

Consolidation & Simplification of Public Higher Education Grants



Problem




State-funded public higher education financial aid programs — Community College Grant, UNC Need-Based Grant, Education Lottery Scholarship — total close to \$180 million but were *too complicated*, *unpredictable*, *and confusing*.

- Different eligibility requirements
- Different calculations for determining aid
- Different funding sources
- Served slightly different but overlapping populations



Solution



Sec. 8A.2 of SL 2021-180 consolidated these grants into a single need-based financial aid program that is simpler, user friendly, and allows students and families to learn about options and eligibility earlier in the process

- Top legislative priority for SEAA and supported by the UNC System and the Community College System
- UNC System President and Community College System President jointly develop a formula and payment schedule that is consistent, transparent, and focused on student need



- Roll out for the 2023-2024 academic year
- Scholarship designed within existing grant funds with sector funding protected
- UNC and Community Colleges have agreed upon a consolidated payment schedule
- The budget also provided funds for **public awareness campaign** to inform students, families, and high schools about the simplified grant
- State-funded need-based aid is based on the student's Pell eligibility. In 2024-2025, the calculation for Pell will move from Expected Family Contribution (EFC) to a Student Aid Index (SAI) so some additional formula revisions will be necessary



Higher Ed Simplification

Base Guarantee

Students from families that report Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) under \$75,000 who have financial need (EFC under \$8,000) will be guaranteed to receive state and federal aid of at least \$2,800 (NCCCS) or \$5,000 (UNC).

Need-based Supplement

- Additional aid will be available for the lowest income students in both Systems.
- The need-based supplement will be based on need and cost of attendance.




North Carolina Community College System (NCCCS)







Consolidation & Simplification of Programs for Non-Public K-12 Students with Disabilities



Background










- The Disabilities Grant and the Education Savings Account programs both paid for tuition or other qualified expenses related to educating a child with a disability
- In 2020-21 70% of ESA program participants also received a Disabilities Grant
- Applying for and complying with regulations for three separate programs was stressful and confusing for families.



ESA: \$4.07 million for 906 students at \$4,500.00

Solution

The new **ESA+ program**, launched in 2022-23 school year, will help ease the burden for families and make more efficient use of state resources. **Total budget \$47.9M**.






ESA+ Program Design

- Each semester, SEAA disburses ESA+ funds for **tuition and fees**. For students in a home school, or for students with a partial award remaining after their schools are paid, ESA+ funds are deposited to an **electronic wallet**. Parents spend those funds for tutoring, educational therapies, curriculum, or technology.
- ESA+ allows SEAA greater oversight of payments to schools, provides flexibility to families without requiring them to pay out of pocket and wait to be reimbursed, and will also allow an increasing number of students to be served with greater efficiency.
- Students are awarded \$9,000 annually. Students with certain designated disabilities may be eligible to receive \$17,000 a year.




ESA+ Program Growth






ESA+ Program 2022-2023 school year
