SPECIAL MESSAGE FROM THE SENATE

The following Special Message is received from the Senate:

TARDIVE DYSKINESIA AWARENESS WEEK

WHEREAS, many people with serious, chronic mental illness, such as schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, severe depression, or gastrointestinal disorders, including gastroparesis, nausea, and vomiting, require treatment with medications that work as dopamine receptor blocking agents (DRBAs), including antipsychotics; and

WHEREAS, while ongoing treatment with these medications can be very helpful, and even lifesaving, for many people, it can also lead to Tardive Dyskinesia (TD); and

WHEREAS, Tardive Dyskinesia is a movement disorder that is characterized by random, involuntary, and uncontrolled movements of different muscles in the face, trunk, and extremities; and

WHEREAS, Tardive Dyskinesia can develop months, years, or decades after a person starts taking DRBAs and even after they have discontinued use of those medications. Not everyone who takes a DRBA develops TD, but if it develops, it is often permanent; and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that over 600,000 Americans suffer from Tardive Dyskinesia. According to the National Alliance for Mental Illness, one in every four patients receiving long-term treatment with an antipsychotic medication will experience Tardive Dyskinesia; and

WHEREAS, years of difficult and challenging research have resulted in recent scientific breakthroughs, with two new treatments for Tardive Dyskinesia approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration; and

RECOGNIZING MAY 25, 2022, AS "SHOW ME YOUR BRAVE DAY" IN NORTH CAROLINA TO PROMOTE AWARENESS AND INSPIRE BULLYING PREVENTION

WHEREAS, "Show Me Your BRAVE Day" is part of a bullying prevention platform founded by Maddie Crotts, a college student and citizen of Monroe, North Carolina to encourage students in schools and colleges in North Carolina and across the nation to be courageous and speak out in classrooms and on social media to tell their own story of when they exhibited bravery in their life. Through in-person classroom and virtual presentations, interactive teaching kits, published children's books, nationwide Beautifully BRAVE video campaigns, and the use of social media websites, Maddie has effectively introduced the values of kindness and inclusion with the objective of standing up against the social injustices of bullying in our classrooms, communities, and daily lives; and

WHEREAS, "BRAVE," which stands for Building Respect and Values for Everyone, is an initiative created to educate and provide awareness to children, parents, and communities about the impact of bullying and everyone's role in preventing it and providing a bully-free environment; and

WHEREAS, bullying most often involves student-to-student interactions and is noted by the National School Safety Center as the most enduring and under-rated problem in U.S. schools. According to the National Center of Educational Statistics, one out of every five (20.2%) students report being bullied and 41% of students who reported being bullied at school indicated that they think the bullying would happen again. Studies show both students who engage in bullying and students who experience bullying are more likely to experience school failure. Bullying is not done by a small number of students who are socially and emotionally isolated, but is common across socio-economic status, gender, grade, and class. Any student can exhibit bullying behavior - male or female, popular or unpopular, students with good grades, and those who struggle academically. "Show Me Your BRAVE Day" is an opportunity for all students from all walks of life to stand up and speak out; and

WHEREAS, whether having been bullied, seen someone being bullied, or been the bully, bullying is a personal issue that all can relate to. Bullying takes the form of physical, verbal, social, and cyberbullying. In this virtual world we now live in, cyberbullying takes place over cell phones, computers, and tablets through sending, posting, or sharing negative, harmful, false, or mean content about someone else. According to Stopbullying in 2019. Reports of cyberbullying are highest among middle school students, followed by high school students, and then primary school students according to the Centers for Disease Control. Social media platforms, such as Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat, and Tik Tok are common grounds for cyberbullying. Hence, "Show Me Your BRAVE Day" specifically seeks to counteract this harmful negativity on social media with positive messages and experiences; and

WHEREAS, the effects and impact of bullying are detrimental to both individuals and society. Students who experience bullying are at increased risk for depression, anxiety, sleep difficulties, lower academic achievement, and dropping out of school according to the Centers for Disease Control. Bullied students are also at a greater risk for both mental health and behavior problems and indicated bullying has impacted their relationships with friends and family, schoolwork, and physical health. They also are twice as likely as non-bullied peers to experience negative health effects such as headaches and stomachaches. Youth who self-blame and conclude they deserved to be bullied are more likely to face negative outcomes, such as depression, prolonged victimization, and maladjustment. (Perren, Ettakal, & Ladd, 2013). Bullying affects witnesses as well as targets. Witnesses are more likely to use tobacco, alcohol, or other drugs; have increased mental health problems; and miss or skip school according to Stopbullying.gov. "Show Me Your BRAVE Day" provides a pivotal moment and platform to show and give others hope and encouragement; and

WHEREAS, students, parents, educators, and communities all have a responsibility to address bullying in schools, on-line and in communities. And most importantly, to model how to treat others with respect and kindness and keep communication lines open. Children and students are always watching and learning from others how friends, colleagues, and families are being treated. "Show Me Your BRAVE Day" allows an opportunity for peers and others to share personal stories and provide real-life examples publicly of courage and bravery in recognizing, preventing, and overcoming bullying;

NOW, **THEREFORE**, **BE IT RESOLVED**, it is fitting to recognize May 25, 2022, as "Show Me Your BRAVE Day" in North Carolina to encourage our students and citizens to make a public stand and pronounce their personal bravery in the battle against bullying to promote awareness and inspire bullying prevention.

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE ADAMS

"Fifty years ago today, a friend of mine perished in Vietnam. I'll read notes from one of his classmates. The Battle of Kontum began in Central Highlands in the Spring of 1972. During the battle, Americans were in trouble. Joe Eubanks stepped forward to fly the mission. He flew his Huey through heavy small arms and under aircraft fire to rescue two Americans. Later that afternoon, Joe flew a second mission through intense enemy fire to rescue more American advisors. When the call went out again, Joe flew to the sound of guns a third time and was able to rescue two more Americans. For his heroic voluntary actions, Joe Eubanks was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross. Several weeks later, Joe, one week from rotating out of Vietnam, and no longer on flight operations, volunteered for another mission to rescue Americans. During the mission, Joe's Huey was raked by heavy ground fire and crashed. Despite the heroic efforts of his flight crew to extricate him, Joe died in the fiery wreckage.

"I waited a long time to pay tribute to Joe. He was very important to me. This is the place, you're the audience, where I want to pay my respects. Joe was an orphan. His adopted parents were older, and they had no other children. Joe openly expressed his love and appreciation for his adoptive parents. I was in high school with Joe. He was a couple years older than me. We all hung out in front of the old Concord High School, now the Glenn Center, in the mornings and at lunch. Joe was a small guy. He was about five foot five. Very animated. He loved sports, particularly basketball. Joe would act out plays he'd seen at basketball games. He had a huge sense of humor and quick wit. His eyes danced as he would act these things out. He loved history. World War II history. Civil War history. He graduated, and I lost track of him.

"I entered The Citadel in the Fall of 1968. A couple weeks after I arrived, I ran into Joe in the cadet canteen. I had no idea he was there. Upperclassmen were forbidden to fraternize with 4th classmen. But Joe said hello and wished me well. Joe was a Cadet Lieutenant in Second Battalion H Company. I was in Fourth Battalion Romeo Company. Plebe year at The Citadel was mental and physical; it was designed to break the weak. Joe had chosen Ranger Airborne in 1965, an incredibly challenging path. You see, a man of his small stature would earn the wrath of upperclassmen, because they wanted men of strength and stature. I knew others like Joe. They were different. Knob year was challenging for me, and like all freshmen, attrition began quickly and continued. By December, I was struggling, and one afternoon, I entered my room after classes and Joe was there. It was not a friendly visit; he was risking his rank by being there. Fraternizing with a freshman was one thing, but he was in a freshman's room alone, a possible honor violation if he was challenged. Joe was not there to give me a pep talk. He gave me a reality check. His remarks were direct and focused. In essence, he also gave me the key to the system. I truly believe that Joe gave me the ability to meet the challenges of the system and actually made second semester a relative breeze. I always wanted to thank him, but he graduated and again disappeared. I figured I'd catch him later.

"I got word of his death a couple of weeks after I graduated. This is the first place, the first time, I felt a real opportunity to pay homage to Joe. If he had lived, I would not be at all surprised if he had not been one of us. If it hadn't been for him, I seriously doubt I would be here. And so, here's to you, Joe Eubanks, son of North Carolina, American hero. My friend, my mentor. Thank you for listening."

The last time I spoke in this Chamber was on the occasion of D-Day honoring the brave soldiers who sacrificed their lives and stormed the shores of Normandy. He was a highly-skilled carpenter who took part in the planning and construction of this North Carolina State Capitol Building. It is documented that expert economists of that time period were very impressed with his talent.

"Although he was a skilled craftsman and planner, he was a slave. In his labor, I can't imagine him thinking that one day, some of his great- grandsons would serve as a State Senator, Mayor of Raleigh, and a Member of the North Carolina House of Representatives, let alone his great-grandson giving an address in the very building he played a major role in planning and constructing. Thank you, dear great-grandfather, for the fortitude in your struggle to maintain your humanity.

"Hear me, dear great-grandfather. I stand tall today as an extension of you, and thank you for passing down to me your human excellence. Dear great-grandfather, I pray that Almighty G-d have mercy on your soul, forgive you your sins, and grant you Paradise. Amen.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for affording me this time."

On page 6, lines 25 and 26, by rewriting the lines to read: "SECTION 5.6.(a) Section 42.11 of S.L. 2021-180 is repealed.

SECTION 5.6.(b) G.S. 105-236(a)(4) reads as rewritten:

'(4) Failure to Pay Tax When Due. - In the case of failure to pay any tax when due, without intent to evade the tax, the Secretary shall assess a penalty equal to ten percent (10%) five percent (5%) of the tax. This penalty does not apply in any of the following circumstances: ...'.

SECTION 5.6.(c) G.S. 105-236(a)(4), as amended by subsection (b) of this section, reads as rewritten:

'(4) Failure to Pay Tax When Due. - In the case of failure to pay any tax when due, without intent to evade the tax, the Secretary shall assess a penalty equal to five two percent (5%) (2%) of the tax. amount of the tax if the failure is for not more than one month, with an additional two percent (2%) for each additional month, or fraction thereof, during which the failure continues, not exceeding ten percent (10%) in aggregate. This penalty does not apply in any of the following circumstances:

...'

SECTION 5.6.(d) Section 8.1(b) of S.L. 2019-246, as enacted by Section 34.4 of S.L. 2021-180, reads as rewritten:

'SECTION 8.1.(b) By January 1, 2022, and monthly thereafter, the Department of Revenue shall submit a written report on the status of the power of attorney registration project required by subsection (a) of this section—to the chairs of the House Appropriations Committee on General Government and the Senate Appropriations Committee on General Government and Information Technology and the Fiscal Research Division. The monthly report shall also-include an update on the status-following:

- (1) The status of the power of attorney registration project required by subsection (a) of this section.
- (2) <u>The status</u> of the Collections Case Management system implementation and the IBM 4100 replacement project currently underway in the Department.
- (3) The status of the Department's ability to make the programmatic changes necessary to implement the graduated penalty for failure to pay tax when due that will apply to tax assessed on or after July 1, 2024.'

SECTION 5.6.(e) Subsection (a) of this section becomes effective June 30, 2022. Subsection (b) of this section becomes effective January 1, 2023, and applies to tax assessed on or after that date. Subsection (c) of this section becomes law July 1, 2024, and applies to tax assessed on or after that date. The remainder of this section is effective when this act becomes law.

SECTION 5.7. Except as otherwise provided, this Part is effective when this act becomes law.".

WHEREAS, Taiwan has contributed extensive resources to help the international community, including the United States, to combat the COVID-19 pandemic through the global donation of tens of millions of surgical and N95 masks, hundreds of thousands of isolation gowns, and tens of thousands of thermometers; reciprocally, the United States has donated 4 million doses of the Moderna vaccine to Taiwan; and

WHEREAS, Taiwan is the United States' ninth-largest trading partner, and the United States is Taiwan's second-largest trading partner; Taiwan supports an estimated 330,000 jobs in the United States; Taiwan is North Carolina's twenty-first-largest export market and fourteenthlargest import market; Taiwan invests \$165 million in North Carolina; recently, South Carolina, New Mexico, Montana, West Virginia, and Pennsylvania have established or decided to open their trade offices in Taiwan to attract more investments;

NOW, **THEREFORE**, it is imperative to continue supporting the relationship between Taiwan and the United States, as both countries deeply cherish the common values of freedom, democracy, human rights, and the rule of law.

HONORING THE LIFE-SAVING HEROISM OF MOLLIE COLASACCO OF MOORE COUNTY

WHEREAS, Mollie Ann Colasacco, a 13-year-old student at Southern Middle School in Aberdeen, is a cadet with the girl scouts who has received bronze and silver awards. She enjoys the outdoors, especially fishing, bird watching, and gardening. On May 23, 2022, Mollie became a hero by saving the life of her sister, Emma Grace Colasacco, a 21-year-old student at Sandhills Community College; and

WHEREAS, that evening around 6:30 P.M., Mollie and Emma were enjoying an ATV ride on their property near the Fort Bragg Army Reservation when they had a rollover accident. Both sisters lost consciousness. After regaining consciousness, Mollie tried to rouse Emma, but she was unresponsive. Without hesitation Mollie called their father, Aberdeen Police Chief, Carl Colasacco, but was unable to reach him due to bad cell phone reception. However, she was able to reach 911. Mollie could not describe her specific location to the 911 operator, so she was instructed to leave Emma and, using Mollie's cell phone GPS, the 911 operator guided Mollie out to the paved roadway to meet the first responders; and

WHEREAS, as it turned out, the sisters were on the Fort Bragg Army Reservation and about 200 yards from the paved roadway. Within a few minutes, personnel from the Fort Bragg Fire and Emergency Service Station 8 arrived on the scene to aid the sisters. Emergency personnel quickly

determined that Emma needed prompt medical attention and contacted a Fort Bragg military helicopter, which transported Emma to Womack Army Medical Center; and

WHEREAS, while at the Medical Center, the doctors determined that Emma had a split aorta and needed emergency heart surgery. She was transferred to Cape Fear Valley Medical Center in Fayetteville, where a stint was placed in her split aorta to stop the bleeding. In addition to her aorta injury, Emma fractured an acetabulum, a rib, a vertebra, and her pelvis in two places and suffered a concussion, scrapes, and bruises; and

WHEREAS, Mollie's father was able to transport her to Womack Army Medical Center, where she was treated for a contusion of her right shoulder, elbow, and forearm; abrasion to right elbow and forearm; cervical strain; and a concussion; and

WHEREAS, currently, Mollie is being treated for continued issues with her radial forearm and Emma must undergo months of therapy and rehabilitation, but her prognosis looks good;

NOW, **THEREFORE**, Mollie Ann Colasacco deserves to be recognized for saving the life of her sister, Emma Grace Colasacco, on May 23, 2022, after their ATV accident by quickly contacting 911 and, despite her own injuries, walking from the accident site to meet and lead first responders to her injured sister, who needed lifesaving emergency medical treatment.

WHEREAS, on March 10, 2022, around 7:00 A.M., Lt. Smith was driving home after working all night when he came upon an accident scene where a wrecked vehicle was on fire on Highway 1 near the Dollar General in Vass. As flames reached the inside of the car, Lt. Smith, along with two bystanders, pulled the unconscious driver from the car. The driver was subsequently air lifted to a trauma center for medical treatment; and

WHEREAS, in both instances, Lt. Smith rendered emergency aid and acted on behalf of those in need without hesitation. He serves as an inspiration to his fellow police officers and to members of his community;

NOW, **THEREFORE**, Lt. Jesse James Smith deserves to be recognized for his selfless and brave public service as a police officer and to be commended for his heroic actions in saving the lives of two people involved in serious car accidents on March 5th and March 10th of this year.

HONORING BROWNE C. LEWIS, FORMER DEAN OF NORTH CAROLINA CENTRAL UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF LAW

WHEREAS, Browne C. Lewis, one of 12 children born and raised in Natchez, Louisiana, earned a B.A. in Political Science from Grambling State University and an M.A. in Public Policy from the Humphrey Institute at the University of Minnesota; and

WHEREAS, Browne C. Lewis began her professional career as a statistician, but soon gravitated towards the law, earning a J.D. from the University of Minnesota School of Law and an LL.M. in Energy and Environmental Law from the University of Houston School of Law; and

WHEREAS, in 2008, Browne C. Lewis joined the faculty at Cleveland State University Cleveland-Marshall College of Law where she was the Leon M. and Gloria Plevin Professor of Law and the founding Director of the Law School's Center for Health Law & Policy; she also served as faculty advisor for several student-led organizations; and

WHEREAS, after her impactful tenure in Cleveland, in July of 2020, Browne C. Lewis was named Dean of the North Carolina Central University School of Law. She steadfastly shepherded the Law School through reaccreditation by the American Bar Association, increased student enrollment, and improved State Bar passage rates. Dean Lewis also encouraged corporations and foundations to provide prestigious internships and fellowships to NCCU Law students and to make monetary donations to aid the Law School in pursuing its mission, including a \$5,000,000 grant from the Intel Corporation for the NCCU-Intel Tech Law and Policy Center which is the only technology and law policy center at one of the country's Historically Black Colleges and Universities; and

WHEREAS, Dean Lewis was a Visiting Researcher at the Brocher Foundation in Geneva, Switzerland; Visiting Scholar at the University of Texas Institute for Medical Humanities; Visiting Scholar at Yale University's Interdisciplinary Center for Bioethics; Senior Fulbright Specialist at Haifa University and Hebrew University in Israel; and a Core Fulbright Scholar at King's College in the United Kingdom. She was also a prolific legal scholar, publishing numerous articles and several books on bioethics, environmental law, family law, and inheritance law; and

WHEREAS, Dean Lewis died unexpectedly on June 2, 2022;

NOW, **THEREFORE**, it is fitting and proper to honor the well-lived life and memory of Browne C. Lewis, former Dean of the North Carolina Central University School of Law.

WHEREAS, in 2019, suicide was the second leading cause of death for Blacks ages 15-24; and

WHEREAS, in 2018, the death rate for suicide of Black men was four times greater than of African-American women; and

WHEREAS, less than 10% of Blacks have received mental health services and only 6.5% of Blacks have received prescription medication for mental health issues; and

WHEREAS, Hispanics were 50% less likely to have received mental health treatment as compared to non-Hispanic whites; and

WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic has both exacerbated and highlighted the need for mental health issues, particularly in minority communities;

NOW, **THEREFORE**, the month of July should be observed as Minority Mental Health Awareness Month in North Carolina.

The House meets at 12:00 p.m. pursuant to **S.J.R. 917**, A JOINT RESOLUTION ADJOURNING THE 2021 REGULAR SESSION OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO A DATE CERTAIN AND LIMITING THE MATTERS THAT MAY BE CONSIDERED UPON RECONVENING (RESOLUTION 2022-6), and is called to order by the Speaker.

The following prayer is offered by Representative Pat B. Hurley:

"Thank You, Heavenly Father, for all Your many blessings. Thank You for the opportunity that You gave to each of us to serve the people of North Carolina. It is an honor and a privilege to be able to assist our constituents and this opportunity is most appreciated.

"Please protect, guide, and comfort our military, our law enforcement personnel, and our first responders wherever they serve. Please give the leaders of our State, our Nation, and the leaders of other countries, wisdom and discernment. Guide them in their decisions that affect so many people.

"Thank You for Christmas! Thank You for sacrificing Your life on the cross as an atonement for our sins and thank You for Your resurrection that we may have eternal life. Please help us to show Your love through us at all times. In Jesus' Name I pray. Amen."

The Speaker leads the Body in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Representative D. Hall, for the Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations of the House, reports the Journal of November 17 has been examined and found correct. Upon his motion, the Journal is approved as written.

A leave of absence is granted to Representative Autry for today.

Serving as Honorary Page for today is Liberty Ann Kidwell.

SEATING OF MEMBERS

The Speaker states the Appointment Proclamation for Representative Nichols was previously read on July 26, 2022. He subscribed to the oath of office on July 29, 2022, administered by Linda Stephens, Retired Court of Appeals Judge. He will occupy Seat 69. The Appointment Proclamation for Representative O'Neal was previously read on September 20, 2022. He subscribed to the oath of office on September 23, 2022, administered by The Honorable Ray Matusko, Clerk of Superior Court. He will occupy Seat 66.

The Speaker appoints Representative D. Hall, Chair; Representatives B. Jones, Lucas, and Adcock to escort the Members to their seats.

The Speaker orders a Special Message sent to the Senate informing that Honorable Body of the seating of Representatives Nichols and O'Neal as Members of the 2021-2022 House of Representatives.

MOTION TO SUSPEND RULES

Representative D. Hall reduces the following motion to writing and moves its adoption:

"Mr. Speaker, pursuant to Mason's Sections 32(3) and 489(4)(e), I move that Mason's Sections 201 and 445 (1) and (3) be suspended for the Pro Forma Session anticipated on December 29th.

"Those Sections shall not apply to a motion to adjourn made on that date with no provision made as to the time of reconvening.

"In absence of those sections, pursuant to Mason's Section 39(5), the precedents set by the Senate may be accorded some weight, which explicitly recognize that a session terminates automatically at the end of the

constitutional term without specific actions by one or both chambers being necessary, including a concurrent resolution adjourning the 2021 Regular Session of the General Assembly sine die."

Without objection, the motion carries.

GUEST

The Speaker extends the courtesies of the floor to Representative-elect Joe Pike of Harnett County.

On motion of Representative Carney, the following remarks are spread upon the Journal.

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE PITTMAN

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. First of all, I want to give thanks to our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ for sustaining me all this time. He told me - and I know some of you don't believe in this stuff - but he told me when I was six years old that I was going to be a preacher. He didn't say a thing about me being in the NC House, and I never suspected that I would be here until 2007 or 2008 when I decided to run. But He's been with me. I'm not going to waste your time telling you about all the times that I could have easily died and I didn't. He's kept me going a long time past what I sometimes expected.

"It's been a privilege to be here to serve the people of North Carolina. But above all, even this here, to me, is service to Jesus Christ. And I've tried my best to do what I felt would be good in many instances for the people of North Carolina. I've been accused sometimes of not being a team player. Well, I am a team player, but my team has always been the people who elected me. I've tried to look out for the average, hard-working, taxpaying citizens in this State, and to uphold our Constitutions. That's been my focus the whole time I've been here. And even though I didn't get a lot of bills passed - I was just joking with some Members, these two Members that just joined will be some of the few who will probably pass less legislation than I have - I have also helped stop some really bad legislation, and I'm proud of that.

"But I want to thank my wife, Tammy. Without her support, I couldn't have been here at all. She's actually the one - I have told her not to complain about the hardships of being here because you're the one who talked me into running. And I have to mention Ronnie Long, a dear friend of mine, who, without his support, his help, I wouldn't have been here. I'm not going into any details, but he has a health problem right now, so I'd appreciate your prayers for him.

"But Tammy has been my legislative assistant most of the time I've been here. There was a little bit of time that she wasn't, but ever since, for about 11 years, she has been my legislative assistant. And I thank Dale Folwell for talking her into doing that. She's been excellent. We've helped people not only in our district, but some folks in other districts as well. And I've been very proud of how she has worked doing that and how she has worked with other people. I'm just proud of her, period. She is the beauty and the sweetness in my life.

"Couple of things I have to mention. Our son Samuel, as you know, is a Captain in the National Guard. He is currently at Fort Hood, he and his command. They will be deployed by the end of the month. We won't see him again until about October or November of next year. There are a lot of families who are going through that right now, not just his command. I couldn't tell you the number, but there are many of them who are going through that right now, and we need to be in prayer for all of them. We are so proud of our son, proud of all who serve this great nation, proud of their families who support them. We need to keep not only the service people but their families very much in our prayers.

"Next thing, I appreciate everybody who is wearing red and black today. You may not be aware of it, but you're wearing my high school colors. I'm wearing my red and black because my New Bern High School Bears football team last Friday night beat Grimsley 40-28 to win the State 4A Championship in football. Been a long time since I wore that uniform. We didn't do so well my senior year. We were 4-6. They are 16-0 on the season and state champions, and I'm tickled to death. I hope Representative Tyson, maybe, next Session, will have the opportunity to present them to you. I wish I could be here for that. Not going to be that way, but I'm proud of them.

"I want to thank our staff around here. James and his staff, they've just done an excellent job. Always been very kind to me. I couldn't ever tell whether they agreed with me or not. They were just good to me. Our legislative staff, they have worked hard on the many bills that I've offered. Unfortunately, their efforts were wasted a lot of times because a lot of those bills never got heard. But I do appreciate the hard work that they put into it and the fairness that they showed to me all that time.

"Our Legislative Police and our Sergeants-at-Arms, we couldn't ask for better people. Sergeants-at-Arms, a number of them, I'm not going to get them in trouble by naming them, but a number of them have told me how sad they are to see me leave. They don't know how much that means to me. Your kindness and support to me over these 11 plus, 11 years and two months, will be treasured in my heart until it quits beating.

"I love North Carolina. It's my home. It's my ancestral home. We've been here since the 1600s. There is no place I want to be more than North Carolina except the Kingdom of God when it comes. So, thank you for the opportunity to serve. Thank you for - some of you have been really kind to me even when I know you didn't agree with me, and I appreciate that. I've tried to be as good to y'all as I could. But I do pray for God's blessings on each and every one of us, that we will learn more and more to love and to serve and to do what is the will of God. God bless you! Merry Christmas."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE COOPER-SUGGS

"Thank you so much, Mr. Speaker. I rise today to acknowledge and remember the life of one who is larger than life itself, who lived in Wilson County, and that is Mrs. Betty Ray McCain. Married to fellow UNC alumnus Dr. John Lewis McCain, Mrs. McCain was a devoted family member, public servant, leader, and community icon. She became a leader in the community, serving as President of the Wilson County Downtown Development Corporation, Vice-Chair of the Wilson County Historical Association, Co-Chair of the Wilson County Whirligig Festival Entertainment Committee, a member of the Wilson Rose Garden Society, and a collaborator in the McCain Internet Empowerment Project.

"Her influence was seen and heard on many boards of distinction, and many of you know her, including the Governor's Taskforce on Child Advocacy, the Center for Public Education, Public Television, Lineberger Comprehensive Cancer Center Board of Visitors, the UNC System Board of Governors, the North Carolina Medical Alliance, and the Tryon Palace Commission. She also received numerous honorary degrees and awards from several of the State's universities and colleges, including UNC, who awarded her the General Alumni Association's Distinguished Service Medal and the William Richardson Davie Award, also from Wake Forest University, UNC-Greensboro, UNC-Wilmington, North Carolina State University, Barton College in Wilson, and also St. Andrew's Presbyterian College.

"Her appointment in 1993 by Governor Hunt as North Carolina Secretary of Cultural Resources saw her dedicate herself to refurbishing and protecting North Carolina's state historic sites as an educational tool for all. Mrs. McCain, Betty, her commitment to providing opportunities for all citizens to thrive and succeed led her to be an active participant in our political process, serving as the President of the North Carolina Democratic Women, the North Carolina Democratic Party, and a leader with the Democratic National

Committee. Always thinking of the future generation, Mrs. McCain was there for her family, her community, and all North Carolinians. Her dedication to this State was amplified when she was inducted into the North Carolina Women's Hall of Fame and was bestowed with the Long Leaf Pine, a North Carolina Award.

"Her accomplishments continue, but I would be remiss if I did not tell you that when she walked into the room, she lit up the room, attention was paid to her, and when she started to speak to tell all of those whimsical, anecdotal stories, they had meaning because she was serious about what she was doing. Wilson has lost a great leader. The State of North Carolina has lost a great leader, as well as our nation. Her impact has and will continue to inspire us to carry on by her example. Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE SZOKA

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. This day comes for all of us. It happened when I left the Army; it was a tough day, and this, equally a tough day. But in reflection on why we're here: it was really brought home to me a couple of weeks ago when myself and Representatives Lucas and Richardson and Wheatley and our two Senators went to a meeting of the Cumberland County Veterans Council, and they thanked us for House Bill 83, which is included in the 2021 Budget. If you don't remember what that is, I don't know how you couldn't remember what it is, but that was making military retired pay non-taxable by the State of North Carolina. And they gave us individual certificates, and they also gave us one for the House here, which I would like to read.

"It says this, 'Certificate of Appreciation to North Carolina House of Representatives: In recognition for your outstanding contribution and unparalleled dedication, Cumberland County Veterans Council would like to express our appreciation and gratitude for the commendable and consistent progress you've made. Your leadership and commitment combined with teamwork of others is instrumental in making North Carolina a tax-free state for military retirees. Your outstanding performance, exceptional diligence, and loyal devotion to duty reflect great credit upon yourself and is in keeping with the highest standards of service to our veterans. Your efforts are another important step toward making North Carolina the most military- and veteranfriendly state in the nation. Thank you for a job well done.'

"On the campaign trail, this was echoed to me by numerous people. And I say this not because I was a primary sponsor of the bill, but because each and every one of you played a role in this, whether you voted for it or whether you didn't - as an individual bill will be voted for in the budget - or you didn't. What we do here has consequences. Every bill we pass has consequences,

and no matter your party or whether you're Republicans or Democrats, we all cooperate and pass things like that bill and like tax things and all transportation and all the things we do. It's brought home to me by my constituents that we make an absolute difference in what we do.

"I thank each and every one of you for helping me pass the things that have been important to me and to my constituents and to your constituents. I certainly thank all the non-partisan staff for all the help they've given us, and as Representative Pittman already mentioned, our Sergeant-at-Arms, the Clerk's staff - I mean, we can't do this by ourself. It's always important to remember whether you're here for a day, whether you're here for a lifetime, it's service to this State, to this country. And my deepest gratitude and appreciation to each and every one of you for being up here and serving. Thank you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE GARRISON

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and colleagues, and staff. The past six years have been quite an interesting experience and one that I will long remember. Reflecting on my life and experiences, I would like to highlight the fact that being a product of Bayboro, Pamlico County, just east of New Bern and Craven County, 17 miles from Bayboro to be exact, I really never had any dream or any idea of serving as an elected official, or particularly in the House. So having moved to Vance County in 1973, and having the great privilege of having made great friends with some former college alumni, I did have an opportunity to serve as a County Commissioner for 28 years, now served in the House for six years, for a total of 34 years, having been in the government-making position capacity, so I'm grateful to God for that opportunity. I believe strongly in democracy. I believe that diversity, unity, inclusiveness, are our strength rather than our weakness. For the Word says that a divided house cannot stand. So, it's so important that we remain steadfast in the biblical teachings that we have been taught and we have learned as we go forward in government decision-making. I don't know what the future holds for me. This could be a two-year hiatus or longer; we'll have to see. But thank you so very much for this opportunity, and I wish you the very best, and godspeed. Thank you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE TERRY

"Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. It has been my joy to end my political stay by serving in this House. The reality is that my journey has been somewhat circuitous. I've been a ten, ten, ten, ten person for 40 years. This is the last ten years here in this House, serving not only the citizens from which I come in Forsyth County, but those in North Carolina where I could

when I could. And as a person who grew up with an Abraham Lincoln Republican grandfather and a yellow-dog Democratic mother, I promise you that this has been a challenge for me. Nonetheless, it has been very enlightening, and I must say that all of you, there's not any one of you, any one in this House that I cannot like because I was taught from my birth to have respect for everyone who lives and breathes.

"So thank you very much for the opportunity, those whose eyes I could meet and say hello to and those who rushed past me trying to get away. The reality is that there is honor to service, particularly within the context of what this Body represents. And I love politics and democracy for what it's worth, and I love also a good fight. The reality about it - I served my country on two other continents, I've served my city on its Council, and my goodness, I got here during the last ten, and was able to serve the citizens of North Carolina in this great Body. Thank you very much. I appreciate you. And I leave you with a thought regarding a person I heard pray here when I first arrived who did the prayer of Saint Francis, which is a wonderful prayer. It's, 'Lord, make me an instrument of Thy peace, where there is hatred, let me sow love.'

"And I absolutely love getting up and breathing every morning when I am able to wake up and say good morning to anybody, even the dogs, the cats, the grass, whatever it is. So thank you very much, Mr. Speaker, and all of those persons in this wonderful place who work; I don't know how they do it, they have to love it because there are some days I don't know, I have to really learn how to find my way around and that sort of thing. So there's just nothing greater than this, and to you, I say thank you for the opportunity and for those of you who continue to represent us, do the best you can, where you are, when you can. And, Happy Holidays. Thank you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE HURTADO

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Wow, it's been an honor of a lifetime to sit here with you all, my colleagues, to serve, not just Alamance County, but the State of North Carolina. Only in America can the son of immigrants, immigrants who fled a civil war and came to this country with nothing but the shirt on their backs, can have a son grow up and serve in an elected body. I'd argue that could probably only happen in a state like North Carolina.

"December is always a reflective time for me, especially this December, as my first term comes to an end here. And it's been important for me to reflect on where we started together as a Body. Some of you may have already forgotten that we started in January of 2021, and as I talked to friends and family of how hopeful I felt for North Carolina and the excitement to serve the people of North Carolina, we had one of the darkest moments in

American history when we saw an insurrection in D.C. And I bring that up because that was a backdrop to our beginning as a Legislative Body together. I remember the following week, my first meeting with anyone here in the building was with Capitol Police, thinking about safety plans for our families before we got inaugurated.

"And on the backdrop of that incident was also a global pandemic with so much uncertainty still present in our lives. My family was mourning the loss of a family member due to COVID and thinking about what could we do to step up to the plate to serve the people of North Carolina. And, serve we have. We've come a long way from that moment. As we think about the unprecedented efforts we've made to make historic investments and all the challenges we have faced together as a State when it comes to our democracy, when it comes to education, when it comes to our health care, and thinking about how we make North Carolina the best place for us to live, play, and work for every single family across North Carolina.

"There's been glimmers of hope, where we've gotten together and found bipartisan compromise on an unprecedented budget with support of the Biden Administration and Congress to extend the resources we have here, to invest in critical projects here in North Carolina. There have also been moments where we questioned where we're going together, where we've had to work with the Governor and stop extremist bills from coming to fruition.

"And so as we head into the next Session, I know that we all head into a moment where we are hopeful for what we can do together as a State, either as legislators, as this Body, or - as I enter as a citizen in North Carolina - as partners, as we think about how we make investments that truly work for everyone across North Carolina. And so I am filled with nothing but gratitude to have the opportunity to meet all of you, to continue doing this work, whether it is in this Body or out of this Body, as we think about what it looks like to build that North Carolina that works for all of us.

"I'm incredibly grateful to the staff here in this building that made all of our lives a little easier every day as we scrambled, like needing to figure out where the bathroom was or where the next meeting was to the committee; to my legislative assistant, Arianna; of course to my wife, who made so many sacrifices to be able to allow me to serve in this Body over the last two years. And as I step into North Carolina as a citizen starting in January, I do know two things for sure, and that's that I love North Carolina from the bottom of my heart and I will continue fighting for this place and for everyone in this State; and two, that I believe in North Carolina and I believe in this Body to continue fighting to make sure this is a better place for everyone. So thank you all so much, and I appreciate your service to North Carolina."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE AGER

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I don't care much for farewells, and I hope my farewell today does not complete my friendships with so many people in this room. I've been proud to try to keep Asheville and its people special. I know many of you like going up there because it's just a little weird. Those ideas, the good ones and the bad ones, sort of separate themselves out at some point, and in a free society, sometimes you and I and all of us have to just put up with some things that make us a little uncomfortable, and that is certainly true for me.

"I call Asheville the Florence of the South. I think we are having an Appalachian Renaissance there. So please, as you all go forward, don't snuff that freedom out. I also want to say how proud I am of the new Buncombe County delegation. Lindsay Prather will be coming down here. Caleb is

already here, kind of as a prelim, and I hope you'll be super nice to my son Eric, who will be joining the House in January. This group is young and talented, and I don't want you to waste their incredible talents. I've gotten to know them very well.

"So please, if you come to Buncombe, come and visit. I don't want to miss any of the gossip when I leave, so come let me know what's going on. Again, thank you for all the friendships and keep this institution strong and great. Thank you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE MEYER

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Ladies and gentlemen, colleagues, I'm just going across the hall, and so I didn't know what to bring in a farewell speech. I certainly plan to continue working with so many of you.

"I've treasured my time in this House and I wanted to share some of my favorite moments on this floor. Some of the things that many of us may remember, and while new folks may not have been here, I think you'll understand the spirit of some of these.

"For instance, the greatest goodbye speech I ever heard, which was when John Blust got so angry on his final day in the House that he told us he was going to leave, but he would not leave crawling out on his knees!

"Or the moment that I think we found the biggest laughs when, in some after-midnight session, Representative Hurley wanted us to pass a bill on exotic animals and we were all laughing like a barrel of monkeys; it was the most joyous debate I've ever seen.

"Or how about the good laugh that we had when not once, but twice, Representative Stevens referenced Josh Dobson's abs in her speeches to accept becoming Speaker Pro Tem?

"Or the quote that I share most frequently from the House when I tell people about what it means to do our work here, which was when Larry Yarborough said, 'You know, I used to think that there were smart people who came down here and made these laws, but now I realize it's just us!'

"Or, this was a private one, but I think you all can appreciate it, when I came here, I had to learn how to understand all the accents from across North Carolina, how people spoke and what they meant when they had their signature phrases. But there was one night, again another late night session when things tend to be a little weird, during my freshman year as I was sitting

in the back, and Bill Brisson was so angry about something that he was just spitting into his microphone. And you know that Representative Brisson usually doesn't speak at all, so he was really fired up. I couldn't understand a word he was saying. I turned to Brad Salmon and I said, 'Brad, is he drunk?' Brad says, 'Naw, he's just from Bladen County.' I've learned to understand you well since then, Representative Brisson.

"And finally, we give speeches on this floor all the time and you know that they rarely change minds. Holy cow was I surprised one day when Michael Speciale, of all people, walked over to me and said, 'You know I'm glad you gave that speech, it changed my mind on that vote.' And that reminded me that there are times where our conversations, whether they're on the floor or off the floor, do change minds, make a difference, impact policy. And I look forward to continuing that work with so many of you.

"And out of appreciation, I want to say that I have learned so much from House Members. Some who aren't here because they've left the Body, like the late Paul Luebke and Joe Tolson, Mickey Michaux, Rick Glazier, Darren Jackson, all people who took me under their wing and gave me advice. And Members who are still here and lead us with their wisdom, like Representatives Carney, Lucas, Gill, Richardson, people who frequently pull me aside to share their wisdom. And of course, you cannot leave without saying thank you to the people who do so ably serve us. I've loved working with this Clerk and everything that I've learned from him and his staff; thank you, James. I adore the Sergeant-at-Arms here, particularly the good humor that we share about what we observe in these floor debates; lots of laughs there.

"And while she's going with me to the Senate, I'm so appreciative to my LA, Daphne Quinn, for all of her work and the true partnership that we have. I'm so glad to have someone who's so dedicated to the work that we do to serve the people of our district - Orange and Caswell Counties.

"Thanks to all of you colleagues. I look forward to our continued service to the State of North Carolina."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE NICHOLS

"Well, this will be my only speech, 'cause you know I've been here a long time and we've had some very difficult debates and things. But I'm actually no stranger to this Body. In 1967, I was a Page from Mecklenburg County and then when I was graduated fresh from law school, I worked as a lawyer for Sarah Morrow, who was Secretary of Human Resources and Jane Patterson, when she was Secretary of Administration, and then Jim Hunt. So I used to sit up in those galleries a lot and watch what was happening on the floor, and sit in the committee rooms. I remember when everybody was just in one building before the new building was built.

"This is an amazing institution, and it's done some great things over the years and will continue to do so. I'm sorry that I won't be part of it, but I'm here in Raleigh and I will be around. I'll probably see you in the Cafeteria, and I will share with you what's been sort of my motto in politics back when I was a county commissioner and other stuff that I've done. It's from Will Rogers, 'Always do right. It will amaze your friends and confound your enemies.' Thank you, Mr. Speaker."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE TURNER

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

"I am incredibly grateful for being able to serve Buncombe County in North Carolina for these past eight years. And I am grateful I got to serve with so many fantastic folks here in this General Assembly, and folks that are, you know, unlikely friends, and hopefully I didn't make any real enemies, at least not long-lasting. And I'm thankful for the folks inside and outside this building.

"But really there is only one person I want to thank, and that is my daughter Eleanor. And that's because for the past eight years she has said goodbye to me on Monday morning, and then hopefully I would race to get home so I could see her before she went to bed on Thursday night. And, when I started this, she was seven. She's 15 now, and she is a big part of the reason why I want to spend some more time at home.

"So, I appreciate all of the wonderful experiences that I have had down here, all of the things I've been able to learn about this great State, from the mountains to the coast. I'm not going to say Murphy to Manteo because that is a bit tired. But for everyone coming back, I want to wish you all the best for the next biennium, and for those of us who aren't coming back, I think we all are going to enjoy a well-deserved rest. So thank you for having me here, back here in 120. It has been great to start here and finish here. So, thank you, Mr. Speaker."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE MCNEILL

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Well, after five terms and 10 years, here we are. I've probably listened to hundreds of these farewell speeches in the five terms that I've been here. And on a lot of them I said to myself, you know when my time comes, I think I'll just ride off into the sunset and be quiet. Well, it's my turn now and I'm not going quietly. Bear with me for a minute. First thing that I want to say is what a distinct honor it has been for me to serve the North Carolina House. It has been a distinct honor to serve the citizens of Randolph and Moore County and the citizens of this great State.

"I want to thank Paul Coble and the Legislative Services Office for all of their help.

"Speaker Moore, I appreciate your leadership and your staff, and also Speaker Tillis during my first term.

"I want to thank all of my friends and supporters in Randolph and Moore County. Without them, I wouldn't be here.

"Most of all, I want to thank my wife for putting up with me these 10 years, allowing me to be gone. I love you. Thank you.

"I'm sure that I left someone out, but what I want to say most of all by that is that I hope we all realize that without all these people that I just mentioned, we wouldn't be successful in what we do down here. It literally takes a large team like that to get this done.

"You know, when I went through school, especially high school, I probably would have been voted the most unlikely person to be in the North Carolina House. I'm sure probably they still would. But you know, at 25 years of age I settled down and did a 33-year career at the Randolph County Sheriff's Office. And the last 19 years as Chief Deputy. And, having worked

for a Sheriff's Office, you all know it is political. Every four years, you got to get elected. So I got deeply involved in politics. In 2012, when former Representative Harold Brubaker decided to retire, he left a vacant seat and I was honored to be appointed to replace him and then stood for five different elections after that.

"Last December 1st I announced that I wasn't seeking re-election again, and I spent much time in prayer and thought about making that decision. Quite selfishly, when I was thinking about the decision, one of my thoughts was, 'Who's going to replace me?' I bet a lot of you had the same thought about who was going to replace you when you leave. Well the next day after I announced, I got a call from Neal Jackson, and I said, 'Thank you Lord, my prayer's been answered.' He won and y'all take it easy on him when he gets down here. He is a good man and I think you'll really like him.

"Over the past year, I feel like I've been on a perpetual farewell tour. Having announced that I wasn't going to run, every event I attended I was introduced as 'Retiring Legislator Representative Allen McNeill, would you like to come up and make a few farewell remarks?' Well, that's been a year ago and you can imagine how many events I have been to and how many farewell speeches I had to give. Maybe, just maybe, this will be my last one.

"I have been asked multiple times what I'm going to do next. Easy answer, anything I want to.

"I will miss this place and the opportunity to make something good happen. I will miss all of you. Some of you might be glad this anti-alcohol and anti-gambling believer won't be here. But you know what? I don't regret one minute my stance against alcohol or against gambling and the other vices. All I can do in the future, though, is pray that some of you will hold the line in here and work to stop some of these bills.

"I know that finally retiring will bring a lot of changes in my life. No more hundreds of emails about every topic under the sun. No more unhappy constituents because I did or didn't do something. No more ugly phone calls, I hope. No more having my good bills die in the Senate. A lot more time on the golf course and at the beach. I could go on, but I won't. A lot will change with a lot of us retiring. You know, even I thought on January 1st, I'm going to have to change my answering machine. No more, 'You have reached Representative McNeill.' Actually, I have something I want to try on y'all for my answering machine, see what y'all think. 'Hello, you have reached the phone of Allen McNeill. I'm now retired and making a lot of changes in my life. Please leave your name, number, and your reason for calling. If I don't call you back, you're one of the changes.'

"Carry on. Fight the good fight. Merry Christmas. I love y'all. God bless this Legislature and this State. "

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE MCELRAFT

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Friends, I want to thank God for this amazing opportunity to serve with each and every one of you and to serve the citizens of Jones and Carteret County. Without His trust in me, I wouldn't be here. I want to thank my husband, Roger, who spent 31 years in the Marine Corps serving his country, for serving those feral cats in our neighborhood, as I left to come up here to serve. I want to thank my grandchildren for being okay with me not being at their games and their dance recitals because I was in Session. I want to thank my legislative assistant, Nancy Fox, who has been amazing. She is retiring also, so it's very bittersweet for the both of us, cleaning out the office because she also is retiring after 20 years of service. And Nancy's daughter works as our research assistant, and I want to thank her. They've decided to leave when I left, so we're all going out with tears in our eyes today. But Nancy has been amazing. The lobbyists come over there; they get their chocolate there. They can't give us anything, but we can give them chocolate. But my girls are entertainment for everyone that comes by; they're so well-liked, and we are going to miss them, the General Assembly I know will miss them.

"I want to thank James, our Clerk James and his staff for being here late at night. I want to thank the Sergeants-at-Arms for their protection and their loving care. I really appreciate all of you. I want to thank the Speaker and my caucus for trusting me to be your Deputy Whip, and I want to thank the Whip for giving me that opportunity. It's been a pleasure. I want to thank the Minority team here, and thank you for your friendships over the years and working on legislation with me, so many of you have. I especially want to tell you about a special friend of mine on your side. When I first got here, she and I didn't see eye to eye on one thing. Nothing, we were polar opposites, especially on the environment at that time. But Pricey, I love you, and I pray for you, with what you're going through right now. And I want you to know that we both gave a little. We negotiated; we shared our love for certain things like the commercial fishermen down in Carteret County. And we were friends; we don't need to be enemies here, y'all. We need to be friends. And we just need to do the people's business in that vein.

"I want to just quickly thank the AGNER staff for all the hours that they put in on our budget. I don't think they ever slept during budget season, and I know that our big Chairs and the staff there did not. Thank you so much for each of you, for your friendships. God bless you. Work together, all of those of you who will still be here. Work together and have respect for each other. Love you all.

"Mr. Speaker, I left one thing out, one thing. One personal thing that I wanted to say. The most important person up here to me - we came in together 16 years ago and we'll be leaving together - is Pat Hurley. Her birthday is the 29th, and we won't be here, so please wish her a happy birthday."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE HURLEY

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and I did have to write this out because I couldn't remember all of it. And speaking of which, I am the oldest woman in the North Carolina House, and I'm glad I'm still here.

"Thank you for the memories. Thank you for the memories I've had for the past 16 years as the first woman from Randolph County to win a State office. I am very thankful for this opportunity. It has been very different. It's been happy, it's been sad, it's been funny. It's just been very special to me, and I'll never, as long as I've got my memory bank hopefully, forget the times that have been here and all of you because you have been part of my life and family. And I've just been so happy to serve these 16 years that I've served here, and I've moved away from what I was going to say, so I'm going to go back to my script before I mess up.

"My seatmate and I came in together in 2007 with a class of 14 Members, nine Republicans and five Democrats. With our leaving, that leaves Representative William Brisson as the only one Member of our class left, and he came in as a Democrat and became a Republican and he will be representing us for the next session. And as a side remark, U.S. Senator Thom Tillis was a Member of our class and he's sort of moved on too. And I expect the median age, when we move on, Pat and I, will be less than 58 years and six months. So, watch out for next Session. I expect it's going to plummet. I'm very thankful, as I said, to be here.

"There are many special memories, and I have to mention, I just have to mention, number one, was a long Session that you've already heard about. That we were still in progress about 1:30 in the morning and everybody was tired and crazy and silly, and there was a bill about exotic animals. It wasn't a bill that I was doing, it was an amendment. But it was about exotic animals and they needed someone to do an amendment to help save the little monkeys, and I got the honor. So, there was so much laughter, you could hardly know it was supposed to be a serious amendment. Even the Speaker was down here laughing. After all of that in the House, and all of the talking and fun we had there, the Senate didn't take it up, which is normal.

"Also, I filed a bill to change the governing of Trinity. That was the one that took a lot of nerve that I had. My Senator didn't go along with me. And then it got married to a Senate bill where it got into litigation. My Trinity

part did pass, the Greensboro part did not pass, and they are doing very well in Trinity now. It was a very controversial bill, and I don't regret doing it now, but I was scared to death then.

"My favorite bill was in 2013 and I have to mention that. It was the Back to Basic bill that required students to learn cursive writing and to memorize multiplication tables. Why you would have to do a bill to do that in education, I have no idea, because until they get back to basics, the kids cannot be thinking critically. It passed and became law but many school districts still don't teach it. I hope that Representative Phil Shepard and Representative Harry Warren, who were primary sponsors with me on that bill, will help give the children this special skill that they need to read, write, and spell, and do everything they need to do.

"The saddest memory is the loss of several of our colleagues who were active Members. In 2020, Representatives Linda Johnson and MaryAnn Black passed away, and in 2021, Representatives Jerry Carter and Dana Bumgardner passed away. They were very dedicated Representatives and very good examples for their districts. I miss them today.

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for your leadership and for appointing me to the Committees and appointing me to Chairs of many of those Committees. I thank you very much for that opportunity.

"I thank my legislative assistant, Debbie Holder. We've had fun times the last ten years, and I thank my legislative assistants before that. But she has been very, very special to me, as family, and she and Frank are very special today and will always be. And thank you for all the personnel in the General Assembly. Every one of them, every job they do, and they do it with dedication and with patience, which I have a hard time. But they have patience and they have understanding, and they are so special. I thank every one of them for what they do here. I'm going to miss you so much. Fiscal is going to be missed. Mr. Trogden in Fiscal, especially, will be missed. I've worked with him since I've been here.

"Last, but certainly not least, I thank my Lord and Savior for the opportunity to serve in this Chamber, and I give Him the glory. He got me here. He's protected me so many times. He gave me wisdom when I asked for it. There's lots of times, you don't ask for it and you don't get it. You may mess up. He gave me wisdom when I needed it and He provided for my needs here as He does for all of us.

"It's been a blessing for me to serve District 70 and a blessing for me to serve with you all, and I will miss helping constituents and seeing each of you. I wish all of you the best to keep North Carolina prospering and being an example to America. Thank you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE R. SMITH

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

"First, I want to say thank you to my family for putting up with this sacrifice, of coming to Raleigh to do work for the people in the State of North Carolina. I will definitely always be indebted to them for that.

"I also want to thank the staff, the Sergeant-at-Arms, the other members of Mr. White's team, for all of their support and their help. There's no way that you can learn all of this stuff in the time that you're given, when you first get here, so I certainly appreciate that.

"Also, I want to thank my legislative assistant, Susan Thompson, who has been a trooper throughout all of this. I inherited her from Representative Larry Bell, who was my predecessor here in the General Assembly and can't wait to go back home and talk to him and tell him about my experiences.

"Also, want to give honor to my mother and father, they are both deceased, but my mother was a 38-year educator. She served on the Board of Education in my community for 18 years, until she passed as a sitting School Board Member. My dad, a United States Marine, who after leaving the Marine Corps, he went into the civil service, and worked at Seymour Johnson Air Force Base for 35 years and served the rest of his life in community service. So that kind of set the stage for who I am and what I'm about to do next. So, if for any reason you think you've seen the last of me, that's not the case! You will be seeing a lot of me and maybe even more than you want to!

"I'm very proud of my time here in the Legislature. Came in with my classmates, we had one of the largest classes that came in at the time that we did, and I'm certainly proud of each and every one of them and the things that they've been able to accomplish.

"But I'm certainly proud of my efforts to make HBCU funding more equitable in the State of North Carolina, and I hope we continue that effort. All of our colleges and universities in the State of North Carolina deserve equitable funding, and we should not be differentiating between one or the other. They are all important, and they all have a major role in the State of North Carolina.

"I'm also proud of the fight to preserve the sanctity of pure amateur sports and that the General Assembly decided not to take over the North Carolina High School Athletic Association. I think that would have been a travesty.

You know, we've ruined professional sports, we're ruining college sports. Let's keep high school sports pure! I think that's one of the things we need to stay away from. So, I'm glad we did not do more damage in that regard.

"And lastly, I'm absolutely proud of my efforts to support all military and veterans' issues. Being a United States Army combat veteran myself, I do indeed honor our troops and our veterans, and I'm very proud of my support for all of those efforts.

"So, that being said, Mr. Speaker, and to something that Representative Terry said earlier, 'I love a good fight too, but I like for that fight to be fair.' So, thank you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE ADCOCK

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Colleagues, there are just three things I want to say as I walk across the court to the other Chamber next month.

"The first is that I don't think there has been anything more instructive to me, and I hope you would agree, than when we all work together in a nonpartisan way to make policy. I plan to take that knowledge and that lesson with me when I serve in the Senate.

"The second is, many of you may not know this, but Suzanne Smith, my LA for the last over seven years is retiring at the end of this month. She is going to stay in the float pool, so some lucky ones of you will have the opportunity to work with her. She has actually been one of the most important people to help me be a success in this office, in addition to all of you and staff and everybody else who has already been mentioned. Suzanne is a very special person with great talents. I am sure many of you have met her and you know how helpful she is in all ways. She has actually been the face of constituent affairs in my office.

"And then the last thing is, I appreciate the way that you welcomed me into this Chamber as the first, and so far only, Nurse Practitioner to ever serve in the Legislature. So many of you have been eager to be on my bills, have asked me to be on yours, have asked me questions and asked for information based on my experience, 35-year experience, as a Nurse Practitioner. And that's made me feel really good. I have appreciated that so much.

"I leave you in the hands of four great nurses: Carla Cunningham, Donna White, Diane Wheatley, and soon to join you, Diamond Staton-Williams. I

"And I thank you for everything else and I will still see you around."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE RICHARDSON

"I'm sad that I am leaving the people here. The staff that works so hard to make us look so good when we really don't deserve to look so good. To all of you, I say thank you for what you do. You don't get paid enough, you don't get recognized enough, you do so much behind the scenes. As my mother would always tell me, still water runs very deep. Our staff are quiet, extraordinarily competent, good staff. They don't take credit, they don't brag. They just get the job done. Thank you so much for what you do.

"A special thank you to my LA. I had the best of the best, quite simply. I had the best of the best. That's all that needs to be said.

"I want to leave you, the bitterness and the sadness, is also the work that I leave behind that we didn't get accomplished. We have so much work to do with water, so much work to do with education, so much work to do with higher education and environment, and with inclusion. We still fall behind in inclusion. We have so much left to be done here. I wish I was going to be

a part of that. I regret that we didn't accomplish all that we needed to accomplish when I was here. But I believe in this system, and I know that you will get the job done. I know you will work on these big-ticket issues. Don't be afraid to take on the big-ticket issues. They are so important to the lives of the people of this State.

"I leave you with these observations. I leave you with the observation of hope. Having served with each of you - and I mean this, folks - having served with each of you, I know your hearts and souls. I know your compassion. I know your love of people. I know your love of this State. Don't lose hope in yourselves and don't lose hope in this institution. You are the embodiment of it. Represent us, serve us, never lose hope. Take on the big-ticket issues and do what you know in your heart is right.

"Never forget your DNA. You're Americans. You're North Carolinians. In your DNA is the DNA of freedom, of visionary greatness, of things not yet accomplished. Never forget that DNA. Never forget those that came before you to sacrifice so much to get us where we are. Carry that tradition on and instill that tradition into your children and grandchildren. It's our DNA, folks, embrace it.

"Finally, accept the challenge of why you are here. You know, it's funny, I was watching a lot of the political ads this past session. A lot of them were about across the aisle cooperation, and how folks made that effort to work across the aisle. I really pray that both sides take that campaign issue to heart. Because on each side of this incredible Body, Democrat and Republican, are extraordinary people with extraordinary gifts, that have so much to offer if we will just learn to work together. If we will just take the time to walk in the other person's shoes and to understand where they are coming from, and to see their vision of America and their vision of North Carolina. If we will take that time, we will all be better Representatives. So I leave with you this: take the time to get to know each other. Because what you will find is that you all are the embodiment of this great State. You're great people with great vision and great hope and love of this State. Work together, take on the bigticket issues, and keep doing what this great State has always done. And that is, we face our problems and we overcome them.

"God bless each of you.

"One last thing I will say, I have been blessed with the best wife a person could have. I met her when I was 16. She's my soulmate, my best friend. I am a blessed man today. And I am blessed because I've been a colleague of y'all's. It has been an honor and thank you so much for allowing me to be a part of this wonderful Body.

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE FARKAS

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you for your management of the floor, as well as Leader Reives for the same.

And know, like I said, it has been the honor of my life to be here. And I thank you so much for being incredible colleagues. Let's continue to move North Carolina forward. Thank you."

REMARKS BY REPRESENTATIVE BOLES

"Thank you, Mr. Speaker. First of all, I would like to thank God for the privilege of serving in this institution and representing the people of Moore County. I would also like to thank my family. When I started, I had a junior in high school and now I have five grandchildren. Time does go by quickly! I would also like to thank my Boles Funeral Home staff because without them, I would not have been able to stay here and serve the community in both the House and in our profession of funeral service. As a funeral director, it is always not good to go after a lawyer to speak, but Representative Billy Richardson, thank you for your words.

"My first experience in this institution and in this building was when I was in the fifth grade, and we came up to take a tour of the Legislative Building. I can remember walking up the red carpet and then when I got here in 2008, I was told that I couldn't touch the red carpet! So, times have changed. I knew when I was here in fifth grade that this was a goal that I wanted to achieve, and I did. It just so happened that in our community was Mr. H. WHEREAS, with the death of Betty Landon Ray McCain, the State of North Carolina has lost one of its most able, outstanding, devoted, and loyal citizens. Betty was born on February 23, 1931, to H.T. and Mary Howell Perrett Ray in Faison, North Carolina. She earned an undergraduate degree from the University of North Carolina (UNC) at Chapel Hill and master's degree in Music from Columbia University Teachers College; and

WHEREAS, Betty McCain was married to fellow UNC alumnus, Dr. John Lewis McCain, and they raised two children in the City of Wilson. She became a leader in the community, serving as President of the Wilson Downtown Development Corporation, Vice-Chair of the Wilson County Historical Associates, Co-Chair of the Wilson Whirligig Festival Entertainment

Committee, a member of the Wil-Med Health Care Foundation Board of Trustees, a member of the Wilson Rose Garden Society, and a collaborator in the McCain Internet Empowerment Project. She was also a dedicated member of the First Presbyterian Church where she was a deacon and an elder and sang in the choir; and

WHEREAS, Betty McCain rendered distinguished service to her beloved alma mater for over 70 years, serving as a member of the UNC Board of Visitors and as Chair of the UNC General Alumni Association, Center for Public Television, and the Lineberger Comprehensive Cancer Center Board of Visitors; and

WHEREAS, Betty McCain contributed to the political affairs of the State, working on several gubernatorial campaigns and later serving as President of the North Carolina Democratic Women and Chair of the North Carolina Democratic Party. She also held a leadership role on the Democratic National Committee; and

WHEREAS, Betty McCain worked unselfishly for the betterment of the State, serving on the North Carolina Medical Alliance, North Carolina Museums Council, Tryon Palace Commission, First Flight Centennial Commission, Chair of the United Way State Employees Combined Campaign, North Carolina Mental Health Association, First Colony Foundation, and as a regional corporate board member for SPRINT Telecommunications. She was appointed to the State Advisory Budget Commission, Governor's Task Force on Child Advocacy, Board of Governors of the University of North Carolina, and as Secretary of the Department of Cultural Resources; and

WHEREAS, Betty McCain received numerous honorary degrees and awards from several of the State's universities and colleges, including UNC, Wake Forest University, UNC-Greensboro, UNC-Wilmington, North Carolina State University, Barton College, and St. Andrews Presbyterian College. UNC awarded her with the General Alumni Association's distinguished service medal and the William Richardson Davie Award. She also received the North Carolinian Society Award, ArtsNC President's Award, and Joseph Caldwell Award from the North Carolina Humanities Council. She was inducted into the North Carolina Women's Hall of Fame and was bestowed the Order of the Long Leaf Pine and North Carolina Award;

H.R. 981, A HOUSE RESOLUTION EXPRESSING SUPPORT FOR UKRAINE AS ITS PEOPLE FIGHT FOR FREEDOM AND URGING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO INCREASE DOMESTIC ENERGY PRODUCTION.

Whereas, on February 24, 2022, Russian President Vladimir Putin authorized an unprovoked attack in Ukraine. Shortly thereafter, Russian forces began missile and artillery strikes on some of Ukraine's major cities, including its capital Kyiv; and

Whereas, Russia's attack on Ukraine has resulted in the unnecessary loss of life, the displacement and flight of countless Ukrainian citizens, and the destruction of property and infrastructure; and

Whereas, the State of North Carolina stands with the people of Ukraine as they fight to defend their country from Russia's invasion; and

Whereas, the State of North Carolina urges the United States government to continue taking steps to punish the Russian government for its actions and to offer humanitarian relief to the Ukrainian people; and

Whereas, the State of North Carolina also urges the United States government to decrease the country's dependence on foreign oil by increasing our domestic production; and

Whereas, North Carolina taxpayers and public employees who teach, protect, and otherwise serve should be granted additional recourse to hold the Russian Federation, its corrupt leadership, and its state-owned corporations accountable in U.S. Courts for economic damage done to the United States; and

Whereas, as American troops deploy to European countries to support allied efforts to aid Ukraine, the State of North Carolina expresses its continued support for all members of the military stationed at bases in the State; Now, therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives:

SECTION 1. The North Carolina House of Representatives stands in solidarity with the people of Ukraine as they fight for their freedom.

SECTION 2. The North Carolina House of Representatives urges the United States government to hold the Russian government accountable for its actions, provide humanitarian aid to the Ukrainian people, and take steps to reduce the United States' dependence on foreign oil by increasing domestic energy production.

SECTION 3. The North Carolina House of Representatives urges the United States Congress to amend the Foreign Sovereign Immunities Act (FSIA) of 1976, codified in Title 28, §§ 1330, 1332, 1391(f), 1441(d), and 1602 through 1611 of the United States Code, to the ends of providing more effective recourse for state pension funds and other institutional investors to hold corrupt regimes and foreign state-owned corporations accountable in U.S. Courts for their actions.

SECTION 4. The Principal Clerk shall transmit a copy of this resolution to each member of North Carolina's Congressional Delegation, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, the Majority Leader of the United States Senate, and the President of the United States.

SECTION 5. This resolution is effective upon adoption.

H.R. 1171, A HOUSE RESOLUTION OBSERVING JUNE 14 AS FLAG DAY.

Whereas, on June 14, 1777, Congress adopted a flag for the United States; and

Whereas, the United States flag has served as a symbol of pride for all Americans for 245 years and as a uniting force for the country during times of conflict; and

Whereas, on August 3, 1949, Congress enacted legislation approving the national observance of Flag Day on June 14 of each year; and

Whereas, observing Flag Day is a way for the citizens of this State to show their respect for and devotion to our Nation's flag; Now, therefore, Be it resolved by the House of Representatives:

SECTION 1. The House of Representatives joins the Nation in observing June 14, 2022, as Flag Day.

SECTION 2. This resolution is effective upon adoption.

H.R. 1174, A HOUSE RESOLUTION URGING CONGRESS TO OPPOSE THE SECURITIES AND EXCHANGE COMMISSION'S PROPOSED RULE ON "THE ENHANCEMENT AND STANDARD-IZATION OF CLIMATE-RELATED DISCLOSURES FOR INVESTORS" AS IT RELATES TO AGRICULTURE.

Whereas, the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) has proposed a rule on "The Enhancement and Standardization of Climate-related Disclosures for Investors," which includes a requirement that public companies disclose their Scope 3 greenhouse gas emissions. This requirement would become de facto regulation of all farms by the SEC and would require farms of all sizes to disclose a significant amount of information on climate-related items that they very well may be currently unable to quantify; and

Whereas, this rule would impact the State's agriculture industry significantly; and

Whereas, agriculture contributes 92.9 billion dollars to our State's economy annually, making it the State's number one industry; and

Whereas, farmgate sales provide nearly a tenth of this total, with robust manufacturing, wholesale, and retail operations accounting for the remainder; and

Whereas, in North Carolina, 98% of farms are family owned and operated. Additionally, of the 46,000 farms in our State, nearly 80% have revenues of \$50,000 or less. These farms are not corporations with sophisticated compliance departments with dedicated staffing resources like you would find in a publicly traded company, nor should they be treated as such. Imposing additional reporting requirements around climate-related metrics would distract farms of all sizes from their focus on producing food, fiber, and fuel; and

Whereas, given the challenges currently facing the farm economy from inflation and increased expenses, this additional regulatory burden could cause family farms to cease operations; and

Whereas, with the strong potential for food shortages in the near future, now is not the time for the SEC to reach beyond its purview and take action that could further stress our nation's food insecurity for the most vulnerable members of our society; and

Whereas, the House of Representatives urges Congress to take action in opposing the SEC's new rule; Now, therefore,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives:

SECTION 1. The House of Representatives urges Congress to oppose the Securities and Exchange Commission's proposed rule that would require public companies to disclose their Scope 3 greenhouse gas emissions as this requirement would impact, and potentially harm, the State's agriculture industry.

SECTION 2. The Principal Clerk shall transmit a copy of this resolution to the Securities and Exchange Commission.

SECTION 3. This resolution is effective upon adoption.

H.R. 1176, A HOUSE RESOLUTION ELECTING DR. M. LEE BARNES, JR., TO THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA.

Whereas, N. Leo Daughtry of Johnston County was elected by the House of Representatives in 2021 to serve as a member of the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina for a term of four years; and

Whereas, N. Leo Daughtry has resigned from the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina effective June 30, 2022; and

H.R. 1177, A HOUSE RESOLUTION ELECTING DR. GRANT L. CAMPBELL TO FILL A VACANCY ON THE STATE BOARD OF COMMUNITY COLLEGES.

Whereas, G.S. 115D-2.2(d) requires that vacancies on the State Board of Community Colleges be filled by the chamber originally electing the vacating member in the manner prescribed by G.S. 115D-2.2(c) for the remainder of the unexpired term; and

Section 3. The Committee, while in the discharge of its official duties, may exercise all powers provided for under G.S. 120-19 and Article 5A of Chapter 120 of the General Statutes. The Committee may contract for professional, clerical, or consultant services, as provided by G.S. 120-32.02.

Section 4. The Committee shall study issues related to education in elementary and secondary schools, including but not limited to the following:

- a. Requirements of the standard course of study.
- b. Outcomes of the standard course of study, including the appropriate metrics.
- c. Opportunities for students to demonstrate competency at their own pace.
- d. Funding and outcomes of current programs, including partnerships with nonprofits, that support the standards and outcomes of a sound basic education.
- e. Any other issue deemed relevant by the Chair to the charge of the Committee.

The Committee will consult with Parents and Students, Leaders in both Small and Large Business and Industry as well as public schools and other academic institutions in its study. The Committee may seek information from experts in the fields of education and any other field deemed appropriate by the Senior Chair.

Section 5. The Committee shall meet at the call of the Senior Chair, and may meet during the session of the General Assembly, the interim period between sessions, or during recesses of the General Assembly.

Section 6. Members of the Committee shall receive per diem, subsistence, and travel allowance as provided in G.S. 120-3.1.

Section 7. The expenses of the Committee including per diem, subsistence, travel allowances for Committee and working group members, and contracts for professional or consultant services shall be paid upon the written approval of the Speaker of the House of Representatives pursuant to G.S. 120-32.02(c) and G.S. 120-35 from funds available to the House of Representatives for its operations. Individual expenses of \$5,000 or less,

SENATE BILL 173 RATIFIED BILL

(The ratified Conference Committee Substitute was vetoed by the Governor on February 24, 2022, and returned to the Senate. The Senate failed to pass the bill notwithstanding the Governor's objections on March 9, 2022. The Senate reconsidered the motion to pass the bill notwithstanding the Governor's objections and the ratified Conference Committee Substitute was referred to the Committee on Rules and Operations of the Senate.)

AN ACT TO PROVIDE PARENTAL DISCRETION IN REQUIREMENTS FOR FACE COVERINGS ON PUBLIC SCHOOL UNIT PROPERTY.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

PART I. PARENTAL DISCRETION IN STUDENT FACE COVERINGS

SECTION 1. Article 25A of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"§ 115C-375.30. Parental discretion in student face coverings.

(a) For the purposes of this section, the term "parent" means the parent or guardian of a child enrolled in a public school unit or attending any early childhood program located on property owned, used, or operated by a public school unit.

(b) Notwithstanding any other State or local law, rule, or policy, a parent may elect for their child to not wear a face covering while on public school unit property and shall notify a public school unit of that election. A public school unit shall adopt a process for parents to provide annual notification of the election. A parent shall not be required to provide a reason or any certification of the child's health or education status in making the election. As a result of a parental election under this section, students without face coverings shall not be treated differently than students with face coverings by the public school unit, including in classroom assignments, course

assignments, non-academic portions of the school day, extracurricular activities, student discipline, and academic grading.

(c) No governing body of a public school unit, or its members, employees, designees, agents, or volunteers, shall be liable for any act or omission in compliance with this section that does not amount to gross negligence, willful or wanton conduct, or intentional wrongdoing."

PART II. CONFORMING CHANGES

SECTION 2.(a) G.S. 115C-47 is amended by adding a new subdivision to read:

"(68) Parental discretion in face coverings. - Local boards of education shall comply with the requirements of G.S. 115C-375.30, providing parental discretion in student face coverings."

SECTION 2.(b) G.S. 115C-218.75 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

"(k) Parental Discretion in Face Coverings. - Charter schools shall comply with the requirements of G.S. 115C-375.30, providing parental discretion in student face coverings."

SECTION 2.(c) G.S. 115C-238.66 is amended by adding a new subdivision to read:

"(19) Parental discretion in face coverings. - Boards of directors shall comply with the requirements of G.S. 115C-375.30, providing parental discretion in student face coverings."

SECTION 2.(d) G.S. 116-239.8(b) is amended by adding a new subdivision to read:

"(22) Parental discretion in face coverings. - Laboratory schools shall comply with the requirements of G.S. 115C-375.30, providing parental discretion in student face coverings."

PART III. REPEAL OF MONTHLY VOTING REQUIREMENTS ON FACE COVERINGS

SECTION 3. Section 10 of S.L. 2021-130 is repealed.

PART IV. EFFECTIVE DATE

SECTION 4. This act is effective when it becomes law.

CONFERENCE COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE NO. 1 FOR SENATE BILL 201

(Conference Report No. 1 for S.B. 201 with Proposed Conference Committee Substitute S201-PCCS35421-BW-2 was submitted to the House on June 30, 2022, and failed of adoption. The vote by which the Conference Report failed of adoption was reconsidered and the Conference Report was returned to the Conference Committee. Conference Report No. 2 was adopted on July 1, 2022.)

S201-PCCS35421-BW-2, A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT TO MAKE VARIOUS CHANGES TO MOTOR VEHICLE AND TRANSPORTATION LAWS.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

CRIMINALIZE UNLAWFUL POSSESSION OF CATALYTIC CONVERTER

SECTION 1.(a) G.S. 14-72.8(b), as enacted by Section 1 of S.L. 2021-154, is repealed.

SECTION 1.(b) Article 23 of Chapter 14 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"§ 14-164.1. Possession of catalytic converter removed from a motor vehicle.

<u>Unless the conduct is covered under some other provision of law</u> providing greater punishment, knowingly possessing a catalytic converter that has been removed from a motor vehicle is a Class I felony unless the person in possession is any of the following:

- (1) An employee or agent of a company, or an individual, acting in their official duties for a motor vehicle dealer, motor vehicle repair shop, secondary metals recycler, or salvage yard that is licensed, permitted, or registered pursuant to State law.
- (2) An individual who possesses vehicle registration documentation indicating that the catalytic converter in the individual's possession is from a vehicle registered in that individual's name and is or will be replaced with another legally obtained catalytic converter.
- (3) An individual who possesses a catalytic converter lawfully received from an individual in subdivision (2) of this section and proof of vehicle ownership and a copy of the most recent vehicle registration documentation for the vehicle from which the catalytic converter was removed."

SECTION 1.(c) G.S. 66-424(a)(3a), as enacted by Section 4 of S.L. 2021-154, reads as rewritten:

"(3a) Purchase any catalytic converters that are not attached to a vehicle, except that a secondary metals recycler may purchase these items from a person listed in <u>G.S. 14-72.8(b).G.S. 14-164.1.</u>"

SECTION 1.(d) This section becomes effective December 1, 2022, and applies to offenses committed on or after that date.

DELAY EFFECTIVE DATE OF PERMIT AND LICENSE **REVOCATIONS FOR NOT MEETING REQUIREMENTS FOR DRIVING ELIGIBILITY CERTIFICATE**

SECTION 2.(a) G.S. 20-13.2 reads as rewritten: "§ 20-13.2. Grounds for revoking provisional license.

(c1)Upon receipt of notification from the proper school authority that a person no longer meets the requirements for a driving eligibility certificate under G.S. 20-11(n), the Division must expeditiously notify the person that his or her permit or license is revoked effective on the tenth thirtieth calendar day after the mailing of the revocation notice. The Division must revoke the permit or license of that person on the tenth-thirtieth calendar day after the mailing of the revocation notice. Notwithstanding subsection (d) of this section, the length of revocation must last for the following periods:"

SECTION 2.(b) This section becomes effective October 1, 2022. and applies to revocation notices mailed on or after that date.

AUTHORIZE UNITED STATES ARMY SPECIAL FORCES SPECIAL REGISTRATION PLATE

SECTION 3.(a) G.S. 20-79.4(b) reads as rewritten:

"(b) Types. - The Division shall issue the following types of special registration plates:

United States Army Special Forces. - Issuable to a member or 0 veteran of the United States Army Special Forces. The plate shall bear the name "United States Army Special Forces" and the insignia of the United States Army Special Forces.

...."

SECTION 3.(b) The Revisor of Statutes is authorized to alphabetize, number, and renumber the special registration plates listed in G.S. 20-79.4(b) to ensure that all the special registration plates are listed in alphabetical order and numbered accordingly.

SECTION 3.(c) The plate authorized by this act is not subject to the requirements to establish a new special registration plate in G.S. 20-79.3A and the expiration of special registration plate authorization in G.S. 20-79.8.

SECTION 3.(d) This section becomes effective October 1, 2022.

DEALER PLATE REGISTRATION CARD REQUIREMENTS

SECTION 4.(a) G.S. 20-79 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

"(b1) Dealer Plate Registration Card. - For each dealer license plate issued pursuant to this section, the Division must provide a registration card that lists all valid dealer license plates issued to that dealer pursuant to this section. The Division shall reissue registration cards as needed to ensure the accuracy of dealer license plate information."

SECTION 4.(b) This section becomes effective December 1, 2022, and applies to dealer plates issued on or after that date.

CLARIFY DEALER PLATE USE REQUIREMENTS

SECTION 5.(a) G.S. 20-79(d) reads as rewritten:

"(d) Restrictions on Use. - A dealer license plate may be displayed only on a motor vehicle that meets all of the following requirements:

- (1) Is part of the inventory of the dealer.
- (2) Is not consigned to the dealer.
- (3) Is covered by liability insurance that meets the requirements of Article 9A of this Chapter.
- (4) Is not used by the dealer in another business in which the dealer is engaged.
- (5) Is driven on a highway by a person who meets one of the following descriptions:
 - a. Has a demonstration permit to test-drive the motor vehicle and carries the demonstration permit while driving the motor vehicle.
 - b. Is an officer or sales representative of the dealer and is driving the vehicle for a business purpose of the dealer.
 - c. Is an employee of the dealer and is driving the vehicle in the course of employment.
 - d. Is an employee of the dealer or of a contractor of the dealer and is driving the vehicle within a 20-mile radius of a place where the vehicle is being repaired or otherwise prepared for sale.
 - e. Is an employee of the dealer or of a contractor of the dealer and is transporting the vehicle to or from a vehicle auction or to the dealer's established salesroom.
 - f. Is an officer, sales representative, or other employee of an independent or franchised motor vehicle dealer or is an immediate family member of an officer, sales representative, or other employee of an independent or franchised motor vehicle dealer.
- (6) A-Displays a dealer license plate that matches (i) a copy of the registration card for the dealer plate issued to the dealer is carried by the person operating the motor vehicle or, vehicle, or (ii) if the person is operating the motor vehicle in this State, the a registration card for the dealer plate issued to the dealer that is maintained on file at the dealer's address listed on the registration card, card and the registration card must be able to be produced within 24 hours upon request of any law enforcement officer.

A dealer may issue a demonstration permit for a motor vehicle to a person licensed to drive that type of motor vehicle. A demonstration permit authorizes each person named in the permit to drive the motor vehicle described in the permit for up to 96 hours after the time the permit is issued. A dealer may, for good cause, renew a demonstration permit for one additional 96-hour period. A franchised motor vehicle dealer is not prohibited from using a demonstration permit pursuant to this subsection by reason of the dealer's receipt of incentive or warranty compensation or other reimbursement or consideration from a manufacturer, factory branch, distributor, distributor branch or from a third-party warranty, maintenance, or service contract company relating to the use of the vehicle as a demonstrator or service loaner.

A dealer may not lend, rent, lease, or otherwise place a dealer license plate at the disposal of a person except as authorized by this subsection."

SECTION 5.(b) This section becomes effective December 1, 2022, and applies to offenses committed on or after that date.

CLARIFY APPLICABILITY OF MOVE OVER LAW

SECTION 6.(a) G.S. 20-157(f) reads as rewritten:

"(f) When an authorized emergency vehicle <u>as described listed in</u> subsection (a) of this <u>section section</u>, or <u>any a</u> public service <u>vehicle vehicle</u>, is parked or standing within 12 feet of a roadway and <u>is giving a warning</u> signal by appropriate light, the driver of every other approaching vehicle shall, as soon as it is safe and when not otherwise directed by an individual lawfully directing traffic, do one of the following:

- (1) Move the vehicle into a lane that is not the lane nearest to the parked or standing authorized emergency vehicle or public service vehicle and continue traveling in that lane until safely clear of the authorized emergency vehicle or public service vehicle. This paragraph subdivision applies only if the roadway has at least two lanes for traffic proceeding in the direction of the approaching vehicle and if the approaching vehicle may change lanes safely and without interfering with any vehicular traffic.
- (2) Slow the vehicle, maintaining a safe speed for traffic conditions, and operate the vehicle at a reduced speed and be prepared to stop until completely past the authorized emergency vehicle or public service vehicle. This paragraph subdivision applies only if the roadway has only one lane for traffic proceeding in the direction of the approaching vehicle or if the approaching vehicle may not change lanes safely and without interfering with any vehicular traffic.

For purposes of this section, "public service vehicle" means a vehicle that <u>is</u> (i) <u>is</u>-being used to assist motorists or law enforcement officers with wrecked or disabled vehicles, (ii) <u>is</u>-being used to install, maintain, or restore utility service, including electric, cable, telephone, <u>water</u>, <u>wastewater</u>, communications, and gas, (iii) <u>is</u>-being used in the collection of refuse, solid waste, or recycling, or (iv) <u>is</u>-a highway maintenance vehicle owned and operated by or contracted by the State or a local government and is operating an amber-colored flashing light authorized by G.S. 20-130.2. Violation of this subsection shall be negligence per se."

SECTION 6.(b) This section becomes effective August 1, 2022, and applies to offenses committed on or after that date.

TEMPORARY DEALER LICENSE REQUIREMENTS

SECTION 7.(a) G.S. 20-295, as amended by Section 5 of S.L. 2021-134, reads as rewritten:

"§ 20-295. Action on application; grace period while application for license renewal is pending.

(a) Division Action. - The Division shall either grant or deny an application for a license or license renewal within 30 days after receiving it. Any applicant denied a license shall, upon filing a written request within 30 days, be given a hearing at the time and place determined by the Commissioner or a person designated by the Commissioner. A hearing shall be public and shall be held with reasonable promptness.

(b) Pending License Renewal Grace Period. - When an application for license renewal has been timely submitted prior to expiration of the license, the license shall remain valid for up to 30 days after the expiration date until the Division grants or denies the application. The Division shall (i) ensure that any database maintained by the Division that indicates the status of a license issued under this Article reflects that the license continues to be valid during this period and (ii) send a temporary license to the <u>renewal</u> applicant for display to evidence extension of the validity of the license to engage in <u>business in this State</u> while the Division pursuant to this subsection shall contain on its face the following notation: "This temporary license is issued pursuant to G.S. 20-295 during a license renewal application review by the North Carolina Division of Motor Vehicles and is valid to engage in business in this State with all rights and privileges of a license.""

SECTION 7.(b) This section becomes effective October 1, 2022, and applies to applications for license renewals submitted to the Division of Motor Vehicles on or after that date.

SECTION 8.(a) G.S. 20-183.8(a) reads as rewritten:

"(a) Infractions. - A person who does any of the following commits an infraction and, if found responsible, is liable for a penalty of up to fifty dollars (\$50.00):

SECTION 10.(a) G.S. 20-43.1 reads as rewritten:

"§ 20-43.1. Disclosure of personal information in motor vehicle records.

(e) As authorized in 18 U.S.C. § 2721, the Division may also provide copies of partial crash report data collected pursuant to G.S. 20-166.1, partial driver license data kept pursuant to G.S. 20-26(a), and partial vehicle

registration application <u>and renewal</u> data collected pursuant to G.S. 20-52 in bulk form to persons, private companies, or other entities, for uses other than official, upon payment of a fee of three cents (3ϕ) per individual record. The Division shall not furnish such data except upon execution by the recipient of a written agreement to comply with the Driver's Privacy Protection Act of 1994, as amended, 18 U.S.C. §§ 2721, et seq. The information released to persons, private companies, or other entities, for uses other than official, pursuant to this subsection, shall not be a public record pursuant to Chapter 132 of the General Statutes.

(e1) As authorized in 18 U.S.C. § 2721 and for verification purposes, the Division may provide information on motor vehicle registration or liability insurance upon written request and payment of a fee of one dollar (\$1.00) per individual record.

SECTION 10.(b) G.S. 20-4.02 reads as rewritten:

"§ 20-4.02. Quadrennial adjustment of certain fees and rates.

(a) Adjustment for Inflation. - Beginning July 1, 2020, and every four years thereafter, the Division shall adjust the fees and rates imposed pursuant to the statutes listed in this subsection for inflation in accordance with the Consumer Price Index computed by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. In cases of a written determination by the Secretary of Transportation that the requirement for compatibility does not make public advertising feasible for the repair of <u>rail equipment or</u> ferryboats, the public advertising as well as the soliciting of informal bids may be waived."

INCLUDE NEVI AND CRP FEDERAL FUNDS WITHIN STI FORMULA

SECTION 13. G.S. 136-189.11, as amended by Section 3.5 of S.L. 2021-185, reads as rewritten:

"§ 136-189.11. Transportation Investment Strategy Formula.

(b) Funds Excluded From Formula. - The following funds are not subject to this section:

- (1) Federal congestion mitigation and air quality improvement program funds appropriated to the State by the United States pursuant to 23 U.S.C. § 104(b)(2) and 23 U.S.C. § 149.
- (1a) Federal Carbon Reduction Program formula funds appropriated to the State.
- (2) Funds received through competitive awards or discretionary grants through federal appropriations either for local governments, transportation authorities, transit authorities, or the Department.
- (3) Funds received from the federal government that under federal law may only be used for Appalachian Development Highway System projects.
- (4) Funds used in repayment of "GARVEE" bonds related to Phase I of the Yadkin River Veterans Memorial Bridge project.
- (5) Funds committed to gap funding for toll roads funded with bonds issued pursuant to G.S. 136-176.

- (6) Funds obligated for projects in the State Transportation Improvement Program that are scheduled for construction as of October 1, 2013, in State fiscal year 2012-2013, 2013-2014, or 2014-2015.
- (7) Toll collections from a turnpike project under Article 6H of this Chapter and other revenue from the sale of the Authority's bonds or notes or project loans, in accordance with G.S. 136-89.192.
- (8) Toll collections from the State-maintained ferry system collected under the authority of G.S. 136-82.
- (9) Federal State Planning and Research Program funds (23 U.S.C. § 505) and Metropolitan Planning funds (23 U.S.C. §§ 104 and 134).
- (10) Federal Lands Access Program funds received by the State pursuant to 23 U.S.C. § 204.
- (11) Funds advanced pursuant to G.S. 136-186.
- (12) Funds appropriated to the North Carolina State Ports Authority for the purposes described in G.S. 136-176(b3).

(c) Funds With Alternate Criteria. - The following federal program activities shall be included in the applicable category of the Transportation Investment Strategy Formula set forth in subsection (d) of this section but shall not be subject to the prioritization criteria set forth in that subsection:

- (1) Bridge replacement.
- (2) Interstate maintenance.
- (3) Highway safety improvement.
- (4) State funds used to match federal Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement (CMAQ) program funds apportioned to the State pursuant to 23 U.S.C. § 104(b)(2) and 23 U.S.C. § 149 for projects on the State highway system that improve the safety, mobility, and operational characteristics of the State highway system for motorists.
- (5) State funds used to match federal Carbon Reduction Program formula funds appropriated to the State for projects on the State highway system that improve the safety, mobility, and operational characteristics of the State highway system for motorists.

(d) Transportation Investment Strategy Formula. - Funds subject to the Formula shall be distributed as follows:

(3) Division Need Projects. - Thirty percent (30%) of the funds subject to this section shall be allocated in equal share to each

of the Department divisions, as defined in G.S. 136-14.1, and used for Division Need Projects.

 - Alternate criteria. Funding from the following programs shall be included in the computation of each of the Department division equal shares but shall be subject to alternate quantitative criteria:
 - 1. Federal Surface Transportation Program-Direct Attributable funds expended on eligible projects in the Division Need Projects category.
 - 2. Federal Transportation Alternatives funds appropriated to the State.
 - 3. Federal Railway-Highway Crossings Program funds appropriated to the State.
 - <u>3a.</u> <u>Federal National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure</u> (NEVI) Program formula funds appropriated to the State.
 - 4. Projects requested from the Department in support of a time-critical job creation opportunity, provided that (i) the Department investment for all projects funded under this subsub-subdivision in any five-year period shall not hundred exceed one million dollars (\$100,000,000) in the aggregate, (ii) the amount of funding associated with a project under this sub-subdivision does not exceed the lesser of ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) and the greater of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) per job created or ten percent (10%) of the amount of private investment associated with the project, (iii) the Department ensures that funding under this sub-subdivision, when combined with any other grants, does not result in the costs of the project to the State outweighing its total benefits and determines that the funding is necessary for completion of the project in this State. Upon the release of a State Transportation Improvement Program, the Department shall submit a report to the Joint Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee detailing the projects funded under this sub-subsubdivision.
 - 5. Federal funds for municipal road projects.

STI REPRIORITIZATION DELAY FOR CERTAIN PROJECTS WITH ROUTE REDESIGNATIONS

SECTION 14.(a) G.S. 136-189.11 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

"(d2)Reprioritization Delay for Certain Projects with Route Redesignations. - After redesignation of an existing or proposed secondary route to a primary highway route, a project shall not be eligible for evaluation in a newly designated funding category under G.S. 136-189.10 until (i) the new route designation is reflected in the transportation plan that has been approved by the appropriate governing body and the Board of Transportation and (ii) the Department has commenced its second subsequent prioritization after the date of final route redesignation approval. All net proceeds of these dispositions shall be deposited into the State Highway Fund.
- (10) The net proceeds derived from the sale <u>or lease</u> of land, facilities, products, or timber owned by the Department of Transportation <u>or owned by the State and solely maintained</u> <u>by the Department of Transportation</u> shall be deposited into the State Highway Fund.

PILOT PROGRAM TO AUTHORIZE AUTOMATIC LICENSE PLATE READERS IN STATE RIGHT-OF-WAY

SECTION 22.(a) The Department of Transportation may enter into agreements with the North Carolina State Bureau of Investigation for the placement and use of automatic license plate reader systems, as defined in G.S. 20-183.30(1), within land or right-of-way owned by the Department of Transportation as part of a pilot program established by this section; provided that (i) the use of the land or right-of-way is temporary in nature, (ii) the automatic license plate reader system is above ground, removeable, and contains no combustible fuel, (iii) the placement and use does not unreasonably interfere with the operation and maintenance of public utility facilities or cause the facilities to fail to comply with all applicable laws, codes, and regulatory requirements, (iv) the authorization to locate the automatic license plate reader system within the right-of-way is revocable by the Department for cause with at least 30 days' notice, (v) the use of the automatic license plate reader system complies with provisions of Article 8A of Chapter 87 of the General Statutes, and (vi) the automatic license plate reader system is operated in accordance with Article 3D of Chapter 20 of the General Statutes. Placement and use of an automatic license plate reader system and related equipment under this subsection must be terminated and removed by the Department upon request by any affected public utility. The Department or a public utility may relocate an automatic license plate reader system and related equipment in the event that the Department or public utility needs immediate access to its utilities or facilities and shall only be liable for damages to the automatic license plate reader system and related equipment caused solely by its gross negligence or willful misconduct. If an automatic license plate reader system or related equipment is moved for immediate access, the Department or applicable public utility must provide notice to the State Bureau of Investigation. For purposes of this subsection, the term "public utility" means any of the following: a public utility, as defined in G.S. 62-3(23), an electric membership corporation, telephone membership corporation, a joint municipal power agency, or a municipality, as defined in G.S. 159B-3(5).

SECTION 22.(b) No later than March 1, 2023, the North Carolina State Bureau of Investigation shall submit a report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Justice and Public Safety and the Joint Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee on automatic license plate reader systems placed on right-of-ways owned or maintained by the Department of Transportation. The report shall contain the written policy governing use of each automatic license plate reader system, the number of requests for captured data by requesting agency, and the amount of data preserved for more than 90 days compared to the amount of data captured on an annual basis.

SECTION 22.(c) Section 41.57(a) and Section 41.57(c) of S.L. 2021-180 are repealed.

SECTION 22.(d) Subsection (a) of this section expires June 1, 2023, and any agreement entered into under the pilot program established in that subsection shall terminate no later than that date.
