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Modernizing the NC Child Care Quality Rating Improvement System

- The Quality Rating Improvement System (QRIS) is North Carolina's star rating system for early childhood education facilities.
- Families may use the star rating to make informed decisions about choosing a child care facility.
- North Carolina led the nation when it launched its Quality Rating Improvement System in 1999.
- Encourages continuous quality improvement

QRIS Modernization – Community Outreach

- Led by NC Child Care Commission QRIS Sub-Committee
- 11-month outreach effort
- Heard from 1800+ people via:
 - 8 in-person listening sessions in all regions of the state
 - 2 online listening sessions.
 - An online survey.
 - Specially designated email account.
 - Focus groups representing child care centers, family child care homes, Head Start, child care providers, before/afterschool and families.
- In addition, the Sub-Committee reviewed national research, trends and outcomes regarding QRIS standards to inform their decision-making.

QRIS Modernization – The Plan

- A choice of three Pathways to demonstrate quality
- Simplify the points-based option
- Update education standards for early childhood to expand credential options
- Additional standards for
 - continuous quality improvement for both educators and facilities
 - family/community engagement practices that promote communication and collaboration

QRIS Next Steps

- NC Child Care Commission working on rules
- NCDHHS draft legislation
 - Establishes the framework for three pathways to a star rating, and immediately implements new accreditation pathway
 - Directs the Commission to adopt, amend, and repeal all rules necessary for the implementation of the framework.
 - Extends the facility hold harmless and the education requirement hold harmless until new rules are adopted.

The Child Care Crisis – Demand > Supply

- Emergency funds run out June 2024
- Net loss of 53 sites June-December 2023*
- NAEYC survey** of NC child care programs finds:
 - -40% have raised tuition
 - 60% are experiencing a staffing shortage
 - 55% are under-enrolled due to lack of staff

Child Care Wages Lag Behind



The Need to Increase the Subsidy Rate Floor

- Subsidy serves 51,000 children statewide (8-15% of eligible children)
- Reimburses just 30–50% of the cost of classroom slot
- Child care subsidy is based on what local families can afford to pay
 - This is not cost of services
 - Falsely suppresses market rates
- Rural counties are disproportionally impacted

Current NC Pre-K Rates in Contrast

NC Pre-K is funded at 48% of what it costs to run a Pre-K slot.

Program per child	10-month (school year) Per-child Rate	
Total cost of NC Pre-K	\$11,330	
Current NC Pre-K Total average funding	\$5450	
Public Schools	\$10,791	

NC Pre-K is funded at 50% of the average public-school rate.
