

FEMA Sheltering and Housing Solutions



STEP 1

The survivor applies for FEMA assistance.

STEP 2

FEMA conducts an assessment of the survivor's application/property to ensure that damage was sustained to the applicant's primary residence.

STEP 3

The applicant is provided with FEMA sheltering and temporary housing solutions.

A survivor who is displaced because of the disaster may be eligible for one or more of the assistance options below.



Displacement Assistance provides money for immediate housing needs.



Rental Assistance provides money to pay for a temporary place to live while plans are made for more permanent housing.



Replacement
Assistance provides
money to eligible
homeowners to rebuild
or make repairs to thei
primary residence.

Lodging Expense Reimbursement provides money to reimburse for emergency lodging expenses such as a hotel or motel.



Transitional Sheltering Assistance provides payment directly to a participating hotel or motel to cover room and tax costs.



Direct Lease allows FEMA to lease residential properties as temporary housing. Properties sought for immediate rental can include single-family homes, multi-family homes, apartments, cooperatives, condominiums and town houses.



Multi-Family Lease and Repair allows FEMA to make repairs or improvements to existing multi-family rental properties located within or near declared areas to provide temporary housing.



Transportable Temporary Housing Unit (travel trailer or mobile housing unit) are available when rental assistance cannot be used due to a lack of available housing resources.

- A Case Manager Can Assist Survivors By
 - Making a recovery plan that fits their individual needs.
 - ➤ Help the survivor to find available resources.
 - Work with the survivor to navigate challenges caused by Tropical Storm Helene.
- Application for FEMA assistance is <u>NOT</u> necessary to receive assistance from NC-DCM.







No-Rise Bridge Certification

- A No-Rise Certification is necessary for bridges that are being replaced in a regulatory floodway or non-encroachment within a special flood hazard area.
- This is a federal requirement, outlined in 44 CFR 60.3(d)(3).
- No-Rise Certification is important to:
 - ➤ Ensure that a new bridge will not result in any increase in base flood elevation within a community.
 - Focuses on resilient recovery by mitigating future flood impacts by ensuing that a new bridge will not exacerbate flood water movement.
- NCEM and the NC National Flood Insurance Program do not "approve" a no-rise.
- A Professional Engineer will determine:
 - ➤ Does the No-Rise Certification for a bridge design meet FEMA guidelines?
 - ➤ Does the documentation meet the requirements in federal law?
