MINUTES HOUSE EDUCATION SUBCOMMITTEE ON COMMUNITY COLLEGES

March 5, 2009

The House Education Subcommittee on Community Colleges met on Thursday, March 5, 2009, in Room 424 of the Legislative Office Building at 11:00 a.m. The following members were present: Representative Jimmy L. Love, Sr., Chairman; Representatives Alice Bordsen, Bob England, and Marian McLawhorn, Vice Chairs; and Representatives Marilyn Avila, Jerry Dockham, Elmer Floyd, Melanie Wade Goodwin, Pat Hurley, James Langdon, Darrell McCormick, Bonner Stiller, Joe Tolson, Ray Warren, and Winkie Wilkins. Staff Counselors Shirley Iorio and Kara McCraw were also in attendance. A Visitor Registration list is attached and made part of these minutes.

Chairman Love called the meeting to order and requested that each member of the Committee introduce him- or herself and provide a brief explanation of his or her connection to community colleges. He then recognized pages Sean Hartness of Vance County, sponsored by Representative Jim Crawford and Melissa Young of Caswell County, sponsored by Representative Bill Faison. Representative Love also recognized and thanked Sergeants-at-Arms John Brandon, Martha Parrish, and Ken Burroughs for their service.

The following bills were considered:

HB 198, AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO PROVIDE FOR DIFFERENTIATED FUNDING OF COMMUNITY COLLEGE ALLIED HEALTH PROGRAMS. Representative McLawhorn was recognized to explain the bill, a request from the Community College System. Following a brief explanation and upon motion made by Representative Tolson, the committee voted for a favorable report and recommendation that the Bill be re-referred to the Appropriations Committee. Copies of the Bill and Bill Summary are attached as part of these minutes.

HB 199, AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO INCREASE THE SALARIES OF FULL-TIME COMMUNITY COLLEGE FACULTY AND PROFESSIONAL STAFF. Representative McLawhorn was recognized to explain the bill, a request from the Community College System. She noted that the salaries of the community college faculty and staff were low, 79th of the national average and that raising these salaries is a priority item. If the funding is approved, North Carolina would reach the average by 2013.

Representative Avila asked who the professional staff for the community colleges were. Representative Love recognized Kennon Briggs, Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of the North Carolina Community College System, who explained that professional staff included all those individuals who were not faculty, not clerical, and not the President. They included all those who had student support functions, i.e., counselors and other academic support staff.

Upon Representative Love's request, Mr. Briggs then introduced two of his staff members, Jennifer Haygood, Vice President of Business and Finance, and Jennifer Willis, Director of Governmental Relations.

Representative Avila asked why the professional staff were higher paid than the faculty. Mr. Briggs replied that for comparison purposes nationally, faculty salaries were based on a nine-month contract (legislative requirements) while all other reported salaries were based on twelve months.

Upon motion made by Representative Bordsen, the committee voted for a favorable report and recommendation that the Bill be re-referred to the Appropriations Committee. Copies of the Bill and Bill Summary are attached as part of these minutes.

HB 228, AN ACT TO CREATE A SALES AND USE TAX REFUND FOR COMMUNITY COLLEGES, AS RECOMMENDED BY THE JOINT LEGISLATIVE EDUCATION OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE. Representative Tolson was recognized to explain the bill. He explained that it was, basically, a fairness bill; the University system gets a refund for the taxes it pays and the Community College system should also be allowed to receive a refund. Representative Avila asked about getting a tax id number and not worrying about getting a refund to which Representative Tolson replied that probably will be done in the future, but at this time it was decided to follow the University system's lead.

Representative McLawhorn moved that the Bill be given a favorable report and recommendation that the bill be re-referred to the Finance Committee. This was unanimously approved by the Committee. The Bill and Bill Summary are attached as part of these minutes.

Kara McCraw gave an overview of the State Board of Community Colleges' (SBCC) elections to fill upcoming vacancies. She reviewed the preferred timeline which is as follows: On Monday, March 16, 2009, nomination forms would be distributed which would then be due, together with the Statement of Economic Interest, in the Clerk's Office and Ethics Commission by Wednesday, April 1, 2009. Elections in the House and Senate would then be held on Thursday, April 23, 2009. This would give the Committee about two-and-a-half weeks to consider the candidates. There are 21 seats, of which the House elects 4 and the Senate elects 4. Ms. McCraw noted that there were two vacancies to fill this year, one of which was currently held by Jim Daniels from Asheville and the other by Anita Powers from Wallace. Each is eligible to run again. The term is six years for a maximum of two consecutive terms.

There being no further business, Chairman Love adjourned the meeting at 11:30 a.m.

SUMMARY:

House Bill 198 would appropriate funds to provide for differentiated funding

of community college Allied Health Programs.

This bill has a serial referral to Appropriations.

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 198 would require the State Board of Community Colleges to do all of the following:

- identify the Allied Health Programs within the Community College System (System);
- weigh the costs of Allied Health Programs as a group against all other programs within the System; and
- modify its funding formula to allow for differentiation in funding between Allied Health Programs and all other programs.

House Bill 198 would appropriate from the General Fund to the Community Colleges System Office \$9.300.000 for the 2009-2010 fiscal year and \$18,600,000 for the 2010-2011 fiscal year to provide for this differentiated funding for Allied Health Programs.

EFFECTIVE DATE: The act would become effective July 1, 2009.

BACKGROUND: Approximately 85% of workers enrolled in allied health education programs are trained through the community colleges, with most professions retaining 75% of those students within the State after graduation.

In the North Carolina Community College System Allied Health Programs (associate degree and diploma programs) cost about one and one half times more than other programs. They carry a weighted cost of 1.47 more than per capita funding, or \$1,646 per FTE student. To date, the General Assembly has provided \$443 per FTE toward that need.

Allied Health Programs include registered nurses, medical assistants, pharmacy technicians, physical therapy assistants, dental hygienists, home health aides, etc.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1.(a) The State Board of Community Colleges shall identify the Allied Health Programs within the Community College System and shall weigh the costs of Allied Health Programs as a group against all other programs within the System. The State Board shall modify its funding formula to allow for differentiation in funding between Allied Health Programs and all other programs.

SECTION 1.(b) There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Community Colleges System Office the sum of nine million three hundred thousand dollars (\$9,300,000) for the 2009-2010 fiscal year and the sum of eighteen million six hundred thousand dollars (\$18,600,000) for the 2010-2011 fiscal year to provide for differentiated funding for Allied Health Programs.

SECTION 2. This act becomes effective July 1, 2009.

SUMMARY: House Bill 199 would appropriate funds to increase the salaries of full-time community college faculty and professional staff.

This bill has a serial referral to Appropriations.

House Bill 199 would provide the following appropriation from the General **BILL ANALYSIS:** Fund to the Community Colleges System Office:

- \$29,800,000 for the 2009-2010 fiscal year, and
- \$59,600,000 for the 2010-2011 fiscal year.

This appropriation would help to increase the salaries of full-time community college faculty and professional staff to the national average.

EFFECTIVE DATE: The bill would become effective July 1, 2009.

North Carolina's average faculty salary for 2007-2008 was \$46,224 which is 79% of the average national salary (\$58,522). North Carolina ranks 40th in the United States and next to last in the region for community college faculty salaries.

Professional staff that support North Carolina students earn, on average, \$55,694, compared to \$69,959 for their peers nationally.

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

There is appropriated from the General Fund to the Community Colleges System Office the sum of twenty-nine million eight hundred thousand dollars (\$29,800,000) for the 2009-2010 fiscal year and the sum of fifty-nine million six hundred thousand dollars (\$59,600,000) for the 2010-2011 fiscal year to begin increasing the salaries of full-time community college faculty and community college professional staff to the national

average.

SECTION 2. This act becomes effective July 1, 2009.

SUMMARY: House Bill 228 would allow an annual refund of state and local sales and use taxes for community colleges.

[As introduced, this bill was identical to S313, as introduced by Sen. Swindell, which is currently in Senate Appropriations/Base Budget.]

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 105-164.14 authorizes certain refunds of the sales and use tax. Subsection (c) specifically authorizes an annual refund of the sales and use tax paid by certain governmental entities on direct purchases of tangible personal property and services, other than electricity, telecommunications services and ancillary services. Certain indirect sales and use liability incurred by the governmental entity related to building materials, supplies, fixtures and equipment which will become a part of a structure owned or leased by the governmental entity are also refundable. The governmental entity must request the refund in writing with required documentation within six months after the end of the governmental entity's fiscal year. The list of current governmental entities includes constituent institutions of The University of North Carolina for certain purchases, and The University of North Carolina Health Care System.

G.S. 105-467(b) provides that the State refund provisions contained in G.S. 105-164.14 apply to the local sales and use tax authorized to be levied and imposed under the Article providing for a first one cent (1¢) local government sales and use tax (Article 39 of Chapter 105).

G.S. 115D-2(2) defines community college as an educational institution operating under the provisions of Chapter 115D dedicated primarily to the educational needs of the service area which it serves, and which may offer freshmen and sophomore courses of a college of arts and sciences, organized credit curricula for the training of technicians, vocational, trade, and technical specialty courses and programs, and courses in general adult education.

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 228 would add community colleges, as defined in G.S. 115D-2, to the list of governmental entities authorized to receive refunds of the state and local sales and use tax.

EFFECTIVE DATE: House Bill 228 would become effective July 1, 2009, and would apply to purchases made on or after that date.

BACKGROUND: This bill is a recommendation of the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee. The Committee found that The University of North Carolina system was made eligible in 2003 for a full refund of the State and local sales and use tax, but that the North Carolina Community College System has not been made eligible for a refund of the State and local sales and use tax.

AN ACT TO CREATE A SALES AND USE TAX REFUND FOR COMMUNITY COLLEGES, AS RECOMMENDED BY THE JOINT LEGISLATIVE EDUCATION OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

 SECTION 1. G.S. 105-164.14(c) is amended by adding a new subdivision to read:

"(c) Certain Governmental Entities. – A governmental entity listed in this subsection is allowed an annual refund of sales and use taxes paid by it under this Article on direct purchases of tangible personal property and services, other than electricity, telecommunications service, and ancillary service. Sales and use tax liability indirectly incurred by a governmental entity on building materials, supplies, fixtures, and equipment that become a part of or annexed to any building or structure that is owned or leased by the governmental entity and is being erected, altered, or repaired for use by the governmental entity is considered a sales or use tax liability incurred on direct purchases by the governmental entity for the purpose of this subsection. A request for a refund must be in writing and must include any information and documentation required by the Secretary. A request for a refund is due within six months after the end of the governmental entity's fiscal year.

This subsection applies only to the following governmental entities:

(20) A constituent institution of The University of North Carolina, but only with respect to sales and use tax paid by it for tangible personal property or services that are eligible for refund under this subsection acquired by it through the expenditure of contract and grant funds.

(20a) A community college as defined in G.S. 115D-2.

(21) The University of North Carolina Health Care System.

SECTION 2. This act becomes effective July 1, 2009, and applies to purchases made on or after that date.

HB 391, AN ACT AUTHORIZING COMMUNITY COLLEGES TO OFFER NONCREDIT COURSES IN SAFE DRIVING TO HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS DURING THE SCHOOL YEAR. Representative Tolson moved for the adoption of an amendment to the bill. The amendment was adopted. Following a brief explanation of the bill by Representative Daughtry and Jim Lawrence of Johnston County and upon motion made by Representative Cleveland, the committee voted for a favorable report as amended, and be re-referred to the Committee on Transportation. Copies of the Bill, the Bill Summary, the Amendment, and the Committee Substitute are attached as part of these minutes.

HJR 485, A JOINT RESOLUTION SETTING THE DATE FOR THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES AND THE SENATE TO ELECT MEMBERS TO THE STATE BOARD OF COMMUNITY COLLEGES. Representative McLawhorn presided while Representative Love explained the bill. Upon motion made by Representative Tolson, the committee voted for a favorable report and recommendation that the Bill be sent straight to the floor of the House. Copies of the Bill and Bill Summary are attached as part of these minutes.

HB 490, AN ACT TO GRANT ADDITIONAL PURCHASING FLEXIBILITY TO COMMUNITY COLLEGES AND TO DIRECT THE STATE BOARD OF COMMUNITY COLLEGES TO STUDY THE NEED FOR FURTHER PURCHASING FLEXIBILITY. Representative Tolson was recognized to explain the bill. He explained that it would allow the Community Colleges to enjoy the same purchasing process that the University system currently employs; a community college can purchase an item at a local establishment if the price is the same or less than the contracted price. Kenneth Briggs, Executive Vice President of Community Colleges, noted that it was not an attempt to discredit Purchasing, but just to enable Community Colleges to purchase locally. The Community Colleges are just asking for the same flexibility as the university system has had for 6 years.

Representative Wilkins moved that the Bill be given a favorable report and recommendation that the bill be re-referred to the Committee on Ways and Means/Broadband Connectivity. This was unanimously approved by the Committee. The Bill and Bill Summary are attached as part of these minutes.

HB 491, AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE COMMUNITY COLLEGES TO TEACH DEVELOPMENTAL COURSES AND COLLEGE SUCCESS SKILLS COURSES AT ANY TIME DURING THE YEAR, INCLUDING THE SUMMER TERM AND TO EARN BUDGET FTE FOR THE COURSES. Representative Tolson moved that the Committee Substitute be approved; he then proceeded to explain the bill. After discussion among the committee members, Representative McLawhorn moved for a favorable report as to the Committee Substitute bill, unfavorable as to the original bill, and recommendation that the committee substitute bill be re-referred to the Committee on Appropriations. The motion was approved. Copies of the Bill, the Bill Summary, and the Committee Substitute are attached as part of these minutes.

HB 492, AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE COMMUNITY COLLEGES TO EARN BUDGET FTE FOR CERTAIN OCCUPATIONAL EXTENSION COURSES. Representative Tolson was recognized to explain the bill. Representative Langdon moved for that the Bill be given a favorable report and recommendation that the bill be re-referred to the Committee on Appropriations. The motion was approved. Copies of the Bill and the Bill Summary are attached as part of these minutes.

There being no further business, Chairman Love adjourned the meeting at 11:40 a.m.

SUMMARY: HB 391 would allow local boards of trustees of community colleges to permit high school students to take noncredit courses in safe driving on a self-supporting basis during the academic year or the summer.

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 115D-1 provides that the major purpose of each community college is to offer vocational and technical education and training and basic, high school level academic education needed in order to profit from vocational and technical education for students who are high school graduates or who are beyond the compulsory attendance age (age 16) and who have left the public schools. Except for specific exceptions provided in statute, high school students and persons under the age of 16 are not permitted to enroll in community college courses.

G.S. 115D-20(4) delegates to the local board of trustees of a community college (local boards) the duty of applying the standards and requirements for admission and graduation of students and other standards established by the State Board of Community Colleges (State Board). Two exceptions are provided in that subdivision.

- Cooperative programs may be established between local administrative boards and local school boards to provide college courses to qualified high school students to earn college credit.
- During the summer quarter, persons less than 16 may be permitted to take noncredit courses on a self-supporting basis, subject to rules of the State Board.

BILL ANALYSIS: HB 391 would add an additional exception to G.S. 115D-20(4) to permit high schools students to take noncredit courses in safe driving on a self-supporting basis during the academic year or the summer, subject to rules of the State Board.

EFFECTIVE DATE: HB 391 would become effective when it becomes law.

SUMMARY: House Joint Resolution 485 would establish Thursday, April 23, 2009, as the date for the House of Representatives and Senate to elect members to the State Board of Community Colleges.

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 115D-2.1(b)(4)(f) sets out the procedure for elections by the House of Representatives and the Senate to the State Board of Community Colleges (State Board). The procedures include the following requirements:

- The Speaker of the House and the President Pro Tempore must assign to a committee of their respective houses the duty of receiving nominations of persons to be considered for election by that house to the State Board.
- Chairs of the assigned committees must jointly determine a nomination period. Each member may nominate only one candidate. A person may not simultaneously be a candidate in both houses.
- Once the nominating period is closed, the assigned committee must vote on whether each
 candidate will be listed as a nominee of the committee. Nominations must be screened by
 the assigned committee as to their qualifications, background, lack of statutory disabilities,
 and willingness and ability to serve if elected. At least one candidate must be nominated by
 the committee for each vacancy; however, if there are sufficient candidates, the committee
 must nominate at least two persons for each vacancy.
- The House of Representative and Senate must fix a common date and time by joint resolution for election of members to the State Board. The committee must report its list of nominees at the election session. No additional nominees are allowed from the floor.
- A nominee is chosen when that person receives the votes of a majority of all members present and voting.

BILL ANALYSIS: As required by G.S. 115D-2.1(b)(4)(f), House Joint Resolution 485 would establish Thursday, April 23, 2009, as the date for election of members to the State Board by the House of Representatives and the Senate.

EFFECTIVE DATE: This joint resolution would become effective upon ratification.

BACKGROUND: Twenty-one members serve on the State Board of Community Colleges in staggered six-year terms, four of which are elected by the House in a staggered election cycle. In 2009, the House must elect two members from the State at-large to six-year terms beginning July 1, 2009. This year, the terms of Mr. Jim W. Daniels and Ms. Anita R. Powers, who were elected by the House of Representatives, will expire on June 30, 2009. Both Mr. Daniels and Ms. Powers are eligible for reelection.

- Permit community colleges purchase flexibility on items that are the same or substantially similar in quality, service, and performance as items available under State term contracts when other current statutory conditions for purchase flexibility are also met.
- Require the State Board of Community Colleges (State Board) to review the purchasing process, consider whether the State Board should have authority to increase the bid value benchmark for individual community colleges, and report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on its findings.

[As introduced, this bill was identical to S419, as introduced by Sen. Clodfelter, which is currently in Senate Education/Higher Education.]

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 115D-58.14 provides for purchasing flexibility for community colleges. Community colleges may purchase the same supplies, equipment, and materials from noncertified sources as are available under State term contracts under the following conditions:

- The purchase price, including delivery cost, is less than the cost under the State term contract; and
- The cost of the purchase does not exceed the bid value benchmark established in G.S. 143-53.1.

The State Board and Department of Administration shall adopt policies and procedures for monitoring implementation.

BILL ANALYSIS: HB 490 would:

- Eliminate the requirement in G.S. 115D-58.14 that items purchased must be the <u>same</u> as items available under State term contracts.
- Create a new condition in G.S. 115D-58.14 that the items purchased must be the <u>same or substantially similar in quality</u>, <u>service</u>, <u>and performance</u> as items available under State term contracts.
- Require the State Board to review the purchasing process for community colleges, and consider whether the State Board should have authority to increase the bid value benchmark for each community college based on the college's overall capabilities, including staff resources, purchasing compliance reviews, and audit reports. The State Board would be required to report the results of the study to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee prior to March 30, 2010.

EFFECTIVE DATE: This act would become effective when it becomes law.

SUMMARY: The Proposed Committee Substitute (PCS) to House Bill 491 would authorize the community colleges to teach developmental courses and college success skills courses at any time during the year, including the summer term, and earn budget FTE for the courses. This bill has a serial referral to Appropriations.

The PCS changed the subsection from "s" to "u".

[As introduced, this bill was identical to S485, as introduced by Sen. Clodfelter, which is currently in Senate Ref to Education/Higher Education. If fav, re-ref to Appropriations/Base Budget.]

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 115D-5 governs the administration of community colleges by the State Board of Community Colleges (State Board). The State Board is authorized to adopt and implement policies, regulations and standards concerning the establishment, administration, and operation of institutions that the State Board deems necessary to insure the quality of educational programs, to promote systematic meeting of educational needs of the State, and to provide for the equitable distribution of State and federal funds to the community colleges.

BILL ANALYSIS: Currently community colleges teach developmental courses and college success skills courses only during the academic year. The PCS to House Bill 491 would allow community colleges to offer these courses during the summer and earn budgeted FTE for the summer courses. Both developmental courses and college success skills courses are non-credit courses. If these courses could be offered in the summer semester it could provide continuous learning opportunities for students needing developmental courses and place them on track in the fall semester.

EFFECTIVE DATE: The act would become effective July 1, 2009.

BACKGROUND: When students go to a community college they are given a placement test to determine their course level. For students who are not ready for college level coursework, developmental courses and college success skills courses are offered. Developmental courses are offered in English, mathematics, and reading, and college success skills courses include study skills that will help students be successful in college level courses.

A pilot program at Central Piedmont Community College indicated that offering developmental courses and college success skills courses during the summer semester helps with retention of students and with increasing the number of students who complete their program of study.

SUMMARY: House Bill 492 would authorize community colleges to earn budget FTE for occupational extension courses taught as part of an approved customized training project when the college pays 50% or more of the instructional costs of providing the courses. The bill also would require community colleges to waive student registration fees and allow the colleges to use customized training funds for the remainder of the costs of the courses.

House Bill 492 has a serial referral to Appropriations.

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 115-5.1 governs workforce development programs. Community colleges are required to assist in the pre-employment and in-service training of employees in industry, business, agriculture, health occupation and governmental agencies. The Customized Training Program within the North Carolina Community College System (System) offers program and training services to assist new and existing business and industry to remain productive, profitable, and within the State. The System president uses specified criteria to determine whether or not a business or industry qualifies to receive assistance under the Customized Training Program.

BILL ANALYSIS: Community colleges currently have the authority under their rules to earn budget FTE when 100% of the instructional cost for providing classes for a company or other entity is paid by the college. If a company or entity reimburses the college for a given class up to 50% of the instructional cost, the college still earns budgeted FTEs.

Customized training courses have not been included in this policy. House Bill 492 would allow colleges to earn budget FTE for occupational extension courses taught as part of an approved customized training project when the college pays 50% or more of the instructional costs of providing the courses.

Colleges would also be required to waive the student registration fees for these courses. In this case, the students are the employees of the companies the colleges are serving.

EFFECTIVE DATE: The act would become effective July 1, 2009.

The House Education Subcommittee on Community Colleges met on Thursday, March 26, 2009, in Room 424 of the Legislative Office Building at 11:00 a.m. The following members were present: Representative Jimmy L. Love, Sr., Chairman; Representatives Alice Bordsen, Bob England, and Marian McLawhorn, Vice Chairs; and Representatives Marilyn Avila, Jerry Dockham, Pat Hurley, James Langdon, Darrell McCormick, Joe Tolson, Ray Warren, and Winkie Wilkins. Staff Counselors Shirley Iorio and Kara McCraw were also in attendance. A Visitor Registration list is attached and made part of these minutes.

Chairman Love called the meeting to order. He recognized pages Woody Horton of Bladen County, sponsored by Representative William Brisson and Kiara Hinton of Guilford County, sponsored by Representative Earl Jones. Representative Love also recognized and thanked Sergeants-at-Arms John Brandon, Reggie Sills, and James Worth for their service.

The following bills were considered:

HB 543, AN ACT TO REPEAL THE PENALTY FOR COMMUNITY COLLEGE AUDIT EXCEPTIONS. Representative Tarleton explained the purpose of the bill and noted that over the last three years, there had been 17 occurrences for 16 colleges for a total of \$52,000.00. Representative McLawhorn questions whether the University and public school systems had the same penalties. Kennon Briggs, Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer, responded to Representative McLawhorn's question noting that the University system does not have such a mechanism. Representative Avila suggested that the errors were not done deliberately to which Representative Tarleton replied that the errors were just mistakes and not done deliberately. Representative McLawhorn moved for a favorable report for HB 543 and that it be re-referred to the Committee on State Government/State Personnel.. The motion was seconded and approved. Copies of the Bill and the Bill Summary are attached as part of these minutes.

HB 573, AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE CLEVELAND COMMUNITY COLLEGE TO ENTER INTO A COLLABORATIVE AGREEMENT WITH THE CLEVELAND COUNTY. Representative McLawhorn moved adoption of the amendment for a title change and rolled into a new Proposed Committee Substitute (PCS). This was seconded and approved. Representative Moore explained the bill. Representative Warren moved for a favorable report on the committee substitute as amended which changes the title, unfavorable as to the original bill, and recommendation that the committee substitute bill be re-referred to the committee on Judiciary II. The motion was seconded and approved. Copies of the Bill, the Bill Summary, the Amendment, and the Committee Substitute are attached as part of these minutes.

Representative Love introduced Bill Ingram and Brenda Rogers from Durham Tech.

Representative Love then noted that the Committee had not yet received any nominations for the State Board of Community Colleges and that April 1, 2009, was the deadline for both the application and the SEI.

The purpose of the annual audit shall be to ensure that college programs and related fiscal operations comply with State law, State regulations, State Board policies, and System Office guidance. The State Board of Community Colleges shall require auditors of community college programs to use a statistically valid sample size in performing program audits of community colleges. All education program audit findings shall be forwarded to the college president, local college board of trustees, the State Board of Community Colleges, and the State Auditor. The State Board shall assess a twenty five percent (25%) fiscal penalty in addition to the audit exception on all audits of both dollars and student membership hours excepted when the audit exceptions result from nonprocessing errors."

SECTION 2. This act is effective when it becomes law.

SUMMARY: House Bill 543 would remove a 25% fiscal penalty for community college audit exceptions.

House Bill 543 has a serial referral to the House State Government/State Personnel Committee.

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 115D-5(m) requires the State Board of Community Colleges (State Board) to maintain an education program auditing function that conducts an annual audit of each community college to ensure that college programs and related fiscal operations comply with State law, State regulations, State Board policies, and System Office guidance. The State Board requires auditors of community college programs to use a statistically valid sample size in performing program audits, and to forward all education program audit findings to the college president, local board of trustees, State Board, and State Auditor.

Currently, the State Board assesses a twenty-five percent (25%) fiscal penalty in addition to the audit exception on all audits of both dollars and student membership hours excepted when the audit exceptions result from non-processing errors.

BILL ANALYSIS: When audit errors are discovered community colleges are required to return 100% of any excess funds they received. They are then charged an additional 25% on top of what they have to return to the general fund. House Bill 543 would repeal the provision in G.S. 115D-5(m) that requires the State Board to assess the 25% fiscal penalty for community college audit exceptions.

EFFECTIVE DATE: The act would become effective when it becomes law.

BACKGROUND: The Community College System has a Program Audit Task Force (Task Force) comprised of a representative sample of community college presidents, chief financial officers, continuing education deans and system office staff which meets periodically to identify and work through program audit issues. The removal of the 25% penalty is a recommendation of this Task Force. The recommendation is endorsed by the Association of Community College Presidents and the State Board of Community Colleges Policy Committee.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 115D-15.1(c), G.S. 143-341(3)a., or any other provision of law pertaining to capital improvements, Cleveland Community College may, in collaboration with Cleveland County, use State grant funds to plan and construct a building on property owned by Cleveland County that is located at 2409 Kings Road in Shelby. The facility shall consist of college classrooms, office space, and multipurpose space. Upon completion of the facility, Cleveland County shall lease the building and the property to Cleveland Community College. The term of the lease shall be equal to the time period required for the county to satisfy the debt service obligations. At the end of the lease term, Cleveland County shall give the building and the property to Cleveland Community College.

If Cleveland County terminates the lease or fails to give the property to the college at the end of the lease term, the county shall reimburse to Cleveland Community College a prorated amount of the State funds provided for the construction.

SECTION 2. Except for G.S. 143-128.2 and G.S. 143-128.3, the provisions of Article 8 of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes shall not apply to the construction of the facility.

SECTION 3. This act is effective when it becomes law.

SUMMARY: House Bill 573 authorizes Cleveland Community College to enter into a collaborative agreement with Cleveland County to use State grant funds to construct a building on property owned by Cleveland County. The building would be leased to Cleveland Community College, and at the end of the lease term transferred from Cleveland County to Cleveland Community College.

[As introduced, this bill was identical to S529, as introduced by Sen. Clary, which is currently in Senate Appropriations/Base Budget.]

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 115D-15.1(c) pertains to acquisition and construction of community college property. The statute provides that, notwithstanding other provisions, the board of trustees of a community college may acquire any interest in real or personal property in the county in which the community college is located or in its service delivery area for use by the board of trustees. The board of trustees may contract for the construction, equipping, expansion, improvement, renovation, repair, or otherwise making available for use by the board of trustees of the community college of all or part of the property upon any terms negotiated between the board of trustees of the community college and the board of county commissioners.

- G.S. 143-341(3)a. pertains to the powers and duties of the Department of Administration regarding the responsibility to examine and approve all plans and specifications for the construction or renovation of:
 - 1. All State buildings or buildings located on State lands, except those buildings over which a local building code inspection department has and exercises jurisdiction; and
 - 2. All community college buildings requiring the estimated expenditure for construction or repair work for which public bidding is required under G.S. 143-129 prior to the awarding of a contract for such work; and to examine and approve all changes in those plans and specifications made after the contract for such work has been awarded.

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 537 provides that, notwithstanding G.S. 115D-15.1 and G.S. 143-341(3)a., provisions related to construction by a community college, or any other provision of law pertaining to capital improvements, Cleveland Community College, in collaboration with Cleveland County, may use State grant funds to plan and construct a building on property owned by Cleveland County in Shelby under the following conditions:

- > The facility must contain college classrooms, office space, and multipurpose space.
- > Upon completion, Cleveland County must lease the building and property to Cleveland Community College. The lease term must equal the time period required for the county to satisfy the debt obligation.
- > At the end of the lease, Cleveland County must give the building and property to Cleveland Community College.
- > If Cleveland County terminates the lease, or fails to give the property to the college at the end of the lease term, the county must reimburse a prorated amount of the State funds provided for construction to Cleveland Community College.

House Bill 537 would also provide that, except for the minority participation provisions, Article 8 of Chapter 143 (the public contracting statutes) would not be applied to the construction of the facility.

EFFECTIVE DATE: House Bill 573 would become effective when it becomes law.

Representative Tarleton was present to explain the bill, noting that there were different building code standards for different building uses. Richard Strickland of the North Carolina Department of Insurance assured the committee that the Department had no problems with the bill. Representative Cleveland moved for a favorable report for HB 543 and that it be re-referred to the Committee on State Government/State Personnel.. The motion was seconded and approved. Copies of the Bill and the Bill Summary are attached as part of these minutes.

Chairman Love introduced the next order of business, the nominations for the State Board of Community Colleges. He stated that the election would be held on Tuesday, April 21, 2009. Kara McCraw of Research explained the procedure: the House has two seats to fill, must have at least 4 nominees but all nominees can be sent to the floor of the House for consideration. Kara noted that an individual could hold one elected office and one appointed office; if someone already held an elected office and was elected to the State Board, he or she would have to give up the other elected office in order to serve. She went on to explain that the top two vote getters would become members of the State Board of Community Colleges. The eight nominees for the State Board of Community Colleges include K. Ray Bailey, sponsored by Representative Bruce Goforth; Barbara A. Baker, sponsored by Representative Bill Faison; Barbara Hudson Harrell, sponsored by Representative Michael Wray; C. Jack Horton, sponsored by Representative Phillip Haire; Vilma Leake, sponsored by Representative Nick Mackey; Samuel C. Powell, sponsored by Representative Alice Bordsen; Anita Powers, sponsored by Representative Russell Tucker; and John F. Watts, sponsored by Representative Ray Warren. Representative Winkie Wilkins moved that all of the candidates be nominated for the ballot sent to the House floor from which two nominees would be elected to serve on the State Board of

Community Colleges. The motion was unanimously adopted. A copy of the slate of nominees with their applications/resumes is attached as part of these minutes.

There being no further business, Chairman Love adjourned the meeting at 11:25 a.m.





I am in receipt of Mr. K. Ray Bailey's March 27, 2009 Statement of Economic Interest as a potential member of the State Board of Community Colleges ("the Board"). I have reviewed it for actual and potential conflicts of interest pursuant to Chapter 138A of the North Carolina General Statutes ("G.S.") also known as the State Government Ethics Act ("the Act").

I did not find an actual conflict of interest nor did I find the potential for a conflict of interest.

The State Board of Community Colleges implements Chapter 115D of the General Statutes, which provides for the establishment, organization, and administration of a statewide system of educational institutions in the form of two-year community colleges. Among other things, the Board recommends the establishment of community colleges after determining that an educational need exists within a proposed administrative area; approves the expenditure of any State funds for capital improvements of existing institutions; develops appropriate criteria and standards to regulate the addition and operation of college transfer programs to institutions; and adopts and executes such policies, regulations, and standards concerning the establishment, administration, and operation of institutions as the Board deems necessary to insure the quality of educational programs, to promote the systematic meeting of educational needs of the State, and to provide for the equitable distribution of State and federal funds to the several institutions:

The Ethics Act establishes ethical standards for certain public servants. G.S. 138A-31 prohibits public servants from using their positions for their financial benefit. G.S. 138A-36(a) prohibits public servants from participating in certain official actions in which they have an economic interest or if the public servant, a member of the public servant's extended family, or a business with which the public servant is associated would otherwise benefit from that action. Finally, G.S. 138A-32 prohibits public servants from accepting gifts, directly or indirectly, from (1) anyone in return for being influenced in the discharge of their official responsibilities, (2) a lobbyist or lobbyist principal, or (3) a person or entity which is doing or seeking to do business with the public servant's agency, is regulated or controlled by





The State Board of Community Colleges implements Chapter 115D of the General Statutes, which provides for the establishment, organization, and administration of a statewide system of educational institutions in the form of two-year community colleges. Among other things, the Board recommends the establishment of community colleges after determining that an educational need exists within a proposed administrative area; approves the expenditure of any State funds for capital improvements of existing institutions; develops appropriate criteria and standards to regulate the addition and operation of college transfer programs to institutions; and adopts and executes such policies, regulations, and standards concerning the establishment, administration, and operation of institutions as the Board deems necessary to insure the quality of educational programs, to promote the systematic meeting of educational needs of the State, and to provide for the equitable distribution of State and federal funds to the several institutions.



Funding concerns prompt service fees, delay independent operation of program

Two new members of the Catawba Valley Community College Board of Trustees took the oath of office Thursday, becoming the first representatives from Alexander County to serve on the board.


Alexander County Commissioner John Watts and Dr. Josephine Foster, who has 44 years experience in education, called the inclusion of Alexander County on the board "a giant step forward" in providing education

idents of all ages. Alexander ty is part of CVCC's twocounty service area.

CVCC President Dr. Cuyler Dunbar presented a recently signed copy of a 20-year lease agreement with Alexander County for a new facility to Watts. The 15,000-square-foot building, off N.C. 16, will soon be renovated to meet educational needs.

Alexander County works with CVCC to supply community college programs to residents. The community college has pledged to give Alexander County funds from its share of the state higher education bond to renovate and restore the new building, purchased last year.

Dr. Ray Lane, vice president of fiscal affairs, announced renovations to the building likely will not be completed until late summer or early fall due to the large number of state building projects currently on the schedule.

The board also approved the temporary housing of the Hickory Metro Sports Commission's Hall of Fame in the college's multipurpose center until a permanent site for the display is obtained.

About a quarter of one wall in the center will be used to display items from the members of the Hall of Fame.

In other motorsports news, Dumbar said a new, private motorsports school in Mooresville, NASCAR Technical Institute, broke ground this week. While the new school's ties to NASCAR are enviable, he said, CVCC's Bobby Isaac Motorsports Technology Program has a different focus than the new school.

CVCC's program focuses.

more on the business operations, fabrications and Winston Cup-type body building aspects of the industry, rather than solely on mechanics.

CVCC does have an automechanic program, which is a different part of the curriculum, and Dunbar said the CVCC programs will be continue to be competitive as the college continues to promote these fields of study.

As state and local funding concerns mount for fiscal year 2001-2002, CVCC approved three new service fees to help offset costs.

Test proctoring for students from other institutions will carry a \$25 fee and an additional \$10 fee for students requiring use of a

computer and/or other special equipment or facilities. Testing fees will be waived for CVCC employees and students enrolled in North Carolina Community College System courses.

Fees will also be charged for MOUS testing and a materials fee for some electrical/electronic maintenance courses.

Dr. Linda Phillips, vice president of academic and student affairs, reported to the board that CVCC is forced to delay independently operating its new radiographic technology (X-ray tech) program due to state budget restrictions.

CVCC began offering the program in collaboration with Forsyth Technical Community College two years ago. Phillips said the program will stay with FTCC for one more year, although CVCC has been ready to take ownership for months.

Informational meetings are scheduled at 4:30 p.m. Thursday and 5:30 p.m. June 6 for anyone interested in the radiography technician program. The one-hour meetings to be held in the Robert E. Paap Building conference room on the CVCC main campus, will include Bruce James, radiography instructor, and Naomi East, chair of health programs, discussing and answering questions about the new program.

The next session of the twoyear associate degree radiography program will begin in the fall.





MINUTES HOUSE EDUCATION SUBCOMMITTEE ON COMMUNITY COLLEGES

April 30, 2009

The House Education Subcommittee on Community Colleges met on Thursday, April 30, 2009, in Room 424 of the Legislative Office Building at 11:00 a.m. The following members were present: Representative Jimmy L. Love, Sr., Chairman; Representatives Alice Bordsen and Marian McLawhorn, Vice Chairs; and Representatives Marilyn Avila, Larry Brown, George Cleveland, Jerry Dockham, Elmer Floyd, Melanie Wade Goodwin, Pat Hurley, James Langdon, Darrell McCormick, Pat McElraft, Joe Tolson, Ray Warren, and Winkie Wilkins. Staff Counselors Shirley Iorio and Kara McCraw were also in attendance. A Visitor Registration list is attached and made part of these minutes.

Chairman Love called the meeting to order. He recognized and thanked Sergeants-at-Arms John Brandon and David Shearon for their service.

The following bills were considered:

HB 698, AN ACT TO AMEND THE UNSTEAD ACT TO PERMIT FAYETTEVILLE TECHNICAL COMMUNITY COLLEGE TO PROPERLY TAKE ADVANTAGE OF CERTAIN INNOVATIVE TECHNOLOGIES. Representative Margaret Dickson explained the purpose of the bill elaborated on the virtual training technology the College planned to use for education and training. She introduced Dr. Larry King, President of Fayetteville Technical Community College who thanked the Committee for their support. Representative Love briefly explained the Umstead Act. Representative Avila wondered why the community colleges were taking the precaution of passing a law that says we are not competing with the Umstead Act. Kara McCraw of the Research Division noted that there would be training curriculum which might be marketed and may also be doing some modeling for private industry. Representative Avila replied that in essence there is a possibility of a conflict with general business, to which Kara McCraw replied that there was a potential for that. Representative Floyd moved for a favorable report for HB 698 and that it be re-referred to the Committee on Commerce, Small Business, and Entrepreneurship. The motion was seconded and approved. Copies of the Bill and the Bill Summary are attached as part of these minutes.

HB 808, AN ACT DIRECTING THE STATE BOARD OF COMMUNITY COLLEGES TO STUDY STRATEGIES FOR MAKING THE CONSTRUCTION PROCESS FOR COMMUNITY COLLEGE FACILITIES MORE EFFICIENT. Representative Jerry Dockham briefly explained the bill, noting that it was introduced at the request of the president of Piedmont Community College in order to simplify and speed up the construction process on community college campuses. Dr. Stephen Scott, President, Wake Technical Community College, and President of the North Carolina Association of Community College Presidents, explained that the community colleges were experiencing significant growth in enrollment and needed to build quickly. He stated that there are a number of duplicative steps the community colleges needed to go through which slowed the process down and that they had been working with the Department of Administration on this bill and had reached an agreement on the wording. Representative Goodwin wanted to make certain that there were safeguards in place to preserve the safety requirements that are the purview of the State

Instruction Office and the Department of Insurance in approving plans. If a building collapses or burns down or something happens, Representative Goodwin stated that she wanted to make sure everyone was covered and the State won't end up being sued because community colleges tried to short circuit the safety process. Representative McCormick wondered if there weren't existing building that could be used, especially if the need was immediate, and a process by which already available buildings could be used or could they just not be brought up to safety standards. President Scott agreed that there were some issues especially when dealing with high school-aged students coming to the campuses. There are some facilities that meet the needs for adults but do not meet the needs for high school-aged students. Representative Avila moved for a favorable report for HB 808 and that it be re-referred to the Committee on State Government/State Personnel. The motion was seconded and approved. A copy of the Bill and Bill Summary are attached as part of these minutes.

There being no further business, Chairman Love adjourned the meeting at 11:15 a.m.

SUMMARY: HB 698 would create an exception to the Umstead Act to permit the use of personnel, equipment and facilities relating to Interactive Three Dimensional (Advanced Visualization) technology and Tele-presence technology at Fayetteville Technical Community College.

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 66-58 provides that units, departments, and agencies of State government may not engage in the sale of merchandise or services in competition with private enterprise. The statute also provides a number of exceptions to the general rule.

BILL ANALYSIS: HB 698 would create an exception to G.S. 66-58 to permit the use of personnel, equipment, and facilities relating to Interactive Three Dimensional (Advanced Visualization) technology and Tele-Presence technology at Fayetteville Technical Community College. Proceeds generated must be used to either continue the function of the program or support the educational mission of the school.

EFFECTIVE DATE: HB 698 would become effective when it becomes law.

BACKGROUND: The Advanced Visualization and Interactive Design Center at Fayetteville Technical Community College includes a number of laboratories housing equipment used to created interactive three-dimensional objects, immersive learning modules, and simulation based learning.

SUMMARY: House Bill 808 would require the State Board of Community Colleges to study the construction process for community college facilities.

House Bill 808 has a serial referral to the State Government/State Personnel Committee.

[As introduced, this bill was identical to S418, as introduced by Sen. Clodfelter, which is currently in Rules and Operations of the Senate.]

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 808 would require the State Board of Community Colleges (Board) to review the construction process for community college facilities and study strategies for making the process more efficient. The Board would consider at least the following:

- The capacity of the various community colleges to construct capital facilities without oversight by the Office of State Construction;
- The appropriateness of increasing the cost threshold at which oversight by the Office of State Construction is required for some or all of the community colleges; and
- The need for oversight by the Office of State Construction in counties with an effective county review process.

The Board would report the results of its study to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee prior to March 30, 2010.

EFFECTIVE DATE: The act would become effective when it becomes law.

BACKGROUND:

Chapter 115D of the North Carolina General Statutes is the authority under which the State Board of Community Colleges (State Board) manages the North Carolina Community College System. The State Board has the responsibility to approve sites and building plans for all colleges, regardless of source of funds, under G.S. 115D-5; to approve the sale, exchange, or lease of property under G.S. 115D-15; to approve the acquisition of property under G.S. 115D-20; and to allocate construction grants from state funds under G.S. 115D-31. The North Carolina Administrative Code, under 23 NCAC 02D .0600 "Capital Construction", provides further authority under which the State Board, the Colleges, and the System Office operate.

The State Construction Office (SCO) has, under G.S. 143-341, the responsibility of approving all community college construction projects meeting the minimum expenditure amount for which public bidding is required under G.S. 143-129. The SCO also operates under the authority of 01 NCAC 30A of the North Carolina Administrative Code.

The State Building Commission (SBC) is a statutory body authorized under Article 8B of G.S. 143-135 to perform many duties with regard to the State's capital improvement program. In limited situations, the SBC has authority over community colleges. The SBC also operates under the authority of 01 NCAC 30D of the North Carolina Administrative Code.¹


