On October 10, 2024, Session Law 2024-51 passed to address challenges emerging from the impact of Hurricane Helene. Part 8, Section 8.3(a) authorized the State Board of Education to allow for educator preparation program candidates engaged in their student teaching experience to have the requirement deemed completed if they were either enrolled in an EPP or placed in a partner school located in a county declared a major disaster area under the Stafford Act (P.L. 93-288) as a result of Hurricane Helene. This report provides the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee (JLEOC) the information required in Part 8, Section 8.3(b) of that law that describe the scope of this waiver's impact.

SECTION 8.3.(b) By February 1, 2025, any EPP with an enrolled student who has his or her clinical internship requirement deemed completed pursuant to subsection (a) of this section shall report to the State Board of Education with the following information:

- (1) Number of students who had the clinical internship requirement deemed completed.
- (2) Reasons for a clinical internship requirement being deemed completed.
- (3) Amount of time completed for a clinical internship.
- (4) Any other information required by the State Board of Education.

Table 1 provides the reporting requirements of this waiver for the JLEOC. A total of 145 students were reported to have had their clinical internship requirement impacted by the hurricane impacts from 6 educator preparation programs. Of those, a total of 142 needed the waiver to complete the 16-week student teaching requirement in § 115C-269.25.(d) (response to question 2). Educator preparation programs reported an average of 15 weeks of student teaching completed for these candidates. In one case, a student was only able to complete a total of nine weeks of student teaching.
