

National Survey on Drug Use and Health 2011/12


Past Month Use



- ◆ The two most commonly used drugs by non-pregnant women have been alcohol and tobacco
- ◆ This same statement is true for pregnant women
- ◆ Among pregnant women in the United States, approximately 18% smoked cigarettes, 9.4% drank alcohol, and 5% used illicit drugs in the past month
- → Among pregnant women, approximately .2% used heroin, and .9% used pain relievers nonmedically in the past month

Prenatal care is one of the best places to identify and engage women in both prenatal care and treatment of substance use disorders.


Horizons' Mission

Horizons Model of Care




Locations and Services

- UNC Women's Hospital: OB/GYN care, individual outpatient treatment, case management
- Burlington: SAIOP, outpatient individual and group treatment, peer support services
- Raleigh: Outpatient individual and group treatment
- Chapel Hill: Outpatient and residential services, SACOT and SAIOP, individual and group treatment, peer support services

Locations and Services

- Since 1993, Horizons has helped over 4,700 women and their children
- In the past 5 years families receiving treatment have come from 37 of the 100 counties in North Carolina



Measuring Success: Women

- ➤ Volume and range of new admissions from North Carolina's 100 counties
- ➤ Number of women treated, number of treatment sessions, and hours provided in:
 - outpatient services
 - residential services
 - psychiatric services
 - OB/GYN services
- > Number of women:
 - receiving GEDs / achieving employment
 - testing drug-abstinent during treatment
 - closing Child Protective Services / child custody cases
 - improving parenting scale scores
 - securing post-treatment housing
 - graduating from our programs



- Full developmental assessments: Speech/Language, Physical and Occupational therapy, and Cognitive for children in childcare.
- All children receive a social-emotional assessment, including trauma and observational parent-child assessment.
- Evidence based social-emotional treatment for any child in need by full time licensed therapist.
- Measured improvements seen in parent-child relationship, socialemotional development, and trauma symptoms.




Space for Horizons

- → December 15, 2013 given 60 days to vacate space we had occupied since 2001
 - Moved early February 2014 into temporary space
 - For Horizons to continue services, need to purchase a 12,000 SF office condominium for program operations, treatment services, and child care facilities
 - Shelton Station, an approved mixed-use project in downtown Carrboro scheduled for completion in Summer / Fall 2015
 - Purchase price of \$3 million for 12,000 SF
 - Horizons will pay all property operating expenses

Space for Horizons

- →\$240,000 in donations to be applied to the purchase
- **→UNC** is highly supportive
- →1 Million dollar challenge grant
