

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. Pursuant to G.S. 115D-2.1(b)(4)f., the House of Representatives and the Senate shall elect members to the State Board of Community

Representatives and the Senate shall elect members to the State Board of Community Colleges during the regular sessions of the two chambers to be held on Thursday, March 22, 2001. At that time the House of Representatives shall elect one member to the State Board for a term of six years beginning July 1, 2001. The Senate shall elect one member to the State Board for a term of six years beginning July 1, 2001. The Senate also shall elect one member to fill an unexpired term expiring June 30, 2005.

SECTION 2. Each chamber shall follow the procedure set out in G.S.

115D-2.1 for the nomination and election of members of the State Board.

SECTION 3. This resolution is effective upon ratification.

Dear Representative Sherrill:

It has been an honor to serve the citizens of North Carolina on the State Board of Community Colleges for the last six years. I hope my actions on the board have been in keeping with the goal of the General Assembly to insure we have the best community college system possible so that we can maintain our competitive edge in economic development.

G.S. 115D-1 states that "the major purpose of each and every institution operating under the provisions of this chapter shall be and shall continue to be the offering of vocational and technical education". 

The House Education Subcommittee on Community Colleges met on Wednesday, April 4, 2001, in Room 415 of the Legislative Office Building at 1:00 PM. The President may, with the approval by the State Board, establish and abolish employment positions within the staff of the System Office in accordance with:

- (1) State Personnel policies and procedures if these positions are subject to the State Personnel Act and if the System Office is operating under the terms of a Performance Agreement or a Decentralization Agreement authorized under Chapter 126 of the General Statutes; or
- (2) Policies and procedures of the State Board of Community Colleges if these positions are exempt from the State Personnel Act.

The results achieved by establishing and abolishing positions pursuant to the conditions set forth in subdivision (1) of this subsection shall be subject to postauditing by the Office of State Personnel. Notwithstanding G.S. 143-64.20, 143-64.21, and 143-64.22, the State Board may authorize the President to employ such consultants as may be necessary to respond to legislative directives for studies and to revise, from time to time, the multiple operating formulae within the 'State Aid' fund 1600. The Community Colleges System Office (Budget Code 16800) may retain one hundred percent (100%) of its overhead receipts for non recurring expenditures that do not impose a continuing obligation upon the State. These retained overhead receipts shall not revert to the State's General Fund.
- (c) The President, in consultation with the State Auditor and the Director of the Office of State Personnel, shall ascertain that the management staff and internal financial controls are in place and continue in place to successfully administer the additional authority authorized herein. All actions taken by the President are subject to audit by the State Auditor."

The Community College System Office may retain all of the overhead receipts for nonrecurring expenditures that don't impose a continuing obligation upon the State. All actions undertaken by the President are subject to audit by the State Auditor.

This act is effective when it becomes law.

BILL ANALYSIS:

Staff positions

With the approval of the State Board of Community Colleges, the President may create and abolish staff positions in the System Office. For positions that are subject to the State Personnel Act and if the System Office is operating under the terms of a Performance Agreement or a Decentralization Agreement authorized under Chapter 126, then the President must follow State Personnel policies and procedures. For positions that are exempt from the State Personnel Act, then the President must follow the policies of the State Board of Community Colleges.

The results of creating and abolishing positions shall be subject to postaudit by the Office of State Personnel. Personnel actions shall not be implemented unless funds are available for the full-annualized costs of the position within the current System Office budget. ., .

General Fund Appropriations

The President may move the General Fund appropriations for the continuing operations of the System Office between line items. The President may use up to 10% of the funds from salary and fringe accounts for nonsalary purposes; including materials, supplies and equipment.

The System Office is no longer required to revert to the General Fund any overhead receipts for non recurring expenditures that don't impose a continuing obligation on the State.

Audits

The President shall ensure that the proper management staff and fiscal controls are in place to administer the authority granted in this act. The President's actions are subject to audit by the State Auditor.

SUMMARY: House Bill 410 is an agency bill that would allow a community college to dispose of a right-of-way or easement with the prior approval of the Community College System Office. It would also allow a college to dispose of personal property without the prior approval of the State Board of Community College and without first making a determination that the personal property is unnecessary or undesirable for the purposes of the institution. The act is effective when it becomes law,

G.S. 115D-15(a) currently requires that a community college must obtain the State CURRENT LAW: Board's approval prior to disposing of any real or personal property. It also requires that the board of trustees must first determine that the property is "unnecessary or undesirable for the purposes of the institution". The same laws that govern the disposal of public school real and personal property (Article ·12 of Chapter 160A) apply to community colleges. Those procedures include: private negotiation and sale; advertisement for sealed bids; negotiated offer, advertisement, and upset bid; public auction; or Public schools (and therefore community colleges) may also use the Department of Administration procedures for the disposal of personal property.

The bill makes changes regarding when and from whom a community college BILL ANALYSIS: must receive prior approval to convey or dispose of real and personal property.

- If a community college wanted to convey a right-of-way or easement for highway construction or for utility installations, it must obtain the prior approval of the Community Colleges System Office.
- If a community college wanted to dispose of personal property, there is no requirement of prior approval.

In addition, a board of trustees could dispose of personal property without first determining that the property is "unnecessary or undesirable for the purposes of the institution".


SUMMARY: House Bill 421 would modify the procedure for submitting local budgets to the State Board of Community Colleges (State Board) for approval by authorizing the State Board to designate a date by which the local boards of trustees would submit their budgets.

Annually, on or before May 1, the board of trustees of each local community **CURRENT LAW:** college prepares for submission by May 15 a budget request based on estimates of available funds if that information is provided by the funding authorities or as estimated by the college, or based on needs as determined by the board of trustees. The board of trustees submits the budget first to the local tax-levying authority, and then upon approval of the local tax-levying authority, the budget is submitted to the State Board.

On or before July 1, but not later than September 1, the local tax-levying authority determines the amount of county revenue to be appropriated to the local college for that budget year. Then, not more than 10 days after the county commissioners notify the boards of trustees of the amount appropriated, the trustees must submit the budget to the State Board for approval.

Currently, a local board of trustees must submit the community college's budget to BACKGROUND: the State Board of Community Colleges (State Board) twice. The first budget request is based on estimates, and the second budget request does not generally contain the State appropriation. The State Board wants the local boards of trustees to submit their budget after they know both the county and the State appropriation.

The State Board believes that submitting the budget once, on a date that they designate, will be more efficient and useful.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. G.S. 115D-54(b)(4) reads as rewritten:

The budget shall be prepared and submitted for approval according to the "(b) following procedures:

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19 20 (4) Plant Fund Budget. - The budget request shall contain the items of capital outlay, as provided in G.S. 115D-31 and 115D-32, for which funds are requested, from whatever source. The budget shall be submitted first to the local-tax levying authority, which board of trustees shall submit the budget to the local tax-levying authority. The local tax-levying authority shall approve or disapprove, in whole or in part, that portion of the budget requesting local public funds. Upon After approval by the local tax-levying authority, the budget shall be submitted by the board of trustees to theboard of trustees shall submit the budget to the State Board of Community Colleges, which Colleges on a date designated by the State Board. The State Board may approve or disapprove, in whole or in part, that portion of the budget requesting State or federal funds. Plant funds provided for construction and major renovations shall be permanent appropriations until the conclusion of the project for which appropriated."

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SECTION 2. G.S. 115D-55(b) reads as rewritten:

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Approval of Budget by State Board of Community Colleges. - Not later than 10 days after After notification by the local tax-levying authority of the amount appropriated, the budget shall be submitted to the State Board of Community Colleges on a date designated by the State Board of Community Colleges for approval of that portion within its authority as stated in G.S. 115D-54(b). The State Board of 1

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Community Colleges shall approve the budget for each institution in such amount as the State Board decides is available and necessary for the operation of the institution.

The State Board of Community Colleges shall have authority to call for all books, records, audit reports and other information bearing on the financial operation of the institution except records dealing with specific persons for which the persons' rights of privacy are protected by either federal or State law.

Nothing in this Article shall be construed to place a duty on the State Board of Community Colleges to fund a deficit incurred by an institution through failure of the institution to comply with the provisions of this Article or rules and regulations issued pursuant hereto."

SECTION 3. This act becomes effective July 1, 2001.

SUMMARY: House Bill 438 is an agency bill that would alter one of the five mandatory performance standards used to evaluate each college so that it no longer includes program noncompleters.

G.S. 115D-31.3 - The State Board of Community Colleges must evaluate each **CURRENT LAW:** college on twelve performance standards:

- 1. Progress of basic skills students,
- 2. Passing rate for licensure and certification examinations,
- 3. Goal completion of program completers and noncompleters,
- 4. Employment status of graduates,
- 5. Performance of students who transfer to the university system,
- 6. Passing rates in developmental courses,
- 7. Success rates of developmental students in subsequent college-level courses,
- 8. The level of satisfaction of students who complete programs and those who do not complete programs,
- 9. Curriculum student retention and graduation,
- 10. Employer satisfaction with graduates,
- 11. Client satisfaction with customized training, and
- 12. Program enrollment.

Each college must publish its performance on the 12 measures annually in its electronic catalog or on the Internet, and in its printed catalog each time the catalog is reprinted. The Community Colleges System Office must publish the performance of all colleges on all 12 measures in its annual Critical Success Factors Report.

For the purpose of performance budgeting, the State Board of Community Colleges must evaluate each college on six performance measures. Of the twelve measures, the first five are mandatory, and each college chooses one more from the remaining seven measures. For each of these six performance measures on which a college performs successfully or attains the standard of significant improvement, the college may retain and carry forward into the next fiscal year one-third of one percent (1/3 of 1%) of its final fiscal year General Fund appropriations.

Funds not allocated to colleges for successful performance on these six standards shall be used to reward superior performance. After all State aid budget obligations have been met, the State Board of

Community Colleges shall distribute the remainder of these funds equally to colleges that perform successfully on at least five of the six performance measures.

Funds retained by colleges or distributed to colleges shall be used for the purchase of equipment, initial program start-up costs including faculty salaries for the first year of a program, and one-time faculty and staff bonuses. These funds may not be used for continuing salary increases or for other obligations beyond the fiscal year into which they were carried forward, and these funds must be encumbered within 12 months of the fiscal year into which they were carried forward.

BILL ANALYSIS: The third required performance standard is "Goal completion of program completers and noncompleters". Performance funding for this particular standard, therefore, is based on goal completion of both program completers and program noncompleters. This bill would remove the noncompleters from this performance standard because it is very difficult to find and survey those who drop out of the programs. The response rate for noncompleters has been very low.

BACKGROUND: In 1998 the General Assembly enacted a special provision that directed the State Board of Community Colleges to study performance budget measures and make recommendations. In addition, the General Assembly found that the annual program review standards at that time were not adequate to ensure that programs were meeting the needs of students, employers, and the general public. A second special provision directed the State Board to look at their annual program review standards to ensure "a high degree of program accountability."

Recommendations were reported in the 1999 Funding Formula Study: Phase IV Report. Legislation based on these recommendations was adopted in the 1999 session, and then rewritten in the 2000 session of the General Assembly.

This act would become effective July 1, 2001.

MINUTES HOUSE EDUCATION SUBCOMMITTEE ON COMMUNITY COLLEGES

April 11, 2001

The House Education Subcommittee on Community Colleges met on Wednesday, April 11, 2001, in Room 415 of the Legislative Office Building at 1:00 PM. The following members were present: Chairwoman Marian McLawhorn, Vice Chairs Smith, Womble, and Arnold, Representatives Allen, Bowie, Carpenter, Cox, Goodwin, McCombs, Oldham, Rayfield, Tolson, Walend, and West. Staff Counselors, Shirley Iorio and Kory Goldsmith were also in attendance. A Visitor Registration list is attached and made part of these minutes.

The Chairwoman called the meeting to order to consider the following bills.

The first order of business was HB 431, A BILL ENTITLED AN ACT DIRECTING THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO ADOPT RULES AND POLICIES REGARDING THE USE OF FUNDS FOR STUDENT FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE. A copy of the bill and bill summary is attached and made part of these minutes (Attachment 1). Representative Saunders, bill sponsor, indicated there was a proposed committee substitute (See Attachment #2) and explained the bill. Upon motion made by Representative Womble, the committee voted for a favorable report to the proposed committee substitute, unfavorable to the original bill, to be reported directly to the floor of the House.

The next order of business was HB 938, A BILL ENTITLED AN ACT TO PERMIT CERTAIN COMMUNITY COLLEGES TO GRANT SECURITY INTERESTS TO FEDERAL AGENCIES. A copy of the bill and bill summary is attached (Attachment 3). Representative Smith, the bill's sponsor, was asked to explain the bill. The proposed committee substitute was given a favorable report, unfavorable to the original bill, to be reported directly to the floor of the House.

Chairwoman McLawhorn recognized Representative Gibson, bill sponsor, to explain HB 443, A BILL ENTITLED AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO

ESTABLISH A NORTH CAROLINA COMMUNITY COLLEGES INSTRUCTIONAL TRUST FUND. A copy of the bill and bill summary is attached and made part of these minutes (Attachment 5). Representative Gibson indicated that there was a proposed committee substitute (See Attachment #6). Dr. Bruce Howell, President of Wake Tech Community College, spoke in favor of the bill. AN ACT DIRECTING THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO ADOPT RULES AND POLICIES REGARDING THE USE OF FUNDS FOR STUDENT FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. G.S. 115D-5 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

"(m) The State Board of Community Colleges shall adopt rules and policies for the disbursement of funds for need-based student financial assistance. The State Board may allocate up to three hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$350,000) of these funds each fiscal year to students who enroll in low-enrollment programs that prepare students for high-demand occupations.

Students must apply for federal Pell Grants or complete FAFSA applications to be eligible for the need-based student financial assistance program, unless the students apply for financial assistance to enroll in low-enrollment programs that prepare students for high-demand occupations. The Community Colleges System shall make these financial assistance funds available to the neediest students who are not eligible for other financial aid programs that fully cover the required educational expenses of these students. The State Board may use some of these funds as short-term loans to students who anticipate receiving the federal HOPE or Lifetime Learning Tax Credits.

State funds for student financial assistance shall not revert at the end of each fiscal year but shall remain available until expended for need-based financial assistance.

The State Board may contract with the State Education Assistance Authority for administration of these financial assistance funds."

SECTION 2. This act becomes effective July 1, 2001.

SUMMARY: The Proposed Committee Substitute to HB431 codifies existing budgetary provisions that create the need-based student assistance for Community College students. It allows the State Board of Community Colleges to allocate no more than 10% of the assistance funds to targeted groups of students. The act becomes effective July 1, 2001.

In 1999, the General Assembly appropriated \$5 Million in recurring funds for both **CURRENT LAW:** the 1999-2000 and the 2000-2001 fiscal years for a need-based financial assistance fund for community college students. In order to qualify, a student must apply for a federal Pell Grant. The program is targeted to the neediest students who are not eligible for other financial aid programs that fully cover the required educational expenses. The State grants are designed to supplement any federal financial aid that might otherwise be available to a student, and some of the funds may be used for short term loans for students who anticipate receiving either federal HOPE or Lifetime Learning Tax Credits. The funds appropriated do not revert, the State Board of Community Colleges may contract with the State Education Assistance Authority to administer the financial assistance, and the State Board must ensure that at least one counselor is available at each college to inform students of the federal programs and assistance that is available.

BILL ANALYSIS: Section 1 of the Proposed Committee Substitute codifies sections 9.4.(a) and 9.4(b) of S.L. 1999-237. This is the special provision in the 1999 budget that created the current needbased community college financial assistance program. The session law language is codified as G.S. 115D-40.1.

Section 2 of the PCS amends the newly codified law. It allows the State Board to allocate no more than 10% of the funds appropriated under this program to provide financial assistance to students who:

- Enroll in low-enrollment programs that prepare students for high-demand occupations.
- Enroll in certificate programs.
- Are transitional students.

These awards would not be need-based.

In order to be eligible to qualify for either the need-based assistance or the targeted assistance, a student would either have to submit an application for a federal Pell Grant, or a Free Application for Federal Financial Assistance (FAFSA). Federal Pell Grants are only available for curriculum degrees (Associates of Arts, Associate of Science, or Associate of Applied Science). By allowing a student to apply using a FAFSA, the financial assistance can be made available to students in non-curriculum programs that offer credentials such as a certificate or a diploma.

Although the PCS deletes the language that appropriates \$5 million for the 1999-2000 and 2000-2001 fiscal years, it does not have the effect of cutting those funds. This is because the appropriations are

recurring and because the PCS is not effective until July 1, 2001, i.e., after the end of the 2000-2001 fiscal year.

AN ACT TO CODIFY THE NEED-BASED SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM FOR COMMUNITY COLLEGE STUDENTS, TO AMEND THE APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS, AND TO ALLOW THE STATE BOARD OF COMMUNITY COLLEGES TO TARGET A PORTION OF THE FUNDS TO STUDENTS ENROLLED IN HIGH DEMAND OCCUPATIONS.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. Section 9.4.(a) and Section 9.4.(b) of S.L. 1999-237 are codified as G.S. 115D-40.1:

"§ G.S. 115D-40.1. Section 9.4.(a) Of the funds appropriated to the Community Colleges System Office for the 1999-2001 fiscal biennium, the sum of five million dollars (\$5,000,000) for the 1999-2000 fiscal year and the sum of five million dollars (\$5,000,000) for the 2000-2001 fiscal year shall be used to provide the largest financial need-based student assistance program in the history of the North Carolina Community College System.

Students must apply for federal Pell Grants to be eligible for this program. It is the intent of the General Assembly that the Community College System make these financial aid funds available to the neediest students who are not eligible for other financial aid programs that fully cover the required educational expenses of these students. SUMMARY: HB938 is a local bill that allows Carteret Community College and Halifax Community College to grant a security interest to the Economic Development Administration (EDA) for real or personal property purchased with grants obtained from the EDA. The act is effective when it becomes law.

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 115D-58.1 allows community colleges to apply for and receive grants from the federal government in order to carry out the college's mission. The board of trustees may agree to and comply with any lawful and reasonable conditions of such grants. The State Board of Community Colleges is directed to adopt rules to govern the application and acceptance of grants.

Community colleges may buy, sell, or lease property (with the approval of the State Board). However, there is not authority for a community college to grant a security interest in property it holds.

BILL ANALYSIS: The bill would allow Carteret Community College and to Halifax Community College the authority to grant a security interest to the Economic Development Administration in property purchased by the colleges with funds received through EDA grants.

BACKGROUND: Three other colleges already have this authority: Haywood Community College, Roanoke-Chowan Community College, and Brunswick Community College.

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



The certification shall be in writing and shall state that (i) pledged contributions of at least seventeen thousand dollars (\$17,000) were received from private donors and deposited in the Academic Improvement Trust account of the foundation during the fiscal year, (ii) the amount pledged has not been used previously for matching purposes; and (iii) the amount pledged and matching State funds shall be used only as provided in subsection (b) of this section.

(d) The college foundation shall be responsible for the accounting of funds in the Academic Improvement Trust Account entrusted to it. The annual audit of the foundation shall include an audit of how funds from the North Carolina Community Colleges Instructional Trust Fund were actually used. This audit shall be available to the State Board of Community Colleges for inspection, upon request."

SECTION 2. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the State Board of Community Colleges the sum of five hundred one thousand five hundred dollars (\$501,500) for the 2001-2002 fiscal year and the sum of five hundred one thousand five hundred dollars (\$501,500) for the 2002-2003 fiscal year for the North Carolina Community Colleges Instructional Trust Fund established in Section 1 of this act.

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SECTION 3. This act becomes effective July 1, 2001.



SUMMARY: SB531 would create a new exception to the Umstead Act. In order to promote economic development, a community college would be permitted to allow certain businesses to use the college's personnel or facilities, or both, for small business incubators, product testing services, and video conferencing services.

The act would be effective when it becomes law.

CURRENT LAW: The Umstead Act (G.S. 66-58) prohibits State agencies from competing with private enterprises. There are a number of entities and activities that are exempt from this prohibition. For example, community colleges and UNC constituent institutions may operate student bookstores. Violation of the Umstead Act is a Class 1 misdemeanor. However, a federal court has held that the Umstead Act does not create a private cause of action for damages or injunctive relief.

A community college's service area is the geographic area that college serves. The State Board of Community Colleges determines the service area of a college. A service area may include counties that do not provide financial support for the community college. Community colleges are currently permitted to enter into agreements to provide courses and services in another college's service area.

The bill would add a new exemption to the Umstead Act. In order for the exemption to apply, the business using the community college personnel or facilities would have to be located on the campus or within the service area of the college, the board of trustees of the college would have to specifically approve the use of the facilities or personnel, and the State Board of Community Colleges would be directed to adopt rules to implement the act. The term "small business incubators" is defined as new business ventures that are located within a community college's service area and which are not likely to succeed without the support and assistance provided by the college. A community college may not provide services to the business venture for more than 24 months.

The bill does not define "economic development" or "product testing services".
