COMMISSION HISTORY 2016

Background

North Carolina's share of the Master Settlement Agreement (MSA) was divided into three different parts. Under the terms of the consent decree in North Carolina, 50% of the funds are directed to a non-profit corporation, Golden LEAF, to be used for economic development in tobacco-dependent communities. By statute the remaining 50% is equally divided between two state Commissions. The Health and Wellness Trust Fund Commission utilizes their portion for health-related needs (HWTFC). The final portion is allocated to the North Carolina Tobacco Trust Fund Commission (TTFC). With the passage of the 2011 budget, the TTFC now receives funding via appropriations and the HWTFC is no longer in existence.

The TTFC was created on August 2, 2000 with the approval of House Bill 1431. The purpose of the Commission is to assist tobacco farmers, former tobacco quota holders, persons engaged in tobacco-related businesses, individuals displaced from tobacco-related employment, and tobacco product component businesses in this State due to the adverse effects of the MSA. Funds can be disbursed through **compensatory programs** and **qualified agricultural programs**.

Membership is made up of 18 people, six appointed by the Governor, six by the Speaker of the House and six by the President Pro Tem of the Senate. The board met for the first time February 15, 2001 at which the members were given their charges and sworn in.

Since November 1, 2015

The TTFC has met **four times** this past year. During these meetings, board members awarded grant funds, received grantee updates and took action on grant amendment requests.

In 2016, a total of **41** grant applications were received requesting over **\$8.3** million in funding. After a very detailed review process, the TTFC approved grants totaling **\$4.5** million for **22** projects. The limitation of funds prevented the board from addressing many more of these worthy applications.

Even with the limitation of funds, the TTFC is very proud of the investments made this past year to help people in North Carolina continue to move forward. Below are examples of positive impacts in just a few of our ongoing projects.

- Through the Agri-Safe NC and Certified Safe Farm program over 12,000 farmers, family members and workers have been served so far through health educational events. Over 1,000 people have received personal health screenings and 30 farms have undergone Certified Safe Farm audits.
- 1,305 students received job training and tuitions assistance through the NC Community College Systems Project Skill-Up.
- The NC Wildlife Federation helped provide 5,200 people 75,000 meals by partnering with Hunters for the Hungry. They were able to reduce the amount of crop damage and number of deer/car accidents.
- Ag-Options has awarded 33 cost share grants in 20 Western NC counties.
 Projects featured innovative ideas using new farm equipment, refurbishing an old grist mill for agri-tourism, improved livestock handling facilities and more.
- The Soil and Water Conservation District, USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service, NC State Cooperative Extension, USDA Farm Service Agency and the NC Forest Service now occupy a new building in Yadkin County. The County Farm Bureau has also scheduled community meetings for over 100 attendies. Many college classes are utilizing the building as well, with a goal of 1,000 early college students and 5,000 corporate and continuing education programs.

New enterprises are continuing to take hold, new markets are being developed, and new job opportunities are being provided. These contributions, detailed throughout this report, illustrate the passion of North Carolinians to restore prosperity to former tobacco-dependent communities and businesses. Agriculture is still a key industry in the state driving an important economic engine in the rural areas. Our state leaders have shown their ability to address current challenges and future opportunities by providing financial resources through our program that will pay dividends for years to come. Tobacco Trust Fund awards grant to VGCC

The North Carolina Tobacco Trust Fund Commission has awarded a \$25,000 grant to Vance-Granville Community College to support students in a pair of training programs.

The grant, for a project entitled "Cultivating and Growing Agricultural Communities," will help cover the cost of tuition and other fees for eligible students in the "NC REAL Agricultural Entrepreneurship" and "Heavy Equipment Operator" courses offered by VGCC. Grant funding will also support instructional staff, marketing and supplies related to the programs.

VGCC has offered the Agricultural Entrepreneurship program at various locations, most recently at the Vance County Regional Farmers Market and the Granville County Expo & Convention Center. Heavy Equipment Operator training is held at VGCC's Warren County Campus.

While this is the first grant of its kind awarded to VGCC, the college has previously received grants from the N.C. Tobacco Trust Fund Commission as part of "Project Skill-UP." As in those previous grants, the commission's goal is to help individuals and communities adversely affected by the decline of tobacco-related employment in the region.

"We appreciate that the Tobacco Trust Fund Commission chose to support our agricultural efforts to help adults in our service area to gain new skills and in some cases, to start new careers or businesses," said Kyle Burwell, VGCC's coordinator of Human Resources Development.

The seven-week NC REAL Agricultural Entrepreneurship course is designed specifically to help local farmers and budding entrepreneurs succeed in developing profitable, environmentally-sound small farms or agricultural businesses.

One of VGCC's newest programs, Heavy Equipment Operator training takes approximately 13 weeks to complete. During the course, students gain a general understanding of the requirements necessary to operate equipment such as a motor grader, a four-wheel drive loader and backhoe, which are used both in construction and in agriculture.

Students receiving grant funding must meet certain eligibility requirements and must be residents of Vance, Granville, Franklin or Warren counties. Each student can receive up to \$250.

A new program providing grants to North Carolina farmers for new and innovative ideas that increase farm profits is being launched by the University of Mount Olive's Lois G. Britt Agricultural Center. AgPrime, which is funded by the NC Tobacco Trust Fund Commission, is designed to strengthen farms and communities that have been impacted by changes in the tobacco economy. UMO AgPrime grants are available to farmers in Cumberland, Lee, Moore, Richmond and Robeson counties.

Funding proposals up to \$10,000 will be considered for farmers who are agriculturally dependent and who have viable ideas for new and innovative agricultural projects. Priority will be given to persons who earn at least 50 percent of their personal income from their farm operation or agribusiness entity, and to current and former tobacco farmers or former quota holders.

Dr. Sandy Maddox, Director of the UMO Agricultural Center, encourages farmers in the targeted counties to apply for funding. "This program is designed to help farmers test creative ideas, implement new marketing strategies and keep more profit closer to the farm gate," Maddox said. "We are excited to partner with the NC Tobacco Trust Fund Commission to bring this important program to the farmers in Cumberland, Lee, Moore, Richmond, and Robeson counties."

The Harrells Christian Academy FFA Chapter was recently awarded a grant from the North Carolina Tobacco Trust Fund Commission. On April 21, the chapter hosted a check presentation in conjunction with the HCA Spring Fling. Jason Davis, the North Carolina State FFA Coordinator, presented the check to the HCA FFA chapter on behalf of the North Carolina Tobacco Trust Fund Commission.

The grant monies, which totaled \$4,993.50, were used to help offset the costs of the equipment inside of the new 35-foot by 72-foot greenhouse facility through the purchase of tables, water hoses, planting materials, and supplies for a mum growing area.

This grant was a portion of an ongoing capital fundraising campaign that will fund an agriculture education complex at Harrells Christian Academy. Once completed, the complex will include three acres of land, the already-completed greenhouse, and a hunter safety range. Future plans for the agriculture education complex include an agriculture mechanics shop as well as a forestry range.

Grant awarded for renovations

SHELBY - The Cleveland County Fair was awarded a \$110,348 grant from the North Carolina Tobacco Trust Fund Commission to finance critical repairs on Tuesday.

The money will be used to make repairs to the Dorton Exhibit Hall, the Weathers Livestock Arena, the Poultry Barn and the Farm Adventures Building, along with ten permanent food vending structures on the grounds.

Greg Traywick, Cleveland County extension director for the N.C. Cooperative Extension, wrote the grant proposal on behalf of the fair. Traywick said the grant money will allow the fair to sustain its ability to showcase agriculture and promote agribusiness in Cleveland County and the surrounding area.

"Some of the buildings on the fairgrounds here were built in the 1930s and the 1940s. That adds a lot of nostalgia and history and charm to our fairground," Traywick said. "They've served us well and can continue to, but a lot of those need some critical repair so they can stay viable and functional to serve the needs of the fair and the public."

Local agricultural and political leaders gathered in the Weathers Livestock Arena on Tuesday afternoon for a presentation of the grant, including Speaker of the House Tim Moore, Senator Warren Daniel and Rep. Kelly Hastings.

Moore spoke about his experiences at the Cleveland County Fair over his life. As a Kings Mountain native, Moore said he has been attending since he was a child.

"This community really does support this fair," Moore said. "I want to say, to the folks on the Tobacco Trust Fund Commission, this is money well spent."

Bill Teague, chairman of the North Carolina Tobacco Trust Fund Commission, said gratitude is owed to the elected officials like Moore who help make the fund possible.

In its 92-year history, Teague said, the Cleveland County Fair has become one of the most outstanding county fairs in the state. According to Teague, the money from the Tobacco Trust Fund will assure that the positive message of farming culture will continue to be passed on to Cleveland County citizens for years to come.

The Cleveland County Fair was established in 1924, and is meant to showcase and promote agriculture, agribusiness, arts, crafts and culture of Cleveland County and the surrounding region.

The fair works to accomplish its mission by sponsoring twelve competitive livestock shows, four livestock and poultry judging contests, judged entries in twenty-one different departments and a variety of live animal and farm product displays and demonstrations.

Hunting for Those in Need

An innovative program keeps deer populations in check while feeding the needy

This hunting season, some deer hunters are targeting hunger through an innovative initiative that feeds impoverished people in need.

The Farmers and Communities
Manage Deer (FCMD) program
encourages licensed hunters to
harvest white-tailed deer and
donate them to drop-off sites and

participating processing facilities. After processing and packaging, the venison is distributed to local relief organizations that welcome the lean, protein-rich meat.

At Food Bank of the Albemarle, a regional food clearing house based in Elizabeth City, Della Hicks comes in weekly to educate clients about venison. A nutritionist with the Pasquotank County Cooperative Extension office, Hicks prepares and shares recipes such as stews and chilies.

"A lot of clients were hesitant since they hadn't had venison before," says Rod Sershen, the bank's food resource manager. "But they said they couldn't tell the difference between it and beef."

Over the past two deer seasons, more than 23,000 pounds of venison burger (roughly 75,000 servings) has been distributed where communities have embraced the program. Originally funded for five eastern counties in 2012, there are currently 11 counties now with donation sites: Beaufort, Bladen, Columbus, Edgecombe, Franklin, Hyde, Jones, Pasquotank, Washington, Wayne and Wilson. The program addresses two big problems: human hunger and costly damage by deer. North Carolina has regularly ranked within the top lists for the highest percentage of its citizens experiencing food shortages in the nation since 2010. In 2015, it ranked 13 in the U.S. for food hardship, according to a Food Research & Action Center study.

Concerns about controlling the deer population include potential spread of disease and dangerous vehicle collisions. Annually, deer cause the vast majority of \$30 million in crop loss suffered by N.C. row crop farmers.

Farmers who participate in the program, allowing hunters access to their land, can reduce the potential for crop damage and

can profit from hunting programs developed through FCMD. Hunters typically pay a minimum of \$75 for a doe hunt, for example. A number of participating landowners, such as Lumber River Outdoors and Rutaa Branch Hunting Club, both based in Cerro Gordo, offer lodging and other outdoor recreation opportunities for added fees. Communities also enjoy an economical boost when visiting hunters purchase gas, eat at local restaurants and buy supplies.

"We can help landowners establish hunting programs and implement community deer donation sites as well. There are a number of options," says program manager Liz Rutledge. Rutledge is a wildlife specialist with the NC Wildlife Federation, which oversees FCMD.

Insured groups willing to assist farmers by conducting free organized fall hunts on their properties include the NC Bowhunters Association (ncbowhunter.com) and Cross Trail Outfitters, a ministry group with chapters across the state that mentors youth through hunting (teamcto.org).

FCMD relies on community organizations and businesses, including churches, civic groups

and hunt clubs, to maintain deer drop-off donation centers and provide financial support for the program. Groups, farmers and other landowners can host community festivals, wild game dinners and deer donation events to raise funds and otherwise assist the program.

Financial support for FCMD comes from the NC Tobacco Trust Fund Commission. FCMD partners with The NC Hunters for the Hungry, Inc.®, a nonprofit organization founded in 1993 (nchuntersforthehungry.org). This integral collaboration leverages several resources, including the provision of numerous NCDA&CS inspected deer processing facilities.
