Vision: To be the unmatched leader in medicolegal death investigation for the decedents and communities we serve resulting in better health, wellbeing, and safety for all North Carolinians













# Statewide Infrastructure includes OCME and Regional Facilities

### System Workload has Increased

- 2019 = 12,010 cases
- $2023 = 15,175 \text{ cases}^*$

### 26% increase in caseload

### System Workload is More Complex

# Nearly 12 people die from overdose each day in NC

- Compared to 2016 YTD
  - 594% increase in fentanyl positive deaths
- Compared to 2018 YTD
  - 63% increase in suspected overdose
  - 112% increase in fentanyl positive deaths
- Comparing January 2023 to January 2024, 391% increase in subpoenas for forensic pathologists, MEs, and toxicologists\*

<sup>\*</sup>Anticipate additional drastic increase in subpoenas to coincide with new DA autopsy death by distribution autopsies to have largest impact on testifying 1-2 years after autopsy exams

## A Successful System Requires Central OCME Stability

## Currently 45% of staff are time-limited and temporary

#### Temporary staff

- Must take furloughs
- Do not receive the same level of benefits
- Harder to sustain this model

#### Impact on workflow

- Slower turnaround times for reports, analysis, access to experts
- Significant delays in completing examinations and decedents stay longer at OCME
- Grieving families, law enforcement, and public do not receive timely responses

### **Recent Legislative Actions**

- Increased autopsy fee from \$2,800 to \$5,800 to meet the cost of autopsy examinations
  - Begins July 1, 2024
- Supported contract autopsy centers
  - Expansion of existing ECU facility plus a new facility in Union County
- Funded additional forensic pathologists
- Expanded who can be appointed as a local Medical Examiner (ME)
- Increased fee for medical transporters

### **Other Legislative Actions**

- Implemented new child toxicology testing requirements
  - Began January 2024
  - New process and additional workload already started
  - Established 2 positions funded by the legislature
- Death by distribution expanded language
  - Began December 2023
  - Allocated funds for equipment, supplies, upgrades, advanced training, temporary positions
  - Have seen an increase in autopsy cases
  - No additional positions for increased workload

### Legislatively Mandated Strategic Plan

#### Staffing Needs for NC's Medical Examiner System

Short Term Solutions	Long Term Solutions
Transition temporary/time limited roles to FTE	Support for education, training and outreach to improve future workforce pipeline
Ensure salaries are more competitive	Establish a Quality Assurance and Accountability team
Increase payment for local MEs & provide equipment	

#### **Better Data Collection & Sharing; Improved Communications**

#### **Short Term Solutions**

Launch new Medical Examiner Information System: streamlined efficiency, paperless workflows, increased case status data availability

Create a call center

Pursue further IT stabilization and automation technologies

#### **Increase Capacity for Autopsies & Exams**

#### **Long Term Solutions**

Expand OCME facility for examination, toxicology and storage

Two additional autopsy centers under purview of OCME to meet the increasing population and work volume
