MINUTES

The House Committee on Education - Community Colleges met at 11:00am on Tuesday, March 3, 2015 in Room 643 of the Legislative Office Building. Representatives Brody, McNeill, Dobson, Reives, Arp, B. Brown, Daughtry, Ford, Insko, Martin, Shepard, Stevens, Tine, Waddell, and Watford attended.

Representative Mark Brody presided and called the meeting to order at 11:10am. He introduced the pages and the Sergeant of Arms staff. The Sergeant of Arms staff passed out a NC Community Colleges information sheet to committee members (Attachment A).

Representative Brody introduced Dr. Scott Ralls, President of the North Carolina Community Colleges to speak. Dr. Ralls gave an overview of the community college system regarding attributes and the fact that the system was first in the nation.

Representative Brody then called for HB 15, entitled, YEAR-ROUND FUNDS FOR CC UGETC to be considered. Representative Brody recognized Representative Pendleton, primary bill sponsor, to explain HB 15 which allows course credit to be accepted at the university level.

After a brief discussion on the bill, Representative Brian Brown moved for a favorable report with a rerefer to Appropriations and the motion passed.

Representative Brody called for HB 47, entitled, YOUTH CAREER CONNECT to be the next bill considered. Since Representative Brody was the primary sponsor of the bill, he asked Representative McNeill (Committee Co-Chair) to preside over the meeting. Representative McNeill recognized Representative Brody to explain HB 47.

A motion was made by Representative Daughtry to place a PCS for HB 47 before the committee. Motion was accepted by the committee. Representative Brody explained the PCS which grants \$1/2million dollars for ninety students to attend community colleges for the next four years. At the end of the four years, the grant would either be renewed or allowed to sunset.



SUMMARY: House Bill 15 would allow community colleges to teach Universal General Education Transfer Courses (UGETC) during the summer term and include the student membership hours from these courses when calculating full-time equivalent students (FTE) for use in budget funding formulas at the State level. House Bill 15 would also require the State Board of Community Colleges to file a report on FTE for the 2015 summer term with the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by October 1, 2015.

CURRENT LAW: The budget for the North Carolina Community College System (NCCCS) is calculated based on a Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) student. An FTE for budget purposes is determined to be a student who takes 256 credit hours a semester or 512 credit hours a year. The NCCCS budgeted enrollment for funding requests is calculated by using the average of the past two years of budgeted FTE or the highest of those two years.

Courses taught in the summer term are typically not utilized in this calculation and NCCCS does not receive State funding to teach them. In 2013, NCCCS received the authority to teach, and use for budgeted FTE calculation purposes, the following courses in a summer term: technical education, health care, developmental education, and STEM-related courses.

BILL ANALYSIS: Section 1 of HB 18 expands the list of courses community colleges may teach, and use for budgeted FTE calculation purposes, in the summer term to include courses contained in the Comprehensive Articulation Agreement entered into between The University of North Carolina and the NCCCS. Student membership hours from these courses should be counted when computing FTE students for use in budget funding formulas at the State level.

Section 2 of HB 18 directs the State Board of Community Colleges to report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by October 1, 2015, on FTE for the summer 2015 term.


EFFECTIVE DATE: This bill would be effective when it becomes law and applies beginning with the summer 2015 term.

BACKGROUND: In February of 2014, The University of North Carolina and the NCCCS entered into a new Comprehensive Articulation Agreement (CAA), which is a statewide agreement governing the transfer of credits between North Carolina community colleges and public universities. Among other things, the new CAA made changes to the Transfer Course List, including identifying certain courses as "Universal General Education Transfer Courses" (UGETC), which are courses guaranteed to transfer for general education equivalency credit to each of the 16 constituent institutions. The new CAA went into effect ith the 2014 fall semester.

AN ACT TO ALLOW COMMUNITY COLLEGES TO TEACH UNIVERSAL GENERAL EDUCATION TRANSFER COURSES DURING THE SUMMER TERM AND EARN FUNDING FOR THOSE COURSES YEAR-ROUND.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:


SECTION 1. G.S. 115D-5(v) reads as rewritten:

"(v) Community colleges may teach technical education, health care, developmental education,—and STEM-related eoursescourses, and the Universal General Education Transfer Courses contained in the Comprehensive Articulation Agreement entered into between The University of North Carolina and the North Carolina Community College System at any time during the year, including the summer term. Student membership hours from these courses shall be counted when computing full-time equivalent students (FTE) for use in budget funding formulas at the State level."

SECTION 2. The State Board of Community Colleges shall report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by October 1, 2015, on FTE for the summer 2015 term.

SECTION 3. This act is effective when it becomes law and applies beginning with the summer 2015 term.

Transforming Developmental Education in North Carolina's Community Colleges

The Imperative

With more than 60 percent of entering community college students in need of at least one developmental course, and only about one-fourth of these students successfully earning a degree or certificate, the North Carolina Community College System (NCCCS) created the *Developmental Education Initiative* (DEI) in 2010 to transform the condition of developmental education for its students. Key goals of DEI include:

- Reducing unnecessary enrollment in developmental coursework;
- Accelerating student completion; and
- Increasing the number of students who successfully complete developmental education and enroll in college-level courses.

In order to accomplish these goals, the DEI implemented three major transformations:

- Redesign the NCCCS developmental education curricula;
- Implement appropriate placement measures; and
- Establish new diagnostic assessments, aligned to the curricula.

Curricula Redesign

As mathematics is the greatest obstacle to student success, ² and has substantial student enrollment, the DEI Math Task Force first focused on developmental mathematics and found that the existing sequence of 16-week semester courses did not meet student needs. Students who only needed to improve specific math skills were not able to move forward quickly, and students testing at very low levels needed additional assistance and options. With the expertise of college faculty from across the state, the DEI streamlined content, reduced redundant curricula, and ensured alignment with K-12 and college-level courses, resulting in eight new developmental mathematics modules implemented in Fall 2013.


Building upon the success of the mathematics redesign, the DEI English and Reading Task Force recommended replacement of the existing separate English and reading semester-long courses with three eight-week, three credit hour courses of integrated English and reading. For students who are near college-ready, colleges may co-requisite the highest developmental course with a college course. The three new developmental courses were implemented in Fall 2014.

Placement Measures

At the request of NCCCS, the Community College Research Center (CCRC) at Columbia University's Teacher College conducted a study that found a student's high school grade point average (GPA) was significantly more predictive of a student's college success than existing placement tests, and would cut in half the number of students misplaced from 30 percent to 15 percent.³ The resulting Multiple Measures for Placement Policy - in effect Fall 2013 and required for use by Fall 2015 -* establishes new placement requirements using a hierarchy of measures as a result of CCRC research.

* At the March 2015 meeting the State Board of Community Colleges will consider delaying the requirement to Fall 2016.

Multiple Measures Placement Policy



North Carolina Diagnostic Assessment and Placement Test

As a result of the new placement policy, students who previously would have been required to take an "off the shelf" placement test may now be placed directly in college-level coursework, dramatically increasing the likelihood of college success. For those students now required to be assessed, NCCCS has created a new diagnostic placement test to custom



fit the developmental curricula. By identifying specific weaknesses and aligning the test items with the developmental curricula, the North Carolina Diagnostic Assessment and Placement test (NC DAP) will result in reduced time enrolled in developmental courses.

Preliminary Results

Data shows that students are already benefiting from this three-pronged approach. Full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollments in developmental education have declined by more than 53 percent since 2009-10, with a 70 percent decline in mathematics and a 35 percent decline in reading/English full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment.

With this decline in remedial enrollment, the annual cost has been significantly reduced – a reduction that has saved both students in lower tuition and in time, and the state budget in reduced need for appropriation to fund developmental coursework.

In the 2014 session, the NC General Assembly was able to maximize these savings by redirecting \$15 million to create a fourth tier of higher funding for health care and technical education programs in priority occupations that have documented skills gaps and pay higher wages.

The NCCCS is continuing to evaluate the success of the DEI. The remediation rate has already declined from the 65 percent reported in 2012 to 52 percent for incoming high school graduates in the 2013-14 academic year. A North Carolina community college research team, who will be developing an assessment process for evaluating the success of the strategies, has recently been established. Results from the statewide DEI, and from additional reform strategies implemented at the local level, will be measured and reported in the coming years.

SUMMARY: HB 47 would authorize Anson County Schools ninth and tenth graders to enroll in curriculum courses at South Piedmont Community College in association with the federal Youth Career Connect Grant.

The Proposed Committee Substitute (PCS) to HB 47 would make the following changes: (i) clarify that tuition for these students is waived, (ii) modify the effective date to contain a sunset of June 30, 2018, and (iii) make a conforming change to the long title.

BACKGROUND: According to news articles and information from the US Department of Labor on the Youth Career Connect grants, Anson County was the only school district in NC selected in 2014 to receive a Youth Career Connect grant. These grants are designed to encourage partnerships between school districts, institutions of higher education, and the workforce investment system to scale up evidence-based high school models to better prepare students to succeed in post-secondary education and in a competitive workforce. The federal Youth Career Connect Grant awarded to Anson County Schools for 2014-2018 requires students to enroll in community college courses in the ninth and tenth grades.

CURRENT LAW: Under current law, there are limited situations in which ninth and tenth grade students may enroll in community college classes. In 2012, the General Assembly enacted the "Career and College Promise" model, which allows juniors and seniors that have demonstrated college readiness to enroll in community college courses while still in high school. The statutes do not allow ninth and tenth graders to enroll in community colleges unless they are 1) enrolled in an early college high school, or 2) taking courses in industrial and engineering technologies that lead to a career technical education certificate or diploma.

BILL ANALYSIS: The PCS for HB 47 provides that South Piedmont Community College may enroll Anson County Schools ninth and tenth grade students in curriculum courses associated with the federal Youth Career Connect Grant. SUMMARY: House Bill 129 would create the High Achieving Tuition Scholarship Program for top performing high school students attending North Carolina Community Colleges.

The Proposed Committee Substitute (PCS) for House Bill 129 would make a variety of changes, including:

- Clarify the application process to allow eligible high school students to apply for the High Achieving Tuition Scholarship (Scholarship) prior to high school graduation.
- Clarify that the amount of the Scholarship award for any student would be reduced by the amount of grants or scholarships received by that student from other state or federal sources.
- Remove the requirement that the State Board of Community Colleges must adopt rules to ensure Scholarship recipients are providing counseling and assistance in selecting coursework and leaves the responsibility instead with the community college itself.
- Change the annual reporting date for the State Education Assistance Authority (SEAA) from March 1 to September 1.


CURRENT LAW: There is not currently a High Achieving Tuition Scholarship Program.

BILL ANALYSIS: Section 1 of the PCS would create the High Achieving Tuition Scholarship Program (Program) and describe the purposes of the Program.

Section 2 of the PCS would outline the criteria for eligible students, including (i) a minimum unweighted GPA of 3.5, (ii) United States citizenship, (iii) State residency for tuition purposes, (iv) admission as a degree-seeking student at a community college, and (v) compliance with Selective Service registration requirements.

Section 3 of the PCS would authorize the SEAA to annually award Scholarships to all eligible students not to exceed the cost of 16 credit hours of tuition per academic semester for a maximum of four academic semesters. Students must complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to be eligible for a Scholarship. The PCS would direct the SEAA to award Scholarships to eligible students in the order in which they are received and must reduce the amount of the Scholarship award by the amount of grants or scholarships received by a student from other state or federal sources. The SEAA is directed to award Scholarships beginning with the fall semester of the 2016-2017 school year to students graduating from high school in the 2015-2016 school year.

Section 4 of the PCS would require the Scholarship to be renewed if the student maintains a 3.0 GPA and completes a minimum of 30 semester credit hours by the end of the academic year.

Section 5 of the PCS would require a Scholarship to be revoked for any of the following at the conclusion of each semester: (i) failure to maintain a 2.5 GPA, (ii) failure to maintain a course load of at least 12 credit hours, (iii) default or unpaid refund on a student loan financial aid program, or (iv) felony conviction for a controlled substance.

Section 6 of the PCS would direct SEAA to adopt rules for administering the Program.

Section 7 of the PCS would require the community colleges to ensure that Scholarship recipients are provided counseling and assistance in selecting coursework. The State Board of Community Colleges (SBCC) would be required to ensure credits earned by participating students are transferable into constituent institutions of The University of North Carolina (UNC).

Section 8 of the PCS would appropriate \$2 million from the General Fund to SEAA for 2016-2017 for administrative costs and award of Scholarships, and states the intent of the General Assembly for future appropriations.

Section 9 of the PCS would require the UNC Board of Governors to adopt a policy to allow any student admitted to a constituent institution who receives a Scholarship to defer admission for two years, beginning with the 2016-2017 school year.

Section 10 of the PCS would require the following reports:

- For the 2015-2016 school year, the State Board of Education (SBE) must direct local boards of education to survey high school seniors who meet the eligibility criteria for the Scholarship to determine interest in the Program. The SBE must report the survey results to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee (JLEOC) by December 1, 2015.
- The UNC Board of Governors and the SBCC must jointly identify and report to the JLEOC by April 1, 2016, on potential issues with the Program
- Beginning on or before September 1, 2017, the SEAA must file an annual report with the JLEOC on the implementation of the Program.

EFFECTIVE DATE: The PCS would become effective July 1, 2015.

Scholarship Renewal. – A scholarship awarded to an eligible student shall be renewed if the student demonstrates maintenance of satisfactory academic progress by maintaining a 3.0 grade point average and completion of a minimum of 30 semester credit hours by the end of the academic year.

SECTION 5. Scholarship Revocation. - A scholarship awarded to an eligible student shall be revoked for any of the following at the conclusion of each semester:

(1)

- Failure to maintain a 2.5 grade point average.
- Failure to maintain a course load of at least 12 credit hours. (2)
- (3)Default or unpaid refund on a student financial aid program.

For students planning to enter a constituent institution of The University of North Carolina, the State Board of Community Colleges shall ensure that credits earned by those students participating in the program are transferable.

SECTION 8. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the State Education Assistance Authority the sum of two million dollars (\$2,000,000) for the 2016-2017 fiscal year for administrative costs and award of scholarships. It is the intent of the General Assembly to appropriate three million five hundred thousand dollars (\$3,500,000) in recurring funds for the 2017-2018 fiscal year for administrative costs and award of scholarships. Any unexpended funds for this purpose shall not revert at the end of each fiscal year but shall remain available to award scholarships to eligible students.

SECTION 9. The Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina shall adopt a policy to permit any student admitted to a constituent university who receives a High Achieving Tuition Scholarship to defer admission to the constituent institution for two years, beginning with the 2016-2017 school year.

SECTION 10.(a) For the 2015-2016 school year, the State Board of Education shall direct local boards of education to survey high school students in their senior year who meet the eligibility requirements of the High Achieving Tuition Scholarship to determine interest in the program, including numbers of students who intend to apply for the scholarship, and reasons that eligible students may choose not to apply for the scholarship. The State Board of Education shall report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee no later than December 1, 2015, on the results of this survey.

SECTION 10.(b) The Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina and the State Board of Community Colleges shall jointly identify and report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by April 1, 2016, on potential issues related to the transition of High Achieving Tuition Scholarship recipients from community college to university enrollment, and other recommendations to improve and expand the High Achieving Tuition Scholarship Program.

SECTION 10.(c) The State Education Assistance Authority shall report annually on or before September 1, beginning in 2017, to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on the implementation of the High Achieving Tuition Scholarship Program. The report shall include the following information:

- Number of students applying for the scholarship, including information (1) about student demographics and geographic location.
- (2) Number of students awarded the scholarship, including information about student demographics and geographic location, and community college attended.



SECTION 5. Scholarship Revocation. – A scholarship awarded to an eligible student shall be revoked for any of the following at the conclusion of each semester:

- (1) Failure to maintain a 2.5 grade point average.
- (2) Failure to maintain a course load of at least 12 credit hours.
- (3) Default or unpaid refund on a student financial aid program.
- (4) Felony convictions for a controlled substances offense under Article 5 of Chapter 90 of the General Statutes.

SECTION 6. Scholarship Administration. – The Authority shall adopt rules for administration of the High Achieving Tuition Scholarship Program.

SECTION 7. Course Counseling and Transfer. – The State Board of Community Colleges shall adopt rules requiring community colleges to ensure that scholarship recipients are provided counseling and assistance in selecting coursework that reflects their educational and career goals. For students planning to enter a constituent institution of The University of North Carolina, the State Board of Community Colleges shall ensure that credits earned by those students participating in the program are transferable.

SECTION 8. There is appropriated from the General Fund to the State Education Assistance Authority the sum of two million dollars (\$2,000,000) for the 2016-2017 fiscal year for administrative costs and award of scholarships. It is the intent of the General Assembly to appropriate three million five hundred thousand dollars (\$3,500,000) in recurring funds for the 2017-2018 fiscal year for administrative costs and award of scholarships. Any unexpended funds for this purpose shall not revert at the end of each fiscal year but shall remain available to award scholarships to eligible students.


SECTION 9. The Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina shall adopt a policy to permit any student admitted to a constituent university who receives a High Achieving Tuition Scholarship to defer admission to the constituent institution for two years, beginning with the 2016-2017 school year.

SECTION 10.(a) For the 2015-2016 school year, the State Board of Education shall direct local boards of education to survey high school students in their senior year who meet the eligibility requirements of the High Achieving Tuition Scholarship to determine interest in the program, including numbers of students who intend to apply for the scholarship, and reasons that eligible students may choose not to apply for the scholarship. The State Board of Education shall report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee no later than December 1, 2015, on the results of this survey.

SECTION 10.(b) The Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina and the State Board of Community Colleges shall jointly identify and report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by April 1, 2016, on potential issues related to the transition of High Achieving Tuition Scholarship recipients from community college to university enrollment, and other recommendations to improve and expand the High Achieving Tuition Scholarship Program.



The PCS would add the term "quadrennially" to clarify that the General Assembly appointments are made on a 4 year cycle, and make a conforming change to clarify the vacancy appointment process.

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 115D-12 establishes the local boards of trustees for community colleges. There are thirteen members on each board, including the president of the student body as an ex officio member. Of the remaining twelve members, they are appointed in groups of four respectively by the following entities:

- 1) The board(s) of education of the local school administrative unit(s) located in the administrative area of the institution.
- 2) The board(s) of commissioners of the county or counties in the administrative area of the institution.

The statute places the following requirements and restrictions on membership:

- 1) No member of the General Assembly may be appointed to a local board of trustees for a community
- 2) All trustees must be residents of the administrative area of the institution for which they are selected or of counties contiguous thereto with the exception of members appointed by the Governor.
- 3) No person who has been employed full time by the community college within the prior 5 years and no spouse or child of a person currently employed full time by the community college shall serve on the board of trustees of that college.
- 4) No board of education may elect a member of the board of education or any person employed by the board of education to serve as a trustee.
- 5) No more than one trustee from appointed by the board of county commissioners may be a member of a board of county commissioners.

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 188 would create a local modification to the appointment procedures for the board of trustees of Isothermal Community College. The 4 trustees previously appointed by the local board of education would instead be appointed by the General Assembly. The board members first appointed in 2015 and 2017, and every 4 years thereafter, would be appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives. The board members first appointed in 2016 and 2018, and every 4 years thereafter, would be appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate. Vacancies occurring in the positions would be appointed according to the procedures of G.S. 120-122, which provides mechanisms for filling vacancies, including when the General Assembly is not in session.

EFFECTIVE DATE: HB 188 would become effective when it becomes law, and apply to appointments to terms beginning on or after July 1, 2015.







The Rutherford County Commissioners and Polk County Commissioners shall ensure that members with the required experiential backgrounds, as required by G.S. 115D-12(a), as enacted in this act, are elected to the board of trustees of Isothermal Community College no later than July 1, 2018.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. G.S. 115D-12(a) reads as rewritten:

"(a) Each community college established or operated pursuant to this Chapter shall be governed by a board of trustees consisting of 13 members, or of additional members if selected according to the special procedure prescribed by the third paragraph of this subsection, who shall be selected by the following agencies. No member of the General Assembly may be appointed to a local board of trustees for a community college.

Group One – four trustees, elected by the board of education of the public school administrative unit located in the administrative area of the institution. If there are two or more public school administrative units, whether city or county units, or both, located within the administrative area, the trustees shall be elected jointly by all of the boards of education of those units, each board having one vote in the election of each trustee, except as provided in G.S. 115D-59. No board of education shall elect a member of the board of education or any person employed by the board of education to serve as a trustee, however, any such person currently serving on a board of trustees shall be permitted to fulfill the unexpired portion of the trustee's current term. appointed by the General Assembly as follows:

- (1) The appointment of a trustee for a term commencing July 1, 2015, shall be made by the General Assembly, upon the recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
- (2) The appointment of a trustee for a term commencing July 1, 2016, shall be made by the General Assembly, upon the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.
- (3) The appointment of a trustee for a term commencing July 1, 2017, shall be made by the General Assembly, upon the recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives.
- (4) The appointment of a trustee for a term commencing July 1, 2018, shall be made by the General Assembly, upon the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate.

<u>Vacancies in positions appointed by the General Assembly upon the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate or the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be filled in accordance with G.S. 120-122.</u>

MINUTES

The House Committee on Education-Community Colleges met on Tuesday, April 14, 2015 at 11:00am in Room 643 of the Legislative Office Building. Representatives Brody, McNeill, Dobson, Holley, Reives, Arp, B. Brown, Cunningham, Daughtry, Ford, Goodman, Insko, Martin, Robinson, Shepard, Stevens, Szoka, Tine, Waddell, and Watford attended.

Representative McNeill called the meeting to order at 11:05am. He introduced the Pages and Sergeant at Arms staff.

Representative McNeill charged the members of the Committee with selecting 2 new members of the State Board of Community Colleges to serve six-year terms from July 1, 2015-June 30, 2021. He explained the elections would take place on the House floor on April 16, 2015.



Representative Ford then motioned for a favorable report for HB 393 and the motion passed.


House bill 396 was not heard.

RE: State Board of Community Colleges Election Procedures

Twenty-one members serve on the State Board of Community Colleges in staggered six-year terms. Four of those seats are elected by the House of Representatives in a staggered election cycle. In **2015**, the House must elect two members from the State atlarge to a six-year term beginning July 1, 2015. (The Senate must also elect two members from the State at-large to a six-year term beginning July 1, 2015.) This year, the terms of Mr. K. Ray Bailey and Dr. Samuel Powell, who were first elected by the House of Representatives in 2009, will expire on June 30, 2015. Both Mr. Bailey and Dr. Powell are eligible for re-election.

2015 Election Procedures

- 1. The Speaker of the House of Representatives has assigned to the House Community College Committee the duty of receiving nominations from members of the House.
- 2. Representatives Brody and McNeill, as co-chairs of this committee, and the co-chairs of the Senate Education committee, have determined that the final date for receiving nominations shall be 5:00 p.m. on Monday, March 30, 2015. The House and Senate will fix by joint resolution Thursday, April 16, 2015 as the common date and time for the election of members of the Board.
- 3. Each Representative may nominate only one candidate. No person may simultaneously be a candidate for election in both chambers. All nominations must be received in the office of Denise Weeks, House Principal Clerk, 2319 LB, by 5:00 p.m. on Monday, March 30, 2015 and submission of a 2015 Statement of Economic Interest must be received by the North Carolina State Ethics Commission by 5:00 p.m. on Monday, March 30, 2015 at which time nominations close. No additional nominees may be received from the floor.



- 4. No member of the General Assembly, no officer or employee of the State, and no officer or employee of an institution under the jurisdiction of the State Board shall be eligible to serve on the State Board. No spouse of a member of the General Assembly or of an officer or employee of the Community College System or of an institution under the jurisdiction of the State Board shall be eligible to serve on the State Board. No person who within the prior five years has been an employee of the Community Colleges System Office shall be eligible to serve on the State Board.
- 5. The Committee must screen the proposed candidates for nomination as to their qualifications, background, lack of statutory disabilities, and willingness and ability to serve if elected.
- 6. After nominations close, the Committee will list all candidates and will separately vote "aye" or "no" on each candidate to determine whether the person will be listed as a nominee of the Committee. The verbal vote of a majority of those members of the Committee present and voting constitutes a candidate as a nominee of the Committee. If a sufficient number of candidates are submitted to the Committee, then the Committee must nominate at least two persons for each place to be filled. Otherwise, the Committee must nominate at least one person for each place to be filled by the House.
- 7. At the election session, the Committee will report its list of nominees with the terms of office (six years) indicated. The ballot will also include the names of all other persons nominated by a member who are determined by the Committee to be qualified for the office, with the Committee's list of nominees clearly set out on the ballot.
- 8. To be elected, a nominee must receive the votes of a majority of all members present and voting.
- 9. When the House has chosen two people for the positions to be filled, the chair of the Committee will make a motion for the election of those people by the House to the indicated positions and for the indicated terms. The vote shall then be called electronically. If a majority of those voting vote "aye," then the people named in the motion shall be declared to have been elected to the State Board by the House.
- 10. The House may adopt rules consistent with G.S. 115D-2.1 with respect to the election by the House of members of the State Board.

SUMMARY: House Bill 390 would (1) authorize the election of an additional member to the Board of Trustees of Beaufort County Community College (BCCC) by each board of county commissioners within the administrative area, and (2) require the State Board of Community Colleges to include all of Washington County in the service area of BCCC.

The PCS would clarify the method of appointment of trustees by county commissioners to the BCCC.

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 115D-12 establishes the local boards of trustees for community colleges. There are thirteen members on each board, including the president of the student body as an ex officio member. The remaining twelve members are appointed in groups of 4 respectively by the following entities:

- 1) The board(s) of education of the local school administrative unit(s) located in the administrative area of the institution. If there is more than one board, the appointment is made jointly.
- 2) The board(s) of commissioners of the county or counties in the administrative area of the institution. If there is more than one board, the appointment is made jointly. If a satellite campus has been established in a county, if the board of trustees agrees, the county commissioners where the satellite campus is located may elect an additional 2 members.
- 3) The Governor.


The State Board of Community Colleges establishes service areas to community colleges for providing education and training services to eliminate duplication of services by different colleges in the same area. Service areas do not regulate or establish attendance areas or administrative areas. Currently, the service area for BCCC is Beaufort, Hyde, Tyrell, and all courses to Washington County except for adult basic education, adult high school/GED, fire training and emergency medical training and in-plant training, which are offered by Martin Community College.

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 390 would make the following changes:

Section 1: Would authorize the board of county commissioners for the county where the main campus for BCCC is located (Beaufort County) to appoint 4 members to the board of trustees, and allow the board of trustees to authorize another board of county commissioners in the administrative area to appoint one trustee.

Section 2: Would require the State Board of Community Colleges to include Washington County fully in the service area of BCCC.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Section 2 would become effective July 1, 2015. The remainder of the act would become effective when it becomes law.







SUMMARY: House Bill 393 would eliminate the 4 appointments of the local board of education to the board of trustees of Tri-County Community College and require the county commissioners of the campus in which the main campus is located to make 8 appointments.

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 115D-12 establishes the local boards of trustees for community colleges. There are thirteen members on each board, including the president of the student body as an ex officio member. The remaining twelve members are appointed in groups of 4 respectively by the following entities:

- 1) The board(s) of education of the local school administrative unit(s) located in the administrative area of the institution. If there is more than one board, the appointment is made jointly.
- 2) The board(s) of commissioners of the county or counties in the administrative area of the institution. If there is more than one board, the appointment is made jointly. If a satellite campus has been established in a county and the board of trustees agrees, the county commissioners where the satellite campus is located may elect an additional 2 members.
- 3) The Governor.

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 393 would create a local modification to the appointment procedures for the board of trustees of Tri-County Community College as follows:

- The local boards of education would no longer appoint any members to the board of trustees.
- The county commissioners of the county in which the main campus for Tri-County Community College is located (Cherokee County) would appoint 8 members to the board of trustees.
- No other county commissioners in the administrative area would make appointments to the board of trustees.

EFFECTIVE DATE: HB 393 would become effective when it becomes law, and applies to appointments made on or after that date.



SUMMARY: House Bill 396 would direct the State Board of Community Colleges to establish the Community College Innovative Pilot Program in order to create new and innovative workforce development programs in development tier 1 and tier 2 counties.

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 396 would direct the State Board of Community Colleges (State Board) to create the Community College Innovative Pilot Program (Pilot Program) for certain community colleges to establish new and innovative workforce development programs in development tier 1 and 2 counties.

The purpose of the Pilot Program would be to expand options available to community colleges in establishing new programs targeting the workforce development needs of economically distressed areas of the State by:

- · Providing initial funding for planning and start-up operational costs for new programs; and
- Allowing community colleges to build student enrollment to create tuition-supported programs and increase employment opportunities for students.

The Pilot Program would be a 3 year pilot beginning in the 2016-2017 academic year until the 2018-2019.

The State Board, in collaboration with the Department of Commerce would develop criteria for the approval of an application submitted by a community college serving a development tier 1 or 2 county to participate in the Program. The State Board shall select applicants for the Pilot Program that represent the geographic diversity of the State's resident population as allowed by the pool of applicants.


By September 1, 2019, The State Board must report the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on the Pilot Program on the following information:

- Use of funds by the participating community colleges including start-up costs for the new programs; costs associated with student instruction; and financial assistance for students.
- Evaluation of the success of the various programs including student enrollment; student outcomes such as job placement and completion of certifications, diplomas, and degrees; and number and type of programs that were fully supported by student tuition by the completion of the Pilot Program.
- Recommendations on the expansion of the Pilot Program and potential modifications to the State funding method for community colleges related to providing funds for new programs.

The bill would appropriate \$5,000,000 to the NC Community College System for the 2015-2016 fiscal year and \$5,000,000 for the 2016-2017 fiscal year to fund the Pilot Program. Up to \$100,000 of these funds may be used each year to administer and evaluate the Pilot Program. The 2015-2016 funds would not revert and would be available to be used for the Pilot Program until June 30, 2017.

EFFECTIVE DATE: The bill would become effective when it becomes law. Section 4 concerning the appropriations would become effective July 1, 2015.

AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A COMMUNITY COLLEGE INNOVATIVE PILOT PROGRAM. The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. The State Board of Community Colleges shall establish the Community College Innovative Pilot Program for participating community colleges to establish new, innovative workforce development programs in development tier one and tier two counties as defined in G.S. 143B-437.08. The purpose of the pilot program is to expand the options available to community colleges in establishing new programs targeting the workforce development needs of economically distressed areas of the State by providing (i) initial funding for planning and start-up operational costs for new programs and (ii) the opportunity for community colleges to build student enrollment to create tuition-supported programs and increased job attainment for students. Implementation of the pilot program shall begin with the 2016-2017 academic year, continue for a period of three academic years, ending with the 2018-2019 academic year.

SECTION 2. The State Board of Community Colleges, in collaboration with the Department of Commerce, shall develop criteria for approval of an application submitted by a community college serving a development tier one or tier two county to participate in the pilot program in accordance with the provisions of this act. Depending on the pool of applicants, the State Board shall select community college programs for participation in the pilot program that represent the geographic diversity of North Carolina's resident population. A community college seeking to participate in the pilot program shall submit to the State Board a completed Curriculum Program Application for a New-to-the-System Program Title.

SECTION 3. The State Board of Community Colleges shall report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee by September 1, 2019, on the implementation and administration of the pilot program, including at least the following information:

- (1) The use of funds by community colleges participating in the pilot program, including:
 - a. Start-up costs to establish new programs.
 - b. Costs associated with student instruction, including faculty salaries, instructional supplies, and related instructional equipment.
 - c. Financial assistance for students, including assistance with tuition, registration fees, books, and certification costs.
- (2) Evaluation of the success of the community college programs, including:
 - a. Student enrollment numbers.



Of the funds appropriated in this subsection, the Community Colleges System Office may use up to one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) each fiscal year for administration and evaluation of the pilot program.

SECTION 4.(b) The funds appropriated for the 2015-2016 fiscal year in subsection (a) of this section shall not revert at the end of the fiscal year, but shall remain available for expenditure for the purposes set forth in this act until June 30, 2017.

SECTION 5. Section 4 of this act is effective July 1, 2015. The remainder of this act is effective when it becomes law.

Representative Brody recognized Representative Tine to present the bill. A motion was made by Representative Reives to place a PCS for HB 396 before the committee and the motion passed. The PCS would remove the appropriation for the program. After a brief discussion on the bill, Representative Goodman motioned for an unfavorable report to the original bill and a favorable report to the PCS with a serial referral to the committee on Appropriations. The motion passed.

HB 754 entitled, COMMUNITY COLLEGE REMEDIATION PILOT PROJECT sponsored by Representative Brody was considered. HB 754 would establish a four year remediation pilot project at South Piedmont Community College. Since Representative Brody was the primary sponsor of the bill, he asked Representative McNeill (Committee Co-Chair) to preside over the meeting while he was presenting. Representative McNeill recognized Representative Brody to present the bill. During the bill discussion, Representative McNeill recognized Dr. Stan Sidor, President of South Piedmont Community College, who was referred by Representative Brody to answer member questions. Representative Arp motioned for a favorable report to the original bill and the motion passed.

HB 756 entitled, FINANCIAL/ LIFE SKILLS CC COURSE sponsored by Representative Queen was considered. HB 756 would establish a program of Financial Literacy and Life Skills instruction to be offered by the community college. Representative Brody recognized Representative Queen to present the bill. A motion was made by Representative Martin to send forth an amendment to the original bill and the motion passed. See Amendment Attachment. After a brief discussion, Representative B. Brown motioned for an unfavorable report to the original bill and a favorable report to the PCS with a re-referral to the committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House. The motion passed.

HB 860 entitled, LIMIT SOLDIERS' CC TUITION sponsored by Representative Hanes was considered. HB 860 would waive the difference in cost between the out-of-state tuition rate and the amount of tuition assistance available from the Department of Defense for certain active duty members of the Armed Forces. Representative Brody recognized Representative Hanes to present the bill. After a brief discussion, Representative Holley motioned for a favorable report to the original bill and the motion passed.



HB 488 entitled, CENTRAL CAROLINA CC/BD. OF TRUSTEES sponsored by Representative Reives was considered. HB 488 would establish procedures for appointment of members of the Board of Trustees of Central Carolina Community College. Representative Brody recognized Representative Reives to present the bill. After a brief discussion, Representative Robinson motioned for a favorable report to the original bill and the motion passed.

The last bill considered was HB 579 entitled, COMM. COLL. SUMMER COURSES/FUNDED FTE sponsored by Representative McNeill. HB 579 would allow community college curriculum courses offered during the summer term to be included in state funding formulas. Representative Brody recognized Representative McNeill to present the bill. After a brief discussion, Representative B. Brown motioned for a favorable report to the original bill and a serial referral to the committee on Appropriations. The motion passed.

There being no further business, Representative Brody adjourned the meeting at 11:35am.

SUMMARY: House Bill 396 would direct the State Board of Community Colleges to establish the Community College Innovative Pilot Program in order to create new and innovative workforce development programs in development tier 1 and tier 2 counties.

The Proposed Committee Substitute (PCS) would remove the appropriation for the Program.

BILL ANALYSIS: The PCS for House Bill 396 would direct the State Board of Community Colleges (State Board) to create the Community College Innovative Pilot Program (Pilot Program) for certain community colleges to establish new and innovative workforce development programs in development tier 1 and 2 counties.

The purpose of the Pilot Program would be to expand options available to community colleges in establishing new programs targeting the workforce development needs of economically distressed areas of the State by:

- Providing initial funding for planning and start-up operational costs for new programs; and
- Allowing community colleges to build student enrollment to create tuition-supported programs and increase employment opportunities for students.

The Pilot Program would be a 3 year pilot beginning in the 2016-2017 academic year until the 2018-2019.

The State Board, in collaboration with the Department of Commerce would develop criteria for the approval of an application submitted by a community college serving a development tier 1 or 2 county to participate in the Program. The State Board shall select applicants for the Pilot Program that represent the geographic diversity of the State's resident population as allowed by the pool of applicants.

By September 1, 2019, The State Board must report the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on the Pilot Program on the following information:







SUMMARY: HB 488 would establish procedures for appointment of members of the Board of Trustees of Central Carolina Community College.

CURRENT LAW: G.S. 115D-12 establishes the local boards of trustees for community colleges. There are thirteen members on each board, including the president of the student body as an ex officio member. Of the remaining twelve members, they are appointed in groups of four respectively by the following entities:

- 1) The board(s) of education of the local school administrative unit(s) located in the administrative area of the institution. No board of education may elect a member of the board of education or any person employed by the board of education to serve as a trustee.
- 2) The board(s) of commissioners of the county or counties in the administrative area of the institution. No more than one trustee appointed by the board(s) of county commissioners may be a member of a board of county commissioners.
- 3) The Governor.

S.L. 2013-263 ended the terms of those individuals elected solely by the Lee County Board of Education to the Board of Trustees of Central Carolina Community College on August 1, 2013, and directed appointment of 4 members of the Central Carolina Community College Board of Trustees jointly elected to the Central Carolina Community College Board of Trustees by the Board of Education of Chatham County, the Board of Education of Lee County, and the Board of Education of Harnett County with each board having one vote in the election of each trustee.

BILL ANALYSIS: HB 488 would repeal S.L. 2013-263 and provide that 16 members be appointed to the Central Carolina Community College Board of Trustees, with changes to the appointments for Groups 1 and 2 as follows:

Group 1 – Local Board of Education Appointments

- Chatham County Board of Education I person to a term beginning July 1, 2016, and quadrennially thereafter.
- Harnett County Board of Education 1 person to a term beginning July 1, 2017, and quadrennially thereafter.
- Lee County Board of Education 2 persons to terms beginning July 1 of 2015 and 2018, respectively, and quadrennially thereafter.

Approval by at least 1 of the other 2 boards of a nominee constitutes selection of the trustee. If a nominee is not approved by at least 1 other board, the nominating board may nominate other persons until another board approves the nominee.

- Chatham County Board of Education 2 persons, both to a term beginning July 1, 2017, and quadrennially thereafter.






SUMMARY: House Bill 579 would allow community college curriculum courses offered during the summer term to be included in state funding formulas.

CURRENT LAW: The budget for the North Carolina Community College System (NCCCS) is calculated based on a Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) student. An FTE for budget purposes is determined to be a student who takes 256 credit hours a semester or 512 credit hours a year. The NCCCS budgeted enrollment for funding requests is calculated by using the average of the past two years of budgeted FTE or the highest of those two years.

Courses taught in the summer term are typically not utilized in this calculation and NCCCS does not receive State funding to teach them. In 2013, the General Assembly authorized community colleges to teach technical education, health care, developmental education, and STEM-related courses during the summer term and earn FTE.


BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 579 would allow community colleges to teach and earn FTE for all curriculum courses taught in the summer term.



SUMMARY: House Bill 754 would establish a four year remediation pilot project at South Piedmont Community College.

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 754 would establish a four year remediation pilot project at South Piedmont Community College (SPCC), intended to fulfill two purposes: (i) increase high school graduation rates and community college completion rates in Union and Anson Counties and (ii) serve as a model for the rest of the State.

The pilot project would consist of the following two components:


- 1. Identification and remediation of high school students who do not meet community college entrance requirements. SPCC would administer a college competency exam to a representative population of high school sophomores, juniors, and seniors in Union and/or Anson county public schools. Students determined by the exam to be deficient in math, English, or reading would have the opportunity to enroll in remediation courses at SPCC instead of other high school graduation electives. Participating students would be included in the average daily membership count of the LEA and the budget FTE for SPCC. Once students successfully complete remediation courses, they could continue their education under the Career and College Promise. SPCC would have to report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on (i) the project's implementation by February 15, 2016 and (ii) the project's impact on participating students by September 15, 2016 and annually through September 15, 2020. No State funds would be allowed to be used to develop and administer the competency examination or the impact of the pilot project on college readiness. Students electing to participate in the project would not be calculated in the LEA's graduation rate or dropout rates or in SPCC's performance funding metrics.
- 2. Authorization for high school students who are at high risk of dropping out of school to complete high school at SPCC. SPCC and each participating LEA must sign a memorandum of understanding (MOU) for a recovery program for students at high risk of dropping out to complete high school in an alternate setting and earn a high school diploma at SPCC. Participating students and their parents would sign a contract with the high school and SPCC agreeing to the terms and conditions of the program. SPCC would generate budget FTE for these students.

EFFECTIVE DATE: This act becomes effective July 1, 2015.





SUMMARY: House Bill 756 would establish a program of Financial Literacy and Life Skills instruction to be offered by the community college.

CURRENT LAW: House Bill 756 enacts Article 6B establishing a Financial Literacy and Life Skills course at the community college level.

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 756 creates a Financial Literacy and Life Skills Instruction Program to be established as a statewide community college curriculum. The program must be implemented through the State Board of Community Colleges (SBCC) Office at community colleges that choose to provide the program. The bill would require a program coordinator that must facilitate training of instructors and be responsible for formatting the courses that may include seminars or visiting speakers about aspects of the program. The curriculum should include basic instruction on:


- Financial Literacy.
- Personal organization and time management.
- Interpersonal skills and effective communication.
- Decision making skills applicable to personal relationships and professional pathways.
- Conflict resolution and negotiation skills.
- Family life education.
- Civic literacy and Character education.

EFFECTIVE DATE: This act is effective when it becomes law.

BACKGROUND: The SBCC currently offers financial literacy courses through the Human Resource Development (HRD) program and Academic Related Courses (ACA), which promote personal development.

Financial literacy courses in the HRD program target the under/unemployed and focus on the real-life economic concepts that enable students to make better informed decisions in the workforce. Topics include basic economic financial literacy concepts and cover topics on positive self-concept, developing employability, personal development and career exploration.

ACA courses such as, *College Transfer Success*, offer information on topics, such as financial aid, strategic planning, critical thinking, and communication.

SUMMARY: House Bill 860 would waive the difference in cost between the out-of-state tuition rate and the amount of tuition assistance available from the Department of Defense for certain active duty members of the Armed Forces.

CURRENT LAW: Under current law, any active duty member of the Armed Forces who qualifies for admission to the UNC system or a community college, but does not qualify as a resident for in-state tuition purposes, is eligible to be charged in-State tuition while stationed in North Carolina. If the member is reassigned outside of the State, the member continues to be eligible for in-State tuition as long as the member is continuously enrolled in the degree or other program in which the member was enrolled at the time the member is reassigned.

BILL ANALYSIS: House Bill 860 would change the statute governing tuition of Armed Forces personnel and their dependents. House Bill 860 would provide that if the amount of the out-of-state tuition rate for a community college exceeds the amount of federal tuition assistance available from the federal government for active duty members of the Armed Forces, the cost difference will be waived if all of the following conditions are met:

- 1. The active duty member of the Armed Forces (member) was enrolled in a degree or other program and receiving in-State tuition at the time of deployment or reassignment.
- 2. The member was not able to remain continuously enrolled in the degree or other program at the community college due to deployment or reassignment.
- 3. The member reenrolls in the same degree or other program at the community college in which the member was enrolled at the time the member was deployed or reassigned within 18 months of deployment or reassignment.
- 4. The member does not otherwise qualify for the in-State tuition rate.

House Bill 860 would also provide that the amount of tuition charged to an active duty member of the Armed Forces eligible to receive this waiver must not be lower than the in-State tuition rate.

EFFECTIVE DATE: This act becomes effective July 1, 2015.

BACKGROUND: Currently, the Department of Defense tuition assistance pays up to \$250 per credit hour. The current out-of-state tuition cost per credit hour at the community college is \$264.

The active duty member of the Armed Forces was not able to remain (2) continuously enrolled in the degree or other program at the community college due to deployment or reassignment.

The active duty member of the Armed Forces re-enrolls in the degree or (3) other program at the community college in which the member was enrolled at the time the member was deployed or reassigned within 18 months of deployment or reassignment.

The active duty member of the Armed Forces does not otherwise qualify for (4) the in-State tuition rate.

The amount of tuition charged to an active duty member of the Armed Forces eligible to receive this waiver shall not be lower than the in-State tuition rate."

SECTION 2. This act becomes effective July 1, 2015.


After the discussion, Representative Waddell moved for a favorable report for SB 112. The motion passed.

BILL ANALYSIS: Senate Bill 112 would urge all of the community colleges that serve the coastal area of the State to offer classes in commercial fishing and aquaculture. The bill would direct the North Carolina Community Colleges System Office to provide technical assistance to these community colleges to offer courses on commercial fishing and aquaculture and directs the Office to report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on any fiscal and administrative issues that limit the colleges' ability to offer such courses.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Senate Bill 112 would be effective when it becomes law.

Whereas, the associate's degree program includes advanced instruction in issues related to aquaculture, such as water quality, genetics, breeding, nutrition, and diseases; and

Whereas, some of these classes can be transferred to four-year marine biology programs; and

Whereas, Brunswick Community College offers (i) an aquaculture program, focusing on freshwater aquaculture and (ii) other classes via distance learning through a cooperative arrangement with Carteret Community College; and

Whereas, community college classes in commercial fishing and aquaculture are not uniformly available in the coastal area of the State; Now, therefore, The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. The General Assembly urges all community colleges serving the coastal area of the State to offer classes on commercial fishing and aquaculture.

SECTION 2.(a) The North Carolina Community Colleges System Office shall provide technical assistance to these colleges on offering such classes.

SECTION 2.(b) The North Carolina Community Colleges System Office shall report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on any fiscal and administrative issues it identifies that limit colleges' ability to offer such courses.

MINUTES

The House Committee on Education-Community Colleges met on Tuesday, August 18, 2015 at 11:00 am in Room 643 of the Legislative Office Building. Representatives Brody, McNeill, Holley, Arp, B. Brown, Daughtry, Ford, Goodman, Martin, Robinson, Shepard, Tine, and Watford attended.

Representative Brody presided over the meeting and called it to order at 11:05 am. He introduced the Pages, the Sergeant at Arms, and NC Community College President, Dr. Scott Ralls, in attendance.

The bill considered was SB 561 entitled, CAREER AND COLLEGE READY GRADUATES sponsored by Senator Barefoot. SB 561 would require the State Board of Community Colleges to develop a program providing community college remediation to high school seniors beginning with the 2016-2017 school year. Representative Brody recognized Senator Barefoot to present the bill.

A motion was made by Representative B. Brown to place a PCS for SB 561 before the committee and the motion passed. The PCS would make the following changes:

- 1) Mandatory remedial courses would be optional for students enrolled in the Occupational Course of Study to receive high school diplomas, unless a parent specifically requested participation through the individualized education program (IEP) process.
- Remove requirements related to direct instruction remedial modules, and instead require the SBCC to approve curriculum used by high schools
- 3) Remove requirements on policies from partner community colleges, and instead require oversight and training by the SBCC.

Senator Barefoot discussed the bill and Rebecca Garland, Deputy State Superintendent for the Department of Public Instruction, was present and answered questions from committee members about the bill. After discussion on the bill, Representative B. Brown motioned for an unfavorable report to the original bill and a favorable report to the PCS. The motion passed.

There being no further business, Representative Brody once again recognized Dr. Ralls and he was applauded for his many years of service to the Community College system. Dr. Ralls gave a brief farewell speech and thanked his colleagues in the community college system, public school system, and university system for their support over the years. Representative Brody adjourned the meeting at 11:33 am.

SUMMARY: SB 561 would require the State Board of Community Colleges (SBCC) to develop a program providing community college remediation to high school seniors beginning with the 2016-2017 school year.

The Proposed Committee Substitute (PCS) for SB 561 would make the following changes:

- Mandatory remedial courses required as part of this PCS would be optional for students enrolled in the Occupational Course of Study to receive high school diplomas, unless a parent specifically requested participation through the individualized education program (IEP) process.
- Remove requirements related to direct instruction remedial modules, and instead require the SBCC to approve curriculum used by high schools.
- Remove requirements on policies from partner community colleges, and instead require oversight and training by the SBCC.

BILL ANALYSIS: The PCS for SB 561 would require the SBCC, in consultation with the State Board of Education (SBE), to develop a program of community college developmental courses in (1) mathematics and (2) reading and English in the high school senior year through cooperation with community college partners. Students enrolled in the Occupational Course of Study would be allowed to opt out of the program for mandatory remedial courses as provided in this PCS, or participate upon specific parent request through the individualized education program (IEP) process. The program would be required to include:

- (1) Measures established by the SBCC to determine student readiness and preparation for college coursework by using ACT scores, student grade point averages, or other measures used by the SBCC to determine college readiness for entering students.
- (2) Changes in curriculum, policy, and rules needed by the SBCC and SBE to make remedial courses mandatory for students who do not meet readiness indicators by their junior year. The changes would be required to include flexibility for students to fulfill senior mathematics and English graduation requirements through enrollment in mandatory remedial courses or to enroll in those courses as electives.
- (3) Use of the curriculum approved by the SBCC, in cooperation with the SBE, by high schools.
- (4) Determinations by the SBCC on the appropriate measures of successful completion of the remedial courses and length of time following high school graduation in which a student who successfully completed remediation would not be required to enroll in developmental courses at a North Carolina community college.
- (5) Delivery of college remediation instruction by high schools consistent with policies established by the SBCC and SBE, including the following:

- a. High school faculty teaching courses must successfully complete SBCC established training requirements.
- b. Oversight would be provided by the NC Community College System to ensure appropriate instructional delivery of remedial courses.


