As of September 30, 2023, there were 8809 licensees supervised by the Board and there were 478 registered assistants.

(2) The number of persons who applied to the board for examination.

This Board uses the Praxis Examination as its required examination and does not have its own examination process.

(3) The number who were refused examination.

(5) The number to whom initial licenses were issued.

There were 720 individuals who had not been previously licensed and were granted a full, unrestricted license by this Board.

(6) The number who applied for a license by reciprocity or comity.

386 individuals applied for a license through reciprocity.

(7) The number who were granted for a license by reciprocity or comity.

386 individuals were granted licenses through reciprocity.

(7a) The number of official complaints received involving licensed and unlicensed activities.

25 official complaints were received.

(7b) The number of disciplinary actions taken against licensees, or other actions taken against non-licensees, including injunctive relief.

The Board took 3 disciplinary actions against a licensee.

## 2 licenses were suspended or revoked

(9) The number of licenses terminated for any reason other than failure to pay the required

renewal fee.

No licenses were terminated for a reason other than failure to pay the required renewal fee.

(9a) The number of applicants for a license and, of that number, the number granted a license.

1058 individuals applied for either a temporary license, a permanent license through reciprocity or permanent license from a temporary status. Of those, 1058 were granted either a temporary or a permanent license. This number includes individuals who moved from a temporary license to a permanent license. Note that application fees are not required for individuals whose temporary year has been approved and are then eligible for a permanent license.

(9b) The number of applicants with a conviction record and, of that number, the number granted a license, denied a license for any reason, and denied a license because of a conviction.

2 applications with criminal convictions were reviewed and both were granted licenses.

(9c) The number of applicants with military training, the number granted a license, the number denied a license for any reason, and a summary of the reasons for denial. The information provided in accordance with this subdivision shall not disclose any identifying information of any applicant.

The Board received no applications from individuals who were considered active military.

(9d) The number of applicants who are military spouses, the number granted a license, the number denied a license for any reason, and a summary of the reasons for denial. The information provided in accordance with this subdivision shall not disclose any identifying information of any applicant.

The Board received 16 applications from individuals who were considered active military spouses and all were granted licensure.

The North Carolina Audiology Association has filed to amend the statute to update the North Carolina General statute governing the practice of audiology to better reflect the changes in education, experience and practice of the profession in order to enhance the health and welfare of North Carolina citizens.
