WHEREAS, during the observance of National Teacher Day, it is fitting to reflect upon the lifelong lessons we learned from our teachers and to recognize the members of the General Assembly who are current or former teachers; and

WHEREAS, in order to respect, recruit, and retain quality teachers, our state and our country's future depend on providing a quality education to all students, and teachers are needed to provide that education;

NOW, **THEREFORE**, teachers deserve our respect, recognition, and appreciation particularly during the observance of National Teacher Day on May 3, 2016, and throughout the year.

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE HORN

"We are here today to remember, honor, and teach a new generation about the lives of those who serve or have served our great Nation and about those that paid the ultimate price, doing everything that they could to uphold the values and ideals that we all hold dear in this Nation and in this State. Their lives, their example, and their sacrifice have instilled in us a pride and a sense of service that we leave to our children and our grand-children. Very few of us returned home to an appreciative community. In fact, many of us were met with hostility and ridicule. As a consequence, many young people today are either not eligible or not willing to 'wear the uniform.'

"The veteran is often asked, "Why did you serve?" It is because we want to give back a small portion of what we have been given; we want our children to know what it means to live in 'The Land of the Free and the Home of the Brave.' We want others to realize the tremendous honor it is to live in a country based on the highest ideals man has even known, and we realize what a privilege it is to be an American and to serve and protect the very freedoms upon which this Nation was founded.

"DaNang, Pleiku, Ia Drang, Phu Kat, Omaha Beach, Bastogne, Remagen, Dachau, Guadalcanal, Iwo Jima, Pusan, Inchon, Chosin, Baghdad, Kandahar, and Tikrit are all places burned in our hearts and minds. But there were other places, places that we sometimes could not even pronounce.

Places where we were not there, but we were! Places that no one has ever even heard about and we were there, too. And there were those that simply disappeared, never to be known or to know. Yes, we were there, too. We answered the call, saluted smartly, and charged the hill.

"I stand with you today proud to be an American, a veteran, and a citizen living in a land that provides the brightest beacon of hope and freedom in the world. We all, here, commit ourselves to seeing that beacon continue to shine brightly for years and generations to come.

"Today we honor those Americans that serve and sacrifice, those persons that put themselves forward, write a check in the amount of their very own life, make it payable to the American people and sign it, often with our own blood. We do this so that our community and our country, nay the entire world, can have hope for a peaceful and productive future."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE G. MARTIN

"I've been in the House now for over a decade, and each year the Veterans Lobby Day is my favorite day of the year. When I first got here in 2005, it was an opportunity for me as a young legislator and a young veteran to hear veterans of Vietnam and Korea, and even a few from World War II, come by and tell their stories - just a chance for me to sit there quietly and to listen. I noticed today, though, for the first time, that a large number of the veterans who came today were actually much younger than me, a combination of the fact that we've been at war for an awful long time now and my advancing age. But the same joy in my heart was there to hear stories from my fellow Afghanistan Veterans, who were there over a decade after I was, and to see the same similarities I have with them that I do with our World War II, Korean, and Vietnam Veterans.

"I think it's very appropriate, as the gentleman from Gaston, Representative Hastings, said, that we do have Members of the General Assembly who are retiring, who are veterans, who are Primary Sponsors here. If you look at the data, both in Congress and in the North Carolina General Assembly, we have a declining number of veterans actually serving. As we're saying goodbye to those four and perhaps others who are members of this Body, I hope that any veterans up there listening or listening over the internet, will realize they have an obligation to continue their service and to consider service in elected office. Whether you are a Democrat, Republican, Libertarian, or Unaffiliated, it doesn't matter. I do think that we will get a better decision-making process both at the Federal level and at the State level the more veterans we can get involved in politics.

"So, if you're listening and you're a veteran, it's not time to stop the service to your country yet. Continue it in a new fashion and come join us here in the General Assembly."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE WHITMIRE

"I will start by paraphrasing a quote by John Stuart Mill that I, as a service academy cadet, had to quote many times that reminds us all of the vital importance of all who have served.

"'War is an ugly thing, but not the ugliest of things. The decayed and degraded state of moral and patriotic feeling which thinks that nothing is worth war is much worse. The person who has nothing for which he/she is willing to fight, nothing which is more important than their own personal safety, is a miserable creature and has no chance of being free unless made and kept so by the exertions of better people than himself.'

"With this, Members of the House, I rise to honor my fellow veterans the Airmen, Sailors, Soldiers, Marines, Coast Guardsmen, and Merchant Marines - who have given up the conveniences of home to selflessly defend our Great Nation, our ideals, and our American way of life.

"To date, more than 1.3 million American military veterans have paid the ultimate price for the freedoms we hold dear today and more than 38,000 remain missing in action.

"Many millions more of our veterans survived a multitude of dangers to return to their families after deploying around the globe in military service to defend our interests and continued to contribute to our Nation in many ways in the civilian sector upon completion of their military commitment.

"Additionally, I commend those who presently serve in our armed forces. These service members comprise our all-volunteer military, the greatest in the history of the world, and give up many conveniences to ensure our Nation has the most capable military might in the world when needed. This is especially important today as our Nation maintains a constant state of awareness for State, non-State, and failed State threats that we must defend against in a global fight against enemies whose fanatical ideals threaten our very way of life. Today, tens of thousands are deployed around the world. Whether at home or abroad, our military service members give the United States the unique ability to conduct 24-hour operations and engagement of all types, to hold any target set at risk in any weather or threat environment anywhere in the world, to command and control our activities, and to assess our effects.

"This said, in honor of our veterans, I ask the Lord above to watch over America's sons and daughters, husbands and wives, fathers and mothers, and brothers and sisters as they serve; to bring them home safely, to wrap His loving arms around the wounded, and bring to His side the ones who have lost their lives; to let their loved ones know peace of mind and spirit from the pain of having lost those who are so dear to them; and to let their children gain wisdom of the selfless sacrifice and incredible purpose for which their parent perished.

"I conclude by asking ALL to thank our veterans who've paved the way for our freedoms and for those who continue to serve. Thank you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE BRAWLEY

"I think today will probably be the most personal conversation I've ever had on this Floor. I was given a pin today as a Vietnam War veteran, and I felt a little uncomfortable with it. I enlisted in 1969 as a punk kid of 19 years old. It was a time a great division in this country and many people were encouraged to resist the draft, to go to Canada, to accept the draft and try to deal with it. I made the first truly adult decision of my life. In 1969, I enlisted in the United States Army simply because I felt I had to make a statement and say that I had picked my side, and when I was serving that the men already there would know that I chose to be there. I was not there unwilling. I accepted the duty.

"I went where they told me to go and I did what they told me to do, and, for me, military service was mostly an inconvenience. I have no wounds. I have to great feats of military prowess on which to brag. But I can say that for two years, eight months, three days, five hours, and approximately thirty minutes, I was in the company of men and women of heroic stature.

"The Class of '46 was just ending up the last of their careers. It was my privilege to serve with men who jumped into Normandy on June fifth. I served with a man who crossed the bridge at Remagen. I knew men that held the Elsenborn Ridge against Sepp Dietrich's 6thSS Panzer Army for thirty days in winter snow, in January of 1945, and a man whose combat patch was Merrill's Marauders, who had spent almost an entire year in the jungles of Southeast Asia, being resupplied by air.

"There were men with whom I had served, and I want to name some of them today. There was Skip Johnson, who had been a sergeant with the 2nd of the 27th Infantry, the Wolfhounds of the 25th Infantry Division, who had been a military historian with the Department of the Army before going on active duty, who began my long-seeded interest in the history of the military. Clarence Thames, 'Sergeant T' - who commanded the lead track of the 11th Armored Calvary Regiment when they went into Cambodia. Jim Turner, who with the 1st Air Cav, was wounded in an engagement that killed two-thirds of his company. A boyhood friend, John Boye, we had played as young men, who with the 23rd Infantry Division - also known as the Americal - was horrendously wounded his first week in Vietnam.

"Serving with these men gave me an example of what to be. I received guidance that began my first day at Fort Bragg from drill sergeants, Platoon Sergeant LaBoo, it's the same rank as a Sergeant First Class, but there is a difference. And then Sergeant (E5) Seeny. I served with the men that I have named and in particular served under men whose leadership showed me what leadership can be. Captain Jerry W. Webster, 1st Lieutenant Luis F. Pizarro - a Puerto Rican who is a knight of medieval stature - 1st Sergeant Robert D. Millirons, who came in 1945 and finished with me as a buck sergeant underneath his command - John W. Feaster, my last commanding officer at Headquarters Company of the 1st COSCOM, who had led at an A-Team with the Sixth Group in Vietnam, our Brigade Commander (James B. Vaughn).

"Last but not least, Isadro C. Aguinaga, my last and favorite 1st Sergeant. They made me, to a large extent, the man I am today. They taught me honor. They taught me courage and gave me encouragement. And by the way, encourage means to fill others with courage. To face the realities, do the best you can, stand tall, support your friends. Last, Ronny Griffin, Mike Price, and Ansel Morse, whose names were on the wall, who as young men, not yet old enough to vote, spent all they had to preserve our liberty. For those who made me what I am today, thank you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE FLOYD

"They didn't come by one. They didn't register by two. They registered by the thousands to defend this great Nation. Those that made the sacrifice, those that remain here with us in this great State, after retiring from the military. Those who fought for this country, and I'm one, and I can recall the times, Mr. Speaker, that I volunteered for the Army, and went into the barracks. Those of you who are a bit younger than I am, remember the wood barracks that we were in.

"Never had a shower until I got in the Army. Those of you who are much younger don't remember how we used to take a bath. We used to take a bath in a round tin tub. A round tin tub - that was the only shower that I knew about. I didn't know how to turn the shower on when I was in service. I had to have assistance from a fellow veteran, who was not of the same persuasion that I am, that helped me turn the shower on. It felt good, too, to take a shower for the first time. It truly did. I'm always so proud to stand before you, and you have heard me say it many times before, that if it was not for the military, I would not be standing before you here today. I'm proud to serve with the General Assembly on the General Government Committee where we have a division of veterans affairs. I'm one that always speaks up for that division. Sometimes Representative Cleveland gets tired, but I'm a veteran, and Fort Bragg is the home of the 911 call-up, when it needs to be called.

"But of this Resolution, page two, line nine, if I'm not mistaken, sums it up - 'We owe a debt of gratitude to our veterans.'"

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE PENDLETON

"Well, I heard a lot of fond memories today, and also reflect back. Growing up, my father was a career Army Officer, and I was an Army Brat. And all these Second World War Veterans - my father was a Second World War Veteran - that I grew up around were role models. Getting to talk to people that flew B-24s and B-17s and were tank commanders. It was just wonderful growing up having people like that for my Scout Masters. When I was 18, I decided to join the Army and go to college later, and I'm glad I did. I think back over reporting to Fort Knox, Kentucky in 1967 for basic training and tank training and it brought a lot of structure into my life.

"In basic training, the thing that really meant a lot, not while I was there, but when I got out, is that we were 44 men in our open-bay barracks, with no partitions between the commodes and open showers. We had people that were poor as dirt that came from the big cities, we had a Philadelphia lawyer in our platoon - all kinds of people and we all had to get along. At first, I was wondering, 'How are we going to get along?' But by the end of the eight-week basic training period, we all did. Everybody did well, and it was wonderful - a wonderful experience.

"So, as I think about my career, of staying in and pulling 26 years, but starting out as a Private, it just meant so much to me as a young man. It taught me one thing: leadership. And people ask me, 'Isn't it great that you are in the legislature? Isn't that the highlight of your life?' I say no, being a

soldier was the highlight of my life, and it's always been that, my wife knows that. It's always been the highlight of my life. I think about how many of my friends were killed or wounded in Vietnam. You know the old saying is so true, freedom isn't free."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE JONES

"Ladies and Gentlemen of the House, it just occurred to me as I've listened to the comments that have been made today, that every person who has spoken to us is a veteran. As we honor the veterans, I just felt like it was appropriate that they hear a word of thanks and appreciation on behalf of those of us who are not veterans. We're here to honor the veterans. It seems like it shouldn't just be veterans honoring veterans. I'm not worthy to share the stage with those that have served for what you have done, but I did want for someone to stand who did not serve as a veteran or is not a veteran of service to just thank you, to thank everyone here, and to thank everyone within the sound of my voice for the freedoms that you fought and secured for us.

"I wouldn't be eloquent enough to pen something like this, but I think it's appropriate to just read this brief little poem that I think some of you are familiar with, but I think it's very appropriate to read it today:

'It is the Soldier, not the minister Who has given us freedom of religion.

It is the Soldier, not the reporter Who has given us freedom of the press.

It is the Soldier, not the poet Who has given us freedom of speech.

It is the Soldier, not the campus organizer Who has given us freedom to protest.

It is the Soldier, not the lawyer Who has given us the right to a fair trial.

It is the Soldier, not the elected official Who has given us the right to vote.

It is the Soldier who salutes the flag, Who serves beneath the flag, And whose coffin is draped by the flag, Who allows the protester to burn the flag.'

"Ladies and Gentlemen, we live in a day when perhaps the spirit of patriotism is not often what it should be compared to times past. And like you, I have the privilege of meeting often with veterans: Veterans of Foreign Wars, American Legion, all kinds of veterans groups. We have events back in my District on Memorial Day, on Veteran's Day, in which we have the opportunity to participate. When I go to those, it's always a privilege just to be in the company of those that have served, those that were willing to give their lives. It's also a wonderful thing to see other people who are not veterans, particularly young people, who are being taught, hopefully, a spirit of patriotism, a spirit of love for country, a spirit of love for freedom that we stand for in this country, and in particular, love and respect for our veterans who fought - and many died - and the others who were willing to give their lives for that.

"So, to the veterans here and all over the State of North Carolina and far beyond, let us just say thank you and give our most deep appreciation for your service."

SPECIAL MESSAGE FROM THE SENATE

The following Special Message is received from the Senate:

S.J.R. 853, A JOINT RESOLUTION HONORING THE LIFE AND MEMORY OF EARLINE W. PARMON, FORMER MEMBER OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

Pursuant to Rule 32, the resolution is placed on today's Calendar for immediate consideration.

On motion of Representative Carney, the following remarks are spread upon the Journal.

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE HANES

"March 15th has become quite a profound day in my life. It's the day that I lost a mentor and the day that I lost a friend that until recently, I don't think I fully appreciated that I actually had in my life. That's the day we lost Senator Earline Parmon.

"I've known Earline my entire life, but she didn't know me. The first time I met her, I told her I've known you my entire life. I've seen you on TV, I've seen you marching, I've seen you doing all the things in the community that means so much to people's prosperity and freedom, but I did not meet her until I decided to run for office in 2012.

"Our first meeting was at little lunch place in downtown Winston-Salem. I had an opportunity to introduce myself to her and she had an opportunity to get to know me a little bit, and I thought 'what an interesting and incredible woman.' I didn't quite realize how interesting and incredible she was until I got down here and actually saw her get to work. At that point, I really began to understand exactly her struggle - exactly what it meant to the community of Winston-Salem to have her representing us here in the General Assembly for as long as we had. I grew to love the woman and I grew to feel that she was someone I needed to have close to my life.

"As many of you know, I'm somewhat the 'bad boy' of education in the General Assembly. Earline used to talk to me on the way home from Raleigh to Winston-Salem every single Thursday. I'd get on the phone as soon as I got to Wade Avenue and we would talk the entire way home - about my feelings, about children, about life, anything that came up. I always felt better when I got off the phone with Senator Parmon; I always felt like I was growing.

"The day we lost her, the day the city lost her, the day I lost her, I felt an incredible unease come over me and I felt that an incredible weight had just been placed upon all the leaders in Winston-Salem and especially those leaders who represent our community in north east and east Winston-Salem in District 72 and District 32, because we had indeed lost a titan. When I tell you the day she passed, a community wept. People were troubled because we'd always had this champion and she was no longer there. It's had a tremendous impact on us. It's also instilled us with a tremendous resolve - a tremendous resolve to keep moving forward, to keep working in the manner in which she would have us work - forward together and never back. I think a lot of people don't understand she meant that for all of us. She meant that for all the people who touched her life and whose lives she touched. She touched them from Buena Vista to Morningside - everywhere. I like to say that Earline was the realization of a dream come true to many of us. She was a crystallization of a vision made clear. She was a bridge over seasoned misfortune for so many people in our community. It's absolutely true that sometimes it absolutely does snow in April and we don't understand why that is, and it makes you feel very badly.

HOUSE JOURNAL

"Today I honor Earline Parmon for the work that she did and I just want to let the Assembly know that I do indeed miss my friend Earline. Thank you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE EARLE

"Mr. Speaker and Members, I want to talk to you about and tell you about my friend. Earline loved her family. She loved her children. She was the backbone; she was the go-to person. Also, she loved her husband Al, and she missed Albert so very much. He died two years ago and I don't think she ever got over that. One good thing is that I feel like they are together again and I've got to feel like Earline is happy because she truly, truly missed Albert.

"I miss my friend so very much, I really do. Earline and I kind of go way, way, way back. If you had anything to do with politics, you knew about Earline Parmon wherever you lived. Then, we were in Washington together with two different groups, and I can't even recall now what we were there for. Earline's group had an opportunity, an invitation, to go to the White House. Somehow or another, she got me in that group. I really don't know but you know, you don't ask any questions with her - you just go on and do it.

"Then we reconnected when she came to the Legislature. I guess you would say that Earline and I were the two most unlikely people to bond and become good friends. Earline could be a little radical - she could be a lot radical. I'm a little bit more laid back. Earline smoked and I stayed on her all the time about that. They wouldn't let me play cards with them, Rosa and Mobley. I guess I didn't play well enough and I certainly didn't play seriously enough. I know one time, or more, they even played over at my place, and I just went to bed and left them up because, like I said, I knew they weren't going to allow me to play with them.

"Then, Earline came to the Legislature and she took Pete Oldham's seat. Pete was what we all refer to as a 'big chair.' I'm going to give you a little history on Room 634. All the rooms on the sixth floor, all the corner rooms on the sixth floor, used to be committee rooms. Then, in 1995 they changed some of them out to offices. Teresa Esposito had 634; they changed it into an office room. I just loved it because it had all the windows around and it was really nice, so I set my sights on that some time ago. When Earline came, of course for a brief moment, she was in that office. My office was on the fifth floor, so I went up to my office, my new office, because I knew I was going to be a 'big chair.' So I went up to my office and I just told Earline not to settle in, don't put up any pictures, and do not smoke up my office. She was pretty good at following directions, but after that, we got to be good friends and we stayed friends during all that time.

"One thing about Earline, we were very good friends and we could pretty much read each other. She knew that once I made up my mind about something, it was kind of done. We certainly didn't think alike about everything, but she knew that once I made up my mind, I was kind of done. I could tell when she was coming to me with something that she wanted to change me on because she would say, 'Now Beverly Earle.' When I heard her call my whole name, I knew that we were going to have some kind of serious discussion. Whether you knew it before, but Earline was a minister. She tried to minister to me quite often. From everything - from my church life, my love life, anything else that came up - I guess she was trying to make sure that when she got to Heaven, I came up to visit her or was up there with her. She wanted to kind of keep me straight.

"I guess I could have been a bad influence on her a little bit. I drank wine - it's good for you. You know that red wine is good for you. Every now and again I could talk Earline into maybe having a glass of wine. When we first started off, of course she wanted sweet wine. So I said, 'Well, why don't you try some White Zinfandel.' Well that wasn't sweet enough. Then, I had her to try some Riesling. That wasn't sweet enough, either. Then, I had her to try 'after dinner wine.' You know that's what it is -

it's desert after dinner, so it's very sweet. Then if we couldn't find anything sweet enough, she'd put Equal in her glass of wine. I mean it's just nothing like messing up a good glass of wine. Everybody that ever went out with her knows that she'd put Equal in it. It almost made my flesh crawl to see her mess up a glass of wine like that.

"I just really, really miss her so much. At any age, but especially at my age, you really start to appreciate the friends you have, the people that you can trust and that you can depend on, you can talk to, you don't have to worry about what you say and how you say it. As I said, we did not always agree on everything, but we could talk about anything and we didn't worry about the other, later on, thinking about something that we got offended about. I tried very hard to talk her out of not leaving every time we had a conversation. I tried to talk her out of leaving. I do want to tell Representative Reverend Lowe that I tried to talk her into coming back and reclaiming her seat. I want him to know that.

"Anyway, I miss my friend. I miss my friend so very, very much. When I go to Winston-Salem, it's almost like I still expect to be able to call her and talk to her. I appreciate you listening to me talk about my friend. I really appreciate it. Thank you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE STAM

"I traveled to Turkey six years ago with Earline and Senator Larry Shaw, if y'all remember him. He was the tour guide and Earline was the entertainment. She was especially entertained that I helped carry her bags.

"We hit the usual sites at Ankara and Ephesus and Cappadocia, but spent quite a bit of time in Istanbul crossing back and forth the Bosporus and had a lot of meetings with government leaders and business leaders.

"We spent a morning at Zaman, which is the largest newspaper... well, the fifth largest in Europe. I think it's been shut down now by the authoritarian new president. But we crossed back and forth, and Earline stopped traffic in Asia and in Europe - she asked to be a maid. I'll have to explain that, because you can't imagine Earline asking to be a maid. Every evening for several days we were supposed to spend the evening at the home of some normal citizens - you know, regular people, and we did that. One night we drove up the Bosporus. We were told we were coming to the house of some normal citizens. We get up there, and we finally come up a little hill. You can see the Bosporus; you can almost see the Black Sea, and here's this house - the second home of the owner of that newspaper, Zaman, who's a billionaire - maybe the Donald Trump of Istanbul - and this is his second home.

"So as we walked in and Earline saw everything there, she said, 'I want to get a job here."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE LUCAS

"I first met Earline in 2002 when she assumed her seat in this Chamber. We immediately became friends because of her gregarious personality.

"Earline loved to travel! A few years ago, I had the pleasure of traveling with Earline to Singapore. While there, she chose to present herself as my personal chaperone. She also enlisted Representative Debbie Clary to guard me when she was unavailable. The two of them jokingly viewed this as a perceived necessary task.

"Earline, being familiar with my wife (Brenda) knew my taste in clothing, so she accompanied me to a local tailor shop and selected several articles of clothing for Brenda and me.

"At dinner one night, Earline decided that she wanted an American drink. She was offered a Coca-Cola (no price mentioned). After dinner, she was billed \$12.00 for the Coke. This made her quite furious, so I decided to pay the bill in order to appease her.

"Earline will be missed and I commend the resolution to you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE FARMER-BUTTERFIELD

"Representative-Senator Parmon: wife, mother, grandmother, great grandmother, minister, former member of the Army Reserve, educator, Member of the House of Representatives, Senator, a phenomenal person.

"She was very proud of the fact that she started a charter school. That was one of the first things she shared with me when I met her in the Class of 2003. Indeed, she and myself, Representative Carney, Representative Lewis, Speaker Moore, and many others came to the Legislature together in the House. She was always right. She was an excellent debater. You knew she had that honorary degree from her alma mater, Winston-Salem State University where she got serious on legislative issues like dropout prevention, eugenics, death penalty, people needing justice who were wrongly incarcerated, and the list goes on and on.

"I will long remember all the things she did to express her wonderful sense of humor and her wit and shared jokes with those of us on both sides of the aisle. In fact Representative Parmon, when my party was in control,

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sat directly in the midst of the party on the other side. She blended in and worked effectively with both sides of the aisle. That's why she was able to successful in not only working with dropout prevention, but domestic violence, voter registration. She worked with the silver alert and just always put people first in everything that she did, regardless of the number of hats that she wore. It was always about putting people first and making sure that their needs were addressed.

"Now, she did have an issue with me because I was a Delta and she was in the AKA Sorority. Of course, she thought her sorority was the best of the rest. So, she and I used to debate about which office was going to be occupied by whom, who was going to moderate a mock session for the Black Caucus on Youth and Family Day, and indeed, we talked about who was going to go to what reception with Beverly Earle, when we were going to go, and when we were going to come back. Earline always won out because she always debated and argued her point with good rationale and logic, so you could respect her opinion.

"I shall miss Representative-Senator Parmon and I know that she's in Heaven, in charge and giving commands of directives to those angels that she's in the midst of, including her husband Albert of 47 years. I commend the resolution to you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE LAMBETH

"Earline Parmon was born in Buffalo, New York. I liked to call her, 'Little Buffalo' because you certainly did not want to get in her way for fear of getting run over.

"Earline and I worked closest together during my tenure on the local Board of Education. She was an outspoken crusader. Earline would fight for those less fortunate. In the late 1990's, Earline founded Lift Academy - Forsyth County's first charter school - even before there were charter school designations. Students who had given up on finishing school, had no parental backing, and lacked the motivation to succeed were welcomed there. Against all odds, she fought for each one who attended Lift Academy.

"Several words come to mind that describe Earline: spunky, direct, accessible, compassionate, and caring.

"When you saw Earline, she always had a smile on her face. I imagine today that she is smiling on this Body.

"I commend to you the resolution."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE CARNEY

"I didn't want to do this, but all of you who have been paying attention that did not know Earline, I hope you are grasping the incredible impact she made on lives up here. As referenced by Representative Farmer-Butterfield, we all came in in the freshman class together, along with Representative Lewis, the Speaker, and others that are still here. Earline will never leave this place. She put her mark here on so many things.

"I have the distinct privilege of sitting in Seat 54 and she sat behind me in 66. All the accolades have been said about Earline, but I want to put a little 'human' side to it. I also had the opportunity to go on a van trip around the State. There were some of us that went out in 2010 and some of us stayed for the whole thing. We would pick up other members along the way. Earline and I were the two that started out together and ended up back here together. I learned a lot sitting in front of her, but I learned a whole lot more on that trip. When you're in a van and you've been in a group talking, you get in the car and you're tired but you keep going.

"The one thing about Earline that hasn't been said is she was an incredible, dapper dresser. She loved coordinating her outfits. So sitting in front of her every day, it was something different. I don't know how long it took me before I realized she hadn't changed an outfit in quite a while. Not only were her clothes a message, or a statement, about her, but I looked down at her shoes and they always were coordinating or they always stood out. I commented one day 'Earline, where do you find your shoes?' Now, some of you may know, but I don't; she never told me. There was a store off the interstate that she would stop by on her way to and from here and pick up something, pick up some new shoes. The other thing that she always wore with her attire was a pin. It was all kinds of pins. So I brought two to her one day that I had for a long time that was passed on to me. I gave them to her and she said, 'What are these?' I said, 'I wanted to contribute to your collection of two pins.' She was most appreciative, but then she came the next day and said, 'I can't take these, they belong to you.' We went back and forth for a couple days, and she ended up keeping them, I knew she wanted them. Anyway, I didn't give in to her.

"There was another thing on the trip that I learned about Earline and that is - and some of you who have been in her home know this - she collected salt and pepper shakers. She had hundreds, I guess, every kind you could imagine. On our van trip, we had one opportunity to go into a local country gas station store. By golly, when we left there, she left there she left with a pair salt and pepper shakers.

"That's the human side of her, that someone who is a stranger to her -11, 12, 13 years ago - she'd just embrace you. I've seen her stand up from Seat 66 many times and chew into some issue on the floor, then she'd sit down and laugh. Then she would go up to the person that she had confronted on the floor, she would apologize for a minute and say, 'Now I'm not sorry I said what I did, but maybe it was the way I said it.'

"She won over everybody that touched her and it was an absolute, incredible privilege for me to get to know Earline Parmon, but she's still with us. I commend the resolution to you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE DOLLAR

"I first got to know Earline back in, I believe it was, 1989 in the Institute of Political Leadership. There were several Members of that class that ended up serving both here in the House, as well as in the Senate and some local offices. Earline was just a real joy to work with. As has been mentioned, she had some very strong opinions. She was not shy about sharing those with you. But you always knew where you stood and how she stood on an issue, which was tremendous.

"But I got entangled, shall we say, on a bill that she ran - a hair braiding bill. The laughter from those that were actually here at the time - that was sort of an amazing bill, it was hotly debated on the floor, it was something. She had her passion into that. So, the bill gets over to the Senate. For some reason, it was toward the end of Session, and most people weren't here in the House, but the Senate was working on that particular day, and I ended up - through a comedy of errors, I suppose - but I ended up over in the Senate working on this thing, for some reason. And in between, I guess, Senator Rand was just trying to keep Senator Garrou, who was trying to make sure that Earline's bill came through ok. Senator East - which some of you remember him - was looking out for the barbers at the time. I don't know if Representative Fisher remembers this but we borrowed your bill and you helped save us. Thank you for that. We borrowed a bill, we split the two issues up, and we untangled them. Anyway, we ended up coming back, I think, the first of the next week and passing two or three different bills, but we got it all done. It was a pretty amazing experience. I thought I was taking my life into my own hands except that her bill was passed and she had what she was looking for.

"She was just, as many have mentioned, she was just a real joy to work with. Remember her very, very fondly as a great legislator, and I commend the resolution to you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE L. BELL

"There's a lot that has been said about Earline, and all of it is true. I'm not going to try to repeat some of that. I remember Senator Parmon when she was a county commissioner. We met at that time and worked together at state conferences and national conferences. I remember working with her when she was traveling around the state with the drop-out prevention program. I met her husband at that time and learned him very well, and we traveled quite a bit not only in the state, but also outside as well.

"I used to tease Earline because when I found out she was a minister, and I'm a deacon at my church, I called her my pastor. I just couldn't imagine her being a preacher at that time. We socialized together a lot. I just teased her about that.

"We miss her quite a bit - already miss her a lot around here. I commend this resolution to you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE HURLEY

"As a freshman, Speaker Hackney appointed me to the commission on dropout prevention and high school graduation. Representative Parmon was a co-chair along with Representative Fisher and they had taken the General Assembly to the people in Forsyth County. I went to the meeting to hear the public and learn from the experience. Representative Parmon asked me if I would be interested in having a meeting of this commission in Randolph County. Of course, I was. It was scheduled, and session adjourned late that day, so we didn't get to Asheboro until around 8:00 p.m., but the auditorium was pretty full. Only one person was there who spoke on why they had dropped out. It had been difficult to contact them because of privacy issues. I had had to go through the schools to send letters I had written to whomever the administration chose. I appreciated her caring about this freshman legislator and for the opportunity it afforded the people of my district.

"I am thankful for the experience of serving with Representative-Senator Parmon. She was always kind and thoughtful. North Carolina has lost a very special person who served citizens and our State with dignity."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE R. MOORE

"Very rarely do I stand up and speak on resolutions about past members, but I had a great deal of respect for Senator Parmon. When I came in, I didn't spend a whole lot of time with her, but the time that we did spend together was very productive. She always had a very, very helpful insight to what I was going through coming into the General Assembly. The first

year I was here was the year the Chamber transitioned from Democrat to Republican. I was sitting over there in the Speaker's chair feeling a little lonely. Earline used to come by, and she used to speak with me. She used to tell me, 'Son, keep holding your head up and keep doing the right thing and moving forward, and you're going to be alright and you're going to have success in this Chamber. Don't worry. Just keep going forward.'

"I have very fond memories of Earline. She was a small woman, but she had a will of iron and the strength and the heart of a lion. She is our modern-day Shirley Chisholm. I just wanted to lend my voice to what's been said. All of you have different experiences, but I will always hold her deep in my heart with love and respect. I commend the resolution to you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE STEVENS

"I waited to see if anybody else brought this up - one thing that incredibly impressed me about Representative Parmon, as we were working on issues one day, I think we were actually talking about the eugenics bill, and she told me that she understood and knew a lot about that because she herself had been the foster mother of eleven children. Now, all the other things we know she's done, and as busy and as active as she's been, to take in eleven of somebody else's children - on top of her own - says something incredible about that woman. I just never forgot that she really devoted her time to the things that she believed in. And to take in eleven foster kids is a lot. So, I commend the resolution to you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE MICHAUX

"I knew Earline, probably, before any of you all ever thought of Earline. I knew Earline back when we called her a rebel with a cause. She sort of rankled with people in Winston-Salem with her activities that many of us would engage in at the time. But it all ended up in the most generous and fruitful manner.

"When she got here in the General Assembly, we renewed - well, we had never lost the friendship that we had made during the movement at all. She got in the habit of calling me 'godfather.' Every time we would cross each other, or come across each other, she'd say godfather this, godfather that, godfather the other. So, I said, 'Earline, why do you keep calling me godfather?' She said, 'Well, for two reasons. One was I saw the movie *The Godfather* and you sort of reminded me of the capo.' I said, 'Why is that?' She said, 'Because you have a habit of talking to people in a way that's nice, but then they better look out for their lives.' I said, 'Wait a minute. Wait a minute, Earline. You're calling me a capo in the Mafia?' She said, 'Well,

The Godfather, that's what it was about and he was the one that shepherded the people through and got them through life or just got rid of them.' She said, 'On the other hand, you have played a part in my life and let me believe you were my godfather and that you helped me, particularly here in the House.'

"She and Representative Larry Womble actually were a pair that you could not dismiss. The eugenics legislation that this House eventually passed was because of the prodding, not only of Larry Womble, but because Earline insisted on it being done. When Larry had his accident, Earline took over the fight and got more done and got things done much better than had been happening in the past.

"Earline had a voice - she spoke, she talked. She said things some times that rankled people. She said things some times that just really hit the wrong nerve at first. But then people began to realize that what she was saying, you know, was true. It reminds me of the great theologian Martin Luther who had a problem with the High Church of Rome, and he began to write letters and theses about how it was being run and the Holy Catholic Church didn't like it. And they eventually engaged in what they called the Diet of Worms where they brought Martin Luther in to get him to ask him whether or not he believed what he wrote. A lot of people asked Earline, 'Do you really believe what you said?' Martin Luther said, 'Give me overnight to think about it.' He came back the next day, and this is what he told the Diet of Worms: 'I neither can nor will recant anything, for it is neither right nor safe to act against conscience. Here I stand, I can do no other.' That was Earline's real forte.

"I miss her. And Beverly, you tried to talk her out of going over to that other Body, and you weren't any more passionate about it than I was. I said, 'You're making a mistake. You need to be over here backing up the rest of us.' Well, she went on over there.

"I guess we will all miss here guidance, miss her counsel, miss her words of wisdom. We will always miss her personality. We will all miss everything that she offered to this Body. I guess the best thing I can say is something I learned a while back which I've tried to apply. I know it sort of epitomizes Earline. And it goes something like this: 'I seek opportunity, not security. I do not wish to be a kept citizen, humbled and dogged, by having the State look after me. I want to take the calculated risk, to dream and to build, to fail and to succeed. I will never cower before any master nor bend to any threat. It is my heritage to stand erect, proud, and unafraid, to think and act for myself, and to face the world boldly and say, 'This I have done.'

"Earline, you have done it."

The resolution passes its second reading, by electronic vote (101-0), and there being no objection is read a third time.

Representative Bumgardner requests and is granted leave of the House to be recorded as voting "aye". The adjusted vote total is (102-0).

The resolution passes its third reading and is ordered enrolled.

Representative Lewis moves, seconded by Representative Michaux, that the House adjourn at 5:08 p.m., subject to receipt and referral of committee reports and re-referral of bills and resolutions, to reconvene Wednesday, May 25 at 2:00 p.m.

The motion carries.

WHEREAS, people from around the country travel to fish the Tuckaseigee River in Jackson County, flowing some 40 miles from southeast to northwest, providing a superior habitat for invertebrate and other trout prey; and

GOVERNOR'S OBJECTIONS AND VETO MESSAGE

SENATE BILL 71: "AN ACT TO (1) REQUIRE A COAL COMBUSTION RESIDUALS IMPOUNDMENT OWNER TO PROVIDE PERMANENT ALTERNATIVE WATER SUPPLIES FOR RESIDENTS IN AREAS SURROUNDING COAL COMBUSTION RESIDUALS SURFACE IMPOUNDMENTS; (2) EXTEND THE PERIOD FOR PUBLIC COMMENT AND REVIEW OF PROPOSED RISK CLASSIFICATIONS FOR COAL COMBUSTION RESIDUALS SURFACE IMPOUNDMENTS; AND (3) MODIFY APPOINTMENTS TO THE COAL ASH MANAGEMENT COMMISSION, THE MINING COMMISSION, AND THE OIL AND GAS COMMISSION, IN ACCORD WITH THE HOLDING OF MCCRORY V. BERGER."

Senate Bill 71 is not good for the environment or for the rule of law in North Carolina.

This bill weakens environmental protections, delays water connections for well owners, ignores dam safety, and hinders environmentally sound efforts to reuse coal ash. This bill also lacks a firm deadline to connect well owners to alternate water supplies. In contrast, my administration proposed a solution that would have provided water connections within 18 months and required Duke Energy to repair dams around its coal ash ponds.

Furthermore, Senate Bill 71 yet again violates the separation of powers by interfering with a Governor's constitutional duty to faithfully execute the laws. It does this by re-establishing unaccountable bureaucracies within the cabinet agencies that have the power to make or overrule executive decisions. This legislation completely disregards a decisive 6-1 North Carolina Supreme Court ruling that came a mere four months ago. The re-established Coal Ash, Mining, and Oil & Gas Commissions have the same lack of supervision and extremely limited removal authority that the Supreme Court objected to in *McCrory v. Berger*. This bill further limits appointment authority by requiring the General Assembly to approve executive appointments by confirmation.

In addition, this legislation imposes unrealistic deadlines to make appointments to the Mining and Oil & Gas Commissions. If an appointment is not made, the General Assembly gives gubernatorial appointments to the Lieutenant Governor, who is also the President of the Senate, despite the fact that these commissions are located in the Governor's cabinet. The Supreme Court was clear that it is the Governor who must have control over entities within the cabinet agencies.

As Governor, I have a duty to protect the environment and preserve the constitutional role of the executive branch, therefore, I veto Senate Bill 71.

 - A majority of the entity's governing body is composed of <u>individuals who (i) are licensed in the State as</u> physicians, physician assistants, nurse practitioners, or <u>psychologists</u> <u>psychologists and (ii) have experience</u> <u>treating beneficiaries of the North Carolina Medicaid</u> program.
 - 3. Holds a PHP license issued by the Department of Insurance."; and

Within 30 calendar days after receiving DHHS's request, OBSM must respond to the request. In these cases, the bill is read a third time.

Whereas, throughout our country's history, generations of men and women have answered the call to leave their families, their jobs, and put their futures and even their lives on the line to valiantly defend our nation and its inalienable rights; and

Whereas, for many, that sacrifice has ended in permanent injury or death, yet their spirit remains in the continued preservation of our freedoms and the promise of liberty; and

Whereas, the military has a prominent presence in North Carolina serving as the location of five military bases, a military ocean terminal, and a U.S. Coast Guard base: Fort Bragg; Camp Lejeune Marine Corps Base; Cherry Point Marine Corps Air Station and Naval Air Depot; New River Marine Corps Air Station; Seymour Johnson Air Force Base; Sunny Point Military Ocean Terminal; U.S. Coast Guard Base, Elizabeth City; accounting for over 116,000 active-duty personnel stationed in the State; and

Whereas, over 11,773 North Carolinians serve in the Air and Army National Guard and 11,562 North Carolinians serve in U.S. Army Reserve, U.S. Marine Corps Reserve, U.S. Air Force Reserve, and U.S. Navy Reserve; and

Whereas, nearly 775,000 veterans live in North Carolina, ranking the State eighth in the nation for the number of veterans; and

Whereas, as of 2014, North Carolina had a female veteran population of over 84,070 ranking fifth in the nation; a military retiree population of more than 92,500 ranking sixth in the nation; and a rural veteran population of over 137,350 ranking second in the nation; and

Whereas, the State of North Carolina is committed to the veterans in this State and provides various services and resources, which are all accessible on a Web site maintained by the North Carolina Division of Veterans Affairs in the North Carolina Department of Military and Veterans Affairs; and

Whereas, the Division of Veterans Affairs is working in partnership with other State agencies to provide veterans a "one-stop-shop" experience for services, benefits, or support from federal, State, and nonprofit programs; and

Whereas, the Division of Veterans Affairs is responsible for overseeing the State Service Office, 22 Veterans Service Centers, four State Veterans Homes, and four State Veterans Cemeteries; and

Whereas, the Division of Veterans Affairs also assists, trains, and accredits county veterans service officers in order to create a coordinated network; and

Whereas, the North Carolina Veterans Council, Inc., has for over 25 years represented the interests of all veterans before the North Carolina General Assembly; and

Whereas, the North Carolina Veterans Council, Inc., is composed of representatives of the 11 active veterans organizations, including Military Officers Association of America (MOAA), Fleet Reserve Association, Disabled American Veterans (DAV), American Veterans (AMVETS), American Legion, Vietnam Veterans of America, Military Order of the Purple Heart, Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), Marine Corps League, Department of American EX-POW, and the NC ELKS Association, as an ex officio member; and

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives:

Section 1. The House Select Committee on Strategic Transportation Planning and Long Term Funding Solutions (hereinafter "Committee") is established by the Speaker of the House of Representatives pursuant to G.S. 120-19.6(a1) and Rule 26(a) of the Rules of the House of Representatives of the 2015 General Assembly.

Section 2. The Committee consists of twenty-four members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives. The membership of the Committee shall include legislators as specified below. Members serve at the pleasure of the Speaker of the House of Representatives. The Speaker

of the House of Representatives may dissolve the Committee at any time. Vacancies are filled by the Speaker of the House of Representatives. A Chair, Vice Chair, or other member of the Committee continues to serve until a successor is appointed.

Section 3. The Committee may study any of the following:

- (1) The I-77 Managed Lanes project
- (2) Improvements to the I-95 corridor
- (3) Port modernization
 - A. Development of Radio Island
 - B. New Freight Rail access to the Ports of Morehead and Wilmington
 - C. Dredging
 - D. Economic Development opportunities
- (4) Technological advancements in infrastructure development and construction
- (5) Autonomous Vehicles

- **Section 4.** The Committee shall meet upon the call of the Chair. A quorum of the Committee shall be a majority of its members. No action may be taken except by majority vote at a meeting at which a quorum is present.
- **Section 5.** The Committee, while in the discharge of its official duties, may exercise all powers provided for under G.S. 120-19 and Article 5A of Chapter 120 of the General Statutes. The Committee may contract for professional, clerical, or consultant services, as provided by G.S. 120-32.02.
- **Section 6.** Members of the Committee shall receive per diem, subsistence, and travel allowance as provided in G.S. 120-3.1
- **Section 7.** The expenses of the Committee including per diem, subsistence, travel allowances for Committee members, and contracts for professional or consultant services shall be paid upon the written approval of the Speaker of the House of Representatives pursuant to G.S. 120-32.02(c) and G.S. 120-35 from funds available to the House of Representatives for its operations.
- **Section 8.** The Legislative Services Officer shall assign professional and clerical staff to assist the Committee in its work. The Director of Legislative Assistants of the House of Representatives shall assign clerical support staff to the Committee.
- **Section 9.** The Committee may meet at various locations around the State in order to promote greater public participation in its deliberations.
- **Section 10.** The Committee may submit an interim report on the results of the study, including any proposed legislation, to the members of the House of Representatives at any time. The Committee may submit a final report on the results of its study, including any proposed legislation, to the members of the House of Representatives prior to the convening of the 2017 General Assembly. Reports shall be submitted by filing a copy of the report with the Office of the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the House Principal Clerk, and the Legislative Library. The Committee terminates upon the convening of the 2017 General Assembly, upon the filing of its final report, or by dissolution by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, whichever occurs first.

CONFERENCE COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL 71

S71-PCCS45507-RI-3, A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT TO (1) REQUIRE A COAL COMBUSTION RESIDUALS IMPOUNDMENT OWNER TO PROVIDE PERMANENT ALTERNATIVE WATER SUPPLIES FOR RESIDENTS IN AREAS SURROUNDING COAL COMBUSTION RESIDUALS SURFACE IMPOUNDMENTS; (2) EXTEND THE PERIOD FOR PUBLIC COMMENT AND REVIEW OF PROPOSED RISK CLASSIFICATIONS FOR COAL COMBUSTION RESIDUALS SURFACE IMPOUNDMENTS; AND (3) MODIFY APPOINTMENTS TO THE COAL ASH MANAGEMENT COMMISSION, THE MINING COMMISSION, AND THE OIL AND GAS COMMISSION, IN ACCORD WITH THE HOLDING OF MCCRORY V. BERGER.

Whereas, the Coal Ash Management Act of 2014 required the owner of a coal combustion residuals surface impoundment to sample and analyze the water quality of drinking water supply wells in areas surrounding coal combustion residuals surface impoundments and, if the sampling and water quality analysis indicated that water from a drinking water supply well exceeded groundwater quality standards for constituents associated with the presence of the impoundment, required the owner to replace the contaminated drinking water supply well with an alternate supply of potable drinking water and an alternate supply of water that is safe for other household uses; and

Whereas, the Department of Environmental Quality recently reported that well water of residents living nearby coal ash residuals impoundments met federal requirements for safe drinking water, but the General Assembly nonetheless recognizes that confusion and worry has persisted with these residents in the aftermath of testing conducted by the Department of Environmental Quality and issuance of "do-not-drink advisories" by the Department of Health and Human Services, even after many of these advisories were subsequently withdrawn; and

Whereas, the General Assembly concludes that the owner of a coal combustion residuals surface impoundment should establish permanent alternative water supplies for residents in areas surrounding coal combustion residuals surface impoundments, to alleviate their concerns about availability of clean, safe, pure, and wholesome water; and

Whereas, in 2014 the General Assembly developed and enacted groundbreaking legislation, the Coal Ash Management Act, to comprehensively address the issue of proper management of coal ash residuals

impoundments in the State for the protection of public health, safety, and welfare; the environment; and natural resources; and

Whereas, the Coal Ash Management Act of 2014 set forth closure requirements based on a comprehensive assessment of a site's risk, taking into account a number of factors, including:

- (1) Any hazards to public health, safety, or welfare resulting from the impoundment.
- (2) The structural condition and hazard potential of the impoundment.
- (3) The proximity of surface waters to the impoundment and whether any surface waters are contaminated or threatened by contamination as a result of the impoundment.
- (4) Information concerning the horizontal and vertical extent of soil and groundwater contamination for all contaminants confirmed to be present in groundwater in exceedance of groundwater quality standards and all significant factors affecting contaminant transport.
- (5) The location and nature of all receptors and significant exposure pathways.
- (6) The geological and hydrogeological features influencing the movement and chemical and physical character of the contaminants.
- (7) The amount and characteristics of coal combustion residuals in the impoundment.
- (8) Whether the impoundment is located within an area subject to a 100-year flood; and

Whereas, the Coal Ash Management Act of 2014 conclusively designated eight coal combustion residuals surface impoundments as high-priority, including two impoundments each at the following facilities: the Dan River Steam Station, the Riverbend Steam Station, the Asheville Steam Electric Generating Plant, and the Sutton Plant; and,

Whereas, the Executive Branch agency tasked with developing proposed classifications based on risk, the Department of Environmental Quality, issued proposed classifications on May 18, 2016, which designated all other coal combustion residuals surface impoundments located in the State as intermediate priority; and

Whereas, upon issuance of the proposed classifications, the Department of Environmental Quality requested that the General Assembly allow the Department an additional 18 months to enable the Department to reconsider the proposed classifications, indicating that "work that is already either planned or underway could significantly change the risk posed by the ponds"; and

Whereas, upon issuance of the proposed classifications, the Secretary of Environmental Quality stated that the Coal Ash Management Act of 2014 did "not allow for revisions to the classifications based on new information about a pond's risk to public health and the environment"; and

Whereas, the Secretary of Environmental Quality further stated that "making decisions based on incomplete information could lead to the expenditure of billions of dollars when spending millions now would provide equal or better protection"; and

Whereas, the General Assembly concurs that accurate classification of risk for coal combustion residuals surface impoundments is essential to appropriate management of the impoundments; and

Whereas the General Assembly created the Coal Ash Management Commission as an integral part of the Coal Ash Management Act of 2014 to provide oversight to the Department of Environmental Quality in establishment of risk classifications and closure plans for all coal combustion residuals surface impoundments; and

Whereas, in reviewing a classification proposed by the Department of Environmental Quality, the Coal Ash Management Act of 2014 directed the Coal Ash Management Commission to evaluate all information submitted in accordance with the Coal Ash Management Act of 2014 related to the proposed classifications, and any other information the Coal Ash Management Commission deemed relevant; and

Whereas, in reviewing a classification proposed by the Department of Environmental Quality, the Act directed the Coal Ash Management Commission to approve a proposed classification only if the Commission determined that the classification accurately reflected the level of risk posed by the coal combustion residuals surface impoundment; and

Whereas, a mechanism existed under the Coal Ash Management Act of 2014, as enacted, to allow sufficient time for the State to properly assess accurate risk for impoundments given that the Act (i) authorized the Commission to consider all information submitted pursuant to the law, and any other information the Commission deemed relevant, (ii) required that the Commission approve plans that accurately reflected the level of risk posed by an impoundment, and (iii) established no deadline for the Commission to issue final approval of an accurate classification; and

Whereas, closure methods under the Coal Ash Management Act of 2014 cannot be developed, approved, or implemented until accurate risk classifications for the impoundments have been finalized; and

Whereas, the General Assembly believes addressing the issue of proper management of coal combustion residuals surface impoundments is too pressing to grant a blanket extension of finalization of risk classifications of the impoundments for 18 months, while recognizing that accurate classifications of impoundments is imperative for timely and proper closure of coal ash impoundments; and

Whereas, the General Assembly established the Coal Ash Management Commission in 2014, to be comprised of individuals qualified with particular experience and expertise, including requirements for appointments of individuals who are representatives of an electric membership corporation or that have a background in power supply resource planning and

engineering, individuals that have experience in economic development, and individuals that have expertise in determining and evaluating the costs associated with electricity generation and establishing the rates associated with electricity consumption, in order to facilitate thorough examination and sound decision making on complex and wide-reaching issues surrounding coal ash management, facets of which are beyond the jurisdictional responsibilities of the Department of Environmental Quality; and

Whereas, in *McCrory v. Berger*, the North Carolina Supreme Court expressed concerns that the General Assembly retained a majority of appointments to the Coal Ash Management Commission under the Coal Ash Management Act of 2014 and held the appointments provisions violated the separation of powers clause of the Constitution of North Carolina; but stated that "the appointments clause does not prohibit the General Assembly from appointing statutory officers, and the General Assembly can appoint them in many instances"; and

Whereas, the Court expressed other separation of powers concerns that although the Coal Ash Management Commission was administratively located within the Division of Emergency Management of the Department of Public Safety, the Commission was directed to exercise all of its power and duties independently and was not subject to the supervision, direction, or control of the Division or Department; and

Whereas, Section 5 of Article III of the North Carolina Constitution ascribes to the General Assembly the power to assign functions, powers, and duties to the Executive Branch; and

Whereas, in accord with the authority given to it under Section 5 of Article III of the North Carolina Constitution, the General Assembly enacted the Coal Ash Management Commission, and other statutorily created commissions, with varying functions, powers, and duties; and

Whereas, Section 11 of Article III of the North Carolina Constitution provides that all administrative departments, agencies, and offices of the State and their respective functions, powers, and duties shall be allocated by law, and further provides that regulatory, quasi-judicial, and temporary agencies may, but need not, be allocated within a principal department; and

Whereas, allocations of the functions, powers, and duties of administrative agencies, by law, is the province and responsibility of the General Assembly through the aforementioned provisions of the Constitution of North Carolina and Article II of the State's Constitution establishing the purpose and power of the legislative branch; and

Whereas, the General Assembly intends to reconstitute the membership of the Coal Ash Management Commission in accord with the Court's holding so that the authority of the Coal Ash Management Commission established in 2014 to finalize accurate risk classifications.

based on evaluation of all information the Commission deems necessary to achieve accurate classifications, can be exercised without further delay for the protection of public health, safety, and welfare; the environment; or natural resources for the benefit of all citizens of North Carolina; and

Whereas, the Court also expressed concerns that the General Assembly retained a majority of appointments to the Oil and Gas Commission and the Mining Commission and held the appointments provisions violated the separation of powers clause of the Constitution of North Carolina but stated that "the appointments clause does not prohibit the General Assembly from appointing statutory officers, and the General Assembly can appoint them in many instances"; and

Whereas, the General Assembly intends to reconstitute the membership of the Oil and Gas Commission and the Mining Commission in accordance with the Court's holding; Now, therefore,

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1.(a) G.S. 130A-309.211 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

"(c1) Provision of Permanent Water Supply. - As soon as practicable, but no later than October 1, 2017, the owner of a coal combustion residuals surface impoundment shall execute a memorandum of agreement or other binding agreement with the Department of Environmental Quality to establish permanent replacement water supplies for (i) each household that has a drinking water supply well located within one-half mile radius from the established compliance boundary of a coal combustion residuals impoundment, and is not separated from the impoundment by the mainstem of a river, as that term is defined under G.S. 143-215.22G, or other body of water that would prevent the migration of contaminants through groundwater from the impoundment to a well and (ii) each household that has a drinking water supply well that is located in an area in which contamination resulting from constituents associated with the presence of a coal combustion residuals impoundment is expected to migrate, as demonstrated by groundwater modeling, and hydrogeologic, geologic, and geotechnical investigations of the site, conducted in accordance with the requirements of G.S. 130A-309.214(a)(4) and the results of other modeling or investigations that are submitted pursuant to G.S. 130A-309.213(b)(4). Preference shall be given to permanent replacement water supplies by connection to public water supplies; however, if the State Water Infrastructure Authority determines that connection to a public water supply to a particular household would be cost-prohibitive, the State Water Infrastructure Authority shall authorize provision of a permanent replacement water supply to that household through installation of a filtration system. For households for which filtration systems are installed, the impoundment owner shall be responsible for periodic required maintenance of the filtration system. No later than September 1, 2017, an impoundment owner shall submit information on permanent replacement water supplies proposed to be provided to each household to the State Water Infrastructure Authority, including, at a minimum, the type of permanent water supply proposed; the location of the household and its proximity to the nearest connection point to a public water supply; projected cost of the permanent water supply option proposed for the household; and if proposing to connect to a public water supply, a binding written agreement with that public water supplier. Projects involving permanent replacement water supplies by connection to public water supplies shall be deemed approved for this purpose. Nothing in this section shall be construed to obviate the need for other federal, State, and local permits and approvals. The Department of Environmental Quality shall expedite any State permits and approvals required for such projects. For projects involving installation of a filtration system, the State Water Infrastructure Authority shall evaluate information submitted by the impoundment owner to determine whether connection to a public water supply is cost-prohibitive and render a decision to approve or disapprove the plan, including written findings of fact, no later than December 1, 2017."

SECTION 1.(b) This section is effective when it becomes law. Requirements for establishment of a permanent alternative water supply under subsection (a) of this section shall apply only to households with drinking water supply wells in existence on the date this act becomes effective.

SECTION 1.1.(a) G.S. 130A-309.214 reads as rewritten: "§ 130A-309.214. Closure of coal combustion residuals surface impoundments.

(g) Notwithstanding any other requirement for closure under this section or Part, no later than December 1, 2016, an impoundment owner shall submit plans to the Department of Environmental Quality to make at least 2.5 million tons of coal combustion residuals per year available for beneficial use for addition to concrete. At least fifty percent (50%) of the coal combustion residuals made available for beneficial use shall be removed from the current inventory of coal combustion residuals. Facilities that are receiving or have received coal combustion residuals from other sites will be the sites from which the coal combustion residuals inventory will be used first. No later than June 1, 2018, an impoundment owner shall begin to supply such coal combustion residuals for beneficial use in accordance with this subsection."

SECTION 1.1.(b) This section is effective when it becomes law. **SECTION 2.(a)** G.S. 130A-309.202 reads as rewritten:

"§ 130A-309.202. Coal Ash Management Commission.

(a) Creation. - In recognition of the complexity and magnitude of the issues associated with the management of coal combustion residuals and the proper closure and remediation of coal combustion residuals surface impoundments, the Coal Ash Management Commission is hereby established.

- (b) Membership. The Commission shall consist of nine members as follows:
 - (1) One appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate in accordance with G.S. 120 121 who shall at the time of appointment be a resident of the State.
 - (2) One appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate in accordance with G.S. 120 121 who shall at the time of appointment have special training or scientific expertise in waste management, including solid waste disposal, hauling, or beneficial use.
 - (3) One appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate in accordance with G.S. 120-121 who shall at the time of appointment be a licensed physician or a person with experience in public health.
 - (4) One appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives in accordance with G.S. 120 121 who shall at the time of appointment be a member of a nongovernmental conservation interest.
 - (5) One appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives in accordance with G.S. 120 121 who shall at the time of appointment have special training or scientific expertise in waste management, including solid waste disposal, hauling, or beneficial use, or is a representative of or on the faculty of a State college or university that conducts coal ash research.
 - (6) One appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives in accordance with G.S. 120 121 who shall at the time of appointment be a representative of an electric membership corporation organized under Article 2 of Chapter 117 of the General Statutes and have a background in power supply resource planning and engineering.
 - (7) One appointed by the Governor who shall at the time of appointment have experience in economic development.
 - (8) One appointed by the Governor who shall at the time of appointment have expertise in determining and evaluating the costs associated with electricity generation and establishing the rates associated with electricity consumption.
 - (9) One appointed by the Governor who shall at the time of appointment be a person with experience in science or engineering in the manufacturing sector.

- (b1) Membership. The Commission shall consist of seven members as follows:
 - (1) One appointed by the Governor subject to confirmation by the General Assembly, who shall at the time of appointment have special training or scientific expertise in waste management, including solid waste disposal, hauling, or beneficial use.

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- (2) One appointed by the Governor subject to confirmation by the General Assembly, who shall at the time of appointment be a licensed physician or a person with experience in public health.
- (3) One appointed by the Governor subject to confirmation by the General Assembly, who shall at the time of appointment be a representative of an electric membership corporation organized under Article 2 of Chapter 117 of the General Statutes and have a background in power supply resource planning and engineering.
- (4) One appointed by the Governor subject to confirmation by the General Assembly, who shall at the time of appointment have expertise in determining and evaluating the costs associated with electricity generation and establishing the rates associated with electricity consumption.
- (5) One appointed by the Governor subject to confirmation by the General Assembly, who shall at the time of appointment be a person with experience in science or engineering in hydrology or geology.
- (6) One appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives in accordance with G.S. 120-121, who is a representative of a nongovernmental conservation interest.
- (7) One appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate in accordance with G.S. 120-121, who shall at the time of appointment be a resident of the State.
- (b2) Process for Appointments by the Governor. The Governor shall transmit to the presiding officers of the Senate and the House of Representatives, within four weeks of the convening of the session of the General Assembly in the year for which the terms in question are to expire, the names of the persons to be appointed by the Governor and submitted to the General Assembly for confirmation by joint resolution. If an appointment is required pursuant to this subsection when the General Assembly is not in session, the member may be appointed and serve on an interim basis pending confirmation by the General Assembly. For the purpose of this subsection, the General Assembly is not in session only (i) prior to convening of the regular session, (ii) during any adjournment of the regular session for more than 10 days, or (iii) after sine die adjournment of the Regular Session.

- (c) Chair. The Governor shall appoint the Chair of the Commission from among the Commission's members, and that person shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor. The Chair shall serve two-year terms. The Governor shall make:
 - (1) The initial appointment of the Chair no later than October 1, 2014. July 1, 2016. If the initial appointment is not made by that date, the Chair shall be elected by a vote of the membership; and
 - (2) Appointments of a subsequent Chair, including appointments to fill a vacancy of the Chair created by resignation, dismissal, death, or disability of the Chair, no later than 30 days after the last day of the previous Chair's term. If an appointment of a subsequent Chair is not made by that date, the Chair shall be elected by a vote of the membership.
- (d) Vacancies. Any appointment to fill a vacancy on the Commission created by the resignation, dismissal, death, or disability of a member shall be for the balance of the unexpired term. The Governor may reappoint a gubernatorial appointee of the Commission to an additional term if, at the time of the reappointment, the member qualifies for membership on the Commission under subdivisions (7) through (9) of subsection (b) of this section. In case of death, incapacity, resignation, or vacancy for any other reason in the office of any member appointed by the Governor, prior to the expiration of the member's term of office, the name of the successor shall be submitted by the Governor within four weeks after the vacancy arises to the General Assembly for confirmation by the General Assembly. In case of death, incapacity, resignation, or vacancy for any other reason in the office of any member appointed Appointments by the General Assembly Assembly, shall be made in accordance with G.S. 120-121, and vacancies in those appointments shall be filled in accordance with G.S. 120-122. If a vacancy arises or exists when the General Assembly is not in session, and the appointment is deemed urgent by the Governor, the member may be appointed by the Governor and serve on an interim basis pending confirmation or appointment by the General Assembly, as applicable. An appointment to fill a vacancy shall be for the unexpired balance of the term.
- (e) Removal. The Governor shall have the power to remove any member of the Commission from office for misfeasance, malfeasance, or nonfeasance in accordance with the provisions of G.S. 143B-13 of the Executive Organization Act of 1973.
- (f) Powers and Duties. The Commission shall have all of the following powers and duties:
 - (1) To review and approve the classification of coal combustion residuals surface impoundments required by G.S. 130A-309.213.
 - (2) To review and approve Coal Combustion Residuals Surface Impoundment Closure Plans as provided in G.S. 130A-309.214.

- (3) To review and make recommendations on the provisions of this Part and other statutes and rules related to the management of coal combustion residuals.
- (4) To undertake any additional studies as requested by the General Assembly.
- (g) Reimbursement. The members of the Commission shall receive per diem and necessary travel and subsistence expenses in accordance with the provisions of G.S. 138-5.
- (h) Quorum. Five Four members of the Commission Commission, at least three of whom must be gubernatorial appointees, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
- (i) Staff. The Commission is authorized and empowered to employ staff as the Commission may determine to be necessary for the proper discharge of the Commission's duties and responsibilities. The Chair of the Commission shall organize and direct the work of the Commission staff. The salaries and compensation of all such personnel shall be fixed in the manner provided by law for fixing and regulating salaries and compensation by other State agencies. The Chair, within allowed budgetary limits and as allowed by law, shall authorize and approve travel, subsistence, and related expenses of such personnel incurred while traveling on official business. All State agencies, including the constituent institutions of The University of North Carolina, shall provide information and support to the Commission upon request.
 - (j) Repealed by Session Laws 2015-9, s. 1.1, effective April 27, 2015.
- (k) Covered Persons; Conflicts of Interest; Disclosure. All members of the Commission are covered persons for the purposes of Chapter 138A of the General Statutes, the State Government Ethics Act. As covered persons, members of the Commission shall comply with the applicable requirements of the State Government Ethics Act, including mandatory training, the public disclosure of economic interests, and ethical standards for covered persons. Members of the Commission shall comply with the provisions of the State Government Ethics Act to avoid conflicts of interest. The Governor may require additional disclosure of potential conflicts of interest by members. The Governor may promulgate criteria regarding conflicts of interest and disclosure thereof for determining the eligibility of persons under this subsection, giving due regard to the requirements of federal legislation, and, for this purpose, may promulgate rules, regulations, or guidelines in conformance with those established by any federal agency interpreting and applying provisions of federal law.
- (l) Meetings. The Commission shall meet at least once every two months and may hold special meetings at any time and place within the State at the call of the Chair or upon the written request of at least five members.
- (m) Reports. The Commission shall submit quarterly written reports as to its operation, activities, programs, and progress to the Environmental Review Commission. The Commission shall supplement the written reports

required by this subsection with additional written and oral reports as may be requested by the Environmental Review Commission. The Commission shall submit the written reports required by this subsection whether or not the General Assembly is in session at the time the report is due.

- (n) Administrative Location; Independence. Location. The Commission shall be administratively located in the Division of Emergency Management of the Department of Public Safety. Safety, the head of which is the Secretary of Public Safety, who, as provided in G.S. 143B-602, has powers and duties as delegated to the Secretary by the Governor and conferred on the Secretary by the Constitution and laws of this State. The Commission shall exercise all of its powers and duties independently and shall not be subject to the supervision, direction, or control of the Division or Department.
- (o) Terms of Members. Members of the Commission shall serve terms of six-four years, beginning effective July 1-January 1 of the year of appointment appointment, and terminate on December 31 of the year of expiration. At the expiration of each member's term, the appointing authority shall replace the member with a new member of like qualifications for a term of four years. A member shall continue to serve until the member's successor is duly confirmed and qualified but such holdover shall not affect the expiration date of such succeeding term. In order to establish regularly overlapping terms, initial appointments shall be made effective June 1, 2016, or as soon as feasible thereafter, and expire as follows:
 - (1) The initial appointments made by the Governor:
 - <u>a.</u> Pursuant to subdivision (b1)(1) of this section shall expire December 31, 2020.
 - b. Pursuant to subdivision (b1)(2) of this section shall expire December 31, 2020.
 - Pursuant to subdivision (b1)(3) of this section shall expire December 31, 2020.
 - <u>d.</u> Pursuant to subdivision (b1)(4) of this section shall expire December 31, 2019.
 - <u>Pursuant to subdivision (b1)(5) of this section shall expire</u>
 <u>December 31, 2019.</u>
 - (2) The initial appointment made by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives pursuant to subdivision (b1)(6) of this section shall expire December 31, 2018.
 - (3) The initial appointment made by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate pursuant to subdivision (b1)(7) of this section shall expire December 31, 2018."

SECTION 2.(b) G.S. 130A-309.213 reads as rewritten:

"§ 130A-309.213. Prioritization of coal combustion residuals surface impoundments.

- (a) As soon as practicable, but no later than December 31, 2015, the Department shall develop proposed classifications for all coal combustion residuals surface impoundments, including active and retired sites, for the purpose of closure and remediation based on these sites' risks to public health, safety, and welfare; the environment; and natural resources and shall determine a schedule for closure and required remediation that is based on the degree of risk to public health, safety, and welfare; the environment; and natural resources posed by the impoundments and that gives priority to the closure and required remediation of impoundments that pose the greatest risk. In assessing the risk, the Department shall evaluate information received pursuant to G.S. 130A-309.211 and G.S. 130A-309.212 and any other information deemed relevant and, at a minimum, consider all of the following:
 - (1) Any hazards to public health, safety, or welfare resulting from the impoundment.
 - (2) The structural condition and hazard potential of the impoundment.
 - (3) The proximity of surface waters to the impoundment and whether any surface waters are contaminated or threatened by contamination as a result of the impoundment.
 - (4) Information concerning the horizontal and vertical extent of soil and groundwater contamination for all contaminants confirmed to be present in groundwater in exceedance of groundwater quality standards and all significant factors affecting contaminant transport.
 - (5) The location and nature of all receptors and significant exposure pathways.
 - (6) The geological and hydrogeological features influencing the movement and chemical and physical character of the contaminants.
 - (7) The amount and characteristics of coal combustion residuals in the impoundment.
 - (8) Whether the impoundment is located within an area subject to a 100-year flood.
 - (9) Any other factor the Department deems relevant to establishment of risk.
- (b) The Department shall issue a proposed classification for each coal combustion residuals surface impoundment based upon the assessment conducted pursuant to subsection (a) of this section as high-risk, intermediaterisk, or low-risk. Within 30 days after a proposed classification has been issued, the Department shall issue a written declaration, including findings of fact, documenting the proposed classification. The Department shall provide for public participation on the proposed risk classification as follows:
 - (1) The Department shall make copies of the written declaration issued pursuant to this subsection available for inspection as follows:

- A copy of the declaration shall be provided to the local health director.
- b. A copy of the declaration shall be provided to the public library located in closest proximity to the site in the county or counties in which the site is located.
- c. The Department shall post a copy of the declaration on the Department's Web site.
- d. The Department shall place copies of the declaration in other locations so as to assure the reasonable availability thereof to the public.
- (2) The Department shall give notice of the written declaration issued pursuant to this subsection as follows:
 - a. A notice and summary of the declaration shall be published weekly for a period of three consecutive weeks in a newspaper having general circulation in the county or counties where the site is located.
 - b. Notice of the written declaration shall be given by firstclass mail to persons who have requested such notice. Such notice shall include a summary of the written declaration and state the locations where a copy of the written declaration is available for inspection. The Department shall maintain a mailing list of persons who request notice pursuant to this section.
 - c. Notice of the written declaration shall be given by electronic mail to persons who have requested such notice. Such notice shall include a summary of the written declaration and state the locations where a copy of the written declaration is available for inspection. The Department shall maintain a mailing list of persons who request notice pursuant to this section.
- (3) No later than 60 days after issuance of the written declaration, the Department shall conduct a public meeting in the county or counties in which the site is located to explain the written declaration to the public. The Department shall give notice of the hearing at least 15 days prior to the date thereof by all of the following methods:
 - a. Publication as provided in subdivision (1) of this subsection, with first publication to occur not less than 30 days prior to the scheduled date of the hearing.
 - b. First-class mail to persons who have requested notice as provided in subdivision (2) of this subsection.
 - c. Electronic mail to persons who have requested notice as provided in subdivision (2) of this subsection.

- (4) At least 30 days from the latest date on which notice is provided pursuant to subdivision (2) of this subsection shall be allowed for the receipt of written comment on the written declaration prior to issuance of a final risk classification. At least 20 days will be allowed for receipt of written comment following a hearing conducted pursuant to subdivision (3) of this subsection prior to issuance of a final risk classification.
- (c) Within 30 days of the receipt After receipt of all written comment as required by subdivision (4) of subsection (b) of this section, the Department shall submit a proposed classification for a coal combustion residuals surface impoundment to the Coal Ash Management Commission established pursuant to G.S. 130A 309.202. G.S. 130A-309.202 as soon as legally practicable but no later than 10 days after all appointments have been made pursuant to G.S. 130A-309.202(b1). The Commission shall evaluate all information submitted in accordance with this Part related to the proposed elassification classification, including memorandums of agreement or other binding agreements to provide permanent replacement water supplies in accordance with the requirements of G.S. 130A-309.211 to reduce potential risks to public health, safety, and welfare, and any other information the Commission deems relevant. The Commission shall only approve the proposed classification if it determines that the classification was developed in accordance with this section and that the classification accurately reflects the level of risk posed by the coal combustion residuals surface impoundment. The Commission shall issue its determination in writing, including findings in support of its determination, determination, which shall constitute a final decision of the Commission for purposes of an appeal under Article 3 of Chapter 150B of the General Statutes. If the Commission, appointed as provided by G.S. 130A-309.202(b1), fails to act on a proposed classification within 60-120 days of receipt of the proposed classification, the proposed classification shall be deemed approved. disapproved. If a proposed classification is deemed disapproved on the basis that a final decision, including a written determination with findings of facts, has not been issued by the Commission prior to expiration of the 120-day period, the Commission may extend the deadline for no more than 120 days if necessary for adequate review of a proposed classification. Parties aggrieved by a final decision of the Commission pursuant to this subsection may appeal the decision as provided under Article 3 of Chapter 150B of the General Statutes. A classification deemed disapproved as a result of the Commission's failure to act within the 120day review period, and, if applicable, a subsequent 120-day review period resulting from an extension issued by the Commission to allow additional review shall not constitute a final decision of the Commission for purposes of an appeal under Article 3 of Chapter 150B of the General Statutes."

SECTION 2.(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 130A-309.202(b2) and G.S. 130A-309.202(o), as enacted and amended by Section 2(a) of this act, no later than 30 days after the date this act becomes law, the Governor shall transmit to the presiding officers of the Senate and the House of Representatives, the names of the persons nominated by the Governor for appointment to the Coal Ash Management Commission pursuant to G.S. 130A-309.202(b1), as enacted by Section 2(a) of this act, for confirmation by the General Assembly by joint resolution.

SECTION 2.(d) Notwithstanding G.S. 130A-309.213(c) and G.S. 130A-309.214(d), the Environmental Management Commission shall assume all powers and duties for review and approval of proposed classifications for all coal combustion residuals surface impoundments and closure plans for all coal combustion residuals surface impoundments pursuant to those sections, if (i) upon expiration of the period established for public comment set forth in Section 2(f) of this act, the Coal Ash Management Commission has not been appointed as provided by G.S. 130A-309.202(b1), as enacted by Section 2(a) of this act, or (ii) if at any point a court of competent jurisdiction issues a temporary or permanent order enjoining the authority, operation, or activities of the Coal Ash Management Commission appointed as provided by G.S. 130A-309.202(b1), as enacted by Section 2(a) of this act, or issues any other decision or order that prevents the Commission from carrying out its statutory duties.

SECTION 2.(e) No classification for any coal combustion residuals surface impoundment, regardless of when such classification was issued, shall be construed to be deemed approved or final, or implemented as such by the Department of Environmental Quality, until the classification is approved by the (i) Coal Ash Management Commission, as appointed pursuant to G.S. 130A-309.202(b1), as enacted by Section 2(a) of this act, or (ii) the Environmental Management Commission, if applicable, pursuant to Section 2(d) of this act.

SECTION 2.(f) Notwithstanding G.S. 130A-309.213, the Department of Environmental Quality shall do all of the following:

(1) Extend the period for receipt of public comment on the written declarations for proposed classifications for all coal combustion residuals surface impoundments until August 1, 2016, consider any comments, information, and data received during this period, including memorandums of agreement or other binding agreements to provide permanent replacement water supplies in accordance with the requirements of G.S. 130A-309.211, as amended by Section 1(a) of this act, to reduce potential risks to public health, safety, and welfare; and incorporate any comments, information, and data necessary for issuance of a classification that accurately reflects the level of risk posed by the coal combustion residuals surface impoundment.

(2) No later than September 1, 2016, submit a proposed classification for review and approval to the (i) Coal Ash Management Commission, as appointed pursuant to G.S. 130A-309.202(b1), as enacted by subsection (a) of this section, or (ii) the Environmental Management Commission, if applicable, pursuant to subsection (d) of this section.

SECTION 2.(g) Up to five receipt-supported positions are created in the Division of Emergency Management of the Department of Public Safety to carry out the duties in G.S. 130A-309.202. There is appropriated a sum of up to four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) to the Coal Ash Management Commission from the Coal Combustion Residuals Management Fund cash balance on June 30, 2016, to fund said positions or for the purpose of executing contractual arrangements for engineering or other consulting services the Commission determines are necessary or advisable to render requisite information and expertise on coal ash management issues or otherwise support the Commission's work. The positions shall be used to provide assistance to the Coal Ash Management Commission established by G.S. 130A-309.202, as enacted by Section 2(a) of this act. The Division of Emergency Management in the Department of Public Safety shall consult with the Chair of the Commission in hiring the staff for the Coal Ash Management Commission. The Division of Emergency Management in the Department of Public Safety shall provide support to the Commission until the staff of the Commission is hired, including the designation of an individual to serve as an interim executive director of the staff. Provided, however, that if the Environmental Management Commission assumes all powers and duties for review and approval of proposed classifications for all coal combustion residuals surface impoundments and closure plans for all coal combustion residuals surface impoundments pursuant to Section 2(d) of this act, then funds to be appropriated pursuant to this section shall instead be appropriated to the Environmental Management Commission, which funds shall be used solely to support the work of the Commission to review and approve proposed classifications and proposed closure plans.

- (2) The initial appointment made by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives pursuant to subdivision (a1)(7) of this section shall expire December 31, 2018.
- (3) The initial appointment made by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate pursuant to subdivision (a1)(8) of this section shall expire December 31, 2018.
- (c) Vacancies. In case of death, incapacity, resignation, or vacancy for any other reason in the office of any member appointed by the Governor, prior to the expiration of the member's term of office, the name of the successor shall be submitted by the Governor within four weeks after the vacancy arises to the General Assembly for confirmation by the General Assembly. In case of death, incapacity, resignation, or vacancy for any other reason in the office of any member appointed by the General Assembly, vacancies in those appointments shall be filled in accordance with G.S. 120-122. If a vacancy arises or exists when the General Assembly is not in session, and the appointment is deemed urgent by the Governor, the member may be appointed by the Governor and serve on an interim basis pending confirmation or appointment by the General Assembly, as applicable. An appointment to fill a vacancy shall be for the unexpired balance of the term.
- (d) Removal. The Governor may remove any member of the Commission from office for misfeasance, malfeasance, or nonfeasance in accordance with the provisions of G.S. 143B-13.

- (e) Compensation. The members of the Commission shall receive per diem and necessary traveling and subsistence expenses in accordance with the provisions of G.S. 138-5.
- (f) Quorum. A majority of the Commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
- (g) Staff. All clerical and other services required by the Commission shall be supplied by the Secretary of Environmental Quality."

SECTION 3.(b) Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 143B-291(a2) and G.S. 143B-291(b), as enacted and amended by Section 3(a) of this act, no later than 30 days after the date this act becomes law, the Governor shall transmit to the presiding officers of the Senate and the House of Representatives the names of the persons nominated by the Governor for appointment to the Mining Commission pursuant to G.S. 143B-291(a1), as enacted by Section 3(a) of this act, for confirmation by the General Assembly by joint resolution. Upon failure of the Governor to submit names as provided herein by December 1, 2016, the Lieutenant Governor shall make such appointments, and if such appointments made by the Lieutenant Governor occur when the General Assembly is not in session, the member may be appointed and serve on an interim basis pending confirmation by the General Assembly.

SECTION 3.(c) This section is effective when it becomes law. **SECTION 4.(a)** G.S. 143B-293.2 reads as rewritten:

"§ 143B-293.2. North Carolina Oil and Gas Commission - members; selection; removal; compensation; quorum; services.

- (a) Repealed by Session Laws 2014-4, s. 4(a), effective July 31, 2015.
- (a1) Members Selection. The North Carolina Oil and Gas Commission shall consist of nine members appointed as follows:
 - (1) One appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives—Governor subject to confirmation by the General Assembly who, at the time of initial appointment, is an elected official of a municipal government located in a region of North Carolina that has oil and gas potential. A person serving in this seat may complete a term on the Commission even if the person is no longer serving as an elected official of a municipal government but may not be reappointed to a subsequent term.
 - (2) One appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives in accordance with G.S. 120-121, who shall be a geologist with experience in oil and gas exploration and development.
 - (3) One appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives in accordance with G.S. 120-121, who is a member representative of a nongovernmental conservation interest.

- (4) One appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate Governor subject to confirmation by the General Assembly who, at the time of initial appointment, is a member of a county board of commissioners of a county located in a region of North Carolina that has oil and gas potential. A person serving in this seat may complete a term on the Commission even if the person is no longer serving as county commissioner but may not be reappointed to a subsequent term.
- (5) One appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate <u>in accordance with G.S. 120-121</u>, who is a <u>memberrepresentative</u> of a nongovernmental conservation interest.
- (6) One appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate <u>in accordance with G.S. 120-121</u>, who shall be an engineer with experience in oil and gas exploration and development.
- (7) One appointed by the Governor <u>subject to confirmation by the General Assembly</u>, who shall be a representative of a publicly traded natural gas company.
- (8) One appointed by the Governor <u>subject to confirmation by the General Assembly</u>, who shall be a licensed attorney with experience in legal matters associated with oil and gas exploration and development.
- (9) One appointed by the Governor <u>subject to confirmation by the General Assembly</u>, with experience in matters related to public health.
- (a2) Process for Appointments by the Governor. The Governor shall transmit to the presiding officers of the Senate and the House of Representatives, within four weeks of the convening of the session of the General Assembly in the year for which the terms in question are to expire, the names of the persons to be appointed by the Governor and submitted to the General Assembly for confirmation by joint resolution. If an appointment is required pursuant to this subsection when the General Assembly is not in session, the member may be appointed and serve on an interim basis pending confirmation by the General Assembly. For the purpose of this subsection, the General Assembly is not in session only (i) prior to convening of the regular session, (ii) during any adjournment of the regular session for more than 10 days, or (iii) after sine die adjournment of the regular session.
- (b) Terms. The term of office of members of the Commission is three years.four years, beginning effective January 1 of the year of appointment and terminating on December 31 of the year of expiration. A member may be reappointed to no more than two consecutive three-year four-year terms. The term of a member who no longer meets the qualifications of their

respective appointment, as set forth in subsection (a)(a1) of this section, shall terminate but the member may continue to serve until a new member who meets the qualifications is appointed. The terms of members appointed under subdivisions (1), (4), and (7) of subsection (a1) of this section shall expire on June 30 of years evenly divisible by three. The terms of members appointed under subdivisions (2), (5), and (8) of subsection (a1) of this section shall expire on June 30 of years that precede by one year those years that are evenly divisible by three. The terms of members appointed under subdivisions (3), (6), and (9) of subsection (a1) of this section shall expire on June 30 of years that follow by one year those years that are evenly divisible by three. In order to establish regularly overlapping terms, initial appointments shall be made effective June 1, 2016, or as soon as feasible thereafter, and expire as follows:

- (1) The initial appointments made by the Governor:
 - a. Pursuant to subdivision (a1)(1) of this section shall expire December 31, 2020.
 - b. Pursuant to subdivision (a1)(4) of this section shall expire December 31, 2020.
 - <u>Pursuant to subdivision (a1)(7) of this section shall expire</u>
 <u>December 31, 2020.</u>
 - d. Pursuant to subdivision (a1)(8) of this section shall expire December 31, 2019.
 - e. <u>Pursuant to subdivision (a1)(9) of this section shall expire</u> December 31, 2019.
- (2) The initial appointments made by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives:
 - a. Pursuant to subdivision (a1)(2) of this section shall expire December 31, 2018.
 - b. Pursuant to subdivision (a1)(3) of this section shall expire December 31, 2019.
- (3) The initial appointments made by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate:
 - <u>a.</u> Pursuant to subdivision (a1)(5) of this section shall expire <u>December 31, 2018.</u>
 - b. Pursuant to subdivision (a1)(6) of this section shall expire December 31, 2019.
- (c) Vacancies; Removal from Office. Vacancies. In case of death, incapacity, resignation, or vacancy for any other reason in the office of any member appointed by the Governor, prior to the expiration of the member's term of office, the name of the successor shall be submitted by the Governor within four weeks after the vacancy arises to the General Assembly for confirmation by the General Assembly. In case of death, incapacity, resignation, or vacancy for any other reason in the office of any member appointed by the General Assembly, vacancies in those appointments shall be filled in accordance with G.S. 120-122. If a vacancy arises or exists when the General Assembly is not in session, and the appointment is

deemed urgent by the Governor, the member may be appointed by the Governor and serve on an interim basis pending confirmation or appointment by the General Assembly, as applicable. An appointment to fill a vacancy shall be for the unexpired balance of the term.

(c1) Removal. -

- (1) Any appointment by the Governor to fill a vacancy on the Commission created by the resignation, dismissal, death, or disability of a member shall be for the balance of the unexpired term. The Governor shall have the power to remove any member of the Commission from office for misfeasance, malfeasance, or nonfeasance in accordance with the provisions of G.S. 143B-13 of the Executive Organization Act of 1973.
- (2) Members appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be made in accordance with G.S. 120 121, and vacancies in those appointments shall be filled in accordance with G.S. 120-122. In accordance with Section 10 of Article VI of the North Carolina Constitution, a member may continue to serve until a successor is duly appointed.
- (d) Compensation. The members of the Commission shall receive per diem and necessary traveling and subsistence expenses in accordance with the provisions of G.S. 138-5.
- (e) Quorum. A majority of the Commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
- (f) Staff. All staff support required by the Commission shall be supplied by the Division of Energy, Mineral, and Land Resources and the North Carolina Geological Survey.
- (g) Committees. In addition to the Committee on Civil Penalty Remissions required to be established under G.S. 143B-293.6, the chair may establish other committees from members of the Commission to address specific issues as appropriate. No member of a committee may hear or vote on any matter in which the member has an economic interest. A majority of a committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.
- (h) Office May Be Held Concurrently With Others. Membership on the Oil and Gas Commission is hereby declared to be an office that may be held concurrently with other elective or appointive offices in addition to the maximum number of offices permitted to be held by one person under G.S. 128-1.1."
- **SECTION 4.(b)** Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 143B-293.2(a1) and G.S. 143B-293.2(b), as enacted and amended by Section 4(a) of this act, no later than 30 days after the date this act becomes law the Governor shall transmit to the presiding officers of the Senate and the House of Representatives, the names of the persons nominated by the Governor for appointment to the Oil and Gas Commission pursuant to G.S. 143B-293.2(a1), as enacted by Section 4(a) of this act, for confirmation by the General Assembly by joint resolution. Upon failure of the Governor to submit names as provided herein by December 1, 2016, the Lieutenant Governor shall make such appointments, and if such appointments made by

the Lieutenant Governor occur when the General Assembly is not in session, the member may be appointed and serve on an interim basis pending confirmation by the General Assembly.

SECTION 4.(c) For purposes of the rules set forth in 15A NCAC 05H (Oil and Gas Conservation Rules), modifications made to the Oil and Gas Commission under Section 4(a) of this act shall, pursuant to G.S. 150B-21.7, be construed to (1) have repealed authority to adopt such rules given to previously constituted commissions and (2) transferred the authority to adopt such rules to the Oil and Gas Commission as modified by Section 4(a) of this act. Therefore, pursuant to G.S. 150B-21.7, rules set forth in 15A NCAC 05H (Oil and Gas Conservation Rules) shall be effective until the Oil and Gas Commission, as modified Section 4(a) of this act, amends or repeals the rules.

SECTION 4.(d) This section is effective when it becomes law.

SECTION 5. The provisions of this act shall be severable, and if any phrase, clause, sentence, or provision is declared to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, the validity of the remainder of this act shall not be affected thereby.

SECTION 6. Except as otherwise provided, this act is effective when it becomes law.
