State Water Infrastructure Authority

State Water Infrastructure Authority (SWIA)


- Established in 2013
- Nine members
- Staffed by the Division of Water Infrastructure
- Awards all funding for water/wastewater projects
- G.S. 159G-70

Set points-based priority system following statutory criteria

Approve Master Plan and consolidated application form

Hold two annual funding cycles (Fall and Spring)

Twenty-Year Capital Cost Needs

DWI: 2021-23 Budget Actions

\$2.3 billion for water infrastructure

- \$1.98 billion from American Rescue Plan Act funds
- \$345.9 million from General Fund
 - \$1.3 billion earmarked for special appropriations
 - \$907 million available for competitive grants







DWI: State Programs

State Wastewater and Drinking Water Reserve

- Provides grants and loans
- Merger/regionalization feasibility (MRF)
- Asset inventory and assessment (AIA)
- G.S. 159G-36(c)

\$10 m recurring appropriation Grant/loan max is \$3 m



DWI: State Programs

Study and Assessment Grants

- Funded from State Reserve appropriation
- Merger/regionalization feasibility (MRF)
 - Allows utilities to explore merge options
- Asset inventory and assessment (AIA)
 - Examine current infrastructure

MRF: \$50,000 max every three years

AIA: \$150,000 max every three years



Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF)

• Provides loans at ½ the market rate for up to 20 years

- Some principal forgiveness loans, 0% interest loans and reduced loans available
- Green Project Reserve

State Match: 20% - \$6 m R

Repaid loans add funding

Loan max: \$30 m



Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF)

• Provides loans at ½ the market rate for up to 20 years

• 30-year, targeted interest rate loans possible

• Some principal forgiveness loans, 0% interest loans and reduced loans available

State Match: 20% - \$7 m R

Repaid loans add funding

Loan max: \$20 m



Community Development Block Grant (CDBG-I)

- Grants
- Water and sewer
- Low to moderate income areas
- Allocated in Annual Appropriations Act

Federally funded - \$20 m

Grant max: \$2 m



Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)

Provides an additional \$1.2 billion available through the State Revolving Funds over five years (starting in FY 2022-23)

Includes:

- \$447 million for lead pipe replacement
- \$119 million to address emerging contaminants in drinking water systems
- \$119 million for small and/or underserved communities





DWI: General Fund Authorized Budget




