






# DAC Prison: Average Daily Cost by Custody Level



#### DAC Prison: Population







  - Impacting 28 facilities



# DAC Prisons: Statewide Misdemeanant Confinement Program (SMCP)

**SMCP houses misdemeanants** who receive a sentence greater than 90 days, and all offenders convicted of DWI **in local jails** 

- All counties participate in SMCP as "sending" counties
- County jails with available space that house offenders from neighboring counties are "receiving counties"
- Counties are reimbursed by the SMCP fund



**Parole-** Discretionary early release from prison which includes community supervision



# DAC Community Supervision: General Supervision

- Nearly 1,600+ Probation and Parole Officers across the State supervise 70k + offenders
  - Place offenders into appropriate supervision levels through comprehensive risk and needs assessment
  - Counsel offenders
  - Make decisions regarding treatment for offenders
  - Respond to offender behavior and non-compliance

## DAC Community Supervision: General Supervision Authority

 Under JRA court can revoke probation for committing additional criminal offenses or absconding Revocations to Prison FY 2021-22 10,601

- Court may impose a period of "confinement in response to violation" (CRV)
- Delegated authority allows PPOs to impose certain additional requirements without court involvement

  - Assign offender to PPO
- Community service tracking and enforcement
  - Supervised ≈ 7,500
  - Unsupervised ≈ 6,000






### DAC Health Services; Cost Increases

### Numerous factors contribute to high correctional healthcare costs

- Offenders with a care deficit and with untreated pre-existing conditions
- Inmates seek health services resources for secondary gain
- More likely to have communicable diseases such as HIV/AIDS, hepatitis, and tuberculosis
- Mental health and substance abuse are more common among offender population
- Aging population



### DAC Rehab & Reentry: Tablets



Academic Programs	These programs prepare incarcerated offenders: to read, write and compute; pass the GED test; and acquire survival skills.	820
Vocational Programs	Programs such as computer literacy, food service training, electrical engineering technology, masonry and job readiness through local community colleges. Programs help incarcerated offenders obtain work with Correction Enterprises or work release assignments.	1,467
Life Skills Programs	Provide parenting skills and Cognitive Behavioral Intervention (CBI) to "restructure" thought processes and learn "cognitive skills" for basic decision-making and problem-solving to change behavior and actions reducing criminal conduct.	2,151



### DAC Rehab & Reentry: Treatment for Effective Community Supervision Programs (TECSP)

- Treatment for Effective Community Supervision Program (TECSP) was created under the Justice Reinvestment Act
- Series of contracts for community-based services focusing on evidence-based practices aimed at reducing recidivism
- 3 Core programs
  - Recidivism Reduction Services (RRS)
  - Transitional/Temporary Housing (TH)
  - Local Reentry Councils (LRC)

### DAC Rehab & Reentry: TECSP Recidivism Reduction Services (RRS)

- Recidivism Reduction Services (RRS) largest community program under TECSP umbrella (limited by offender risk)
- Offers cognitive behavioral intervention, substance abuse services (outpatient → aftercare/recovery) & support services
- Performance based contracts
  - Total Contracts Value: \$17.8 M
  - Total Expenditures FY 2021-22 \$6.6M



# DAC Rehab & Reentry: TECSP Local Reentry Councils (LRC)

**LRCs** are networks of individuals and agencies providing supervision and coordination of innovative responses to the reintegration of formally incarcerated offenders

- 17 LRCs statewide-15 single county 2 multi-county
  - Contract based between DAC Reentry and a Local Intermediary Agency (IA): Community Colleges, Local Organization, Law Enforcement
  - > \$2.7M total contract cost
    - Cost/LRC: \$150k single \$225 for multi county
  - Offenders can be referred from any county and served, but areas of the state are not supported by a catchment

- The Department of Adult Correction is a new cabinet agency
- 2. Responsible for supervising more than 100 k offenders
- 3. 50% of the JPS budget and 60% of the FTE
- 4. Operating prisons most costly and labor intensive, but community supervision supervises twice the number of offenders with fewer personnel and resources
- Moving forward, the Department is placing greater emphasis on rehabilitation and reentry programming for all offenders
