Whereas, the NAACP's founders consisted of a multiracial group of activists, including Ida Wells-Barnett, W.E.B. DuBois, Henry Moscowitz, Mary White Ovington, Oswald Garrison Villiard, and William English Walling; and

Whereas, the NAACP's mission is to ensure the political, educational, social, and economic equality of rights of all persons and to eliminate racial hatred and racial discrimination; and

Whereas, according to the NAACP's constitution, some of the organization's objectives include removing all barriers of racial discrimination through democratic processes; seeking enactment and enforcement of federal, state, and local laws securing civil rights; and informing the public of the adverse effects of racial discrimination and how to take lawful action to help eliminate racial discrimination; and

Whereas, for 100 years, the NAACP has led public demonstrations and joined court battles to bring about awareness of racial and other injustices; and

Whereas, the NAACP will observe its 100th anniversary through activities planned throughout the year and ending with its annual convention in 2010; and

Whereas, the NAACP has more than 1,700 units nationwide, and its members actively participate in a number of programs that focus on the mission of the NAACP; and

Whereas, Rev. Dr. William J. Barber II serves as President of the North Carolina NAACP and is committed to improving the civil rights of everyone in the State; Now, therefore,

Whereas, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) was founded on February 12, 1909, the centennial of Abraham Lincoln's birth, by a multiracial group of distinguished leaders, including Ida Wells-Barnett, W.E.B. DuBois, Henry Moscowitz, Mary White Ovington, Oswald Garrison Villiard, and William English Walling; and
Whereas, the NAACP is the oldest and largest civil rights organization in the United
States; and Whereas, the NAACP's mission is to ensure the political, educational, social, and economic equality of rights of all persons and to eliminate racial hatred and racial discrimination; and
Whereas, according to the NAACP's constitution, the principal objectives of the
Association are:
(1) To ensure the political, educational, social, and economic equality of all citizens.
(2) To achieve equality of rights and eliminate race prejudice among the citizens of the United States.
 (3) To remove all barriers of racial discrimination through democratic processes. (4) To seek enactment and enforcement of federal, state, and local laws securing civil rights.
(5) To inform the public of the adverse effects of racial discrimination and to seek its elimination.
(6) To educate persons as to their constitutional rights and to take all lawful action to secure the exercise thereof, and to take any other lawful action in furtherance of these objectives, consistent with the NAACP's Articles of Incorporation and its Constitution; and
Whereas, the NAACP advances its mission through the press, the petition, the
ballot, and the courts; and
Whereas, the NAACP has been persistent in achieving its goals through
nonviolence, using effective means such as lobbying, demonstrations, and marches; and
Whereas, after years of fighting segregation in public schools, the NAACP's



lawyers, led by Thurgood Marshall, won a great legal victory in the Supreme Court's 1954

Whereas, Roger Bone was born in 1939 in Nash County to R. Winslow Bone and the late Etna-Wayne Coppedge Bone; and

Whereas, Roger Bone graduated from North Carolina State University in 1961 with a BS degree in Agricultural Business; and

Whereas, after college, Roger Bone began working for the Flue-Cured Tobacco Stabilization Corporation, where he was an administrative assistant; and

Whereas, in 1968, Roger Bone became President of an International Harvester tractor and farm-machinery dealership in Rocky Mount and later served as President of Bone International, a used car dealership; and

Whereas, Roger Bone served one term in the North Carolina General Assembly during the 1979 Session as a member of the House of Representatives, where he represented Nash, Edgecombe, and Wilson counties; and

Whereas, Roger Bone later served as a legislative assistant to Liston Ramsey, Speaker of the House of Representatives, and as a government affairs assistant with the Department of Community Colleges; and

Whereas, in 1987, Roger Bone established Bone and Associates, a governmental relations firm, and successfully lobbied on behalf of many industries, including propane, pork producers, community colleges, used automobiles, tobacco, adult-care homes, volunteer firefighters, and pharmaceuticals; and

Whereas, Roger Bone was often ranked as one of the top three lobbyists in terms of effectiveness and, in 2008, was recognized as the most influential lobbyist in the State by the North Carolina Center for Public Policy; and

Whereas, Roger Bone was active in his community serving as President of the Jaycees and Rotary Club; and

Whereas, Roger Bone also found time to serve on numerous boards and organizations, including the Nash Community College Foundation Board, North Carolina 4-H Development Fund Board, North Carolina State University Physical and Math Sciences





1	Foundation Board, North Carolina Environmental Management Commission, and the North
2	Carolina State University College of Agriculture & Life Sciences Board; and

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives:

SECTION 1. The permanent rules of the Regular Sessions of the House of Representatives of the 2009 General Assembly are:

I. Order of Business

RULE 1. Convening Hour, Limitation on Friday, Night, and Sunday Legislative Sessions. – The House shall convene each legislative day at the hour fixed by the House. In the event the House adjourns on the preceding legislative day without having fixed an hour for reconvening, the House shall convene on the next legislative day at 2:00 P.M. During January and February of 2009, no sessions may be held on Friday. Without leave of the House, no session shall continue after 10:00 P.M. on Monday nor after 9:00 P.M. on any other days, and the Speaker shall adjourn the House without motion at that point, except that a motion may be made as to the time and day of next convening. No session shall be held on Sunday.

RULE 1.1 Emergencies. In the event of a disaster, natural or otherwise, that precludes the General Assembly from meeting in the Legislative Building, the members will be notified by the Speaker where and when the House will convene.

RULE 2. Opening the Session. — At the convening hour on each legislative day, the Speaker shall call the members to order and shall have the session opened with prayer. At the convening hour on the first day of each legislative week, the Speaker, or the Speaker's designee, shall lead the members in the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag.

RULE 3. Quorum. – (a) A quorum consists of a majority of the qualified members of the House.

(b) Should the point of a quorum be raised, the doors shall be closed, and the Clerk shall call the roll of the House, after which the names of those not responding shall again be called. In the absence of a quorum, 15 members are authorized to compel the attendance of



absent members and may order that absentees for whom no sufficient excuses are made be taken into custody wherever they may be found by special messenger appointed for that purpose.

- RULE 4. Approval of Journal. (a) The Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House shall cause the Journal of the House to be examined daily before the hour of convening to determine if the proceedings of the previous day have been correctly recorded.
- (b) Immediately following the opening prayer and upon appearance of a quorum, the Speaker shall call for the Journal report by the Chair of the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House, or by a Representative designated by the Chair, as to whether the proceedings of the previous day have been correctly recorded. Without objection, the Speaker shall cause the Journal to stand approved.
- RULE 5. Order of Business of the Day. After the approval of the Journal of the preceding day, unless otherwise ordered by the Speaker, the House shall proceed to business in the following order:
 - (1) The receiving of petitions, memorials, and papers addressed to the General Assembly or to the House;
 - (1a) Messages from the Governor;
 - (2) Ratification of bills;
 - (3) Reports of standing committees and permanent subcommittees;
 - (4) Reports of select committees;
 - (5) Reports of referral by standing committee chairs of bills to permanent subcommittees;
 - (6) First reading and reference to committee of bills and resolutions;
 - (7) Messages from the Senate;
 - (8) Concurrence with Senate amendments or Senate committee substitutes;
 - (9) The unfinished business of the preceding day;
 - (10) Calendar (each category in accordance with Rule 40):
 - a. Local bills (roll call), third reading
 - b. Local bills (roll call), second reading
 - c. Local bills, third reading
 - d. Local bills, second reading
 - e. Public bills (roll call), third reading
 - f. Public bills (roll call), second reading
 - g. Public bills and resolutions, third reading
 - h. Public bills and resolutions, second reading;
 - (11) Reading of notices and announcements.

II. Conduct of Debate

RULE 6. Duties and Powers of the Speaker. — The Speaker shall have general direction of the Hall. The Speaker may name any member to perform the duties of the chair, but substitution shall not extend beyond one day, except in the case of sickness or by leave of the House. If the Speaker is absent and has not designated a member to perform the duties of the chair, the Principal Clerk shall preside during such absence. In the case of a vacancy in the office of the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Principal Clerk shall preside over the House until the House elects a Speaker.

- RULE 7. Obtaining Floor. (a) When any member desires recognition for any purpose, the member shall rise and respectfully address the Speaker. No member shall proceed until recognized by the Speaker for a purpose.
- (b) When a member desires to interrupt a member having the floor, the member shall first obtain recognition by the Speaker and permission of the member occupying the floor, and when such recognition and permission have been obtained, he or she may propound a

question to the member occupying the floor; but he or she shall not otherwise interrupt the member having the floor, except as provided in subsection (c) of this rule; and the Speaker shall, without the point of order being raised, enforce this rule.

- (c) A member who has obtained the floor may be interrupted only for the following reasons:
 - (1) A request that the member speaking yield for a question,
 - (2) A point of order,
 - (3) A parliamentary inquiry, or
 - (4) A question of privilege.

RULE 8. Questions of Privilege. — Upon recognition by the Speaker for that purpose, any member may speak to a question of privilege for a time not to exceed three minutes. Questions of privilege shall be those affecting, first, the rights of the House collectively, its safety, dignity, and the integrity of its proceedings; second, the rights, reputation, and conduct of members, individually, in their representative capacity only; and shall have precedence over all other questions, except motions to adjourn. Privilege may not be used to explain a vote or debate a bill. The Speaker shall determine if the question is one of privilege and shall, without the point of order being raised, enforce this rule.

RULE 9. Points of Order. — (a) The Speaker shall decide questions of order and may speak to points of order in preference to other members arising from their seats for that purpose. Any member may appeal from the ruling of the chair on questions of order; on such appeal no member may speak more than once, unless by leave of the House. A two-thirds vote of the members present shall be necessary to sustain any appeal from the ruling of the chair.

(b) When the Speaker calls a member to order, the member shall be seated, except that a member called to order may clear a matter of fact, or explain, but shall not proceed in debate so long as the decision stands. If the member appeals from the ruling of the chair and the decision by a two-thirds vote of the members present be in favor of the member called to order, the member may proceed; if otherwise, the member shall not; and if the case, in the judgment of the House, requires it, the member shall be liable to censure by the House.

RULE 10. Limitations on Debate. - (a) No member shall speak on, debate, or solicit cosponsors for a bill or resolution at its first reading.

- (b) No member shall speak more than twice on the main question nor longer than 20 minutes for the first speech and 10 minutes for the second speech; nor shall the member speak more than twice upon an amendment or motion to reconsider, re-refer, appeal, or postpone or any motion on concurrence, and then not longer than 10 minutes for the first speech and five minutes for the second speech.
- (c) A member may speak only once and for not more than 20 minutes on the question of the adoption of a minority report.
- (d) The House, by consent of a majority of the members present, may suspend the operation of subsections (b) and (c) of this rule during any debate on any particular question before the House.

RULE 11. Reading of Papers. – When there is a call for the reading of the text of a paper which has been presented to the House and there is objection to such reading, the question shall be determined by a majority vote of the members of the House present. Except for protests permitted by the Constitution, no member may have material printed in the Journal until said material has been presented to the House and the printing approved by the House, and said material shall not exceed 1,000 words.

RULE 12. General Decorum. – (a) The Speaker shall preserve order and decorum.

(b) Decency of speech shall be observed and disrespect to personalities carefully avoided.



- (c) When the Speaker is putting any question, or addressing the House, no person shall speak, stand up, walk out of, or cross the House nor, when a member is speaking, engage in disruptive discourse or pass between the member and the chair.
- (d) Food or beverages shall not be permitted on the floor of the House during the first two hours of the daily session.
- (e) The reading of newspapers shall not be permitted on the floor of the House while the House is in session.
- (f) Smoking shall not be permitted on the floor of the House or in the galleries at any time. The consumption of food or beverages shall not be permitted in the galleries at any time.
- (g) Special recitals and performances by musicians or other groups shall not be permitted on the floor of the House; and special guests of members of the House shall not be permitted on the floor of the House.
- (h) Members shall observe appropriate attire, coat and tie for male members and dignified dress for female members.
 - (i) The use of wireless telephones shall not be permitted in the House Chamber.
- (j) Placards, stickers, or signs not approved by the Speaker are not permitted in the House Chamber.

III. Motions

RULE 13. Motions Generally. - (a) Every motion shall be reduced to writing if the Speaker or any two members request it. No motion relating to a bill shall be in order which does not identify the bill by its number and short title.

- (b) When a motion is made, it shall be stated by the Speaker, or, if written, it shall be handed to the chair and read aloud by the Speaker or Clerk before debate.
- (c) After a motion has been stated by the Speaker or read by the Speaker or Clerk, it shall be in the possession of the House; but it may be withdrawn before a decision or amendment, except in case of a motion to reconsider, which motion, when made by a member, shall be in possession of the House and shall not be withdrawn without leave of the House.

RULE 14. Motions, Order of Precedence. – When there are motions before the House, the order of precedence is as follows:

To adjourn.

To recess.

To lay on the table.

Previous question.

To postpone indefinitely.

To reconsider.

To postpone to a day certain.

To re-refer.

To amend an amendment.

To amend.

To pass the bill.

No motion to lay on the table, to postpone indefinitely, to postpone to a day certain, to re-refer, or to make a particular amendment, being decided, shall be again allowed at the same stage of the bill or proposition.

RULE 15. Motion to Adjourn. - (a) A motion to adjourn shall be seconded before the motion is put to the vote of the House.

(b) A motion to adjourn shall be decided without debate and shall always be in order, except when the House is voting or some member is speaking; but a motion to adjourn shall not follow a motion to adjourn until debate or some other business of the House has intervened.

RULE 16. Motion to Table. - (a) A motion to table shall be seconded before the motion is put to the vote of the House and is in order except when a motion to adjourn or to recess is before the House.

- (b) A motion to table shall be decided without debate.
- . (c) A motion to table a bill shall constitute a motion to table the bill and all amendments thereto.
- (d) When the question before the House is the adoption of an amendment to a bill or resolution, a motion to table the bill is not in order; and a motion to table an amendment applies to the amendment only, and the motion may not expressly or by implication or construction be expanded to include a motion to table the bill also.
- (e) When a question has been tabled, it shall not thereafter be considered except on motion to reconsider under Rule 18 or to remove from the table approved by a two-thirds vote.

RULE 17. Motion to Postpone Indefinitely. — A motion to postpone indefinitely is in order except when a motion to adjourn or to lay on the table or for the previous question or to recess is before the House. However, after one motion to postpone indefinitely has been decided, another motion to postpone indefinitely shall not be allowed at the same stage of the bill or proposition. When a question has been postponed indefinitely, it shall not thereafter be considered except on motion to reconsider under Rule 18 or to place on the favorable calendar approved by a two-thirds vote.

RULE 18. Motion to Reconsider. - (a) When a question has been decided, it is in order for any member to move for the reconsideration thereof on the same or the succeeding legislative day; provided that if the vote by which the motion was originally decided was taken by a recorded vote, only a member of the prevailing side may move for reconsideration.

- (b) A motion to reconsider shall be determined by a majority vote, except the following shall require a two-thirds vote: a second or subsequent motion to reconsider and a motion to reconsider:
 - (1) A vote upon a motion to table,
 - (2) A motion to postpone indefinitely,
 - (3) A motion to remove a bill from the unfavorable calendar,
 - (4) A motion that a bill be read twice on the same day, or
 - (5) A motion to remove from the table.
- (c) A motion to reconsider the vote by which a person has been elected as Speaker or Speaker Pro Tempore shall not be in order. This subsection of this rule cannot be suspended.

RULE 19. Previous Question. – (a) The previous question may be called only by:

- (1) The Chair of the Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House:
- (2) The Majority Leader;
- (3) The member submitting the report on the bill or other matter under consideration;
- (4) The member introducing the bill or other matter under consideration; or
- (5) The member in charge of the measure, who shall be designated by the chair of the standing committee or permanent subcommittee reporting the same to the House at the time the bill or other matter under consideration is reported to the House or taken up for consideration.
- (b) The previous question shall be as follows: "Shall the main question now be put?" When the call for the previous question has been decided in the affirmative by a majority vote of the House, the question is on the passage of the bill, resolution, or other matter under consideration.



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- (c) The call for the previous question shall preclude all motions, amendments, and debate, except the motion to adjourn, motion to recess, or motion to table.
- (d) If the previous question is decided in the negative, the question remains under debate.

IV. Voting

RULE 20. Use of Electronic Voting System. – (a) Votes on the following questions shall be taken on the electronic voting system, and the ayes and noes shall be recorded on the Journal:

- (1) The passage as required by Article II, Section 23 of the North Carolina Constitution on second and third readings of any bill:
 - a. Raising money on the credit of the State,
 - b. Pledging the faith of the State for the payment of a debt,
 - c. Imposing a State tax, or
 - d. Authorizing a county, municipality, or other local governmental unit
 - 1. Raise money on its credit,
 - 2. Pledge its faith for the payment of a debt, or
 - 3. Impose a local tax.
- (2) All measures affecting a fee imposed by the State or any subdivision thereof.
- (3) All questions on which a call for the ayes and noes under Rule 24(a) and Article II, Section 19 of the North Carolina Constitution has been sustained.
- (4) Both second and third readings of bills proposing amendment of the North Carolina Constitution or ratifying resolutions amending the United States Constitution.
- (5) The passage of a bill notwithstanding the Governor's veto thereof pursuant to Article II, Section 22 of the North Carolina Constitution.
- (b) Votes on the following questions shall be taken on the electronic voting

system:

- (1) Second reading of all public bills, all amendments to public bills offered after second reading, third reading if a public bill was amended after second reading or if the reading occurs on a day or days following the second reading, all conference reports on public bills, all motions to lay public bills on the table, and all motions to postpone public bills indefinitely.
- (2) Upon a call for division.
- (3) Any other question upon direction of the Speaker or upon motion of any member supported by one-fifth of the members present.
- (c) When the electronic voting system is used, 15 seconds shall be allowed for voting on the question before the House, unless the chair shall direct otherwise. Once the system is locked, the vote shall be recorded and printed.
- (d) The voting station at each member's desk in the Chamber shall be used only by the member to which the station is assigned. Under no circumstances shall any other person vote at a member's station. It is a breach of the ethical obligation of a member either to request that another person vote at the requesting member's station or to vote at another member's station. The Speaker shall enforce this rule without exception.
- (e) When the electronic voting system is used, the Speaker shall state the question and shall then state substantially the following: "All in favor vote 'aye'; all opposed vote 'no'; the Clerk will open the vote." In order to have the vote recorded, the member must vote by the electronic voting system within the time allowed for that vote, unless the voting station assigned to a member is malfunctioning. The Speaker shall enforce this rule without exception. After the allotted time for voting has elapsed, the Speaker shall say: "The Clerk will



 now lock the machine and record the vote." After the machine is locked and the vote recorded, the Speaker shall announce the vote and declare the result.

- (f) One copy of the machine printout of the vote record of all votes taken on the electronic voting system shall be filed in the office of the Principal Clerk, and two copies shall be filed in the Legislative Library where the copies shall be open to public inspection. A legible copy of the bill, amendment, or motion on which the vote was taken shall be filed with the printout of the vote in the Legislative Library.
- before a vote is taken or while a vote is being taken on the electronic voting system, the Speaker shall announce that fact to the House, and any partial electronic voting system voting record shall be voided. In such a case, if the North Carolina Constitution or the Rules of the House require a call of the ayes and noes, the Clerk shall call the roll of the House, and the ayes and noes shall be taken manually and shall be recorded on the Journal. All roll call votes shall be taken alphabetically. If, after a vote is taken on the electronic voting system, it is discovered that a malfunction caused an error in the electronic voting system printout, the Speaker shall direct the Reading Clerk and the Principal Clerk to verify and correct the printout record and so advise the House.
- (h) For the purpose of identifying motions on which the vote is taken on the electronic voting system, the motions are coded as follows:
 - (1) To adjourn.
 - (2) To recess.
 - (3) To lay on the table.
 - (4) Previous question.
 - (5) To postpone indefinitely.
 - (6) To reconsider.
 - (7) To postpone to a day certain.
 - (8) To re-refer.
 - (9) To amend an amendment.
 - (10) To amend.
 - (11) To concur or not concur.
 - (12) Miscellaneous.

RULE 21. Voice Votes; Stating Questions. – (a) All other votes except those required to be taken on the electronic voting system shall be taken by voice vote.

- (b) When a voice vote is taken, the Speaker shall put the question substantially as follows: "Those in favor (as the question may be) will say 'Aye,'" and after the affirmative voice has been expressed, "Those opposed will say 'No.""
- (c) No statement, explanation, debate, motion, parliamentary inquiry, or point of order shall be allowed once the voice vote has begun. Any point of order or parliamentary inquiry may be raised, however, after the completion of the vote.
- RULE 22. **Determining Questions.** (a) Unless otherwise provided by the Constitution of North Carolina or by these rules, all questions shall be determined by a simple majority of the members present and voting.
- (b) No member may vote unless the member is in the Chamber when the question is put. This subsection of this rule cannot be suspended.
- RULE 23. Voting by Division. Any member may call for a division of the members upon the question before the result of the vote has been announced. Upon a call for a division, the Speaker shall cause the number voting in the affirmative and in the negative to be determined. Upon a division and count of the House on any question, no member away from the member's seat shall be counted.

RULE 24. Roll Call Vote. - (a) Before a question is put, any member may call for the ayes and noes. If the call is sustained by one-fifth of the members present, the question shall be decided by the ayes and noes upon a roll call vote.

(b) Every member who is in the Hall of the House when the question is put shall vote upon a call of the ayes and noes, unless excused pursuant to Rule 24.1A.

RULE 24.1A. Excuse From Deliberations and Voting on a Bill. – (a) Any member shall, upon request, be excused in advance from the deliberations and voting on a particular bill at any time that the reason for the request arises in the proceedings on the bill.

- (b) The member may make a brief oral statement of the reasons for making the request. The member may provide to the Principal Clerk, on a form provided by the Clerk, a concise written statement of the reason for the request, and the Clerk shall include this statement in the Journal.
- (c) The member so excused shall not debate the bill or any amendment to the bill, vote on the bill, offer or vote on any amendment to the bill, or offer or vote on any motion concerning the bill, in committee or on the floor of the House at any reading, or any subsequent consideration of the bill.
- (d) A member may request that his or her excuse from deliberations on a particular bill be withdrawn.

RULE 24.1B. **Division of Amendments.** — Any member may call for an amendment to be divided into two or more amendments to be voted on separately, and the Speaker shall determine whether the amendment admits of such a division.

RULE 25. Voting by Speaker. — In all elections the Speaker may vote. In all other instances the Speaker may vote or may reserve this right until there is a tie in which event the Speaker may vote; but in no instance may the Speaker vote twice on the same question.

V. Committees

- RULE 26. Standing Committees and Permanent Subcommittees Generally. —
 (a) The Speaker shall appoint a chair, or cochairs, of every standing committee, permanent subcommittee, and select committee, if any. In the construction of these rules, the word "chair" as applied to a committee extends to and includes a cochair of the committee. The Speaker shall have the exclusive right and authority to establish select committees, but this does not exclude the right of the House by resolution to establish select committees.
- (b) All permanent subcommittees of each standing committee shall be appointed by the Speaker, and the members appointed, along with the chair of the standing committee, shall constitute the standing committee of which the permanent subcommittee is a part. The Speaker shall appoint all members of permanent subcommittees at the beginning of the first regular session in a manner to reflect the partisan membership of the House.
- (c) The Speaker shall appoint the members of all standing committees having no permanent subcommittees at the beginning of the first regular session in a manner to reflect the partisan membership of the House.
- (d) Before appointing members of committees and subcommittees, the Speaker shall consult with the minority leader. The Speaker shall consider members' committee preferences in making appointments.
- (e) The Speaker may not appoint new members to committees or permanent subcommittees after April 15 of an odd-numbered year or at any time during an even-numbered year except to fill vacancies caused by the resignation, death, removal, or inability to serve of a member. As to select committees established after March 1 of an odd-numbered year or during an even-numbered year, the Speaker may not appoint new members more than 60 calendar days after the select committee is established, except to fill vacancies caused by the resignation, death, removal, or inability to serve of a member.
- (f) Each chair of a permanent subcommittee shall be a vice-chair of the standing committee of which it is a permanent subcommittee. The Speaker may name other members as

vice-chairs of the standing committee. The Speaker may name one or more vice-chairs for any standing committee not having permanent subcommittees.

- (g) A maximum of two chairs of a standing committee are entitled to vote in a permanent subcommittee of the standing committee.
- (h) Either the chair or acting chair, designated by the chair or by the Speaker, and five other members of the standing committee or permanent subcommittee, or a majority of the standing committee or permanent subcommittee, whichever is fewer, shall constitute a quorum of that standing committee or permanent subcommittee.
- (i) In any joint meeting of the Senate and House committees or subcommittees, the House standing committee or permanent subcommittee reserves the right to vote separately.

RULE 26.1. Mentions of Standing Committee Includes Select Committee. – Any reference in these rules to standing committees shall extend to select committees unless the context requires otherwise.

RULE 27. List of Standing Committees and Permanent Subcommittees. – The standing committees and permanent subcommittees thereof are:

RULE 28. Standing Committee and Permanent Subcommittee Meetings. – (a) Standing committees and permanent subcommittees of standing committees shall be furnished with suitable meeting places pursuant to a schedule established by the Chair of the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House. Select committees shall be furnished with suitable meeting places as their needs require by the Chair of the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House.

- (b) Subject to the provisions of subsection (c) of this rule, standing committees and permanent subcommittees thereof shall permit other members of the General Assembly, the press, and the general public to attend all sessions of said standing committees or permanent subcommittees.
- (c) The Chair or other presiding officer shall have general direction of the meeting place of the standing committee or permanent subcommittee, and, in case of any disturbance or disorderly conduct therein, or if the peace, good order, and proper conduct of the legislative business is hindered by any person or persons, the Chair or presiding officer shall have power to exclude from the session any individual or individuals so hindering the legislative business.
- (d) Procedure in the standing committees and permanent subcommittees shall be governed by the rules of the House, so far as the same may be applicable to such procedure. Before a question is put, any member may call for the ayes and noes. If the call is sustained by one-fifth of the members present, the question shall be decided by the ayes and noes upon a roll call vote. All roll call votes shall be taken alphabetically and shall be subject to Rule 21(c).
- (e) No standing committee or permanent subcommittee shall meet on any day when the House shall not convene except by permission of the Speaker or by approval of the House by resolution adopted by a majority vote of the House.
- (f) No standing committee or permanent subcommittee shall meet during any session of the House. Standing committees and permanent subcommittees shall meet at their regularly scheduled hour. No permanent subcommittee shall meet at the same time that its standing committee is meeting. Standing committees and permanent subcommittees may meet at other times as authorized by the Chair of the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House in order to assure the availability of the meeting room and that no conflicts will exist with the meetings of other bodies. All standing committee and permanent subcommittee meetings shall adjourn no later than:
 - (1) 15 minutes preceding a regular session of the House, and
 - (2) 10 minutes preceding the hour of the next regularly scheduled standing committee or permanent subcommittee meeting.
- (g) Any call or notice of a standing committee or permanent subcommittee meeting between legislative sessions shall be mailed to each member of the standing committee or permanent subcommittee at least five days prior to such meeting. If a member of the body so requests in writing to the chair of the standing committee or permanent subcommittee, the member shall be notified by certified mail of the meetings.
- (h) During standing committee and permanent subcommittee meetings, the chair may exercise the right to vote, or may reserve this right until there is a tie, in which event the chair may vote, but in no instance may the chair vote twice on the same question.
- RULE 28.1. Ethics Committee Investigations Into Violations of the Open Meetings Law. (a) On its own motion, or in response to signed and sworn complaint of any individual filed with the Standing Committee on Ethics, the Committee shall inquire into any alleged violation by members of the House of the Open Meetings Law (Article 33C of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes), as the same may be amended in the future.
- (b) If, after such preliminary investigation as it may make, the Committee determines to proceed with an inquiry into the conduct of any individual, the Committee shall notify the individual as to the fact of the inquiry and the charges against the individual and shall

 schedule one or more hearings on the matter. The individual shall have the right to present evidence, cross-examine witnesses, and be represented by counsel at any hearings.

- (c) After the Committee has concluded its inquiries into the alleged violations, the Committee shall dispose of the matter by taking one of the following actions:
 - (1) Dismiss the complaint and take no further action.
 - (2) Issue a private letter of reprimand to the legislator, if the legislator unintentionally violated the provisions of the Open Meetings Law.
 - (3) Issue a public letter of reprimand if the violation of the Open Meetings Law was intentional or if the legislator has previously received a private letter of reprimand. The Chair of the Committee on Ethics shall have the public letter of reprimand spread on the pages of the House Journal.
 - (4) Refer the matter to the House for appropriate action.

RULE 29. Notice of Standing Committee and Permanent Subcommittee Meetings and Hearings. — Public notice of all standing committee and permanent subcommittee meetings shall be given in the House. The chair of the standing committee or permanent subcommittee shall notify or cause to be notified the sponsor of each bill which is set for hearing or consideration before the standing committee or permanent subcommittee as to the date, time, and place of that meeting.

RULE 29.1. **Public Hearings.** – (a) Requests for a public hearing shall be made in writing to the chair of the standing committee and, if applicable, the chair of the permanent subcommittee to which the bill has been referred. The chair of the standing committee may schedule a public hearing by the standing committee as a whole after the adjournment of a regular daily House session. The chair of the permanent subcommittee may schedule a public hearing before the permanent subcommittee at its regularly scheduled hour. Denial of a request made by a House member may be appealed to the Speaker.

Notice shall be given not less than five calendar days prior to public hearings. These notices shall be issued as information for the press and shall be posted in the places designated by the Principal Clerk.

(b) Persons desiring to appear and be heard at a public hearing shall submit their requests to the chair of the standing committee or permanent subcommittee. The standing committee or permanent subcommittee chair may designate one or more members to arrange the order of appearance of interested parties. A brief written statement of testimony may be submitted without oral presentation and shall be incorporated into the minutes of the public hearing.

RULE 29.2. Minutes to Legislative Library. – The chair of a standing committee or a permanent subcommittee shall ensure that written minutes are compiled for each of the body's meetings. The minutes shall indicate the members present and the actions taken at the meeting. Not later than 20 days after the adjournment of each session of the General Assembly, the chair shall deliver the minutes to the Legislative Library. The Speaker of the House may grant a reasonable extension of time for filing said minutes upon written application of the chair.

RULE 30. Standing Committee of the Whole House. – (a) A Standing Committee of the Whole House shall not be formed, except by suspension of the rules, if there be objection by any member.

- (b) After passage of a motion to form a Standing Committee of the Whole House, the Speaker shall appoint a chair to preside in the standing committee, and the Speaker shall leave the dais.
- (c) The rules of procedure in the House shall be observed in the Standing Committee of the Whole House, so far as they may be applicable, except the rule limiting the time of speaking and the previous question.



(d) In the Standing Committee of the Whole House, a motion that the standing committee rise shall always be in order, except when a member is speaking, and shall be decided without debate.

(e) When a bill is submitted to the Standing Committee of the Whole House, it shall be read and debated by sections, leaving the preamble to be last considered. The body of the bill shall not be defaced or interlined, but all amendments, noting the page and line, shall be duly entered by the Principal Clerk on a separate paper as the same shall be agreed to by the standing committee and be so reported to the House. After report, the bill shall again be subject to be debated and amended by sections before a question on its passage be taken.

VI. Handling of Bills

RULE 31. Introduction of Bills and Resolutions. — (a) All bills and resolutions shall be introduced by submitting same to the Principal Clerk's office on the legislative day prior to the first reading and reference thereof according to the following schedule: by 30 minutes after adjournment each Monday; and by 3:00 P.M. each Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday.

(b) Bills shall not become resolutions provided the Senate has a similar rule. Resolutions shall not become bills. Resolutions are not law but may be used when a law is not necessary for the purpose contained therein. Resolutions shall not be used to appropriate funds for any purpose, but may be used to create study commissions or committees or establish investigative committees, to honor deceased persons, and to adopt House rules and internal affairs. Resolutions cannot amend, repeal, or modify a statute; nor do they have life beyond the term of the session during which they are adopted.

(c) Every bill or resolution shall be read in regular order of business, except upon permission of the Speaker or on the report of a standing committee.

(d) All bills and resolutions shall show in their captions a brief descriptive statement of the true substance of same, which captions may thereafter be amended. Captions of public bills may be amended only by amendment proposed by the standing committee to which the bill was referred. Third reading shall not be had on any bill or resolution on the same day that such caption is amended.

(e) A Substitute Bill shall be covered with the same color jacket as the original bill and shall be prefaced as follows: "House Committee Substitute for_____".

(f) House Resolutions need not be read more than twice.

 (g) All memorializing, celebration, commendation, and commemoration resolutions, except those honoring the memory of deceased persons, shall be excluded from introduction and consideration in the House.

 (h) Any reference in these rules to bills shall extend to resolutions unless the context requires otherwise.

RULE 31.1. Deadlines on Introduction and Receipt; No Blank Bills; Single Subject Rule. – (a) All local bills must be submitted to the Bill Drafting Division of the Legislative Services Office by 4:00 P.M. on Wednesday, March 18, 2009, and must be introduced not later than 3:00 P.M. on Wednesday, April 1, 2009.

 (b) All public bills which would not be required to be re-referred to the Appropriations or Finance Committees under Rule 38 must be submitted to the Bill Drafting Division of the Legislative Services Office by 4:00 P.M. on Thursday, March 26, 2009, and must be introduced not later than 3:00 P.M. on Wednesday, April 8, 2009.

(c) All public bills which under Rule 38 are required to be re-referred to either or both of the Appropriations Committee or the Finance Committee, must be submitted to the Bill Drafting Division of the Legislative Services Office by 4:00 P.M. on Wednesday, April 22, 2009, and must be introduced not later than 3:00 P.M. on Wednesday, May 6, 2009. If any bill is subject to the deadline under this subsection and the bill is amended so that all the provisions

requiring referral to either or both of those committees under Rule 38 do not remain in the bill, it is not eligible for further consideration.

- (d) A bill containing no substantive provisions may not be introduced in the House.
- (e) In order to be eligible for consideration by the House during the first Regular Session, all Senate bills other than finance or appropriations bills which would be required to be re-referred to the Appropriations or Finance Committee under Rule 38 or adjournment resolutions must be received and read on the floor of the House as a message from the Senate no later than Thursday, May 14, 2009; provided that a message from the Senate received by the next legislative day stating that a bill has passed its third reading and is being engrossed shall comply with the requirements of this subsection and provided that the Senate has a similar rule.
- (f) Except by motion approved by a majority of members of the House present and voting, no public House bill other than the Current Operations Appropriations Act or the Capital Improvement Appropriations Act may contain more than one subject.
- (g) This rule, other than subsections (d) and (f), does not apply to bills (i) establishing districts for Congress or State or local entities, or (ii) ratifying an amendment or amendments to the Constitution of the United States.

RULE 32. Reference to Standing Committee and to Permanent Subcommittee; Serial Referrals. — (a) Each bill not introduced on the report of a standing committee shall immediately upon its first reading be referred by the Speaker to such standing committee or permanent subcommittee as the Speaker deems appropriate. The Speaker at the same time may order that, if the bill is reported with any favorable recommendation or without prejudice, it be re-referred automatically upon the committee report to another committee or permanent subcommittee designated in the order. Each joint resolution or House resolution not introduced on the report of a standing committee shall immediately upon its first reading either be referred by the Speaker to a standing committee or permanent subcommittee or be calendared on the date designated by the Speaker, as the Speaker deems appropriate.

- (b) The standing committee chair may refer each bill referred to the standing committee to the permanent subcommittee specifically charged with the subject matter of the bill. A report of that referral shall be made in writing and submitted to the body pursuant to Rule 5(5). Except as provided in Rule 36, the permanent subcommittee to which the bill is referred shall report the bill back to the full standing committee. That subcommittee report shall include one of the following recommendations:
 - (1) Favorable, without prejudice, or unfavorable as to the original bill with the recommendation that the report be made to the standing committee;
 - (2) Favorable, without prejudice, or unfavorable as to the original bill, as amended, with the recommendation that the report be made to the standing committee;
 - (3) Favorable or without prejudice to the proposed committee substitute, and unfavorable to the original bill, with the recommendation that the report be made to the standing committee;
 - (4) Favorable as to the original bill with the recommendation that the report be made directly to the floor of the House, if approved by the standing committee chair;
 - (5) Favorable to the original bill, as amended, with the recommendation that the report be made directly to the floor of the House, if approved by the standing committee chair; or
 - (6) Favorable to the proposed committee substitute with the recommendation that the report be made directly to the floor of the House, if approved by the standing committee chair, and unfavorable to the original bill.

Any recommendation of favorable or without prejudice may include a recommendation of re-referral to another standing committee. After a bill is reported to a standing committee by a permanent subcommittee of that standing committee, the standing committee chair may re-refer the bill to another permanent subcommittee of that standing committee.

Upon recommendation to the standing committee, the bill shall be before that body for further action unless the permanent subcommittee chair reports the bill directly pursuant to Rule 36.

RULE 33. Papers Addressed to the House. - Petitions, memorials, and other papers addressed to the House shall be presented by the Speaker. A brief statement of the contents thereof may be made orally by the introducer before reference to a committee, but such papers shall not be debated or decided on the day of their first being read unless the House shall direct otherwise.

RULE 34. Introduction of Resolutions and Bills, Copies Required. - (a) Whenever any resolution or bill is introduced, a duplicate copy thereof shall be attached thereto, and the Principal Clerk shall cause said duplicate copy to be numbered as the original resolution or bill is numbered and shall cause the same to be available at all times to the member introducing the same.

- Numbering of House Bills shall be designated as "H.B.___." (No. (b) following). A Joint Resolution shall be designated as "H.J.R. ____." (No. following). A House Resolution shall be designated as "H.R.___." (No. following).
- Whenever any resolution or bill is filed for introduction, it shall be in a House bill jacket containing the number of copies designated by the Principal Clerk and in the form designated by the Speaker. Any resolution or bill not accompanied by the required number of copies shall be returned immediately to the introducer. The Clerk shall stamp the copies with the number stamped upon the original bill.
- No bill may be filed for introduction if the draft contains names preprinted on the bill jacket and body of the bill (either as primary sponsors or cosponsors) unless each such member has signed the jacket.

RULE 35. Duplicating and Availability of Copies of Bills. – (a) The Legislative Services Officer shall cause such bills as are introduced to be duplicated in such numbers as may be specified by the Speaker. The Legislative Services Officer shall cause one copy of each resolution and public bill for each member to be delivered to the member's committee assistant or legislative assistant who shall place it in the appropriate notebook on the member's desk. If a member so requests, a second copy shall be delivered to the member's committee assistant or legislative assistant who shall place it in the member's office. The remaining copies shall be placed in the Printed Bills Room and made available to the committees to which the bill is referred, to individual members on request, and to the general public.

A public bill is a bill affecting 15 or more counties. A local bill is one affecting fewer than 15 counties. No public bill and, upon objection by a member, no local bill may be considered unless copies of the bill have been made available to the entire membership of the House.

RULE 35.1. Assessment Reports. - (a) Every bill or resolution proposing the establishment of an occupational or professional licensing board, as defined in Article 18A of Chapter 120 of the General Statutes, or a study for the need to establish such a board shall have attached to the jacket of the original bill or resolution at the time of its consideration on second and third readings by the House or by any standing committee or permanent subcommittee of the House an assessment report from the Legislative Committee on New Licensing Boards pursuant to Article 18A of Chapter 120 of the General Statutes. The assessment report shall not constitute any part of the expression of legislative intent proposed by the formation of a licensing board. Upon receipt of the request, the Legislative Committee on New Licensing

Boards shall prepare and return the assessment report as soon as possible but not later than 60 days, reserving the right to extend this time to 90 days.

(b) Every legislative proposal introduced in the House or received in the House from the Senate, proposing the incorporation of a municipality shall have attached to the jacket of the original bill at the time of its consideration on second or third readings by the House or by any committee of the House prior to a favorable report, a recommendation from the Joint Legislative Commission on Municipal Incorporations, established by Article 20 of Chapter 120 of the General Statutes. The recommendation of the Joint Legislative Commission on Municipal Incorporations shall be made in accordance with the provisions and criteria set forth in Article 20 of Chapter 120 of the General Statutes and shall include the findings required to be made by G.S. 120-166 through G.S. 120-170.

RULE 36. Report by Standing Committee or Permanent Subcommittee. – (a) When Reports Required. – All House bills and resolutions shall be reported from the standing committee or permanent subcommittee to which referred with such recommendations as the standing committee or permanent subcommittee may desire to make except in the case where the principal introducer requests in writing to the chair of the standing committee or permanent subcommittee that the bill not be considered.

With the written approval of the chair of the standing committee and with the recommendation of the subcommittee pursuant to Rule 32(b)(4) through (6), the chair of the permanent subcommittee may report the bill directly to the floor with that recommendation. If a permanent subcommittee recommends reporting a bill to the floor and the chair of the standing committee fails to give approval, the bill shall be deemed to have been reported to the standing committee with the same recommendation as the subcommittee would have made to the House.

(b) Favorable Report. — When a standing committee or permanent subcommittee reports a bill with the recommendation that it be passed, the bill shall be placed on the favorable calendar on the day and in the order designated by the Chair of the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House, but not on the same day that it is reported except by leave of the House, and no later than the fourth legislative day after submission of the report or Senate message under Rule 43.2 or Rule 43.3(a), unless:

(1) The bill is re-referred to the Committee on Appropriations or Committee on Finance under Rule 38 or was serially referred under Rule 32; or

(2) The bill has not yet been placed on the calendar, and the Speaker refers the bill to another committee.

place a bill on the calendar for a legislative day, notice shall be given by the Chair

In order to place a bill on the calendar for a legislative day, notice shall be given by the Chair of the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House orally in the House or in writing to the Principal Clerk. When a committee substitute is adopted and receives a favorable report by the committee or permanent subcommittee, the standing committee or permanent subcommittee chair shall submit to the standing committee or permanent subcommittee the question of an unfavorable report on the original bill. The standing committee's or permanent subcommittee's action, if any, on the original bill shall be reported at the same time the committee substitute is reported.

(c) Report Without Prejudice. — When a standing committee reports a bill without prejudice, the bill shall be placed on the favorable calendar in the same manner as provided in subsection (b) of this rule.

(d) **Postponed Indefinitely.** – When a standing committee reports a bill with the recommendation that it be postponed indefinitely and no minority report accompanies it, the bill shall be placed on the unfavorable calendar.

(e) Unfavorable Report. – When a standing committee reports a bill with the recommendation that it not be passed and no minority report accompanies it, the bill shall be placed on the unfavorable calendar.

(f) Minority Report. – When a bill is reported by a standing committee with a recommendation that it not be passed or that it be postponed indefinitely but it is accompanied by a minority report signed by at least one-fourth of the members of the standing committee who were present and voting when the bill was considered in standing committee, the question before the House shall be: "The adoption of the minority report." If the minority report is adopted by majority vote, the bill shall be placed on the favorable calendar for consideration. If the minority report fails of adoption by a majority vote, the bill shall be placed on the unfavorable calendar.

RULE 36.1. Fiscal Notes. — (a) The Chair or Cochair of the Appropriations Committee, of the Finance Committee, or of the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House, upon the floor of the House, may request that a fiscal analysis be made of a bill, resolution, or an amendment to a bill or resolution which is in the possession of the House and that a fiscal note be attached to the measure, which request shall be allowed when, in the opinion of the Speaker, the fiscal effects of that measure are not apparent from the language of the measure. When a request is properly made under this subsection, the bill is removed from the calendar until such time that the fiscal note is attached to the measure.

- (b) The fiscal note shall be filed and attached to the bill or amendment within two legislative days of the request. If it is impossible to prepare a fiscal note within two legislative days, the Director of Fiscal Research shall, in writing, so advise the Speaker, the Principal Clerk, and the member introducing or proposing the measure and shall indicate the time when the fiscal note will be ready.
- (c) The fiscal note shall be prepared by the Fiscal Research Division on a form approved by the Chair of the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House as to content and form and signed by the staff member or members preparing it. If no estimate in dollars is possible, the fiscal note shall indicate the reasons that no estimate is provided. The fiscal note shall not comment on the merit but may identify technical problems. The Fiscal Research Division shall make the fiscal note available to the membership of the House.
- (d) A sponsor of a bill or amendment may deliver a copy of the bill or amendment to the Fiscal Research Division for the preparation of a fiscal note. The sponsor shall attach the fiscal note to the bill when filed or to the amendment when its adoption is moved.
- (e) The sponsor of a bill or amendment to which a fiscal note is attached who objects to the estimates and information provided may reduce to writing the objections. These objections shall be appended to the fiscal note attached to the bill or amendment and to the copies of the fiscal note available to the membership.
- (f) Subsection (a) of this rule shall not apply to the Current Operations Appropriations Bill or the Capital Improvement Appropriations Bill. This rule shall not apply to a bill or amendment requiring an actuarial note under these rules.

RULE 36.2. Actuarial Notes. – (a) Every bill or resolution proposing any change in the law relative to any:

- (1) State, municipal, or other retirement system funded in whole or in part out of public funds; or
- (2) Program of hospital, medical, disability, or related benefits provided for teachers and State employees, funded in whole or in part by State funds;

shall have attached to it at the time of its consideration by any standing committee or permanent subcommittee a brief explanatory statement or note which shall include a reliable estimate of the financial and actuarial effect of the proposed change to that retirement or pension system. The actuarial note shall be attached to the jacket of each proposed bill or resolution which is reported favorably by any standing committee or any permanent subcommittee, shall be separate therefrom, and shall be clearly designated as an actuarial note.

A bill described in subdivision (a)(1) of this rule shall be referred to the Committee on Pensions and Retirement upon its introduction in accordance with G.S. 120-111.3.

- (b) The sponsor of the bill or resolution shall present a copy of the measure, with a request for an actuarial note, to the Fiscal Research Division, which shall prepare the actuarial note as promptly as possible but not later than two weeks after the request is made unless an extension of time is agreed to by the sponsor as being necessary in the preparation of the note. Actuarial notes shall be prepared in the order of receipt of request and shall be transmitted to the sponsor of the measure. The actuarial note of the Fiscal Research Division shall be prepared and signed by an actuary.
- (c) The sponsor of the bill or resolution shall also present a copy of the measure to the actuary employed by the system or program affected by the measure. Actuarial notes shall be prepared and transmitted to the sponsor of the measure not later than two weeks after the request is received, unless an extension of time is agreed to by the sponsor as being necessary in the preparation of the note. The actuarial note shall be attached to the jacket of the measure. The provisions of this subsection may be waived by the measure's sponsor for a measure affecting local government retirement or pension plans not administered by the State or any local government program of hospital, medical, disability, or related benefits for local government employees not administered by the State.
- (d) The note shall be factual and shall, if possible, provide a reliable estimate of both the immediate effect and, if determinable, the long-range fiscal and actuarial effect of the measure. If, after careful investigation, it is determined that no dollar estimate is possible, the note shall contain a statement to that effect, setting forth the reasons why no dollar estimate can be given. No comment or opinion shall be included in the actuarial note with regard to the merits of the measure for which the note is prepared. Technical and mechanical defects in the measure may be noted.
- (e) When any permanent subcommittee or standing committee reports a measure to which an actuarial note is attached at the time of permanent subcommittee or standing committee consideration, with any amendment of such nature as would substantially affect the cost to or the revenues of any retirement or pension system, or program of hospital, medical, disability, or related benefits for teachers or State employees, the chair of the permanent subcommittee or standing committee reporting the measure shall obtain from the Fiscal Research Division an actuarial note of the fiscal and actuarial effect of the proposed amendment. The actuarial note shall be attached to the jacket of the measure. An amendment to any bill or resolution shall not be in order if the amendment affects the costs to or the revenues of a State-administered retirement or pension system, or program of hospital, medical, disability, or related benefits for teachers or State employees, unless the amendment is accompanied by an actuarial note, prepared by the Fiscal Research Division, as to the actuarial effect of the amendment.
- (f) The Fiscal Research Division shall make all relevant actuarial notes available to the membership of the House.

RULE 36.3. Local Legislation Affecting State Highway System. – A local bill affecting the State Highway System shall be referred to the Committee on Transportation.

RULE 36.4. Content of Appropriations Bills. – No provision shall be contained in any of the following bills unless it pertains to the appropriation of money or the raising or reducing of revenue: (i) the Current Operations Appropriations Bill; (ii) the Capital Improvement Appropriations Bill; (iii) any bill generally revising appropriations for the second fiscal year of a biennium.

RULE 37. Removing Bill From Unfavorable Calendar. — A bill may be removed from the unfavorable calendar upon motion carried by a two-thirds vote. A motion to remove a bill from the unfavorable calendar is debatable.

RULE 38. Reports on Appropriation and Revenue Bills. – (a) All standing committees, other than the Standing Committees on Appropriations, when favorably reporting any bill or resolution which:

- (1) Carries an appropriation from the State; or
- (2) Requires or will require in the future substantial additional State monies from the General Fund or Highway Fund to implement its provisions shall indicate same in the report, and said bill or resolution shall be referred to the Standing Committees on Appropriations for a further report before being acted upon by the House.
- (b) All standing committees, other than the Standing Committee on Finance, when favorably reporting any bill which in any way or manner raises revenue, reduces revenue, levies a tax, authorizes the levying of a tax, an assessment, or a fee, or authorizes the issue of bonds or notes, whether public, public-local, or private, shall indicate same in the report, and said bill shall be referred to the Standing Committee on Finance for a further report before being acted upon by the House. This subsection shall not apply to bills only imposing fines, forfeitures, or penalties.
- (c) Action on Amendment Before Re-Referral. If any standing committee recommends adoption of an amendment or committee substitute of a bill which, under the rules of the House, must be referred to the Standing Committees on Appropriations or the Standing Committee on Finance, the amendment or committee substitute shall be considered and, if adopted, the amendment or substitute engrossed before the bill is re-referred.
- RULE 39. Recall of Bill From Standing Committee. (a) When a House bill has been introduced and referred to a standing committee, or when a Senate bill has been referred to a standing committee, if after 10 legislative days the standing committee has failed to act thereon, then the introducer of the House bill or some member designated by the introducer, or some House member designated by the introducer of the Senate bill, may, after three legislative days' public notice given in the House and delivered in writing to the chair of the standing committee, on motion supported by a vote of three-fifths of the members of the House, recall the same from the standing committee to the floor of the House for consideration and such action thereon as a majority of the members present may direct.
- (b) This rule shall not be temporarily suspended without one day's notice on the motion given in the House and delivered in writing to the chair of the standing committee, and to sustain that motion two-thirds of the members of the House shall be required.
- RULE 39.1. Recall of Bill From Permanent Subcommittee. When a House bill has been referred to a permanent subcommittee, if after 10 legislative days the subcommittee has failed to act thereon, or at any time, with the agreement of the subcommittee chair, the standing committee chair may re-refer the bill from that permanent subcommittee to another permanent subcommittee of the same standing committee provided the report of the re-referral shall be made pursuant to Rule 32.
- RULE 39.2. Re-Referral of Bills From One Standing Committee to Another Standing Committee. Upon consent of the sponsor of the bill, the Speaker, the chair of the standing committee from whom the bill is to be re-referred, and the chair of the standing committee from whom the bill is to be re-referred, the chair of the standing committee from whom the bill is to be re-referred or the Chair of the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House may move for a re-referral to another standing committee, and the bill shall be re-referred upon vote of the majority present during a regular session of the House.
- RULE 40. Calendars and Schedules of Business. The Clerk of the House shall prepare a daily schedule of business, including the Calendar of Bills and Resolutions for consideration and debate that day, in accordance with the Order of Business of the Day (Rule 5). The Clerk shall number all bills and resolutions in the order in which they are introduced.

All bills and resolutions shall be taken up as they appear in each category (Rule 5(10)) in the order they were placed on the Calendar under Rule 36(b).

RULE 41. Reading of Bills. – (a) Every bill shall receive three readings in the House prior to its passage. The first reading and reference to standing committee of a House bill shall occur on the next legislative day following its introduction. The first reading and reference to standing committee of a Senate bill shall occur on the next legislative day following its receipt on messages from the Senate. The Speaker shall give notice at each subsequent reading whether it is the second or third reading.

(b) No bill shall be read more than once on the same day without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present and voting; provided, no bill governed by Section 23 of Article II of the North Carolina Constitution or described in Rule 20(a)(2) herein shall be read twice on one day under any circumstance.

RULE 42. Effect of a Defeated Bill. – (a) Subject to the provisions of subsection (b) of this rule, after a bill has:

- (1) Been tabled,
- (2) Been postponed indefinitely,
- (3) Failed to pass on any of its readings, or
- (4) Been placed on the unfavorable calendar,

the contents of that bill or the principal provisions of its subject matter shall not be considered in any other measure originating in the Senate or originating thereafter in the House. Upon the point of order being raised and sustained by the chair, that measure shall be laid upon the table, and shall not be taken therefrom except by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting.

(b) No local bill shall be held by the chair to embody the contents of or the principal provisions of the subject matter of any statewide measure which has been laid on the table, has failed to pass on any of its readings, or has been placed on the unfavorable calendar.


RULE 43. Amendments. – (a) No amendment to a measure before the House shall be in order unless the amendment is germane to the measure under consideration. A House amendment deleting a previously adopted House amendment shall not be in order, except that this sentence does not apply to amendments adopted under Rule 38(c). No amendment that is clearly unconstitutional shall be in order.

If the Senate adopts an amendment or committee substitute to a House bill, the House may refuse to receive the bill on account of lack of germaneness if the Senate has a similar rule.

Only one principal (first degree) amendment shall be pending at any one time. If a subsequent or substitute principal amendment shall be offered, the Speaker shall rule it out of order. However, any member desiring to offer a subsequent or substitute principal amendment in opposition to the pending amendment may inform the House by way of argument against the pending amendment that if it is defeated the member proposes to offer another principal amendment, and the member may then read and explain such proposed amendment.

Perfecting (or second degree) amendments may be offered and considered without limitation as to number, and in the event of multiple perfecting amendments, they shall be voted upon in inverse order.

- (b) The following rules apply when considering: (i) the Current Operations Appropriations Bill; (ii) the Capital Improvement Appropriations Bill; (iii) any bill generally revising appropriations for the second fiscal year of a biennium:
 - (1) Amendments cannot increase total spending within a subcommittee area beyond the total for that subcommittee as shown in the committee report.
 - (2) Amendments can only affect appropriations within the departments, agencies, or programs within the jurisdiction of the subcommittee.



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- (3) Amendments cannot increase total spending, from any source, beyond the total amount shown in the committee report.
- (4) Amendments that cause the budget to be unbalanced are not in order.
- (5) Amendments cannot spend reversions.
- (6) Amendments cannot make nonrecurring reductions to fund recurring items.

RULE 43.1. Engrossment. — Bills and resolutions, except those making appropriations, which originate in the House and which are amended, shall be engrossed before being sent to the Senate.

RULE 43.2. House Concurrence in Senate Amendments to House Bills. — When the House receives a Senate amendment to a bill originating in the House, it shall be placed on the calendar in accordance with Rule 36(b).

RULE 43.3. Committee Substitutes Adopted by the Senate to Bills Originating in the House; Procedure for Treatment of Material Amendments Thereto. – (a) Whenever the Senate has adopted a committee substitute for a bill originating in the House and has returned the bill to the House for concurrence in that committee substitute, it shall be placed on the calendar in accordance with Rule 36(b).

(b) The Speaker shall rule whether the committee substitute is a material amendment under Section 23 of Article II of the North Carolina Constitution which reads:

"Revenue bills. – No law shall be enacted to raise money on the credit of the State, or to pledge the faith of the State directly or indirectly for the payment of any debt, or to impose any tax upon the people of the State, or to allow the counties, cities, or towns to do so, unless the bill for the purpose shall have been read three several times in each house of the General Assembly and passed three several readings, which readings shall have been on three different days, and shall have been agreed to by each house respectively, and unless the yeas and nays on the second and third readings of the bill shall have been entered on the journal."

If the committee substitute was referred to standing committee, the standing committee shall:

- (1) Report the bill with the recommendation either that the House do concur or that the House do not concur; and
- (2) Advise the Speaker as to whether or not that committee substitute is a material amendment under Section 23 of Article II of the North Carolina Constitution.
- (c) If the committee substitute for a bill is not a material amendment, the question before the House shall be concurrence.
- (d) If the committee substitute for a bill is a material amendment, the receiving of that bill on messages shall constitute first reading, and the question before the House shall be concurrence on second reading. If the motion is passed, the question then shall be concurrence on third reading on the next legislative day.
- (e) No committee substitute adopted by the Senate for a bill originating in the House may be amended by the House.

RULE 44. Conference Standing Committees. — (a) Whenever the House shall decline or refuse to concur in amendments put by the Senate to a bill originating in the House, or shall refuse to concur in a substitute adopted by the Senate for a bill originating in the House, or whenever the Senate shall decline or refuse to concur in amendments put by the House to a bill originating in the Senate, or shall refuse to concur in a substitute adopted by the House for a bill originating in the Senate, a conference committee may be appointed by the Speaker upon the Speaker's own motion and shall be appointed upon request by the principal sponsor of the original bill, the chair of the House standing committee which reported the bill, or the sponsor of the amendment in which the Senate refused to concur; and the bill under consideration shall thereupon go to and be considered by the joint conferees on the part of the House and Senate. In appointing members to conference committees, the Speaker shall appoint

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no less than a majority of members who generally supported the House position as determined by the Speaker.

- (b) Only such matters as are in difference between the two houses shall be considered by the conference, and the conference report shall deal only with such matters. The conference report may be made by a majority of the House members of such conference committee and shall not be amended.
- (c) If the conferees fail to agree or if either house fails to adopt the report of its conferees, new conferees may be appointed.
- (d) No vote shall be taken on adoption of a conference report until the next legislative day following the report.
- RULE 44.1. Transmittal of Bills to Senate. Unless ordered by the Speaker or two-thirds vote of the members present and voting, no bill shall be sent from the House on the day of its passage, except on the last day of the session.

VII. Legislative Officers and Employees

RULE 45. Elected Officers. – (a) The House shall elect its Speaker from among its membership.

- (b) The House shall elect its Speaker Pro Tempore from among its membership who shall perform such duties as the Speaker may assign.
- (c) The House shall elect a Principal Clerk, who shall continue in office until another is elected. The Speaker may appoint a Reading Clerk and shall appoint a Sergeant-at-Arms, both of whom shall serve at the Speaker's pleasure. The Principal Clerk, Reading Clerk, and Sergeant-at-Arms shall have and perform duties and responsibilities, not inconsistent with these rules, as the Speaker may assign. Unless directed otherwise by the Speaker on behalf of the House, the Principal Clerk or an employee designated by the Principal Clerk shall receive House bills not approved by the Governor.
- RULE 46. Assistants to Principal Clerk and Sergeant-at-Arms. The Principal Clerk and the Sergeant-at-Arms may appoint, with the approval of the Speaker, such assistants as may be necessary to the efficient discharge of the duties of their respective offices.
- RULE 47. Speaker's Staff; Chaplain; and Pages. (a) The Speaker may appoint one or more staff members to the Speaker, a Chaplain of the House, and pages to wait upon the sessions of the House.
- (b) When the House is not in session, the pages shall be under the supervision of the Supervisor of Pages.
 - (c) The Speaker, at the request of a member, may appoint honorary pages.
- RULE 48. Member's Staff. (a) Each standing committee and permanent subcommittee shall have a committee assistant. The committee assistant to a standing committee or permanent subcommittee shall serve as staff to the chair of the standing committee or permanent subcommittee.
- (b) Each member shall be assigned a legislative assistant, unless the member has a committee assistant to serve as legislative assistant.
- (c) The selection and retention of committee assistants, legislative assistants, and office assistants shall be the sole prerogative of the individual member or members. Such staff shall file initial applications for employment with the Principal Clerk and shall receive compensation as prescribed by the Legislative Services Commission. The employment period of such staff shall commence not earlier than the convening date of the General Assembly and shall terminate not later than the final adjournment or recess of the General Assembly unless employment for an extended period is approved by the Speaker. The committee assistants, legislative assistants, and office assistants shall adhere to such uniform rules and regulations not inconsistent with these rules regarding hours and other conditions of employment as the Legislative Services Commission shall fix by appropriate regulations.

RULE 49. Compensation of Legislative Assistants. — No clerk, committee assistant, legislative assistant, office assistant, or other person employed or appointed under Rules 46, 47, and 48 hereof shall receive during such employment, appointment, or service any compensation from any department of the State government, and there shall not be voted, paid, or awarded any additional pay, bonus, or gratuity to any of them; but they shall receive only the pay now provided by law for such duties and services. This rule shall not apply to employment, appointment, or service or to the receipt of compensation or additional pay, bonus, or gratuity from another department of State government between regular sessions of the General Assembly.

VIII. Privileges of the Hall

RULE 50. Admittance to Floor. — No person except members, officers, and designated employees of the General Assembly who have been issued identification tags as provided by this rule, and former members of the General Assembly who are not registered under the provisions of Article 2 of Chapter 120C of the General Statutes, shall be allowed on the floor of the House during its session, unless permitted by the Speaker or otherwise provided by law. Employees of the General Assembly shall wear identification tags, approved by the Legislative Services Officer, when on the floor of the House.

RULE 51. Admittance of Press. – Reporters wishing to take down debates may be admitted by the Speaker, who shall assign such places to them on the floor or elsewhere, to effect this object, as shall not interfere with the convenience of the House. Reporters admitted to the floor of the House shall observe the same requirements of attire for members contained in Rule 12(h).

RULE 52. Extending Courtesies. – Courtesies of the floor, galleries, or lobby shall be extended at the discretion of the Speaker and only by the Speaker. Requests by members to extend these courtesies shall be typewritten and delivered to the Speaker. No member shall orally ask the Speaker to extend these courtesies during the daily session.

RULE 53. Order in House Chamber, Galleries, and Lobby. – In case of any disturbance or disorderly conduct in the House Chamber, galleries, or lobby, the Speaker or other presiding officer is empowered to order the same to be cleared to the extent they deem necessary.

IX. General Rules

RULE 54. Attendance of Members. – No member or officer of the House shall be absent from the service of the House without leave, unless from sickness or disability.

RULE 55. **Documents to Be Signed by the Speaker.** – All acts, addresses, and resolutions and all warrants and subpoenas issued by order of the House shall be signed by the Speaker or other presiding officer.

RULE 56. Printing or Reproducing Materials. – There shall be no printing or reproducing of paper(s) that are not legislative in essence except upon approval of the Speaker.

RULE 57. Placement or Circulation of Materials. – Persons other than members of the House shall not place or cause to be placed any materials on members' desks in the House Chamber without obtaining approval of the Speaker. Any material placed on members' desks in the House Chamber, or circulated to House members anywhere in the Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building, shall bear the name of the originator.

RULE 58. Rules, Rescission, and Alteration. — (a) These rules shall not be permanently rescinded or altered except by House simple resolution passed by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting. The introducer of the resolution must on the floor of the House give notice of intent to introduce the resolution on the legislative day preceding its introduction.

(b) Except as otherwise provided herein, the House upon two-thirds vote of the members present and voting may temporarily suspend any rule.

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RULE 59. Cosponsorship of Bills and Resolutions. - (a) Any member wishing to cosponsor a bill or resolution which has been introduced may do so by appearing in the office of the Principal Clerk for such purpose within one-half hour following the adjournment of the session during which such bill or resolution was first read and referred, or within one hour following adjournment if the cosponsorship is done electronically under procedures approved by the Principal Clerk.

- Members wishing to jointly sponsor legislation should indicate such to the drafter at the time the bill is requested or upon filing the bill with the Principal Clerk's office. The names of the members who are the primary sponsors shall be listed in the order requested by them, followed by the words (Primary Sponsors); and the remaining names of members cosponsoring shall follow. No more than four members may be listed as primary sponsors.
- No member shall permit anyone, other than that member's committee assistant, legislative assistant, office assistant, or another member, to have possession of and solicit for bill or resolution cosponsorship, the jacket of a bill or resolution.
- RULE 60. Correcting of Typographical Errors. The Legislative Services Officer may correct typographical errors appearing in House bills or resolutions provided that such corrections are made before ratification and do not conflict with any actions or rules of the Senate and provided further that such correction be approved by the Chair of the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House, the Speaker, or other presiding officer.
- RULE 61. Assignment of Seats. After initial assignment of seats, a member shall continue to occupy the seat to which initially assigned until assigned a permanent seat; once assigned a permanent seat, the member shall occupy it for the entire biennial session. In event of vacancy, that member's successor will occupy the seat of the member replaced for the remainder of the biennial session.
- RULE 61.1. Office Assignments. The Chair of the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House shall assign to each member an office space. When available, chairs of standing committees and permanent subcommittees shall be assigned an office adjacent to the room in which the standing committee or permanent subcommittee generally meets if the Chair so desires. The Speaker shall be assigned an office of his or her choice.
- RULE 61.2. Convening and Assigning Seats in the New House. (a) The Principal Clerk of the previous House of Representatives shall convene the House of Representatives at 12:00 noon on the date established by law for the convening of each regular session and preside over the body until the members elect a Speaker. In the case of a vacancy, inability, or refusal to so serve, the duty shall devolve upon the Sergeant-at-Arms of the prior House, and in the case of a vacancy in that office, or inability or refusal to so serve, the duty shall devolve upon the Reading Clerk of the prior House.
- It shall be the duty of the Chair of the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House of the prior House to assign temporary seats to the members of the House of Representatives in its Chamber. In the case of the inability or refusal to serve of the Chair of the Standing Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House, the Speaker of the prior House of Representatives shall appoint a person to assign seats to members of the House of Representatives in its Chamber. In the event that the party that had a majority of members in the prior House will no longer have a majority of members in the new House, then the duty assigned in this subsection to the Chair of the Committee of the prior House shall instead be the duty of the person nominated as Speaker by the majority party caucus for the new House, or some member-elect designated by the Speaker-nominee. In the event no party will have a majority, then the duty assigned in this subsection to the Chair of the Committee of the prior House shall instead be the joint duty of one person chosen each by the caucuses of the two parties having the greatest numbers of members.

Whereas, Roscoe Jacobs, Sr. made a living as a Job Developer for the Lumbee Regional Development Association for Columbus and Bladen Counties and as a Community Developer for Four County Community Services, Inc.; and

Whereas, Roscoe Jacobs, Sr. became a leader of the Waccamaw Siouan Tribe and was elected as the Tribe's first Chief in April 2005; and

A JOINT RESOLUTION HONORING THE LIFE AND MEMORY OF ROBERT WALTER "BOB" SCOTT, FORMER GOVERNOR OF NORTH CAROLINA.

Whereas, Robert Walter "Bob" Scott was born June 13, 1929, near the Haw River in Alamance County to Walter Kerr Scott and Mary Elizabeth White Scott; and

Whereas, Bob Scott attended Duke University from 1947 to 1949 and received a bachelor's of science degree in Animal Industry from North Carolina State University in 1952; and

Whereas, Bob Scott served as a Special Agent in the Counter Intelligence Corps of the United States Army during the Korean War from 1953 to 1955; and

Whereas, after serving in the army, Bob Scott returned to Alamance County to manage the family's dairy farm; and

Whereas, Bob Scott became active in politics following the path of other family members who were elected to public office in North Carolina, including his father who served as Governor from 1949 to 1953 and as a United States Senator from 1954 to 1958; and

Whereas, Bob Scott served as Lieutenant Governor of North Carolina from 1965 to 1969 and as Governor from 1969 to 1973; and

Whereas, during his term as Governor, Bob Scott led the effort that resulted in the passing of the State's first cigarette tax, which helped fund kindergarten education programs; aided in the preservation of the State Capitol and the restoration of the Governor's Mansion; worked to have Reed Gold Mine designated as a State Historic Site; and appointed the first African-American to serve as a superior court judge; and

Whereas, Bob Scott was in the forefront of the move to unite all of the State's public colleges and universities into one body, creating The University of North Carolina System, and was instrumental in the reorganization of State departments and agencies to better serve the citizens of this State; and

Whereas, Hertford County was formed from Chowan, Bertie, and Northampton Counties by an act of the State legislature in 1759; and

Whereas, Hertford County was named in honor of Francis Seymour Conway (1715-1794), Marquis of Hertford, a distinguished member of the British parliament and a soldier; and

Whereas, the Town of Winton, originally known as Wynnton and laid out on land donated by Representative Benjamin Wynns, was established as the county seat in 1766; and

- (4) What would be the fiscal impact in raising the compulsory school attendance age from 16 to 17 and 16 to 18, respectively, for each local administrative school unit in North Carolina.

SECTION 2. No later than December 31, 2009, the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina shall submit a report of its study to the Joint Legislative Commission on Dropout Prevention and High School Graduation and the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee, including its findings and recommendations.

Whereas, both "Good Morning Starshine" and "Jean" were included on Oliver's "Good Morning Starshine" album, which reached Number 19 on the pop chart in the fall of 1969; and

Whereas, Oliver performed his hits on a number of TV variety shows and specials in the late 1960s, including the Ed Sullivan Show; and

Whereas, some of Oliver's other recordings included "Sunday Mornin'," which peaked at Number 35 in December 1969; "Light the Way," which was composed by Eric Carmen in 1970; and "Early Morning Rain," which gained success on the easy listening charts in 1971; and


Whereas, Oliver performed throughout the United States during the 1970s and, after retiring from the music industry in the 1980s, worked in the construction and pharmaceutical fields; and

Whereas, the Passenger Rail Investment and Improvement Act of 2008 (Division B of P.L. 110-432) and the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (P.L. 111-5) (the Acts) are now the law of the land; and

Whereas, the Acts establish a program of federal capital grants to states and interstate high-speed rail compacts for infrastructure investments which will improve passenger, intermodal and freight services, create a new capital program for states to expand and improve conventional and high-speed intercity passenger rail services, facilitate competitive service provisions, provide grants to address critical rail network capacity needs, and encourage public-private partnerships that provide for the financing, design, construction, operation, and maintenance of high-speed rail services; and

Whereas, the Congress has appropriated \$8 billion and the President has recommended a program of additional investments at the rate of \$1 billion annually over the next five federal fiscal years for a total national availability of \$13 billion to develop high-speed rail and other investments in rail infrastructure that improve network capacity, safety, and reliability; and

Whereas, primary objectives of the Acts are to contribute to economic recovery efforts by creating and/or saving jobs, advance strategic transportation goals that ensure safe and efficient transportation, build a foundation for future economic competitiveness, promote energy efficiency and environmental quality, support interconnected livable communities, and further development of high-speed and intercity passenger goals; and

Whereas, the North Carolina House Interim Committee on Expanding Rail Service has reported to the North Carolina General Assembly that expansion of rail freight and passenger services can help promote economic development and mobility for our citizens; that improved freight and intermodal services can help integrate North Carolina into the global economy; that the General Assembly should consider mechanisms to join with local governments, the federal government, and the private sector to provide funding for improved freight, Intermodal, and passenger services; and

Whereas, the National Railroad Passenger Corporation's (Amtrak) national passenger rail system currently serves 16 cities and towns in North Carolina with eight daily passenger trains, two in partnership with the State of North Carolina, providing safe, efficient, and affordable intercity mobility for hundreds of thousands of citizens annually; and

Whereas, North Carolina and its cities and towns have partnered for nearly 40 years with the National Railroad Passenger Corporation (Amtrak) to provide its citizens with higher levels of mobility and passenger services and continues to do so; and



Whereas, the 21st Century Transportation Committee completed an examination of the role of ports, airports, mass transit, rail, and pedestrian and cycling access in providing the transportation needs of the State; and

Whereas, the 21st Century Transportation Committee recommended that North Carolina maximize capacity and utilization of rail freight and passenger movements; and

Whereas, in response to Session Law 2007-551, the North Carolina Office of State Budget and Management coordinated development of a statewide logistics plan that addresses the State's long-term economic, mobility, and infrastructure needs; and

Whereas, the United States Department of Transportation, working through the Federal Railroad Administration and the Federal Highway Administration and pursuant to the National Environmental and Policy Act has issued a Record of Decision concerning development of the Southeast High Speed Rail Corridor connecting Charlotte through Raleigh to Richmond, Virginia, and on to Washington, D.C.; and

Whereas, 16 chambers of commerce in six states, including those serving Raleigh, Greensboro, Winston-Salem, and Charlotte, have created the Southeastern Economic Alliance to promote development of improved intercity and high-speed rail services across the southeastern United States; and

Whereas, the North Carolina Department of Transportation has analyzed and recommended extension of passenger service to connect Western North Carolina via Salisbury to Asheville and southeastern North Carolina via Raleigh, Fayetteville, and Goldsboro to Wilmington; and

Whereas, 57 municipalities, 17 counties, 18 transportation planning organizations and councils of government, 17 chambers of commerce, and 10 other State and local organizations have endorsed a resolution supporting creation of a comprehensive passenger rail system to serve the State of North Carolina; and

Whereas, the North Carolina Secretary's Rail Advisory Committee, acting through the Secretary of the North Carolina Department of Transportation, has asked the United States Secretary of Transportation to provide for stability in our nation's intercity passenger rail program and provide for a program of federal, State, and private investment in our freight and passenger railroad system; and

Whereas, Article 18 of Chapter 136 of the North Carolina General Statutes provides for establishment of the Virginia-North Carolina Interstate High-Speed Rail Compact; and

Whereas, North Carolina has over 3,200 miles of railroad and is served by two Class I and 24 short-line railroads; and

Whereas, in 1849 the North Carolina General Assembly chartered the North Carolina Railroad Company with a mission to connect the piedmont and eastern portions of our State, and the right to transport persons, goods and merchandise; and

Whereas, the State of North Carolina holds in perpetuity 100% of the common shares of stock in the North Carolina Railroad Company; and

Whereas, the North Carolina Railroad Company serves the State as a vital economic force; and

Whereas, the capacity of the rail network serving North Carolina is strained, which impacts our consumers, producers, shippers, communities, and citizens; and

Whereas, CSX Transportation has asked the State to enter into a partnership with it to develop the National Gateway initiative; and

Whereas, the Norfolk Southern Railway has asked the State of North Carolina to enter into a partnership with it to develop the Crescent Corridor initiative; and

Whereas, North Carolina has heretofore invested State funds to develop a rail program in support of these State, national, and regional goals; Now, therefore,

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SECTION 1. The North Carolina General Assembly encourages the North Carolina Department of Transportation to work in partnership with the North Carolina Railroad Company, Norfolk Southern Railway, CSX Transportation, and Amtrak to develop eligible projects and corridor plans, enter into stakeholder agreements, develop comprehensive project management plans, and make application and aggressively compete for available federal funds.

SECTION 2. The North Carolina General Assembly encourages the railroad industry to work cooperatively with State and local officials to achieve these public policy objectives.

SECTION 3. The North Carolina General Assembly encourages the Governor and the North Carolina Department of Transportation, in concert with the North Carolina Congressional Delegation, to work with the United States Department of Transportation to develop cooperative agreements and letters of intent to develop and implement a program of projects and corridor plans.

Whereas, in 1933, at the age of 16, Walter Cronkite enrolled at the University of Texas at Austin and took courses in political science, economics, and journalism; and

Whereas, Walter Cronkite left college early to become a general reporter for the Houston Post and later held several other jobs in media, including serving as a sports announcer; and

Whereas, in 1939, Walter Cronkite began working for the United Press news agency (now United Press International), covering stories from Houston, Austin, Dallas, El Paso, Kansas City, and New York City; and

Whereas, Walter Cronkite served as a war correspondent during World War II from 1942 to 1945, as the chief correspondent during the Nuremberg war crimes trials, and as the bureau manager in Moscow from 1946 to 1948; and

Whereas, in 1950, Walter Cronkite was recruited by Edward R. Murrow to join CBS, where he found success and gained popularity as the narrator of several television programs, including "You Are There" and "The Twentieth Century"; and

Whereas, in 1952, Walter Cronkite covered the Democratic and Republican national presidential conventions for CBS and went on to cover every national political convention, with the exception of the 1964 Democratic convention, until his retirement from the network; and

Whereas, in 1962, Walter Cronkite became the anchor and editor for the CBS Evening News, which later was named the CBS Evening News with Walter Cronkite; and

Whereas, according to an independent national poll in 1972, Walter Cronkite was considered "the most trusted man in America"; and

Whereas, Walter Cronkite retired as the anchor of the CBS Evening News in 1981 and thereafter served as a producer and narrator for several television specials, series, and documentaries; and

Whereas, Walter Cronkite published his autobiography, "A Reporter's Life" in 1996;

Whereas, Walter Cronkite received many awards and honors, including two Peabody Awards, several Emmy Awards, and honorary degrees from American International College, Harvard University, Rollins College, Bucknell University, Syracuse University, and

PCS HOUSE COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL 425. which changes the title to AN ACT TO STREAMLINE THE PLAN REVIEW AND INSPECTION PROCESS FOR STATE BUILDINGS BY TRANSFERRING THE AUTHORITY FOR BUILDING CODE ENFORCEMENT WITH RESPECT TO STATE BUILDINGS FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF INSURANCE TO THE DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRAION; BY TRANSFERRING FOUR CODE ENFORCEMENT POSITIONS FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF INSURANCE TO THE DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION; BY CREATING FOUR CODE **ENFORCEMENT POSITIONS IN THE DEPARTMENT OF** ADMINISTRATION; AND TO CONTINUE THE SECRETARY OF ADMINISTRATORION"S AUTHORITY TO APPOINT MEMBERS TO THE BOARD OF AWARDS. A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO STREAMLINE THE PLAN REVIEW AND INSPECTION PROCESS FOR STATE BUILDINGS BY TRANSFERRING THE AUTHORITY FOR BUILDING CODE ENFORCEMENT WITH RESPECT TO STATE BUILDINGS FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF INSURANCE TO THE DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION; BY TRANSFERRING FOUR CODE ENFORCEMENT POSITIONS FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF INSURANCE TO THE DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION; BY CREATING FOUR CODE ENFORCEMENT POSITIONS IN THE DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION; AND TO CONTINUE THE SECRETARY OF ADMINISTRATION'S AUTHORITY TO APPOINT MEMBERS TO THE BOARD OF AWARDS.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. G.S. 58-31-40 reads as rewritten:

"§ 58-31-40. Commissioner to inspect State property; plans submitted.property.

- (a) The Commissioner shall, at least once every year or more often if the Commissioner considers it necessary, visit, inspect, and thoroughly examine every State property to analyze and determine its protection from fire, including the property's occupants or contents. The Commissioner shall notify in writing the agency or official in charge of the property of any defect noted by the Commissioner or any improvement considered by the Commissioner to be necessary, and a copy of that notice shall be forwarded by the Commissioner to the Department of Administration.
- (b) No agency or other person authorized or directed by law to select a plan and erect a building for the use of the State or any State institution shall receive and approve of the plan until it is submitted to and approved by the Commissioner as to the safety of the proposed building from fire, including the property's occupants or contents. No agency or person authorized or directed by law to select a plan or erect a building comprising 20,000 square feet or more for the use of any county, city, or school district shall receive and approve of the plan until it is submitted to and approved by the Commissioner as to the safety of the proposed building from fire, including the property's occupants or contents.
- (c) The Commissioner shall review a plan subject to subsection (b) of this section within 30 days of submission, provided that the Commissioner may require one additional 30 day extension if necessary to complete the review. If the Commissioner has neither approved nor denied the plan during the initial 30 day review period, the owner may proceed



with the building site preparation, the building foundation, and any structural components of the building that are not subject to inspection for the purposes set forth in subsection (b) of this section. If the Commissioner has neither approved nor denied the plan within 60 days of submission, the owner may request review and final approval under subsection (b) of this section by the Department of Administration, State Construction Office, pursuant to rules adopted under G.S. 143-135.26."

SECTION 2. Part 1 of Article 36 of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"§ 143-345.11. Secretary's approval of plans for State buildings required.

- (a) No agency or other person authorized or directed by law to select a plan and erect a building for the use of the State or any State institution shall receive and approve of the plan until it is submitted to and approved by the Secretary as to State construction standards and at a minimum as to the safety of the proposed building from fire, including the property's occupants or contents.
- (b) Any plan submitted to the Commissioner of Insurance and approved prior to the effective date of this section shall be deemed to have been approved jointly by the Commissioner of Insurance and the Secretary.
- (c) Except as provided in subsection (a) of this section, nothing in this section shall be construed to abrogate the authority of the Commissioner of Insurance under G.S. 58-31-40 or any other provision of law.
- (d) The Secretary shall provide quarterly written reports on plans reviewed and approved under this section to the Commissioner of Insurance. The reports shall be made in a form approved by the Commissioner of Insurance and the Secretary."

SECTION 3. G.S. 143-139(b) reads as rewritten:

"(b) General Building Regulations. – The Insurance Commissioner shall have general supervision, through the Division of Engineering of the Department of Insurance, of the administration and enforcement of all sections of the North Carolina State Building Code pertaining to plumbing, electrical systems, general building restrictions and regulations, heating and air conditioning, fire protection, and the construction of buildings generally, except those sections of the Code, the enforcement of which is specifically allocated to other agencies by subsections (c) and (d)through (e) below. The Insurance Commissioner, by means of the Division of Engineering, shall exercise his duties in the enforcement of the North Carolina State Building Code (including local building codes which have superseded the State Building Code in a particular political subdivision pursuant to G.S. 143-138(e)) in cooperation with local officials and local inspectors duly appointed by the governing body of any municipality or board of county commissioners pursuant to Part 5 of Article 19 of Chapter 160A of the General Statutes or Part 4 of Article 18 of Chapter 153A of the General Statutes, or any other applicable statutory authority."

SECTION 4. G.S. 143-139 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

"(e) State Buildings. – With respect to State buildings, the Department of Administration shall have general supervision, through the Office of State Construction, of the administration and enforcement of all sections of the North Carolina State Building Code pertaining to plumbing, electrical systems, general building restrictions and regulations, heating and air conditioning, fire protection, and the construction of buildings generally, except those sections of the Code the enforcement of which is specifically allocated to other agencies by subsections (c) and (d) of this section, and shall also exercise all remedies as provided in subsection (b1) of this section. The Department of Administration shall be the only agency with the authority to seek remedies pursuant to this section with respect to State buildings. Except as provided herein, nothing in this subsection shall be construed to abrogate the authority of the Commissioner of Insurance under G.S. 58-31-40 or any other provision of law."

SECTION 5. G.S. 143-341(3)d. reads as rewritten:

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41 42 To supervise and inspect all work done and materials used in the construction or renovation of all State buildings and all community college buildings whose plans and specifications must be examined and approved under a.2. of this subdivision; to act as the appropriate official inspector or inspection department for purposes of G.S. 143-143.2; and no such work may be accepted by the State or by any State agency until it has been approved by the Department."

SECTION 6. The North Carolina Code Officials Qualification Board shall issue a Level III standard certificate for the exercise of duties pursuant to G.S. 143-341(3) to any person who (i) was employed by the Department of Administration on the day this act became effective; (ii) successfully completes a course, developed pursuant to this section, relating to the State Building Code regulations and Code-enforcement administration; (iii) successfully completes all examinations required by the North Carolina Code Officials Qualification Board: and (iv) possesses a valid license to practice as an architect, registered pursuant to Chapter 83A of the General Statutes, or a professional engineer, registered pursuant to Chapter 89C of the General Statutes. The North Carolina Code Officials Qualification Board, in consultation with the Departments of Administration and Insurance, shall develop an expedited course of training on State Building Code regulations and Code-enforcement administration to facilitate persons obtaining Level III standard certification in accordance with this section.

SECTION 7. The Department of Insurance shall transfer to the Department of Administration four building code review positions selected by the Department of Administration for the purpose of assisting the Department of Administration in administering G.S. 143-341(3) and G.S. 143-139(e). These positions shall be supported by the Insurance Regulatory Fund at one hundred percent (100%) of the full budgeted amount for each position from fiscal year 2009-2010 through fiscal year 2011-2012. Beginning fiscal year 2012-2013, the State Treasurer, as custodian of the State Property Fire Insurance Fund, shall support those positions out of the State Property Fire Insurance Fund.

SECTION 8. There are established within the Department of Administration four new Engineering/Architectural Technician - Advanced positions at a budgeted amount of sixty-nine thousand eight hundred sixty-two dollars (\$69,862) each for the purpose of assisting the Department in administering G.S. 143-341(3) and G.S. 143-139(e). These positions shall be supported by the Insurance Regulatory Fund.

SECTION 9. Section 2 of S.L. 2007-169, as amended by Section 45 of S.L. 2008-187, reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 2. Notwithstanding G.S. 143-52.1 and S.L. 2006-203, through June 30, 2009,2011, the members of the Advisory Budget Commission in office on June 30, 2007, shall continue to be eligible for appointment to the Board of Awards, and vacancies may be filled by the appointing authority. Through June 30, 2009,2011, the Secretary of Administration shall appoint the Board of Awards from among those eligible."

SECTION 10. Sections 1 through 8 of this act become effective October 1, 2009. Section 9 of this act becomes effective June 30, 2009. The remainder of this act is effective when it becomes law.

S 425. FAIR HOUSING ACT AMENDMENT. Filed 3/4/09. AMENDING THE STATE FAIR HOUSING ACT TO PROHIBIT DISCRIMINATION ON THE BASIS OF RECEIPT OF HOUSING ASSISTANCE AND TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS TO THE NORTH CAROLINA HUMAN RELATIONS COMMISSION TO ADMINISTER THIS ACT.

As the title indicates. Amends GS 41A-3 to add a new subdivision defining *housing* assistance as a subsidy provided to defray the cost of rental housing for a household that has a member who is either: (1) age 62 or older, or (2) has been found eligible for a government-funded disability program.

Amends GS 41A-4 to add *housing assistance* to the list of factors that when used as a basis for discriminatory actions in real estate transactions, real estate related transactions, or participation in real estate related services or organizations, constitute unlawful discriminatory housing practices.

Makes conforming changes to GS 41A-5, regarding proof of a violation of GS Chapter 41A. Also provides that it is *not* a violation of the Chapter if the housing assistance on which the transaction is dependent is not authorized for the transaction within 14 days of the date of the landlord's approval of the tenant. Makes conforming changes to GS 41A-6(a), regarding exceptions to the application of the provisions of GS 41A-4 (unlawful discriminatory housing practices).

Makes additional technical changes.

Allocates \$50,000 of the funds appropriated to the Department of Administration for the 2009-10 fiscal year to the NC Human Relations Commission for use in handling additional claims that arise from the addition of housing assistance status to this act.

Effective October 1, 2009, and applies to actions taken or not taken on or after this date. **Intro. by Kinnaird.** GS 41A

S 425. STREAMLINE PLAN REV. & INSPECTION/STATE BLDGS. (NEW). Filed 3/4/09. House committee substitute deletes all the provisions of the 3rd edition and replaces it with AN ACT TO STREAMLINE THE PLAN REVIEW AND INSPECTION PROCESS FOR STATE BUILDINGS BY TRANSFERRING THE AUTHORITY FOR BUILDING CODE ENFORCEMENT WITH RESPECT TO STATE BUILDINGS FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF INSURANCE TO THE DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION; BY TRANSFERRING FOUR CODE ENFORCEMENT POSITIONS FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF INSURANCE TO THE DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION; BY CREATING FOUR CODE ENFORCEMENT POSITIONS IN THE DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION; AND TO CONTINUE THE SECRETARY OF ADMINISTRATION'S AUTHORITY TO APPOINT MEMBERS TO THE BOARD OF AWARDS.

Amends GS 58-31-40 to require the Commissioner of Insurance (Commissioner), after at minimum an annual inspection of state property, to notify in writing the agency or official in charge of the property of any defect or any necessary improvement, and to forward a copy of that notice to the Department of Administration. Deletes provision that requires the submission of plans as to the proposed building to the Commissioner for approval as to fire safety for buildings erected for

the use of the state or any state institution, and also deletes provision directing the Commissioner to review such plans.

Enacts new GS 143-345.11 to provide that plans for erecting a building for the use of the state or any state institution cannot receive approval until the plan has been submitted to and approved by the Secretary of Administration (Secretary) as to state construction standards, and at minimum as to the fire safety of the proposed building. Provides that any plan submitted to the Commissioner and approved before the statute's effective date (October 1, 2009) is deemed to have been jointly approved by the Commissioner and the Secretary. Directs the Secretary to provide quarterly written reports on plans reviewed and approved under this section to the Commissioner in a form approved by the Commissioner and the Secretary. Provides that nothing in this section is to be construed as abrogating the authority of the Commissioner under GS 58-31-40 or any other provision of law.

Amends GS 143-139 to add new subsection (e) to designate the Department of Administration (Department) as the state agency having general supervision, through the Office of State Construction, of the administration and enforcement of all sections of the North Carolina State Building Code except those sections of the Code specifically allocated to other agencies by subsections (c) and (d) of this statute. Identifies the Department as the only agency with the authority to seek remedies pursuant to this statute with respect to state buildings. Also provides that nothing in this section is to be construed as abrogating the authority of the Commissioner under GS 58-31-40 or any other provision of law. Makes a conforming change to GS 143-139(b).

Amends GS 143-341(3)d, to include among the powers and duties of the Department, to act as the appropriate official inspector or inspection department for purposes of GS 143-143.2.

Directs the North Carolina Code Officials Qualification Board (Qualification Board), in consultation with the Departments of Administration and Insurance, to develop an expedited course of training on State Building Code regulations (Code) and Code-enforcement administration to facilitate persons obtaining Level III standard certification. Requires the Qualification Board to issue a Level III standard certificate for the exercise of duties under GS 143-341(3) to any person who (1) was employed by the Department on the day that this act became effective; (2) successfully completes a course, developed under this section, relating to the Code regulations and Code-enforcement administration; (3) successfully completes all examinations required by the Qualification Board; and (4) has a valid license to practice as an architect, registered under GS Chapter 83A or a professional engineer, registered under GS Chapter 89C.

Directs the Department of Insurance to transfer four building code review positions to the Department of Administration. Provides that these positions are to be selected by the Department of Administration and used to assist the Department in administering GS 143-341(3) and GS 143-139(e). Directs the Insurance Regulatory Fund to support the positions at 100% of the full budgeted amount for each position from fiscal year 2009-10 through fiscal year 2011-12. Directs the State Treasurer, as custodian of the State Property Fire Insurance Fund (SPFIF), to support the positions out of SPFIF, beginning with the 2012-13 fiscal year.

Establishes four new Engineering/Architectural Technician-Advanced positions within the Department, at a budgeted amount of \$69,862 per position, to assist the Department in administering GS 143-341(3) and GS 143-139(e). Directs the Insurance Regulatory Fund to support the positions from fiscal year 2009-10 through fiscal year 2011-12. Directs the State Treasurer, as custodian of the State SPFIF, to support the positions out of SPFIF, beginning with the 2012-13 fiscal year.

Amends Section 2 of SL 2007-169, as amended, to provide that notwithstanding GS 143-52.1 and SL 2006-203, the members of the Advisory Budget Commission in office on June 30, 2007, continue to be eligible for appointment to the Board of Awards (Board) through June 30, 2011 (was, June 30, 2009) and vacancies may be filled by the appointing authority. Directs the Secretary to appoint members to the Board from among those eligible through June 30, 2011 (was, June 30, 2009). Effective June 30, 2009.

Except as otherwise indicated, effective October 1, 2009.

S 425. STREAMLINE PLAN REV. & INSPECTION/STATE BLDGS. Filed 3/4/09. House amendment makes the following changes to 4th edition. Provides that four new Engineering/Architectural Technician-Advanced positions are to be supported by the Insurance Regulatory Fund (was, supported by the Insurance Regulatory Fund from 2009-10 fiscal year through 2011-12 fiscal year, and beginning with fiscal year 2012-13, directed the State Treasurer to support the positions out of the State Property Fire Insurance Fund).

A JOINT RESOLUTION HONORING FOUR-TIME NASCAR SPRINT CUP CHAMPION JIMMIE JOHNSON.

Whereas, at the age of 34, Jimmie Johnson has had an outstanding career as a race car driver; and

Whereas, Jimmie Johnson began racing on 50cc motorcycles at the age of five and within a few years had moved to the 60cc motorcycle class, winning his first championship at the age of eight; and

Whereas, Jimmie Johnson began competing in the Mickey Thompson Entertainment Group Stadium Racing Series and later advanced to off-road racing; and

Whereas, in 1998, Jimmie Johnson began driving in the American Speed Association Series, earning the title of ASA Pat Schauer Rookie of the Year; and

Whereas, Jimmie Johnson raced in the NASCAR Busch Series beginning in 1998 and posted his first Busch Series win in 2001 at the inaugural race at Chicagoland Speedway; and

Whereas, Jimmie Johnson began his career as a driver in the NASCAR Sprint Cup Series in 2002 driving the Lowe's #48 Chevrolet for Hendrick Motorsports and has been sponsored by North Carolina-based Lowe's Home Improvement Warehouse; and

Whereas, in 2002, Jimmie Johnson became the first rookie in NASCAR Sprint Cup racing to lead in the point standings, claiming three victories in his rookie campaign by winning twice at Dover International Speedway and once at California Speedway, and the first rookie in series history to sweep both races at a track; and

Whereas, in 2003, Jimmie Johnson finished second in the Sprint Cup point standings with three wins, 14 top-five finishes, 20 top-ten finishes, and two poles. He swept the May races at Lowe's Motor Speedway, capturing victories in the All-Star Race and the Coca-Cola 600, and won two races at New Hampshire International Raceway; and

Whereas, in 2004, Jimmie Johnson was able to complete the season with a second-place finish in the inaugural Chase for the NASCAR Sprint Cup Championship, had the most number of wins of any driver with eight victories, claimed 20 top-five and 23 top-10 finishes, and led 24 races for a total of 1,312 points; and

Whereas, during the 2005 season, Jimmie Johnson's accomplishments included a fifth-place finish in the Chase for the NASCAR Sprint Cup Championship, the lead in point standings for 17 weeks, first-place finishes at Las Vegas Motor Speedway and Dover International Speedway, winning both points events at Lowe's Motor Speedway, and becoming the only driver ranked in the top 10 in point standings after every race during the season; and



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Whereas, in 2006, Jimmie Johnson captured his first NASCAR Sprint Cup Championship at Homestead-Miami Speedway and became the only driver in the modern era to win at least three races in each of his first five full-time seasons; and

Whereas, at that time, Jimmie Johnson's success placed him among four other drivers in NASCAR's history to have won the Daytona 500 and the NASCAR Sprint Cup Championship in the same season and the title of Driver of the Year; and

Whereas, in 2007, Jimmie Johnson won his second consecutive Sprint Cup Series Championship and finished the season with 10 wins, 20 top-five finishes, 24 top-10 finishes, and four poles; and

Whereas, in November 2008, Jimmie Johnson's fifteenth-place finish in the Ford 400 at Homestead-Miami Speedway earned him his third consecutive Sprint Cup Championship; and

Whereas, with this victory, Jimmie Johnson became the first person to win three back-to-back championships in 30 years since Cale Yarborough repeated three times from 1976 to 1978; and

Whereas, Jimmie Johnson's third Sprint Cup Championship enabled him to become part of an elite class of three-time champions, which includes Richard Petty, Dale Earnhardt, Jeff Gordon, Darrell Waltrip, David Pearson, Lee Petty, and Cale Yarborough; and

Whereas, in 2009, Jimmie Johnson became the first driver in NASCAR history to win four consecutive Sprint Cup Series Championships; and

Whereas, Jimmie Johnson also won four races during the 10-race Chase for the Championship in 2009, tying his record of four wins in 2004 and 2007; and

Whereas, Jimmie Johnson was named the 2009 Male Athlete of the Year by the Associated Press, becoming the first race car driver to earn the award in its 78-year history; and

Whereas, during the off-season, Jimmie Johnson is a frequent guest on late night television shows and other media outlets; and

Whereas, Jimmie Johnson founded the Jimmie Johnson Foundation with his wife Chandra Johnson in February 2006 to assist children, families, and communities in need across the United States; and

Whereas, in March of 2006, the Jimmie Johnson Foundation established Victory Lanes, a bowling alley for campers with chronic and life-threatening illnesses at Kyle and Pattie Petty's Victory Junction Camp in Randleman, North Carolina; and

Whereas, Jimmie Johnson's achievements as a member of the Hendrick Motorsports team are a fitting memorial to the memory of William C. "Bill" France, known to the racing world as Bill France, Jr., who succeeded his father, William Henry Getty "Big Bill" France, as President of NASCAR, serving the company from 1972 to 2000; and

Whereas, Bill France, Jr., died on June 4, 2007, and is survived by his wife, Betty Jane, and children, Brian France and Lesa France Kennedy; Now, therefore, Be it resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. The General Assembly congratulates Jimmie Johnson on earning his fourth consecutive NASCAR Sprint Cup Championship.

Whereas, prompt delivery of CPR more than doubles the victim's chance of survival by helping to maintain vital blood flow to the heart and brain, increasing the amount of time in which an electric shock from a defibrillator may be effective; and

Whereas, an automated external defibrillator (AED), even when used by a bystander, is safe, easy to operate, and, if used immediately after the onset of sudden cardiac arrest, highly effective in terminating ventricular fibrillation so the heart can resume a normal, effective rhythm; and

Whereas, for every minute without bystander CPR, survival from witnessed cardiac arrest decreases 7-10 percent; and

A JOINT RESOLUTION HONORING THE FOUNDERS OF THE TOWN OF TRYON ON THE TOWN'S ONE HUNDREDTH TWENTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY.

Whereas, in 1767, William Tryon, Royal Colonial Governor of North Carolina, negotiated a treaty line separating lands claimed by settlers from the Cherokee hunting grounds to the west, at which time one of the landmark peaks was named Tryon Mountain; and

Whereas, in 1839, a frontier post office named Tryon was established on Howard Gap Road; and

Whereas, in 1877, the Asheville-Spartanburg Railroad established a line to connect the markets and seaports of the South Carolina Low Country to the people and resources of Western North Carolina, Tennessee, and the Ohio Valley, which had a dramatic impact upon the course of this area's economic and social development; and

Whereas, Tryon City was chartered as an incorporated municipality on March 11, 1885, by the North Carolina General Assembly with the appointment of T.T. Ballenger as Mayor; C.L. Jordan, George A. Smith, and Edwin Anderson as Commissioners; and John M. Dalton as Marshall; and

Whereas, the Town was formally laid out in a half-mile radius circle around the intersection of Pacolet Street and the railroad, a location presently marked by the Town's mascot, the Tryon Horse; and

Whereas, one of Tryon's most distinguished early residents, William Gillette, a noted actor who, in collaboration with Arthur Conan Doyle, created the stage version of Sherlock Holmes in 1889; and

Whereas, on January 9, 1889, the Le Duc sisters established the Lanier Library, as a private subscription library, named in honor of Sidney Lanier, Poet Laureate of the Confederacy, to stimulate the development of the community's civic and cultural character; and

Whereas, in the 1890s, General Ulysses Doubleday, brother of American baseball founder General Abner Doubleday, established his Tryon grape industry on the slopes of Tryon's Laurel Avenue and the slopes of Little Piney Mountain growing white Niagara and red Delaware grapes and initiating an era of highly successful viticulture on Tryon area slopes; and

Whereas, in 1915, Eleanor Vance and Charlotte Yale, late from Biltmore Industries, moved to Tryon and established the Tryon Toymakers and Wood Carvers, which trained local craftsmen for production of artisan furniture and toys which were sold worldwide; and

Whereas, in 1918, Carter P. Brown, noted Michigan hotelier, hearing of the Town's natural beauty and friendly citizens, converted a lodge, formerly used as a tuberculosis sanatorium, into the historical Pine Crest Inn, founded, shortly thereafter, the Tryon Riding and Hunt Club and laid the foundation for Tryon's thriving equestrian cultural tradition; and

Whereas, in 1920, the State Legislature granted Tryon a second charter changing the name from Tryon City to the Town of Tryon; and



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Whereas, in 1928, the Tryon Daily Bulletin, the world's smallest daily newspaper. was launched by Seth Vining; and

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Whereas, also in 1928, Tryon physicians, Dr. Allen J. Jervey and Dr. Marion C.

Palmer, founded the 25-bed St. Luke's Hospital, with funds from an initial bequest by Miss Lucy Embury, a grant from Duke Foundation and \$57,000 contributed by local citizens; and

Whereas, Tryon has contributed to the leadership and historic preservation of the State of North Carolina, sending T.T. Ballenger to serve as State Senator in 1903, Francis T. Bacon to serve as State Representative in 1925 and 1937, Carroll P. Rogers to serve as State Representative in 1929, 1939, and 1941, and as a State Senator in 1945, during which time Rogers cosponsored the bill enabling the State to purchase the site of Tryon Palace in New Bern; and

Whereas, numerous individuals of social, cultural, literary, and cinematic fame have deeply invested themselves in the Town of Tryon, including Lou Hoover, Grace Coolidge, Eleanor Roosevelt, Margaret Culkin Banning, Lady Astor, F. Scott Fitzgerald, Ernest Hemmingway, General George Marshall, and David Niven, among others; and

Whereas, in 1933, internationally renowned singer and human rights activist Nina Simone, née Eunice Waymon, was born in Tryon; and

Whereas, in 1964, a bequest from Violet Parish-Watson requiring matching funds from the public to build a "civic auditorium and arts center" led to the organization and opening in 1969 of the Tryon Fine Arts Center through the vision and hard work of many individuals and arts organizations including Tryon Little Theater, Tryon Concert Association, Tryon Arts & Crafts, and Tryon Painters & Sculptors; and

Whereas, in 1985, Foothills Equestrian Nature Center (F.E.N.C.E.) came into being as a non-profit nature education and outdoor recreation center, built around an original contribution of 112 acres from the Mahler family who had come to Tryon in the 1920s; and

Whereas, in 1992, the Tryon Business Beautification Association, now the Tryon Downtown Development Association, was created by concerned citizens to foster improvements in downtown Tryon; and

Whereas, March 11, 2010, marked the 125th anniversary of the original Town Charter; Now, therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring:

SECTION 1. The General Assembly honors the memory of the founders of the Town of Tryon and expresses its appreciation for the contributions that these citizens made to the State of North Carolina.

SECTION 2. The General Assembly joins the citizens of the Town of Tryon in celebrating the Town's 125th anniversary and encourages the people of this State to participate in activities planned through March 10, 2011, to celebrate the Town's historic anniversary.

SECTION 3. The Secretary of State shall transmit a certified copy of this resolution to the Mayor of the Town of Tryon.

A JOINT RESOLUTION HONORING THE FOUNDERS OF TRANSYLVANIA COUNTY ON THE OCCASION OF THE COUNTY'S ONE HUNDRED FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY.

Whereas, Transylvania County was formed from Henderson and Jackson Counties by an act of the State Legislature in 1861; and

Whereas, the act was introduced by Hendersonville attorney and representative of the House of Commons in the General Assembly, Joseph P. Jordan; and

Whereas, Transylvania County's name was derived from the words trans ("across") and silva or sylva ("woods"); and

Whereas, the many tributes and events of historical importance make Transylvania County truly unique; and

Whereas, the City of Brevard, laid out on land donated by Braxton C. Lankford, Leander S. Gash, and Alex F. England, was established as the county seat in 1868 and was named for Dr. Ephraim Brevard, who helped write the Declaration of Independence for Mecklenburg County and served his burgeoning young nation as a surgeon during the American Revolution; and

Whereas, perhaps the most widely known pioneer family in the County's past, the Gillespie family (formerly Gillaspie), has had a historical impact reaching far beyond the upper French Broad River as the founders of Transylvania County's famed clan of gunsmiths. The father, John Gillespie, also fought in the American Revolution and has been added to the honored roll of veterans of the American War for Independence who were laid to rest in Transylvania County; and

Whereas, in 1902, Joseph S. and Elizabeth Mount Silversteen came to Transylvania County as a young couple and embarked on a lifetime of business and civic leadership. The Silversteen family provided jobs for thousands of people throughout the County at their Toxaway Tanning, Gloucester Lumber, and Rosman Tanning Extract companies in Rosman and Transylvania Tanning in Brevard. The Silversteen's legacy of civic and cultural involvement continues to benefit the citizens of Transylvania County today; and

Whereas, the original Brevard Rosenwald School for African-Americans was constructed in 1920 and was a place of learning and of celebrating one's identity and, furthermore, emphasized the need for the students themselves to be caring, compassionate citizens; and

Whereas, Transylvania County became the State's first public school system to integrate, beginning in 1963, and became fully integrated in 1966, and Brevard High School was the first North Carolina high school to field integrated athletic teams, beginning with its 1963 State champion football team; and



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and Whereas, residents of Transylvania County take pride in the cultural resources in the County, including the Brevard Music Center, an internationally known summer institute which provides outstanding opportunities for students to learn and work with some of music's acknowledged professionals; an excellent public library known statewide for its high usage and contributions to the community's cultural life; a public school system recognized across North Carolina as of the highest caliber; a broad faith community, with churches throughout the County; and a remarkable array of rich, indigenous mountain music and renowned arts and

formed in 1853, is the oldest college or university in the mountains of Western North Carolina;

Whereas, Brevard College, an internationally recognized liberal arts institution,

Whereas, Transylvania County is known as the "Land of Waterfalls," as it is blessed with over 250 waterfalls, partially due to the fact that parts of Transylvania County receive the largest amount of rainfall in the State; and

Whereas, the Blue Ridge Parkway traverses parts of the County, affording spectacular views of the Appalachian Mountains, which reach over 6,000 in feet elevation in the County, with the highest point being Chestnut Knob, which lies northwest of the county seat; and

Whereas, the Cradle of Forestry in America is a 6,500-acre historic site within the Pisgah National Forest which attracts more than 40,000 visitors annually. Officially established in 1968, its roots begin with Carl Schenck's Biltmore Forest School, the first forestry school in America. The Cradle's Forest Discovery Center offers visitors a hands-on experience in conservation, history, and resource management, telling the story of the history of the area and early forest practices; and

Whereas, Transylvania County citizens have always answered the call to serve in our nation's military forces in peace and wartime. Beginning with the Spanish-American War, through World War I, World War II, the Korean Conflict, Vietnam, the Gulf War, and now in Iraq and Afghanistan, our citizens were there. Both men and women served willingly and honorably in the United States Army, Marine Corps, Navy, Air Force, and the Coast Guard. Some did not return, answering the ultimate call; and

Whereas, Transylvania County has contributed to the social, economic, cultural, and political prosperity of the State of North Carolina; and

Whereas, Transylvania County has continued to grow and prosper through the continued dedication, insight, and planning of the County's concerned leaders and citizens; and

Whereas, 2010 marks the 20th anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act, landmark legislation to protect the civil rights of individuals with disabilities and ensure that more than 54 million Americans receive the same basic freedoms – independence, equal access, freedom of choice and inclusion – afforded to every citizen in our country; and

Whereas, the purpose of the Americans with Disabilities Act was to:

- (1) Provide a clear and comprehensive national mandate for the elimination of discrimination against individuals with disabilities.
- (2) Provide clear, strong, consistent, enforceable standards addressing discrimination against individuals with disabilities.
- (3) Ensure that the federal government plays a central role in enforcing the standards established in the act on behalf of individuals with disabilities.
- (4) Invoke the sweep of congressional authority, including the power to enforce the 14th amendment to the Constitution and to regulate commerce, in order to address the major areas of discrimination faced day-to-day by people with disabilities; and

Whereas, Congress passed the Americans with Disabilities Act with overwhelming bipartisan majorities, and President George H. W. Bush signed the bill into law on July 26, 1990; and

Whereas, the Americans with Disabilities Act established the world's first comprehensive prohibition of discrimination on the basis of disability in the areas of employment, public accommodations, public services, transportation, and telecommunications; and

Whereas, more than 1.822 million people with disabilities live in North Carolina, contributing to the State's economy and to the civic life in their communities; and

Whereas, many of the State's citizens have been recognized as advocates for individuals with disabilities, including Lockhart Follin-Mace, who served as the first director of the North Carolina Governor's Advocacy Council for Persons with Disabilities; Ron Mace, who served as founder and program director of The Center for Universal Design; and Deborah Greenblatt, who served as Executive Director of Carolina Legal Assistance, a legal services program devoted to enforcing the rights of children and adults with mental disabilities; and

Whereas, Kenneth D. Franklin served as Director of the North Carolina Office on the Americans with Disabilities Act; Manuel Houston Crockett served as the principal of the



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former Garner Road School for the Blind and the Deaf; and Grady Galloway chaired the Architectural Barriers Committee of the National Vocational Rehabilitation Association; and

Whereas, Thomas McCue "Mac" Brownlee, Ph.D., served on the Advocacy Council for Persons with Disabilities (now Disability Rights North Carolina); Dr. Gary Shaffer served as a professor of Social Work at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and was nationally known as an expert on children's issues; and Victor Hall was a pioneer of the self-advocacy movement; and

A JOINT RESOLUTION HONORING THE FOUNDERS OF THE CITY OF NEW BERN ON THE OCCASION OF THE CITY'S THREE HUNDREDTH ANNIVERSARY.

Whereas, New Bern was founded in 1710 by Swiss and German settlers at the confluence of the Neuse and Trent Rivers on the site of a former Native American community called Chattawka; and

Whereas, Christopher de Graffenried, a member of a prominent family from the area around Bern, Switzerland, founded and laid out the center of the City, which he named New Bern in honor of his native home; and

Whereas, despite early difficulties, including disagreements with the native population, New Bern prospered during the mid-eighteenth century as a major port and trading center; and

Whereas, Royal Governor William Tryon selected New Bern as the site of the first permanent capital of colonial North Carolina and had a palace built to serve as the seat of government and the home of the Governor; and

Whereas, New Bern served as the location of a number of noteworthy events, including the first Provincial Congress in defiance of British orders in 1774; the first meeting of the General Assembly in 1777; visits by George Washington and sitting Presidents James Monroe and Harry Truman; during Civil War occupation developed important black leaders who contributed to the Union Army and helped begin the Freedmen's Bank and Bureau; and the invention of "Brad's Drink" by pharmacy owner, Caleb Bradham, in 1898, which was later known as Pepsi; and

Whereas, many of New Bern's citizens have rendered distinguished service to the State and the nation, including Richard Dobbs Spaight, a member of the Continental Congress and signer of the United States Constitution; John Wright Stanly, a business owner whose merchant ships raided British vessels to aid the American cause during the Revolutionary War; William Gaston, a State legislator, State Supreme Court Justice, author of the State's song, a member of the United States Congress, founder of Saint Paul's Church, the oldest Catholic congregation in the State, and a champion of tolerance; Joseph Leach, North Carolina's first State treasurer and head of the Council of State during the Revolutionary War period; and George Henry White, a former slave, attorney, State legislator, and the last African-American to serve in the United States Congress prior to the passage of the Voting Rights Act of 1965; and

Whereas, New Bern has contributed to the cultural prosperity of the State, serving as the home of many artistic people including James Davis, the first printer in North Carolina; Mary Bayard Clarke, a well-known 19th century poet; Bayard Wooten, a nationally known early 20th century photographer; and Ervin Rouse, fiddler and composer of the Orange Blossom Special; and



Whereas, many place names in North Carolina honor individuals whose lives were important in New Bern and in North Carolina, including Wake County named for Margaret Wake Tryon, Tryon named for Governor William Tryon, Gaston County and Gastonia named for William Gaston, and Nash County named for Governor Abner Nash; and

 Whereas, New Bern is home to more than 150 sites listed on the National Register of Historic Properties; and

 Whereas, New Bern has seen a revival in civic pride and an interest in preserving the City's history and restoring the City's historic structures, including a new North Carolina History Center at Tryon Palace, a restored federal building and courthouse, a new and expanded Firemen's Museum, and a new visitor center at the site of the Battle of New Bern; and

Whereas, New Bern is observing its 300th anniversary in 2010 and plans to highlight this historic occasion through a series of year-long events and activities; and

Whereas, Boy Scouts of America was incorporated on February 8, 1910, by William Boyce, a Chicago publisher who modeled the organization on the Boy Scouts Association that was established in England in 1908; and

Whereas, the Boy Scouts of America was established to provide an educational program for boys and young adults to build character, to train in the responsibilities of participating citizenship, and to develop personal fitness; and

Whereas, North Carolina Central University (NCCU) in Durham was chartered in 1909 as a private institution and opened to students on July 10, 1910; and

Whereas, NCCU was founded by Dr. James E. Shepard as the National Religious Training School and Chautauqua; and

Whereas, in 1915, the School was sold and reorganized and its name was changed to the National Training School; and

Whereas, in 1923, the General Assembly appropriated funds for the purchase and maintenance of the School making it a publicly supported institution; and

Whereas, during that time, the School was renamed the Durham State Normal School; and

Whereas, in 1925, the School was converted to the North Carolina College for Negroes becoming the nation's first state-supported liberal arts college for African-American students; and

Whereas, the College saw significant expansion between 1927 and 1929 through appropriations from the General Assembly, a generous gift from B.N. Duke, and contributions from the citizens of Durham; and

Whereas, the College was accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools as an "A" class institution in 1937 and gained membership in that association in 1957; and

Whereas, in 1939, the General Assembly authorized the College to offer graduate studies, which led to the establishment of the School of Law in 1940 and the School of Library Science in 1941; and

Whereas, in 1947, the General Assembly changed the name of the College to North Carolina College at Durham and in 1969 changed the name to North Carolina Central University; and

Whereas, in 1972, NCCU became part of the consolidated University of North Carolina; and

Whereas, NCCU was led by Dr. Shepard from 1910 until his death on October 6, 1947; and

AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR STUDIES BY THE LEGISLATIVE RESEARCH COMMISSION, STATUTORY OVERSIGHT COMMITTEES AND COMMISSIONS, AND OTHER AGENCIES, COMMITTEES, AND COMMISSIONS.

The General Assembly of North Commissions and active.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

PART I. TITLE

SECTION 1.1. This act may be known as "The Studies Act of 2010."

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PART II. LEGISLATIVE RESEARCH COMMISSION

SECTION 2.1. The Legislative Research Commission may study the topics listed below. When applicable, the bill or resolution that originally proposed the issue or study and the name of the sponsor are listed. Unless otherwise specified, the listed bill or resolution refers to the measure introduced in the 2009 or 2010 session of the 2009 General Assembly. The Commission may consider the original bill or resolution in determining the nature, scope, and aspects of the study.

SECTION 2.2. Allowing State Personnel Commission to Transfer Annual and Sick Leave From A City or County (S.B. 1386 – East) – The Commission may study the issue of allowing the State Personnel Commission to transfer an employee's accrued annual and sick leave from a city or county, and allowing such transfers for employees shifting employment between units of local government. In conducting the study, the Commission may consider the fiscal impact of allowing the transfers, including any impact on the Teachers' and State Employees' Retirement System and Local Governmental Employees' Retirement System.

SECTION 2.3. Consolidation of State Agencies and Departments (S.B. 1427 – Brock) – The Commission may study issues relating to whether some State agencies and departments can be consolidated to achieve increased efficiency and cost savings.

SECTION 2.4. Flexibility for Certified Nurse Midwives (S.B. 940 – Davis) – The Commission is authorized to study whether certified nurse midwives should be given more flexibility in the practice of midwifery. In conducting the study, the Commission may consider whether a certified nurse midwife should be allowed to practice midwifery in collaboration with, rather than under the supervision of, a physician licensed to practice medicine under



Article 1 of Chapter 90 of the General Statutes who is actively engaged in the practice of obstetrics.

SECTION 2.5. Televising House of Representatives and Senate Sessions (Stevens.)

SECTION 2.5. Televising House of Representatives and Senate Sessions (Stevens, McKissick) — The Commission may study the feasibility of televising all House of Representatives and Senate sessions and, in conducting the study, may appoint an advisory committee composed of members of the Legislative Services Commission, other legislators, and members of the public. The study may also include the feasibility of streaming video content over the Internet. The study may include various options for handling the project, including the UNC Center for Public Television and the Agency for Public Telecommunications. The study may examine newer technologies for more cost-efficient means of handling the broadcasts.

SECTION 2.6. reserved

SECTION 2.7. reserved

SECTION 2.8. Efficient E-Commerce in State Government (S.B. 1425 – Brock) – The Commission may

- (1) Review the current payments and collections made by the State that have the greatest potential to benefit from increased automation.
- (2) Examine best practices in the use of electronic funds transfers and direct depositing for State government financial transactions.
- (3) Identify goals and objectives for a coordinated State program to make State government e-commerce more effective and cost efficient through paperwork reduction and lower transaction and personnel costs.
- (4) Consider any other matters related to improving State government e-commerce and lower the cost of financial transactions.

SECTION 2.9. Fur-bearer and Fox Management (Faison) – The Commission may study the effectiveness of the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission's implementation of G.S. 113-291.4(e). The Commission may solicit input from interested parties including hunters, trappers, public health authorities, local governments, the North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, and private landowners.

SECTION 2.10. Pre-Escheat Procedures (Stein) – The Commission may study the need for statutory changes to the law governing location of the legitimate owner of unclaimed property prior to the assumption of the abandonment of the property by the State Treasurer, and to permit a person holding unclaimed property to recover a reasonable charge for complying with the good faith effort requirement of G.S. 116B-59.

SECTION 2.11. Changing Demographics in the State Community College and University Systems (S.B. 1457 – Allran) – The Commission may study issues relating to the changing demographics in the State's community college and university systems. The Commission may consider how, over the last decade, the populations attending the State's community colleges and universities have changed with regard to all of the following:

- (1) Age.
- (2) Reasons for attendance.
- (3) Students enrolling who have prior educational experience.
- (4) Students enrolling through college transfer programs from community colleges.
- (5) Any other issue the Commission deems relevant to the study.

SECTION 2.12. Ownerless Dogs and Cats, Commercial Dog Breeding (S.B. 1332 – McKissick, Jones; S.B. 460 – Davis; H.B. 208 – Harrison, Wray, Cotham, Carney) – The Commission may study issues related to ownerless dogs and cats, and the State's role in ensuring the humane treatment of dogs and cats by breeders, shelters, and other facilities that house dogs and cats.

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SECTION 2.13. Use of Military Veteran Contractors (H.B. 912 - Killian) - The Commission may study methods to encourage State and local government to use military veteran contractors.

SECTION 2.14. Requiring Long-Term Care Facilities to Carry Liability Insurance (H.J.R. 1768 – Harrison, Insko, Jeffus) – The Commission may study whether long-term care facilities should be required to carry liability insurance. In conducting the study, the Commission should consider:

- Whether the laws of this State adequately protect the ability of residents of (1) long-term care facilities who are harmed by a wrongful act of the facility from receiving just compensation because of bankruptcy or other actions by the facility's owners to unjustly shield personal or business assets.
- Whether as a condition of licensure, long-term care facilities should carry ·(2) liability insurance.
- (3) Whether other states require long-term care facilities to carry liability insurance as a requirement for licensure.

SECTION 2.15. Insurance Coverage Options for Fresh Produce Growers (Wray) -The Commission may study the issue of adequate insurance coverage options for fresh produce growers.

SECTION 2.16. Use of "Most Favored Nation" Clauses (H.B. 2004 – Insko) – The Committee may study the use of "Most Favored Nation" (MFN) clauses in contracts. In conducting the study, the Committee should consider:

- The extent to which MFN clauses are included in contracts in our State, and (1) in the nation as a whole.
- The most common forms and elements of MFN clauses included in (2)
- (3) The effect that inclusion of MFN clauses in contracts.
- The effect that prohibiting the use of MFN clauses in contracts has had in (4) those states that have prohibited their use.
- (5) Any other issue relating to the use or prohibition of MFN clauses in contracts that the Committee deems appropriate.

SECTION 2.17. Regulation of Beauty Pageants for Youth Under Thirteen Years of Age (H.B. 1348 - Mobley) - The Commission may study the regulation of beauty pageants for youth under 13 years of age in North Carolina.

SECTION 2.18. State Boards and Commissions – The Commission may study consolidation or elimination of State Boards and Commissions.

PART III. JOINT LEGISLATIVE HEALTH CARE OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE **STUDIES**

SECTION 3.1. The Joint Legislative Health Care Oversight Committee may study the topics listed in this Part and report its findings, together with any recommended legislation, to the 2011 Regular Session of the General Assembly upon its convening.

SECTION 3.2. State Diabetes Coordinator (England) - The Committee may study the issue of the feasibility of establishing a State Diabetes Coordinator as a way to help address the growing epidemic of diabetes in the State. The coordinator could be charged to advise ways to save lives, improve the quality of life, and save money for taxpayers and patients by reducing the rates of diabetes and its complications.

SECTION 3.3. Review of Collaborative Project for Reducing Medical Malpractice Claims (Glazier) - The Committee may review the collaborative project for reducing medical malpractice costs and claims.

SECTION 3.4. Monitor Impact of Revised Requirements for Personal Care Services (Adams) - The Committee may study and monitor the impact that the revised eligibility requirements for Personal Care Services has on seniors and disabled citizens, including the number of persons who are refused services and the reasons therefore and the time frame between request for services and the initiation of services.

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PART IV. JOINT LEGISLATIVE TRANSPORTATION OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE STUDIES

SECTION 4.1. The Joint Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee may study the topics listed in this Part and report its findings, together with any recommended legislation, to the 2011 Regular Session of the General Assembly upon its convening.

SECTION 4.2. Untitled Vehicles Removed and Sold for Scrap (Gibson) — The Committee, in consultation with the Division of Motor Vehicles, may study the issue of the untitled vehicles being removed and sold for scrap without sufficient notice to the owner.

SECTION 4.3. Welcome Centers and Visitor Centers (H.B. 2046 – Tucker, Cole) – The Committee, in consultation with the Department of Transportation and the Department of Commerce, may study issues related to the location, funding, construction, maintenance, and operation of visitor centers and welcome centers in the State.

SECTION 4.4. Debt Agreements (H.B. 1800 – Crawford) – The Committee, as a part of the study authorized under Section 28.7(e) of Senate Bill 897, may study the issue of the appropriate scope of the power of the Department of Transportation to enter into debt and debt-like agreements pursuant to G.S. 136-18(39).

SECTION 4.5. Street Construction/Developer Responsibility (S.B. 761 – Brown; Cole) – The Committee may study whether to limit the responsibility of developers for the cost of street or highway construction to the amount necessary to serve the projected traffic generated by a development.

PART V. JOINT LEGISLATIVE EDUCATION OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE STUDIES

SECTION 5.1. The Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee may study the topics listed in this Part and report its findings, together with any recommended legislation, to the 2011 Regular Session of the General Assembly upon its convening.

SECTION 5.2. Virtual School of Engineering (Shaw) – The Committee may study the feasibility of establishing a Virtual School of Engineering. The purpose of the study is to determine the cost and feasibility of developing and maintaining a Virtual School of Engineering, including the effectiveness of linking the constituent institutions to the established UNC Schools of Engineering by offering engineering classes through satellite and online courses, whether an engineering curriculum lends itself to such a model, and any other related issues deemed relevant by the Committee.

SECTION 5.3. Graduation Disparity (S.B. 1417 – Graham) – The Committee may examine each of the following:

- (1) Minority graduation statistics.
- (2) National best practices for educating minority students.
- (3) Current statewide efforts to increase high school retention of minority students.
- (4) Teaching methodologies specifically designed for minority students.
- (5) Existing technical and career curriculum.
- (6) Innovative practices or solutions that have demonstrated success in other states.

The Committee may develop a comprehensive statewide plan and recommendations for increasing the number of minority individuals who complete high school.

SECTION 5.4. Maximum Age for Enrollment in Public Schools (H.J.R. 1948 – Fisher, Gill, Yongue, Farmer-Butterfield) – The Committee may study whether the maximum initial age for enrollment in the public schools shall be lowered from age seven to age six.

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PART VI. ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW COMMISSION STUDIES

SECTION 6.1. The Environmental Review Commission may study the topics listed in this Part and report its findings, together with any recommended legislation, to the 2011 Regular Session of the General Assembly upon its convening.

SECTION 6.2. Impact of Environmental Toxins on Human Health (S.B. 1416 – Bingham; H.B. 2015 - Harrison, Glazier, Fisher, Insko) - The Commission may study the impact of environmental toxins on human health and report its findings and recommendations. including any proposals for legislation or administrative action, to the General Assembly no later than the convening of the 2012 Session of the 2011 General Assembly. The findings and recommendations may include all of the following:

- A survey of legislation in other states that ban toxins and chemicals, along (1) with an assessment of the effectiveness of the legislation.
- A survey of how other states have set up entities within state government to (2) review and regulate toxins and chemicals that have or will be introduced into the stream of commerce.
- A review of incentives proposed or enacted in other states to promote the (3) growth of the green chemistry sector, including a special analysis of documented environmental, public health, and economic benefits, including job creation, within the states.

SECTION 6.3. Water Quality Cost Share (S.B. 1385 - McKissick) - The Commission may study the costs and benefits of improving water quality in reservoirs, rivers, and other water resources shared by local governments. In its study the Commission may consider the water quality issues for local governments located both upstream and downstream from water resources, the wastewater treatment standards that local governments both upstream and downstream must meet, the cost of complying with water quality and wastewater treatment standards, and the benefits received by local governments by complying with those standards. The Commission may also consider possible alternatives to the current rate structure, treatment programs, and technology used by the State and local governments with regard to water quality and wastewater treatment. The Commission may also consider any other issue that it deems relevant to this study.

SECTION 6.4. Oil and Gas Exploration in the Triassic Basin (Gibson, Love) - The Committee may study the issue of oil and gas exploration in the Triassic Basin.

SECTION 6.5. Issues Related to the Use and Storage of Reclaimed Water (H.B. 643 - Tucker) - The Commission, in consultation with the Department of Environment and Natural Resources, may study issues related to the use and storage of reclaimed water. In its study, the Commission may examine the following issues:

- The feasibility and desirability of implementation of reclaimed water (1) programs by municipal wastewater treatment facilities for nonconsumptive indoor use and outdoor use. The Commission may consider any of the following factors:
 - The implementation and efficacy of reclaimed water policies, programs, ordinances, standards, rules, and regulations established in other states, municipalities, and countries.
 - Minimum effluent standards for reclaimed water sufficient to address b. any public health, safety, or environmental risks that may be caused by use of or contact with reclaimed water.
 - Potential uses for reclaimed water for nonconsumptive indoor use C. including, but not limited to: toilet flushing; fire protection; and decorative water features.

- b. Whether current federal or State laws, including the Underground Injection Control Program of the federal Safe Drinking Water Act and current regional or watershed-based water management strategies, apply to aquifer storage and recovery in North Carolina and are sufficient to address any public health, safety, or environmental risks that may be caused by aquifer storage and recovery.
- c. Regulations necessary to assure the protection of public health, safety, and the environment if storage of reclaimed water in aquifers is determined to be in the best interest of the State.
- d. Any other topics the Commission deems appropriate to assure that aquifer storage and recovery systems will not be a detriment to public health, safety, or the environment.
- (4) Such other matters as the Commission deems appropriate in the conduct of this study.

SECTION 6.6. reserved

SECTION 6.7. Gas Leases in the Central Shale Belt (Gibson, Love) – The Commission may study the issue of gas leases in the central shale belt, located in the Chatham and Moore County area.

SECTION 6.8. Carbon Sequestration Potential of Natural and Working Landscapes and Other Carbon Offset Opportunities (S.B. 1220 – Stein, Albertson; H.B. 1809 – Harrison, Underhill, Wilkins) – The Commission may study the carbon sequestration potential of natural and working landscapes in the State and the feasibility and advisability of establishing a carbon offset program.

PART VII. REVENUE LAWS STUDY COMMITTEE STUDIES

SECTION 7.1. The Revenue Laws Study Committee may study the topics listed in this Part and report its findings, together with any recommended legislation, to the 2011 Regular Session of the General Assembly upon its convening.

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SECTION 7.2. reserved

SECTION 7.3. Ticket Resale (Gibson) — The Committee may study issues related to ticket resale, including the need for consumer protections in the primary market for event ticket sales; transparency of ticket distribution by artists, promoters and their agents; freedom of transferability for tickets purchased by consumers; and open interoperability of ticket sale and resale market systems.

PART VIII. JOINT LEGISLATIVE UTILITY REVIEW COMMITTEE STUDIES

SECTION 8.1. The Joint Legislative Utility Review Committee may study the topics listed in this Part and report its findings, together with any recommended legislation, to the 2011 Regular Session of the General Assembly upon its convening.

 SECTION 8.2. Gas Leases in the Central Shale Belt (Gibson, Love) – The Committee may study the issue of gas leases in the central shale belt, located in the Chatham and Moore County area.

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PART IX. JOINT LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM EVALUATION OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE STUDIES

SECTION 9.1. Operation of the Child Nutrition Program (S.B. 1152 – Purcell, Dannelly, Davis, Preston, Tillman, Walters; H.B. 1777 – Yongue, Brown, Insko, Parfitt) – The Joint Legislative Program Evaluation Oversight Committee may include in the 2010 Work Plan for the Program Evaluation Division of the General Assembly a study of the operation of the Child Nutrition Program. The Division may examine (i) the guidelines for assessing indirect costs to local child nutrition programs in local school administrative units and (ii) the financial impact upon local child nutrition programs and local school administrative units of a policy prohibiting the assessment of indirect costs to a child nutrition program until that program has achieved and sustained a three-month operating balance.

SECTION 9.2. Chapter 150B Contested Cases (S.B. 1305 – Nesbitt; H.B. 1892 – Insko, Braxton, Justus) – The Joint Legislative Program Evaluation Oversight Committee may include in the 2010 Work Plan for the Program Evaluation Division of the General Assembly a study of Chapter 150B contested cases. The Division may study the number of decisions rendered by administrative law judges that are overturned as a final agency decision. For these cases the Division may evaluate the nature of the case, the basis of the reversal, the number of cases appealed to superior court, and the results of those appeals.

PART X. JOINT LEGISLATIVE CORRECTIONS, CRIME CONTROL, AND JUVENILE JUSTICE OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE STUDIES

SECTION 10.1. The Joint Legislative Corrections, Crime Control, and Juvenile Justice Oversight Committee may study the topics listed in this Part and report its findings, together with any recommended legislation, to the 2011 Regular Session of the General Assembly upon its convening.

SECTION 10.2. Unsecured Bonds (Love) – The Committee may study the factors used in determining the release of defendants with unsecured bonds; the frequency of using unsecured bonds for the release of defendants; the failure to appear rates under unsecured bonds, when a failure to appear has occurred; the amount of time it takes and the entity most likely to apprehend the defendant, after the bond is forfeited; and the likelihood of converting forfeiture or judgment to revenue.

PART XI. JOINT LEGISLATIVE ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURE OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE TO STUDY IMPACT OF EXEMPTING WILDLIFE RESOURCES COMMISSION AND MARINE FISHERIES COMMISSION FROM THE LEGISLATIVE DISAPPROVAL PROCESS

SECTION 11.1. The Joint Legislative Administrative Procedure Oversight Committee may study the impact of exempting the Wildlife Resources Commission and the Marine Fisheries Commission from the legislative disapproval process under the Administrative Procedure Act. In conducting the study the Committee may consider the number of bills to disapprove rules adopted by either of the two Commissions that have been introduced since 2003, the effect of the delayed effective dates on the enforcement capabilities of the two Commissions, and alternatives available to the public for objecting to rules adopted by either of the two Commissions. The Joint Legislative Administrative Procedure Oversight Committee may report its findings and recommendations to the 2011 General Assembly.

PART XII. ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE COMMISSION STUDY

SECTION 12.1. The North Carolina Alcoholic Beverage Commission, in consultation with the League of Municipalities, the Association of County Commissioners, the Retail Merchants Association, the North Carolina Restaurant and Lodging Association, the Association of Local ABC Boards, and other interested parties, may study the following issues and report to the General Assembly by March 1, 2011:

- (1) The role of local government in ABC permit recommendations in promoting public safety, consistent with a system of uniform alcohol regulation in the State.
- (2) The existence of research-based best practices to promote public safety by limiting the number of ABC retail permits or the total capacity of ABC on-premises retail permits in jurisdictions with high concentrations of ABC permits.
- (3) Identifying regulatory or legal changes to promote more gradual dispersal of patrons at closing times and reducing the encouragement to rapidly consume alcohol at closing times.
- (4) The need for whistleblower protections for local ABC board employees, modeled on Article 14 of Chapter 126 of the General Statutes.
- (5) The need for spirituous liquor sales representatives and brokerage representative permits for the effective oversight of trade practices.
- (6) The need for uniform training standards in alcohol regulation for local ABC law enforcement officers and contracted officers exercising ABC regulatory enforcement powers.
- (7) Identification of statutes inconsistent with a uniform legal framework maintaining the three tiers of alcohol regulation of supplier, distributor/wholesaler, and retailer.

PART XIII. STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO STUDY ISSUES RELATED TO SPORTS INJURIES AT MIDDLE SCHOOL AND HIGH SCHOOL LEVELS (H.B. 1837 – Cotham, Fisher, Glazier, Rapp)

SECTION 13.1. The State Board of Education shall study issues relating to sports injuries for all sports at the middle school and high school levels, focusing on the prevention and treatment of injuries. In conducting the study, the Board should consult with school administrators, representatives of the North Carolina High School Athletic Association, high school athletic directors, middle school coaches, athletic trainers, and doctors with expertise in the area of sports medicine. All State departments and agencies and local governments and their subdivisions shall furnish the Board with any information in their possession or available to them.

SECTION 13.2. The State Board shall submit a final report of the results of its study and its recommendations to the 2011 General Assembly upon its convening.

 PART XIV. STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO ESTABLISH A BLUE RIBBON TASK FORCE TO STUDY THE IMPACTS OF RAISING THE COMPULSORY PUBLIC SCHOOL ATTENDANCE AGE (S.B. 1249 – Davis; H.B. 1879 – Parmon, Bryant, Hurley, Hall)

SECTION 14.1. The State Board of Education shall establish a Blue Ribbon Task Force to study the impacts of raising the compulsory public school attendance age prior to completion of a high school diploma from 16 to 17 or 18. In its study, the Board of Governors shall consider all of the following:

- (1) What impacts, including fiscal impacts, has raising the compulsory school attendance age had in states which have raised the compulsory school attendance age in the last 15 years.
- What conclusions can be drawn as to the impact the compulsory school attendance age has made in the dropout and high school completion rates for states who require compulsory school attendance to ages 16, 17, and 18, respectively.
- (3) What best practices for working with at-risk populations of students who remain in school have been employed in states that have raised the compulsory attendance age in the last 15 years.
- (4) What would be the fiscal impact in raising the compulsory school attendance age from 16 to 17 and 16 to 18, respectively, for each local administrative school unit in North Carolina.

SECTION 14.2. No later than November 15, 2010, the State Board of Education shall submit a report of its study to the Joint Legislative Commission on Dropout Prevention and High School Graduation and the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee, including its findings and recommendations.

PART XV. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE FOR HIGHWAY SAFETY IN THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION TO STUDY RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ADDITIONAL LEGISLATION TO ADDRESS THE CAUSES OF TEEN DRIVING FATALITIES (S.B. 900 – Rouzer)

SECTION 15.1. The Executive Committee for Highway Safety in the Department of Transportation shall report to the General Assembly by April 30, 2011, its recommendations for additional legislation to address the causes of teen driving fatalities.

PART XVI. NORTH CAROLINA INSTITUTE OF MEDICINE TO STUDY THE NEEDS OF YOUNG CHILDREN WITH MENTAL HEALTH PROBLEMS AND THEIR FAMILIES (S.B. 1321 – Nesbitt; H.B. 1903 – Insko)

SECTION 16.1. The North Carolina Institute of Medicine may convene a Task Force to study the needs of young children with mental health problems and their families. The Task Force shall:

- (1) Examine the current mental health needs of young children, defined as children from birth to age five.
- (2) Examine existing public and private systems of mental health care that are currently available to families of young children with mental health problems.
- (3) Identify evidence-based and promising universal, selective, and indicated prevention strategies to promote the emotional well-being of young children.
- (4) Identify strategies for early screening and identification of young children with mental health risk factors or mental health problems. The screening and identification strategies shall address the impact of parents' behavioral health problems on the mental health of their young children.

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- Review evidence-based and promising interventions and systems to promote (5) the positive mental health and emotional well-being of young children and their families.
- Identify strategies to ensure that children who are at high risk of developing (6) mental health problems and their families have access to a comprehensive range of treatments and services, coordinated across agencies and service systems that are (i) culturally, linguistically, and developmentally sensitive; (ii) individualized; (iii) family-centered; (iv) home-, school-, community-based; and (v) evidence-based.
- Examine workforce adequacy and training needs of mental health (7) professionals and other professionals who provide services to young children and their families.
- (8) Examine the adequacy of State and other funding to support a comprehensive array of evidence-based services.
- Recommend strategies to develop, evaluate, and disseminate treatment and (9) service delivery models to meet young children's mental health needs.
- Examine any other issue that the NCIOM deems relevant to the study. (10)

SECTION 16.2. The NCIOM shall make an interim report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services no later than January 15, 2012, which may include legislative and other recommendations, and shall issue its final report with findings, recommendations, and any proposed legislation to the 2013 General Assembly upon its convening.

PART XVII. DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES, DIVISION OF MEDICAL ASSISTANCE, TO STUDY THE FEASIBILITY OF REQUIRING PROVIDERS ENROLLED IN COMMUNITY CARE OF NORTH CAROLINA TO IMPLEMENT BODY MASS INDEX SCREENING FOR CHILDREN AT RISK OF **BECOMING OBESE** AND **WHO ARE RECEIVING MEDICAID** PARTICIPATING IN NORTH CAROLINA HEALTH CHOICE FOR CHILDREN PROGRAM (S.B. 1286 -Purcell; H.B. 1904 -England, Hughes, Weiss, Yongue)

SECTION 17.1. The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Medical Assistance, may explore the feasibility of requiring Community Care of North Carolina (CCNC) to implement body mass index (BMI) screening for children at risk of becoming obese and developing diabetes or other chronic diseases, who are receiving Medicaid or participating in the North Carolina Health Choice for Children Program.

SECTION 17.2. As part of its exploration into the feasibility of requiring BMI screening pursuant to Section 17.1, the Department shall work toward the development of each of the following items:

- Establishing performance goals within each CCNC network that includes (1) each of the following components:
 - Care management for children who are at risk of becoming obese and developing diabetes or other chronic diseases.
 - Annual BMI screening to identify the percentage of children who b. have a BMI test and the percentage of children who have a decrease in BMI levels.
- (2) Developing a uniform protocol across the CCNC network to ensure the integrity and confidentiality of information collected through BMI screening.
- Implementing reliable methods of collecting data utilizing fitness assessment (3) and reporting programs for youth that include health-related physical fitness

- Make our communities safer for both consumers and others.
- Reduce recidivism for the MHDDSA population. (12)

SECTION 18.6. The Task Force shall:

- Identify frequent users of psychiatric beds (state and community) and (1) emergency departments.
- (2) For the above group, determine:
 - Their housing situation. (a)
 - (b) Incarceration history.
 - (c) Recidivism rates.
 - Treatment offered and treatment compliance. (d)
 - (e) Other factors as determined by task force.
- (3) Review existing state and national initiatives in this area.

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- (4) Use information from subsections (1) and (2) to do the following:
 - (a) Study current practices and issues related to placement of MHDDSA populations following discharge from psychiatric facilities.
 - (b) Develop a business case for the development of a statewide supportive housing initiative to benefit MHDDSA populations.
 - (c) Calculate the number of supportive housing units needed in the state.
 - (d) Calculate the level of capital investment needed for this multi-year initiative.
 - (e) Propose different methods that could be used to pay for ongoing operational costs.
 - (f) Examine the potential cost-saving attained through this strategy.
 - (g) Calculate the level of capital investment needed for this multi-year initiative.
- . (5) Other tasks as identified by the task force.

PART XIX. DEPARTMENT OF CULTURAL RESOURCES TO STUDY THE FEASIBILITY OF DESIGNATING THE ENDOR IRON FURNACE AS A STATE HISTORIC SITE (S.B. 1353 – Atwater; H.B. 1927 – Love)

SECTION 19.1. The Department of Cultural Resources shall study the feasibility of designating the Endor Iron Furnace as a State Historic Site. The Department shall submit the results of its study to the 2011 General Assembly upon its convening.

PART XX. DIVISION OF MARINE FISHERIES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENT AND NATURAL RESOURCES TO STUDY THE FISHERY MANAGEMENT PLAN DEVELOPMENT PROCESS (S.B. 1271 – Albertson; H.B. 1711 – Wainwright, Spear, Underhill)

SECTION 20.1. The Division of Marine Fisheries of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources shall study the Fishery Management Plan development process. The Division shall specifically consider how the process could be made more efficient without impairing public input into the process. The Division shall report its findings and recommendations, including any legislative proposals, to the Joint Legislative Commission on Seafood and Aquaculture no later than October 1, 2010.

PART XXI. EXTEND THE NORTH CAROLINA ZOOLOGICAL PARK FUNDING AND ORGANIZATION STUDY COMMITTEE (S.B. 1179 – Brunstetter; H.B. 1720 – Brubaker, E. Warren, Harrison)

SECTION 21.1. Section 5.11 of S.L. 2009-329 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 5.11. Report. – The Committee shall report its findings and recommendations to the 2010-2011 Regular Session of the 2009-2011 General Assembly and the Environmental Review Commission on or before May-1, December 31, 2010, at which time the Committee shall terminate."

PART XXII. LEGISLATIVE STUDY COMMISSION ON URBAN GROWTH AND INFRASTRUCTURE ISSUES REPORT DATE

SECTION 22.1. Section 36.6 of S.L. 2008-181 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 36.6. The Commission shall report the results of its study and its recommendations to the 2009 General Assembly upon its convening. The Commission shall submit its final report on or before the date of the convening of the 2011 General Assembly. The Commission shall expire upon the delivering of its final report, or the convening of the 2011 General Assembly, whichever occurs first."

 PART XXIII. STATE INVESTMENT STUDY REPORTING DATE (S.B. 1217 – Hartsell; H.B. 1811 – Michaux)

SECTION 23.1. Section 47.4 of S.L. 2009-574 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 47.4. The Commission shall make an interim report to the 2010 Regular Session of the 2009 General Assembly prior to its convening, and shall make a final report to the 2010 Regular Session of the 2011 General Assembly. The report shall include any proposed legislation."

PART XXIV. EXTEND JOINT SELECT COMMITTEE ON PRESERVATION OF BIOLOGICAL EVIDENCE (Glazier)

SECTION 24.1. Section 7.(d) of S.L. 2009-203 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 7.(d) The Committee shall submit a final report on the results of its study, including any proposed legislation, to the General Assembly on or before April 1, 2010 the convening of the Regular Session of the 2011 General Assembly. The Committee shall file a copy of its report with the President Pro Tempore's office, the Speaker's office, and the Legislative Library. The Committee shall terminate on April 1, 2010 upon the convening of the Regular Session of the 2011 General Assembly, or upon the filing of its final report, whichever occurs first."

PART XXV. EXTEND GENERAL STATUTES COMMISSION STUDIES (S.B. 1164 – Hartsell; Ross)

SECTION 25.1. Section 2 of Session Law 2009-281 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 2. The General Statutes Commission shall study and recommend to the 20102011 Regular Session of the 2009-2011 General Assembly ways to ensure that the General Statutes properly and uniformly refer to federal or state military organizations. These may include a single term that will include all organizations that compose the reserve components of the armed forces. The recommendations may include a process to be authorized by the General Assembly whereby changes that do not change the law can be made administratively by the Attorney General."

SECTION 25.2. Section 1 of Session Law 2009-273 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 1. The General Statutes Commission shall study and recommend to the 2010 Regular Session of the 2009 General Assembly and the 2011 Regular Session of the General Assembly ways to make the General Statutes and the North Carolina Constitution gender neutral. These may include recommending legislative changes needed to make the General Statutes and the Constitution gender neutral and a process to be authorized by the General Assembly whereby changes that do not change the law can be made administratively by the Attorney General to make the General Statutes gender neutral."

PART XXVI. REESTABLISH LEGISLATIVE TASK FORCE ON CHILDHOOD OBESITY (S.B. 1153 – Purcell; H.B. 1827 – Yongue, Brown, Hughes, Insko)

SECTION 26.1. Part XLIX of S.L. 2009-574 reads as rewritten:

"PART XLIX. LEGISLATIVE TASK FORCE ON CHILDHOOD OBESITY (Yongue) "SECTION 49.1. There is created the Legislative Task Force on Childhood Obesity.

"SECTION 49.2. The Task Force shall consist of 12 members as follows:

- (1) Six members of the House of Representatives.
- (2) Six members of the Senate.

"SECTION 49.3. The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall designate one Representative as cochair, and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall designate one Senator as cochair. Terms of the initial members begin on appointment and continue until the convening of the 2011 Session of the General Assembly. Subsequent appointments begin during the 2011 Session of the General Assembly and continue until the Task Force terminates.

Vacancies on the Task Force shall be filled by the same appointing authority that made the initial appointment. A quorum of the Task Force shall be a majority of its members.

"SECTION 49.4. The Task Force shall include, but should not be limited to study of

"SECTION 49.4. The Task Force shall include, but should not be limited to, study of issues relating to childhood obesity. In the course of the study, the Task Force shall consider and recommend to the General Assembly strategies for addressing the problem of childhood obesity and encouraging healthy eating and increased physical activity among children through:

- (1) Early childhood intervention;
- (2) Childcare facilities;
- (3) Before and after-school programs;
- (4) Physical education and physical activity in schools;
- (5) Higher nutrition standards in schools;
- (6) Comprehensive nutrition education in schools;
- (7) Increased access to recreational activities for children:
- (8) Community initiatives and public awareness; and
- (9) Other means.

"SECTION 49.5. The Task Force shall encourage input from public nonprofit organizations, promoting healthy lifestyles for children, addressing the problems related to childhood obesity, encouraging healthy eating, and increasing physical activity among children.

"SECTION 49.6. Members of the Task Force shall receive per diem, subsistence, and travel allowances in accordance with G.S. 120-3.1, 138-5, or 138-6, as appropriate. The Task Force, while in the discharge of its official duties, may exercise all powers provided for under G.S. 120-19 and G.S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4. The Task Force may meet at anytime upon the joint call of the cochairs. The Task Force may meet in the Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building.

With approval of the Legislative Services Commission, the Legislative Services Officer shall assign professional staff to assist the Task Force in its work. The House of Representatives' and the Senate's Directors of Legislative Assistants shall assign clerical staff to the Task Force, and the expenses relating to the clerical employees shall be borne by the Task Force. The Task Force may contract for professional, clerical, or consultant services as provided by G.S. 120-32.02. If the Task Force hires a consultant, the consultant shall not be a State employee or a person currently under contract with the State to provide services.

All State departments and agencies and local governments and their subdivisions shall furnish the Task Force with any information in their possession or available to them.

"SECTION 49.7. The Task Force shall submit a final-report of the results of its study and its recommendations to the 2010 Regular Session of the 2009 General Assembly. The Task Force may make a report of the results of its study and recommendations to the 2011 General Assembly and shall submit a report to the 2012 Regular Session of the 2011 General Assembly. The Task Force shall terminate on May 1, 2010, or upon the filing of its final report, whichever occurs first upon the convening of the 2012 Regular Session of the 2011 General Assembly."

PART XXVII. JOINT LEGISLATIVE STUDY COMMITTEE ON THE CONSOLIDATION OF EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION AND CARE (S.B. 1116 – Blue, Purcell, Swindell; H.B. 1781 – Rapp, Glazier, Insko)

SECTION 27.1. Committee Established. – There is created the Joint Legislative Study Committee on the Consolidation of Early Childhood Education and Care. The Committee shall consist of 10 members to be appointed as follows:

- (1) Five members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
- (2) Five members of the Senate appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.

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The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall designate one Representative as cochair, and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall designate one Senator as cochair. Vacancies on the Committee shall be filled by the same appointing authority making the initial appointment.

The Committee, while in the discharge of its official duties, may exercise all powers provided for under G.S. 120-19 and G.S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4. The Committee may meet at any time upon the joint call of the cochairs. The Committee may meet in the Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building. The Committee may contract for professional, clerical, or consultant services as provided by G.S. 120-32.02.

The Legislative Services Commission, through the Legislative Services Officer. shall assign professional staff to assist the Committee in its work. The House of Representatives and the Senate's Directors of Legislative Assistants shall assign clerical staff to the Committee, and the expenses relating to the clerical employees shall be borne by the Committee. Members of the Committee shall receive subsistence and travel expenses at the rates set forth in G.S. 120-3.1, 138-5, or 138-6, as appropriate.

SECTION 27.2. Duties. – The Committee shall continue the work of the Task Force on the Consolidation of Early Childhood Education and Care created under S.L. 2009-451 by continuing to work toward the development of an integrated system of early childhood education and care. To that end, the Committee may consult with and receive reports from the appropriate State departments, agencies, and board representatives on issues related to early childhood education and care and consider any other issues the Committee deems relevant.

SECTION 27.3. Report. – The Commission may make a final report, including any proposed legislation, to the 2011 General Assembly upon its convening. The Commission shall terminate upon filing its final report or upon the convening of the 2011 General Assembly, whichever is earlier.

PART XXVIII. EXTEND POVERTY REDUCTION AND ECONOMIC RECOVERY LEGISLATIVE STUDY COMMISSION (H.B. 1845 - Pierce, Bryant, Jones, Stewart)

SECTION 27.1. Section 41.2 of S.L. 2008-181 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 41.7. The Commission shall submit its final report by the 2010 Regular Session of the 2009 General Assembly and may make interim reports it deems necessary. The Commission's final report shall include the results of the Commission's review and specific legislative recommendations. to the 2011 General Assembly. The Commission shall terminate upon filing its final report, or upon the convening of the 2010 Regular Session of the 2009 2011 General Assembly, whichever occurs first."

PART XXIX. AGRISCIENCE AND BIOTECHNOLOGY REGIONAL SCHOOL PLANNING COMMISSION (S.B. 1199 – Swindell)

SECTION 29.1. There is established the Agriscience and Biotechnology Regional School Planning Commission. The purpose of the Commission shall be to develop and plan a regional school of agriscience and biotechnology to open in the 2011-2012 school year. The Commission shall be located administratively in the Department of Public Instruction but shall exercise its powers and duties independently of the Department of Public Instruction. The Department of Public Instruction shall provide for the administrative costs of the Commission and shall provide staff to the Commission.

SECTION 29.2. The Commission shall consist of up to nine members appointed by the chair of the State Board of Education. Appointments shall be made no later than September 1, 2010.

SECTION 29.3. The Agriscience and Biotechnology Regional School Planning Commission shall develop a plan for a regional school of agriscience and biotechnology to

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PART XXX. GOVERNOR'S LOGISTICS TASK FORCE TO STUDY COMBINING GLOBAL TRANSPARK AUTHORITY, PORTS AUTHORITY, AND RAILROAD; AND ESTABLISHING SERVICE OF A CLASS I RAIL SERVICE TO THE GLOBAL TRANSPARK AND THE PORTS (McComas)

SECTION 30.1. The Governor's Logistics Task Force, as established by Executive Order 32, shall study the following issues:

- Combining the operations and governing authority of the Global TransPark (1) Authority, the North Carolina Ports Authority, and the North Carolina Railroad to create one entity and one governing body to oversee the combined infrastructure of air cargo, rail, and sea transportation.
- Establishing service of a Class I Rail service by more than one railroad to (2) both the Global TransPark and the State Ports.

SECTION 30.2. The Task Force shall report the findings of their study to the Governor, the General Assembly, and the Joint Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee on or before the convening of the 2011 Regular Session of the 2011 General Assembly.

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PART XXXI. WOOD AND CROP BIOMASS STRATEGIC WORKING GROUP (H.B. 2009 - Harrison, Bryant, Jones)

SECTION 31.1. The Wood and Crop Biomass Strategic Working Group, as described in H.B. 1766, is established.

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PART XXXII. LEGISLATIVE STUDY COMMISSION ON PUBLIC-PRIVATE PARTNERSHIPS (Owens)

SECTION 32.1. There is established the Legislative Study Commission on Public-Private Partnerships.

SECTION 32.2. The Commission shall be composed of 16 members, as follows:

- Five members of the Senate appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the (1) Senate.
- (2) Five members of the House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
- Three public members, appointed by the Speaker of the House of (3) Representatives.
- (4) Three public members, appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.

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The Commission shall include, and consult with, the Secretary of Transportation, the North Carolina Turnpike Authority, the State Treasurer, the Local Government Commission, the State Construction Office, the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners, the North Carolina League of Municipalities, and the North Carolina School Boards Association in the course of its deliberations

Public members shall be residents of the State. Vacancies on the Commission shall be filled by the appointing authority. The President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each designate a co-chair, who shall be a member of the General Assembly. A quorum of the Commission shall be 10 members.

The Commission, while in the discharge of its official duties, may exercise all powers provided for under G.S. 120-19 and G. S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4. The Commission may meet at any time upon call of the chairs. The Commission may meet in the Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building. The Commission may contract for professional, clerical, or consultant services as provided by G.S. 120-32.02.

The Legislative Services Commission, through the Legislative Services Officer. shall assign professional staff to assist the Commission in its work. The House of Representatives' and Senate's Directors of Legislative Assistants shall assign clerical staff to the Commission, and the expenses relating to the clerical employees shall be borne by the Commission. Members of the Commission shall receive subsistence and travel expenses at the rates set forth in G.S. 120-3.1, 138-5, or 138-6, as appropriate.

SECTION 32.3. The Commission shall study issues related to Public Private Partnerships (PPPs), including examination of the appropriate authority for State, regional and local government units to engage in PPPs for public capital projects through a regulatory framework.

SECTION 32.4. The Commission may make a final report, including any proposed legislation, to the 2011 General Assembly upon its convening. The Commission shall terminate upon filing its final report or upon the convening of the 2011 General Assembly, whichever is earlier.

PART XXXIII. LEGISLATIVE TASK FORCE ON PRESCRIPTION DRUG ABUSE

SECTION 33.1. There is established the Legislative Task Force on Prescription Drug Abuse.

SECTION 33.2. The Task Force shall be composed of 12 members, as follows:

- (1) Four members of the Senate, appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.
- (2) Four members of the House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
- (3) Two public members, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
 - (4) Two public members, appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.

Public members shall be residents of the State. Vacancies on the Task Force shall be filled by the appointing authority. The President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each designate a co-chair, who shall be a member of the General Assembly. A quorum of the Task Force shall be eight members.

The Task Force, while in the discharge of its official duties, may exercise all powers provided for under G.S. 120-19 and G.S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4. The Task Force may meet at any time upon call of the chairs. The Task Force may meet in the Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building. The Task Force may contract for professional, clerical, or consultant services as provided by G.S. 120-32.02.

The Legislative Services Commission, through the Legislative Services Officer, shall assign professional staff to assist the Task Force in its work. The House of

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Representatives' and Senate's Directors of Legislative Assistants shall assign clerical staff to the Task Force, and the expenses relating to the clerical employees shall be borne by the Task Force. Members of the Task Force shall receive subsistence and travel expenses at the rates set forth in G.S. 120-3.1, 138-5, or 138-6, as appropriate.

SECTION 33.3. The Task Force may study whether to expand access to the Controlled Substances Reporting System (CSRS) to physician employees and additional types of law enforcement officers, whether to require a photo ID when picking up prescriptions that are considered controlled substances, whether physician education and relicensure needs to include more training on decreasing substance abuse of prescription drugs, and any other matter the Task Force feels would be helpful in reducing prescription drug abuse.

SECTION 33.4. The Task Force may make a final report, including any proposed legislation, to the 2011 General Assembly upon its convening. The Task Force shall terminate upon filing its final report or upon the convening of the 2011 General Assembly, whichever is earlier.

PART XXXIV. LEGISLATIVE COMMISSION ON DIVERSITY IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS (Dannelly, Michaux)

SECTION 34.1. There is created the Legislative Commission on Diversity in the Public Schools.

SECTION 34.2. The Commission shall consist of 15 members as follows:

- (1) Five members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
- (2) Five members of the Senate appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.
- Five public members appointed by the Governor. (3)

SECTION 34.3. The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall designate one representative as cochair, and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall designate one senator as cochair. Vacancies on the Commission shall be filled by the same appointing authority that made the initial appointment. A quorum of the Commission shall be a majority of its members.

SECTION 34.4. The Commission shall study the effects of student diversity in public school enrollment. As part of this study, the Commission shall:

- Consider whether schools in which students of various racial, ethnic, and (1) socioeconomic characteristics are balanced improve the quality of the learning experience and the academic achievement of all students as compared to schools with more homogeneous student enrollments.
- Examine whether diverse public schools are successful in closing the (2) achievement gap.
- Explore the level of parental involvement in schools with a diverse student (3) population.
- Examine best practices for creating and maintaining student diversity in (4) schools and school systems in other states.
- Consider whether diverse public schools improve student discipline. (5)
- Consider the fiscal impact and efficiency of State funding streams given the (6) data accumulated in items (1) through (5).
- Study any other issue the Commission considers relevant.

SECTION 34.5. The Commission, while in the discharge of its official duties, may exercise all powers provided for under G.S. 120-19 and G.S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4. The Commission may meet at anytime upon the joint call of the cochairs. The Commission may meet in the Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building.

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With approval of the Legislative Services Commission, the Legislative Services Officer shall assign professional staff to assist the Commission in its work. The House of Representatives' and the Senate's Directors of Legislative Assistants shall assign clerical staff to the Commission, and the expenses relating to the clerical employees shall be borne by the Commission. The Commission may contract for professional, clerical, or consultant services as provided by G.S. 120-32.02. If the Commission hires a consultant, the consultant shall not be a State employee or a person currently under contract with the State to provide services.

All State departments and agencies and local governments and their subdivisions shall furnish the Commission with any information in their possession or available to them.

SECTION 34.6. The Commission shall submit a final report of the results of its study and its recommendations to the 2011 General Assembly. The Commission shall terminate on March 1, 2011, or upon the filing of its final report, whichever occurs first.

PART XXXV. JOINT SELECT COMMITTEE TO STUDY THE ADOPTION OF COMPARATIVE NEGLIGENCE AND ABROGATION OF JOINT AND SEVERAL LIABILITY (H.B. 813 – Glazier, Blust, Ross)

SECTION 35.1. There is established the Joint Select Committee to Study the Adoption of Comparative Negligence and Abrogation of Joint and Several Liability.

SECTION 35.2. The Commission shall be composed of 10 members, as follows:

- (1) Five members of the Senate appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.
- (2) Five members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Vacancies on the Committee shall be filled by the appointing authority. The President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each designate a co-chair, who shall be a member of the General Assembly. A quorum of the Committee shall be a majority of its members.

The Committee, while in the discharge of its official duties, may exercise all powers provided for under G.S. 120-19 and G. S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4. The Commission may meet at any time upon call of the chairs. The Committee may meet in the Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building.

The Legislative Services Commission, through the Legislative Services Officer, shall assign professional staff to assist the Committee in its work. The House of Representatives' and Senate's Directors of Legislative Assistants shall assign clerical staff to the Committee, and the expenses relating to the clerical employees shall be borne by the Committee. Members of the Committee shall receive subsistence and travel expenses at the rates set forth in G.S. 120-3.1.

SECTION 35.3. The Committee shall study issues related to the adoption of comparative negligence and the abrogation of joint and several liability, and any other issues related to tort liability.

SECTION 35.4. The Committee may make a final report, including any proposed legislation, to the 2011 General Assembly upon its convening. The Committee shall terminate upon filing its final report or upon the convening of the 2011 General Assembly, whichever is earlier.

PART XXXVI. RAILROADS STUDY COMMISSION (Nesbitt, Dickson)

SECTION 36.1. There is established the Railroads Study Commission.

SECTION 36.2. The Commission shall be composed of 10 members, as follows:

Five members of the Senate appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.

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(2) Five members of the House of Representatives, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Vacancies on the Commission shall be filled by the appointing authority. The President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each designate a co-chair, who shall be a member of the General Assembly. A quorum of the Commission shall be six members.

The Commission, while in the discharge of its official duties, may exercise all powers provided for under G.S. 120-19 and G. S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4. The Commission may meet at any time upon call of the chairs. The Commission may meet in the Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building. The Commission may contract for professional, clerical, or consultant services as provided by G.S. 120-32.02.

The Legislative Services Commission, through the Legislative Services Officer, shall assign professional staff to assist the Commission in its work. The House of Representatives' and Senate's Directors of Legislative Assistants shall assign clerical staff to the Commission, and the expenses relating to the clerical employees shall be borne by the Commission. Members of the Commission shall receive subsistence and travel expenses at the rates set forth in G.S. 120-3.1, 138-5, or 138-6, as appropriate.

SECTION 36.3. The Commission may study all issues related to railroads in the State, including passenger rail, freight rail, and corridor issues.

SECTION 36.4. The Commission may make a final report, including any proposed legislation, to the 2011 General Assembly upon its convening. The Commission shall terminate upon filing its final report or upon the convening of the 2011 General Assembly, whichever is earlier.

PART XXXVII. OUT-OF-STATE TRAVEL

SECTION 37.1. For legislative studies authorized by this act, out-of-state travel must be authorized by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate or the Speaker of the House of Representatives, as appropriate.

PART XXXVIII. BILL AND RESOLUTION REFERENCES

SECTION 38.1. The listing of the original bill or resolution in this act is for reference purposes only and may not be deemed to have incorporated by reference any of the substantive provisions contained in the original bill or resolution.

PART XXXIX. EFFECTIVE DATE AND APPLICABILITY

SECTION 39.1. Except as otherwise specifically provided, this act is effective when it becomes law. If a study is authorized both in this act and in the Current Operations and Capital Improvements Appropriations Act of 2010, the study shall be implemented in accordance with the Current Operations and Capital Improvements Appropriations Act of 2010 as ratified.

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR STUDIES BY THE LEGISLATIVE RESEARCH COMMISSION, STATUTORY OVERSIGHT COMMITTEES AND COMMISSIONS, AND OTHER AGENCIES, COMMITTEES, AND COMMISSIONS.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

6 PART I. TITLE

SECTION 1. This act may be known as "The Studies Act of 2010."

PART II. LEGISLATIVE RESEARCH COMMISSION

SECTION 2.1. The Legislative Research Commission may study the topics listed below. When applicable, the bill or resolution that originally proposed the issue or study and the name of the sponsor are listed. Unless otherwise specified, the listed bill or resolution refers to the measure introduced in the 2009 or 2010 session of the 2009 General Assembly. The Commission may consider the original bill or resolution in determining the nature, scope, and aspects of the study

SECTION 2.2. Allowing State Personnel Commission to Transfer Annual and Sick Leave From a city or County (S.B. 1386 – East) – The Commission may study the issue of allowing the State Personnel Commission to transfer an employee's accrued annual and sick leave from a city or county, and allowing such transfers for employees shifting employment between units of local government. In conducting the study, the Commission may consider the fiscal impact of allowing the transfers, including any impact on the Teachers' and State Employees' Retirement System and Local Governmental Employees' Retirement System.

SECTION 2.3. Consolidation of State Agencies and Departments (S.B. 1427 – Brock) – The Commission may study issues relating to whether some State agencies and departments can be consolidated to achieve increased efficiency and cost savings.

SECTION 2.4. Flexibility for Certified Nurse Midwives (S.B. 940 – Davis) – The Commission is authorized to study whether certified nurse midwives should be given more flexibility in the practice of midwifery. In conducting the study, the Commission may consider whether a certified nurse midwife should be allowed to practice midwifery in collaboration with, rather than under the supervision of, a physician licensed to practice medicine under



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Article 1 of Chapter 90 of the General Statutes who is actively engaged in the practice of

SECTION 2.5. Televising House of Representatives and Senate Sessions (Stevens. McKissick) - The Commission may study the feasibility of televising all House of Representatives and Senate sessions and, in conducting the study, may appoint an advisory committee composed of members of the Legislative Services Commission, other legislators, and members of the public. The study may also include the feasibility of streaming video content over the Internet. The study may include various options for handling the project, including the UNC Center for Public Television and the Agency for Public Telecommunications. The study may examine newer technologies for more cost-efficient means of handling the broadcasts.

SECTION 2.6. Reserved.

SECTION 2.7. Reserved.

SECTION 2.8. Efficient E-Commerce in State Government (S.B. 1425 – Brock) – The Commission may:

- (1) Review the current payments and collections made by the State that have the greatest potential to benefit from increased automation.
- Examine best practices in the use of electronic funds transfers and direct (2) depositing for State government financial transactions.
- (3) Identify goals and objectives for a coordinated State program to make State government e-commerce more effective and cost-efficient through paperwork reduction and lower transaction and personnel costs.
- (4) Consider any other matters related to improving State government e-commerce and lower the cost of financial transactions.

SECTION 2.9. Fur-Bearer and Fox Management (Faison) - The Commission may study the effectiveness of the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission's implementation of G.S. 113-291.4(e). The Commission may solicit input from interested parties, including hunters, trappers, public health authorities, local governments, the North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, and private landowners.

SECTION 2.10. Pre-Escheat Procedures (Stein) - The Commission may study the need for statutory changes to the law governing location of the legitimate owner of unclaimed property prior to the assumption of the abandonment of the property by the State Treasurer, and to permit a person holding unclaimed property to recover a reasonable charge for complying with the good faith effort requirement of G.S. 116B-59.

SECTION 2.11. Changing Demographics in the State Community College and University Systems (S.B. 1457 - Allran) - The Commission may study issues relating to the changing demographics in the State's community college and university systems. Commission may consider how, over the last decade, the populations attending the State's community colleges and universities have changed with regard to all of the following:

- (1) Age.
- (2) Reasons for attendance.
- Students enrolling who have prior educational experience. (3)
- (4) Students enrolling through college transfer programs from community colleges.
- Any other issue the Commission deems relevant to the study.

SECTION 2.12. Ownerless Dogs and Cats, Commercial Dog Breeding (S.B. 1332 - McKissick, Jones; S.B. 460 - Davis; H.B. 208 - Harrison, Wray, Cotham, Carney) - The Commission may study issues related to ownerless dogs and cats, and the State's role in ensuring the humane treatment of dogs and cats by breeders, shelters, and other facilities that house dogs and cats.

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SECTION 2.13. Use of Military Veteran Contractors (H.B. 912 – Killian) – The Commission may study methods to encourage State and local government to use military veteran contractors.

SECTION 2.14. Requiring Long-Term Care Facilities to Carry Liability Insurance (H.J.R. 1768 – Harrison, Insko, Jeffus) – The Commission may study whether long-term care facilities should be required to carry liability insurance. In conducting the study, the Commission should consider:

 (1) Whether the laws of this State adequately protect the ability of residents of long-term care facilities who are harmed by a wrongful act of the facility from receiving just compensation because of bankruptcy or other actions by the facility's owners to unjustly shield personal or business assets.

(2) Whether as a condition of licensure, long-term care facilities should carry liability insurance.

(3) Whether other states require long-term care facilities to carry liability insurance as a requirement for licensure.

SECTION 2.15. Insurance Coverage Options for Fresh Produce Growers (Wray) – The Commission may study the issue of adequate insurance coverage options for fresh produce growers.

SECTION 2.16. Use of "Most Favored Nation" Clauses (H.B. 2004 – Insko) – The Committee may study the use of "Most Favored Nation" (MFN) clauses in contracts. In conducting the study, the Committee should consider:

 (1) The extent to which MFN clauses are included in contracts in our State, and in the nation as a whole.

(2) The most common forms and elements of MFN clauses included in contracts.

(3) The effect of inclusion of MFN clauses in contracts.

 (4) The effect that prohibiting the use of MFN clauses in contracts has had in those states that have prohibited their use.

(5) Any other issue relating to the use or prohibition of MFN clauses in contracts that the Committee deems appropriate.

SECTION 2.17. Regulation of Beauty Pageants for Youth Under Thirteen Years of Age (H.B. 1348 – Mobley) – The Commission may study the regulation of beauty pageants for youth under 13 years of age in North Carolina.

SECTION 2.18. State Boards and Commissions – The Commission may study consolidation or elimination of State Boards and Commissions.

PART III. JOINT LEGISLATIVE HEALTH CARE OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE STUDIES

SECTION 3.1. The Joint Legislative Health Care Oversight Committee may study the topics listed in this Part and report its findings, together with any recommended legislation, to the 2011 Regular Session of the General Assembly upon its convening.

SECTION 3.2. State Diabetes Coordinator (England) – The Committee may study the issue of the feasibility of establishing a State Diabetes Coordinator as a way to help address the growing epidemic of diabetes in the State. The coordinator could be charged to advise ways to save lives, improve the quality of life, and save money for taxpayers and patients by reducing the rates of diabetes and its complications.

SECTION 3.3. Review of Collaborative Project for Reducing Medical Malpractice Claims (Glazier) – The Committee may review the collaborative project for reducing medical malpractice costs and claims.

SECTION 3.4. Monitor Impact of Revised Requirements for Personal Care Services (Adams) – The Committee may study and monitor the impact that the revised

eligibility requirements for Personal Care Services has on seniors and disabled citizens, including the number of persons who are refused services and the reasons therefore and the time frame between request for services and the initiation of services.

PART IV. JOINT LEGISLATIVE TRANSPORTATION OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE STUDIES

SECTION 4.1. The Joint Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee may study the topics listed in this Part and report its findings, together with any recommended legislation, to the 2011 Regular Session of the General Assembly upon its convening.

SECTION 4.2. Untitled Vehicles Removed and Sold for Scrap (Gibson) — The Committee, in consultation with the Division of Motor Vehicles, may study the issue of the untitled vehicles being removed and sold for scrap without sufficient notice to the owner.

SECTION 4.3. Welcome Centers and Visitor Centers (H.B. 2046 – Tucker, Cole) – The Committee, in consultation with the Department of Transportation and the Department of Commerce, may study issues related to the location, funding, construction, maintenance, and operation of visitor centers and welcome centers in the State.

SECTION 4.4. Debt Agreements (H.B. 1800 – Crawford) – The Committee, as a part of the study authorized under Section 28.7(e) of Senate Bill 897, may study the issue of the appropriate scope of the power of the Department of Transportation to enter into debt and debt-like agreements pursuant to G.S. 136-18(39).

SECTION 4.5. Street Construction/Developer Responsibility (S.B. 761 – Brown, Cole) – The Committee may study whether to limit the responsibility of developers for the cost of street or highway construction to the amount necessary to serve the projected traffic generated by a development.

PART V. JOINT LEGISLATIVE EDUCATION OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE STUDIES

SECTION 5.1. The Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee may study the topics listed in this Part and report its findings, together with any recommended legislation, to the 2011 Regular Session of the General Assembly upon its convening.

SECTION 5.2. Virtual School of Engineering (Shaw) – The Committee may study the feasibility of establishing a Virtual School of Engineering. The purpose of the study is to determine the cost and feasibility of developing and maintaining a Virtual School of Engineering, including the effectiveness of linking the constituent institutions to the established UNC Schools of Engineering by offering engineering classes through satellite and online courses, whether an engineering curriculum lends itself to such a model, and any other related issues deemed relevant by the Committee.

SECTION 5.3. Graduation Disparity (S.B. 1417 – Graham) – The Committee may examine each of the following:

- (1) Minority graduation statistics.
- (2) National best practices for educating minority students.
- (3) Current statewide efforts to increase high school retention of minority students.
- (4) Teaching methodologies specifically designed for minority students.
- (5) Existing technical and career curriculum.
- (6) Innovative practices or solutions that have demonstrated success in other states.

The Committee may develop a comprehensive statewide plan and recommendations for increasing the number of minority individuals who complete high school.

SECTION 5.4. Maximum Age for Enrollment in Public Schools (H.J.R. 1948 – Fisher, Gill, Yongue, Farmer-Butterfield) – The Committee may study whether the maximum initial age for enrollment in the public schools shall be lowered from age seven to age six.

PART VI. ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW COMMISSION STUDIES

SECTION 6.1. The Environmental Review Commission may study the topics listed in this Part and report its findings, together with any recommended legislation, to the 2011 Regular Session of the General Assembly upon its convening.

SECTION 6.2. Impact of Environmental Toxins on Human Health (S.B. 1416 – Bingham; H.B. 2015 – Harrison, Glazier, Fisher, Insko) – The Commission may study the impact of environmental toxins on human health and report its findings and recommendations, including any proposals for legislation or administrative action, to the General Assembly no later than the convening of the 2012 Session of the 2011 General Assembly. The findings and recommendations may include all of the following:

- (1) A survey of legislation in other states that ban toxins and chemicals, along with an assessment of the effectiveness of the legislation.
- (2) A survey of how other states have set up entities within state government to review and regulate toxins and chemicals that have or will be introduced into the stream of commerce.
- (3) A review of incentives proposed or enacted in other states to promote the growth of the green chemistry sector, including a special analysis of documented environmental, public health, and economic benefits, including job creation, within the states.

SECTION 6.3. Water Quality Cost Share (S.B. 1385 – McKissick) – The Commission may study the costs and benefits of improving water quality in reservoirs, rivers, and other water resources shared by local governments. In its study the Commission may consider the water quality issues for local governments located both upstream and downstream from water resources, the wastewater treatment standards that local governments both upstream and downstream must meet, the cost of complying with water quality and wastewater treatment standards, and the benefits received by local governments by complying with those standards. The Commission may also consider possible alternatives to the current rate structure, treatment programs, and technology used by the State and local governments with regard to water quality and wastewater treatment. The Commission may also consider any other issue that it deems relevant to this study.

SECTION 6.4. Oil and Gas Exploration in the Triassic Basin (Gibson, Love) – The Committee may study the issue of oil and gas exploration in the Triassic Basin.

SECTION 6.5. Issues Related to the Use and Storage of Reclaimed Water (H.B. 643 – Tucker) – The Commission, in consultation with the Department of Environment and Natural Resources, may study issues related to the use and storage of reclaimed water. In its study, the Commission may examine the following issues:

- The feasibility and desirability of implementation of reclaimed water programs by municipal wastewater treatment facilities for nonconsumptive indoor use and outdoor use. The Commission may consider any of the following factors:
 - a. The implementation and efficacy of reclaimed water policies, programs, ordinances, standards, rules, and regulations established in other states, municipalities, and countries.
 - b. Minimum effluent standards for reclaimed water sufficient to address any public health, safety, or environmental risks that may be caused by use of or contact with reclaimed water.
 - c. Potential uses for reclaimed water for nonconsumptive indoor use including, but not limited to: toilet flushing, fire protection, and decorative water features.

- d. Potential uses for reclaimed water for outdoor use including, but not limited to: commercial and residential landscaping, lawn irrigation, agricultural irrigation; wetland and stream augmentation; and planned direct or indirect potable reuse.
- (2) The feasibility and desirability of storage of reclaimed water in aquifers by municipal wastewater treatment facilities. The Commission may consider any of the following factors:
 - a. Whether the current practice of land application of wastewater by municipal wastewater treatment facilities requires too much land to be practicable in the long term.
 - b. Whether the current practice of land application of wastewater by municipal wastewater treatment facilities is better suited to certain parts of the State or to areas of certain geological or topographical conditions.
 - c. Whether there are any alternative methods of disposing of wastewater by municipal wastewater treatment system facilities and the costs and benefits of employing any such alternative methods either on a statewide basis or in any specific area of the State.
- (3) Whether reclaimed water can be safely stored in and recovered from aquifers. The Commission may consider any of the following factors:
 - a. The benefits and costs of using reclaimed water in aquifers for use as a barrier to saltwater intrusion.
 - b. Whether current federal or State laws, including the Underground Injection Control Program of the federal Safe Drinking Water Act and current regional or watershed-based water management strategies, apply to aquifer storage and recovery in North Carolina and are sufficient to address any public health, safety, or environmental risks that may be caused by aquifer storage and recovery.
 - c. Regulations necessary to assure the protection of public health, safety, and the environment if storage of reclaimed water in aquifers is determined to be in the best interest of the State.
 - d. Any other topics the Commission deems appropriate to assure that aquifer storage and recovery systems will not be a detriment to public health, safety, or the environment.
- (4) Such other matters as the Commission deems appropriate in the conduct of this study.

SECTION 6.6. Reserved.

SECTION 6.7. Gas Leases in the Central Shale Belt (Gibson, Love) – The Commission may study the issue of gas leases in the central shale belt, located in the Chatham and Moore County area.

SECTION 6.8. Carbon Sequestration Potential of Natural and Working Landscapes and Other Carbon Offset Opportunities (S.B. 1220 – Stein, Albertson; H.B. 1809 – Harrison, Underhill, Wilkins) – The Commission may study the carbon sequestration potential of natural and working landscapes in the State and the feasibility and advisability of establishing a carbon offset program.

PART VII. REVENUE LAWS STUDY COMMITTEE STUDIES

SECTION 7.1. The Revenue Laws Study Committee may study the topics listed in this Part and report its findings, together with any recommended legislation, to the 2011 Regular Session of the General Assembly upon its convening.

SECTION 7.2. Reserved.

SECTION 7.3. Ticket Resale (Gibson) – The Committee may study issues related to ticket resale, including the need for consumer protections in the primary market for event ticket sales; transparency of ticket distribution by artists, promoters, and their agents; freedom of transferability for tickets purchased by consumers; and open interoperability of ticket sale and resale market systems.

PART VIII. JOINT LEGISLATIVE UTILITY REVIEW COMMITTEE STUDIES

SECTION 8.1. The Joint Legislative Utility Review Committee may study the topics listed in this Part and report its findings, together with any recommended legislation, to the 2011 Regular Session of the General Assembly upon its convening.

SECTION 8.2. Gas Leases in the Central Shale Belt (Gibson, Love) – The Committee may study the issue of gas leases in the central shale belt, located in the Chatham and Moore County area.

PART IX. JOINT LEGISLATIVE PROGRAM EVALUATION OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE STUDIES

SECTION 9.1. Operation of the Child Nutrition Program (S.B. 1152 – Purcell, Dannelly, Davis, Preston, Tillman, Walters; H.B. 1777 – Yongue, Brown, Insko, Parfitt) – The Joint Legislative Program Evaluation Oversight Committee may include in the 2010 Work Plan for the Program Evaluation Division of the General Assembly a study of the operation of the Child Nutrition Program. The Division may examine (i) the guidelines for assessing indirect costs to local child nutrition programs in local school administrative units and (ii) the financial impact upon local child nutrition programs and local school administrative units of a policy prohibiting the assessment of indirect costs to a child nutrition program until that program has achieved and sustained a three-month operating balance.

SECTION 9.2. Chapter 150B Contested Cases (S.B. 1305 – Nesbitt; H.B. 1892 – Insko, Braxton, Justus) – The Joint Legislative Program Evaluation Oversight Committee may include in the 2010 Work Plan for the Program Evaluation Division of the General Assembly a study of Chapter 150B contested cases. The Division may study the number of decisions rendered by administrative law judges that are overturned as a final agency decision. For these cases the Division may evaluate the nature of the case, the basis of the reversal, the number of cases appealed to superior court, and the results of those appeals.

PART X. JOINT LEGISLATIVE CORRECTIONS, CRIME CONTROL, AND JUVENILE JUSTICE OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE STUDIES

SECTION 10.1. The Joint Legislative Corrections, Crime Control, and Juvenile Justice Oversight Committee may study the topics listed in this Part and report its findings, together with any recommended legislation, to the 2011 Regular Session of the General Assembly upon its convening.

SECTION 10.2. Unsecured Bonds (Love) – The Committee may study the factors used in determining the release of defendants with unsecured bonds; the frequency of using unsecured bonds for the release of defendants; the failure to appear rates under unsecured bonds, when a failure to appear has occurred; the amount of time it takes and the entity most likely to apprehend the defendant after the bond is forfeited; and the likelihood of converting forfeiture or judgment to revenue.

PART XI. JOINT LEGISLATIVE ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURE OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE TO STUDY IMPACT OF EXEMPTING WILDLIFE RESOURCES COMMISSION AND MARINE FISHERIES COMMISSION FROM THE LEGISLATIVE DISAPPROVAL PROCESS

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SECTION 11.1. The Joint Legislative Administrative Procedure Oversight Committee may study the impact of exempting the Wildlife Resources Commission and the Marine Fisheries Commission from the legislative disapproval process under the Administrative Procedure Act. In conducting the study, the Committee may consider the number of bills to disapprove rules adopted by either of the two Commissions that have been introduced since 2003, the effect of the delayed effective dates on the enforcement capabilities of the two Commissions, and alternatives available to the public for objecting to rules adopted by either of the two Commissions. The Joint Legislative Administrative Procedure Oversight Committee may report its findings and recommendations to the 2011 General Assembly.

PART XII. Reserved.

PART XIII. STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO STUDY ISSUES RELATED TO SPORTS INJURIES AT MIDDLE SCHOOL AND HIGH SCHOOL LEVELS (H.B. 1837 - Cotham, Fisher, Glazier, Rapp)

SECTION 13.1. The State Board of Education shall study issues relating to sports injuries for all sports at the middle school and high school levels, focusing on the prevention and treatment of injuries. In conducting the study, the Board should consult with school administrators, representatives of the North Carolina High School Athletic Association, high school athletic directors, middle school coaches, athletic trainers, and doctors with expertise in the area of sports medicine. All State departments and agencies and local governments and their subdivisions shall furnish the Board with any information in their possession or available to them.

SECTION 13.2. The State Board of Education shall submit a final report of the results of its study and its recommendations to the 2011 General Assembly upon its convening.

PART XIV. STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO ESTABLISH A BLUE RIBBON TASK FORCE TO STUDY: THE IMPACTS OF RAISING THE COMPULSORY PUBLIC SCHOOL ATTENDANCE AGE (S.B. 1249 - Davis; H.B. 1879 - Parmon, Bryant, Hurley, Hall)

SECTION 14.1. The State Board of Education shall establish a Blue Ribbon Task Force to study the impacts of raising the compulsory public school attendance age prior to completion of a high school diploma from 16 to 17 or 18. In its study, the Board of Governors shall consider all of the following:

- (1) What impacts, including fiscal impacts, has raising the compulsory school attendance age had in states which have raised the compulsory school attendance age in the last 15 years.
- (2) What conclusions can be drawn as to the impact the compulsory school attendance age has made in the dropout and high school completion rates for states who require compulsory school attendance to ages 16, 17, and 18, respectively.
- What best practices for working with at-risk populations of students who (3) remain in school have been employed in states that have raised the compulsory attendance age in the last 15 years.
- (4) What would be the fiscal impact in raising the compulsory school attendance age from 16 to 17 and 16 to 18, respectively, for each local administrative school unit in North Carolina.

SECTION 14.2. No later than November 15, 2010, the State Board of Education shall submit a report of its study to the Joint Legislative Commission on Dropout Prevention and High School Graduation and the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee, including its findings and recommendations.

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PART XV. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE FOR HIGHWAY SAFETY IN THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION TO STUDY RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ADDITIONAL LEGISLATION TO ADDRESS THE CAUSES OF TEEN DRIVING FATALITIES (S.B. 900 – Rouzer)

SECTION 15. The Executive Committee for Highway Safety in the Department of Transportation shall report to the General Assembly by April 30, 2011, its recommendations for additional legislation to address the causes of teen driving fatalities.

PART XVI. NORTH CAROLINA INSTITUTE OF MEDICINE TO STUDY THE NEEDS OF YOUNG CHILDREN WITH MENTAL HEALTH PROBLEMS AND THEIR FAMILIES (S.B. 1321 – Nesbitt; H.B. 1903 – Insko)

SECTION 16.1. The North Carolina Institute of Medicine may convene a Task Force to study the needs of young children with mental health problems and their families. The Task Force shall:

- (1) Examine the current mental health needs of young children, defined as children from birth to age five.
- (2) Examine existing public and private systems of mental health care that are currently available to families of young children with mental health problems.
- (3) Identify evidence-based and promising universal, selective, and indicated prevention strategies to promote the emotional well-being of young children.
- (4) Identify strategies for early screening and identification of young children with mental health risk factors or mental health problems. The screening and identification strategies shall address the impact of parents' behavioral health problems on the mental health of their young children.
- (5) Review evidence-based and promising interventions and systems to promote the positive mental health and emotional well-being of young children and their families.
- (6) Identify strategies to ensure that children who are at high risk of developing mental health problems and their families have access to a comprehensive range of treatments and services, coordinated across agencies and service systems that are (i) culturally, linguistically, and developmentally sensitive; (ii) individualized; (iii) family-centered; (iv) home-, school-, and community-based; and (v) evidence-based.
- (7) Examine workforce adequacy and training needs of mental health professionals and other professionals who provide services to young children and their families.
- (8) Examine the adequacy of State and other funding to support a comprehensive array of evidence-based services.
- (9) Recommend strategies to develop, evaluate, and disseminate treatment and service delivery models to meet young children's mental health needs.
- (10) Examine any other issue that the NCIOM deems relevant to the study.

SECTION 16.2. The NCIOM shall make an interim report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services no later than January 15, 2012, which may include legislative and other recommendations, and shall issue its final report with findings, recommendations, and any proposed legislation to the 2013 General Assembly upon its convening.

PART XVII. DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES, DIVISION OF MEDICAL ASSISTANCE, TO STUDY THE FEASIBILITY OF REQUIRING

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PROVIDERS ENROLLED IN COMMUNITY CARE OF NORTH CAROLINA TO IMPLEMENT BODY MASS INDEX SCREENING FOR CHILDREN AT RISK OF BECOMING OBESE AND WHO ARE RECEIVING MEDICAID OR PARTICIPATING IN NORTH CAROLINA HEALTH CHOICE FOR CHILDREN PROGRAM (S.B. 1286 – Purcell; H.B. 1904 – England, Hughes, Weiss, Yongue)

SECTION 17.1. The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Medical Assistance, may explore the feasibility of requiring Community Care of North Carolina (CCNC) to implement body mass index (BMI) screening for children at risk of becoming obese and developing diabetes or other chronic diseases, who are receiving Medicaid or participating in the North Carolina Health Choice for Children Program.

SECTION 17.2. As part of its exploration into the feasibility of requiring BMI screening pursuant to Section 17.1, the Department shall work toward the development of each of the following items:

- (1) Establishing performance goals within each CCNC network that includes each of the following components:
 - a. Care management for children who are at risk of becoming obese and developing diabetes or other chronic diseases.
 - b. Annual BMI screening to identify the percentage of children who have a BMI test and the percentage of children who have a decrease in BMI levels.
- (2) Developing a uniform protocol across the CCNC network to ensure the integrity and confidentiality of information collected through BMI screening.
- (3) Implementing reliable methods of collecting data utilizing fitness assessment and reporting programs for youth that include health-related physical fitness tests to assess aerobic capacity; muscular strength, muscular endurance, and flexibility; and body composition.

SECTION 17.3. If the study is undertaken, not later than September 1, 2011, the Department shall report its findings and recommendations to the Legislative Task Force on Childhood Obesity, if reestablished for the 2011-2012 Session, to the Public Health Commission, and to the Fiscal Research Division.

PART XVIII. TASK FORCE/STUDY OF ALTERNATIVES TO HOSPITALIZATION OF FREQUENT USERS OF PSYCHIATRIC HOSPITALS IN NORTH CAROLINA

SECTION 18.1. The Department of Health and Human Services shall conduct a study and propose recommendations by January 31, 2011, regarding the cost-effectiveness of supportive housing as an alternative to institutionalization of the MH/DD/SA populations.

SECTION 18.2. The study shall be conducted by a task force appointed by the Secretary of Health and Human Services.

SECTION 18.3. The Task Force shall include the following:

- (1) Five representatives from various areas of the Department of Health and Human Services.
- (2) One representative from the Housing Trust Fund.
- (3) Six representatives from Local Management Entities.
- (4) Two representatives from the North Carolina Department of Correction.
- (5) One representative from the Division of Medical Assistance.
- (6) One representative from Community Care of North Carolina.
- (7) Two representatives from private providers of housing services for the mentally ill.
- (8) Two representatives from public housing agencies.

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PART XIX. DEPARTMENT OF CULTURAL RESOURCES TO STUDY THE FEASIBILITY OF DESIGNATING THE ENDOR IRON FURNACE AS A STATE HISTORIC SITE (S.B. 1353 – Atwater; H.B. 1927 – Love)

Other tasks as identified by the Task Force.

Examine the potential cost-saving attained through this strategy.

Calculate the level of capital investment needed for this multiyear

SECTION 19. The Department of Cultural Resources shall study the feasibility of designating the Endor Iron Furnace as a State Historic Site. The Department shall submit the results of its study to the 2011 General Assembly upon its convening.

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PART XX. DIVISION OF MARINE FISHERIES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENT AND NATURAL RESOURCES TO STUDY THE FISHERY MANAGEMENT PLAN DEVELOPMENT PROCESS (S.B. 1271 – Albertson; H.B. 1711 – Wainwright, Spear, Underhill)

SECTION 20. The Division of Marine Fisheries of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources shall study the Fishery Management Plan development process. The Division shall specifically consider how the process could be made more efficient without impairing public input into the process. The Division shall report its findings and recommendations, including any legislative proposals, to the Joint Legislative Commission on Seafood and Aquaculture no later than October 1, 2010.

PART XXI. EXTEND THE NORTH CAROLINA ZOOLOGICAL PARK FUNDING AND ORGANIZATION STUDY COMMITTEE (S.B. 1179 – Brunstetter; H.B. 1720 – Brubaker, E. Warren, Harrison)

SECTION 21. Section 5.11 of S.L. 2009-329 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 5.11. Report. – The Committee shall report its findings and recommendations to the 2010-2011 Regular Session of the 2009-2011 General Assembly and the Environmental Review Commission on or before May 1, December 31, 2010, at which time the Committee shall terminate."

PART XXII. LEGISLATIVE STUDY COMMISSION ON URBAN GROWTH AND INFRASTRUCTURE ISSUES REPORT DATE

SECTION 22. Section 36.6 of S.L. 2008-181 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 36.6. The Commission shall report the results of its study and its recommendations to the 2009 General Assembly upon its convening. The Commission shall submit its final report on or before the date of the convening of the 2011 General Assembly. The Commission shall expire upon the delivering of its final report, or the convening of the 2011 General Assembly, whichever occurs first."

PART XXIII. STATE INVESTMENT STUDY REPORTING DATE (S.B. 1217 – Hartsell; H.B. 1811 – Michaux)

SECTION 23. Section 47.4 of S.L. 2009-574 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 47.4. The Commission shall make an interim report to the 2010 Regular Session of the 2009 General Assembly prior to its convening, and shall make a final report to the 2010 Regular Session of the 2011 General Assembly. The report shall include any proposed legislation."

PART XXIV. EXTEND JOINT SELECT COMMITTEE ON PRESERVATION OF BIOLOGICAL EVIDENCE (Glazier)

SECTION 24. Section 7(d) of S.L. 2009-203 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 7.(d) The Committee shall submit a final report on the results of its study, including any proposed legislation, to the General Assembly on or before April 1, 2010. the convening of the Regular Session of the 2011 General Assembly. The Committee shall file a copy of its report with the President Pro Tempore's office, the Speaker's office, and the Legislative Library. The Committee shall terminate on April 1, 2010, upon the convening of the Regular Session of the 2011 General Assembly, or upon the filing of its final report, whichever occurs first."

PART XXV. EXTEND GENERAL STATUTES COMMISSION STUDIES (S.B. 1164 – Hartsell; Ross)

SECTION 25.1. Section 2 of S.L. 2009-281 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 2. The General Statutes Commission shall study and recommend to the 20102011 Regular Session of the 2009-2011 General Assembly ways to ensure that the General Statutes properly and uniformly refer to federal or state military organizations. These may include a single term that will include all organizations that compose the reserve components of the armed forces. The recommendations may include a process to be authorized by the General Assembly whereby changes that do not change the law can be made administratively by the Attorney General."

SECTION 25.2. Section 1 of S.L. 2009-273 reads as rewritten:

"SECTION 1. The General Statutes Commission shall study and recommend to the 2010 Regular Session of the 2009 General Assembly and the 2011 Regular Session of the General Assembly—ways to make the General Statutes and the North Carolina Constitution gender neutral. These may include recommending legislative changes needed to make the General Statutes and the Constitution gender neutral and a process to be authorized by the General Assembly whereby changes that do not change the law can be made administratively by the Attorney General to make the General Statutes gender neutral."

PART XXVI. REESTABLISH LEGISLATIVE TASK FORCE ON CHILDHOOD OBESITY (S.B. 1153 – Purcell; H.B. 1827 – Yongue, Brown, Hughes, Insko)

SECTION 26. Part XLIX of S.L. 2009-574 reads as rewritten:

"PART XLIX. LEGISLATIVE TASK FORCE ON CHILDHOOD OBESITY (Yongue)

"SECTION 49.1. There is created the Legislative Task Force on Childhood Obesity.

"SECTION 49.2. The Task Force shall consist of 12 members as follows:

- (1) Six members of the House of Representatives.
- (2) Six members of the Senate.

"SECTION 49.3. The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall designate one Representative as cochair, and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall designate one Senator as cochair. Terms of the initial members begin on appointment and continue until the convening of the 2011 Session of the General Assembly. Subsequent appointments begin during the 2011 Session of the General Assembly and continue until the Task Force terminates. Vacancies on the Task Force shall be filled by the same appointing authority that made the initial appointment. A quorum of the Task Force shall be a majority of its members.

"SECTION 49.4. The Task Force shall include, but should not be limited to, study of issues relating to childhood obesity. In the course of the study, the Task Force shall consider and recommend to the General Assembly strategies for addressing the problem of childhood obesity and encouraging healthy eating and increased physical activity among children through:

- (1) Early childhood intervention;
- (2) Childcare facilities:
- (3) Before and after-school programs;
- (4) Physical education and physical activity in schools;
- (5) Higher nutrition standards in schools;
- (6) Comprehensive nutrition education in schools;
- (7) Increased access to recreational activities for children;
- (8) Community initiatives and public awareness; and
- (9) Other means.

"SECTION 49.5. The Task Force shall encourage input from public nonprofit organizations, promoting healthy lifestyles for children, addressing the problems related to childhood obesity, encouraging healthy eating, and increasing physical activity among children.

"SECTION 49.6. Members of the Task Force shall receive per diem, subsistence, and travel allowances in accordance with G.S. 120-3.1, 138-5, or 138-6, as appropriate. The Task Force, while in the discharge of its official duties, may exercise all powers provided for under

G.S. 120-19 and G.S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4. The Task Force may meet at anytime upon the joint call of the cochairs. The Task Force may meet in the Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building.

With approval of the Legislative Services Commission, the Legislative Services Officer shall assign professional staff to assist the Task Force in its work. The House of Representatives' and the Senate's Directors of Legislative Assistants shall assign clerical staff to the Task Force, and the expenses relating to the clerical employees shall be borne by the Task Force. The Task Force may contract for professional, clerical, or consultant services as provided by G.S. 120-32.02. If the Task Force hires a consultant, the consultant shall not be a State employee or a person currently under contract with the State to provide services.

All State departments and agencies and local governments and their subdivisions shall furnish the Task Force with any information in their possession or available to them.

"SECTION 49.7. The Task Force shall submit a final-report of the results of its study and its recommendations to the 2010 Regular Session of the 2009 General Assembly. The Task Force may make a report of the results of its study and recommendations to the 2011 General Assembly and shall submit a report to the 2012 Regular Session of the 2011 General Assembly. The Task Force shall terminate on May 1, 2010, or upon the filing of its final report, whichever occurs first-upon the convening of the 2012 Regular Session of the 2011 General Assembly."

PART XXVII. JOINT LEGISLATIVE STUDY COMMITTEE ON THE CONSOLIDATION OF EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION AND CARE (S.B. 1116 – Blue, Purcell, Swindell; H.B. 1781 – Rapp, Glazier, Insko)

SECTION 27.1. Committee Established. – There is created the Joint Legislative Study Committee on the Consolidation of Early Childhood Education and Care. The Committee shall consist of 10 members to be appointed as follows:

- (1) Five members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
- (2) Five members of the Senate appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.

The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall designate one Representative as cochair, and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall designate one Senator as cochair. Vacancies on the Committee shall be filled by the same appointing authority making the initial appointment.

The Committee, while in the discharge of its official duties, may exercise all powers provided for under G.S. 120-19 and G.S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4. The Committee may meet at any time upon the joint call of the cochairs. The Committee may meet in the Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building. The Committee may contract for professional, clerical, or consultant services as provided by G.S. 120-32.02.

The Legislative Services Commission, through the Legislative Services Officer, shall assign professional staff to assist the Committee in its work. The House of Representatives' and Senate's Directors of Legislative Assistants shall assign clerical staff to the Task Force, and the expenses relating to the clerical employees shall be borne by the Task Force. Members of the Task Force shall receive subsistence and travel expenses at the rates set forth in G.S. 120-3.1, 138-5, or 138-6, as appropriate.

SECTION 33.3. The Task Force may study whether to expand access to the Controlled Substances Reporting System (CSRS) to physician employees and additional types of law enforcement officers, whether to require a photo ID when picking up prescriptions that are considered controlled substances, whether physician education and relicensure needs to include more training on decreasing substance abuse of prescription drugs, and any other matter the Task Force feels would be helpful in reducing prescription drug abuse.

- (6) Consider the fiscal impact and efficiency of State funding streams given the data accumulated in subdivisions (1) through (5) of this section.
- (7) Study any other issue the Commission considers relevant.

SECTION 34.5. The Commission, while in the discharge of its official duties, may exercise all powers provided for under G.S. 120-19 and G.S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4. The Commission may meet at any time upon the joint call of the cochairs. The Commission may meet in the Legislative Building or the Legislative Office Building.

With approval of the Legislative Services Commission, the Legislative Services Officer shall assign professional staff to assist the Commission in its work. The House of Representatives' and the Senate's Directors of Legislative Assistants shall assign clerical staff to the Commission, and the expenses relating to the clerical employees shall be borne by the Commission. The Commission may contract for professional, clerical, or consultant services as provided by G.S. 120-32.02. If the Commission hires a consultant, the consultant shall not be a State employee or a person currently under contract with the State to provide services.

SECTION 37. For legislative studies authorized by this act, out-of-state travel must be authorized by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate or the Speaker of the House of Representatives, as appropriate.

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PART XXXVIII. BILL AND RESOLUTION REFERENCES

SECTION 38. The listing of the original bill or resolution in this act is for reference purposes only and may not be deemed to have incorporated by reference any of the substantive provisions contained in the original bill or resolution.

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PART XXXIX. EFFECTIVE DATE AND APPLICABILITY

SECTION 39. Except as otherwise specifically provided, this act is effective when it becomes law. If a study is authorized both in this act and in the Current Operations and Capital Improvements Appropriations Act of 2010, the study shall be implemented in accordance with the Current Operations and Capital Improvements Appropriations Act of 2010 as ratified.
