COMMISSION HISTORY 2015

Background

North Carolina's share of the Master Settlement Agreement (MSA) was divided into three different parts. Under the terms of the consent decree in North Carolina, 50% of the funds are directed to a non-profit corporation, Golden LEAF, to be used for economic development in tobacco-dependent communities. By statute the remaining 50% is equally divided between two state Commissions. The Health and Wellness Trust Fund Commission utilizes their portion for health-related needs (HWTFC). The final portion is allocated to the North Carolina Tobacco Trust Fund Commission (TTFC). With the passage of the 2011 budget, the TTFC now receives funding via appropriations and the HWTFC is no longer in existence.

The TTFC was created on August 2, 2000 with the approval of House Bill 1431. The purpose of the Commission is to assist tobacco farmers, former tobacco quota holders, persons engaged in tobacco-related businesses, individuals displaced from tobacco-related employment, and tobacco product component businesses in this State due to the adverse effects of the MSA. Funds can be disbursed through **compensatory programs** and **qualified agricultural programs**.

Membership is made up of 18 people, six appointed by the Governor, six by the Speaker of the House and six by the President Pro Tem of the Senate. The board met for the first time February 15, 2001 at which the members were given their charges and sworn in.

Since November 1, 2014

The TTFC has met **four times** this past year. During these meetings, board members awarded grant funds, received grantee updates and took action on grant amendment requests.

In 2015, a total of **40** grant applications were received requesting over **\$4.5** million in funding. After a very detailed review process, the TTFC approved grants totaling **\$1,896,492** for **25** projects. The limitation of funds prevented the board from addressing many more of these worthy applications.

Even with the limitation of funds, the TTFC is very proud of the investments made this past year to help people in North Carolina continue to move forward. Below are examples of positive impacts in just a few of our ongoing projects.

- New farmers markets opened in the thriving downtown areas of Concord and Elkin, while a new diesel mechanics training facility will hold its grand opening in the Fall of 2015 in Duplin County.
- 34 schools throughout the state received grants to improve their Agricultural Education programs impacting over 3,000 students.
- NC farms continue to be safer and healthier thanks to the nationally recognized Agri-Safe NC and Certified Safe Farm programs.
- Over 500 forest landowners, farmers and industry professionals attended two "Forest Landowner Summits" to learn how to better manage over 73,000 acres of forest land.
- Through Project Skill-Up, over 700 students, farmers and food companies at 16 community colleges have received certification leading to new employment, entrepreneurship training assistance, or attended marketing/production seminars designed to increase their sales.

New enterprises are continuing to take hold, new markets are being developed, and new job opportunities are being provided. These contributions, detailed throughout this report, illustrate the passion of North Carolinians to restore prosperity to former tobacco-dependent communities and businesses. Agriculture is still a key industry in the state driving an important economic engine in the rural areas. Our state leaders have shown their ability to address current challenges and future opportunities by providing financial resources through our program that will pay dividends for years to come. On behalf of the board and the many people we serve, the TTFC thanks you for your support.

A grand opening was held in May.

This vital project helped farmers implement Phase II Risk Mitigation Measures for soil fumigants being released by the US Environmental Protection Agency in December 2012. 4 "Fit to Farm" modules were created for health providers and farmers. The project directly impacted nearly 1,300 people. Respirator fit testing sessions were conducted in nine counties. Many farms can now fit test their own employees, saving time and money. An estimated \$70,000 in cost savings for farmers was realized due to savings in equipment, training and required field signs. In addition health screenings were conducted on nearly 200 farmers to determine health-related issues.

This project will establish a nationally recognized Continuing Education Diesel Mechanic Program at James Sprunt Community College. This grant request is to build a new facility on existing land owned by Duplin County in Warsaw, NC. Mechanics will be trained and placed into high demand jobs in the region. Grant funds will be leveraged with other funders.

STATUS: Construction has proceeded during the year with a projected opening of late 2015. The construction budget is just over \$1.3 million. Partnerships with three county school systems have been established so that students can earn both high school and college credit through the Diesel Tech Academy.

This research project helped establish the feasibility of commercial production of stevia in multiple tobacco regions in eastern NC. Best management practices for conventional and organic production were researched and developed to insure highest return to growers. At the end of 2014, 14 growers were under contract for a major Stevia producer. The production is expected to grow from about 400 acres to 1,000 acres in 2016 thanks to increased interest from two major Stevia processors.

Funding for the Value-Added Cost Share program continued the activities initiated in 2008. Cost-share funding was awarded to 66 producers/producer groups or processors since the projects inception. Funding went to processors adding value to NC-Grown agricultural commodities and for producers of value-added products made from raw commodities. The funds were used to off-set the costs of specialized equipment involved in the value-adding processes directly related to the processing and/or packaging of those products. An estimated increase in annual sales of \$1.9 million was projected. Producers leverged 4304,074 of their own funds. Since 2009, nine of the companies that received assistance from feasibility studies received over \$1.2 million in federal dollars to help expand their value-added operations.

This one of a kind, two-year project helped 567 farms in nine tobacco dependent counties implement best deer herd management practices on over 75,000 acres of NC farmland. Over 330 hunters were matched with farms to implement organzied deer harvests. Results were better than expected. Over 1200 deer were harvested, with a high percentage of doe included. This will result in a substantial reduction in the present and future deer population. Over 25,000 pounds of vennison was donated to community food banks, resulting in over 100,000 meals for the hungry. Other partners included the Hunt NC Farmlands Program of the NCDA&CS, the Bonus Antlerless Deer Tag Program of NCWRC and Hunters for the Hungry.

The successful, year-round farmers market in downtown Kinston utilized grant funds to improve the surrounding grounds and expand the paved parking area. The parking lot was paved, structure was painted, new sidewalks installed and solar panels to power the market annex were installed. Vendors reported strong sales over half-million dollars for the year. Over 300 acres were impacted and over 25 yendors benefitted from the market.

The NC FFA Office offered a competitive grant program for the state's high schools. Over 50 schools applied with 35 schools winning grants of up to \$5,000. The grants were used to enhance the agricultural education programs at the schools. Projects included animal education barns, aquaculture labs, new machine shop tools/equipment and more. Over 5,000 teachers and students were impacted by the project. The project leveraged over \$56,000 in other funds/contributions also.

Farmers, their families and their workers will benefit from learning how maintaining a healthier lifestyle can reduce medical expenses. On-site health screenings, seminars and ag-related events will be utilized to reach thousands of people. Farmers in 18 counties can apply for free farm safety evaluations and can qualify for up to \$500 in cost-share funds to make safety improvements on their operations.

Over 1,000 people have received health screenings and 10 farms have undergone Certified Safe Farm audits. A new full-time person will work directly with farmers and cooperative extension agents.

The successful "Project Skill-Up" program continued at 24 community colleges. Students who had a "tobacco connection" either through direct work in the tobacco industry or through their family's previous employment qualified for tuition and/or school supply assistance. The project impacted just over 1,000 students. During the year, 384 students were re-employed in areas such as healthcare, agriculture and specialized industries.

The project will support the "Got to Be NC" marketing campaign. Cooperative marketing funds will support efforts in the grocery and foodservice industries as well as through various commodity associations.

Grant funding supported a marketing and media campaign that encouraged farmers to aggressively address weeds in row crops that are herbicide resistant. The project included digital media and statewide radio ads. In addition, farmers participating in extension-led field days and meetings heard the "Weed Free NC" message. 16,000 farmers planted soybeans across NC and a vast majority heard/saw the message. The state campaign has been closely followed by the national commodity groups who now have implemented similar programs for soybeans and other crops.

Farmers applied for cost share funds of up to \$8,000 which were used for innovative projects designed to increase farm income. The 20 awarded projects also served as demonstrations to other farmers on how they can incorporate the lessons learned. The project targeted farmers in top producing tobacco counties and gave priority to current/former tobacco farmers. Impacts from projects included 40 jobs sustained, over 1,700 acres impacted and personal farmer investments totaling over \$68,000.

Farmers in western NC counties applied for cost share funds designed to improve farm income and fund innovative ideas. 29 farmers in 20 western counties qualified for funding of either \$3,000 or \$6,000. The honor recognizes those organizations which show tremendous support towards FFA and agricultural educators. The agency was applauded for its competitive grant programs which have supported projects at over 50 high schools across the state.

Agricultural Entrepreneurship Training a Success!

Ag Education teachers from across the state have attended one of twelve, one-day sessions, designed to enhance their ability to teach entrepreneurship to their students. Originally a grant awarded to NC REAL Enterprises before its closure this past Spring, the project is now overseen by the NC Agricultural Foundation, Inc. The training is provided by NC REAL curriculum facilitators.

New Diesel Mechanics Facility Takes Shape

Construction is underway in Duplin County for the region's Diesel Mechanics Training Facility. The \$1 million+ project is overseen

by James Sprunt Community College. A \$100,000 NCTTFC grant awarded in 2012 is helping to defray construction costs. When completed, the building will serve students who plan to take on jobs with ag–related companies in the area to fulfill a skills gap for qualified mechanics that can service large trucks and other machinery.

New Farmers Markets Open!

In May the Town of Elkin celebrated the grand opening of its new market. Located at Town Hall in downtown, the open air shelter hosts 20+ vendors every Saturday. A \$75,000 NCTTFC grant in 2013 literally helped pave the way! The funds were matched with a massive resurfacing of the parking lot by the town as well as other donations. The shelter will serve other events and festivals.

The Concord Rotary Club partnered with many businesses, other non-profit foundations and the Piedmont Farmers Market Association to construct its new downtown destination. The \$350,000+ project was supported by a \$75,000 grant awarded in 2011. The facility will host other downtown events too!







The University of Mount Olive has reached over 500 people during its two Forest Landowner Summits held in Martin and Moore counties. The audience has learned valuable information on forest management, taxation and estate planning. Extension and industry professionals have shared their knowledge on a variety of topics. The project is overseen by the Lois G. Britt Agribusiness Center. Two more summits are planned in 2016.

Students Get "Down on the Farm!"

Eight NC State University students will remember the summer of 2015 as a unique learning experience. In 2014, the NC Ag Foundation received a grant to support the all new 'Developing Future NC Farmers" program. Students majoring in Agrelated degrees applied for the chance to attend specific seminars and classes during the year. The eight students selected also come from families where farming is not the main source of income. The program's goal is to give students the chance to develop their farming and business skills so that, they too, can pursue a career as farmers and farm managers. For the summer, they were also assigned an "Ag Mentor" to learn first-hand the experiences that come from running an ag business. The students spent at least 40 hours each week over two months doing everything from planting seedlings, moving hay, running equipment and tracking animal production. During the Fall, all students will submit a report and a business plan based on the skills they learned. The program continues with 10 new students in 2016.



Through our annual grant application cycle, projects are submitted during a two-month period. Goals, Objectives, Evaluations, Financials and Projected Impacts are all part of the application. ACCOUNTABILITY

Grantees must provide quarterly reports and keep the NCTTFC informed throughout the project. Site visits and documentation of all expenses are required. A final report provides details on how expected goals were met. Our Board is kept informed on the progress of all projects while under contract.

EFFICIENCY

A small staff and low overhead guarantee efficient grants management. Our projects generate results that are tracked and documented.
