MINUTES HOUSE EDUCATION SUBCOMMITTEE ON UNIVERSITIES

Thursday, March 31, 2005 Representative Dickson, Chair, Presiding

The House Education Subcommittee on Universities met on Thursday, March 31, 2005, in Room 425 of the Legislative Office Building at 11:00 A.M. The following members were present: Chairs Margaret Dickson and Karen Ray; Vice Chair Jim Harrell; Representatives Adams, Daughtridge, Hollo, Insko, McAllister, Michaux, Rapp, Stiller, and Ex-Officio Representative Joe Hackney.

Chair Dickson called the meeting to order and recognized the Pages, Sergeant-at-Arms, Staff, and visitors.

Two bills were on the Agenda for consideration:

- HB 695 Reduced Tuition/UNC Employees. Rep. Insko
- HB 738 UNC Bd. Of Govs. Delegate Duties to Pres. Rep. Hackney

HB 695: Rep. Insko was recognized by the Chair and asked to speak on HB 695. She said that the bill as framed allows the UNC Board of Governors to permit full-time faculty and staff to enroll in up to three courses per academic year tuition free (previously, this was one course per semester); it allows 25% tuition reduction for spouse and dependent children of full-time faculty and staff; it provides that a full-time UNC employee, or the spouse or dependent child of that employee who is a legal resident of North Carolina, qualifies as a resident for tuition purposes without having maintained that legal residence for at least 12 months; and it requires the UNC Board of Governors and the State Board of Community Colleges to study the feasibility of a tuition waiver exchange program.

Rep. Rapp asked if a fiscal note had been prepared and what the costs of this benefit will be.

Mr. Mark Fleming of UNC was recognized by the Chair to speak. He said the bill would be re-referred to the House Appropriations Committee if a favorable report is forthcoming at which time a fiscal note will be prepared. Also speaking to the bill wasMr. Larry Nielson of N.C. State University. Several other issues were raised.

Rep. Daughtridge said the language of the bill appears to be inconsistent among the sections of the bill. Several other members of the Committee expressed concern with the language and the cost of the bill.

Rep. Daughtridge offered an amendment that would clear up the language inconsistencies. The amendment was adopted. He moved that the amendment be rolled

into a committee substitute with a favorable report as to the committee substitute bill, and an unfavorable report as to the original bill with the recommendation that the committee substitute bill be re-referred to the Committee on Appropriations. The motion carried.

HB 738: Rep. Hackney was recognized by the Chair to explain the bill. He stated that the bill's intent is to correct technical oversights that currently exist. He asked Mr. Charles Mercer of the UNC Board of Governors to further explain the bill. Mr. Mercer said the bill would allow the UNC Board of Governors to delegate any of its statutory duties to the President of The University of North Carolina when the delegation appears necessary for the expeditious operation of The University of North Carolina, and that the Board may rescind any delegation or part of any delegation of authority.

A comprehensive discussion among the Members present followed and many issues related to the bill were raised among which was the scope of authority being delegated to the President.

Rep. Daughtridge moved for approval of the bill. The motion did not carry.

Rep. Hackney asked that the bill be held from consideration in order that it be recrafted and the language clarified.

There was no further business; the meeting was adjourned.

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO EXPAND THE EXISTING TUITION WAIVER PROGRAM AND TO PROVIDE AN EXCEPTION TO THE TWELVE-MONTH RESIDENCY REQUIREMENT FOR CERTAIN UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA EMPLOYEES AND THEIR CHILDREN.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. G.S. 116-143 reads as rewritten:

"§ 116-143. State-supported institutions of higher education required to charge tuition and fees.

- (a) The Board of Governors of the University of North Carolina shall fix the tuition and fees, not inconsistent with actions of the General Assembly, at the institutions enumerated in G.S. 116-4 in such amount or amounts as it may deem best, taking into consideration the nature of each institution and program of study and the cost of equipment and maintenance; and each institution shall charge and collect from each student, at the beginning of each semester or quarter, tuition, fees, and an amount sufficient to pay other expenses for the term.
- (b) In the event that said students are unable to pay the cost of tuition and required academic fees as the same may become due, in cash, the said several boards of trustees are hereby authorized and empowered, in their discretion, to accept the obligation of the student or students together with such collateral or security as they may deem necessary and proper, it being the purpose of this Article that all students in State institutions of higher learning shall be required to pay tuition, and that free tuition is hereby abolished.
- (c) Inasmuch as the giving of tuition and fee waivers, or especially reduced rates, represent in effect a variety of scholarship awards, the said practice is hereby prohibited except when expressly authorized by statute or by the Board of Governors of the University of North Carolina; and, furthermore, it is hereby directed and required that all budgeted funds expended for scholarships of any type must be clearly identified in budget reports.

- (d) Notwithstanding the above provision relating to the abolition of free tuition, the Board of Governors of the University of North Carolina may, in its discretion, discretion, do the following:
 - (1) provide Provide regulations under which a full-time faculty member of the rank of full-time instructor or above, and any full-time staff member of the University of North Carolina may during the period of normal employment enroll for not more than one course three courses per semester—academic year in the University of North Carolina free of charge for tuition, provided such enrollment does not interfere with normal employment obligations and further provided that such enrollments are not counted for the purpose of receiving general fund appropriations.
 - (2) Provide regulations under which the spouse and one or more dependent children of a full-time faculty member or staff member of The University of North Carolina may have the spouse's or dependent children's tuition reduced by twenty-five percent (25%) so long as the employee remains employed full-time at The University of North Carolina."

SECTION 2. G.S. 116-143.1 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

- "(m) Notwithstanding subsection (b) of this section, a person who is a full-time employee of The University of North Carolina, or is the spouse or dependent child of a full-time employee of The University of North Carolina, and who is a legal resident of North Carolina, qualifies as a resident for tuition purposes without having maintained that legal residence for at least 12 months immediately prior to his or her classification as a resident for tuition purposes."
- SECTION 3. The Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina and the State Board of Community Colleges shall study the feasibility of a tuition waiver exchange program under which full-time employees of The University of North Carolina would be allowed to take a specified number of courses at a community college without paying tuition, and full-time employees of a community college would be allowed to take a specified number of courses at The University of North Carolina without paying tuition. The Boards shall report the results of this study to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by April 1, 2006.
 - **SECTION 4.** This act is effective when it becomes law.

SUMMARY: House Bill 695 would allow full-time employees of The University of North Carolina to take three courses per academic year free of charge. The bill would also allow a 25% tuition reduction for spouses and dependent children of full-time University employees and waive the 12 month residency requirement for in-state tuition for spouses or dependent children of full-time University employees. The bill directs the UNC Board of Governors and the State Board of Community Colleges to study the feasibility of a tuition waiver exchange program.

CURRENT LAW: Currently, full-time employees (full-time faculty members of the rank of full-time instructor or above and full-time staff members) may enroll in one course per semester free of charge. The enrollment may not interfere with normal employment obligations and these enrollments are not counted for the purpose of receiving General Fund appropriations. Spouses and dependent children of full-time employees of The University do not receive any tuition discounts at this time. In order to qualify as a resident for tuition purposes, a person must have established legal residency in the State and have maintained it for 12 months.

Section 1 of the bill provides that the UNC Board of Governors may adopt regulations to allow full-time faculty members (of the rank of full-time instructor or above) and full-time staff members of The University of North Carolina to enroll in three courses per academic year free of charge. It also allows the UNC Board of Governors to adopt regulations to allow a 25% tuition reduction for spouses and dependent children of full-time faculty and staff members of The University of North Carolina so long as the employee remains employed full-time.

Section 2 of the bill would remove the 12 month residency requirement for in-state tuition for full-time employees of The University of North Carolina and their spouses and dependent children.

Section 3 of the bill directs the UNC Board of Governors and the State Board of Community Colleges to study the feasibility of a tuition waiver exchange program. This program would allow full-time employees of The University of North Carolina to take a specified number of courses at a North Carolina community college without paying tuition and allow full-time employees of community colleges to take a specified number of courses at a constituent university without paying tuition. Both Boards are report the results of this study to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by April 1, 2006.

EFFECTIVE DATE: The bill would be effective when it becomes law.

The House Education Subcommittee on Universities met on Thursday, April 7, 2005, in Room 425 of the Legislative Office Building at 11:00 A.M. The following members were present: Chairs Margaret Dickson and Karen Ray; Representatives Adams, Aldridge, Hollo, McAllister, Michaux, Rapp, Bonner, and Ex-officio Joe hackney

Rep. Ray called the meeting to order and recognized the Pages, Sergeant-at-Arms, Staff, and visitors.

Two Bills were on the Agenda for consideration:

- HB 678 UNC-CH Service Contracts/AB.- Rep. Tolson
- HB 780 Need-Based nursing Scholarships/AB.- Rep. Yongue

<u>HB 678:</u> Rep. McAllister as recognized by the chair to make a motion to move to accept the Proposed Committee Substitute. The PCS was adopted without objection.

Rep. Tolson was recognized to speak on HB 678. He said that the bill allowed the university system to obtain service contracts with terms of less than 10 years without approval from the State Purchasing Officer. HB 678 would allow The University of North Carolina to obtain bids on service contracts without obtaining approval from the State Purchasing Officer. This helps to negotiate better pricing and saves one to two weeks in procurement.

Rep. Tolson asked if there were any questions. There were no questions from the committee.

Rep. Daughtridge moved to adopt the proposed committee substitute unfavorable to the original. The motion carried.

HB 780: Rep. Yongue was recognized to speak on HB 780. The Proposed Committee Substitute (PCS) for HB 780 makes the need-based Nurse Education Scholarship Loan Program consistent with the other need-based scholarships administered by the State Education Assistance Authority. HB 780 saves money, promotes efficiency, and places all scholarship selection responsibility with the State Education Assistance Authority. It is non controversial and improves the process.

Rep. Dickson asked how other need-based scholarships were processed.

Rep. Daughtridge asked who is on the State Education Assistance Authority and who appoints the board.

Steve Brooks, state director from State Education Assistance Authority was recognized. He stated that a board of directors appointed by the governor governed the board, which is chaired by Dick Robertson from Winston Salem.

Rep. Daughtridge also asked if there would be one set of criteria for both the community colleges and the universities.

Mr. Steve Brooks stated that they were an affiliated agency of the university system and responsive to the Board of Governors as well as the community colleges and independent colleges. The eligibility standards of the programs will not be changed in any way. This is just an administrative change for efficiency and organization.

After much discussion, Rep. Rapp moved to adopt the proposed committee substitute unfavorable to the original. The motion carried.

The PCS for House Bill 678 would allow The University of North Carolina to obtain bids on service contracts without obtaining approval from the State Purchasing Officer. The original bill only provided for The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill to have this exemption.

CURRENT LAW: Service contracts are handled by each agency and have no particular bid requirements. The agency chooses the company based on its requirements and then send the service contract to the State Purchasing and Contract office for review. However, if the service contract is for more than three years (including extensions and renewals), the State Purchasing and Contract office must give the agency *prior approval* before the request for proposals is posted.

The PCS for House Bill 678 would provide that The University of North Carolina **BILL ANALYSIS:** is not required to obtain the prior approval of the State Purchasing and Contract office before it solicits bids for services contracts of up to ten years or less.

SUMMARY: The Proposed Committee Substitute (PCS) for House Bill 780 amends the need-based Nurse Education Scholarship Loan Program so that the State Education Assistance Authority administers the program in the same manner as other need-based scholarships. The PCS gives the State Education Assistance Authority the responsibility for adopting rules for selecting candidates to receive the scholarship loans. The PCS also makes technical and conforming changes. The act becomes effective January 1, 2006 and applies to all scholarship loans awarded after that date.

CURRENT LAW: The General Assembly created a need-based scholarship loan fund for students in licensed practical nursing or registered nursing programs offered by community colleges, UNC constituent institutions and private colleges.

The need-based nursing scholarship loan funds shall be administered by the State Board of Community Colleges, the UNC Board of Governors, and the State Education Assistance Authority. The State Board of Community Colleges and the UNC Board of Governors shall determine how the funds are allocated among their respective constituent institutions. After consulting with the N.C. Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, the Board of the State Education Assistance Authority shall determine how funds are allocated to private nonprofit colleges offering nursing degrees.

Each institution receiving funds is responsible for publicizing the availability of the scholarship loans, distributing and reviewing applications for the scholarship loans and selecting recipients.

BILL ANALYSIS: Under the provisions of the PCS, the State Education Assistance Authority assumes responsibility for administering the need-based nursing scholarship loan funds in accordance with rules adopted by its board.

Distribution of the scholarship loan funds to students enrolled in the community colleges, UNC constituent institutions, and private colleges shall be proportional to the amounts awarded to the same category of students in the previous fiscal year.

The State Education Assistance Authority assumes responsibility for promulgating rules necessary to implement the program, including the selection criteria and method of selecting recipients.

BACKGROUND: The 1989 General Assembly first funded the program as part of an effort to reduce the shortage of practicing nurses in the State. The awards for the Nurse Education Scholarship Loan Program range from \$400 to \$5,000. The maximum amount for students enrolled in associate nursing degree and LPN programs is \$3,000. The maximum amount for students enrolled in a BSN program is \$5,000. The loan is forgiven if the student works one year for each year that the loan was received. Loans that are not repaid through service must be repaid in cash.

The UNC Board of Governors requested this bill as a part of its 2005 non-budget legislative initiatives.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. G.S. 90-171.65 reads as rewritten:

"§ 90-171.65. Need-based nursing scholarships fund.

- (a) There is created a need-based scholarship loan fund for nursing students. Need-based scholarship loans shall be available for study in nursing programs offered by community colleges and The University of North Carolina, and by private colleges which that offer licensed practical nursing or registered nursing programs. Part-time students and nontraditional students who have post-secondary degrees, and registered nurses pursuing a baccalaureate degree in nursing, are eligible to receive need-based nursing scholarship loans.
- (b) Need-based nursing scholarship loan funds shall be administered by the State Board of Community Colleges, the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina, and the State Education Assistance Authority. The State Board of Community Colleges and the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina shall allocate the scholarship loan funds among their respective constituent institutions which have programs of education leading to a degree in nursing. Distribution shall be in a manner determined by the appropriate governing body. The State Education Assistance Authority shall distribute scholarship loan funds to private nonprofit colleges which offer nursing degree programs. Distribution shall be in a manner determined by the Board of the State Education Assistance Authority after consultation with the North Carolina Association of Independent Colleges and Universities. State Education Assistance Authority in accordance with rules and regulations adopted by the Board of the State Education Assistance Authority. Distribution of scholarship loan funds among students enrolled in the constituent institutions of The University of North Carolina, community colleges, and private colleges shall be in amounts proportionate to the

amounts awarded to each such group of students in the preceding fiscal year. Scholarship loans shall be made only to prospective and enrolled nursing students under the terms and conditions established for the need-based nursing scholarship loan program by the State Education Assistance Authority.

- (c) The State Education Assistance Authority shall carry out the following functions in implementing the need-based nursing scholarship loan program:
 - (1) Promulgate the rules and regulations necessary to implement the scholarship program; program, including the selection criteria and method of selection of recipients of need-based nursing scholarship loans:
 - (2) Disburse, collect, and monitor scholarship loan funds;
 - (3) Establish the terms and conditions of promissory notes executed by loan recipients;
 - (4) Approve service repayment agreements;
 - (5) Collect cash repayments required when service repayment is not completed; and
 - (6) Adopt rules to allow for the forgiveness of scholarship loans if it determines that it is impossible for the recipient to practice nursing in North Carolina for a sufficient time to repay the loan because of the death or permanent disability of the recipient within ten years following graduation or termination of enrollment in a nursing education program.
- (d) Each institution to which scholarship loan funds are allocated shall publicize the availability of, shall disseminate, receive and review applications for, and shall select the recipients of scholarship loans. Scholarship loans shall be made only to prospective and enrolled nursing students under the terms and conditions established for the need-based nursing scholarship loan program by the State Education Assistance Authority."

SECTION 2. This act becomes effective January 1, 2006, and applies to all scholarship loans awarded after that date.

Chair Dickson called the meeting to order and recognized the Pages, Sergeant-at-Arms, Staff, and visitors.

Two bills were on the Agenda for consideration:

• HB 387 Social Security # Can't Be Student ID # - Rep. Jeff Barnhart

• HB 771 UNC/Dual Office Holding. – AB – Rep. Margaret Dickson

<u>HB 387</u>: Rep. McAllister made a motion for the adoption of the PSC for discussion purposes. The chair called on Rep. Barnhart to explain the bill. He stated that this bill would prohibit institutions of UNC from using Social Security numbers as student's ID number or as part of that number, but allows use of the Social Security number when required by state or federal law. The bill applies to students who first enroll for the fall semester of 2006 and subsequent semesters.

He said that the bill is proposed to address the ever-increasing problem of identity theft often associated with Social Security numbers. Mr. David Dunn of UNC-Charlotte and Ms. Leslie Winner of UNC were asked to speak on the bill. They supported the bill's intent as explained by Rep. Barnhardt.

Rep. Michaux made a motion that the bill be given a favorable report as to the committee substitute bill; unfavorable report as to the original bill. The motion carried.

<u>HB 771</u>: Chair Dickson asked Vice-Chair Jim Harrell to preside at this point in the meeting so that she could present HB 771 for consideration.

Rep. Dickson gave a comprehensive overview of the bill and said the bill eliminates the prohibition against certain spouses of members of the UNC Board of Governors, members of the Board of Trustees of a constituent institution, or members of the State Board of Community Colleges from being employees or officers of the State.

Rep. McAllister moved that the bill be given a favorable report.

Several members of the Committee asked for language clarification and asked about several provisions in the bill relating to spouses and workplace.

Staff Attorney Drupti Chauhan answered member's questions pertaining to the bill and its provisions.

Rep. Dickson offered an amendment to the bill, which would change the effective date of the bill to January 1, 2006. She said the amendment speaks to the fact that the appointment process is in progress at the present time.

Rep. Michaux moved for reconsideration and for a vote on the amendment. All were in favor except Rep. Daughtridge who voted no.

Rep. Dickson withdrew her amendment and moved for its adoption.

Rep. Daughtridge questioned the effective date of the bill, and Rep. Michaux said that could be remedied by amending the bill and changing the effective date to June 30, 2005.

Rep. Dickson accepted the amendment.

Rep. Michaux moved that the amendment be rolled into a new committee substitute with with a favorable report as to the committee substitute, and an unfavorable report as to the original bill. The Motion carried.

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 771 would allow the spouses of officers or employees of the State to be eligible to be members of the UNC Board of Governors, members of the board of trustees of UNC constituent institutions, and members of the State Board of Community Colleges. However, the following prohibitions would remain in place:

- An officer of The University of North Carolina
- An employee of The University of North Carolina
- An officer of any constituent institution
- An employee of any constituent institution

- An officer of the constituent institution in question
- An employee of the constituent institution in question

State Board of Community Colleges

Spouses of the following could not be members of the State Board of Community Colleges:

- A member of the General Assembly
- An officer of the Community College System
- An employee of the Community College System
- An officer of an institution under the jurisdiction of the State Board of Community Colleges
- An employee of an institution under the jurisdiction of the State Board of Community Colleges

BACKGROUND: There is no statutory definition of a public office or public officer but the North Carolina courts have held that an office is a delegation to an elected or appointed individual of some of the sovereign functions of the government to be exercised for the public benefit. Some of the criteria that are considered include the following: whether the position was created by election or appointment and not by contract of employment; whether the individual is required to take an oath or post a bond before assuming the duties of the position; whether the statute or constitution that creates the position designates it as a public office; executive, legislative, or judicial functions have been delegated to the individual and the exercise of those powers will bind the rights of others; and the individual is largely independent of the control of others and has the power of direction supervision and control.

EFFECTIVE DATE: The bill would become effective when it becomes law.

MINUTES HOUSE EDUCATION SUBCOMMITTEE ON UNIVERSITIES THURSDAY, MAY 5, 2005 Representative Ray, Presiding Chair

The House Education Subcommittee on Universities met on Thursday, May 5, 2005, in Room 425 of the Legislative Office Building at 11:00 A.M. The following members were present: Chairs Margaret Dickson and Karen Ray; Reps. Adams, Daughtridge, Hollo, McAllister, Michaux, Rapp, and Stiller.

Chair Ray called the meeting to order and recognized the Pages, Sergeant at Arms, Staff, and Visitors.

Three bills were on the Agenda for consideration:

- HB 92: UNC/BOG Student Member Vote. Rep. Adams.
- HB 1354: UNC/Private Gift Acceptance & Refusal Policy. Rep. Pate, Jr.
- HB 1552: N.C. A&T University Campus Parking. Rep. Adams.

HB 1552: The PCS was adopted and before the committee for consideration. Rep. Adams was called by the Chair and asked to speak on HB 1552. She gave a comprehensive overview of the provisions of the bill and said that the provisions of the bill extend the regulatory authority for parking on portions of certain named streets in the City of Greensboro to the board of trustees of N.C. A&T.

Rep. Michaux moved for a favorable report as to the committee substitute bill, and an unfavorable report as to the original bill. The motion carried.

<u>HB 92:</u> Rep. Adams was recognized by the Chair to present HB 92: UNC/BOG Student Member Vote which amends GS 116-6.1 to provide that the student member of the UNC Board of Governors have the same right to vote as all other members. The bill deletes the provision that the student member may serve as designee.

Rep. Adams pointed out that this proposed legislation has been before and passed the House on three different occasions, but the process was not continued in the Senate. Mr. Zack Wynn, student representative, spoke in favor of the bill. Rep. Dickson asked Mr. Mark Fleming of the UNC Board of Governors if the BOG has taken a position on this matter. Mr. Fleming said the Board has not spoken to the issue this Session but in previous years had taken a favorable position.

Rep. Rapp offered strong support in favor of the provisions of the bill.

Chair Ray called for a motion.

Representative McAllister moved for a favorable report on HB 92. The motion carried.

HB 1354: Rep. Pate was called on by Chair Ray to explain HB 1354: UNC/Private Gift Acceptance & Refusal Policy. The Bill provides that the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee study the policy of each of the constituent institutions of the UNC system regarding the acceptance or refusal of private grants and gifts to the institution. The commission would be required to make an interim report to the 2006 session and a final report to the 2007 session.

Chair Ray pointed out that Rep. Pate asked that a vote not be taken on this bill at the meeting.

Other members of the Committee and university representatives commented and raised questions on the bill for future clarification and advice.

Rep. Pate asked that no action be taken and that the bill be held until the UNC Board of Governors meets.

No other matters were before the Committee for consideration; Chair Ray called for adjournment.



SUMMARY: House Bill 92 would give the student member of the UNC Board of Governors the right to vote. The bill is effective when it becomes law.

CURRENT LAW: The UNC Board of Governors is composed of thirty-two voting members serving staggered four-year terms. Each long session, the General Assembly elects sixteen members to the Board. The Senate and the House of Representatives separately elect eight members to fill the vacancies on the Board.


Former board chairmen, who have served at least one full term, may continue to serve on the Board for an additional four-year term after their regular elected term has expired. Board members who are former North Carolina governors and have served at least one term on the Board may continue to serve. The Board members who are former board chairmen or former North Carolina governors are non-voting members emeriti but have all the other rights and privileges of serving on the Board.

Currently, the student serving as the president of the UNC Association of Student Governments (UNCASG) or his designee is a non-voting ex officio member of the Board. The UNC Association of Student Governments is composed of the student body Presidents of the sixteen constituent institutions. Typically, UNCASG elects a new president each year.

House Bill 92 changes the status of the student member of the UNC Board of **BILL ANALYSIS:** Governors from non-voting to voting. This change would increase the number of voting members on the Board from thirty-two to thirty-three. The bill also makes clear that the student member on the Board is the current president of the UNC Association of Student Governments and is not the president's designee.

There are student members on the State Board of Community Colleges and the individual community college board of trustees, but they do not vote. The student member serving on the board of trustees of a UNC constituent institution is allowed to vote.

SUMMARY: House Bill 1354 directs the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee to study the policy of each UNC constituent institution regarding accepting or refusing private gifts and grants. The Committee shall consider the criteria used by each institution to determine whether or not to accept or refuse private gifts and grants, the body or official responsible for making the determination, and how the criteria are applied when making the determination. shall also evaluate whether improvements could be made to those policies. The Committee shall make an interim report to the 2006 Session and a final report to the 2007 General Assembly.

EFFECTIVE DATE: The bill is effective when it becomes law.

BACKGROUND: Private fund raising is a responsibility of each institution. According to information from the UNC Office of the President, each institution complies with the industry standard on reporting and recording gifts known as the CASE Management and Reporting Standards (revised 2004).

SUMMARY: House Bill 1552 gives the board of trustees of North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University authority to prohibit, regulate, and limit by ordinance the parking of motor vehicles on certain named streets in the City of Greensboro where the City does not prohibit parking. Additionally, the board of trustees may regulate traffic on portions of certain named streets that abut the university.

The Proposed Committee substitute removed lines 15-16 on page 1.

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 116-44.5 currently has similar provisions for the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, Appalachian State University, the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, the University of North Carolina at Wilmington, and the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

MINUTES HOUSE EDUCATION SUBCOMMITTEE ON UNIVERSITIES THURSDAY, MAY 12, 2005

Representative Dickson, Presiding Chair

The House Education Subcommittee on Universities met on Thursday, May 12, 2005, in Room 425 of the Legislative Office Building at 11:00 A.M. The following members were present: Chairs Margaret Dickson and Karen Ray; Reps. Adams, Daughtridge, Hollo, Insko, McAllister, Michaux, and Rapp.

Chair Dickson called the meeting to order and recognized the Pages, Sergeant at Arms, Staff, and Visitors.

Two bills were on the Agenda for consideration:

- HB 1464: Repeal Sunset on UNC Design Contracts/Report. Rep. McMahan.
- HB 1515: Med Schools/Crim Background Check. Reps. LaRoque and England.

Prior to the convening of the Committee meeting, Reps. LaRoque and England requested that their bill not be heard until the next meeting.

HB 1464: Chair Dickson asked Rep. McMahan to explain his bill. He said that HB 1464 would repeal the sunset provision on the delegation of design, construction, and renovation authority for construction projects that have an estimated expenditure of public funds of \$2,000,000 or less. The authority will expire on December 31, 2006.

The bill would also add a reporting requirement from the UNC Board of Governors to the State Building Commission. The UNC Board of Governors would have to submit an annual report with the following information:

- A list of projects that fall under the delegation
- The estimated cost of each project along with the actual cost
- The name of each person awarded a contract when it becomes law.

Several members of the committee including Reps. Michaux, Adams, and Insko were concerned that the inclusion of minority contractors is not addressed directly in the bill.

Rep. McMahan said that his bill will not adversely affect minority businesses and that the extra reporting requirements could identify such a problem if it were to exist.

Staff Attorney Drupti Chauhan cited two different statutes that already speak to the issues raised by Rep. Michaux. (GS 143-128.2 and GS 143-128.2(g).

Rep. Michaux moved to amend the bill by adding a new section. The motion carried.

It was moved and passed that the bill pass with a favorable report as to the committee substitute bill and unfavorable as to the original bill.

There was no further business before the Committee for consideration; Chair Dickson called for adjournment.

SECTION 1. Section 14(a) of S.L. 2001-496 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 14.(a) Sections 8(a) through 8(e) of this act become effective July 1, 2001. Section 11.1 of this act becomes effective March 1, 2002. The remaining sections of Parts I and II of this act become effective January 1, 2002, and apply to construction projects for which bids or proposals are solicited on or after that date. The remainder of this act is effective when it becomes law. Sections 8(a) through 8(e) of this act expire December 31, 2006."

SECTION 2. G.S. 116-31.11 reads as rewritten:

"§ 116-31.11. Powers of Board regarding certain fee negotiations, contracts, and capital improvements.

- (a) Notwithstanding G.S. 143-341(3) and G.S. 143-135.1, the Board shall, with respect to the design, construction, or renovation of buildings, utilities, and other property developments of The University of North Carolina requiring the estimated expenditure of public money of two million dollars (\$2,000,000) or less:
 - (1) Conduct the fee negotiations for all design contracts and supervise the letting of all construction and design contracts.
 - (2) Develop procedures governing the responsibilities of The University of North Carolina and its affiliated and constituent institutions to perform the duties of the Department of Administration and the Director or Office of State Construction under G.S. 133-1.1(d) and G.S. 143-341(3).



SUMMARY: House Bill 1464 would repeal the sunset provision on the delegation of construction authority to The University of North Carolina and would require an annual report to the State Building Commission.

CURRENT LAW: The University of North Carolina currently has the authority to manage all university system capital projects requiring an estimated expenditure of \$2,000,000 or less. The UNC Board of Governors may delegate its authority to a constituent institution if the institution is qualified under guidelines adopted by the Board and approved by the State Building Commission and the Director of the Budget.

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 1464 would repeal the sunset provision on the delegation of design, construction, and renovation authority for construction projects that have an estimated expenditure of public funds of \$2,000,000 or less. The authority will expire on December 31, 2006.

The bill would also add a reporting requirement from the UNC Board of Governors to the State Building Commission. The UNC Board of Governors would have to submit an annual report with the following information:

- A list of projects that fall under the delegation
- The estimated cost of each project along with the actual cost
- The name of each person awarded a contract under the delegation

EFFECTIVE DATE: The bill would become effective when it becomes law.

BACKGROUND: The Office of State Construction is the primary agency responsible for the management of capital construction, repair and renovation projects for agencies throughout the State. The University of North Carolina, however, has been given authority to manage projects of \$2,000,000 or less on its own.

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO REQUIRE A CRIMINAL BACKGROUND CHECK OF ALL STUDENTS ADMITTED INTO A SCHOOL OF MEDICINE AT A NORTH CAROLINA INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. Chapter 116 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new Article to read:

"Article 33.

"Criminal Background Checks Required for Medical Students.

"§ 116-265. Criminal background check required for medical students.

- The following definitions apply in this Article:
 - "Institution" includes both constituent institutions and private (1) institutions.
 - "Constituent institution" is as defined in G.S. 116-2. (2)
 - "Private institution" means an institution licensed under G.S. 116-15.
- Any institution that has a school of medicine shall require as part of its matriculation process a national and State criminal background check of every person who has accepted an offer of admission to the school of medicine at the institution. The criminal background check shall include a check to determine whether the person has any adjudications as a sex offender that would require registration under Article 27A of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes.
- The Department of Justice may provide a criminal record check to a constituent institution for a person who is accepted for admission to the school of medicine. If the institution is a private institution, then the Department of Justice may provide a criminal record check to the North Carolina Medical Board on behalf of the private institution as provided by G.S. 116-266. The institution shall provide to the Department of Justice, along with the request, the fingerprints of the applicant, any additional information required by the Department of Justice, and a form signed by the

applicant consenting to the check of the criminal record and to the use of the fingerprints and other identifying information required by the State or national repositories. The applicant's fingerprints shall be forwarded to the State Bureau of Investigation for a search of the State's criminal history record file, and the State Bureau of Investigation shall forward a set of the fingerprints to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for a national criminal history check. The institution and the North Carolina Medical Board shall keep all information pursuant to this subsection privileged, in accordance with applicable State law and federal guidelines, and the information shall be confidential and shall not be a public record under Chapter 132 of the General Statutes.

The Department of Justice may charge each applicant a fee for conducting the checks of criminal history records authorized by this subsection; however, the fee shall not exceed the cost of conducting the criminal background check.

Nothing in this Article prohibits an institution from contracting with a private company to conduct the criminal background checks required by this Article.

"§ 116-266. North Carolina Medical Board receive criminal background check information on behalf of private medical schools.

If the institution requesting the background check in compliance with G.S. 116-265 is a private institution, then the institution may request that the State Bureau of Investigation provide the information received from the background check to the North Carolina Medical Board. Upon request of the private institution, the Medical Board shall receive the information from a student's background check and shall review the information using the same criteria to evaluate the information that is used to evaluate the information received by the Board under G.S. 90-11. If the Medical Board determines any information received from the criminal background check would cause the Medical Board either to refuse to license a student to practice medicine under G.S. 90-11 or to investigate a student further before issuing a license to the student, then the Medical Board shall report that fact to the private institution requesting the background check.

The Medical Board may charge the private institution a reasonable fee for providing this service.

"§ 116-267. Evaluation of criminal background information by school of medicine; effect on admissions decision.

The information collected as a result of the criminal background check required by this Article shall be considered by the appropriate school of medicine in determining whether or not to complete an applicant's matriculation process. A criminal conviction shall not automatically preclude an applicant from matriculating, and the school of medicine may use its discretion in evaluating the applicant's fitness for the study of medicine. However, an applicant who has been adjudicated as a sex offender shall be precluded from gaining admission to any school of medicine at an institution located in North Carolina."

SECTION 2. This act is effective when it becomes law and applies to the 2006-2007 academic year and each subsequent academic year.

SUMMARY: House Bill 1515 would require criminal background checks of all students admitted to a school of medicine located in the State. Any applicant who has been convicted or adjudicated as a sex offender which would require registration under Article 27A of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes would be precluded from gaining admission to any school of medicine in the State.

The PCS makes technical changes.

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 1515 would require criminal background checks of all students admitted to a medical school in the State. Every medical school must require, as a part of the matriculation process, a national and State criminal background check of every student that has accepted an offer of admission.

The NC Department of Justice (DOJ) may provide a criminal background check to a UNC constituent institution for a student admitted into a school of medicine. If the institution is private, the Department of Justice may provide a criminal background check to the NC Medical Board for the private institution. Both public and private institutions must provide to the DOJ fingerprints of the applicant, information requested by the DOJ and a consent form signed by the applicant.

The DOJ is required to send the fingerprints to the State Bureau of Investigation for a search of the State criminal records and the State Board of Investigation is required to forward a set of the fingerprints to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for a national criminal history check.

All information obtained must be kept confidential. The DOJ may charge each applicant a fee that does not exceed the cost of conducting the criminal background check.

If institution requesting the criminal check is a private institution, then it may request the information received from the background check go to the NC Medical Board. If the NC Medical Board determines that the information would cause the Medical Board to refuse to issue a license to the student or to further investigate the student, then it shall report that fact to the private institution. This determination shall be made using the same criteria that is used to evaluate the issuance of licenses under G.S. 90-11.

The NC Medical Board may charge the private institution a reasonable fee for providing this service.

The school of medicine must use the information collected from criminal background check in determining whether or not to complete the applicant's matriculation process. MINUTES HOUSE EDUCATION SUBCOMMITTEE ON UNIVERSITIES THURSDAY, MAY 19, 2005 Representative Ray, Presiding Chair

The House Education Subcommittee on Universities met on Thursday, May 19, 2005, in Room 425 of the Legislative Office Building at 11:00 A.M. The following members were present: Chairs Margaret Dickson and Karen Ray; Vice Chair Jim Harrell, Reps. Hollo, Insko, McAllister, and Rapp..

Chair Ray called the meeting to order and recognized the Pages, Sergeant at Arms, Staff, and Visitors.

One bill was on the Agenda for consideration:

• HB 1515: Med Schools/Crim Background Check. – Reps. LaRoque and England.

Chair Dickson moved to consider the PCS.

Rep. LaRoque outlined the provisions of the bill and said the bill would require criminal background checks of all students admitted to a medical school in the State. Every medical school must require, as a part of the matriculation process, a national and State criminal background check of every student that has accepted an offer of admission. Any applicant who has been convicted or adjudicated as a sex offender who would require registration under Article 27A of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes would be precluded from gaining admission to any school of medicine in the State.

Rep. Rapp asked Mr. Thom Mansfield of the North Carolina Medical Board about the current procedure in regard to medical student background checks. Mr. Mansfield said that before a medical student can become board certified in N.C., he or she must pass a background check at the time of licensing.

Rep. Insko questioned the purpose of the bill, and asked what the goal is. She said the word "shall" is inconsistently used and would like it to replace references to the word "may" with the word "shall."

Other questions that arose involved the meaning of the word *adjudicated*, how many people are included in these background checks, are all N.C. medical schools doing the checks, etc. Mr. Mansfield recapped the N.C. Medical Board's procedure. Mr. Tim McDowell of the N.C. Independent Colleges said there is no objection from the independent medical schools, as those schools already require entry background checks.

A motion was made that the PCS be given a favorable report with the recommendation that it be sent to the Finance Committee. The motion did not carry for lack of support.

Rep. Insko moved that the motion be held and that the bill be displaced and the bill given further consideration at the next meeting.

There was no further business to come before the Committee for consideration; Chair Ray called for adjournment.

CAROLINA INSTITUTION OF HIGHER EDUCATION.

- (1) "Institution" includes both constituent institutions and private institutions.
- (2) "Constituent institution" is as defined in G.S. 116-2.
- (3) "Private institution" means an institution licensed under G.S. 116-15.
- (b) Any institution that has a school of medicine shall require as part of its matriculation process a national and State criminal background check of every person who has accepted an offer of admission to the school of medicine at the institution. The criminal background check shall include a check to determine whether the person has any adjudications as a sex offender that would require registration under Article 27A of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes.
- (c) The Department of Justice may provide a criminal record check to a constituent institution for a person who is accepted for admission to the school of medicine. If the institution is a private institution, then the Department of Justice may provide a criminal record check to the North Carolina Medical Board on behalf of the private institution as provided by G.S. 116-266. The institution shall provide to the Department of Justice, along with the request, the fingerprints of the applicant, any additional information required by the Department of Justice, and a form signed by the

applicant consenting to the check of the criminal record and to the use of the fingerprints and other identifying information required by the State or national repositories. The applicant's fingerprints shall be forwarded to the State Bureau of Investigation for a search of the State's criminal history record file, and the State Bureau of Investigation shall forward a set of the fingerprints to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for a national criminal history check. The institution and the North Carolina Medical Board shall keep all information pursuant to this subsection privileged, in accordance with applicable State law and federal guidelines, and the information shall be confidential and shall not be a public record under Chapter 132 of the General Statutes.

The Department of Justice may charge each applicant a fee for conducting the checks of criminal history records authorized by this subsection; however, the fee shall not exceed the cost of conducting the criminal background check.

Nothing in this Article prohibits an institution from contracting with a private company to conduct the criminal background checks required by this Article.

"§ 116-266. North Carolina Medical Board receive criminal background check information on behalf of private medical schools.

If the institution requesting the background check in compliance with G.S. 116-265 is a private institution, then the institution may request that the State Bureau of Investigation provide the information received from the background check to the North Carolina Medical Board. Upon request of the private institution, the Medical Board shall receive the information from a student's background check and shall review the information using the same criteria to evaluate the information that is used to evaluate the information received by the Board under G.S. 90-11. If the Medical Board determines any information received from the criminal background check would cause the Medical Board either to refuse to license a student to practice medicine under G.S. 90-11 or to investigate a student further before issuing a license to the student, then the Medical Board shall report that fact to the private institution requesting the background check.

The Medical Board may charge the private institution a reasonable fee for providing this service.

"§ 116-267. Evaluation of criminal background information by school of medicine; effect on admissions decision.

Any applicant who has been convicted or adjudicated as a sex offender which would require registration under Article 27A of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes would be precluded from gaining admission to any school of medicine in the State.

The PCS makes technical changes.

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 1515 would require criminal background checks of all students admitted to a medical school in the State. Every medical school must require, as a part of the matriculation process, a national and State criminal background check of every student that has accepted an offer of admission.

The NC Department of Justice (DOJ) may provide a criminal background check to a UNC constituent institution for a student admitted into a school of medicine. If the institution is private, the Department of Justice may provide a criminal background check to the NC Medical Board for the private institution. Both public and private institutions must provide to the DOJ fingerprints of the applicant, information requested by the DOJ and a consent form signed by the applicant.

The DOJ is required to send the fingerprints to the State Bureau of Investigation for a search of the State criminal records and the State Board of Investigation is required to forward a set of the fingerprints to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for a national criminal history check.

All information obtained must be kept confidential. The DOJ may charge each applicant a fee that does not exceed the cost of conducting the criminal background check.

If institution requesting the criminal check is a private institution, then it may request the information received from the background check go to the NC Medical Board. If the NC Medical Board determines that the information would cause the Medical Board to refuse to issue a license to the student or to further investigate the student, then it shall report that fact to the private institution. This determination shall be made using the same criteria that is used to evaluate the issuance of licenses under G.S. 90-11.

The NC Medical Board may charge the private institution a reasonable fee for providing this service.

The school of medicine must use the information collected from criminal background check in determining whether or not to complete the applicant's matriculation process. The House Education Subcommittee on Universities met on Thursday, May 26, 2005, in Room 425 of the Legislative Office Building at 11:00 A.M. The following members were present: Chairs Margaret Dickson and Karen Ray; Vice Chair, James Harrell; Reps. Adams, Hollo, Insko, McAllister, Rapp, and Stiller

Chair Dickson called the meeting to order and recognized the Pages, Sergeant at Arms, Staff, and Visitors.

Three bills were on the Agenda for consideration:

- HB 1515: Med Schools/Crim Background Check. Reps LaRoque and England.
- HB 1105: In-State Tuition/Paramedic-to-BSN Program. Reps. West and Womble.
- HB 1285: Modify Bd. Of Governors Terms. Rep. Haire.

Chair Dickson called on Rep. Haire, and he asked that his bill (HB 1285) be removed from the agenda and considered at the next meeting.

HB 1105: Rep. West explained the bill and said that the provisions of the bill would make students who are enrolled in the Paramedic-to-BSN Program offered at Tri-County Community College by Winston-Salem State University and in the Paramedic-to-BSN Program at Winston-Salem State University eligible for in-State tuition without waiting to qualify as a "resident for tuition purposes" as outlined in G.S. 143.1

He pointed out that North Carolina students will have a separate early registration period for acceptance into the program to ensure that no out of state student displaces a North Carolina resident.

He pointed out that both institutions would evaluate the effect of the program on the production, retention, and utilization of registered nurses in the State.

Kristine Leggett of the General Assembly's Fiscal Research Division explained the Fiscal Note she had prepared for the bill.

There were several questions by other members of the committee. Rep. Stiller inquired about the number of students who would be involved in this program. Rep. Insko asked if there are other programs in the university system that are one-of-a-kind.

Rep. McAllister said there is serious shortage of nurses in Western North Carolina.

Mr. Kenneth Briggs, Vice President of Finance, Community College System, said that the Community College System supports the legislation. He answered a question relating to reciprocity by saying that North Carolina does not have reciprocity with states with contiguous borders for this type education program.

Rep. Insko expressed concern that as a first of its kind the scope of the bill was too broad.

Rep. Womble, the bill co-sponsor, said that the bill is a very good bill and a very simple bill that will speak to the nursing shortage, that it is a very narrowly drawn bill that will enable badly needed nurses and will benefit North Carolina as a whole. He said that after a four-year trial period, there will be a review and evaluation of its effectiveness.

Rep. McAllister made a motion that the bill be given a favorable report.

Rep. Stiller asked if the bill had to make "cross-over," and if so, why since the bill has a fiscal note and will be re-referred to Appropriations.

Staff member Sara Kamprath said that cross-over bills must meet both the House and Senate Rules and under Senate Rules, the bill had to make cross-over.

With Rep. Insko voting no, Rep. Rapp made a motion that the bill be given a favorable as to the original bill with the recommendation that the bill be re-referred to the Committee on appropriations.

<u>HB 1515</u>: This bill was brought forward from the previous meeting. The PCS was adopted for HB 1515 for discussion.

Rep. Adams offered an amendment that was incorporated in the bill. Staff Attorney prepared the amendment and read it back to the committee. The amendment carried.

Rep. Stiller made a motion that the PCS pass as amended and rolled into a new PCS with a favorable report and re-referred to the Finance Committee, but unfavorable as to the original bill.

There was no further business before the Committee for consideration; Chair Dickson called for adjournment.

AN ACT TO MAKE STUDENTS ENROLLED IN THE PARAMEDIC-TO-BSN PROGRAM OFFERED AT TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY COLLEGE BY WINSTON-SALEM STATE UNIVERSITY ELIGIBLE FOR IN-STATE COMMUNITY COLLEGE TUITION AND TO MAKE STUDENTS ENROLLED IN THE PARAMEDIC-TO-BSN PROGRAM OFFERED AT WINSTON-SALEM STATE UNIVERSITY ELIGIBLE FOR IN-STATE UNIVERSITY TUITION.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. G.S. 115D-39(a) reads as rewritten:

"§ 115D-39. Student tuition and fees.

(a) The State Board of Community Colleges shall fix and regulate all tuition and fees charged to students for applying to or attending any institution pursuant to this Chapter.

The receipts from all student tuition and fees, other than student activity fees, shall be State funds and shall be deposited as provided by regulations of the State Board of Community Colleges.

The legal resident limitation with respect to tuition, set forth in G.S. 116-143.1 and G.S. 116-143.3, shall apply to students attending institutions operating pursuant to this Chapter; provided, however, that when an employer other than the armed services, as that term is defined in G.S. 116-143.3, pays tuition for an employee to attend an institution operating pursuant to this Chapter and when the employee works at a North Carolina business location, the employer shall be charged the in-State tuition rate; provided further, however, a community college may charge in-State tuition to up to one percent (1%) of its out-of-state students, rounded up to the next whole number, to accommodate the families transferred by business, the families transferred by industry, or the civilian families transferred by the military, consistent with the provisions of G.S. 116-143.3, into the State. Notwithstanding these requirements, a refugee who lawfully entered the United States and who is living in this State shall be deemed to qualify as a domiciliary of this State under G.S. 116-143.1(a)(1) and as a State resident

for community college tuition purposes as defined in G.S. 116-143.1(a)(2). Also, a nonresident of the United States who has resided in North Carolina for a 12-month qualifying period and has filed an immigrant petition with the United States Immigration and Naturalization Service shall be considered a State resident for community college tuition purposes. A student who is in the Paramedic-to-BSN Program offered at Tri-County Community College by Winston-Salem State University shall be considered a State resident for community college tuition purposes so long as the student remains in good standing in the Program."

SECTION 2. Article 14 of Chapter 116 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"§ 116-143.6. Tuition of certain students in the Paramedic-BSN-Program at Winston-Salem State University.

Notwithstanding G.S. 116-143.1, any student who enrolls in the Paramedic-to-BSN Program offered at Winston-Salem State University shall be eligible to be charged the in-State tuition rate for courses relevant to that Program so long as the student remains in good standing in the Program."

SECTION 3. There shall be a separate early registration period for in-State students for the Paramedic-to-BSN Program offered at Tri-County Community College by Winston-Salem State University to ensure that no out-of-state student displaces an in-State student in the Program.

SECTION 4. Winston-Salem State University and Tri-County Community College shall thoroughly evaluate the effects of the grant of in-State tuition in this act on the production, retention, and utilization of registered nurses in the State. They shall report their findings and their recommendation on continuing the grant of in-State tuition to the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina and the State Board of Community Colleges prior to January 1, 2009.

SECTION 5. This act is effective when it becomes law and expires July 31, 2009. Students who enter the Paramedic-to-BSN Program offered at Tri-County Community College by Winston-Salem State University or enter the Program at Winston-Salem State University prior to July 31, 2009, shall continue to receive in-State tuition in the Program until they complete it so long as they remain in good standing in the Program.

The applicant's fingerprints shall be forwarded to the State Bureau of Investigation for a search of the State's criminal history record file, and the State Bureau of Investigation shall forward a set of the fingerprints to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for a national criminal history check. The institution and the North Carolina Medical Board shall keep all information pursuant to this subsection privileged, in accordance with applicable State law and federal guidelines, and the information shall be confidential and shall not be a public record under Chapter 132 of the General Statutes.

The Department of Justice may charge each applicant a fee for conducting the checks of criminal history records authorized by this subsection; however, the fee shall not exceed the cost of conducting the criminal background check.

Nothing in this Article prohibits an institution from contracting with a private company to conduct the criminal background checks required by this Article.

"§ 116-266. North Carolina Medical Board receive criminal background check information on behalf of private medical schools.

If the institution requesting the background check in compliance with G.S. 116-265 is a private institution, then the institution may request that the State Bureau of Investigation provide the information received from the background check to the North Carolina Medical Board. Upon request of the private institution, the Medical Board shall receive the information from a student's background check and shall review the information using the same criteria to evaluate the information that is used to evaluate the information received by the Board under G.S. 90-11. If the Medical Board determines any information received from the criminal background check would cause the Medical Board either to refuse to license a student to practice medicine under G.S. 90-11 or to investigate a student further before issuing a license to the student, then the Medical Board shall report that fact to the private institution requesting the background check.

The Medical Board may charge the private institution a reasonable fee for providing this service.

"§ 116-267. Evaluation of criminal background information by school of medicine; effect on admissions decision.

The information collected as a result of the criminal background check required by this Article shall be considered by the appropriate school of medicine in determining whether or not to complete an applicant's matriculation process. A criminal conviction shall not automatically preclude an applicant from matriculating, and the school of medicine may use its discretion in evaluating the applicant's fitness for the study of medicine. However, an applicant who has been adjudicated or convicted as a sex

SUMMARY: House Bill 1515 would require criminal background checks of all students admitted to a school of medicine located in the State. Any applicant who has been convicted or adjudicated as a sex offender which would require registration under Article 27A of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes would be precluded from gaining admission to any school of medicine in the State.

The PCS makes technical changes.

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 1515 would require criminal background checks of all students admitted to a medical school in the State. Every medical school must require, as a part of the matriculation process, a national and State criminal background check of every student that has accepted an offer of admission.

The NC Department of Justice (DOJ) may provide a criminal background check to a UNC constituent institution for a student admitted into a school of medicine. If the institution is private, the Department of Justice may provide a criminal background check to the NC Medical Board for the private institution. Both public and private institutions must provide to the DOJ fingerprints of the applicant, information requested by the DOJ and a consent form signed by the applicant.

The DOJ is required to send the fingerprints to the State Bureau of Investigation for a search of the State criminal records and the State Board of Investigation is required to forward a set of the fingerprints to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for a national criminal history check.

All information obtained must be kept confidential. The DOJ may charge each applicant a fee that does not exceed the cost of conducting the criminal background check.

If institution requesting the criminal check is a private institution, then it may request the information received from the background check go to the NC Medical Board. If the NC Medical Board determines that the information would cause the Medical Board to refuse to issue a license to the student or to further investigate the student, then it shall report that fact to the private institution. This determination shall be made using the same criteria that is used to evaluate the issuance of licenses under G.S. 90-11.

The NC Medical Board may charge the private institution a reasonable fee for providing this service.

The school of medicine must use the information collected from criminal background check in determining whether or not to complete the applicant's matriculation process. An applicant who has been convicted or adjudicated as a sex offender that would require registration under Article 27A of Chapter 14 cannot be admitted to any school of medicine at an institution located in the State.

EFFECTIVE DATE: The bill would become effective when it becomes law and applies to the 2006-2007 academic year and each subsequent academic year.

BILL SUMMARY:

H.B. 1105 allows out-of-state students enrolling in the Paramedic to Bachelor of Science in Nursing programs offered concurrently by Tri-County Community College (TCCC) and Winston-Salem State University (WSSU) to receive the in-state tuition rate at TCCC and WSSU as long as they remain in good standing in the program.

ASSUMPTIONS AND METHODOLOGY:

The Paramedic to BSN program offered by Winston-Salem State University (WSSU) at Tri County Community College (TCCC) in Cherokee County allows paramedics located in the western part of the State to obtain a BSN from WSSU on the TCCC Campus. Courses are taught either via distance education or by resident WSSU faculty. The following assumptions and methodology were used to determine the cost of granting residency status for tuition purposes to out-of-state students:

- 1. Paramedics enrolling in the program will have completed all of their lower level courses and will matriculate directly into upper level (i.e. university) courses. Therefore, all of the students enrolled in the program will be paying university tuition.
- 2. The bill will result in a loss of receipts to the enrolling institution. Therefore, the cost shown in the table above represents the difference between in-state and out-of-state tuition. In-state tuition at Winston-Salem State University is \$1,451 per year; out-of-state tuition is \$10,091. The difference is \$11,542. Therefore, for each out-of-state student enrolled in the program, Winston-Salem State University would realize \$11,542 less if the out-of-state student pays in-state tuition.
- 3. University tuition is estimated to increase by approximately \$200 per year for in-state and out-of state students.
- 4. Students will take two years to complete the program.
- 5. There are currently 23 students enrolled in the Paramedic to BSN program. All of those students are North Carolina residents. Tri-County Community College estimates that enrollment in FY05-06 will be 25 to 50 full-time equivalent (FTE) students. Of those, approximately 50% will be from out-of-state if the bill becomes law. (TCCC does not believe out-of-state enrollment will be as significant if tuition is not reduced for those out-of-state students.) The estimate shown in the table above assumes a maximum out-of-state enrollment of 25 students in the first year. In the second year, 25 new students will begin the program, while the original 25 students complete it, for a total of 50 FTE in the second year.

SUMMARY: House Bill 1285 would increase the length of the terms of the members of the UNC Board of Governors to six years; decrease the numbers members to 30; and eliminate the position of member emeritus.

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 116-6 provides for 32 members of the UNC Board of Governors (Board), each serving four-year terms. Sixteen members are elected every 2 years, with 8 members elected by the NC House of Representatives (House) and 8 members elected by the NC Senate (Senate). A person cannot be elected to:

- More than 3 full four-year terms in succession
- A four-year term if preceded immediately by election to full eight-year terms in succession
- A four-year term if preceded immediately by election to an eight-year term and four-year term in succession

Resignation from a term does not constitute a break in service. Any person who has served at least one full term as chairman of the Board is a member emeritus of the Board for one four-year term. Any person who has served at least one term as a member of the Board after having served as Governor of North Carolina is a member emeritus of the Board as well. Members emeriti have all of the rights and privileges of membership but they do not have the right to vote.

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 1285 would reduce the number of the members of the Board to 30 and provide for one student member. At each session of the General Assembly held in an odd-numbered year, the Senate and the House shall elect one-half of the number of persons necessary to fill the vacancies on the Board.

In 2007, the Senate would elect 7 members to the Board in the following manner:

- 5 members who would serve terms that expired June 30, 2011 (4-year terms)
- 2 members who would serve terms that expired June 30, 2013 (6-year terms)

In 2009, the Senate would elect 8 members to the Board in the following manner:

- 3 members who would serve terms that expired June 30, 2013 (4-year terms)
- 5 members who would serve terms that expired June 30, 2015 (6-year terms)

In 2011 and each subsequent session in an odd-numbered year, the Senate would elect 5 members who would each serve 6-year terms.

In 2007, the House would elect 7 members to the Board in the following manner:

- 5 members who would serve terms that expired June 30, 2011 (4-year terms)
- 2 members who would serve terms that expired June 30, 2013 (6-year terms)

In 2009, the House would elect 8 members to the Board in the following manner:

- 3 members who would serve terms that expired June 30, 2013 (4-year terms)
- 5 members who would serve terms that expired June 30, 2015 (6-year terms)

In 2011 and each subsequent session in an odd-numbered year, the House would elect 5 members who would each serve 6-year terms.

A person **could NOT** be elected to the following:

- More than 2 full six year terms in succession
- A six year term if preceded immediately by election to 3 consecutive four-year terms

Resignation from a term of office would not constitute a break in service. Service on the Board prior to July 1, 2007 would be included in calculating term limitations.

Any vacancy that occurred on or after July 1, 2005 would be filled in this new manner.

EFFECTIVE DATE: The bill becomes effective July 1, 2005 and applies to terms commencing on or after that date.

MINUTES HOUSE EDUCATION SUBCOMMITTEE ON UNIVERSITIES TUESDAY, MAY 31, 2005

Representative Ray, Presiding Chair

The House Education Subcommittee on Universities met on Tuesday, May 31, 2005, in Room 425 of the Legislative Office Building at 12 Noon. The following members were present: Chairs Margaret Dickson and Karen Ray; Reps. Adams, McAllister, Michaux, and Rapp.

Chair Ray called the meeting to order and recognized the Pages, Sergeant at Arms, Staff, and Visitors.

One bill was on the Agenda for consideration:

• HB 1285: Modify Bd. Of Governors Terms. – Rep. Haire

Chair Ray called on Rep. Haire to explain the bill.

Rep. Haire gave a comprehensive overview of the bill and said that the provisions of the bill would increase the length of the terms of the members of the UNC Board of Governors to six years and decrease the number of members to 30. The bill would also eliminate the position of member emeritus.

Questions from Reps. McAllister and Michaux expressed concerns regarding the makeup and whether or not minority representation would be affected.

Rep. Michaux also questioned the elimination of the emeritus members and whether or not useful experience may be lost. He emphasized the need for diversity.

Several members expressed concern on term lengths and other pertinent proposed changes to the overall makeup of the Board of Governors.

Rep. Adams proposed an amendment to the bill, and Staff Attorney Drupti Chauhan explained the complexity of working out the terms and that she would need additional time to effect the provisions of the amendment into a PCS.

Rep. McAllister made a motion that the amendment be incorporated in a PCS.

The committee agreed to meet on the PCS around Rep. Dickson's Chamber Desk 5 minutes prior to session today (2:55 p.m.).

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. Chapter 116 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"§ 116-6.01. Election and terms of members of Board of Governors after July 1, 2005.

- (a) As the terms of members of the Board of Governors elected before July 1, 2005, under G.S. 116-6 expire, their successors shall be elected by the Senate and House of Representatives under this section. In electing members to the Board of Governors, the Senate and the House of Representatives shall consider whether the Board of Governors appropriately reflects the genders, diversity, and geographical areas of the State.
- (b) Beginning July 1, 2007, the Board of Governors shall consist of 30 members elected by the General Assembly and one student member as provided in G.S. 116-6.1. At each session of the General Assembly held in an odd-numbered year, the Senate and the House of Representatives shall each elect one-half of the number of persons necessary to fill the vacancies on the Board of Governors.
 - (1) In 2007, the Senate shall elect seven members to the Board of Governors, five of whom shall serve a term expiring June 30, 2011, and two of whom shall serve a term expiring June 30, 2013. In 2009, the Senate shall elect eight members to the Board of Governors, three of whom shall serve a term expiring June 30, 2013, and five of whom shall serve a term expiring June 30, 2015. - (c) In electing members to the Board of Governors, the Senate and the House of Representatives shall select from a slate of candidates made in each house. The slate shall be prepared as provided by resolution of each house. If a sufficient number of nominees who are legally qualified are submitted, then the slate of candidates shall list at least twice the number of candidates for the total seats open. In 2007, and biennially thereafter, each house shall hold their elections within 30 legislative days after appointments to their education committees are complete.
- (d) All terms shall commence on July 1 of odd-numbered years and, except as provided in subdivisions (b)(1) and (b)(2) of this section, all members shall serve for six-year overlapping terms.
 - (e) No person may be elected to:
 - (1) More than two full six-year terms in succession; or
 - (2) A six-year term if preceded immediately by election to three consecutive four-year terms.

Resignation from a term of office does not constitute a break in service for the purpose of this subsection. Service on the Board of Governors before July 1, 2007, shall be included in the limitations of this subsection."

SECTION 2. G.S. 116-6(f) is repealed.

SECTION 3. G.S. 116-6(g) is repealed.

SECTION 4. G.S. 116-7(c) reads as rewritten:

"(c) Whenever any vacancy shall occur in the elected membership of the Board of Governors, it shall be the duty of the Board to inform the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the President of the Senate of the vacancy. The chamber that originally elected the vacating member shall elect a person to fill the vacancy. Any vacancy occurring on or after July 1, 2005, shall be filled under G.S. 116-6.01 for the unexpired term. The vacancy shall remain unfilled until the appropriate chamber of the General Assembly elects a person to fill the vacancy.

The vacancy shall be filled not later than the adjournment sine die of the next regular session of the General Assembly. The election shall be for the remainder of the unexpired term. Whenever a member shall fail, for any reason other than ill health or service in the interest of the State or nation, to be present for four successive regular meetings of the Board, his place as a member shall be deemed vacant."

SUMMARY: House Bill 1285 would increase the length of the terms of the members of the UNC Board of Governors to six years; decrease the numbers members to 30; and eliminate the position of member emeritus.

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 116-6 provides for 32 members of the UNC Board of Governors (Board), each serving four-year terms. Sixteen members are elected every 2 years, with 8 members elected by the NC House of Representatives (House) and 8 members elected by the NC Senate (Senate). A person cannot be elected to:

- More than 3 full four-year terms in succession
- A four-year term if preceded immediately by election to full eight-year terms in succession
- A four-year term if preceded immediately by election to an eight-year term and four-year term in succession
