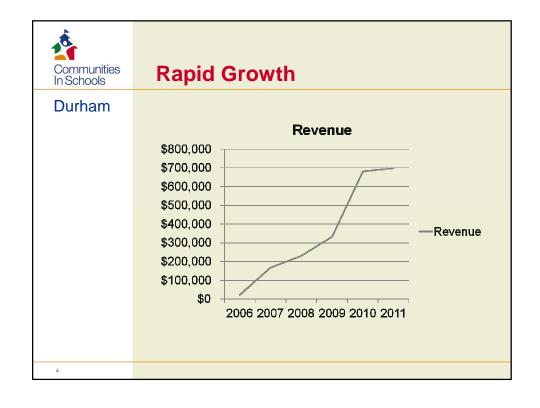

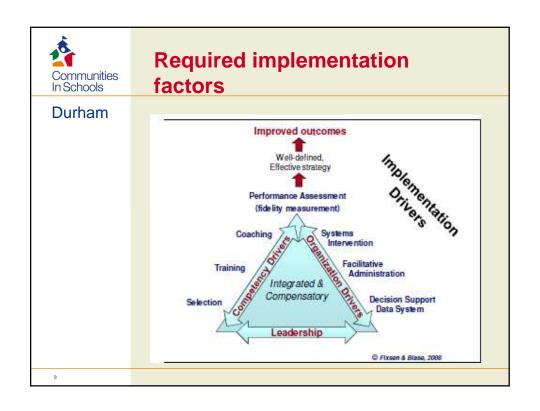


Communities In Schools	An admission
Durham	 Inside the mind of an admitted "Evidence-based fundamentalist" Hopeful skeptic "You are probably wasting your time" "Do your homework!" "Amateurs are everywhere"

Communities In Schools	Define Evidence-Based
Durham	 Gold standard – randomized control trial and replicated by others
	Research evidence does not fall simply into "evidence-based" and "non-evidence-based" classes, but can be anywhere on a continuum

Communities In Schools	Dropout Logic Model
Durham	 Factors leading to dropout Individual Factors (adult responsibilities, attitudes and beliefs, anti-social behavior, trauma) Family Factors (family dynamics, attitudes about education, parent behaviors regarding education) School Factors (academic policies, school discipline, school environment) Peer and community influences (friends who are dropouts or delinquents)

Durham	 NIRN Framework on Implementation Drivers Role of intermediary organizations (eg Prevent Child Abuse North Carolina)

Communities In Schools	Effective implementation takes time
Durham	 Stages of Implementation Exploration Installation Initial Implementation Full Implementation Takes 2-4 years Fixsen, Naomi, Blasé, Friedman & Wallace, 2006 Later Stages Innovation (and drift!) Sustainability Not linear process; more iterative

Communities In Schools	Why IY for violence prevention?
Durham	 Emotional regulation and social competence are powerful predictors of school success Children with emotional and behavioral difficulties are at high risk for poor school readiness, underachievement, school drop out, delinquency, violence, Substance abuse

Communities In Schools	IY Goals
Durham	 Short Term Objectives To prevent and reduce aggression and behavior problems in young children. To promote social, emotional and academic competence in young children. Long Term Objectives To prevent delinquency, substance abuse and violence in adolescence

Communities In Schools	How achieve goals?
Durham	 Reduce conduct problems in children: Decrease negative behaviors and noncompliance with parents at home. Decrease peer aggression and disruptive behaviors in the classroom. Promote social, emotional, and academic competence in children: Increase children's social skills. Increase children's understanding of feelings. Increase children's conflict management skills and decrease negative attributions. Increase academic engagement, school readiness, and cooperation with teachers.

Communities In Schools	IY Skills
Durham	 Importance of parental attention and special time Learning academic, persistence, social and emotional coaching Setting predictable household rules, responsibilities and routines Clear and respectful limit setting Following through with logical and natural consequences Understanding the importance of monitoring children's whereabout

Durham	 Coping (vs. Mastery model) Video modeling/DVDs Role play practice & rehearsal Home assignments Group support
