HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES Wednesday, January 14, 2015

This day, in accordance with the Constitution of the State of North Carolina and G.S. 120-11.1, which fixes the date for the meeting of the General Assembly of North Carolina, the Members of the House of Representatives assemble in the House Chamber of the State Legislative Building in the City of Raleigh at 9:00 a.m. and are called to order by the Honorable Denise G. Weeks, Principal Clerk of the 2013 House of Representatives.

On motion of the Chair, the House recesses at 9:01 a.m., to reconvene at 9:30 a.m.

RECESS

The House reconvenes pursuant to recess and is called to order by the Principal Clerk.

The following remarks and prayer are offered by Representative John A. Torbett:

"The year is 1774 and Representatives from each of the 13 States are meeting in Philadelphia to iron out political differences that threatened to destroy the new nation. The arguments intensified until one man stood and spoke these words. That man was Benjamin Franklin.

'I have lived, sir, a long time, and the longer I live, the more convincing proofs I see of this truth - that God governs in the affairs of men. And if a sparrow cannot fall to the ground without His notice, is it probable that an empire can rise without His aid? ... I therefore beg leave to move that henceforth prayers imploring the assistance of Heaven, and its blessing on our deliberations, be held in this Assembly every morning before we proceed to business...'

"O Lord our Heavenly Father, high and mighty King of kings, and Lord of lords, who dost from thy throne behold all the dwellers on earth and reignest with power supreme and uncontrolled over all the Kingdoms, Empires and Governments; look down in mercy, we beseech Thee, on these our American States, who have fled to Thee from the rod of the oppressor and thrown themselves on Thy gracious protection, desiring to be henceforth dependent only on Thee. To Thee have they appealed for the righteousness of their cause; to Thee do they now look up for that countenance and support, which Thou alone canst give. Take them, therefore, Heavenly Father, under Thy nurturing care; give them wisdom in Council and valor in the field; defeat the malicious designs of our cruel adversaries; convince them of the unrighteousness of their Cause and if they persist in their sanguinary purposes, of own unerring justice, sounding in their hearts, constrain them to drop the weapons of war from their unnerved hands in the day of battle!

"Be Thou present, O God of wisdom, and direct the councils of this honorable assembly; enable them to settle things on the best and surest foundation. That the scene of blood may be speedily closed; that order, harmony and peace may be effectually restored, and truth and justice, religion and piety, prevail and flourish amongst the people. Preserve the health of their bodies and vigor of their minds; shower down on them and the millions they here represent, such temporal blessings as Thou seest expedient for them in this world and crown them with everlasting glory in the world to come. All this we ask in the name and through the merits of Jesus Christ, Thy Son and Our Savior. Amen."

Richardson of Troutman, and Mayor Joyce Rogers of Harmony on January 5, 2015; Representative Cecil Brockman by the Honorable Elaine F. Marshall, North Carolina Secretary of State on January 7, 2015; Representative Brian Turner by Chairman David Gantt of Buncombe County Board of Commissioners on January 8, 2015; Representative Gale Adcock by Justice Robin E. Hudson, Associate Justice of the North Carolina Supreme Court on January 9, 2015; Representative Larry D. Hall by retired Superior Court Judge G.K. Butterfield, Jr. on January 9, 2015; Representative Shelly Willingham by the Honorable Quentin T. Sumner, Senior Resident Superior Court Judge, District 7A on January 10, 2015; Representative Phil Shepard by Representative Tim Moore, House of Representatives on January 12, 2015; and Representative Edgar V. Starnes by Representative Tim Moore, House of Representatives on January 13, 2015.

ELECTION OF SPEAKER

The Principal Clerk announces that the first order of business is the election of a Speaker and explains the voting procedure to be used in the absence of adopted rules. The Clerk declares that nominations are in order.

The Chair recognizes Representative Daughtry who places the name of Representative Tim Moore as the Republican nominee for the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

"Thank you, Madam Clerk, former Speaker Tillis, now U.S. Senator Tillis, Members of the Supreme Court, special guests, and fellow Members:

"It is a pleasure and a great honor, in just a few moments, to place into nomination, as our next Speaker of the House for this coming biennium, the Honorable Tim K. Moore.

"But before I do, I would first like to speak to those Members who may have aspirations of being Speaker in the next biennium. If Tim Moore is running, I would suggest that you not put your name in the ring. He is hard to beat. I know from experience.

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"Most of you do not know this but Tim Moore will not be the first Representative Moore to serve as Speaker of the House. In 1870, W. A. Moore of Chowan County, also a good Republican, served as Speaker. For those of you wondering - no, I was not there during that Session. But I have served under 5 different Speakers and I think I know a little something about what it takes to make a successful Speaker.

"First, a good Speaker must <u>have a clear understanding</u> of the importance of public education, K-12 as well as our community colleges and our university system. Tim is a product of public education. He graduated from Kings Mountain High School and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He also served as a member of the University Board of Governors from 1997 to 2001, giving him additional insights into our public education system. He therefore realizes that education is the great equalizer and that anyone in this state, no matter where that person lives, if willing to apply him or herself, ought to be able to get an education and be successful. Tim is committed to our public education system.

"Second, a good Speaker <u>must appreciate</u> our third branch of government, the judiciary. As a practicing attorney in Cleveland County since 1997, he has seen first-hand the importance of the rule of law. When we suffered the disaster at the Boston Marathon, we stood with Boston. Today, we stand with the people of France. We are Charlie. He wants to ensure that the laws we pass are enforced without impartiality or favoritism and further he is ready to help bring our court system into the 21st Century.

"Third, a good Speaker must provide leadership so our State can continue to emerge from the crisis of the Great Recession, which occurred a few years ago. In addition to being a practicing attorney, Tim is small businessman and he has seen first-hand how our State must continue down the road of being competitive with our neighboring states, and putting a welcome mat out for new industry looking for a place to call home. He wants everyone to have a job, be secure in that job, and successful financially. What greater legacy could a Speaker have than to be a job creator?

"Fourth, a good Speaker must be a good parent because every parent wants, in the long run, to see that their children are left a better state than we have now. Tim has two fine young sons, McRae and Wilson, and I am sure he will introduce them to you later. Because of them, he will take the long view of making sure that we make decisions now that will impact our State for years to come - whether that involves farmers, rural area, or distressed counties. Make no mistake; Tim is up for the job. When we elect Tim, all ranks in North Carolina will be proud and thank us, both Democrats, Republicans, and Independents. He can get along with people.

He knows how to find the common ground with the Senate or the Governor. But most importantly, he is ready to work with all of us for the betterment of our State. He will do an outstanding job and there is a lot to be done. This is the 'People's House' and Tim is ready to lead.

"Madam Clerk, my fellow Members, I proudly place into nomination for the Speaker of the North Carolina House, my friend, the gentleman from Cleveland, the Honorable Tim K. Moore."

The nomination is seconded by Representative Dollar.

"Members, honored guests, family and friends, you know one way to tell if a person is a native North Carolinian is to ask them a question, "where are you from?" If they answer with the name of their home county, they are a native North Carolinian. In this Chamber, the recognition to speak begins with the calling the county name of the member who wishes recognition.

"Representative Tim Moore is a true son of his native Cleveland County. Tim's best day is walking atop King's Mountain with his two boys, McRae and Wilson, soaking up the sun, soaking up the moment, and soaking up the history.

"And as you recall from our history, some 235 years ago, North Carolinians won an unexpected and pivotal victory defeating a British-led Tory Army at the top of King's Mountain. The Continental Army and the militia had experienced a crushing defeat at Camden and our State lay open for invasion. Lord Cornwallis advanced to Charlotte and with a strong flanking column of Tories on his left, led by Major Patrick Ferguson, the British were determined to pacify the western counties of our State, threatening to put the countryside to 'fire and sword'. As Representative West will attest, that was a bad idea. Answering the call to serve, frontiersmen, hunters, farmers, tradesmen led by such back-country 'colonials' with names that we honor today - leaders like, Joseph McDowell, Joseph Winston, Isaac Shelby, and Benjamin Cleveland. Nine hundred Patriots strong, they surrounded and repeatedly stormed up King's Mountain, eventually winning the high ground and taking the battle. Having lost the left wing of his army, Cornwallis was forced to retire back to South Carolina. The western piedmont mountains of North Carolina and beyond were secure from invasion and a young nation cheered a muchneeded victory. These were ordinary people willing to work together, to sacrifice, to serve a cause greater than their own.

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"The character and value of those Patriots lives on today. They have shaped and inspired leaders like Tim Moore, with that same willingness to serve, the courage to fight for what is right and the determination to stand firm for what is best for all North Carolinians. He will do this as he helps lead this great State to an even brighter and more prosperous future.

"Madame Speaker, Timothy K. Moore will honorably serve as our Speaker, exhibiting the best qualities of leadership and service. I second the nomination of the gentleman from Cleveland County."

Representative Lewis moves that the nominations be closed and that Representative T. Moore be elected by acclamation. In compliance with Article VI, Section 5 of the North Carolina Constitution, the election is confirmed by vote of the Members and Representative T. Moore is elected Speaker of the 2015 House of Representatives by acclamation.

The Speaker, escorted to the Chair by Representatives Daughtry, Dollar, Cotham, Bumgardner, Hastings, Torbett, B. Brown, McElraft, Hager, and L. Hall, takes and subscribes to the following oath of office administered by Associate Justice Paul Newby, North Carolina Supreme Court.

OATH FOR SPEAKER OF THE 2015 HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

"I, TIM MOORE, do solemnly and sincerely swear that I will support the Constitution of the United States; that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to the State of North Carolina, and to the constitutional powers and authorities which are or may be established for the government thereof; and that I will endeavor to support, maintain and defend the Constitution of said State, not inconsistent with the Constitution of the United States, to the best of my knowledge and ability; so help me, God.

"I, TIM MOORE, do swear (or affirm) that I will well and truly execute the duties of the office of Speaker of the North Carolina House of Representatives according to the best of my skill and ability, according to law; so help me, God."

The Speaker, Mr. Tim Moore, approaches the dais and makes the following remarks.

"Please, have a seat. Well, Good morning! I have had the honor of standing here before, but it is a little different today. This time, Senator Tillis actually did not pull out the little step stool for me to step on - he normally likes to do that for me.

"Distinguished Justices of the Supreme Court, Members of the Court of Appeals, thank you all for being here. Members of the House, Cabinet Secretaries, other distinguished visitors, thank you for being here with us today on this great day.

"I want to, first of all, congratulate my colleagues here in the House, upon your reelection. Whether it is your first term or your tenth term, it is always an honor to be here. And those of us who run and serve have this job to do but the only way we can do it is because our families, our friends, and our supporters let us do it. I would ask my fellow Members of the House to please rise and thank our family members who stand by us and allow us to do this. In that same sense, and with a spirit of gratitude, I do want to thank my family who are here today. I have numerous relatives who have traveled across the state to be here and friends from outside the State. It means a lot for you all to be here. Most of my family is down front here and, of course, my two sons who were up here helping me a bit ago. I love you all and appreciate the support you give and I can't thank you enough for your support and the opportunity to serve.

"Let me tell you a little about myself. My good friend Nelson Dollar stole the history lesson about Kings Mountain, and we were trying to find a witness to the battle of Kings Mountain, but George Cleveland was not willing to come up here and talk to us today. If you think about the history of our State, we have so much to thankful for. We live in the absolute best State in the Nation. If you go back to the Revolutionary War and the freedoms that were fought for, and the freedom that we have today, to sit in this very Chamber, and the pass the laws and do the things we do, we have so much that we owe our predecessors.

"I grew up in Kings Mountain. I practiced law in a small town. I have two young boys who are growing up into young men, the oldest one is now in driver's education. I think we need to file a bill to raise the driving age. Maybe, I don't know; that might be something we need to do.

"Growing up in North Carolina in a small town, I have learned the value of hard work. I have learned the value of giving back, and have had the opportunity to serve in this House Seat since 2002. I remember the first time I sat in here and being sworn in. My oldest was two years old and the youngest one was just a baby. Now here we are with them 14 and 12 and have these many years later, being in the House.

"One thing I can tell you is that this is a great institution. It's a great institution not because of the building where we are but because of the people who are here; those of you who are serving and those who served

before, like my good friend Jack Hunt. Jack, thank you for being here with us today. Former Speaker Pro Tem and Rules Chairman, you did a wonderful job for Cleveland County and you honor us with being here again today. Thank you very much.

"It is an interest in public service, I think, that drives every single Member who is here. An interest in public service aside from party labels, ideology, and anything else. We all bring different backgrounds. We all have different views of how we see the world. But at the end of the day, we all come together, in this very room, to reach solutions to try move North Carolina forward. I remember two examples when we were in the minority that I can think of. We worked on legislation to strengthen the laws with child predators - the Jessica Lunsford Act. A number of you who were here worked with me on that bill. That bill is now in effect and we now have one of the toughest laws in the State on predators. We passed legislation to increase the penalties on repeat drunk drivers. We have done a lot of things that were nonpartisan or bipartisan and I would like to see us continue to do those kinds of efforts as we move forward.

"We have a lot of challenges facing this State. The last few years we have dealt with a lot of issues. We have dealt with unemployment. We have dealt with economic development, trying to improve the way we do road funding and infrastructure. But there is still more work to be done. There are great ideas on the problems facing North Carolina from both sides of the aisle. The answers are never Republican or Democrat. They are North Carolina answers, North Carolina solutions. I pledge that we work to see that we arrive at those. All of us have a desire to improve our communities back home and state-wide. It is those efforts, it's those interests, that make it worth being here. I thank every one of you for taking the time away from families, from your careers, to come up here and give up your time to serve in the House. I think a lot of time folks don't realize the time it takes. Of course those of you who have served here know - the new folks here - you are about to find out. So, it does take quite a bit of time.

"I wanted to touch on a couple of ideas that I thought we should address in this upcoming Session. One is an initiative to work with publicprivate partnerships, with groups like the YMCA, Boys and Girls Club of North Carolina, Big Brothers and Big Sisters to help address issues with after school care. You know a lot of youth, sometimes it is that period between the end of school and when a parent or some other caretaker gets home that a lot of good things can happen or a lot of bad things can happen. I think that is an issue that this year we ought to work on. That is

something I think that we can work together - both parties can - and that folks will come behind. I am going to task our education committee with working on that; finding those solutions and coming up with a good plan moving forward to address those matters.

"I also want to recognize the fact that North Carolina is great in large part - in major part, frankly - to the sacrifice by those who have served our country and the military. We are one of the most military friendly states in the nation. We have a lot to be thankful for. I ask that those who are either still serving in the military or who have served in the military to please rise so we can appropriately thank you for your service; those Members and non-Members would you please rise. I would also like to extend that same recognition to any law enforcement officers, firefighters, or first responders who also serve. If you all would please rise so we can welcome and thank you, as well.

"Members, we have a special guest with us today. I saw Sergeant Reid Ellington rise and I would like to take a moment to tell you about a special guest we have today. We would like to welcome Cooper Ellington who is seated here in the back of the Chamber along with his parents Sergeant Reid Ellington and Stephanie Ellington; if you all would please stand. Cooper is an honor roll student in 9th grade at Union Pines High School in Moore County. Representative Boles is their Representative. For the last three and a half years, Cooper has courageously battled DHL Syndrome. Cooper, I want you to know that the North Carolina House is proud to have here, you honor us with your presence and you are in our prayers. We wish you the best and hope one day you will be serving with us. Thank you again for being here and for your courageous fight.

"You know, a lot of what we do, in fact most of what we do, is about the future. If we pass a law here, it has an effect but it is down the road. The major policy changes we effect are long-term. They are the things that affect our children and grandchildren and beyond. I think it is important that we remember that in everything we do.

"The challenges, going forward, that we also have...I mentioned a couple of initiatives. We probably need to make priority number one jobs in this State. What can we do to retain the industries, companies, the businesses we have, and to recruit new ones? I pledge to you, as your Speaker, I will do all I can, in this body to make sure we pass policies and laws that do just that - bring jobs to this State, that we keep taxes low, that we invest in infrastructure, and that we continue to move North Carolina forward.

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"You know, there are a lot of issues that will come that frankly none of us are thinking of right now. I am sure when they do, we will deal with those the way we have. We will confront them directly; we will deal with one another candidly; and we will try to reach the best solution we can in those ways. At the end of the day, we need to listen to our constituents and make sure that we are, in fact, putting them first. Something Speaker Tillis always said that I thought was always very appropriate was, 'vote your conscience; vote your constituents; and then vote with your caucus; vote in that order.' Always put your principals above anything else, then your folks back home, then your caucus at that point. I think that if we all try to adhere to that, it will help the Session and help us all be even better Members.

"Our work is set out before us. We will work together collegially. Every now and then we will disagree but not as much as we think. When you see the media, you would think that we are up here fighting and arguing all the time. That in fact, is not the case. I would say, probably 85 percent of the time we are generally in agreement. It is that 15 percent that gets talked about a little more. The key is that when we get those 15 percent of the times, when we disagree between or within the parties, or who knows what, that we do so respectful with one another. I pledge as your Speaker, to do that.

"I am looking very forward to serving as your Speaker in this biennium. I am looking forward to working with each and every Member of this House. I want you to know that I consider this the highest honor for this job and I will give everything I can every day to make sure that we do it.

"Thank you. God Bless you, and God Bless this Great State of North Carolina."

The Speaker assumes the duties of the Chair.

ADOPTION OF TEMPORARY RULES

Representative Lewis is recognized and states that he has placed a resolution with the Clerk for consideration by the Body.

The Speaker directs the Clerk to number the resolution and places **H.R. 1**, A HOUSE RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE TEMPORARY RULES OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES FOR THE 2015 REGULAR SESSION, before the Body.

The resolution is adopted, by electronic vote (119-0), and ordered printed.

ELECTION OF SPEAKER PRO TEMPORE

The Speaker states that nominations are in order for Speaker Pro Tempore.

The Chair recognizes Representative Faircloth who places in nomination the name of Representative Stam as the Republican nominee for Speaker Pro Tempore.

"Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, honored guests, ladies and gentlemen, today it is indeed my high honor and distinct privilege to bring to this Legislative Body and place in nomination the name of the gentleman from Wake County, the Honorable Paul Stam, for the Office of Speaker Pro Tempore of the North Carolina House.

"For those of us who have been here awhile, no introduction of Paul Stam is necessary. We know the gentleman, and we know of his love for and his dedication and many contributions to this institution and to the State of North Carolina. But for those of you who are newly arrived Members amongst us, or who are visiting the 'People's House' today, let me make a few points.

"If public service is a desired quality, Paul Stam has met that test throughout his adult life. A U.S. Marine serving his country, a Sunday school teacher serving his church, a practiced and distinguished attorney serving his profession and his community, and a local and state leader serving his Party are just a few examples. With respect to this House, Representative Stam is in his eighth term and has served as Minority and Majority Leader, and, most recently, as Speaker Pro Tem.

"Skip Stam is personally responsible for the successful transformation of many in this Chamber from being active and interested citizen-candidates to becoming dedicated and effective legislators. His availability to offer advice, his willingness to collaborate on bill development, his careful deliberation and honesty in his critique, and his stress for cooperation within the Caucus and across the aisle, has consistently resulted in quality legislation in the best interests of those we serve. Skip is a teacher and a mentor, and I personally thank him for that. I echo and agree with the thoughts of Representative Nelson Dollar when he said that Paul Stam is 'a man of unshakable character'. After a difficult legislative battle, when rhetoric can often become heated. Skip Stam is as quick to offer a smile and a handshake to his adversaries as he is to his allies. He serves as an example in our democratic process; that you can fight passionately for deeply held beliefs and when the battle is over, win or lose, hold no grudges or ill will for his opponents in a campaign, in court, or in this Chamber.

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"Representative Stam is not one to take on an assignment and do just enough to fulfill the job requirements. We can rest assured that if we see fit to elect him to this office, he will stand ready to assist our Speaker and to participate in the leadership activities necessary to support us all in our duties and responsibilities.

"He will personally be involved in promoting meaningful policy development and will personally be participating in the furtherance of legislation in keeping with his strong conservative principles and his deep Christian faith.

"I can think of a more well-qualified candidate, nor more concerned inclusive member of the leadership team of this 2015-2016 House than Paul Stam. For these reasons and more, I respectfully ask for the support of the Members of this House to elect him as our Speaker Pro Tem. Thank you."

Representative Hurley seconds the nomination.

"Ladies and gentlemen of the House, Mr. Speaker, and honored guests here this morning. I stand to second the nomination of Representative Paul Stam as Speaker Pro Tempore of the North Carolina House in this one hundred fifty-second convening of the General Assembly.

"Today Representative Stam will begin serving his eighth term as a Member of the House of Representatives. He is one of the most trusted and respected Members of this Body. And he will give you advice and answer your questions. He may not always agree with you but he respects you and will give you the truth. His integrity is beyond reproach. Contrary to what some of you may think, he did not write the Magna Carta. However, I am sure he can read it. He is the 'go to' person for anything pertaining to history. I am very honored to serve with him and I can say so much more. But I think you understand who he is and what he stands for. So I humbly ask you to join me in voting for Representative Paul Stam for Speaker Pro Tem of the North Carolina House of Representatives. I am proud to second the nomination."

Representative Lewis moves that the nominations be closed and that Representative Stam be elected by acclamation. In compliance with Article VI, Section 5 of the North Carolina Constitution, the election is confirmed by vote of the Members and Representative Stam is elected Speaker Pro Tempore of the 2015 House of Representatives by acclamation.

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The Speaker Pro Tempore, escorted to the Well of the House by Representatives Faircloth, Hurley, Jackson, Catlin, Gill, and Fraley, takes and subscribes to the following oath of office administered by Associate Justice Barbara Jackson, North Carolina Supreme Court.

OATH FOR SPEAKER PRO TEMPORE OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES 2015 SESSION

"I, PAUL STAM, do solemnly and sincerely swear that I will support the Constitution of the United States; that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to the State of North Carolina, and to the constitutional powers and authorities which are or may be established for the government thereof; and that I will endeavor to support, maintain and defend the Constitution of said State, not inconsistent with the Constitution of the United States, to the best of my knowledge and ability; so help me, God.

"I, PAUL STAM, do swear (or affirm) that I will well and truly execute the duties of the office of Speaker Pro Tempore of the North Carolina House of Representatives according to the best of my skill and ability, according to law; so help me, God."

Speaker Pro Tempore Stam makes the following remarks.

"Members, guests, Justices Edmunds, Newby and Jackson, I am especially pleased that former Speaker Pro Tem Jack Hunt is here today. He and I served together many years ago when I was young and he was distinguished.

"I accept your election. Two years ago on this occasion, I thanked my family and I used the examples of my eldest grandsons for some lessons on how we could do legislation better. But they are here today and I am not going to embarrass Aidan and Will.

"This is a time to be reminded of first principles.

"And 2015 is the 800th anniversary of Magna Carta. Members of the House would be shocked - shocked if I did not mention it and draft it into the service of the House.

"Magna Carta was a deal between the nobility and King John. He was in deep trouble and barely kept the crown and perhaps his life by making 63 campaign promises. In Section 25 he promised 'Every county shall remain at its ancient rent without increase.' Some issues never die. Tax increases and unfunded mandates were not invented last year.

"Litigation, then and now, requires years to complete. His campaign promise 40 provides "To no one will we sell, to no one deny or <u>delay</u>, right or justice.' Many of us are working now to realize that promise so that the resolution of criminal charges, at least, may require only months and not years.

"In a day when the principles of free trade and free enterprise are attacked from the right and the left King John's campaign promise number 41 provides - *and I should say this is all in Latin so this is translated for all of us* - 'All merchants may enter or leave England unharmed and without fear, by land or water, for purposes of trade, free from all illegal exactions in accordance with ancient and lawful customs.' Free trade and free enterprise have many friends - except when its friends think it damages their own pocketbooks. Eight hundred years ago the English realized that free trade and free enterprise are powerful engines of economic growth for the State as a whole.

"Environmental issues didn't just surface fifty years ago. Eight hundred years ago there were those advocating locking up of land from use by the public. Robin Hood and the Sheriff of Nottingham came to blows over this question. Robin Hood won when campaign promise number 47 provided 'All forests' - *remember he was exiled to the forests and he was in trouble for shooting the King's deer* - 'All forests that have been created in our reign shall at once be disafforested and a similar course shall be followed with regard to river banks.' I am not advocating today that we literally fulfill this campaign promise by eliminating the parks at Grandfather Mountain and places like that. I'm just saying this is not a new issue.

"Religious Liberty is always an issue. In <u>12</u>15 the first and last sections of Magna Carta protected the church from the government. In <u>20</u>15 when the Little Sisters of the Poor, a charitable order of nuns, is threatened with massive fines by the federal government, we need a restoration of religious freedom. When we next reconvene on January 28 there will be a legislative briefing on that subject, open to all.

"Magna Carta even addresses separation of powers. And I am glad Senator Tillis is here today because he may get an idea here from promise number 61. North Carolina was perhaps the first state to place that principle of separation of powers in its constitution, on instruction from the inhabitants, Representative Insko, of Orange County to the Provincial Assembly in 1776: But what is the remedy for usurpation of power by an executive like King John? Is it lawsuits? Magna Carta suggested a unique consequence. This requires not only a translation from Latin to English but a paraphrase so that you may enjoy it. Senator Tillis, take note.

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"King John made campaign promise number 61: 'If we, or our Attorney General, offend in any respect against any man and offense is made known to the Senate (that is the 25 chosen barons) they shall come to us or to the Attorney General - to declare it and claim immediate redress. If we, or the Attorney General, make no redress within 40 days - 40 days - the Senate may then distrain upon and assail us in every way possible, with the support of the whole community of the land, by seizing our castles, our lands, our possessions, and anything else, except only our own person and that of the First Lady and our children, until they have secured such redress as they have determined upon. And having secured that redress the Senate may then resume its normal obedience to us.' That would really turn things around in Washington.

"Let us enjoy the Session as we address new challenges, new technology, new demographics, and the ideas of new Representatives. But old principles will often suggest the way forward.

"Thank you very much for your election."

ELECTION OF PRINCIPAL CLERK

The Speaker announces that nominations are in order for Principal Clerk of the House of Representatives.

Representative Howard places the name of Denise G. Weeks of Wake County in nomination for Principal Clerk.

"Mr. Speaker, Members of the House, distinguished guests and visitors:

"At this time I rise to nominate Ms. Denise Gale Weeks for the Office of House Principal Clerk.

"As change is ever present, it is good that some things remain steady and constant.

"Over twenty-two years, Ms. Weeks has served alongside the 400 men and women and the seven Speakers who came before us.

"Only a very few of us legislators have ever known another Principal Clerk.

"Ms. Weeks' excellence and ability has made her an institution in our Honorable Assembly and a strong pillar in our House.

"Through our most chaotic proceedings over the past two decades, Ms. Weeks has made sure our calendars print, the session bell rings, and our votes are counted.

"Her knowledge, composure, and integrity have earned the respect of this Body and extensive national praise from her peers.

"It is my honor to nominate Ms. Denise Gale Weeks for the Office of House Principal Clerk. Her dedication, professionalism, and efficiency in managing the Clerk's office make her highly qualified to continue serving as our Principal Clerk."

JOINT SESSION

Pursuant to resolution heretofore adopted and exchange of messages, the Sergeant-at-Arms announces the arrival of the Senate at the door of the House. The Speaker directs the admittance and seating of that Honorable Body. The President of the Senate, the Honorable Dan Forest, is seated to the right of the Speaker.

The Sergeant-at-Arms is recognized and he announces the approach of the Chief Justice, the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, the Chief Judge, and the Judges of the Court of Appeals who are seated in a body for the Joint Session.

The Sergeant-at-Arms is recognized and he announces the approach of the members of the Council of State and the members of the Governor's Cabinet who are seated in a body for the Joint Session.

The Speaker of the House relinquishes the gavel to the President of the Senate, Lieutenant Governor Forest. The Joint Session is called to order by the President.

The Sergeant-at-Arms of the House announces the approach of the Governor. His Excellency enters, escorted by Senator Brown, Chair; Senators Rucho, Tillman, Harrington, Blue, Van Duyn; and Representative Daughtry, Chair, Representatives Hager, L. Hall, McElraft, Michaux, Schaffer, and Setzer.

The President recognizes Representative Daughtry, who presents his Excellency, Pat McCrory, Governor of North Carolina, to the Joint Assembly.

STATE OF THE STATE ADDRESS

"Mr. Speaker, Lt. Governor, Mr. President Pro Tempore, Members of the Court, Members of the General Assembly, Members of the Council of State, and my Cabinet, and to the people of the great State of North Carolina:

"Two years ago, just before arriving to deliver the State of the State address, I received a phone call informing me that Highway Patrol Trooper Michael Potts was fighting for his life. You see, during a routine traffic stop on Highway 70, Trooper Potts was shot four times. He was shot in his hands, shoulder, and directly in his face. He was left for dead by the assailant; left for dead on the side of the road. After the State of the State speech, I immediately traveled to Duke University Medical Center to visit Trooper Potts, his family, and fellow troopers who gathered at his bedside. The terror of that evening was only the first day of suffering Trooper Potts and his family would endure. Since the shooting, there have been surgeries, grueling rehabilitative therapy, and personal reassessment. Some advised Trooper Potts to turn in his badge and to pursue a safer line of work. But Trooper Potts did not walk away. Instead, he overcame his obstacles and today, he is assigned to the North Carolina Highway Patrol Training Academy.

"Ladies and Gentlemen, join me in welcoming North Carolina Highway Patrol Trooper Michael Potts and his wife Lauren. I'm honored to call Trooper Potts a friend. We've played catch at the Capitol, and that's been a real thrill for me since Trooper Potts was a Major League pitcher for the Milwaukee Brewers before joining the Highway Patrol. You know, Trooper Potts still carries bullet fragments in his skull. But instead of being defined by his injuries, he conquered them and has come back even stronger. Ladies and Gentlemen, like Trooper Potts, I'm proud to report the State of North Carolina has come back even stronger. Its people are resilient and our future is bright.

"Our unemployment rate, which was the fifth highest in the nation just two years ago, has dropped substantially - the second sharpest drop in the United States. Our economy is improving; cranes are returning to our skylines; and real estate is emerging stronger. And yes, the 'Made in North Carolina' brand is returning as our factories are expanding. Along the way our administration took swift action in response to serious crises: from an Ebola scare, to the Dan River spill, to this year's very serious flu virus.

"We've also had to respond to extreme weather events throughout North Carolina: heavy rains and flooding in western North Carolina, a series of ice storms covering the whole state, Hurricane Arthur hitting the Outer Banks, bringing flooding and knocking out the power to thousands, and nine tornadoes devastating parts of eastern North Carolina. In fact, while visiting many areas damaged by these horrific storms, I was moved by the sight of neighbor helping neighbor and the professionalism of county and state emergency workers.

"And at one tornado-damaged area, I was especially touched by the spirit of Winfall's Mayor Fred Yates. Many homes in the area were demolished. I saw firsthand the physical and psychological damage of those citizens impacted. It was overwhelming. But Mayor Yates told me his community would rebuild and get through this. Ladies and Gentlemen, please welcome a true leader in a crisis, Winfall's Mayor Fred Yates.

"You know, it's that same spirit of resilience that helped North Carolina recover from our economic crisis. When I took the oath of office in January, 2013, North Carolina taxes were among the highest in the Southeast. But working together, we passed historic tax reform that put more money in people's paychecks. It was the first major overhaul of our tax system in nearly 80 years. And two years ago, because of our badly outdated unemployment insurance system, our businesses owed the federal government \$2.5 billion. But drawing upon our resilience, we reformed our unemployment program. We not only aligned our benefits with neighboring states, we also devised a plan to pay off our debt this year, a full three years ahead of schedule.

"Now in North Carolina, not only do we balance our budget, but when we have a debt, we cut up the credit card and we pay it off. That's a lesson those in Washington need to learn. I want to thank our Assistant Secretary of Employment Security Dale Folwell and Secretary John Skvarla's Commerce team for being the driving force behind this effort. Today in North Carolina, we have career centers, not unemployment offices because as Dale often says, we want people off unemployment and into new jobs.

"As I said, two years ago, our unemployment rate was the fifth highest in the nation. So we all rolled up our sleeves, made the tough decisions, and as of today, the private sector has created nearly 200,000 new jobs. We went from the fifth highest in unemployment to the 23rd lowest, and now we're even beating South Carolina. Despite this tremendous accomplishment, there are still a lot of communities, small businesses, and individuals that are hurting, and there is still much work to be done. Therefore, my administration's focus will be on five areas that have the greatest impact on our people.

"First, ensuring everyone who wants a job can find a job in a vibrant North Carolina economy. Second, ensuring every child and adult obtains the skills and knowledge needed to become a productive citizen. Third, we will continue to connect North Carolina's small towns with our State's commerce centers through physical and digital highways. Fourth, improving

the quality of life and public safety for North Carolina's families. And fifth, finding efficiencies in our budget and improving government services. That's jobs, education, connectivity, healthcare, and public safety, as well as efficiency.

"Let's talk about jobs. As you know, the fight for jobs is global, played at the highest level, and the competition is on our heels. In California, while visiting high-tech companies and venture capital firms, I ran into Governor John Kasich of Ohio. I know he wasn't there to tour the wine country, and neither was I. Just a few weeks ago, while on an economic development trip in Europe, other governors preceded me, and I know, followed me after I visited a major company. The governors I'm competing against are good friends, and often neighbors. Like North Carolina, they have cut taxes, invested in education, and built good roads. What they have that I don't is a clear and concise job creation toolbox.

"Therefore, working with the leadership of the House and Senate, we will submit for your approval, a series of tools which will help us beat the competition. We need these tools passed in a matter of weeks, not months. Our plan, 'NC Competes', will promote long-term sustainable job growth and capital investment. It will encourage mid- and large-scale manufacturing because manufacturing is part of our DNA. It will leverage our university research advantage to attract venture capital and a new generation of entrepreneurs, as well as help retain North Carolina's home-grown talent. This plan is based on a series of guiding principles - principles designed to grow North Carolina while protecting our taxpayers. 'NC Competes' recognizes the importance of economic strength in all regions but emphasizes support to areas of high unemployment. 'NC Competes' will require strong financial safeguards to provide a positive return to state revenues.

"In addition to 'NC Competes', we need to pass the Historic Preservation Tax Credit to continue to revitalize main streets from Wilkesboro to Greensboro, to Swansboro. Secretary Susan Kluttz reminds us that the vitality of our State is best reflected by the vibrancy of our town centers. Last week at the Hotel Concord, I was joined by Senator Fletcher Hartsell and Representative Linda Johnson, along with 200 citizens, and was reminded of the success and opportunity this initiative provides our State. Now is not the time to pull the plug on a strategy that has created jobs and new investments.

"Two years ago when I stood before you, I said North Carolina had to get off the sidelines and into the energy business. Ladies and Gentlemen, I'm pleased to report that North Carolina is off the bench and in the game. And we have a new quarterback, Secretary Don van der Vaart. To keep energy prices low, particularly in eastern North Carolina, we're supporting the construction of a \$5 billion natural gas pipeline that will run from West Virginia throughout eastern North Carolina. This year, we will begin to assess North Carolina's energy potential both on land and offshore. We are right now working with our Congressional Delegation to ensure North Carolina gets energy revenue that will help pay for teachers, roads, beach re-nourishment, and the dredging of our ports.

"While encouraging these new investments, we must not forget that small business is the largest job creating sector of our economy. We must also remember that agriculture is North Carolina's biggest industry, contributing more than \$78 billion a year to our economy. We must continue to look for new ways to help our farmers who are facing increased competition from around the world and here at home. One area that continues to be a challenge to our growers is the shortage of food processing facilities in North Carolina. Our farmers have to send their products to other states, which substantially increases their costs.

"So working with Agriculture Commissioner Steve Troxler, we will name a task force of farmers, business leaders, and venture capitalists to assess the need and develop a strategy for attracting more food processing plants across the state. This group will convene, recommend a plan, and disband by March 2016. One key to our economy which affects agriculture and other industries is our State ports. But as I address you tonight, we have an urgent problem at the Port of Morehead City. The Beaufort Inlet channel has an authorized depth of 45 feet.

"But during the past few months, shifting sands have reduced the depth to 34 feet, forcing many ships to enter the port half empty. Or in some cases they split their loads between Morehead City and another port. We have been working closely with our Congressional Delegation and the Army Corps of Engineers and I am pleased to announce that our efforts have paid off. The Corps just added \$4.1 million to this year's dredging budget bringing the total to \$8.9 million in federal dollars dedicated to this emergency. In addition, my administration stands ready to commit State dollars as needed to keep this crucial commercial artery open for business. I especially want to thank Secretary of Transportation Tony Tata and our entire Congressional Delegation, led by Senator Richard Burr, who has been working on this problem around the clock.

"Let's talk about my second area of focus: education. A key part of any jobs plan is a quality education so students can be competitive in a global economy. Connecting his students to the greater world is the mission of Garinger High School history teacher James Ford. Ford, once an Illinois teacher, chose North Carolina to continue his career and fulfill his teaching potential. Not only did he become North Carolina's Teacher of the Year, but Charlotte Magazine's Person of the Year, beating out business and civic leaders. Now that's the type of respect teachers deserve. Ladies and Gentlemen, help me welcome a member of my Teacher's Advisory Committee, Mr. James Ford.

"Because of teachers like James Ford, we have some good news to report. Our most recent graduation rate is the highest in North Carolina's history. With continued investments in Pre-K and continued reforms, such as NCWorks, in job training at our community colleges, we can expect to see even higher graduation rates and more people filling the skills gap in North Carolina. Still, we have to build an education system that rewards teachers like James Ford for their results-driven leadership so that North Carolina is a teaching destination, not a layover for our State's best and brightest. Teaching is hard, very hard. I know this firsthand. As a 20-year old student-teacher at North Rowan High School in Spenser, I thought I had the perfect lesson plan for my first day of teaching. I worked for days preparing an hour's worth of teaching material. But I ran out of material after 10 minutes. With my advisor and all 30 students looking to me for direction, the remaining 50 minutes were the longest of my life. Teaching is hard, so to support our teachers, we must fulfill our promise to raise teacher base pay to \$35,000 a year.

"We also must give our teachers and students the gift of time by testing less and teaching more. My administration is finalizing a plan to reduce tests working with Lieutenant Governor Dan Forest, State Superintendent June Atkinson, State School Board Chair Bill Cobey, as well as our district superintendents, principals, and teachers, to distinguish which tests improve a student's performance and which tests simply waste time. We will eliminate unneeded testing by next year. We are continuing our efforts to bring Wi-Fi to all our classrooms and long-distance learning to both our children and adults.

"To help our schools hire the teachers they need now, we are moving to expedite teacher certification, recognizing an individual's experience and subject expertise. For example, my education advisor Eric Guckian taught for two years in the South Bronx for Teach for America and has a master's degree in education from Harvard. Yet, he was required to take eighteen

months of courses to earn his North Carolina teacher certification. This bureaucratic process must change. We want, and should be encouraging, accomplished people who want to join the teaching profession. The bureaucracy should never, never, stand between their talents and our children.

"Cost must also not become an obstacle for students at our community colleges and universities. We must look at our community college and university balance sheets to make sure we're making investments in the programs that will prepare our students for the global economy and close North Carolina's skills gap. Now, we in North Carolina are fortunate to enjoy the benefits of the best research universities in the world.

"We are leveraging the advantage provided by our public and private research universities through our 'Innovation to Jobs' initiative that we just presented to the UNC Board of Governors. It's designed to convert more of our research dollars into products and services that are patented and introduced into the marketplace. Increasing the commercialization of university research and connecting it to our greater economy will create more high-paying jobs. As governor, my goal is to have North Carolina become the third vertex of the National Innovation Triangle connecting North Carolina to Boston and the Silicon Valley. This effort is a top priority. Therefore, I've asked my Chief of Staff Thomas Stith to lead this 'Innovation to Jobs' initiative.

"Let's talk about our third focus: transportation and infrastructure. During the past decade or so, as I have driven down the highways of North Carolina, I've noticed it goes from two lanes, to four lanes, back to two lanes, to eight lanes, to four lanes, and then back to two lanes. And everywhere it gets wider, it's named for a politician or a DOT Board Member. And where the congestion choke points still exist the road is nameless. That's not the way we do things anymore. We've taken the politics out of road-building by putting in place a transportation formula that focuses on relieving congestion, improving safety, and growing and connecting the economy in all parts of our State. Those changes allow us to be more efficient with taxpayer dollars. In fact, we've more than doubled the number of transportation projects that will be built. This new approach will create thousands of new jobs during the next 10 years.

"Our 25-year transportation vision connects small towns to economic centers. These connections will make it easier for people to travel to jobs, schools, hospitals, and parks. Our 25-year plan also recognizes that even with the new formula, we can only build one out of five projects, and counties and cities tell us they need more.

"Therefore, I will request a transportation bond of \$1.2 billion that will allow for the quicker construction of projects in the 25-year vision plan. Projects funded through a revenue bond would be the next projects in line, scored under the Mobility Formula, with environmental documents in place so we can begin these projects immediately. Here are a few examples of what we can achieve with the Mobility Formula - this proposed bond as part of our 25-year vision. For our coastal counties, we'll make it easier for the military to move troops and equipment during deployments, while helping transport goods at our ports. It will relieve congestion during the busy tourist season and improve emergency evacuation routes.

"In the east, we'll connect eastern North Carolina to the Hampton Roads region in Virginia. In the central part of the state, we'll focus on relieving interstate congestion bottlenecks and easing the flow of freight and in the west, we'll connect the mountains to the coast by improving the flow of traffic from Wilmington to Asheville. Additionally, I will support your efforts to protect and stabilize our existing transportation revenue streams, while also looking at funding reform and alternatives for our future transportation and infrastructure needs.

"We must also turn our attention to the condition and inefficiency of our State buildings. One of my first clues of the disrepair many of our State properties are in occurred when Ann and I walked up to the 1840 State Capitol for my swearing in. We noticed the two fountains in front of the Capitol were broken and filled with trash and dirty water. They looked terrible. I asked why they were in such disrepair. I was told, 'I don't know, they've been that way for five years.' We can no longer afford a culture of neglect and apathy. Turns out all the fountains needed was a little routine maintenance to get the water flowing again. Now, on any day, you can see people having lunch, reading a book, or simply enjoying the day next to those beautiful, historic fountains. Like those fountains two years ago, many of our State buildings are suffering from the lack of maintenance. Too many of our buildings are obsolete, with broken HVAC units and inadequate insulation, which cost taxpayers a fortune to operate.

"At Dorothea Dix, for example, North Carolina taxpayers spend approximately \$8.5 million a year to keep the complex operating. It's fantastic that our Capitol city is gaining land for a destination park and the maintenance costs of the Dix complex will finally go off the State's books. Even better, news is that we'll get \$52 million directed toward supporting mental health and the well-being of our citizens.

"We have structures all across the state that are a blight to North Carolina's main streets. They have asbestos insulation, broken elevators and leaky roofs. We're forced to rent office space in towns where we have buildings that are about half-empty because of the deteriorated shape they're in. We have many buildings that taxpayers are paying for that are essentially being used for storage - very expensive storage. Therefore, I will submit to the General Assembly a \$1.2 - \$1.4 billion general bond proposal for Project Phoenix. It will revitalize buildings that can be saved, tear down those that can't, and build new, workable, and efficient facilities that will be points of pride and help build economic development opportunities for their communities.

"Last Session, funds were appropriated to gut the Albemarle Building, which is replete with soiled carpets, broken tables and stained ceiling tiles. Of course, you have done a magnificent job refurbishing this Legislative Chamber. Now, let's do the same for other buildings throughout the state. These renovations will boost employee morale, improve safety, and increase productivity, while saving the taxpayer's money.

"Additionally, this is an excellent time for these bonds. Interest rates are historically low and we have the financial capacity to invest and maintain our physical infrastructure. Two years ago, I tasked Secretary Tata to make the DMV more customer-friendly. Back then, people waited in line for hours only to learn that they were in the wrong line. Going to the DMV took so long folks had to take time off from work.

"Our DOT leadership team immediately went to work transforming the DMV into an example of excellent customer service by: opening some offices on Saturday and extending hours during the week. Today, nine million residents are within a 30-minute drive of a DMV office with extended hours. We will soon be installing self-service kiosks for renewal and/or replacement of driver licenses or ID cards. License plate agencies across the state now accept credit and debit cards, and later this year, DMV offices will too. Most importantly, the DMV now has a culture that treats people like customers.

"And the fourth focus will be healthcare. Our customer-first philosophy must translate into a 'Patients First' philosophy for healthcare, as well. We hear from patients that health care is too hard to navigate. Imagine a hardworking, low-income mother juggling kids, a job, running the household, and trying to keep her family healthy. What if that mom could rely on one visit to coordinate the care she needs, whether it's treatment for an earache for a child, an orthopedist to set a broken ankle, or a plan to keep her high blood pressure under control.

"Our reform plan, under our Healthy NC initiative, was developed in partnership with doctors, patients, and healthcare providers across the state. It was formulated under the leadership of Secretary Aldona Wos, who's also a medical doctor. She went out into North Carolina communities large and small talking to the people on the frontlines of our health care system. This is physician-led reform. As part of this plan, healthcare providers will share in the responsibility for reducing costs by avoiding unnecessary use of services and working to keep people healthy and out of the emergency room.

"Our Healthy NC reform plan puts patients first and controls costs for taxpayers and also incentivizes health care providers to coordinate care. North Carolina's health care community has a long history of solving problems. Let's empower them to keep us healthy and continue to make North Carolina an excellent place to practice medicine and produce new discoveries in treatment.

"Now last Session, we came close to passing Medicaid reform, but progress stalled on the one yard line. Let's not take another pass this year. Let's run it up the middle and win a victory for families across North Carolina. As we continue to review health care options for the uninsured, we are exploring North Carolina-based options that will help those who can't help themselves and encourage those who can. If we bring a proposal to cover the uninsured, it will protect North Carolina taxpayers. Any plan will require personal and financial responsibility from those who would be covered. I will only recommend a North Carolina - not a Washington plan, so that we can put patients first!

"Now an issue of critical importance to our young people: underage drinking and addiction. That's why we have launched a powerful campaign called 'Let's Talk It Out' to start the conversation to stop underage drinking. I hope you've seen those poignant television ads! This campaign is being led by one our State's great leaders, former Lt. Governor Jim Gardner. Please join me in thanking Jim Gardner.

"Providing for the public safety for all of our citizens is our sacred duty. The Department of Public Safety under Secretary Frank Perry and S.B.I. Director B.W. Collier are implementing new intelligence-based initiatives designed to prevent crime before it happens. In North Carolina, not only are we fighting drugs and gangs on our streets, we're also fighting gangs in our prisons. Corrections officers are confronting the most violent people in our State every minute of their day. Some live under death threats, not only to themselves but to their families. Working in this environment comes at a price.

"On average, a North Carolina corrections officer was assaulted every 11 hours during 2014. Some were sexual assaults - nearly 300 involved weapons. Retention is a constant challenge. We will be submitting specific proposals not only to fight gangs and drugs, but to help our corrections officers who may have the most difficult job in North Carolina.

"We also have an obligation to those who risked their lives defending our freedoms. In just two years, our administration has launched successful veteran initiatives including converting military training into college credit or professional licenses, giving credit for military experience when veterans serve as educators, creating driver's licenses that identify veterans, and working to support a new Veterans Life Center in Butner. But for some veterans, the transition to civilian life has been difficult. They've had problems with addiction, homelessness, getting a job, and struggling with mental health issues.

"In 2013, we established a Veterans Treatment Court to help troubled veterans. The court has been an unqualified success. Therefore, working with our judicial leaders, our goal is to establish two more Veterans Treatment Courts in North Carolina to give our veterans a second chance to come home.

"In addition to these issues, we will have budget and legislative recommendations to help support our correctional officers, to provide resources for the western crime lab, to protect our pets from abuse in puppy mills, to fight drugs and gangs, to improve mental health, and to prevent addiction just to name a few.

"All of our challenges and opportunities require money and resources. Like last Session, money will be tight. Department of Revenue Secretary Lyons Gray is updating me every week on the revenue that's coming in. Every dollar counts because much of our spending is already obligated even before we sit down to write a new budget. State worker pensions and healthcare costs for current and retired state employees alone account for nearly 22 percent of our spending.

"So here's what we're going to do to find continued savings in our current operations. Workers' compensation claims have cost North Carolina taxpayers \$896 million during the past six years. That's about \$150 million annually, which would have paid for a two percent pay raise for state employees, every year.

"We all want to pay legitimate claims and give injured employees the best medical care we can. More importantly, under the excellent leadership

of Office of State Human Resources Director Neal Alexander, we are increasing worker safety training, not only to reduce worker accidents, but to prevent them in the first place.

"Our examination of workers' compensation estimates that 40 percent of workers' costs are related to abuse or outright fraud. To take hold of costs and to get people back to work sooner, I am signing and submitting an executive order placing the oversight of workers' compensation under the Office of State Human Resources.

"One of our first priorities will be to responsibly settle cases that are over five years old, an action that could save taxpayers up to \$17 million over the next two years. We will also launch a major effort to stop fraud and abuse dead in its tracks.

"Many of you are familiar with our NC GEAR efficiency program and by the way, I want to commend our new budget director Lee Roberts for the outstanding job he's doing with NC GEAR. Based on some of the NC GEAR findings, I will take additional actions to streamline our operations, not only because they save money, but because they make sense.

"For instance, the North Carolina Zoo and State aquariums, museums and our State parks will move from the Department of Natural and Environmental Resources to the department that manages attractions as part of its mission, Cultural Resources.

"Over the years, the Department of Administration has become a home for various divisions and agencies. We will begin to transfer a number of these agencies from the Department of Administration to areas where they are better aligned.

"Now one area where we've found a lot of inefficiency is in information technology. What we've found is that the piecemeal approach we've taken during the past decade to information technology has had disastrous results. Seventy-four percent of the State's IT projects have come in over budget and behind schedule. Who would hire anyone or a company with that track record?

"We found that the state has 40 data centers with over 1,000 different computer systems. That's hardly an example of efficiency. We discovered that obvious opportunities to pool the purchasing power of several agencies were often bypassed.

"My administration is going to insert accountability into our IT operations by proposing a new cabinet-level Department of Information Technology. The IT professionals throughout the Cabinet agencies and departments of the Executive Branch will report to the new department. However, they will remain housed with their Secretaries to provide in-house expertise and service. I want to thank my Chief Information Officer Chris Estes for doing the groundbreaking work on getting the new department and efficiencies launched.

"At a time when so many servicemen and women are coming home from Afghanistan and Iraq through North Carolina, we must have an efficient and well-coordinated process in place to meet the needs of active duty personnel and veterans. These services are scattered across many areas of state government with no accountability, causing delay, frustration, and poor customer service.

"Thanks to the Marine Corps dedication of my Veterans Affairs Director Ilario Pantano and the leadership of Department of Administration Secretary Bill Daughtridge, we have made tremendous improvements serving our State's veterans.

"But we are going to do more to strengthen our Veteran Affairs and the Office of my Military Advisor. I am proposing the creation of the Department of Military and Veterans Affairs. This department will be responsible for protecting and fighting for our military bases, promoting the health and safety of our veterans and military families, helping our veterans get jobs, and working with the unique needs of base communities. I have asked my Military Affairs Advisor Gen. Cornell Wilson to spearhead this new initiative.

"The military also has a special place in the heart of my wife, Ann McCrory. She has hosted numerous events for military families at the Executive Mansion, outside of the cameras. Her knowledge of the sacrifice made by our military families comes naturally. She was born on a military base and her father, Colonel William 'Flash' Gordon, was a P-47 Army Air Corps pilot in World War II.

"This evening, we are very fortunate to have in attendance some of the leaders of the more than 100,000 men and women serving their nation throughout North Carolina.

"However, I want to give a special welcome to Lieutenant General Joseph Anderson, Commander of the XVIII Airborne Corps at Fort Bragg, who until December was a Deputy Commanding General in Afghanistan. During his deployment, he honored North Carolina by displaying this flag, which has flown over our own State Capitol, at the Kabul International Airport where it was photographed with diplomats from the 48 countries that comprised the international coalition. General Anderson brought this flag back home. In fact, he wrote a little note on the back: 'General Anderson brought our flag home and he brought our troops home.' Ladies and Gentlemen, please welcome Lieutenant General Joseph Anderson.

"My vision for North Carolina is to have the best of everything. Think about it, we have beautiful mountains, big city skylines, and we have the best beaches in the nation. But it's more than that. We must have both big city opportunities and small town quality of life choices from the mountains to the coast. We have the best of both Mayberry and metropolis. When we unleash our resources in education, transportation, energy, and technology, and commit to greater government efficiency and affordability, our State will be second to none. We will be the role model for the nation, not only for today but for future generations.

"To continue our momentum of success, we must be innovative while maintaining the basic values that make our State great. We must continue to cultivate a culture that encourages building, growing, producing, and inventing things. We're protecting our environment to preserve the natural beauty that draws visitors from around the world to our attractions and State park system, which this year is celebrating its 100th anniversary.

"As my father often said when he was a city councilman in Ohio and later a civic leader in Greensboro, 'We must walk the fine line between our continued economic prosperity, while also protecting the quality of life that brought us here.' I have no doubt the people of North Carolina can live up to that challenge. We are resilient, strong, diverse, strategic, and we have already proven that we can deal with crises.

"As we have grown to become the ninth most populous state in the nation, let's continue together to fulfill our potential and create opportunity for all of North Carolina. So I ask you to join me and let us together achieve the best for everyone, everywhere. May God continue to bless the people of North Carolina."

Upon completion of his address, the Governor is escorted from the Chamber by Representative Daughtry and Senator Brown.

On motion of President Pro Tempore Berger, seconded by Speaker Moore, the Joint Session is dissolved and the Senate returns to its Chamber.

The House stands adjourned at 8:25 p.m.

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE R. JOHNSON

"North Carolina has lost an innovator, a man of vision, a man of courage in the passing of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (UNC) Head Coach, Dean Smith.

"Let me say, when he retired in 1997, Coach Smith was the winningest college basketball coach with 879 wins. Let me also say, that his teams won two National Championships, 13 ACC Tournaments, participated in 11 Final Fours, and coached the 1976 Olympic team to a gold medal. All those great accomplishments come in second in my view to what he has done off the court. He was a man of courage regarding Civil Rights. Some people do not realize that Coach Dean Smith, his minister, and a black UNC theology student integrated a whites-only restaurant in 1964. They sat

down and ate their meal without an incident. It took courage to do what he did, because he could have lost his job. (I don't think that Dean Smith along with his minister and the theological student went around the back.) He took positions that made others very uncomfortable. He was responsible for UNC having their first African-American basketball player. That player's name was Charles Scott. He endured being spit on, cussed at, and ridiculed just because of the color of his skin.

"Over those 36 years, he had players from urban, rural, black, and white who played together. In Coach Smith's eyes, there were no superstars who received the VIP treatment. They were part of a team whose focus was winning games and receiving an education. Ninety-six percent of his players graduated. I do not have to mention some of the African-American athletes who played after Charles Scott. But, for some who do not know, I will just mention two players, Greensboro's Bob McAdoo and Wilmington's Michael Jordan. Coach Smith spoke out while others were silent. He put his career on the line to do what was right.

"How many other Dean Smith-minded people do we have among us, who would have the courage to do what is right for all citizens? Whether we like it or not, we, in this Chamber are part of a team. We are a team that represents millions of people. The question should be are we winning the hearts and minds of all the citizens of North Carolina?

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

JOINT SESSION

Pursuant to resolution heretofore adopted and exchange of messages, the Sergeant-at-Arms announces the arrival of the Senate at the door of the House. The Speaker directs the admittance and seating of that Honorable Body. The President of the Senate, Lieutenant Governor Dan Forest, is seated to the right of the Speaker.

The Sergeant-at-Arms is recognized and he announces the approach of the Judges of the Court of Appeals who are seated in a body for the Joint Session.

The Sergeant-at-Arms is recognized and he announces the approach of the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court, who are seated in a body for the Joint Session.

The Speaker extends the courtesies of the House to Governor McCrory, Kim Martin, wife of Chief Justice Mark Martin and his daughter Susanna Martin, members of the Judiciary, and all invited guests.

The Speaker of the House relinquishes the gavel to the President of the Senate, Lt. Governor Forest. The Joint Session is called to order by the President.

The Sergeant-at-Arms of the House announces the approach of Chief Justice Mark Martin of the Supreme Court. His Honor is escorted by Senator Brown, Chair, Senators Blue, Barringer, Lee, Van Duyn, and Daniel; and Representative Stevens, Chair, Representatives Jackson, Szoka, Jordan, Baskerville, and Farmer-Butterfield.

The President recognizes Representative Stevens, who presents His Honor, Mark Martin, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of North Carolina to the Joint Assembly.

STATE OF THE JUDICIARY ADDRESS

"President Forest, Speaker Moore, President Pro Tempore Berger, Members of the General Assembly, my colleagues from the Supreme Court and Court of Appeals, distinguished guests, and the people of North Carolina. It is a great honor to have Governor Pat McCrory with us today.

"I am pleased to share that we also have with us this afternoon leaders from our justice system. I would like to recognize a few by name, and respectfully ask that those in the gallery please hold your applause until I have named them all: Chief Bence Hoyle, Chief of Police for the Town of Cornelius and President of the North Carolina Association of Chiefs of Police; Clerk Archie Smith, Clerk of Superior Court for Durham County and President of the North Carolina Conference of Clerks of Superior Court; Kimmel McDiarmid, Official Court Reporter for District 15B, Orange and Chatham Counties, and President of the North Carolina Association of Official Court Reporters; District Attorney Andrew Murray, District Attorney for the 26th Prosecutorial District, Mecklenburg County, and President-Elect of the North Carolina Conference of District Attorneys; Judge Robert Rader, Chief District Court Judge for the 10th Judicial District, Wake County, and Past-President of the North Carolina Conference of District Court Judges; Magistrate Rudy Locklear, Magistrate for District 16B, Robeson County, and the Magistrate Representative on the State

Judicial Council; Sheriff Asa Buck, Carteret County Sheriff and President of the North Carolina Sheriffs' Association; Judge Osmond Smith, Senior Resident Superior Court Judge for District 9A, Person and Caswell Counties, and President of the Conference of Superior Court Judges; Catharine Arrowood, President of the North Carolina Bar Association; and Ron Gibson, President of the North Carolina State Bar. Finally, would all those here today who are currently working in the justice system please stand so that we can recognize you. Please join me in thanking these justice system leaders for all their hard work. Finally, I especially want to recognize my wife Kym and daughter Susanna.

"It is my distinct privilege to renew the tradition of reporting to you on the state of the Judicial Branch of Government. It is particularly meaningful to renew the tradition this year, when we celebrate the 800th anniversary of Magna Carta. As Speaker Pro Tem Stam has so often reminded this Body, Magna Carta is foundational to our liberties and form of government, as it was the first governing document to place limits on the power of the English King. In Europe, at the time of our country's independence, judges typically remained in office only if their rulings pleased the Crown. Our founders saw the need for an independent judiciary - a judiciary not left to the control of a monarch but instead a separate and equal branch of government, accountable to the people, as expressed in their Constitution. The founders recognized that the Judicial Branch's solemn duty to preserve the Rule of Law was best achieved in this way. And so on this special occasion, I am reminded of our generation's stewardship of this sacred duty of government - preserving justice for all.

"Earlier this morning, thousands of school children across our great State pledged allegiance to the flag and recited the words 'with liberty and justice for all'. Those same children are learning - and we hope they are paying attention - that our State has three co-equal branches of government: the Legislative Branch, which is responsible for making our laws; the Executive Branch, which is responsible for executing these laws; and the Judicial Branch, which resolves disputes arising under those laws. And for the Judicial Branch, ensuring 'justice for all' is the most important thing that we do.

"The Judicial Branch comprises more than 6,000 public servants. Our Unified Court System includes seven Supreme Court Justices, 15 Court of Appeals Judges, 112 Superior Court Judges, 270 District Court Judges, 100 Clerks of Superior Court, and 44 District Attorneys. The Administrative Office of the Courts provides our elected judges, clerks, prosecutors, and courthouse personnel with assistance in personnel management and compensation, purchase and delivery of equipment and technology systems, and specialized judicial and staff training. In states without a unified court system, these jobs are duplicated in every local jurisdiction.

"The Judicial Branch handles just under three million cases each year. We are grateful for the support that this General Assembly has shown for our justice system. This General Assembly's recent Business Court Modernization Act is an excellent example. We know that a stable and predictable legal system is a key driver of economic development in a globally competitive marketplace. As this General Assembly has wisely recognized, strong courts are good for business.

"Likewise, in 2011 this General Assembly passed the Justice Reinvestment Act. That legislation was designed to improve public safety and conserve resources. By enacting the Justice Reinvestment Act, the General Assembly has safeguarded public resources, while investing in programs that decrease crime, provide mental health treatment, and strengthen our communities.

"In both of these examples, the General Assembly has partnered with the Judicial Branch and other stakeholders to ensure the fair and impartial administration of justice in our courts.

"We all know that like a business, the administrative operations of the Judicial Branch must be run efficiently in order to be effective. We understand this, and we fully appreciate that in partnering with the Legislative Branch, the Judicial Branch must be a good steward of its resources. I want to take a moment to tell you about the justice system's efforts to promote savings in recent years.

"When the Great Recession began nearly eight years ago, it placed tremendous strain and pressure upon the General Assembly to keep the budget balanced. Like the Executive Branch and the Legislative Branch, the Judicial Branch did its part. Our operations budget has been reduced significantly, as has our budget for personnel. However, even before the start of the Great Recession, in 2007, North Carolina ranked 49th out of 50 states in terms of per capita spending on the Judicial Branch. Five years later, in 2012, we ranked 45th out of the 50 states using the same source data as corroborated by the highly-respected National Center for State Courts.

"We have eliminated positions and currently have workforce deficits in courthouses across our State. Under the metrics used by the National Center for State Courts, our Judicial Branch is now understaffed by 536 positions. That is approximately 9% of our workforce. It is clear that we are asking our justice system employees to do more with less. Our dedicated Judicial Branch staff has picked up the slack from these vacancies, while their own families' finances are still feeling the strain of economic hardship.

I am told that Assistant Clerks and court employees are taking second and even third jobs to make ends meet. Magistrates and Assistant Clerks of court pitched in to help each other when they did not have enough staff to get the work done. Deputy Sheriffs and security guards also lent a hand while vigilantly protecting our courthouses from those who would do us harm. Judicial officials and employees across our State have carried out countless acts of diligence, compassion, and hard work that so often went unpublicized during these challenging economic times. We will continue to do our part to manage expenses.

"In response to the Recession, not only did we lower expenditures through workforce reductions, we also re-engineered our operations to capture efficiencies. For example, we improved our centralized procurement system for statewide supply purchases and deliveries to generate \$350,000 in annual cost savings. In addition, in 2007 the Administrative Office of the Courts moved to a leased commercial office facility. Prior to this, the AOC was scattered in seven different locations. In 2009 with the Legislature's support, the AOC was able to buy this property during the Recession. Purchasing this facility saved taxpayers \$13 million over the life of the lease that was in place at the time.

"We also effectively used technology to create operational efficiencies. Specifically, we have launched web technologies and browser-based systems to communicate with our employees who are distributed among all 100 counties throughout the State. Web-based solutions are also used to recruit employees, provide mandatory training, facilitate new employee orientation, and manage transactional business such as paying traffic tickets online. We are committed to continuing our efforts to find efficiencies in these areas.

"Not only did we cut costs, find efficiencies, and go the extra mile to cover staffing shortages, we continued to find innovative ways to fulfill our mandate to deliver justice. For instance, we now have two Veterans Treatment Courts serving those who have paid the price to protect our freedom. Governor McCrory, we were all very pleased to hear the positive comments in your State of the State Address about our Veterans Courts in Harnett and Cumberland Counties. Some of those who have served this nation find themselves involved with the legal system for minor offenses, and Veterans Courts play a vital role in helping them to choose the path of rehabilitation instead of recidivism, ensuring that men and women across this State who have served our country have the resources they need to thrive as civilians.

"Specialty courts such as the Veterans Treatment Courts enable us to do more with less. Along with drug courts, family courts, mental health

courts, and sobriety courts, our specialty courts have enabled Judicial Branch personnel to administer large numbers of cases while ensuring that people in crisis receive the help that they need. For example, in 1999, the first family courts were established by the General Assembly. Now, family courts are operating in a fourth of the State, providing effective case management to almost half of the State's citizens. The median age of a pending domestic case in a Family Court District on December 31, 2014 was 113 days as compared to 392 days in non-Family Court Districts. Family Courts are an example of specialty courts that are working to process cases through the court system in a timely manner, while helping bring closure and stability to families.

"Our courts in Alamance County offer another prime example of efficiency through innovation. That Judicial District offers a unique option for domestic violence victims. They can electronically file for a protective order and have a remote video hearing with a judge, all from a safe and secure location. Protective orders are then sent electronically to the Sheriff for service on the alleged abuser. This project has already won two national public sector innovation awards.

"Magistrates across the State are also using remote video technology to save time and costs when issuing search warrants or providing the initial appearance to a criminal defendant. Traditionally these exchanges required law enforcement officers and criminal defendants to appear in person before a magistrate. Now, over one hundred law enforcement agencies in more than forty counties are using technology to facilitate these proceedings. Law enforcement officers may even apply for search warrants using the laptop in their patrol vehicle. If the search warrant is approved, it can be processed electronically in the NCAWARE system, and the search can proceed. In rural counties where a magistrate is on-call for a 24-hour shift, this technology may eliminate the need to travel to a courthouse. Investments in this type of technology pay off many times over, especially for law enforcement officers who have more time to ensure the safety of our communities.

"An initiative that we will soon be undertaking involves civics education. Our citizens must understand the vital role that courts perform in protecting our democracy. This dialogue must begin in our schools with our youngest citizens. Thus, I have asked two of my colleagues on the Supreme Court to work with the State Board of Education and the Department of Public Instruction to enhance our State's civics education curriculum. In addition, we will develop a speakers bureau of judges and attorneys who can talk to community groups and school classes about the importance of civic values. In order to ensure that young people understand the fundamental principles of our society, this work must continue.

"As our economy improves, we are also exploring ways to bring about innovation in electronic filing to further invest in the efficient administration of justice. How many of us have children or grandchildren who cannot function without their smartphones? Many of us now fall into that category as well. As a judge at the Court of Appeals and now as a justice at the Supreme Court, I have seen firsthand the benefits of technology. We were national leaders when our Supreme Court instituted an electronic filing system almost twenty years ago. Our business courts have also benefited from e-filing. Recently, our neighbors to the north and south, Virginia and South Carolina, began moving forward with statewide e-filing in their trial courts.

"Now, we are developing a master plan for instituting e-filing statewide. In order to innovate in a prudent manner, we will prepare a strategic action plan outlining how to implement e-filing and virtual courtroom technology in all 100 county courthouses. We will be deliberate in our approach, and our plans will benefit from technological expertise in the private sector, from studying the best practices of other states that have been administering e-filing systems for several years, and from practical insights of the numerous stakeholders within our own system.

"In sum, we have all learned to 'do more with less'. But while these efforts at efficiency and innovation in our justice system have helped ease the crisis, they are not enough. Many of you are business owners and understand that a business cannot bring itself out of the red through efficiencies and innovation alone; it needs investment if it is to succeed. The same is true for the Judicial Branch.

"We are now approaching a challenging phase in terms of the Judicial Branch's operational needs. Our operations budget is under tremendous stress, and we have been forced to rely on money available from vacant positions to cover shortfalls for basic functions such as payments to jurors, court reporters, and expert witnesses. If we cannot pay for these basic services, we cannot conduct timely trials. The resulting delays erode public trust and confidence in the integrity of the justice system, because they impair our ability to promptly apprehend offenders and see that they are tried and appropriately sentenced. We all know that 'justice delayed is justice denied', and we are confronting a situation where the justice system is unable to promptly serve those who turn to us for help.

"The justice system is in many ways a complex chain, and we all know that a chain is only as strong as its weakest link. In order to bring a felony criminal case to trial, among other things, a grand jury indictment must be returned and often times lab results must be obtained. I am told that delays of more than a year have become the norm, rather than the exception, for

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lab results of blood-alcohol tests in DWI cases and DNA analysis in serious felony cases. These delays undermine the ability of our criminal justice system to deter crime and do justice. Even when cases proceed after these delays, many never go to trial because defendants enter into agreements with the State, where the defendant pleads guilty to a lesser offense in order for the State to avoid expenses associated with trials. Especially when resources are limited, this strategy allows prosecutors to cope with their heavy caseloads. If a case makes it to trial, a jury has to be selected and a court reporter scheduled. Defendants who are found guilty can appeal to the Court of Appeals and also seek further review in our Supreme Court. There are many steps in the process from the time a criminal defendant is arrested until the time that the case is finally resolved. The entire system must work correctly from start to finish, and this requires adequate resources.

"Our State Constitution guarantees that courts shall be open and that justice shall be administered without delay. Think about what it will mean if the people of this great State cannot rely on us to promptly administer justice. How can we explain that to the victims of violent crime and their families? How can we explain that to the small-business owners who need a contract dispute resolved in order to keep their store open and avoid bankruptcy? How can we explain that to the family that lost a loved one because of a drunk driver? We must be able to provide them with justice.

"In order to do this, we need the help of this General Assembly. We all know how important education is to the progress of this great State. By way of illustration, one county's annual budget for the public school system in Fiscal Year 2014-15 is nearly \$1.5 billion. The entire justice system budget, for all 100 counties, is only \$464 million. This means that the entire Judicial Branch budget is less than one-third of the Wake County Public School System's budget. The funding-related problems we are now facing have been decades in the making. It is not the fault of any particular General Assembly. Over the past twenty-five years, our State's commitment to the judiciary has not exceeded 3% of the State budget. That's less than 3% for a co-equal branch of government. If we are to right this ship, the Judicial Branch will need sufficient investment from this General Assembly to ensure that we adequately fund the basic operations of the court system, provide modest pay increases for our personnel, and move forward with critical technology infrastructure to support the rapidly-increasing demands on our county courthouses across the State. I look forward to working with the General Assembly on the details of this budgetary request.

"As I have mentioned by way of the earlier examples, the Judicial Branch will be a good steward of this investment. Indeed, to further our accountability to this Body and to the general public, this spring I will convene a multi-disciplinary commission to undertake a comprehensive evaluation of our justice system, and to make recommendations for how we can strengthen our courts within the existing administrative framework. We will be inviting participation from the General Assembly. The commission will also include key leaders from the private sector and stakeholders from within our justice system.

"This multi-disciplinary commission will continue to ensure that the Judicial Branch conserves its valuable resources and will make recommendations for how we can strengthen our courts to the greatest extent possible through re-engineering and capturing efficiencies. My sincere hope is that the work of the commission will be available for the start of the 2017 Long Session, and that it will provide a road map to assist the General Assembly in its efforts to ensure the integrity of our justice system.

"There will come a day when our time in public service will be over. Our legacy, good or bad, will be part of history. I hope there will be many achievements of which we will be proud and for which we will be remembered. Our ancestors paid the price so that we would have the benefit of the best justice system in the world. Let's work together to ensure that we do our part, that we keep our communities safe, and that we preserve the integrity of our courts.

"Thank you again for inviting me to speak with you today. Having the Chief Justice deliver a State of the Judiciary Address is an important tradition in North Carolina. I look forward to partnering with this General Assembly to ensure that our justice system has the resources to ensure 'justice for all'.

"Thank you, and may God richly bless this State that we love."

Upon completion of his address, the Chief Justice is escorted from the Chamber by Representative Stevens and Senator Brown.

On motion of President Pro Tempore Berger, seconded by Speaker Moore, the Joint Session is dissolved and the Senate returns to its Chamber.

On motion of Representative Lewis of Harnett County, the Chair extends the courtesies of the floor to Evelyn and Eddy Langston. Mrs. Evelyn Langston worked for North Carolina Public Schools for 63 years.

On behalf of all the Members of the House, and especially Representative Michaux, the Chair extends the courtesies of the floor to some very special guests: Sam Jones, his wife Gladys, and LaVelle Moton (NCCU basketball coach).

Sam Jones is a native North Carolinian. He was born in Wilmington, attended and graduated from North Carolina Central University (then North Carolina College), where he was a four-year letter winner. Jones scored 1,745 points, which is still second in school history. He was a three-time All-CIAA league selection.

Sam played all of his 12 seasons in the NBA with the Celtics. He was know as a 'clutch scorer', with more that 15,000 points in his career. He participated in five All-Star Games, and is usually recognized as one of the best shooting guards of his generation. He was named to the All-NBA Second Team three straight years (1965-1967), and he played on 10 Championship teams (1959-1966 and 1968-1969) - a total exceeded only by teammate Bill Russell in NBA history. His perfect form when shooting a jump shot, along with his great 'clutch shooting', led opponents to nickname him 'The Shooter'.

On page 1, lines 2 through 15, by deleting the lines and substituting the following:

"AN ACT TO PROVIDE FUNDS FOR CERTAIN EXPENDITURES AND TO CLARIFY AND MODIFY OTHER LAWS." and

on page 1, by inserting the following between lines 16 and 17:

"SECTION 1. Of the funds appropriated to the Department of Public Instruction for the 2014-2015 fiscal year, the Department shall transfer the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) to the Office of Administrative Hearings to be allocated to the Rules Review Commission, created by G.S. 143B-30.1, to pay for any litigation costs incurred in the defense of

North Carolina State Board of Education v. The State of North Carolina and The Rules Review Commission, Wake County Superior Court, File No. 14 CVS 14791 (filed November 7, 2014). These funds shall not revert at the end of the 2014-2015 fiscal year but shall remain available during the 2015-2016 fiscal year for expenditure in accordance with this section.";

and on page 1, lines 17-34, by deleting the lines and substituting the following:

"SECTION 2. Of the funds appropriated to the Department of Public Instruction for the 2014-2015 fiscal year for current operations of the Department, the Department shall transfer the sum of two hundred seventy-five thousand dollars (\$275,000) to the Department of Administration to support the operations of the Academic Standards Review Commission established in S.L. 2014-78. From these funds, an amount equal to the total of all costs incurred by the Department of Administration prior to the enactment of this act to support the operations of the Commission shall be credited to the Department. Expenditure of the remainder of these funds shall be made upon authorization by the Commission, only for the following:

(1) Administrative assistance, including professional and clerical staff and any contracts for professional, clerical, and consultant services. Consultant services may include contracts with qualified experts on academic standards that may be used as an alternative to the Common Core Standards, including other state academic standards.

(2) Technical assistance, including meeting rooms, telephones, office space, equipment, and supplies provided by the Department of Administration in accordance with Section 2(f) of S.L. 2014-78.
(3) Per diem, subsistence, and travel allowances provided to Commission members in accordance with G.S. 138-5, 138-6, or 120-3.1, as appropriate.";

and on page 4, line 37, through page 6, line 8, by deleting the lines and substituting the following:

"SECTION 11.(a) Notwithstanding G.S. 143C-6-4 or any other provision of law, the sum of two million dollars (\$2,000,000) appropriated to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Central Management and Support, for the health information exchange for the 2014-2015 fiscal year shall be nonrecurring. The Department shall not, under any circumstances, use any portion of this two million dollars (\$2,000,000) in nonrecurring funds for any purpose not expressly authorized under section 12A.2 of S.L. 2014-100, as amended by this act. Any funds that are not expended or encumbered as of June 30, 2015, shall revert to the General Fund.

SECTION 11.(b) Section 12A.2 of S.L. 2014-100 reads as rewritten: "**SECTION 12A.2.(a)** It is the intent of the General Assembly:

(1) To maximize receipt of federal funds for administration and support of the statewide health information exchange network (HIE Network).

(2) To allow the North Carolina Health Information Exchange (NC HIE), the nonprofit corporation responsible for overseeing and administering the HIE Network, to receive the State's share of available federal funds for administration and support of the HIE Network in order to reduce the operating costs of the HIE Network by an amount sufficient to allow for the elimination or reduction of the participation fee the NC HIE currently imposes on hospitals required to connect to the HIE Network pursuant to G.S. 90 413.3A.

(3) Beginning with the 2015-2016 fiscal year, to make the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Central Management and Support, responsible for using State funds to draw down available matching federal funds for administration and support of the HIE Network.

SECTION 12A.2.(b) From the <u>nonrecurring</u> funds appropriated in this act to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Central Management and Support, for the health information exchange for the 2014-2015 fiscal year, the Department shall allocate to the North Carolina Health Information Exchange, Exchange (NC HIE), a nonprofit corporation, an amount sufficient to represent the State share for the maximum amount of approved federal matching funds for allowable Medicaid administrative eosts related to the HIE Network.the following amounts to be used to fund the following expenses incurred or encumbered by the NCHIE during the period commencing February 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2015:

(1) Four hundred thirty-six thousand ten dollars (\$436,010) to be used for software vendor maintenance, hosting, and licensing costs due under the technology vendor contract currently in effect between NCHIE and Orion.

(2) <u>Three hundred fifty-six thousand nine hundred</u> twenty dollars (\$356,920) to be used for NCHIE payroll costs.

(3) <u>Ninety-two thousand one hundred sixty dollars</u> (\$92,160) to be used for operational expenses.

SECTION 12A.2.(b1) The Department shall, within five days of this act becoming law, process the payment for the expenses allowed in subsection (b) of this section and incurred or encumbered between February 1, 2015, and June 30, 2015. The NC HIE shall not use any portion of the funds allocated to the NC HIE pursuant to subsection (b) of this section for expenses incurred or encumbered prior to February 1, 2015, or for any other purpose not expressly authorized under subsection (b) of this section.

SECTION 12A.2.(b2) In addition to the allocations authorized under subsection (b) of this section, of the two million dollars (\$2,000,000) of nonrecurring funds appropriated to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Central Management and Support, for the health information exchange for the 2014-2015 fiscal year, the Department shall transfer the sum of one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000) to the Office of the State Chief Information Officer (SCIO). The SCIO, in conjunction with the Department, shall use these funds to conduct an assessment of the existing functionality, structure, and operation of the HIE Network.

SECTION 12A.2.(c) By March 1, 2015, the NC HIE shall report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Health and Human Services, the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology, and the Fiscal Research DivisionMay 1, 2015, the Department shall submit to the House Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services, the Senate Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services, the Joint Legislative Oversight Committees on Health and Human Services, the Joint Legislative Oversight Committees on Health and Human Services and Information Technology, and the Fiscal Research Division a report on its use of (i)all State appropriations allocated to or on behalf of the NC HIE pursuant to this section and (ii) federal matching funds received by the NC HIE for costs related to the HIE Network. The report shall include a detailed, audited report of all State and federal funds received by the NC HIE and all expenditures from these funds.

SECTION 12A.2.(d) By June 1, 2015, the Department, in conjunction with the Office of the SCIO, shall submit to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committees on Health and Human Services and Information Technology and to the Fiscal Research Division the results of the results of the assessment conducted pursuant to subsection (b2) of this section.

SECTION 12A.2.(e) It is the intent of the General Assembly to continue efforts towards the implementation of a statewide HIE."; and

HONORING THE LIFE AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF RICHARD PETTY

WHEREAS, Richard Lee Petty was born on July 2, 1937, in Level Cross, North Carolina, to Lee Petty and Elizabeth Petty; and

WHEREAS, Richard Petty, known to many simply as "The King," joined the National Association for Stock Car Auto Racing (NASCAR) as a driver in 1958, following in the footsteps of his father, who was a stock car driver and three time winner of the Grand National Series Championship as well as founder of Petty Enterprises racing team; and

WHEREAS, in 1959, Richard Petty earned nine top 10 finishes, and was named NASCAR Rookie of the Year; and

WHEREAS, in 1964, Richard Petty earned his first Grand National Series Championship and championships in NASCAR's top series in 1967, 1971, 1972, 1974, 1975 and 1979; and

WHEREAS, Richard Petty is the most decorated driver in the history of NASCAR racing, winning a record number of 200 career races and seven NASCAR Cup championships during his career as a driver; and

WHEREAS, the No. 43 Pontiac race car driven by Richard Petty in his 200th NASCAR Sprint Cup victory on July 4, 1984, at Daytona International Speedway became part of the collections of the National Museum of American History at the Smithsonian Institution; and

WHEREAS, along with his success as a driver, Richard Petty and his race team were considered innovators in their field and are credited with introducing to stock car racing roll bars, nylon window nets, cooled helmets and two way radios; and

WHEREAS, Richard Petty retired from driving in 1992 as the most successful stock car racer in history, but continued his distinguished career as an owner as the driving edge behind Petty Enterprises; and

WHEREAS, Richard Petty continues his career as a car owner today. The multicar team which bears his name, Richard Petty Motorsports, is located in Mooresville, North Carolina; and

WHEREAS, Richard Petty has been inducted into the NASCAR Hall of Fame, National Motorsports Press Association Hall of Fame, International Motorsports Hall of Fame, North Carolina Auto Racing Hall of Fame, and the North Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame; and

WHEREAS, Richard Petty is loved by his community and has supported efforts to build the Level Cross Volunteer Fire Department, the town ball fields and community center, and served as a member of the Randolph County Board of Commissioners; and

WHEREAS, several members of Richard Petty's family have also made contributions to the motorsports industry, including his wife of over 50 years, Lynda Gayle Owens Petty, who died on March 25, 2014; and

WHEREAS, Lynda Petty was known throughout the racing world as the "First Lady of NASCAR"; and

WHEREAS, Lynda Petty helped to establish the Racing Wives Auxiliary (Women's Auxiliary of Motorsports, Inc.), a benevolent fund for injured members of the NASCAR community; and

WHEREAS, in 2004, Richard and Lynda Petty donated 84 acres of their land in Randleman, North Carolina, to establish Victory Junction Gang Camp in honor of their grandson, Adam Petty, a fourth generation NASCAR driver who died in a racing accident on May 12, 2000; and

WHEREAS, Victory Junction Gang Camp is a camp that works to enrich the lives of children with chronic medical conditions or serious illnesses at no cost to the children or their families; and

WHEREAS, Richard Petty continues his philanthropic efforts through the Petty Family Foundation, the Petty Museum and the many years he has spent as a true ambassador for the sport of stock car racing and one of North Carolina's "favorite sons"; and

WHEREAS, in the year 2012, Taiwan held its fifth direct presidential election and again demonstrated the strength and vitality of its democratic system; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan serves the best interests of the Asia-Pacific region in the continuation of stability and growth. Taiwan and mainland China (PRC) signed the Economic Cooperation Framework Agreement (ECFA) in 2010. United States businesses can collaborate with innovative Taiwanese companies in Taiwan's comprehensive protection of intellectual property rights, and then use Taiwan as a springboard for entering mainland China (PRC) and other key Asian markets; and

WHEREAS, since 1991, the State of North Carolina and Taiwan have enjoyed cordial, and mutually beneficial sister-state relations; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan is the United States' tenth-largest trading partner, and the United States is Taiwan's second-largest trading partner; and

WHEREAS, the designation of Taiwan into the United States' Visa Waiver Program is a significant step to draw travelers from Taiwan choosing the United States as their destination for trade, investment, and tourism; and

WHEREAS, by working together with Taiwan, North Carolina welcomes all opportunities for an even closer economic partnership, such as the signing of a US-Taiwan Bilateral Investment Agreement and a Free Trade Agreement, and the inclusion of Taiwan in the Trans-Pacific Partnership in order to enhance the special sister-state bond between North Carolina and Taiwan and to encourage further cultural, educational, and business exchanges between the citizens of both nations; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan is an active member in the international community with a long history of commitment to international health and humanitarian aid as well as environmental protection.

NOW, **THEREFORE**, I along with many members of this body commend and support the democratization efforts of Taiwan and the nation's meaningful participation in the World Health Organization and the International Civil Aviation Organization as well as other international organizations, and extend my most sincere best wishes for continued cooperation and success.

HONORING THE MEMORY OF JEAN MOULTHROP HOOGSTRA AND HER ROLE IN DEVELOPING HOSPICE CARE IN WESTERN NORTH CAROLINA, AND RECOGNIZING THE WORK OF FOUR SEASONS COMPASSION FOR LIFE

WHEREAS, the origin of the word "hospice" can be traced to medieval times when it referred to a place where tired or sick travelers could find shelter to rest; and

WHEREAS, the term was first applied to specialized care for dying patients by Dame Cicely Saunders, a physician who began working with the terminally ill in 1948, and who went on to establish the first modern hospice, known as St. Christopher's Hospice, in London; and

WHEREAS, in 1963, Dame Cicely Saunders introduced the idea of hospice to the United States during a lecture at Yale University; and

WHEREAS, in 1979, Jean Moulthrop Hoogstra of Hendersonville, North Carolina, learned of specialized care for terminally ill patients provided by St. Christopher's Hospice in London, England and during that same year, helped establish Hospice of Henderson County, Inc.; and

WHEREAS, in December of 1979, Hospice of Henderson County was incorporated as a nonprofit organization with the following members serving as either officers or members of the Board of Directors: Jean Moulthrop Hoogstra, Claire Burson, Miriam Kussrow, Lex Veazey, Dr. Jerald Pyles, Joyce Coates, Wendy Goodwin, Sudi Hicks, Ray McCaslin, Chaplain David Prest, Wanda Wolfe, Jane Zecher, and Reverend Richard Randolph; and

WHEREAS, Hospice of Henderson County received "seed money" from Immaculate Conception Church and St. John in the Wilderness Church; and

WHEREAS, a very generous donation from Melvin and Georgiana Lane through the "Venture in Mission" program of the Episcopal Diocese provided the funds necessary for Hospice of Henderson County to start patient care and enabled the organization to move from the home of Jean Moulthrop Hoogstra into donated space in the First Presbyterian Church in Hendersonville; and

WHEREAS, in 1981, Hospice of Henderson County served its first patient and in April 1999, Hospice of Henderson County opened Elizabeth House, a 12-bed inpatient hospice residence; in 2007, expanded the facility to 19 beds; and

WHEREAS, in 2003, Hospice of Henderson County added a palliative care program; in 2005, became a nationally recognized clinical research department; and in 2009, was renamed Four Seasons Compassion for Life, during which time, the organization received the prestigious Circle of Life Award for its innovative care; and

WHEREAS, prior to her death in 2012, Jean Moulthrop Hoogstra was proud to know that Four Seasons Compassion for Life had served more than 10,000 patients and their families and would continue to grow;

NOW, THEREFORE, Jean Moulthrop Hoogstra deserves recognition and appreciation for her role in establishing a hospice facility to help care for patients and their families in western North Carolina.

Let their anguish, pain and torture never be forgotten. In our memory, they will live forever.

"Almighty God, full of Wisdom, remember the plight of the sages and elders, who instead of teaching people how to live in peace, had to teach them how to die with dignity. Fill our hearts with compassion towards the elderly, infirm and sick of today. By helping them both to live in peace and die with dignity, we honor the memory of those who perished.

"Almighty God, full of Compassion, remember all the forgotten and unrecognized heroes, who willingly sacrificed their lives for the sake of others. In our hearts, they will live forever. Open our hearts to the cries of the discarded members of our society today; people, who in silence bear the crushing burden, fear and despair of their collapsed world. By helping them, we honor the memory of the unknown heroes of the Holocaust.

"Almighty God, remember the fighters of the ghettos, the partisans, and members of the Resistance. They fought without weapons, ammunition and often hope. Their heroism paved the way for the rebirth of nations. Open the hearts of the religious fanatics of today who kill in thy name. Let them understand there can be no love of God without love for our fellow man. Let them understand that religious dogma cannot override the Commandment: 'Thou shall not kill!'

"Almighty God, remember the six million people who were gassed, killed, drowned, burned alive, tortured, beaten or frozen to death. For the sake of one man, millions died, while at times the world looked on in silence. In our hearts, their sacred memory will last forever.

"Finally, God of our fathers, let the ashes of the children incinerated in Auschwitz and the rivers of blood spilled at Babbi Yar, Dachau and Majdanek be a warning to mankind that hatred is destructive and violence is

contagious. Help us all Almighty God to fulfill the prophecy of Isaiah: 'They shall beat their swords into ploughshares...nation shall not lift up sword against nation and neither shall they learn war anymore.' And, let us all say Amen."

HONORING THE MEMORY OF DOROTHY HOOVER

WHEREAS, in an effort to address the need for male combat pilots during World War II, the United States Military began the Women Airforce Service Pilots program, known as WASP; and

WHEREAS, WASPs were assigned to Army bases throughout the United States and were given duties such as being test pilots or instructors, towing targets for air-to-air gunnery practice and ground-to-air anti-aircraft practice, transporting personnel and cargo, and ferrying planes from base to base; and

WHEREAS, of the 24,000 women who applied for the program, only 1,830 were accepted and only 1,075 successfully completed the flight training, including Dorothy Post Hoover of Henderson County, who had received a pilot's license as a teenager; and

WHEREAS, after the war, Dorothy Post Hoover returned to North Carolina, where she had a successful career as a court reporter in Buncombe County and during her retirement wrote numerous books on subjects ranging from fictional adventures and mysteries to highly researched theological commentaries; and

WHEREAS, Dorothy Post Hoover was a founding member of All Saints Anglican Church in Mills River but, in her later years, returned to her former church, St. Mary's Episcopal Church in Asheville; and

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WHEREAS, several years prior to her death on March 15, 2015 at the age of 98, Dorothy Post Hoover was honored as one of the WASPs featured in a special DVD, "Fly Girls of World War II," produced by retired National Geographic photographer Tom Nebbia for the WASP Reunion held in Texas;

NOW, THEREFORE, Dorothy Post Hoover and the Women Airforce Service Pilots deserve gratitude for their service to this nation during World War II as the first women to fly American military aircraft.

RECOGNIZING THE IMPORTANCE OF THE PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN KAZAKHSTAN AND THE UNITED STATES

WHEREAS, on December 25, 1991, the Republic of Kazakhstan declared its sovereign independence from the Soviet Union; and

WHEREAS, on that same day, the United States became the first country to recognize Kazakhstan's independence and established full-fledged diplomatic relations with the country; and

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WHEREAS, Kazakhstan is located in Central Asia, bordered by Russia and China, and is home to over 18 million people of diverse backgrounds and traditions; and

WHEREAS, Kazakhstan has a long-standing tradition of peaceful coexistence with various ethnic and religious communities; and

WHEREAS, over the last two decades, Kazakhstan has consolidated its sovereignty and independence and has become a leader in Central Asia; and

WHEREAS, Kazakhstan considers the United States one of its most important economic and diplomatic partners, which has allowed both countries to develop a strong strategic partnership based on shared values and interests that include bilateral cooperation on trade, regional security and the stabilization of Afghanistan, regional economic integration, and development of civil society, rule of law, and democracy; and

WHEREAS, Kazakhstan has been an international leader in nuclear nonproliferation for 20 years, voluntarily dismantling its nuclear weapons and securing its nuclear materials soon after independence; and

WHEREAS, Kazakhstan has been an ally to the United States in counterterrorism efforts; and

NOW, **THEREFORE**, it is important to support and strengthen the partnership between the United States and Kazakhstan.

GOVERNOR'S OBJECTIONS AND VETO MESSAGE

House Bill 405, "A bill to be entitled an act to protect property owners from damages resulting from individuals acting in excess of the scope of permissible access and conduct granted to them."

"This bill is intended to address a valid concern of our state's businesses how to discourage those bad actors who seek employment with the intent to engage in corporate espionage or act as an undercover investigator. This practice is unethical and unfair to employers, and is a particular problem for our agricultural industry. It needs to be stopped.

"While I support the purpose of this bill, I believe it does not adequately protect or give clear guidance to honest employees who uncover criminal activity. I am concerned that subjecting these employees to potential civil penalties will create an environment that discourages them from reporting illegal activities.

"Earlier this week, I was proud to sign Burt's Law. It requires adult care home employees who witness sexual abuse of patients to report it to the proper authorities. I signed Burt's Law because it protects a vulnerable population and gives clear direction to employees to report any abuse they witness. I don't want to discourage good employees of any industry from

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reporting illegal activities to the proper authorities, which is why I am vetoing House Bill 405. In good conscience, I cannot sign Burt's Law and then in the same week turnaround and sign contradictory legislation.

"I encourage the General Assembly to reconsider this bill as soon as possible and add protections for those employees who report illegal activities directly and confidentially to the proper authorities. I stand ready to work with legislators during this process, and I am very optimistic that we can reach a solution that addresses the concerns of our North Carolina employers while still protecting honest employees."

On motion of Representative Hamilton, the following remarks are spread upon the Journal.

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE INSKO

"Thank you Mr. Speaker, ladies and gentlemen of the House and honored guests.

"Dean Edwards Smith - Coach Smith - was an extraordinary coach, but he was foremost an exemplary human being. In basketball, he had an unparalleled record of wins. He was a brilliant strategist and teacher. His innovations changed the game. His dependable self-discipline and high expectations gave us the never-give-up fortitude and loyalty of his players and a treasure chest of memories for Carolina fans. No one who saw the eight-points-in-17-seconds win over Duke will ever forget it or the graceful slow arc of Walter Davis' shot as it soared toward the basket. We knew it was going in.

"Those 17 seconds were the result of the strong alliance of a gifted coach, primed players, and the trusting relationship between them, as well as the joy of the game. 'Isn't this fun?'

"On the personal side, Coach Smith was so low key and unpretentious, it took us, the Carolina family and followers, a few years to realize just how impactful he would be - not only on basketball, but on the State, the community and our individual lives. As we saw his quiet, consistent don'tshrink-from-doing-what-is-right-even-if-it's-not-popular example, we recognized him for the remarkable person he was. We didn't just admire him; we loved him.

"I got a hint of his quiet, effective leadership at a game my husband and I attended in Carmichael Auditorium probably in 1967 - Coach Smith's first trip to the Final Four. He was working with his own recruits and the team was winning. Larry Miller was a senior, Charlie Scott was a shining sophomore, Rusty Clark, Dick Grubar, Eddie Fogler. Those were the days - tickets were first come, first served; the front rows were so close to the court we claimed we got spattered with sweat; the cheering was so loud and intense we worried about hearing loss. With every spectacular play, the fans rose as one body - it was Carolina Blue.

"It was the first time in my life I experienced the home team crowd welcoming the opposing players with warm applause as they were introduced. What's this? Coach Smith reminded us some are still teenagers, not long out on their own, never tested before thousands. It was the first time in my life I saw a bad call by the refs greeted with rebuking silence instead of jeers and boos. It was the first time in my life I saw a coach stand up and turn to the crowd and lift a hand to quiet the first hint of booing. Gradually, we got it. We called it the Carolina Way; it was the Coach Smith Way.

"We learned a lot more over the years from his quiet, unassuming leadership in the community and on the court. Others will share more; I'll give one more example.

"When Charlie Davis, the Wake Forest standout and 1971 ACC Men's Basketball Player of the Year, played his last game at Carolina, his coach took him out of the game a few minutes before it was over. The Carolina fans rose to applaud him as if he was one of our own. He was one of our own.

"We had learned from Coach Smith that basketball is more than a game and it's about a lot more than winning or being perfect. It's about growingup; doing your best; learning from, not dwelling on mistakes; being prepared for what's ahead. (Will the ball - the opportunity - come your way? Don't be surprised, be disappointed.) It's about never giving up, never letting discouragement lose the game for you, trusting your teammates, respecting the opposing team, building relationships, acknowledging assists, experiencing the joy. The lessons of life can all be learned in basketball.

"It's not often we have someone move through our lives who leaves such an indelible mark. He awakened our better selves, stirred us to finer goals and greater productivity; he reshaped our understanding of responsibility and opportunity; he taught us to love.

"I am very grateful to have had him in my life. Thanks Coach for the assist."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE MEYER

"Colleagues, I was not raised in North Carolina and I was not raised on North Carolina basketball. I learned about Coach Smith when I moved to North Carolina, to Orange County in 1998.

June 10, 2015

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"I want to speak some about the dignity of this man, who wasn't even coaching by the time I got to the town of Chapel Hill. Some people might wonder, 'How **did** Chapel Hill and our community become one of **the** most progressive, liberal places in our State?' And I would argue that it is, in part, because of our basketball coach.

"Today we see coaches who are afraid to speak up on **any** social issue, afraid to ruin their brand, afraid to step into controversy. Chapel Hill had a basketball coach for decades, who was not only someone who was recognized on the floor, but also someone who was recognized in the community. Someone who believed that it was important to live a full life in the community, participate in his children's schools, a local church, and just be someone approachable on the street. And during a tumultuous time for all of North Carolina, indeed, all of the United States, we had a basketball coach in Chapel Hill who was willing to take action, to fight for integration in a restaurant, to fight for integration in schools, to fight for equality. Later, we saw that this impact transcended generations. He was not just a coach; he was not just a man who was a leader in the community. He had something that is very rare to find, someone who inspires people to do what he did.

"I worked in schools for a long time and one of the ways that you know the best teacher is not judged by what their students go on to do out in the world, but by how many of their students come back to teach, and say, 'I'm a teacher because of this teacher who came before me.' And we all know many, many of Coach Smith's famous protégés who went on to be professional players. I would guess that beyond those you also could not find **any** coach who has had more professional coaches come from the lineage of their program.

"And finally, I want to speak to Coach Smith about the way I saw him most often, which was as a father. I am very fortunate to have a very close friend who's here with us today, Kristen Smith, Coach's daughter. She's one of the first people that I became friends with in Chapel Hill and so my exposure to Coach Smith was often when I would take my daughter over to the Coach's house, the family's house to use their swimming pool. I got to see him in the way that he related to his children and to my child. I told this story earlier to Linnea Smith, Coach's wife, who's here today. At one time my daughter would tell her friends, 'Oh yeah, I'm friends with Coach Smith, I'm friends with Dean Smith,' and I would say, 'Well, you know Sweetie, you're maybe not **friends** with Coach.' Then we were out in a local restaurant in Chapel Hill and here comes Coach and his family, Kristen, Linnea, Kelly; they all come in, and who does Coach come over to say hi to in the restaurant? It was Ashley, calling her by name and asking her how she's doing and talking to her about school.

"He raised his daughters to be humble; he raised them to contribute to the community; he raised them to do what they believe is right. And because he had that impact on them, they've had that impact on me and my family and my children, and I try to raise my children using Coach Smith, Kristen's dad, 'Mr. Smith', as he was occasionally known to me, as a role model for myself as a father. I appreciate this man so much and I'm so grateful for all he has contributed to our State."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE DOBSON

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Some of my earliest and best memories were watching Carolina basketball with my Dad. My Dad taught me how to play the game and he thought there was nothing like Coach Smith. As a young boy, because my Dad thought he was great, I also thought he was great and only as I became a man did I realize his contributions and how great he really was.

"I literally can mark time in my life by Carolina basketball and watching those games with my Dad. When they beat Michigan in the National Championship, I remember where I was. When we had the bitter loss a few years later against Boston College, I remember where I was. I remember how that felt and I will never forget that. I guess all of that was part of my childhood and those are things I'll never forget.

"Finally, I want to talk about my personal experience as a young boy with Coach Smith and how I remembered him. Carolina basketball was a rite of passage for any boy that played basketball or tried to play basketball. I remember going to Carolina basketball school as a teenager and there were probably 500 or so and he took the time to get his picture made with each one of us and took the time to speak to us. It's just something that I'll never forget.

"One thing that really sticks out in my mind even to this very day was when he had us all together there in the Smith Center. He had us all together and he was speaking, and Hubert Davis, if you all remember Hubert Davis, was down there on the floor with him and Coach Smith was talking about Hubert Davis and he said that he told Hubert Davis that maybe the NBA was probably not what he needed to do. He didn't think he was quick enough or something like that. Hubert Davis went on to have a great career in the NBA and Coach Smith said, "Well that shows you how much I know about the game of basketball.' I remember him saying that, and he didn't do it in a false humility way or anything fictitious or phony, that was just, as the other members have spoken about, that was just his humbleness. That was the way he perceived life and that's just how I remember him - not only in that way, but the Carolina way that has also

been spoken about. That was the right way. He showed us how it was supposed to be done, in life and in college basketball and in general.

"North Carolina, college basketball, and the Carolina Tar Heels are better because of Coach Dean Smith. It was an honor for me to watch Carolina basketball all those years."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE FISHER

"Although, I did not know Coach Dean Smith personally, I remember hearing a story on NPR shortly after his death, where it was reported that he had left money in his will to treat his players and their families to a good steak dinner. This exemplifies to me how much Dean Smith thought of his players as his family. It also hearkens back to the time in the 60's when he went to eat with a black religious studies student and his pastor at a segregated restaurant and speaks to Coach Smith's recognition at that time of the importance of equality for all. What a legacy of forward thinking Dean Smith has left us all and what an example of leadership in the University of North Carolina system of schools we are left to aspire to follow. I commend the resolution to you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE JONES

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I just wanted to briefly add a comment to some of the good things that have been said about Coach Dean Smith and particularly about his character and his integrity.

"My personal background - I remember I was coming of age as a young boy and a basketball fan just as Dean Smith's program was coming of age and he began leading Carolina basketball to Final Fours and just sustained success. But if you remember for a long period of time in his career, he made it to the Final Four, he made it to the championship games, but it was his seventh trip to the championship game before he actually won the championship. He was criticized early on, as well, he couldn't win the big game or that type thing. But you know for Coach Smith and for the Carolina program at the time, the strength was sustained excellence.

"What I think we saw in Coach Smith and his character was that he never changed. I enrolled as a freshman at Chapel Hill in the fall of 1980 and I spent the next eight years of school there between college and dental school. I was there when Coach Smith won his first championship and I noticed that it didn't change him at all. I was there when Carolina basketball made the transition to the new center that would carry his name, despite his objections, because he was such a humble man. But even when he was going and coaching in a 22,000 seat Smith Center that never changed the man.

"I don't know that I hardly ever missed a Carolina basketball game during those eight years, but what I came to admire and respect even more than all the victories and all the championships was the sustained character and integrity that the man exhibited on and off the court. In the Chapel Hill community, certainly a nationwide and even a worldwide figure, we know that he was an Olympic Gold Medal coach, certainly someone who was recognized as I said nationwide and worldwide for his accomplishments, but it never changed the man. He was a humble man. He was always one who would share the credit, to give the credit to others, and success never did change him.

"One thing I will always remember about him, I remember a couple of times in particular during my eight years there where the fans got a little bit out of control. Sometimes you'd start hearing a chant or something with a little bit of profanity or something like that that was not appropriate. Coach Smith would stand up himself and stop the game and he went over and grabbed the microphone and he said, "We don't do that here.' He was so respected that it didn't matter how many students were chanting or whatever, it went quiet. They showed respect to the man. So, I just wanted to add my voice in admiration of Dean Smith.

"My final comment will be I'll never forget March 13, 1997, shortly before his retirement, was the day that he passed or he met and later passed Adolph Rupp's record for the most wins in college basketball history. Now, I remember that for multiple reasons but I remember it for one reason: because my wife was gracious enough to wait until right after the game to go into labor with my daughter. We made a little trip to the hospital after that game that night. It was just an honor. I think we stand here today and say that Coach Dean Smith was a great ambassador not just for the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, but for this State, and we are deeply indebted to him for the legacy that he leaves.

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE R. JOHNSON

"To the Smith Family, Members, and Friends,

"We are here to honor the life and legacy of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (UNC-CH) Basketball Coach Dean Smith.

"I did not know Coach Smith, but I was fortunate to have a glimpse of who he was through one of my friends and one of his players, Bob McAdoo. Coach Smith played a huge role in his life, as he did for others.

"The issues in the 60's and early 70's were turbulent times. Racial unrest, voting challenges, and educational opportunities were some of the issues that African-Americans faced during that time. Coach Smith was instrumental in integrating the UNC basketball team. But, just as important, he along with his pastor and an African-American seminary student who was attending UNC went to a restaurant, sat down, and ate a meal - a man before his time.

"As we honor him today, what would he say about the problems which we are faced with today: healthcare, education, voting, gun violence, job opportunities for all people?

"The Word states, 'If you fulfill the royal law, and love your neighbor as yourself, you do well. But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors.'

"Coach Smith, you have done well! You have done well!"

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE HANES

"Colleagues, I am humbled and honored to stand before you today to share some stories with regard to my relationship that I was so fortunate to develop with Coach Dean E. Smith as an undergraduate student at the University of North Carolina. That story actually started as a small boy though. It started in 1980 at the last Big Four Tournament in Greensboro -UNC v. Duke - James Worthy had 26 points - Tar Heels 78, Duke 76. I was seven years old. That was the spark. I must be a Tar Heel!

"1981, UNC v. Duke, Senior Night, Gene Banks of Duke had a very big and special night - Duke 66, UNC 65. The match was officially lit. I don't like those guys and I have to be a Tar Heel. 1982, MJ, his J, fade-away, was perfect. The fire was fully lit then. I've got to be a Tar Heel and I have to play for that man - Dean E. Smith.

"I began to do the research at that point. I needed to know who Coach Dean E. Smith was. I went to my father and I started asking these questions. I was fortunate enough at that time to have a father who played for a great legendary coach in his own right, Coach John McLendon at North Carolina Central University, with a teammate, of the great Sam Jones, who visited us in this Chamber. So, I already knew about the legend there. I was fortunate enough to grow up in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, and attend the basketball camps and be friends with the family of legendary Coach 'Big House' Gaines - Clarence 'Big House' Gaines. So, I already knew about them. I got to learn about this man, Coach Smith, and

my father began to tell me the stories, many stories that have already been related to you on this floor today with regard to his fight for civil rights and justice and being a man of high character. I knew at that point that I needed to do what I needed to do to get to Chapel Hill. The first thing that I needed to do was to become a better basketball player.

"By the time I was in eighth grade, I was one of the top five-star ranked, one of the top 75 eighth graders in the country - whatever that means. By the time I got to Carver High School in Winston-Salem, North Carolina, I was the apple of my coach's eye. I was well on my way and by the time I was a twelfth grader, I had a shattered knee and a severely broken left foot. So at that point or actually before that point, I fortunately had parents that focused me academically.

"I was able to attend the University of North Carolina and as I walked around the campus I started to hear this rumor of a freshman basketball team that existed at the University of North Carolina that provided opportunities for young men, like me, who dreamed of being a Tar Heel but perhaps basketball was not our strongest suit.

"I had this opportunity and I said to myself then, 'I can still be a Tar Heel. I can play for this man, this great coach.' I was fortunate that on an August afternoon/September morning, I was fortunate enough to make that basketball team as a freshman. The day I got that Carolina Blue uniform was one of the greatest days of my life. The day I ran out of the tunnel in the Smith Center for the first time I absolutely cried before I hit the floor. It was an awesome experience because I was close to being able to play for this great coach - Dean E. Smith.

"You have to understand that in the Dean E. Smith Center, as a player, as a manager, as one of his employees, or one of the employees of the University, everything is done the right way at all times. When you walk into that building, you stand a little straighter. You do things the right way, you speak in a manner that you know Coach Dean Smith would have you speak to others.

"When we were practicing on the JV team, we ran a little harder - all the time. Sometimes we were just hoping that Coach Smith would see us because the dream is to make that varsity squad after one year on the JV team. And sure enough one day Coach Smith came into the gym and I made eye contact with him and I said, 'This is my chance. I finally got it after all of these years. I'm going to show him I can play.' I actually made a pretty good defensive play on a ball. I was right where I was supposed to be, I attacked the ball and I got the steal. He stopped me. 'Come back.

Tell me what you just did.' I explained to him how I attacked the ball and why I did it, the way I did it. He said, 'Tell me why you didn't go with your inside hand to strip the ball.' I said, 'Well Coach, because when I was in high school we came up and devised a way to attack with the outside hand so that I could touch the ball and tip it out and never hit the man with my body as I went by him and avoid the foul. He looked at me and said, 'Humph. That's good.' I thought I would faint on the court of the Smith Center right there because Dean Smith had validated for me that I did something good on a basketball court.

"Long story short, the end was near for me and I didn't know it at that point but it was certainly near. I tried out for the team the next year. They had two gentlemen by the name of Jerry Stackhouse and Rashid Wallace who were also trying out for the varsity team and that was the end of Representative Hanes' basketball career.

"I was very fortunate to have played for the man but I was sad that day because it was the first basketball team in my life that I had been cut from. I remember calling my father, who was also as I said before a basketball player of North Carolina Central and had guided me along my way. I called him very upset. I was crying and told him that I couldn't believe that I had been cut. He listened to me and then he said, 'Son, let me tell you something. Coach Dean Smith has cut far better basketball players than you. So what you need to do is get focused on your books before you lose your academic scholarship. That's what would make Coach Smith the proudest.' And that's what I did.

"Years and years later I did my best. I was a loyal fan. I had several friends who played on the basketball team; one who was a manager, Christopher Levy Johnson, who is now at the University of South Carolina. I utilize those relationships to stay close to the basketball team. Over the years I have had the opportunity to interact with Coach Smith and I had a couple of opportunities to ask him to help me out on some projects. What amazed me, and you've heard this a million times, was that when I called the office and when I spoke to his assistant, she would deliver the message and he would call me back.

"Several times, we had the opportunity to meet and he would already know more about me, it seemed, than I knew about myself. This gentleman actually remembered me and that was startling. I was a freshman team player who literally played seven months of basketball in his program. I don't think I ever averaged more than six or seven points a game, seven or eight rebounds, but he took it upon himself to remember me for years and years. I was always amazed that he did.

"I would say to Coach Smith, and I hope too he is listening today, I would just say, 'Thank you. Thank you for all that has been described in this room today about this great gentleman. But more than anything, thank you for allowing the dreams of a little boy in Winston-Salem to come true and allowing me to be a Tar Heel basketball player, if only for a moment."
