact Commission. A delegation shall include not less than three nor more than five persons. Each delegation shall include at least one dairy farmer who is engaged in the production of milk at the time of appointment or 18 reappointment, and one consumer representative. Delegation members shall be 19 residents and voters of, and subject to such confirmation process as is provided for in, 20 21 the appointing state. Delegation members shall serve no more than three consecutive 22 terms with no single term of more than four years, and be subject to removal for 23 cause. In all other respects, delegation members shall serve in accordance with the 24 laws of the state represented. The compensation, if any, of the members of a state delegation shall be determined and paid by each state, but their expenses shall be 25 paid by the Commission. 26

"§ 5. Voting requirements. 27

All actions taken by the Commission, except for the establishment or termination 28 of an over-order price or commission marketing order, and the adoption, amendment, or rescission of the Commission's bylaws, shall be by majority vote of the delegations present. Each state delegation shall be entitled to one vote in the conduct of the 32 Commission's affairs. Establishment or termination of an over-order price or 33 commission marketing order shall require at least a two-thirds vote of the delegations The establishment of a regulated area that covers all or part of a 34 participating state shall require also the affirmative vote of that state's delegation. A 36 majority of the delegations from the participating states shall constitute a quorum for 37 the conduct of the Commission's business.

"§ 6. Administration and management. 38

(a) The Commission shall elect annually from among the members of the 39 40 participating state delegations a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, and a treasurer. The 41 Commission shall appoint an executive director and fix his or her duties and 42 compensation. The executive director shall serve at the pleasure of the Commission, 43 and, together with the treasurer, shall be bonded in an amount determined by the



- (b) The Commission shall adopt bylaws for the conduct of its business by a two-4 thirds vote and shall have the power by the same vote to amend and rescind these 5 bylaws. The Commission shall publish its bylaws in convenient form with the 6 appropriate agency or officer in each of the participating states. The bylaws shall 7 provide for appropriate notice to the delegations of all Commission meetings and 8 hearings and of the business to be transacted at such meetings or hearings. Notice 9 also shall be given to other agencies or officers of participating states as provided by 10 the laws of those states.
- (c) The Commission shall file an annual report with the Secretary of Agriculture 11 12 of the United States, and with each of the participating states by submitting copies to 13 the Governor, both houses of the legislature, and the head of the state department 14 having responsibilities for agriculture.
- (d) In addition to the powers and duties elsewhere prescribed in this compact, the 15 16 Commission may engage in all of the following:
 - Sue and be sued in any state or federal court. (1)
 - Have a seal and alter the same at pleasure. (2)
 - Acquire, hold, and dispose of real and personal property by gift, <u>(3)</u> purchase, lease, license, or other similar manner, for its corporate purposes.
 - Borrow money and to issue notes, to provide for the rights of the <u>(4)</u> holders thereof, and to pledge the revenue of the Commission as security therefor, subject to the provisions of Section 18 of this compact.
 - Appoint such officers, agents, and employees as it may deem <u>(5)</u> necessary, prescribe their powers, duties, and qualifications.
 - Create and abolish such offices, employments, and positions as it **(6)** deems necessary for the purposes of the compact and provide for the removal, term, tenure, compensation, fringe benefits, pension, and retirement rights of its officers and employees.
 - Retain personal services on a contract basis. (7)

"§ 7. Rule-making power.

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
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In addition to the power to promulgate a compact over-order price or commission 35 marketing orders as provided by this compact, the Commission is further empowered 36 to make and enforce such additional rules and regulations as it deems necessary to 37 implement any provisions of this compact, or to effectuate in any other respect the 38 purposes of this compact.

- 39 ARTICLE IV. Powers of the Commission
- 40 "§ 8. Powers to promote regulatory uniformity, simplicity, and interstate cooperation. The Commission may: 41
 - Investigate or provide for investigations or research projects (1) designed to review the existing laws and regulations of the participating states, to consider their administration and costs, to





"§ 9. Equitable farm prices.

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- (a) The powers granted in this section and Section 10 shall apply only to the 28 establishment of a compact over-order price, so long as federal milk marketing orders 29 remain in effect in the region. In the event that any or all such orders are 30 terminated, this Article authorizes the Commission to establish one or more commission marketing orders, as herein provided, in the region or parts thereof as 32 defined in the order.
- (b) A compact over-order price established pursuant to this section shall apply 33 34 only to Class I milk. Such compact over-order price shall not exceed one dollar and 35 fifty cents (\$1.50) per gallon at Atlanta, Georgia, however, this compact over-order 36 price shall be adjusted upward or downward at other locations in the region to reflect 37 differences in minimum federal order prices. Beginning in 1990, and using that year as a base, the foregoing one dollar and fifty cents (\$1.50) per gallon maximum shall 39 be adjusted annually by the rate of change in the Consumer Price Index as reported 40 by the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the United States Department of Labor. For 41 purposes of the pooling and equalization of an over-order price, the value of milk 42 used in other use classifications shall be calculated at the appropriate class price 43 established pursuant to the applicable federal order or state dairy regulation and the 44 value of unregulated milk shall be calculated in relation to the nearest prevailing

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
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(c) A commission marketing order shall apply to all classes and uses of milk.

- (d) The Commission may establish a compact over-order price for milk to be paid 5 by pool plants and partially regulated plants. The Commission also may establish a 6 compact over-order price to be paid by all other handlers receiving milk from 7 producers located in a regulated area. This price shall be established either as a 8 compact over-order price or by one or more commission marketing orders. 9 Whenever such a price has been established by either type of regulation, the legal 10 obligation to pay such price shall be determined solely by the terms and purpose of 11 the regulation without regard to the situs of the transfer of title, possession, or any 12 other factors not related to the purposes of the regulation and this compact. 13 Producer-handlers as defined in an applicable federal market order shall not be 14 subject to a compact over-order price. The Commission shall provide for similar 15 treatment of producer-handlers under commission marketing orders.
- (e) In determining the price, the Commission shall consider the balance between production and consumption of milk and milk products in the regulated area, the 18 costs of production including, but not limited to, the price of feed, the cost of labor 19 including the reasonable value of the producer's own labor and management, 20 machinery expense and interest expense, the prevailing price for milk outside the 21 regulated area, the purchasing power of the public, and the price necessary to yield a reasonable return to the producer and distributor.
- (f) When establishing a compact over-order price, the Commission shall take such 24 other action as is necessary and feasible to help ensure that the over-order price does not cause or compensate producers so as to generate local production of milk in excess of those quantities necessary to assure consumers of an adequate supply for fluid purposes.
- (g) The Commission shall whenever possible enter into agreements with state or 29 federal agencies for exchange of information or services for the purpose of reducing regulatory burden and cost of administering the compact. The Commission may reimburse other agencies for the reasonable cost of providing these services.


"§ 10. Optional provisions for pricing order.

Regulations establishing a compact over-order price or a commission marketing order may contain, but shall not be limited to, any of the following:

- Provisions classifying milk in accordance with the form in which or (1) purpose for which it is used, or creating a flat pricing program.
- With respect to a commission marketing order only, provisions **(2)** establishing or providing a method for establishing separate minimum prices for each use classification prescribed by the Commission, or a single minimum price for milk purchased from producers or associations of producers.
- With respect to an over-order minimum price, provisions <u>(3)</u> establishing or providing a method for establishing such minimum price for Class I milk.

Before promulgation of any regulations establishing a compact over-order price of commission marketing order, including any provision with respect to milk supply under subsection (f) of Section 9, or amendment thereof, as provided in Article IV, the Commission shall conduct an informal rule-making proceeding to provide interested persons with an opportunity to present data and views. Such rule-making proceeding shall be governed by Section 4 of the Federal Administrative Procedure Act, as amended (5 U.S.C. § 553). In addition, the Commission shall, to the extent practicable, publish notice of rule-making proceedings in the official register of each participating state. Before the initial adoption of regulations establishing a compact over-order price or a commission marketing order and thereafter before any amendment with regard to prices or assessments, the Commission shall hold a public hearing. The Commission may commence a rule-making proceeding on its own initiative or may in its sole discretion act upon the petition of any person including individual milk producers, any organization of milk producers or handlers, general farm organizations, consumer or public interest groups, and local, state or federal officials.

"§ 12. Findings and referendum.

(a) In addition to the concise general statement of basis and purpose required by section 4(b) of the Federal Administrative Procedure Act, as amended (5 U.S.C. § 53) (c), the Commission shall make findings of fact with respect to:

- (1) Whether the public interest will be served by the establishment of minimum milk prices to dairy farmers under Article IV.
- What level of prices will assure that producers receive a price sufficient to cover their costs of production and will elicit an adequate supply of milk for the inhabitants of the regulated area and for manufacturing purposes.
- (3) Whether the major provisions of the order, other than those fixing minimum milk prices, are in the public interest and are reasonably designed to achieve the purposes of the order.
- Whether the terms of the proposed regional order or amendment are approved by producers as provided in Section 13.

44 "§ 13. Producer referendum.

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- (a) For the purpose of ascertaining whether the issuance or amendment of 2 regulations establishing a compact over-order price or a commission marketing order, 3 including any provision with respect to milk supply under subsection (f) of Section 9, 4 is approved by producers, the Commission shall conduct a referendum among 5 producers. The referendum shall be held in a timely manner, as determined by regulation of the Commission. The terms and conditions of the proposed order or amendment shall be described by the Commission in the ballot used in the conduct 8 of the referendum, but the nature, content, or extent of such description shall not be a basis for attacking the legality of the order or any action relating thereto.
- (b) An order or amendment shall be deemed approved by producers if the 10 11 Commission determines that it is approved by at least two-thirds of the voting 12 producers who, during a representative period determined by the Commission, have been engaged in the production of milk the price of which would be regulated under the proposed order or amendment.
- (c) For purposes of any referendum, the Commission shall consider the approval 16 or disapproval by any cooperative association of producers, qualified under the provisions of the Act of Congress of February 18, 1922, as amended, known as the 18 Capper-Volstead Act, bona fide engaged in marketing milk, or in rendering services for or advancing the interests of producers of such commodity, as the approval or 20 disapproval of the producers who are members or stockholders in, or under contract 21 with, such cooperative association of producers, except as provided in subdivision (1) of this subsection and subject to the provisions of subdivisions (2) through (5) of this subsection.
 - No cooperative that has been formed to act as a common (1) marketing agency for both cooperatives and individual producers shall be qualified to block vote for either.
 - Any cooperative that is qualified to block vote shall, before **(2)** submitting its approval or disapproval in any referendum, give prior written notice to each of its members as to whether and how it intends to cast its vote. The notice shall be given in a timely manner as established, and in the form prescribed, by the Commission.
 - Any producer may obtain a ballot from the Commission in order (3) to register approval or disapproval of the proposed order.
 - A producer who is a member of a cooperative which has provided <u>(4)</u> notice of its intent to approve or not to approve a proposed order, and who obtains a ballot and with such ballot expresses his or her approval or disapproval of the proposed order, shall notify the Commission as to the name of the cooperative of which he or she is a member, and the Commission shall remove such producer's name from the list certified by such cooperative with its corporate vote.
 - In order to ensure that all milk producers are informed regarding a <u>(5)</u> proposed order, the Commission shall notify all milk producers

that an order is being considered and that each producer may register his or her approval or disapproval with the Commission either directly or through his or her cooperative.

"§ 14. Termination of over-order price or marketing order.

(a) The Commission shall terminate any regulations establishing an over-order price or commission marketing order issued under this Article whenever it finds that such order or price obstructs or does not tend to effectuate the declared policy of this compact.

(b) The Commission shall terminate any regulations establishing an over-order 10 price or a commission marketing order issued under this Article whenever it finds 11 that such termination is favored by a majority of the producers who, during a 12 representative period determined by the Commission, have been engaged in the production of milk, the price of which is regulated by such order; but such termination shall be effective only if announced on or before such date as may be specified in such marketing agreement or order.

(c) The termination or suspension of any order or provision thereof, shall not be considered an order within the meaning of this Article and shall require no hearing, 18 but shall comply with the requirements for informal rule making prescribed by 19 Section 4 of the Federal Administrative Procedure Act, as amended (5 U.S.C. § 553).

20 ARTICLE VI. Enforcement

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21 "§ 15. Records, reports, access to premises.

(a) The Commission may by rule and regulation prescribe record keeping and 23 reporting requirements for all regulated persons. For purposes of the administration and enforcement of this compact, the Commission may examine the books and records of any regulated person relating to his or her milk business and for that purpose, the Commission's properly designated officers, employees, or agents shall have full access during normal business hours to the premises and records of all regulated persons.

(b) Information furnished to or acquired by the Commission officers, employees, 30 or its agents pursuant to this section shall be confidential and not subject to disclosure 31 except to the extent that the Commission deems disclosure to be necessary in any administrative or judicial proceeding involving the administration or enforcement of 33 this compact, an over-order price, a compact marketing order, or other regulations of 34 the Commission. The Commission may adopt rules further defining the 35 confidentiality of information pursuant to this section. Nothing in this section shall be deemed to prohibit (i) the issuance of general statements based upon the reports of a number of handlers, which do not identify the information furnished by any 37 person, or (ii) the publication by direction of the Commission of the name of any person violating any regulation of the Commission, together with a statement of the 40 particular provisions violated by such person.

(c) No officer, employee, or agent of the Commission shall intentionally disclose 42 information, by inference or otherwise, that is made confidential pursuant to this 43 section. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction, be 44 subject to a fine of not more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000) or to imprisonment

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1 for not more than one year, or both, and shall be removed from office. The 2 Commission shall refer any allegation of a violation of this section to the appropriate 3 state enforcement authority or United States Attorney.

"§ 16. Subpoena, hearings and judicial review.

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(a) The Commission is hereby authorized and empowered by its members and its properly designated officers to administer oaths and issue subpoenas throughout all signatory states to compel the attendance of witnesses and the giving of testimony and the production of other evidence.

- (b) Any handler subject to an order may file a written petition with the Commission stating that any order or any provision of any such order or any obligation imposed in connection therewith is not in accordance with law and praying for a modification thereof or to be exempted therefrom. The handler shall thereupon be given an opportunity for a hearing upon such petition, in accordance with regulations made by the Commission. After such hearing, the Commission shall make a ruling upon the prayer of such petition which shall be final, if in accordance with law.
- The district courts of the United States in any district in which the handler is (c) an inhabitant, or has his or her principal place of business, are hereby vested with jurisdiction to review such ruling, provided a complaint for that purpose is filed within 30 days from the date of the entry of the ruling. Service of process in these proceedings may be had upon the Commission by delivering to it a copy of the complaint. If the court determines that the ruling is not in accordance with law, it shall remand such proceedings to the Commission with directions either (i) to make such ruling as the court shall determine to be in accordance with law, or (ii) to take such further proceedings as, in its opinion, the law requires. The pendency of proceedings instituted pursuant to this subdivision shall not impede, hinder, or delay the Commission form obtaining relief pursuant to Section 17. Any proceedings brought pursuant to Section 17, except where brought by way of counterclaim in proceedings instituted pursuant to this section, shall abate whenever a final decree has been rendered in proceedings between the same parties, and covering the same subject matter, instituted pursuant to this section.

"§ 17. Enforcement with respect to handlers.

- (a) Any violation by a handler of the provisions of regulation establishing an overorder price or a commission marketing order, or other regulations adopted pursuant to this compact shall:
 - Constitute a violation of the laws of each of the signatory states.

 Such violation shall render the violator subject to a civil penalty in an amount as may be prescribed by the laws of each of the participating states, recoverable in any state or federal court of competent jurisdiction. Each day such violation continues shall constitute a separate violation.
 - (2) Constitute grounds for the revocation of license or permit to engage in the milk business under the applicable laws of the participating states.

- (b) With respect to handlers, the Commission shall enforce the provisions of this 1 compact, regulations establishing an over-order price, a commission marketing order or other regulations adopted hereunder by:
 - Commencing an action for legal or equitable relief brought in the (1)name of the Commission in any state or federal court of competent jurisdiction; or
 - Referral to the state agency for enforcement by judicial or (2) administrative remedy with the agreement of the appropriate state agency of a participating state.
- (c) With respect to handlers, the Commission may bring an action for injunction 10 to enforce the provisions of this compact or the order or regulations adopted thereunder without being compelled to allege or prove that an adequate remedy of
- 13 law does not exist.

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- 14 ARTICLE VII. Finance
- "§ 18. Finance of start-up and regular costs.
- (a) To provide for its start-up costs, the Commission may borrow money pursuant to its general power under Section 6, subdivision (d), paragraph 4. In order to 18 finance the cost of administration and enforcement of this compact, including 19 payback of start-up costs, the Commission may collect an assessment from each 20 handler who purchases milk from producers within the region. If imposed, this 21 assessment shall be collected on a monthly basis for up to one year from the date the 22 Commission convenes, in an amount not to exceed \$.015 per hundred weight of milk 23 purchased from producers during the period of the assessment. The initial assessment may apply to the projected purchases of handlers for the two-month period following 25 the date the Commission convenes. In addition, if regulations establishing an over-26 order price or a compact marketing order are adopted, they may include an assessment for the specific purpose of their administration. These regulations shall provide for establishment of a reserve for the Commission's ongoing operating 29 expenses.
- (b) The Commission shall not pledge the credit of any participating state or of the 30 31 United States. Notes issued by the Commission and all other financial obligations 32 incurred by it, shall be its sole responsibility and no participating state or the United 33 States shall be liable therefor.
- 34 "§ 19. Audit and accounts.
- The Commission shall keep accurate accounts of all receipts and 35 36 disbursements, which shall be subject to the audit and accounting procedures 37 established under its rules. In addition, all receipts and disbursements of funds 38 handled by the Commission shall be audited yearly by a qualified public accountant 39 and the report of the audit shall be included in and become part of the annual report 40 of the Commission.
- (b) The accounts of the Commission shall be open at any reasonable time for 41 42 inspection by duly constituted officers of the participating states and by any persons 43 authorized by the Commission.

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- (c) Nothing contained in this Article shall be construed to prevent commission 1 compliance with laws relating to audit or inspection of accounts by or on behalf of 3 any participating state or of the United States.
- 4 ARTICLE VIII. Entry into Force; Additional Members and Withdrawal
- "§ 20. Entry into force; additional members.
- The compact shall enter into force effective when enacted into law by any three 7 states of the group of states composed of Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, 8 Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South 9 Carolina, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, and West Virginia and when the consent of
- 10 Congress has been obtained.
- 11 "§ 21. Withdrawal from compact.
- Any participating state may withdraw from this compact by enacting a statute 12 13 repealing the same, but no such withdrawal shall take effect until one year after 14 notice in writing of the withdrawal is given to the Commission and the governors of 15 all the participating states. No withdrawal shall affect any liability already already 16 incurred by or chargeable to a participating state prior to the time of such 17 withdrawal.
- 18 "§ 22. Severability.

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- If any part or provision of this compact is adjudged invalid by any court, such 20 judgment shall be confined in its operation to the part or provision directly involved 21 in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered and shall not 22 affect or impair the validity of the remainder of this compact. In the event Congress 23 consents to this compact subject to conditions, said conditions shall not impair the 24 validity of this compact when said conditions are accepted by three or more 25 compacting states. A compact state may accept the conditions of Congress by 26 implementation of this compact.
- 27 "\$ 106-811. Appointment of members to the Southern Dairy Compact Commission.
- (a) The delegation from the State of North Carolina to the Southern Dairy 28 29 Compact Commission, as established in Article IV of the Compact, shall be composed of five members appointed as follows:
 - One member representing consumers of milk, appointed by the (1)Governor.
 - One member appointed by the General Assembly upon the **(2)** recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
 - One member appointed by the General Assembly upon the <u>(3)</u> recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.
 - Two members appointed by the Commissioner of Agriculture, one (4) of whom shall be a dairy farmer engaged in the production of milk at the time of appointment or reappointment.
 - (b) Members must be registered to vote in the State.
- (c) Members shall serve a term of four years and may be reappointed, but no 41 42 member shall serve more than three consecutive terms. Members shall serve until 43 their successors are duly appointed. Any appointment to fill an unexpired term shall 44 be for the balance of the unexpired term and shall be made by the appropriate

- 1 appointing authority. A member may be removed by the appointing authority, in
 2 accordance with G.S. 143B-13. The Commissioner of Agriculture shall designate one
 3 member of the delegation to serve as chair, at the pleasure of the Commissioner.
- 4 (d) Members of the delegation shall receive per diem and necessary travel and 5 subsistence expenses in accordance with G.S. 138-5.

Section 9. (a) Except where expressly repealed or amended by this act, the provisions of S.L. 1997-443, S.L. 1998-1 Extra Session, S.L. 1998-9, S.L. 1998-23, and S.L. 1998-153 remain in effect.

(b) Notwithstanding any modifications by this act in the amounts appropriated, except where expressly repealed or amended, the limitations and directions for the 1998-99 fiscal year in S.L. 1997-443, S.L. 1998-1 Extra Session, S.L. 1998-9, S.L. 1998-23, and S.L. 1998-153 that applied to appropriations to particular agencies or for particular purposes apply to the newly enacted appropriations of this act for those same particular purposes.

EFFECT OF HEADINGS

Section 10. The headings to the sections of this act are a convenience to the reader and are for reference only. The headings do not expand, limit, or define the text of this act.

SEVERABILITY CLAUSE

Section 11. If any section or provision of this act is declared unconstitutional or invalid by the courts, it does not affect the validity of this act as a whole or any part other than the part so declared to be unconstitutional or invalid.
