Our office has received Reverend Pearl E. Burris-Floyd's 2022 Statement of Economic Interest as a member of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors (the "Board"). We have reviewed it for actual and potential conflicts of interest pursuant to Chapter 138A of the North Carolina General Statutes ("N.C.G.S."), also known as the State Government Ethics Act (the "Act").

Compliance with the Act and avoidance of conflicts of interest in the performance of public duties are the responsibilities of every covered person, regardless of this letter's contents. This letter, meanwhile, is not meant to impugn the integrity of the covered person in any way. This letter is required by N.C.G.S. § 138A-28(a) and is designed to educate the covered person as to potential issues that could merit particular attention. Advice on compliance with the Act is available to certain public servants and legislative employees under N.C.G.S. § 138A-13.

We did not find an actual conflict of interest or the likelihood for a conflict of interest.

Chapter 116 of the North Carolina General Statutes provides for the development of a coordinated system of higher education known as the University of North Carolina, a public, multi-campus university system governed by the Board. Although each constituent institution of the University has a board of trustees, the Board has retained the authority to determine degree programs offered by each institution; set enrollment levels, tuition rates, and uniform admissions requirements; elect the system president; consider the nomination of the president's principal staff and of the principal administrators and tenured faculty of each institution; establish dependent care assistance and flexible compensation plans; administer certain scholarship and financial aid programs; oversee the preparation of the comprehensive University system budget; approve or recommend the acquisition and disposition of real and personal property; license certain nonpublic entities offering post-secondary degrees; and manage the system's endowment and trust funds, including the ability to designate one or more banks or trust companies as the "official depository" of fees and other payments for medical, dental, or other health care services.

By law, no member of the General Assembly, or officer or employee of the State or of any constituent institution, or spouse of any such member, officer, or employee, may be a member of the Board. Any member of the Board who is elected or appointed to the General Assembly or who becomes an officer or employee of the State or of any constituent institution, or whose spouse is elected or appointed to the General Assembly or becomes such officer or employee, shall be deemed to resign from his membership on the Board.

The Act establishes ethical standards for certain public servants and prohibits public servants from: (1) using their positions for their financial benefit or for the benefit of their extended family or business, N.C.G.S. § 138A-31; and (2) participating in official actions from which they or certain associated persons might receive a reasonably foreseeable financial benefit, N.C.G.S. § 138A-36(a). The Act also requires public servants to take appropriate steps to remove themselves from proceedings in which their impartiality might reasonably be questioned due to a familial, personal, or financial relationship with a participant in those proceedings. N.C.G.S. § 138A-36(c).

In addition to the conflicts standards noted above, the Act prohibits public servants from accepting gifts from (1) a lobbyist or lobbyist principal, (2) a person or entity that is seeking to do business with the public servant's agency, is regulated or controlled by that agency, or has financial interests that might be affected by their official actions, or (3) anyone in return for being influenced in the discharge of their official responsibilities. N.C.G.S. § 138A-32. Exceptions to the gifts restrictions are set out in N.C.G.S. § 138A-32(e).

When this letter cites an actual or potential conflict of interest under N.C.G.S. § 138A-24(e), the conflict must be recorded in the minutes of the applicable board and brought to the membership's attention by the board's chair as often as necessary to remind all members of the conflict and to help ensure compliance with the Act. N.C.G.S. § 138A-15(c).

Finally, the Act mandates that all public servants attend an ethics and lobbying education presentation. N.C.G.S. § 138A-14. Please review the attached document for additional information concerning this requirement.

C. Philip Byers, of Forest City, NC, was appointed by the North Carolina General Assembly in 2015 and reappointed in 2019 to serve on the Board of Governors of the University of North Carolina System. His term will end in 2023.

Byers is chair of the Subcommittee on Laboratory Schools, vice chair of the Committee on Military and Public Affairs, and a member of the Committee on University Governance. He is passionate about student success, safety on college campuses, and access to education for all citizens in North Carolina.

Byers served in law enforcement for 20 years, retiring in 2006 as sheriff of Rutherford County, NC.

In 2014, Byers was named president of Challenge Foundation Properties, a sister organization to TeamCFA, which helps connect the network's charter schools with the building resources they need for long-term success. In his work, Byers has served as the southeast regional director for the Challenge Foundation and as executive director for Education Freedom Alliance.

Byers joined the Thomas Jefferson Community Education Foundation as executive director. He continues to work with the Thomas Jefferson Classical Academy, having formerly served as a board member and board chair. He is a founding member of the Lake Lure Classical Academy, a Challenge Foundation Academy.

During his tenure in law enforcement, Byers received acclaim for leading the fight against methamphetamine production in rural western North Carolina and, as a result, testified on three occasions before the US Congress. Swadesh Chatterjee is a nationally and internationally recognized civic leader, businessman, and entrepreneur. He has a deep and enduring commitment to civic and educational causes and has worked tirelessly with those of differing political, national, religious, and cultural affiliations to achieve major accomplishments benefitting the United States.

Chatterjee is perhaps best known as Chairman and Co-founder of the U.S.-India Friendship Council, a coalition of prominent Indian American individuals and associations that worked with then-Senator Joe Biden (and many other U.S. Senators and House members) and the George W. Bush administration towards achieving the US-India Civilian Nuclear Deal. Final legislation for this landmark deal was signed into law by President George W. Bush on Wednesday, October 8, 2008.

Chatterjee also worked with both the Clinton administration and the Congress to stabilize the U.S.-India relationship after the disruptive Indian nuclear tests of 1998. He played a critical role in ensuring the support of then-Chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, Senator Jesse Helms (R-NC), which brought about a reconciliation between the U.S. and India. He also accompanied President Clinton during his March 2000 visit to India.

Chatterjee is a pioneer in bringing political awareness and involvement to the Indian American community. His service as National President of the Indian American Forum for Political Education (1998-2000) built upon his presidency of the North Carolina chapter of the IAFPE (1994-1996), his service on the Board of Directors of the Hindu Society of North Carolina (1988-1990) and as founder and President of the North Carolina Bengali Association.

All of these activities he did for the public good without compensation of any kind and entirely at his own expense to bolster constructive communications between the U.S. and India. Chatterjee has been honored repeatedly for his international work. He was conferred the *Padma Bhushan*, India's highest civilian award, by the president of India and named *Community Leader of the Year* (2006) by the most prominent ethnic newspaper, India Abroad. In 2001, he was inducted as a member of the Prime Minister of India's Global Advisory Council.

Chatterjee has also been publicly recognized by a number of prominent U.S. Senators, Members of Congress and local leaders [e.g., Senator Jesse Helms; Congressman David Price; Governor Roy Cooper to name just a few] from both parties for his tireless dedication and public service over many decades. He has worked to increase jobs and prosperity in his home state of North Carolina. He was appointed by the NC Governor to serve on the North Carolina Joining Our Business and Schools (JOBS) Commission and was a founding member of TiE Carolinas, a group of successful businesspeople whose primary goal is to develop and assist fledgling entrepreneurs. He served a two-year term (2003-2004) as President of the group.

Chatterjee is currently a Vice Chair of the Chancellor's Global Advisory Council and Chair of the Modern India Studies Program Steering Committee at UNC-Chapel Hill. He is also the President and CEO of Swadesh Chatterjee & Associates and supervises a number of biotech and life science companies in the U.S., Sweden, Finland, Norway, Denmark, France and India. Additionally, he serves on the Board of Directors for a number of private biotech companies in the U.S. Europe and India. Swadesh is author of the book, "Building Bridges: How Indian Americans Brought the United States and India Closer Together" and is frequently featured in news outlets in both the U.S. and India.

He received his M.B.A degree from North Carolina State University, a B.S. Degree in Physics from Calcutta University, and a B.S. Degree in Instrumentation and Electronic Engineering from Jadavpur University. We have reviewed it for actual and potential conflicts of interest pursuant to Chapter 138A of the North Carolina General Statutes ("N.C.G.S."), also known as the State Government Ethics Act (the "Act").

Compliance with the Act and avoidance of conflicts of interest in the performance of public duties are the responsibilities of every covered person, regardless of this letter's contents. This letter, meanwhile, is not meant to impugn the integrity of the covered person in any way. This letter is required by N.C.G.S. § 138A-28(a) and is designed to educate the covered person as to potential issues that could merit particular attention. Advice on compliance with the Act is available to certain public servants and legislative employees under N.C.G.S. § 138A-13.

We did not find an actual conflict of interest but found the potential for a conflict of interest. The potential conflict identified does not prohibit service on this entity.

Chapter 116 of the North Carolina General Statutes provides for the development of a coordinated system of higher education known as the University of North Carolina, a public, multi-campus university system governed by the Board. Therefore, Mr. Chatterjee has the potential for a conflict of interest and should exercise appropriate caution in the performance of his public duties should issues involving Wells Fargo of any of his consulting clients come before the Board for official action.

In addition to the conflicts standards noted above, the Act prohibits public servants from accepting gifts from (1) a lobbyist or lobbyist principal, (2) a person or entity that is seeking to do business with the public servant's agency, is regulated or controlled by that agency, or has financial interests that might be affected by their official actions, or (3) anyone in return for being influenced in the discharge of their official responsibilities. N.C.G.S. § 138A-32. Exceptions to the gifts restrictions are set out in N.C.G.S. § 138A-32(e).

Terry Hutchens

Terry Hutchens, of Fayetteville, NC, was appointed by the NC General Assembly in 2019 to serve on the Board of Governors of the University of North Carolina System. His term will end in 2023.

Hutchens serves as chair of the Committee on Audit, Risk Management, and Compliance, and as a member of the Committee on Budget and Finance.

Dear Speaker Moore:

Our office has received Mr. H. Terry Hutchens' 2022 Statement of Economic Interest as a member of the University of North Carolina Board of Governors (the "Board"). We have reviewed it for actual and potential conflicts of interest pursuant to Chapter 138A of the North Carolina General Statutes ("N.C.G.S."), also known as the State Government Ethics Act (the "Act").

Compliance with the Act and avoidance of conflicts of interest in the performance of public duties are the responsibilities of every covered person, regardless of this letter's contents. This letter, meanwhile, is not meant to impugn the integrity of the covered person in any way. This letter is required by N.C.G.S. § 138A-28(a) and is designed to educate the covered person as to potential issues that could merit particular attention. Advice on compliance with the Act is available to certain public servants and legislative employees under N.C.G.S. § 138A-13.

We did not find an actual conflict of interest but found the potential for a conflict of interest. The potential conflict identified does not prohibit service on this entity.

Chapter 116 of the North Carolina General Statutes provides for the development of a coordinated system of higher education known as the University of North Carolina, a public, multi-campus university system governed by the Board. Although each constituent institution of the University has a board of trustees, the Board has retained the authority to determine degree programs offered by each institution; set enrollment levels, tuition rates, and uniform admissions requirements; elect the system president; consider the nomination of the president's principal staff and of the principal administrators and tenured faculty of each institution; establish dependent care assistance and flexible compensation plans; administer certain scholarship and financial aid programs; oversee the preparation of the comprehensive University system budget; approve or recommend the acquisition and disposition of real and personal property; license certain nonpublic entities offering post-secondary degrees; and manage the system's endowment and trust funds, including the ability to designate one or more banks or trust companies as the "official depository" of fees and other payments for medical, dental, or other health care services.

By law, no member of the General Assembly, or officer or employee of the State or of any constituent institution, or spouse of any such member, officer, or employee, may be a member of the Board. Any member of the Board who is elected or appointed to the General Assembly or who becomes an officer or employee of the State or of any constituent institution, or whose spouse is elected or appointed to the

General Assembly or becomes such officer or employee, shall be deemed to resign from his membership on the Board.

The Act establishes ethical standards for certain public servants and prohibits public servants from: (1) using their positions for their financial benefit or for the benefit of their extended family or business, N.C.G.S. § 138A-31; and (2) participating in official actions from which they or certain associated persons might receive a reasonably foreseeable financial benefit, N.C.G.S. § 138A-36(a). The Act also requires public servants to take appropriate steps to remove themselves from proceedings in which their impartiality might reasonably be questioned due to a familial, personal, or financial relationship with a participant in those proceedings. N.C.G.S. § 138A-36(c).

Mr. Hutchens is a managing partner of Hutchens Law Firm, LLP and owns a financial interest in Hutchens, Senter, Kellam & Pettit, P.A., which also provides legal services. In addition, he owns financial interests in various real estate-related companies, including Great Escapes Aviation, LLC, Ramsey Street Office Building, LLC and Tylers Ridge Southern Pines, LLC. His spouse owns a financial interest in the commercial real estate company, McPherson Square Associates, LLC. Therefore, Mr. Hutchens has the potential for a conflict of interest and should exercise appropriate caution in the performance of his public duties, should the business of Hutchens Law Firm, LLP or Hutchens Senter, Kellam & Pettit, P.A., or issues involving his real estate interests or any entity in which he or his spouse own a financial interest come before the Board for official action.

In addition to the conflicts standards noted above, the Act prohibits public servants from accepting gifts from (1) a lobbyist or lobbyist principal, (2) a person or entity that is seeking to do business with the public servant's agency, is regulated or controlled by that agency, or has financial interests that might be affected by their official actions, or (3) anyone in return for being influenced in the discharge of their official responsibilities. N.C.G.S. § 138A-32. Exceptions to the gifts restrictions are set out in N.C.G.S. § 138A-32(e).

When this letter cites an actual or potential conflict of interest under N.C.G.S. § 138A-24(e), the conflict must be recorded in the minutes of the applicable board and brought to the membership's attention by the board's chair as often as necessary to remind all members of the conflict and to help ensure compliance with the Act. N.C.G.S. § 138A-15(c).

Finally, the Act mandates that all public servants attend an ethics and lobbying education presentation. N.C.G.S. § 138A-14. Please review the attached document for additional information concerning this requirement.
