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Vital Records Serves North Carolinians

- The Office of Vital Records (OVR) is responsible for collecting, preserving and administering the North Carolina system of vital events
 - This includes birth, death, fetal death, marriage, and divorce
- In fulfilling its mission, OVR is dependent upon and collects data from multiple stakeholders:
 - Hospitals, birth facilities, and local health departments
 - Health care facilities, medical certifiers, medical examiners, local health departments, and funeral homes
 - County Registers of Deeds
 - County Clerks of court


How Vital Records Served North Carolinians in 2023


- In calendar year 2023, OVR:
 - Registered*
 - 122,011 births
 - 108,232 deaths
 - 660 fetal deaths
 - Served nearly 45,000 customers seeking copies of certificates
 - Served almost 6,000 customers requesting amendments or new certificates pursuant to adoption or other sealed process

Process to Issue Non-Digitized Records


RECORDS 1970 OR EARLIER • 45 MINUTE PROCESSING TIME PER ORDER






Process of Issuing a Non-Digitized Record

- 1 Search the DOS mainframe system to obtain microfilm cartridge identifier (Step 3B).
- 2 Output on the DOS mainframe detailing where a record is located on the microfilms (Step 3B).
- 3 Stacks of microfilms (Step 4).
- 4 Review record on microfilm, determining if it is complete and legible (Step 4).
- 5 Retrieve book of records from one of the vaults. Each book contains 500 records (Step 4A).
- 6 Opening a record book with a screwdriver. They will next flip through the book until they come to the record of interest (Step 4B).











OVR Workforce is Strained and Unsustainable

- Vital Records does not receive state appropriations
- 53 permanent positions; 24 are vacant (45%)
 - Entry level salary \$36,682
- Relies heavily on Temporary Employees
 - 10 member Call Center is 100% staffed with temporary employees; 90% turnover rate
 - Temporary employees must take furloughs and do not receive the same level of benefits
- Temporary Efforts Undertaken by OVR:
 - Hired temps and contracted staff
 - Established a second shift; worked weekends; paid overtime
 - Solicited volunteers from across DHHS workforce

Status of Death File for Calendar Year 2022

- DHHS submits vital records to the CDC daily, and closes files annually
- 2022 was a unique year Transitioned death reporting from completely paper-based to electronic
- February 16, 2023 Submitted the remainder of data and CDC closed both NC's and the national death files

Single Vital Records System

- North Carolina's Database Application for Vital Events (NCDAVE) is a single, unified system
- Electronic Death Registration was launched October 2022
 - Time to complete state registration of death decreased by 90%, from 6 months to 8 days
- Electronic Birth and Fetal Death Registration moved to NCDAVE in January 2024
- Next Steps:
 - Digitize records to improve timeliness as NCDAVE doesn't contain all paper birth records.
 - Implement remaining 3 NCDAVE modules by 2025.

Progress on Digitization

- General Assembly provided \$8 million dollars for digitization of the 11 million paper and microfilm birth records
- This was a competitive procurement
- Recommended vendor has been identified and shared with State Department of Information Technology
- Expect award to be announced this month (March 2024)

Better Tools to Improve Service

- New call center launched in May 2023
- Callers can:
 - 1) Wait for a live agent
 - December 2023 wait time was 3.84 minutes
 - 2) Opt to receive an automated return call or leave a voicemail that is automatically queued for response when an agent becomes available
 - December 2023 wait time was 12.92 minutes for automated return calls

Sustaining Progress

- Provide additional funding to raise entry level salary for positions
- Reduce reliance on temporary positions; more easily transition temps to permanent roles
- Begin and sustain progress on digitization
- Continue to improve customer services/calls to OVR by developing and enhancing technology
