# MINUTES HOUSE COMMITTEE ON WILDLIFE RESOURCES

#### April 9, 2003

The House Committee on Wildlife Resources met on Wednesday, April 9, 2003, in Room 1425 of the Legislative Building at 12:00 noon. The following members were present: Chairman Bobby H. Barbee, Sr., Representatives Marvin Lucas, Wayne Sexton, Edith Warren, Arthur Williams and Ex-officio member, Bill Culpepper. Barbara Riley and Mary Shuping, staff from Research Division, were in attendance. Aaron Woodlief and Francis Poole, of the Sergeant-at-Arms office, were introduced to assist with the meeting. The Pages in attendance were Nathan Harrell, Trey Williams and Shawn Guy. A Visitor Registration List is attached and made part of these minutes.

The Chairman called the meeting to order and asked that the committee members introduce themselves and tell a little about their lives in the workplace.

The following bills were then considered:

Representative Walend was recognized to explain HB 13, A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT TO PROHIBIT HUNTING FROM THE RIGHT-OF-WAY OF PUBLIC ROADS IN TRANSYLVANIA COUNTY AND TO REQUIRE WRITTEN PERMISSION BEFORE HUNTING ON THE LAND OF ANOTHER IN TRANSYLVANIA COUNTY. Upon motion made by Representative Sexton, the bill received a favorable report.

Representative Barbee called on Representative C. Johnson to explain his House Bill 550, AN ACT TO PROHIBIT HUNTING FROM THE RIGHT-OF-WAY OF CERTAIN ROADS IN CRAVEN COUNTY. Representative Johnson withdrew this bill for consideration at this time.

The next order of business was HB 581, A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT TO ALLOW ELECTROFISHING FOR CATFISH IN COLUMBUS COUNTY. Representative Hill, bill sponsor, explained the bill. Richard Hamilton of the N. C. Department of Wildlife Resources stated that he was not opposed to this bill. Upon motion made by Representative A. Williams, the Committee voted for a favorable report.

The chair recognized Representative Culpepper, who explained the bill in the absence of Representative Owens, sponsor of HB 646, A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT TO CHANGE THE MANNER OF CHOOSING THE MEMBERS OF THE CURRITUCK COUNTY GAME COMMISSION. Upon motion made by Representative Sexton, the Committee voted to give this bill a favorable report.

Representative Culpepper was recognized to explain HB 655, A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A NO-WAKE ZONE ON A PORTION OF PEMBROKE CREEK IN CHOWAN COUNTY. Barbara Riley was asked to explain the committee substitute. Upon motion made by Representative Lucas the committee voted to give the original bill an unfavorable report and the committee substitute a favorable report.

There being no further business, the Chair adjourned the meeting at 12:45 PM.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

**SECTION 1.** It is unlawful to hunt, take, or kill any wild animal or wild bird from, on, or across the right-of-way of a public road, street, highway, or other public vehicular area in Transylvania County. For purposes of this section, "right-of-way" refers to the road surface from shoulder to shoulder. This section does not apply to public vehicular areas located in the Pisgah, Nantahala, or Toxaway game lands outside of designated safety zones.

**SECTION 2.** It is unlawful to hunt on the land of another without having on one's person the written permission, dated within the last 12 months, of the landowner or lessee, or the landowner's or lessee's designee.

**SECTION 3.** Violation of this act is a Class 3 misdemeanor.

**SECTION 4.** This act is enforceable by law enforcement officers of the Wildlife Resources Commission, by sheriffs and deputy sheriffs, and by peace officers with general subject matter jurisdiction.

**SECTION 5.** This act applies only to Transylvania County.

SECTION 6. This act becomes effective October 1, 2003, and applies to offenses committed on or after that date.

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# HB 13: Transylvania Hunting

#### **SUMMARY:**

Date:

House bill 13 prohibits hunting from the right-of-way of public roads in Transylvania County. "Right-of-way" is defined as the road surface from shoulder to shoulder. The public vehicular areas located in the Pisgah, Nantahala, and Toxaway game lands outside of designated safety zones are excluded from the prohibition.

House Bill 13 also makes it unlawful to hunt on the land of another without the written permission of the landowner or lessee or their designee. The written permission must be dated within the last 12 months to be valid.

Violation of the act is a Class 3 misdemeanor.

The act becomes effective October 1, 2003 and applies to offences committed on or after that date.

SECTION 3. Violation of this act is a Class 3 misdemeanor.

SECTION 4. This act is enforceable by law enforcement officers of the Wildlife Resources Commission, by sheriffs and deputy sheriffs, and by other peace officers with general subject matter jurisdiction.

SECTION 5. This act becomes effective October 1, 2003.

#### **SUMMARY:**

HB 581 allows electrofishing in the Waccamaw and Lumber Rivers.

#### **CURRENT LAW:**

G.S. 113-272.2 requires a person to obtain a special device license to be entitled to take nongame fish with any apparatus other than hook and line. The Wildlife Resources Commission, by rule, has identified the types of special devices that will be allowed. The use of hand operated devices generating electrical currents for taking catfish is not an approved method for taking catfish under a special device license.

#### **BILL ANALYSIS:**

House Bill 581 would allow persons who hold a special device license to use a hand operated device that generates an electrical current for taking catfish in the Waccamaw and Lumber Rivers.

The act becomes effective July 1, 2003.

#### A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO CHANGE THE MANNER OF CHOOSING THE MEMBERS OF THE CURRITUCK COUNTY GAME COMMISSION.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

**SECTION 1.** Section 5 of Chapter 1436 of the 1957 Session Laws, as amended by Chapter 622 of the 1981 Session Laws, reads as rewritten:

"Sec. 5. A Game Commission of Currituck County is hereby created which Commission shall consist of five members, each of whom shall be thoroughly acquainted with migratory water fowl shooting both ashore and afloat. The Game Commission shall be selected and appointed by the Board of County Commissioners of Currituck County, but no member shall be removed except upon the unanimous vote of all the members of the board of commissioners. One member of said Commission shall be chosen from the district South of the Narrows, on from the district North of the Narrows and South of the northerly end of Church's Island, one from the district North of Church's Island on the westerly side of the Sound, one from the district North of Church's Island on the easterly side of the Sound, and one from the district North of Currituck Courthouse on the westerly side of the Sound. One member shall be chosen from each of the four townships of Currituck County and one member shall be appointed to serve at large. In the event of a vacancy, successors to the members of the Commission shall be similarly appointed.

The members of said Game Commission shall be appointed by the board of county commissioners on the first Monday in July, 1957 and thereafter on the first Monday of June of each year as terms expire, and shall hold their offices for terms of two years, or until their successors are appointed and qualified, provided the terms of those appointed on the first Monday of July, 1957, shall expire on the first Monday of June, 1959. Provided 1959, and provided that present members serving on date of ratification shall finish their term.terms.

The said Game Commission acting with the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission shall have charge of the enforcement of this and all migratory wild fowl

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game laws in Currituck County, and the said Game commission acting with the North
Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission shall have the power and authority to
prescribe rules and regulations for the enforcement of such game laws and the
protection of wild fowl life in said county, not inconsistent with the provisions of this
Act. It is expressly provided that said Game Commission may establish sanctuaries or
rest areas in which no wild fowl may be shot, hunted or disturbed."
<b>SECTION 2.</b> This act becomes effective June 1, 2003.

#### **SUMMARY:**

House Bill 646 changes the current method of selecting the members of the Currituck County Game Commission.

#### **CURRENT LAW:**

The Currituck County Game Commission consists of 5 members selected and appointed by the board of County Commissions. S.L. 57-1436 set forth the geographic areas of the county from which each member would be drawn. These areas included the district south of the Narrows, North of the Narrows, south of the northerly end of Church's Island on the west side of the sound, north of Church's Island on the easterly side of the Sound and north of Currituck Courthouse on the westerly side of the sound.

#### BILL ANALYSIS

House Bill 646 provides that the County Commissioners shall select one member of the Game Commission from each of the four townships in the County and one member shall be appointed to serve at large. The bill would not effect the terms of the current membership of the Commission.

The act becomes effective June 1, 2003.

#### A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A NO-WAKE ZONE ON A PORTION OF PEMBROKE CREEK IN CHOWAN COUNTY.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. It is unlawful to operate a vessel at greater than no-wake speed on the waters of Pembroke Creek from the Highway 17 Business bridge to the vicinity of Dillard's Island in Chowan County. No-wake speed is idle speed or a slow speed creating no appreciable wake.


SECTION 2. With regard to marking the no-wake speed zone established in Section 1 of this act, Chowan County or its designee may place and maintain markers in accordance with the Uniform Waterway Marking System and any supplementary standards for that system adopted by the Wildlife Resources Commission. All markers of the no-wake speed zone shall be buoys or floating signs placed in the water or signs placed on pilings and shall be sufficient in number and size so as to give adequate warning of the no-wake speed zone to vessels approaching from various directions.

SECTION 3. This act is enforceable under G.S. 75A-17 as if it were a provision of Chapter 75A of the General Statutes.

**SECTION 4.** Violation of this act is a Class 3 misdemeanor.

**SECTION 5.** This act applies only to Chowan County.

SECTION 6. This act is effective when it becomes law and is enforceable after markers complying with Section 2 of this act are placed in the water.

#### SUMMARY:

House Bill 655 establishes a no wake zone in Pembroke Creek from the Highway 17 Business bridge upstream to the northern entrance of the canal creating Dillard's Island in Chowan County.

No wake speed is idle speed or slow speed without an appreciable wake. Chowan County, or its designee may place and maintain markers in accordance with the Uniform Waterway Marking System and any supplemental standards adopted by the Wildlife Resources Commission. The markings shall be buoys or floating signs or signs placed on pilings sufficient to give adequate notice of the no wake speed zone.

The act is enforceable by wildlife protectors and other State and local law enforcement officers pursuant to the enforcement provisions of the Boating Safety Act, G.S. 75A-17. Violation of the act is a Class 3 misdemeanor.

The act is effective when it becomes law and may be enforced after the appropriate signs and markers are placed in Pembroke Creek.

#### MINUTES HOUSE COMMITTEE ON WILDLIFE RESOURCES

#### April 16, 2003

The House Committee on Wildlife Resources met on Wednesday, April 16, 2003 in Room 1425 of the Legislative Building at 12:00 noon. The following members were present: Chairman Bobby Barbee, Vice-Chair Stanley Fox, Representatives John Blust, Billy Creech, Marvin Lucas, Wayne Sexton, Edith Warren, and Arthur Williams. Barbara Riley and Mary Shuping, Staff from Research Division, were in attendance. Martha Gadison and Brian Doherty assisted the committee from the Sergeant-at-Arms office. Wells Vance of Iredell County and Street Jones of Wake County were the Pages serving the committee. A Visitor Registration List is attached and made part of these minutes.

The Chairman called the meeting to order and requested that Representative Fox and Representative Creech, who had not been present at the first meeting, tell the committee in a few words about themselves and what they do for a living.

Representative Barbee called on Representative Pryor Gibson to present House Bill 898, A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT TO GRANT AN ALLOWANCE FOR CONTROLLED HUNTING PRESERVES LICENSED BY THE WILDLIFE RESOURCES COMMISSION FOR THE TAKING OF DOMESTICALLY RAISED GAME BIRDS. There was much discussion. Questions were asked of Dick Hamilton, Assistant Director of the Department of Wildlife Resources. Joe McClees and Bill Brooks, lobbyists, were recognized and spoke against the bill. Representative Stephen LaRoque, co-sponsor of the bill, was called on to make comments. Representative Sexton suggested that the bill be studied further. Representative Barbee appointed a subcommittee composed of Representative Sexton, Representative Lucas and Representative Creech and asked for a report subject to the crossover. Representative Barbee appointed Representative Sexton chairman.

House Bill 1100, AN ACT TO AMEND THE AUTHORITY OF THE WILDLIFE RESOURCES COMMISSION TO ENABLE PROTECTION OF CERTAIN REPTILES AND AMPHIBIANS REQUIRING CONSERVATION MEASURES, was explained by Representative Marvin Lucas, bill sponsor. Dick Hamilton of the Wildlife Department spoke for the passage of the bill on behalf of the Department. Handouts related to this bill were distributed to the committee members, copies attached. Representative Creech made a motion for a favorable report and the motion passed.

Representative Trudi Walend was recognized to explain House Bill 13, AN ACT TO PROHIBIT HUNTING FROM THE RIGHT-OF-WAY OF PUBLIC ROADS IN TRANSYLVANIA COUNTY AND TO REQUIRE WRITTEN PERMISSION BEFORE HUNTING ON THE LAND OF ANOTHER IN TRANSYLVANIA COUNTY. This bill was withdrawn from the House Calendar on April 10 and returned to this committee.

Representative Sexton submitted an amendment to this bill, which is attached, and made motion for a favorable report on the amendment. The amendment failed. Representative Warren made motion for a favorable report on the original bill. Representative Barbee called for a vote and the motion passed.

The chair called on Representative Charles Johnson to present House Bill 550, AN ACT TO PROHIBIT HUNTING FROM THE RIGHT-OF-WAY OF CERTAIN ROADS IN CRAVEN COUNTY. Upon motion by Representative Warren, the Committee voted to give this bill a favorable report.

House Bill 1158, AN ACT TO AMEND THE LAW SPECIFYING THE TYPE OF PISTOLS THAT MAY BE USED FOR HUNTING, was explained by Representative William Daughtridge, Jr., bill sponsor. Representative Sexton made motion for a favorable report. The committee voted for a favorable report on House Bill 1158.

For purposes of this section, "right-of-way" refers to the road surface from shoulder to shoulder. This section does not apply to public vehicular areas located in the Pisgah, Nantahala, or Toxaway game lands outside of designated safety zones.

**SECTION 2.** It is unlawful to hunt on the land of another without having on one's person the written permission, dated within the last 12 months, of the landowner or lessee, or the landowner's or lessee's designee.

**SECTION 3.** Violation of this act is a Class 3 misdemeanor.

**SECTION 4.** This act is enforceable by law enforcement officers of the Wildlife Resources Commission, by sheriffs and deputy sheriffs, and by peace officers with general subject matter jurisdiction.

**SECTION 5.** This act applies only to Transylvania County.

SECTION 6. This act becomes effective October 1, 2003, and applies to offenses committed on or after that date.

The public vehicular areas located in the Pisgah, Nantahala, and Toxaway game lands outside of designated safety zones are excluded from the prohibition.

 "(6) To adopt and implement rules to limit, regulate, or prohibit the taking, possession, collection, purchase or sale of those species of wild animals in the classes Amphibia and Reptilia that do not meet the criteria for listing pursuant to G.S. 113-334, but that are determined by the Commission to require conservation measures. However, the Commission shall not have the authority under this subdivision to prohibit the taking of any such species solely to protect persons or property, or to prohibit possession of four or less individual reptiles or 24 or less individual amphibians of those species in the aggregate by any person."

**SECTION 2**. The commercial taking of all individuals within the species of turtles in the families Emydidae and Trionychidae, which are the large basking and sliding turtles, is prohibited until such time as the Wildlife Resources Commission adopts rules to regulate the taking of turtles within these two families of reptiles. For the purposes of this section, "commercial taking" is defined as the capture and possession in the aggregate of five or more individual turtles from the two families of reptiles listed herein.

### **SUMMARY:**

House Bill 1100 amends the powers and duties of the Wildlife Resources Commission to regulate activities related to endangered or threatened wildlife or species of special concern to include the authority to protect certain species of reptiles and amphibians not qualifying as endangered, threatened, or of special concern.

### **CURRENT LAW:**

Under Article 25 of Chapter 113 of the General Statutes, the Wildlife Resources Commission is authorized to adopt lists of protected wildlife species, revise those lists, coordinate and implement conservation programs for protected species, and to prevent the taking, sale and collection of protected species. G.S. 113-333. The species which may be placed on a protected list include those on the federal lists of endangered or threatened species under the Federal Endangered Species Act, and those that the North Carolina NonGame Wildlife Advisory Committee propose to add to the list. In determining whether to add a species to the list, the Advisory Committee examines the data and information available to determine if any federal, state, or private entity is working to protect the species, whether there is current or threatened destruction of habitat, if there is overutilization of the species for commercial, recreational or scientific purposes, whether there is a critical depopulation of the species and the existence of other manmade factors affecting the viability of the species. G.S. 113-334.

### **BILL ANALYSIS:**

House Bill 1100 amends the powers and duties of the Wildlife Resources Commission under Article 25 authorizing the Commission to adopt rules limiting, regulating or prohibiting the taking, possession collection, purchase and sale of species of Amphibia and Reptilia that do not meet the criteria for listing as a protected species, but that the Commission has determined do require conservation measures. The Commission may not adopt rules to prohibit the taking of species in cases of protection of person or property. The rules adopted shall allow the possession of 4 or fewer reptiles and 24 or fewer amphibians.

Section 2 of House Bill 1100 prohibits the commercial taking of all species of turtles in the families Emydidae and Trionychidae until the Wildlife Resources Commission adopts rules to regulate their taking. The turtles covered include the large basking turtles and sliding turtles. Commercial taking is defined as the capture and possession of 5 or more turtles from the 2 families.

he act becomes effective October 1, 2003.

### Justification for HB 1100 - Protect certain amphibians and reptiles

Currently the Wildlife Resources Commission does not have regulatory authority over any species of amphibian or reptile unless it is listed as an endangered or threatened species. Many threats to the welfare of certain amphibians and reptiles exist today, such as over harvest for commercial purposes. We need to be able to address these threats and protect these populations before they become endangered or threatened. This bill is "proactive" in scope in that it allows the WRC to implement management plans so that listing the animal as endangered or threatened is not necessary. HB 1100 does not impose any restriction on the use of private property nor does it impose any additional burden on any other state agency.

Section 1 of HB 1100 authorizes the Wildlife Resources Commission to enact rules to protect amphibians and reptiles when it finds that these animals need conservation measures to prevent their becoming endangered or threatened. The bill restricts to some degree the protection that may be imposed so that any person may protect his/her property or self from harm from one of these animals. Furthermore, any rule adopted pursuant to this authority must allow a person to collect or possess 24 amphibians and 4 reptiles for personal reasons.

Section 2 gives immediate protection to the group of turtles known as the basking and sliding turtles and continues that protection until such time as the Wildlife Resources Commission can enact rules to protect them from over exploitation. This section still provides the private collection and possession of 4 reptiles and 24 amphibians by any person. Commercial taking of these turtles has increased dramatically in the past couple of years and the populations of these turtles in being decimated in North Carolina.





# What is happening to turtles in North Carolina?

Commercial collectors have removed a dramatically increasing number of North Carolina's turtles over the past two years!



- A reported 460 turtles were removed from North Carolina in 2000. That number increased to more than 1,600 turtles in 2001 and 23,000 turtles in 2002.
- All commercial collectors (12) reporting in 2002 reapplied for annual licenses for the current year.
- Native turtle populations have taken many years to reach current levels but are being seriously reduced in a very short time.
- Recovery of populations will not be quick, and continued unsustainable harvest rates will only exacerbate the problem.
- The most common commercial outlet of turtles is the Asian food industry where more than two tons of turtles are sold daily in China.

# Why are turtles so vulnerable to overexploitation?


- Low reproductive rates. Of all vertebrate groups, turtles have the lowest.
- High egg and juvenile mortality. Most eggs and juveniles are lost.
- Delayed sexual maturity. Turtles require seven to 15 or more years to reach sexual maturity.
- Dependence on long-lived adults to sustain populations. Turtles live from 25 to over 100 years
- Relative ease in trapping large percentages of local populations.
- Lack of regulations to control removal.


- Older and larger turtles are the most sought after by the commercial food trade. But they are the most important individuals for population maintenance.
- Other factors impacting turtle populations, such as habitat loss, habitat fragmentation, road mortality, predators, diseases and drought, are eliminating "excess" that might be available for commercial removal.
- Sustainable removal from turtle populations is much lower than the numbers removed by most commercial operations.

# Why should we care what happens to North Carolina's turtles?

- One third of North Carolina's 21 turtle species are currently in jeopardy.
- The box turtle, the state reptile of North Carolina, is vulnerable to commercial exploitation.
- We have a responsibility to current and future generations to manage the state's natural resources responsibly.
- Turtles are an integral part of ecosystems.
- For now, the southeastern United States boasts one of the world's richest diversity of turtle species.
- Protecting turtles benefits a broad array of public interests, ranging from educational and scientific to recreational and economic.

# Where are commercial collectors removing turtles?





- Eighty percent of the turtles removed from North Carolina during 2002 (23,311) were taken by out-of-state collectors who paid only \$5 each for a license.
- For turtle species, unsustainable use is likely the most significant global threat (Rhodin 2000). Delayed maturity
  and low levels of recruitment put a premium on adult survivorship and may preclude sustainable harvest of adults
  (Congdon et al. 1993, 1994; Reed et al. 2002).

"(g) If a season is open permitting such method of taking for the species in question, a hunter may take rabbits, squirrels, opossum, raccoons, fur-bearing animals, and nongame animals and birds open to hunting with a pistol of .22 caliber with a barrel not less than six inches in length and loaded with long rifle ammunition. five and one-half inches in length. In addition, a hunter or trapper lawfully taking a wild animal or wild bird by another lawful method may use a knife, pistol, or other swift method of killing the animal or bird taken. The Wildlife Resources Commission may, however, restrict or prohibit the carrying of firearms during special seasons or in special areas reserved for the taking of wildlife with primitive weapons or other restricted methods."

SECTION 2. This act becomes effective October 1, 2003.

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# **HB 1158: Hunting with Pistols**

### SUMMARY:

House Bill 1158 amends G.S. 113-291.1(g) which provides for the taking of rabbits, squirrels, possums, raccoons and other fur-bearing animals with .22 caliber pistols having a barrel length of not less than 6 inches. The amendment would allow the use of pistols with a minimum barrel length of 5 ½ inches. According to the Wildlife Resources Commission, the standard barrel length on a pistol is 5 1/2 inches. Pistols with barrels of 6 inches or more must be special ordered.

The act becomes effective October 1, 2003.

### MINUTES HOUSE COMMITTEE ON WILDLIFE RESOURCES

May 7, 2003

The House Committee on Wildlife Resources met on Wednesday, May 7, 2003, in Room 1425 of the Legislative Building at 12:00 noon. The following members were present: Chairman Bobby H. Barbee, Sr., Representatives John Blust, Marvin Lucas, Wayne Sexton and Ex-officio members, Pete Cunningham, and Rick Eddins. Barbara Riley and Mary Shuping, staff from the Research Division, were in attendance. Mia Woo and Jessica Brentley, both of Randolph County, served as Pages for the meeting. Bill Sullivan and James Worth assisted the committee from the Sergeant-at-Arms office. A Visitor Registration List is attached and made part of these minutes.

The chairman called the meeting to order and introduced the Pages and Sergeant-at-Arms.

Senator David Weinstein was called on to present Senate Bill 245, AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE THE HUNTING OF COYOTES IN CONTROLLED HUNTING PRESERVES AND TO MAKE IT UNLAWFUL TO IMPORT LIVE COYOTES INTO THIS STATE. A summary of this bill prepared by Barbara Riley and a North Carolina Coyote Distribution Map prepared by Wildlife Resources Commission were passed out to members, copies attached. Representative Marvin Lucas moved for a favorable report and the motion passed.

George Givens of the Research Division, representing Senator Charles Albertson, bill sponsor, was recognized to present Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 825, AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE THE WILDLIFE RESOURCES COMMISSION TO PROTECT CERTAIN REPTILES AND AMPHIBIANS THAT REQUIRE CONSERVATION MEASURES. He informed the committee that this Senate Committee Substitute is very similar to House Bill 1100 sponsored by Representatives Earline Parmon and Larry Womble that passed the House on April 23, 2003. Mr. Givens advised that this version is endorsed by the Wildlife Resources Commission.

Section 1 adds power to the Commission to limit taking of certain classes of amphibians and reptiles, including turtles. At present these turtles are not on the endangered species list. Purpose of these rules is to conserve the turtles so they would not become endangered species. This is not authorized protection of habitat. It is limitation of taking turtles.

Section 2 provides for the temporary prohibition of taking these turtles and a penalty, same as violation of any wildlife rules.

Section 3 makes this Act effective July 1, 2003.

Representative Sexton submitted an amendment to insert the word "terrapin" in several places in the bill (copy of amendment attached). The chairman asked for a vote on the amendment and the amendment passed. Representative Sexton made motion for a favorable report on House Substitute Bill 825. The motion passed.

Representative Barbee recognized Representative Sexton, chairman of the subcommittee appointed on April 16, 2003 to study House Bill 898, CONTROLLED HUNTING PRESERVES. Representative Sexton advised that the subcommittee decided that this bill not be taken up this year.

There being no further business, the Chair adjourned the meeting at 12:50 P.M.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

### **SECTION 1.** G.S. 113-273(g) reads as rewritten:

"(g) Controlled Hunting Preserve Operator License. – The Wildlife Resources Commission is authorized by rule to set standards for and to license the operation of controlled hunting preserves operated by private persons. Controlled hunting preserves are of two types: one is an area marked with appropriate signs along the outside boundaries on which only domestically raised game birds other than wild turkeys are taken; the other is an area enclosed with a dog-proof fence on which foxes and coyotes may be hunted with dogs only. A controlled fox and coyote hunting preserve operated for private use may be of any size; a controlled hunting preserve operated for commercial purposes shall be an area of not less than 500 acres or of such size as set by regulation of the Wildlife Resources Commission, which shall take into account differences in terrain and topography, as well as the welfare of the foxes. wildlife.

Operators of controlled fox hunting preserves may purchase live foxes and coyotes from licensed trappers who live-trap foxes and coyotes during any open season for trapping them and may, at any time, take live foxes from their preserves for sale to other licensed operators. The controlled hunting preserve operator license may be purchased for a fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00), and is an annual license issued beginning August 1 each year running until the following July 1."

**SECTION 2.** G.S. 113-294 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

"(o) Any person who willfully transports or attempts to transport live coyotes (Cania latrans) into this State for any purpose is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor, and upon conviction the Wildlife Resources Commission shall suspend any controlled hunting preserve operator license issued to that person for two years."

1 2 3 **SECTION 3.** Section 2 of this act becomes effective October 1, 2003, and applies to acts committed on or after that date. The remainder of this act becomes effective October 1, 2003.

### **SUMMARY:**

Senate Bill 245 would amend the existing wildlife laws allowing the hunting of foxes with dogs on controlled preserves to include the hunting of coyotes in the same manner. The act also bans the importation of coyotes into the State.

### **CURRENT LAW:**

G.S. 113-273 authorizes the Wildlife Resources Commission to set standards for the operation of controlled hunting preserves. Such preserves are of two types: one is an area properly marked in which only domestically raised game birds may be taken. The other type is an area enclosed by a dog proof fence in which foxes may be hunted only with dogs. Private preserves may be any size. Commercial preserves must be at least 500 acres or of a size set by rule by the WRC. Operators of such preserves may purchase live fox from licensed trappers during any open season for trapping them.

G.S. 113-294 sets out a number of specific violations of the wildlife laws and the penalties for their violation.

### BILL ANALYSIS:

Section 1 of SB 245 would allow the hunting of coyote with dogs on controlled hunting preserves.

Section 2 of the bill makes it a Class 1 misdemeanor to import a live coyote into the State. In addition, those persons convicted of importing a coyote shall also have their controlled hunting preserve operator's license suspended for 2 years.



AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE THE WILDLIFE RESOURCES COMMISSION TO PROTECT CERTAIN REPTILES AND AMPHIBIANS THAT REQUIRE CONSERVATION MEASURES.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. G.S. 113-333(a) is amended by adding a new subdivision to

"(6) To adopt and implement rules to limit, regulate, or prohibit the taking, possession, collection, transportation, purchase or sale of those species of wild animals in the classes Amphibia and Reptilia that do not meet the criteria for listing pursuant to G.S. 113-334 if the Commission determines that the species requires conservation measures in order to prevent the addition of the species to the protected animal lists pursuant to G.S. 113-334. This subdivision does not authorize the Commission to prohibit the taking of any species of the classes Amphibia and Reptilia solely to protect persons, property, or habitat; to prohibit possession by any person of four or fewer individual reptiles; or to prohibit possession by any person of 24 or fewer individual amphibians."

**SECTION 2.** The commercial taking of any turtle within any of the species of turtles in the families Emydidae and Trionychidae that are the large basking and sliding turtles is prohibited until such time as the Wildlife Resources Commission adopts rules to regulate the taking of turtles within these two families of reptiles. For the purposes of this section, "commercial taking" is defined as the taking, possession, collection, transportation, purchase or sale of five or more individual turtles from either of the two families of reptiles described in this section. Any person who violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor and is punishable as provided in G.S. 113-135. This

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section shall not apply to a licensed veterinarian; to a bona fide zoo operated by the
federal government, the State, or a unit of local government; or to bona fide scientific,
biological, medical, or veterinary education or research.

SECTION 3. Sections 1 and 3 of this act are effective when this act becomes law. Section 2 of this act becomes effective 1 July 2003 and applies to offenses committed on or after that date.



## **SB 825: Protect Certain Reptiles and Amphibians**

#### **SUMMARY:**

Senate Bill 825 amends the powers and duties of the Wildlife Resources Commission to regulate activities related to endangered or threatened wildlife or species of special concern to include the authority to protect certain species of reptiles and amphibians not qualifying as endangered, threatened, or of special concern.

#### **CURRENT LAW:**

Under Article 25 of Chapter 113 of the General Statutes, the Wildlife Resources Commission is authorized to adopt lists of protected wildlife species, revise those lists, coordinate and implement conservation programs for protected species, and to prevent the taking, sale and collection of protected species. G.S. 113-333. The species which may be placed on a protected list include those on the federal lists of endangered or threatened species under the Federal Endangered Species Act, and those that the North Carolina NonGame Wildlife Advisory Committee propose to add to the list. In determining whether to add a species to the list, the Advisory Committee examines the data and information available to determine if any federal, state, or private entity is working to protect the species, whether there is current or threatened destruction of habitat, if there is overutilization of the species for commercial, recreational or scientific purposes, whether there is a critical depopulation of the species and the existence of other manmade factors affecting the viability of the species. G.S. 113-334.

#### **BILL ANALYSIS:**

Senate Bill 825 amends the powers and duties of the Wildlife Resources Commission under Article 25 authorizing the Commission to adopt rules limiting, regulating or prohibiting the taking, possession, transportation, collection, purchase and sale of species of Amphibia and Reptilia that do not meet the criteria for listing as a protected species, but that the Commission has determined do require conservation measures to prevent the species from becoming listed. The Commission may not adopt rules to prohibit the taking of species in cases of protection of persons, property, or habitat. The rules adopted shall allow the possession of 4 or fewer reptiles and 24 or fewer amphibians.

Section 2 of Senate Bill 825 prohibits the commercial taking of all species of turtles in the families Emydidae and Trionychidae until the Wildlife Resources Commission adopts rules to regulate their taking. The turtles covered include the large basking turtles and sliding turtles. Commercial taking is defined as the taking, possession, collection, transportation, purchase or sale of 5 or more turtles from the 2 families.

The act becomes effective October 1, 2003.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

**SECTION 1.** G.S. 103-2 reads as rewritten:

### "§ 103-2. Hunting on Sunday.

If any person shall, except in defense of his own property, hunt on Sunday, having with him a shotgun, rifle, or pistol, he shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor. Provided, that the provisions hereof shall not be applicable to military reservations, the jurisdiction of which is exclusively in the federal government, or to field trials authorized by the Wildlife Resources Commission. Commission, or to controlled hunting preserves licensed by the Wildlife Resources Commission pursuant to G.S. 113-273(g) for the taking of domestically raised game birds other than wild turkeys. Provided further that no person shall hunt on Sunday on a controlled hunting preserve from 11:00 A.M. to 1:30 P.M. or within one-half mile of a place of worship. Wildlife protectors are granted authority to enforce the provisions of this section."

SECTION 2. This act becomes effective October 1, 2003.

House Bill 898 amends G.S. 103-2, prohibiting hunting on Sunday, to exempt controlled hunting preserves licensed by the Wildlife Resources Commission for the taking of game birds. Senate Bill 164 allows the use of weapons for the purpose of hunting at the Howell Woods Nature Center in Johnston County when used with the written permission of the Johnston County Community College.

#### **BILL ANALYSIS:**

G.S. 14-269.2 makes it a Class I felony for a person to possess a gun on educational property. Educational property includes any property owned, used, or operated by a board of education, school board of trustees or directors for the administration of a school.

Howell Woods Nature Center is owned by the Johnston County Community College. Feral pigs have become a problem on the property, but may not be hunted because of the prohibition against weapons in G.S. 14-269.2. The bill would add an exemption to the prohibition against weapons on school property for hunting at Howell Woods when the person has the written permission of the Community College.

The act is effective when it becomes law.

Donor Hunt It is believed that feral pigs have been in the Neuse Lowgrounds for at least 100 years. These feral pigs do not look like the pink domestic pig, but have reverted back to their "wild" appearance of long black or brown hair, tusks, and a very aggressive behavior. We like to call the feral pigs on the property "free range organic pork."

The feral pig hunts are held:

- 1. To help control/remove a feral and exotic species from the property that causes much environmental harm to native wildlife and plant species.
- 2. To raise money for numerous programs and activities that occur at the Learning Center and on the property. All money raised in the hunts goes to our annual budget.

There are four ways to participate in feral pig hunts on Howell Woods: lottery hunt, sponsor hunt, volunteer hunt, or donor hunt.

#### **General Rules and Regulations**

Education and conservation are important parts of all hunts. A two-hour management and safety seminar is required once per season for all hunters. The seminar covers the natural history of feral pigs, how to fill out our wildlife sighting and hunter exit survey form, and ends with safe and effective hunting techniques for feral pigs while on the property.

- 1. Valid hunting license required (any state) or hunter safety certificate; must be 16 years or older.
- 2. Bow and arrow, shotgun, pistol (.357 caliber or higher with a barrel length of at least 5.5 inches) and rifle, .243 caliber or higher, will be allowed.
- 3. Hunter must provide his or her own stand with a safety harness.
- 4. Hunter must wear a safety orange hat and/or vest at all times while on the property.
- 5. Must hunt at least 10-feet off the ground. (special exceptions for handicapped hunters)
- 6. Baiting is allowed and encouraged.
- 7. There is no harvest limit in regards to size or number of individuals.
- 8. Hunting begins at noon on Friday.

- 9. Attendance to the 2-hour species management/safety seminar class is required for all hunters. The seminar will be held at 9 am the Friday morning of each scheduled hunt. Hunters who are drawn for multiple hunts need only to attend one seminar.
- 10. ATV's are allowed but must stay on marked roads and trails.
- 11. All hunters are subject to inspection by State and/or Federal Wildlife Enforcement Officers.

The staff reserves the right to refuse hunting to any person who fails to abide by State/Federal regulations as well as Howell Woods specific rules and regulations and who fail to follow proper safety procedures.

**Disclaimer** - All hunts will be held regardless of the weather, with the exception of severe flooding on the property or other environmental conditions that make travel to or on the property dangerous. Any hunts postponed will be rescheduled at the convenience of the Howell Woods staff.

#### SUMMARY:

House Bill 1349 would provide for an open season for taking fox with weapons in Columbus County from December 1 through January 1 of each year. The bill would also provide for an open season for trapping fox from January 2 through January 31 of each year. There is a season bag limit of 30 on all fox taken whether by trapping or weapons.

#### **CURRENT LAW:**

G.S. 113-291.4A establishes an open season for taking fox with weapons in areas east of Interstate Highway 77 and in Mitchell and Caldwell Counties. The season runs from the beginning of the rabbit and quail season, currently November 22, through January 1 of each year. There is no season for trapping fox in Columbus County.

#### **BILL ANALYSIS:**

House Bill 1349 would add Columbus County to legislation enacted for Brunswick County, S.L. 2003-208, Secs. 5, 6, 7 & 9. Columbus County would have an open season for taking fox with weapons from December 1 to January 1 each year and for trapping fox from January 1 through January 31 of each year.

The act becomes effective October 1, 2004.

Section 2 of S.L. 1986-868 makes it unlawful in Chowan County for a person to hunt with or possess a center-fire rifle on the land of another without having written permission on their person, provided that the mere transportation in or on a motor vehicle on the land of another is not prohibited. Section 1 of the bill removes the exemption for transportation of a center-fire rifle on or in a vehicle. Section 2 of the bill makes it unlawful in Chowan County to hunt with a center-fire rifle unless the barrel of the rifle is at least 8' above ground level. Violation is punishable as a Class 3 misdemeanor.

Section 3 of the bill adds Chowan and Anson Counties to the list of counties that prohibit the intentional removal or destruction of an electronic dog collar.

Section 1 of the act is effective when it becomes law. Sections 2 and 3 of the act become effective October 1, 2004.

#### **SUMMARY:**

House Bill 1712 makes it unlawful to hunt on the land of another in Wilson County unless the hunter has on his person written permission of the landowner to hunt. The writing must be signed and dated for the current hunting season. The original bill made it unlawful only to hunt deer on the land of another without written permission.

The first conviction for violation of the act is a Class 3 misdemeanor. A second or subsequent conviction is a Class 2 misdemeanor.

The act is enforceable by Wildlife Resource Commission Officers, sheriffs and deputy sheriffs and other peace officers with general subject matter jurisdiction.

The act becomes effective October 1, 2004 and applies to offenses committee on or after that date.
